FIRST SITTING, JULY 15TH

The Thirteenth Annual Assembly of the California District of The Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in Pasadena, California, July 15th, 1935 with General Superintendent Rev. Walter L. Surbrook in the chair.

Sitting opened for business at 9 o'clock, devotional services in charge of Brother Nering, District Superintendent. Hymns "When We All Get to Heaven" and "Heavenly Sunlight" were sung, followed with scripture lesson by W. R. Miner Assistant Supt., and with prayer led by Brother J. P. Coleman.

The opening address of our General Superintendent to the California Assembly sounded a note of warning against Spiritual decline, encouraging all with the glad fact that personal victory with unity brings success. He also gave a report sketch of the Pilgrim work generally.

The District Roll call was made with 38 responding from the Ministerial and Deaconess list and 19 from lay delegates elected by the Churches.

Moved and supported that the first six rows of seats in building constitute the Assembly bar. Carried.

Moved and supported that the Assembly convene from 9 to 11:55 A. M., 1:30 to 4:00 afternoon and 7:00 to 9:00 evenings. Carried.

Moved and supported that our District Superintendent appoint the

different committees needed to serve the Assembly. Carried. (See page two for appointments.)

Moved and supported that each pastor give a report of his year's work but all others be turned over to the Statistical Committee for general reporting. Carried.

Miss Agnes Born introduced and given an honorary seat in the bar.

Brother Biller coming from the Indiana District introduced and given a seat.

At this time the reporting of Pastors was resumed.

Moved that we adjourn until the afternoon session that each Committee may meet to prepare material to be brought before this Assembly. Carried.

Adjourned at eleven o'clock by prayer.

SECOND SITTING, JULY 15TH

The second session of the Thirteenth Annual Assembly convened at 1:30 P. M. Rev. C. J. Meyers led song service, Scripture from the eighty fifth Psalm was read by Geo. C. Wise and Miss Salome Gross led the Assembly to the Throne in prayer.

Mrs. Ames representing the W.C.T.U. was introduced to the Assembly and spoke for a period of ten minutes from the fact, "Repeal has failed."

Miss Peterson from the Colorado District was introduced and given an honorary seat within the bar.

Moved and supported that we dispense with the roll call for the afternoon. Carried.

Minutes of the previous sitting read and discussed and approved.

Moved that we hear from Committees. Carried.

Ways and Means committee reported through Chairman, Mrs. Neff.

Motion to adjourn until the evening session. Carried.

Assembly dismissed with prayer by Bro. Nering.

THIRD SITTING, JULY 15TH, 7:00 P. M.

Assembly came to order by singing songs led by Brother R. V. Steelhead, and prayer by Brother Abbott.

While the roll call was given a request was made that each minister pledge himself for certain numbers of subscriptions to the Advocate, resulting in about four hundred and fifty seven being promised.

Minutes of the afternoon session read, corrected and approved.

Reception committee introduced Bro. and Sister Gipson of the East Los Angeles Church, and they were granted a seat within the bar.

Auditing Committee report as follows, (see reports).

Report accepted by the Assembly as given.

Report of District Treasurer read.

Moved and supported that we accept the Treasurer's report. Carried. (See reports.)

A standing vote of thanks was given Bro. Hall for his efficient and faithful services through the year.

Following resolution introduced to the assembly by the Foreign Missionary Committee. Adopted. (See reports.)

Because of the earliness of the hour and nothing before the house,

moved and supported that we proceed to the election of District Officers.

Moved and supported that District Superintendent appoint six tellers and handle the balloting.

Bros. Hampton, Stone, Hodgins, Abbott, Lloyd and Hall were appointed.

Because of the absence of two delegates from First Church, pastor asked the privilege of recommending two substitutes, viz., Brother Jensen and Harper Welch. They were approved by the Assembly.

After prayer the Assembly proceeded to the election of a District Superintendent, and Paul C. Nering was re-elected.

Moved from the floor that resolution of last year to the effect that Assistant Supt. be a pastor be rescinded. Carried.

Proceeded to election of Assistant Supt. W. R. Miner was elected.

Time voted for thirty minute extension, voting continued.

Garnett L. Palmer elected District Secretary.

Elmer R. Hall elected as District Treasurer.

Three additional members of council voted upon, Bros. W. H. Neff and Wise elected on first ballot, Bro. Lloyd on second.

The election of one member of the Examining Board resulted in the re-election of Miss Lilian Beard.

Bro. Alex Krag re-elected on the Educational Board for continued term of three years.

Time extended for the conclusion of our balloting, fifteen minutes.

District Trustees voted upon and resulted in the election of Bros. W. L. Troyer, H. L. Blake, and Jens Jensen.

Session closed by all joining in singing the Doxology.

FOURTH SITTING, JULY 16TH

Assembly convened at 9:00 with Bro. Surbrook presiding, singing led by John Orkney, Scripture read by Bro. C. J. Meyers from Hebrews 13th chapter, followed by a season of prayer led by Bro. Biller.

Moved and seconded that we dispense with the roll call. Carried.

Bro. Surbrook spoke to the Assembly from 2 Cor. 6th chapter, on the theme, "Helps and Hindrances to the Ministry." Basing his message on three words, "Fire, Field and Future." A great message was enjoyed by all.

The Secretary read the Minutes of the previous sitting and they were approved.

Superintendent reported that Council had passed on O. D. Weaver and Ruby T. Gipson for Ordination and they were accepted by the Assembly.

A beautiful Ordination service followed, with Brother Surbrook, Bros. Nering, Neff, Miner, Blake and Coleman as Ordination Committee.

At this time the report of the Educational and Examining Boards was read and approved by the Assembly. (See listings of Ministers as reported.)

Moved we adjourn until 1:00 to complete business. Carried.

Brother Paul Thomas dismissed the Assembly with prayer.

FIFTH SITTING, JULY 16TH, 1:30 P. M.

The Assembly convened for final matters to be handled, opened with song service in charge of C. J. Meyers. Bro. Weaver read the Scripture lesson from Eph. 5th chapter, and the Assembly was led to the Throne of Grace in prayer by Brother Avery.

Minutes of previous sitting read and approved.

W. H. Neff presented two names for Credentials that Church had not passed upon and Assembly voted to grant recommendations upon recommendation of the Church at Pasadena.

Moved and supported that we dispense with any further reporting, Carried.

Motion from the floor recommended that District Minutes be sold for 25 cents with the following promises from the churches as to number they will take: East Pasadena 6, East Los Angeles 7, Fresno 3, Hermiton 6, Klamath Falls 4, Long Beach 7, Pasadena First 30, Phoenix 8, Rialto 3, Riverside 7, San Diego 3, Santa Barbara 6, Ventura 6.

Minutes of this sitting read and approved.

Assembly closed with singing and prayer.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the thirteenth annual Dist. Assembly, we submit the following report:

First of all we thank God for the abundant mercy bestowed upon us during the past year. While there seems to be no end to church problems, in this life, through much prayer and waiting on God, He helped us solve some for His glory and to the best interest of the church.

Second, we wish to thank the council for their loyalty and cooperation, also the pastors and the faithful laity who have prayed for us.

We are not able to report any new churches organized the past year. This we regret very much, however, we have three places where regular preaching services and Sunday Schools have been maintained, and most churches have made substantial progress especially in a financial way. Over one thousand dollars more was raised than last year. Our people as a whole have a larger vision concerning new fields in the home land, and more has been given for that purpose this year than any other year since we came to the District.

Our vision as a whole has been enlarged as we travel through the many places where there is no Holiness Church. As a district we must keep intensely missionary in order to keep alive. God has committed to our trust the Gospel in its fullness, and we should never rest until we preach it in every hamlet in this land and every other land. We cannot consider our task finished until all have the Gospel that saves to the uttermost.

This challenges us to be a missionary church. We are debtors to all people and according to the great commission Jesus gave us, we must evangelize all unoccupied territory in our home land as well as in our foreign fields. We can only keep saved and blessed as we press into new fields. We can press forward in foreign fields only as we press forward and establish new churches in the home land. We have the message the world needs. Let us press forward into new fields with greater zeal than ever before.

As a District we are not making the progress we should. We do not wish to put emphasis on numerical success to increase our membership at the price of quality. But there is a danger of discouraging the newly converted people who have been brought to Jesus through the influence of the church, if we fail to provide for them protection that membership in the church gives. Babes in Christ need the church far more than the strong and mature. There should be a holy desire on all the church and ministry to nourish and protect all those who are won for God and are willing to measure up to our standards, to encourage them to cast their lot with us till we can say with Luke in the Acts of Apostles "The churches were edified and walking in the fear of the Lord, and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost, were multiplied." Acts 9-31.

We have been kept very busy. Have responded to every call that has come to us. I have visited all churches three times and some five times as occasions demanded. Have investigated ten different places for the purpose of opening new work, have conducted 18 business meetings, have preached 151 times, conducted 6 revivals, prayed in 110 homes, traveled 23,128 miles in the interest of the District, have received for my support \$868.63, including the \$54.00 love offering that was given to me at the close of last camp.

The kindness shown us by the brethren is more than we can express in words. We are intensely interested in all work of the Lord.

Whereas the Ministerial Conventions held in the past have proved a great blessing to ministers, workers and local churches, BE IT RESOLVED that the District have at least two ministerial conventions during the year, and that a committee be appointed to determine the places, worker and subjects, be it further resolved that our pastors arrange their revivals not to conflict with the above conventions.

4

BE IT RESOLVED that each Sunday School be encouraged to institute a thank offering fund; same to be used for support of home missions, and be it further resolved that each Sunday School take a birthday offering each Sunday, and that this money be used for Home Missions.

5

BE IT RESOLVED that one of the monthly missionary offerings each quarter be devoted to Home Missions, with a special service to arouse Home Missionary interest.

6

Whereas our District Secretary is required to put considerable time to the District work; BE IT RESOLVED that he be paid \$25.00 a year for this work.

7
