#### CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

#### FIRST SITTING

The Ninth Annual Conference of the Arizona-New Mexico District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was convened at the call of Superintendent Crosser. Rev. John Dunn, pastor of the host church, welcomed the annual conference.

Rev. Alvin Ransom led the assembled group in singing "I Love To Tell The Story." Several spontaneous testimonies were given. Rev. John Garver led in prayer followed by Mr. Don Little.

Superintendent Crosser introduced Dr. Hawkins as presiding officer.

Dr. Hawkins read a portion of scripture from Hebrews the 6th Chapter. His subject was entitled "Let Us Go On." In his message, to the conference he emphasized that sanctification is only the beginning. We must go on. He likened our walk in Christian Grace to the children of Israel after crossing the Jordan River. He refreshed our memories that many giants, many cities, and many obstacles were ahead of them as they are ahead of us today. "WE MUST GO ON."

Rev. Hawkins told us that we as Christians must always be searching for growth and new spiritual truth. The church must likewise grow and progress spiritually. In relation to the church he stated that, "the church must always reach out." He emphasized that we may not attain the power, fame and finance of some churches, but he quickly added that "we may excel in spiritual development and progress." "LET US GO ON."

He states, "The flaming fires of Pentecost will energize us to reach as many as we can with the Gospel. With a determined purpose, we will take the Gospel to those about us with a word of witness or a helping hand." "Let us Go On in this holy endeavor."

He closed his address by saying that the writer of the Hebrew letter has meaning for us today. "LET US GO ON." This we will do by God's Grace.

The roll of ministers and delegates was called.

A motion carried to seat the following in the absence of duly elected delegates: Naomi Gastin, Jeanette Baldwin and Sue Churchwell.

A motion carried to designate the platform and the first 5 rows of seats as the conference bar.

By motion, the schedule of sessions was set as follows: 9:00-11:30 a.m., 1:30-5:00 p.m., 7:00 p.m. until business is completed.

A motion carried to accept the transfers of the following: Rev. and Mrs. W. A. Elkins, ordained ministers from the Rocky Mountain District, Rev. Edwin Diggs, an ordained minister from the Kansas District, Rev. Burt Mead, an ordained minister from the East Michigan District, and Rev. Alvin Ransom, a licensed minister from the Michigan District. A further motion carried to accept the following transfers pending receipt of official letters: Rev. John Garver, an ordained minister of the Penn.-New Jersey District, Rev. Dale Rummel, an ordained minister of the Rocky Mountain District, Rev. Eugene Zerby, an ordained minister of the Pittsburgh District and Rev. David Miller, a licensed minister of the East Michigan District.

District Superintendent Crosser presented his annual report to the conference. It was accepted with a rising vote of appreciation to the Superintendent.

The auditor's report was read and approved.

Alvin Ransom, John Garver, David Miller and Lowell Downey were appointed as usher-tellers for the conference.

The District Treasurer, Denzel Clouse, read the financial report. A motion carried to accept this report with a hearty "Amen."

The Statistician gave the summary totals of his report. It was approved as read.

The Sunday School Promotion Secretary, Dale Rummel, gave a summary of the District Sunday School work. A motion carried to accept this report.

The Pastor's reports were given and received by a rising vote of appreciation.

Prayer was offered for Herman E. Underwood, who has been seriously ill of late.

By motion carried, the first sitting adjourned.

#### SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference was called to order by singing "I've Anchored in Jesus."

Prayer was offered by H. C. Fridenmaker.

The minutes of the first sitting were approved as read.

Melvin Lockard, Secretary of the Educational and Examining Board, read the committee report which was approved as read.

An appropriate memorial service was given by the Memoirs Committee in honor of deceased members and friends of Pilgrim Churches. After a special song in honor of those departed and reading of the Scriptures by M. E. Waddell, their report concluded with a memorial prayer by Dr. R. C. Hawkins.

The Conference Action Committee reported through its chairman, Melvin Lockard.

Resolutions # 1,2,3,4 were adopted by motions carried.

Resolution # 5 was amended to read "2 or more." The amendment was approved by motion carried. The resolution lost by a vote of 18 to 13.

Resolution # 6 ruled out of order.

Resolution # 7 was approved by motion carried.

Resolution # 8-e, paragraph 6, item 1, was amended to read quarterly in the place of weekly or monthly. Carried.

Resolution #8-e, paragraph 2, amended by deleting "and to re-establish the annual camp meeting." Carried.

Resolution # 8 carried as amended.

The chairman declared a recess at 3:45 with Rev. Brown offering prayer.

Conference reconvened at the appointed time for the purpose of ordaining Lowell Downey and Alvin Ransom to the ministry.

M. E. Waddell led the assembly in singing "Rock of Ages" after which W. A. Elkins led in prayer. Superintendent Crosser presented the ordinands to the conference and Dr. Hawkins. The assembly sang "A Charge to Keep I Have." Pass—10—

ages of scripture were read by John A. Dunn, Melvin Lockard and M. E. Waddell. Dr. R. C. Hawkins delivered the ordination message and gave the charge to the candidates. Members of the ordination council laid hands on the candidates as Dr. Hawkins prayed for each one.

The conference sang "The Doxology" and "Blest Be The Tie That Binds," as the newly ordained ministers were congratulated.

The conference adjourned with a prayer of dismissal given by Dr. Hunt.

#### THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the conference was called to order by Superintendent Crosser. Rev. David Miller led in prayer.

The minutes of the second sitting were approved as read. Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

M. E. Waddell was elected on the first ballot.

A ballot for District Treasurer was cast using the Council nominees, Reverend Melvin Lockard and Mr. Denzel Clouse. Mr. Denzel Clouse was elected on the first ballot.

A ballot was cast for Advisory member to the Coundil. Melvin Lockard was elected on the first ballot.

A ballot for a three year term as member of the Educational and Examining Board was cast. Council nominees were Dale Rummel and Eugene Zerby. Dale Rummel was elected on the first ballot.

Council nominees for a three year term on the Board of Trustees were Elwood Hunter and Bruce Collins. Elwood Hunter was elected on the first ballot.

Superintendent Crosser read the committee appointments for the new conference year.

Invitations were accepted to host the annual conference, May 18, 1965 from Tucson First Church and Tempe.

A final resolution from the Conference Action Committee was read from the floor by Melvin Lockard as follows: BE IT RESOLVED that by a rising vote we express our deep appreciation to Dr. R. C. Hawkins for his outstanding and efficient chairmanship of this annual conference, to the Calvary Church

and pastor for their hospitality and to District Superintendent H. R. Crosser for his faithful and effective leadership. Motion carried with a rising vote of thanks.

Following announcements, conference adjourned with the prayer of dismissal given by C. J. Meyers.

#### CONFERENCE REPORTS

ADDRESS OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT TO THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE SESSION--April 28, 1964

Christian greetings to our presiding officer, Doctor R.C. Hawkins, General Secretary of Church Extension, my ministerial brethren, and to the lay delegates and friends assembled for our ninth annual conference.

It is a joy to be assembled here to do kingdom business. We will want to do it in the most effective and efficient way possible. It almost goes without saying that this conference will be given over primarily to a consideration of "the stuff of which church work is made." But we must never forget that the work of the church is not composed alone of church rolls, Sunday School averages, programs, building and promotion, but the essence of all this effort is flesh and blood and pulsating life that will live on forever through eternity.

I must confess I am most interested in a revival of vital spirituality. I am persuaded that a mechanistic approach alone can never produce prime results. Only when our plans are salted with tears and punctuated with a groan of holy anxiety can we see real advance in the church. As a result I call this people to fasting and prayer, to become a society of men and women with a passionate concern for the lost—to be a people helping to carry the cross of human woe and degradation and, as a result leaving its mark on society. At the same time, while we carry the burden of an immoral and lost age, we must make our message meaningful and relevant to a civilization fast becoming heathen and materialistic.

Every vestige of Pharisaism must be done to the death.

I call our ministers to be men who will not come down from their exalted calling. They must be like Nehemiah and feel their work is the greatest work. They must, as Nehemiah of old did, ask this question of all and sundry who fear and tremble, "Should the work cease?" How Satan would like to answer this himself; however it is not for him but the church must do the replying. How will the church ansswer? With all reason for grateful obedience she can only respond to the challenges of the hour. The work must go on. It will go on. With faith and action the future is ours!

The Lord's work, dear people of God, must be our life. We must be gripped with an arresting awareness of purpose. While others sigh and hope we must pray and work. With a sense of mission we must arise and build God's work. Actually, if the work ceases and we lose holy momentum, it can only be traced to lost vision, lost heart, lost sense of purpose, and failure to utilize the power of the Holy Spirit.

I call all of you to faith and militancy and say in the words of another, "Christian purpose is not negotiable, Christian sense of duty is not a matter of compromise or conference." I have discovered that if God has assigned a task to me there is nothing to talk about. The church at its best has always refused to exchange work for talk.

Actually in carrying out our God-assigned tasks without quibble we safeguard ourselves from moral corruption. Our holy activity is our security. Because we refuse to come down God bears us up. And the work will be done.

The General Church has believed in this effort in our great Southwest. It has subsidized us for some eighty years. In this length of time we have grown from six churches, 179 members and a Sunday School average of 400 to the point today where there are 15 churches and preaching points, 463 members and 827 in Sunday School. To my great sorrow these later figures are lower than last year with a decrease of 28 members and 96 in Sunday School average. There was an increase of one church.

Financially we have progressed far beyond the most sanguine hopes of the founding years. From the first figure of \$39,906.00 we have progressed to this years total of \$97,655.14. More was given to denominational interests and our own zone college this year than was invested by the Gen-

eral Church through allocation. Our property valuation has risen from a total of \$90,500.00 with an equity of \$76,500.00 to \$594,100.00 and an equity of \$363,815.89.

All of this augurs well for the future. But it also points in the direction of added responsibilities and less and less dependence on the General Church. Just as local churches are weened from the subsidy list and become self-sufficient, so this district must by a gradual process assume more and more of the cost of administering its own affairs and enlarging its borders. This can be done if we have the mind to do it and the most likely method seems to be through the pastor's tithe.

One of the best ways of growing up is for everybody to pay up. The present budget setup this year should have produced about \$2,000.00 more than was collected. This would have allowed us to pay in full our U.S.F. to the General Church. As it was we paid \$1,000.00—the highest amount in our history and a 67% increase over last year. The following churches are to be commended for their budget payments: Yuma overpaid; Phoenix First, Tucson First, Phoenix West, each paid 100%; Tempe and Phoenix Mountain View made commendable payments.

As far as our physical plants are concerned this was an interesting year of awakening for most of our churches. In many places we either discovered or faced up to the fact that the saturation point had been reached in the realm of Sunday School attendance. It has been a rude awakening but our people have not bowed to these circumstances. As a result the following has happened:

Phoenix First, the "mother church" of our district, recently purchased two and a half acres at Lincoln Drive and 21st Street with an option to buy more land in a year.

Two acres of land for future relocation of Phoenix Calvary is being acquired at 1702-1714 N. 36th Street.

Progressive steps have also been taken in providing pastoral lodging and support. Apache Junction has just finished a fine new parsonage. Tempe has voted to build a parsonage and is rapidly reaching the point of launching construction.

Three churches are on the verge of giving their pastors substantial support so that they will not have to do secular work. A fourth has taken a big stride in this direction.

The largest membership gain was experienced at Phoenix West. God visited this church with a mighty revival and glorious conversions. The visitation of the Spirit of God has given this congregation spiritual and numerical stature, and has provided an object lesson in the surest method of progress and growth.

We can take just pride in the District Missionary and Youth Organizations. The ladies have just voted in their conference to subsidize the work in Roswell, New Mexico with the sum of \$500.00. This is a marvelous and loyal action on their part. They are leading the way for this conference to take similar actions. We have a great group of young people who give sparkle and tone to every phase of the work. The youth camp is always a highlight of the conference year.

As we look to the tomorrows I am reminded that "Except the Lord build the house they labor in vain that build it..." In the fear of God I am proposing a Two Year Plan to the conference that will culminate in a tenth anniversary celebration. The basic growth pattern is to be 10% in every area of activity in the local church. The District goals are as follows: Churches and preaching points—20, (18 organized); Church membership—600; Sunday School enrollment—1600; Sunday School average attendance 1200; income \$120,000.00. These goals are not formidable. In the light of the great need this will be so little.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S PERSONAL REPORT

I have ministered 96 times, conducted 11 prayer services, and have seen a number of souls seeking God in three weekend meetings. I assisted at two funerals and dedicated five children.

It was my privilege to make 91 visits to the churches and had 84 conferences with pastors. I presided over six council meetings, 13 annual meetings, 31 board meetings, five district committee meetings, eight congregational meetings, a youth conference, a missionary society conference, a ministerial convention, and one ground breaking as well as serving as Director of Workshops at the Western Regional Sunday School Convention.

In the course of my duties I attended the Superintendents Conference, hosted the Church Extension Superintendent's

Conference, attended on Central Pilgrim College Board Meeting and four executive Committee Meetings of the same institution, edited three issues of the district paper AD-VANCE, taught four classes at Youth Camp, did Church Extension Deputation work for about two weeks, and conducted four installation services.

I have traveled 24,500 miles for the District and 25,500 miles for the zone and General Church. My salary has been paid in full. It has been a great joy to serve God and the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

That we establish a Contingency Fund, this money to accrue from 1% of the active ministers total income (ministerial and secular), to be forwarded to the District Treasurer from the local church and allocated as follows: one-half  $(\frac{1}{2})$  to the International Conference Fund and one-half  $(\frac{1}{2})$  to the District United Stewardship Fund.

e. INASMUCH as the District Indebtedness program is vitally necessary to liquidate the district debt and IN-ASMUCH as such a program needs increased interest along with advanced promotion to maintain and increase its effectiveness in accomplishing its purpose more fully, and WHEREAS the present resolution which infers that gruesome word "ASSESSMENTS" in the words (\$5.00 per assessable member), the following workable program to accomplish the desirable end of the District Indebtedness program is suggested:

# STANDING RESOLUTIONS OF PREVIOUS CONFERENCES

#### LOCAL CHURCH

- l. The local churches shall provide modern cooling, cooking and heating facilities for the parsonage, the type of facilities to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated, and all churches in the conference shall pay the utilities for the parsonages.
- 2. Each local church is urged to raise a subscription list

to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate equal to its total member-ship.

- 3. BE IT RESOLVED that all local indebtedness involving an expenditure of more than \$500, where financing is involved, be approved by the District Council. (1960)
- 4. BE IT RESOLVED that all non-Pilgrim Evangelists must first have the approval of the District Superintendent or the District Council before being called for evangelistic activity in our churches. (1960)
- 5. BE IT RESOLVED that no church may borrow from its pastor, nor may any pastor underwrite loans for a church so as to make himself legally responsible as an individual, without the prior consent of the District Council. (1961)

#### CONFERENCE

- l. The district council and the following committees and boards shall meet at least 30 days prior to the Annual Conference to take care of such work as they have at hand. Conference Action Committee and the Educational and Examining Board.
- 3. In order that the relatives and friends may know the set time for the ordaining of ministers, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Ordination Service take place at 4:00 p.m. the first day of Conference. (1957)
- 3. The Educational and Examining Boards shall be combined and this Board shall consist of three members, one being elected for a period of three years, one for a period of two years and one for one year.
- 4. There shall be a memoirs committee which shall annually list departed members by name, date of decease, and church, for inclusion in the Conference Journal. In the case of ministers, there shall be a picture and a brief resume of ministerial labors.
- 5. BE IT RESOLVED that the district furnish credential forms to each local church conference delegate and alternate to be filled out and signed by the pastor and the church secretary, and sent to the district secretary at least 30 days prior to Conference. (1959)
- 6. BE IT RESOLVED that the District Trustees and the Statistician be made permanent members of the District Conference. (1959)

- 7. INASMUCH as there is such close correlation between the work of the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee: THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that there be an appointment of a Conference Action Committee of 5 members, which would combine the functions and capacities of the Resolutions and the Ways and Means Committees. (1960)
- 8. BE IT RESOLVED that there be an appointment of a Building Appraisal Committee: (competent in the field of Appraisal) the function of which shall be to set the value of all church property. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the appointment of this committee be made bi-annually, for the purpose of making a general appraisal of all local church and district property bi-annually. AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all properties acquired between these appraisals shall be carried as tentatively appraised by the District Council, until the next general appraisal. (Revised 1961)
- INASMUCH AS Resolution #6, p. 16 of the 1960 Conference Journal carried and provides that all resolutions and ways and means actions be classified both in presentation and in publication. BE IT RESOLVED that the following general classification, "Report of the Conference Action Committee" and "Standing Resolutions of Previous Conferences", be applied to all past and present conference legislation and BE IT FUR-THER RESOLVED that the present "Standing Rules" heading be abolished, and legislation of previous conferences currently listed under this heading be classified under "Standing Resolutions of Previous Conferences" and, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following specific classifications be applied to all past, present and future legislation: LOCAL CHURCH, CONFER-ENCE, DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, MINISTERIAL, DISTRICT COUNCIL, BUDGET, CAMP, SUNDAY SCHOOL, YOUTH, MISSIONARY ORGANIZATIONS. (1961)
- 10. WHEREAS the District Council has recommended the moving of the Arizona-New Mexico District into the "ADVANCED LEVEL," THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this conference approve the promotion of the Arizona-New Mexico District into the "AD-VANCED LEVEL STATUS." (1962)
- 11. BE IT RESOLVED that the conference year of the Arizona-New Mexico District shall begin April 1 and end March 31 the following year, and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician by April 15. (1962)

12. WHEREAS the District Conference expenses for pastors and delegates is to be paid by the local churches, and WHERE-AS this creates a disadvantage for the churches at greater distances from the place of conference, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the total expense for District Officers, pastors and delegates be pro-rated and paid on a basis similar to the General Conference system, for automobile travel. (1962) 13. WHEREAS the District Superintendent has presented the Quadrennial Pattern for Progress for the 1962-66 period to all pasters and churches of our district, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Pattern for Progress be adopted by the Conference. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following goals be adopted as the Local Church and Conference Goals for the coming year: 1. Pattern for Progress Growth Standards - 10% Sunday School Gains, 10% Church Membership Gains, 10% Local Church Financial Gains. 2. Fostering of Youth Society, Women's Missionary Society, Men for Missions, and creation of Christian Youth Crusades. 3. Lay Visitation Evangelism in each Local Church. 4. New Missions, Branch Sunday Schools and Prayer Meetings throughout the District. 5. Use of Probationary and Junior Membership programs. 6. Payment of all budgets in full and by the month. (1962)

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. BE IT RESOLVED that the District pay \$200.00 per month on salary of the District Superintendent; BE IT FURTHER RE-SOLVED, that the District Superintendent be remunerated for meals and lodging incidental to travel. (Revised 1963)

#### MINISTERIAL

- l. Before licensed or ordained ministers coming from other churches shall be received into the local church, the pastor shall consult with the District Superintendent and Council regarding said minister.
- 2. Each pastor is to be granted a two weeks vacation with full salary.
- 3. INASMUCH as several of our districts have a group hospitalization, surgical, and medical insurance plan, and since a number of the district pastors have expressed a

desire for such a plan, BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we accept the Blue Cross. Blue Shield group hospitalization, surgical and medical plan. AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the churches pay \$5.00 per month to be applied to the pastor's premium, and the district pay \$5.00 per month to be applied to the District Superintendent's premium. lution is recommended first for discussion by the committee with the added recommendation that the lay delegation be given the privilege of discussion. (1959 - Revised 1962) 4. BE IT RESOLVED that when ministers come to this district from other denominations, that the Executive Officer of the transferring minister be contacted by the District Superintendent asking for a recommendation, to be in the hands of the District Council at least 30 days prior to moving date. AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the transferring minister be interviewed by the District Council prior to reception of his credentials. (1959)

#### DISTRICT COUNCIL

- 1. BE IT RESOLVED that each council member be paid 5 cents per mile for travel expense to and from council meetings and that when several members travel in one car, the driver be paid an additional one cent per mile for each council member travelling with him. (Amended 1961)
- 2. WHEREAS those who serve as District Secretary and District Treasurer must devote considerable time to their duties, and INASMUCH AS other districts comparable in size to our district pay their Secretary and Treasurer token remunerations, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the yearly honorarium for the District Secretary be \$60.00 and the District Treasurer \$75.00. (1962 Revised 1964)

#### BUDGET

1. BE IT RESOLVED that all monies raised in local churches for district, general or Bible College purposes be disbursed through the District Treasurer, and only such monies as are processed accordingly may be credited to the local churches on the District Treasurer's report.

ALSO SEE CURRENT LEGISLATION.

#### CAMP

- 1. WHEREAS it appears that the cost of owning and maintaining a camp ground is prohibitive; BE IT RESOLVED, that the Conference instruct the Council to take steps to dispose of the real property on the camp ground and that the proceeds be applied as follows: 1. Satisfy the claims of cabin owners, 2. Camp ground indebtedness, 3. Balance if any to be put in a Camp Fund. (1960)
- 2. BE IT RESOLVED that the district promote a week-end summer camp meeting on rented grounds beginning in July of 1964. (1963)

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL

1. BE IT RESOLVED that the work of the District Sunday School Board be financed by offerings from the District camp Sunday School and Sunday School conventions, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED if a need for additional funds for this Board arises, a request shall be made to the District Council for appropriation (1961)

#### YOUTH

l. INASMUCH AS the need for activity among our youth is so great, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that at least six Zone Youth Rallies be held during the conference year in each Zone, with the responsibility of planning and implementing these rallies to be cared for by the elected Zone committee. (1961)

#### MISSIONARY RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

# APRIL 27, 1964

1. BE IT RESOLVED, that we adopt the following as BY LAWS instead of a Constitution.

NAME - There shall be an organization within the District known as the WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF ARIZONA-NEW MEXICO. PURPOSE - The purpose of the organization shall be to foster and coordinate the work of the local church societies within our churches.

OFFICERS - The officers of the organization shall be: The District President, who shall direct the functions; District Vice-President, who shall assist the president and should necessity demand it, succeed to that office through the course of the year; Secretary-Treasurer, who shall keep records and finances for the organization; and two members at large. These five persons shall constitute the MISSIONARY SOCIETY BOARD and shall direct executive affairs.

MEMBERSHIP - Membership in the organization shall be defined

<u>MEMBERSHIP</u> - Membership in the organization shall be defined in the Constitution for the local church society, 1962 Manual, Section 77, Paragraph 7. MEETINGS - District Meetings may be held at such times as deemed advisable by the Missionary Society Board. However, all meetings shall have the approval of the District Courcil or the District Superintendent.

ELECTIONS - Annually the organization shall meet to elect The District President shall be elected from its officers. two or more nominees provided by the District Council. Other officers shall be elected from among the active members. The electing body shall be constituted of the officers of the previous year. all Pilgrim ministers wives, ordained deaconnesses, and local missionary society presidents, and one delegate from each society for each 10 members or major frastion thereof. Each church shall be allowed at least one delegate. The officers shall be elected for the term of one year, and shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified. The District Superintendent or his representative shall preside at the meeting of election. SUPERVISION - All activities and projects shall be subject to the approval of the District Council.

FINANCES - The organization shall not levy assessments upon the local churches or the societies. It may, however, ask for offerings from the local societies.

AMENDMENTS - These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at the Annual Business meeting. All amendments must be in keeping with the Church Manual. (Carried)

- 2. BE IT RESOLVED that each church be notified by the secretary concerning an offering for district missionary expense such as: travel, correspondence and etc. The time for raising this offering is to be decided by the executive board. (Carried)
- 3. BE IT RESOLVED that we pay  $5\phi$  per mile to each member of the Executive Board when they travel to board meetings. (Carried)
- 4. BE IT RESOLVED that the executive board choose two other members to serve as a committee which will present new resolutions to our conference each year. (Carried)
- 5. WHEREAS the Missionary Societies are definitely interested in the spiritual welfare of our youth and co-operating with the activities of the Youth Camp, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that each Society President actively work in con-

junction with the pastor and local youth president to encourage and assist financially and otherwise all young people to attend Youth Camp. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the District Missionary President contact the local presidents each year to encourage the societies to back this worth while effort. (Carried)

6. WHEREAS the Scholarship Fund has met with generous response for several years, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we adopt this as a district project for the month of September. The amount to be raised will be in accordance with the semester tuition, taking into consideration a possibility of increase from year to year. Any amount in excess of this is to be used as a gift to the school. (Tabled)

7. WHEREAS the District Council is laying plans to start a new church in Roswell, New Mexico, June 1st and WHEREAS it is our desire, as members of the Missionary Societies, to encourage missionary activity on the home front, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we underwrite the Home Missionary Pastor's salary, Rev. and Mrs. Willard Metz, in the amount of \$500.00 in 1964-1965. To raise said amount, BE IT RESOLVED that we set a goal of \$3.00 per member for each missionary society to reach during the year. This amount due bi-annually, namely - October and February. Goals for Missionary Societies are based on membership records reported at the 1963 conference and are as follows:

The Rev. Alvin Ransom invoked the Lord's blessings upon the conference.
