



Proceedings

FIRST SITTING

The Twenty-fourth Annual Conference of the California Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church met at the Holiness Tabernacle, El Monte, California, at 9:30 a. m.. July 8, 1946, with Rev. Wm. H. Neff, Assistant General Superintendent, in the chair.

Rev. Geo. A. Moran, Conference Superintendent, opened the devotional service. Rev. Clifford Thomas led the congregation in singing, "Praise Him, Praise Him." Rev. Fred K. Wells, President of former Holiness Church, led the assembly in prayer.

Rev. C. A. Nicola favored the Conference with a special song.

Rev. Wm. H. Neff, Conference Chaiman, brought the opening message, reading from 1 Cor. 3, and speaking on the subject, "Laborers Together With God."

At the close of the message, Rev. G. A. Moran, feeling the need of the unusual help and blessing of God on our hearts, called the Conference to special prayer. Rev. John Hess led to the Throne of Grace.

Rev. J. H. Kiehl led a testimony meeting while the Conference Council was in business session.

The Conference Council recommended that ordained ministers John Carlson, C. R. Dage, Hugh Estes, Mrs. Carl H. Dauel, and Lorin Wilson, and licensed ministers Gracie E. Hahn, Ralph Pynchon, Bernard Richards, Eugene Probst, and Mrs. Eugene Probst, be admitted to our Conference fellowship. Upon presentation of these names to the Conference it was voted to receive them.

The Chairman called on the Secretary of the former Holiness Church, Donald R. Washburn, to give the roll call from the Holiness Directory, and G. L. Palmer to give the roll call of the Pilgrim Holiness Church—59 responding from the Ministerial Directory and 24 from the Church Lay Delegates.

It was moved and seconded that the first ten rows of seats and the platform constitute the Conference Bar. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the hours of sitting be set for 9:00 a. m. to noon, 1:00 p. m. to 4:00 p. m., and 7:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Sitting adjourned with prayer.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Conference opened at 1:30 p. m. with song and praise. Conference Treasurer Rev. E. R. Hall led Conference in prayer.

The minutes of the morning sitting were read and approved.

Rev. Donald Washburn and Rev. G. L. Palmer proceeded to read the roll call that it might be completed.

Rev. T. C. Abbott read report of the Auditing Committee. It was moved and seconded that report be accepted. Carried.

Rev. E. R. Hall was called upon for the Financial Report. It was moved and seconded that the Treasurer's Report be accepted. Carried. (See Reports.)

A Financial Report of the former Holiness Church was given by E. C. Bickmore, Treasurer. It was moved and seconded that this splendid report be accepted. Carried.

Rev. D. E. Olson, Missionary Treasurer of the former Holiness Church was called upon for a financial report. Accounts reported not complete. It was moved and carried that this report be heard later in this Conference.

The financial report of the Standard Bearer was also postponed for more complete information.

Rev. Fred K. Wells, President of the Holiness Church before amalgamation, gave his annual report. It was moved and carried that his report be accepted by a rising vote of appreciation and thanksgiving.

The Conference was favored with a special song, "Lead Me Gently Home," by the Emery sisters.

The reception committee introduced Rev. S. I. Emery to the Conference.

It was moved and seconded that E. C. Bickmore be seated in the Conference Bar with all privileges. Carried.

The Conference Council recommended that Rev. Frank Mills, Rev. M. J. Pyles and Rev. C. A. Nicola be received into the Conference.

It was moved and seconded that this action be sustained. Carried.

Rev. Wm. H. Neff, Chairman, called the entire group of new ministers and their wives forward and introduced each to the Conference.

It was moved and seconded that the Conference adjourn until evening sitting. Carried.

After singing, "Blest Be The Tie That Binds," the sitting adjourned.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the Twenty-fourth Annual Conference of the California Conference opened by singing, "Standing on the Promises," led by Rev. C. A. Nicola.

Rev. Fred. K. Wells read the Scripture lesson and the Conference was led in prayer by Rev. D. W. Brown.

Minutes of previous sitting were read and approved.

It was moved and seconded that the roll call be dispensed with. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the election of officers be held at 10:00 a. m. tomorrow morning. Carried.

Rev. G. A. Moran, Conference Superintendent, gave his Annual Report. It was moved and seconded that Rev. Moran's report be accepted. Carried.

A financial report of the Holiness Evangelistic Institute was read. It was moved and seconded that the report be accepted. Carried.

Bro. E. C. Bickmore read the financial report of the Young People's Society of the former Holiness Church. It was moved and seconded that the report be accepted. Carried.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read by Rev. C. W. Brown. Recommendations:

No. 1. Was adopted after being amended to read "that the Young people have a voice in directing the use of the funds." (See reports.)

No. 2. Adopted.

Rev. F. T. Benner, Secretary of the Resolutions Committee, read their report. On account of expiration of time, it was moved and seconded that we extend

time of sitting for one hour. The motion was lost.

New motion to the effect that the sitting be extended to complete action on Resolution No. 1 before adjournment. It was seconded and carried.

Resolution No. 1 was adopted.

Session closed with prayer.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the Twenty-fourth Annual Conference of the California Conference opened at 9:00 a. m., Rev. Wm. H. Neff in the chair.

Rev. Ellis L. Morell led in singing, "Send The Light."

The Conference was then led to the Throne in prayer by Rev. Robert Manuel. Minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Rev. W. L. Troyer, Conference Statistician, gave the Statistical Report. It was moved and seconded that we accept it. Carried.

Bro. Martin Horine spoke of the need of our getting back of the Holiness Evange-listic Institute in a material way in making provision for food. The different churches agreed to can fruit for the school. Twelve-hundred quarts were pledged.

Rev. F. T. Benner read their resolution No. 17. It was moved and seconded that we adopt the resolution. Carried.

Rev. G. A. Moran, Conference Superintendednt, appointed tellers for the election as follows: Rev. Clifford Thomas, Rev. Ralph Pynchon, Rev. E. Probst, Bro. M. Horine, Bro. E. R. Sparks, Rev. T. C. Abbott.

The chair read from the manual the responsibility of all delegates to remain in the Conference until the completion of business, after which the body knelt in silent prayer, then proceeded to the election of the Conference Superintendent. Rev. George A. Moran was elected.

The Conference then proceeded to the election of the Assistant, Conference Superintendent. Rev. Fred K. Wells was elected.

The Conference then proceeded to the election of the Conference Secretary. Rev. Donald Washburn was elected on the second ballot.

Upon the nomination by the combined councils of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the former Holiness Church, the names of Rev. E. R. Hall, Bro. E. C. Bickmore and Rev. David Olson were presented to the Conference for the Conference Treasurer's office. There was no election on the first ballot. Rev. E. R. Hall was elected on the second ballot.

There was a motion from the floor that the combined councils meet and work on the plan for a property custodian to act for the coming year, the name to be presented to the Conference for confirmation. It was moved and seconded that this motion be adopted. Carried.

The Conference proceeded to the election of the three additional members to the Conference Council. Rev. Carl Hahn was elected on the first ballot. Rev. J. M. Dooley and Rev. Clifford Morgan were elected on the second ballot.

Conference adjourned.

FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting opened at 1:00 o'clock with singing and thanksgiving to God-Gracious was God's blessing upon the saints.

The council of the former Holiness Church recommended the names of Edward C. Bickmore and Roy Freeman as additional members to the Conference Trustees for a period of two years. It was moved and seconded that these names be sustained. Carried,

The Conference then proceeded to the election of the members of the Educational Board for three years. There was no election on the first ballot.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. C. L. Dage coming to us from the Pacific Northwest District.

Conference proceeded to the election of a member to the Educational Board for one year. Rev. Roy Adams was elected.

The Council recommended Bro. E. C. Bickmore to the Conference as Conference Property Custodian. He was elected by acclamation.

Rev. Paul Beck was elected for a three year term to the Examining Board.

Rey, Ray W. Chamberlain was elected on the second ballot to a three-year term on the Educational Board.

Educational and Examining Boards recommended names of Licensed Ministers and Deaconesses to the Conference. It was moved and seconded that these be accepted.

Moved and seconded that the secretary send a night letter to the editor of the "Advocate" asking about the sending of the "Advocate" to the "Standard Bearer" The churches pledged the following number of copies of Conference Minutes wanted 300.

Rev. David Olson read report of the Foreign Missionary Work of the former Holiness Church. Moved and seconded that the report be accepted. Carried.

Rev. G. A. Moran, Conference Superintendent, proceeded to the appointment of the Editing Committee as follows: Rev. Donald Washburn, Rev. Ray W. Chamberlain, Miss Gladys Clark.

E. C. Bickmore, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the former Holiness Church, gave the Trustees Report.

The motion was made and seconded that the Fred K. Wells family retain the President's Home through the conference year, and that \$900.00 be set aside from Conference Foreign Missionary funds for Bro. Wells' support at \$100.00 per month, beginning September 1. It was amended to read that \$450.00 come from the Foreign Missionary funds and \$450.00 from the General Funds of the former Holiness Church.

The motion as amended was carried.

The chairman of the Committee on Memorials gave the report of two faithful saints who have passed on to their reward.

Rev. G.A. Moran read the appointments of committees to function the coming year. The Examining and Educational Boards further reported, and on motion the report was accepted.

Resolution No. 9 was carried.

It was moved and seconded that the Ordination Service be set for 7:00 o'clock tonight. Carried.

Rev. G. A. Moran made a motion that we show our appreciation for the services of our Assistant General Superintendent, Rev. W. H. Neff, by a generous love offering. Adjourned to meet at 7:00 p.m. for Ordination Service.

SIXTH SITTING

The sixth sitting opened July 9, 1946 at 7 p.m. with song.

The Conference Council presented the following for ordained minister: Thelma Brown, Melvin Dixon, Gracie Hahn, Worth Hodgin, Robert Moran, Bernard Richards.

Upon motion they were accepted.

Bro. Neff brought the ordination message.

Motion carried we adjourn.

CONFERENCE SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 24th annual conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in session at El Monte, California, July 8, 1946, greetings!

We wish to express our appreciation of our brethren in the ministry; the comradeship and co-operation throughout the past year has been impressive indeed. We believe we have been "workers together with God."

Spiritual Advancement. Several churches have had exceptional revivals, among others Phoenix, Ventura, Los Angeles; and throughout the conference the saints are heartened and faith is multiplying.

Numerical Growth. The numerical increase over the conference has been sizable yet the turnover in membership is such as to show only a small increase. We would do well as a Church to ask ourselves what in our policy is causing such a large turnover in membership? God help us to build a family church!!

Amalgamation. God in His providence has seen fit to bring together in one fellowship "The Holiness Church" and the "Pilgrim Holiness Church." Throughout the committee meetings and in the entire proceedings there has been the manifest presence of the Lord. There has been a splendid spirit of co-operation and a desire of both groups to serve this present age as God would have us.

However, real unity does not depend on wearing the same label and subscribing to the same set of doctrinal principles; these are earthly things and may or may not be of the Spirit. For example, the atonement is a fundamental doctrine to be subscribed to but never yet has doctrine been able to realize oneness—unity is only obtainable on the basis of experience inwrought by the power of the Holy Spirit—this is heavenly and effectual.

Let us in our new relationship recognize the power and virtue of the blood as sufficient against all that Satan might attempt in the line of schism or division.

There are two strong preaching points at Dobbins, California and Show Low, Arizona; both of which are eligible for organization. Bro. and Sis. C. T. Meyer of Eloy, Arizona have given the church two lots for a church in that city and construction is expected to begin next September.

Building Program. Parsonages have been builded at Rosemead, California and Long Beach. The parsonage will soon be available at Rocklin, California. Extensive reconditioning has been accomplished on several churches and the El Monte Tabernacle.

Youth. The Youth Work for the conference year began with a splendid conference held in Pasadena's Oak Grove Park. Youth rallies have been conducted in many churches throughout the year, with seekers at the altar in every service. A young man who was converted in one of the youth rallies is now Riverside's Sunday school Supt.

Pilgrim Pines, the new youth camp in the Barton Flats area, is another accomplishment of the year.

Ministerial Meetings. Ministerial meetings have been held during the year, with guest speakers chosen from among those who have made a success in some line of christian endeavor. "The Fine Art of Public Worship" and "Preaching from the Bible" were among the texts studied. Also the fellowship and inspiration of the meetings have been beneficial.

Camp Meeting. We have just concluded one of the largest and best camps of our movement in this area. It pleased the Lord to give us Rev. S. I. Emery and Rev. M. L. Goodman at their best. The Minister's Seminar conducted by Rev. Thatcher and the many splendid missionary addresses by Rev. and Mrs. Solter and Rev. R. K. Storey all combined to give us a feast of good things long to be remembered, and afford both ministers and laymen a wonderful background for courage, inspiration and vision for the coming year.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Inasmuch as the young people of the former Holiness Church have had a successful Penny-a-day plan for financing new home missionary projects; therefore, be it resolved that we recommend this plan be adopted by each Young People's Society.

Be it further resolved that all funds be sent monthly to the Conference Treasurer to be held by him in a separate fund. Work and distribution of funds to be under direct supervision of Conference Council in co-operation with the Young People's Council.

(2)

Minister's Retirement Plan

Inasmuch as the Minister's Retirement Plan was adopted at the General Conference, requiring the payment of two percent of the weekly salary by the pastor and four percent of the weekly salary by the local church; therefore, be it resolved that local church treasurers deduct the two percent of the pastor's weekly salary and add to this an additional four percent from regular offerings, forwarding these amounts to the Conference Treasurer monthly.

Be it resolved that the Board of Trustees of the former Holiness Church shall legally function in behalf of these properties until their transfer to the Pilgrim Holiness Church is completed.

Inasmuch as the Ministerial Directory in the Conference Minutes does not differentiate between missionaries in foreign lands and ministers in the homeland, therefore, be it resolved that in the future these be shown in two separate lists.

(9)

Be it resolved that the necessary data for the General Statistician be placed in our Conference Minutes.

(10)

Be it resolved that the 6:30 p.m. service of the Conference Camp be devoted to a young people's service, to be arranged for by the Young People's Council.

(11)

Be it resolved that resolutions 3, 4, 5, on page 11 of the '45 Minutes and, 6, 7, and 10 on page 12 be deleted.

Be it resolved that the Conference Superintendent be given a month's vacation with pay.

(13)

Be it resolved that this Conference give its presiding officer, Asst. Gen. Supt. Rev. Wm. H. Neff, a rising vote of thanks for his labor of love among us.

(14)

Be it resolved that we express our gratitude to God for His wonderful outpourings of divine grace that have welded our two separate bodies into one body in Christ.

(15)

Inasmuch as we have been so graciously entertained by the El Monte Pilgrim Holiness Church, be it resolved that this Conference give the cooks, dining room and kitchen help, dishwashers and custodians a rising vote of appreciation for their untiring efforts to make it comfortable for the entire camp.

(16)

Be it resolved that the "Pilgrim News" be placed on a subscription basis.

(17)

Be it resolved that the Board of Trustees be enlarged to a Board of five (5). And that two (2) members of this Board be nominated by the Board of Elders of the former Holiness Church.

RESOLUTIONS IN EFFECT FROM PREVIOUS CONFERENCES

(1)

Be it resolved that all conference rulings regulating the financial affairs of the conference be brought forward and spread on the pages of the Minutes.

(2)

Be it resolved that the emphasis being placed on the work among the children of the Sunday schools shall not be lessened but that a greater stress shall be placed on the work among our young married folk and adults, thus building into our Sunday school program a definite place for the family as a complete unit.

(3)

We recommend that our Conference Superintendent or his Assistant shall, when possible, conduct Quarterly Meetings at each church, at which time he shall preach a gospel sermon and administer the sacraments.

(4)

We recomend that, Whereas we now have a standing Statistical Committee to function during the Conference Year, Be it resolved that all reports be made in full and sent to the Statistical Committee not later than one week before the Conference date.

(5)

Resolved that since some of our Churches seem to have no definite system of raising their General, Conference and Local expenses, therefore be it resolved that each Church adopt the Budget System and make an effort to raise the same.

(6)

Resolved that no Pastor employ an evangelist without the endorsement of the Conference Superintendent.

(7)

Resolved that love offering be taken monthly for the Pastor of each Church, and that the delegate see that this is done.

(8)

Resolved that before Licensed or Ordained Ministers, coming from other Churches, shall be received into the local churches, that the pastor shall consult with the Conference Superintendent and Council regarding said Minister.

(9)

We recommend that each self-supporting Church put forth a home missionary campaign and try to establish at least one new church.

(10)

Whereas it is already our practice to alternate our Home and Foreign Missionary offerings throughout the year, We recommend that the months of August, October, December, February and April be designated as our Home Missionary offering months.

(11)

Resolved that we have a Camp Meeting Association with membership dues of \$1.00 per year, and that our Conference Superintendent present this Association to the people on his first visit to every church in the Conference, and get as many members as possible.

(12)

It is recommended that the Conference create the office of Conference Sunday School Secretary, which person is to be nominated by the Conference Sunday School Committee, the nomination to be ratified by the Conference Council, and said secretary shall be an ex-officio member and responsible to the Sunday School Committee.

(13)

Be it resolved that all plans for the construction or remodeling of church buildings be presented to a committee on which there shall be an architect, a builder, and a financier for their suggestions.

(14)

Whereas the stress and strain of the times in which we live are such as to tax the strength of the busy pastors of our conference, be it resolved that each church of the Conference give their pastor a two weeks' vacation with pay.

(15)

Whereas our Conference is scattered geographically, be it resolved that the Conference Superintendent edit a Conference Bulletin, to be published monthly at the expense of the Conference.

(16)

Resolved that when recommendation for credentials is presented to the Conference the candidate be present, or send a written testimony to accompany the recommendation.

(17)

Whereas the devastating influence of the liquor traffic in America is gaining such momentum, Be it resolved our church and ministry take a more militant stand against the sale of same.

(18,

Resolved that an offering be taken when Conference Minutes are distributed at the various churches that will be equivalent to the amount of 15c per copy.

Resolutions Concerning Certain Financial Obligations

(19)

Resolved that ten per cent of church offerings after deducting Building Fund, rent for church or payment for purchase of church building, be sent to Conference Treasurer.

(20)

Resolved that each member pay the amount of \$1.50 to the support of the Conference Superintendent per year.

(21)

Resolved each member be assessed the amount of 30c for the General Conference.

(22)

Resolved that the Sunday School, Birthday and Thank Offerings be used for Conference Home Missions.

Resolved that 10% of Sunday school offerings be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

(24)

All assessments are based on total membership with exceptions provided for regularly engaged christian workers on the church roll who are in active missionary or evangelistic work elsewhere. In no case is this exemption to exceed 10% of total reported membership.

1946 CALIFORNIA CONFERENCE MEMORIALS

W. Frank Hooker was born June 21, 1889 in Bangor, Iowa. He was reared in an old-fashioned Quaker home where stress was laid on things of eternal value. He was a faithful member of the Rees Memorial Pilgrim Holiness Church of Pasadena from 1923 until 1939, at which time his letter was transferred to the Rosemead Pilgrim Church, when the family moved to El Monte. The positive evidence that Brother Hooker gave through song, testimony and consistent daily living, leads us to the comforting conclusion that through Jesus, on November 8, 1945, our brother dropped anchor in that final harbor, God's haven of rest.

Rev. Carl Henry Dauel, on the evening of May 3, 1946, laid down his implements of earthly warfare and went home to be with his Lord and Savicur. Rev. Dauel was born in Hanover, Germany, February 13, 1878. He came to America in his youth. During a period of industrial strikes and unrest, he became a bartender in the city of Chicago. Here he was converted to God in a Rescue Mission conducted by the late Seth C. Rees. Under the call of God and the watchful guidance of Rev. Rees he immediately began a glorious and successful career of soul winning. At his first street meeting twenty-one hands were raised for prayer; fourteen men knelt at the curb to pray, four of whom became ministers of the Gespel.

After spending sometime at God's Bible School in Cincinnati, Ohio, he began to blaze a trail back and forth across America with a message that reached the lowest of the low and the highest of the high.

He served the Pilgrim Church as evangelist and pastor. He served as Supt. of the California Conference and of the Oklahoma Conference and Asst. Supt. of the Rocky Mountain Conference. He was also Supt. of Rescue Missions and of City Missions. More than forty churches owe their existence to his picneer work. He had a gift for developing talent and many fine workers of the church began their ministry under his influence and guidance. He was a man of principle and a soul winner to the end. God was real to him and he had an ability to make God real to all he met.

On the evening of his home-going he was enabled of the Holy Spirit to enter a last time into a wonderful season of prayer and soul burden for the needs of an entire world. Soon after he went to sleep to awaken at home with God whom he loved and whom he served. A broken and bleeding world has lost a friend and lover; the church militant, a mighty warrior and many of us in this conference a very personal friend and christian brother.

Sister Ida Martin was one of the pioneer members of the Fresno Church. Her work for the Kingdom was tireless as she held our standards high. Sister Martin's zeal for missions was outstanding, as her will revealed in leaving most of her sizable estate to the cause of missions. God grant the mantle of this rare soldier of the cross may fall on us all, that we may continue to carry on the work which was so dear to her heart:

John C. Will was born in Chicago, Ill., August 8, 1878, and fell asleep in Jesus November 9, 1945, whi'e pastor of The Holiness Church at Highland Park, Los Angeles. His wife and six children survive him.

He was in the Gospel ministry over thirty years, twenty years of which were spent in The Holiness Church. He served on the Board of Elders from 1934 to his death. He was noted for his faithfulness and optimism. He wrote articles for the Standard Bearer for many years, and was a good pianist and singer as well as preacher.

Leonard A. Clark was born in Salinas, Calif., March 25, 1862, and died April 1, 1946, at Eagle Rock Calif. In childhood he joined the Methodist Church; later was sanctified and identified himself with the holiness people in Los Angeles in 1884. In 1888 he became editor of "The Pentecost," which became the official paper of "The Holiness Church" when it was organized in 1896. He served this church for many years as editor, pastor, elder, and for several terms as president.
