Moved and supported that the assembly bar include all the seats in the room except the last two rows.

Rev. Geo. C. Wise was appointed Assistant Secretary.

Moved and supported that the time of the assembly be set from nine to eleven forty-five A. M. and from two to four P. M.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the California District, greetings.

This has been a very busy year for me but we want to thank the Lord for the help He has given and the grace and victory that has been ours throughout the year.

We have spent much time in looking after work that needed to be done on the school buildings and grounds, have also been Dean of the boys' dormitory which has kept me from giving as much time to the district as I would like to have done. We want to thank the Pastors and District Officers for their co-operation and help in getting the quarterly and yearly reports to us so that we are able to have practically a complete roll call and statistical report ready before the assembly convened. Bro. Roper has given much time to the secretary work of the district and on the statistical report.

Our Phoenix Church has almost doubled in membership this year. Bro. Nering, who has been the faithful pastor since its organization is leaving for evangelistic work and Bro. and Sr. H. H. Bolender of the Rocky Mountain District have been called to pastor the class. We welcome them to the District.

Our Ventura church is growing. They have purchased seats, songbooks and piano and are now adding three new Sunday school rooms. Most of the churches have had profitable revivals during the year.

In the eight revivals held both on and off the district this year we have had over 300 professions, have received 12 new members, baptized 6 new converts and secured a number of subscriptions to the PILGRIM HOLINESS ADVOCATE.

I have preached 233 times, visited all the churches on the district, most of them each quarter, and attended many board meetings. I have traveled a total of 19,000 miles by boat, train and auto at an expense of over \$600.00.

The district has given us for support \$638.26. Received from revivals \$507.61. Total amount received for the year \$1145.87. Once more we want to praise God from whom all blessings flow.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S SUPPORT AND EXPENSES

For the expenses of the District Superintendent we, your committee, further recommend an additional thirty days be added to the above leave of absence for revival work and that he be instructed to visit the churches twice a year instear of quarterly with the exceptions of the Newburg, Oregon, and Phoenix, Arizona churches which he shall visit only once.

Your committee after careful consideration of the matter before us reports as follows:

1. We heartily agree with the plan which has been suggested and published in a recent issue of the PILGRIM HOLINESS ADVOCATE that there should be a correlation of church boards, the object being to save over-much-travel of members of the board, besides unnecessary expense to the church.

2. We recommend that the ministerial delegation shall be selected at the ration of one to ten instead of one to five. Sec. 28.

3. We recommend to do away with quarterly reports as burdensome and unnecessary. Sec. 49, Para. 3.

4. We recommend that the ratio of lay delegates shall be chosen from the local churches of the district at the ratio of one to every one hundred and fifty members or fraction thereof, no district to have less than one. Sec. 28.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The one great parting command of our Lord was that His disciples should preach and teach the Gospel in all the world and to every creature. This, therefore, should be the primary occupation of the church, and until it is completely accomplished all else must be subservient to it.

In this present age practically all the larger denominations are retrenching along foreign missionary lines; their offerings are diminishing and their missionaries sent to the field are fewer in number than in previous years. This virus of the retrenching spirit has spread to a number of the Holiness churches and thus while through lack sacrifice and faith the armies of the Living God are beaten back before the assaults of the enemy our Lord delayeth His coming and for almost two thousand years sadly waits for a slothful and defeated church to obey His first command. But thanks be unto to God who giveth us victory, it is our privilege to be with those who move forward, who keep the missionary fire burning unquenched by Laodicean luke warmness, and thus hasten the returning of our Lord.

As we look over the previous year our hearts are rejoiced to see the number of splendid missionaries who have gone out from our midst, but best of all, already reports are returning from them telling of souls saved, churches established and schools started, and this accomplished within the last few months.

It is, however, to be sadly noted that the report of the district foreign missionary offerings for the assembly year just past is less than that of former years. This, we believe can be accounted for by the following facts:

First, many individuals have sent their offerings directly to the field

and failed to give account of them to the church treasurer. Second, many local church treasurers have failed to send or report their missionary offerings to the district missionary treasurer, and thus the treasurer's report is much smaller than the actual amount of cash reaching the foreign field, therefore be it

RESOLVED: That all money given for foreign missionary work be sent through or reported to the local church treasurer and that he send or report the same to the district missionary treasurer.

Whereas: Along missionary lines the retrenchment of the larger churches has made it increasingly necessary for some one to fill in the gap and

Whereas: The pressing need of the present is for financial aid rather

than for workers be it Resolved: That the Pilgrims of the California District go forward and give more systematically and liberally than ever before to foreign missions.

REPORT OF THE DORCAS MISSIONARY SOCIETY, PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, PASADENA, CALIFORNIA

The Dorcas Missionary Society of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Pasadena, California, was organized of Nov. 1, 1929, with a membership of twenty-two ladies. During the winter we have met fourteen times in the various homes, these meetings haveing been richly honored and blessed of God.

Two hundred and thirty-six garments have been made, a goodly number of these going to the orphanage in Kingswood, Ky., while others have gone to the Isle of Pines; and just last week a box of much needed garments were sent as a surprise, to Mrs. Chapman in Mexico. Ten quailts and comforters have also been made, six of these going to Mexico, two ot the orphanage, one to a missionary in the mountains in Ken-

tucky, while the other was given locally. Seventy-one dollars and sixteen cents (\$71.16) in actual cash—free-will offerings have gone through our treasury. Sixty-four dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$64.99) amount disbursed, giving a balance of six dollars and seventeen cents (\$6.17). Are closing the year with thirtyfive members.

The words of gratitude given with tears and the letters of appreciation which we have received, are inducements to continue our labour of love and to adhere more closely to our motto, "Be ye doers of the Word and not hearers only". James 1-22.

REPORT OF REV. FRANCISCI SOLTERO AND WIFE

Dear Pilgrims of the California District:

Greetings in Jesus' name. We are praising God for precious blood-bought victory. Another year has slipped into history bringing us one year nearer the end of our earthly journey and one year nearer our heavenly home. The battle has been fierce but we have our feet on the Rock of Ages and are sure of victory every step of the way.

Looking back over the past year of our work in Mexico we can say that much damage has been done to the enemy's kingdom and much has been accomplished for our Lord and Master. I have seen three or four hundred souls at the altar, have preached 150 sermons, visited 300 homes, traveled hundreds of miles by train, automobile, on horseback and no foot. Quite a number of new mission stations have been opened in the name of the Lord and in our Annual Assembly which convened in April there were reported 23 preaching points and mission stations. Some new chapels have been built and two properties have been bought in very important towns in the Huasteca. Much of this has been done with the money raised in our churches in Mexico.

The financial struggle during the past year has been intense. Several times the physical man has been o thhe point of breaking but God sustained and renewed our strength from day to day until we are constrained to take new courage and press on.

The Native Training we consider one of the most important factors of our work at present. We now have eighteen fine young men, all fervent Christians, twelve of whom are called definitely to the ministry and the others are subject to a call and we are trusting that God will give it to them.

For more than a yera we have been suffering from an awful drouth which has rendered it impossible for us to get any benefit financially fro mour nice tract of land. It finally became so intense that the city water was about t ogive out. It had been announced that by the 20th of this month the city water supply would be gone. On the tenth we began to pray mightily with fasting and prayer and in just exactly ten days God heard and answered and sent water in abundance. The great dam above the city received 25 feet of water and our own little plot was once more flooded with water. The very next day we joyfully sowed corn, beans and vegetables, trusting that God who has given us the first good rain will continue to irrigate these fields until we see an abundant harvest. Now our faith reaches up for other and greater things.

Hrs. Soltero keeps pretty busy with the Training School and has little time to get out in the work although she acts as assistant pastor nad takes care of the church when I am away.

Our faithful nurses rae a great blessing to us. They receive no sup-ports but work on as faithfully as though they were receiving the best of salaries. They live in a little house back of the main building and have a tiny little sick room where they have faithfully cared for many people. They eat with us and their lights and water are also supplied from the School. They also do a great deal of deaconess work among the church people and the poor about us.

We praise God for the privilege of working for Him. We are especially grateful to the saints in California for the way they have stood by us with their prayers and also the liberal gifts which have been sent to us from time to time which have helped materially in keeping up this work of the Lord.
