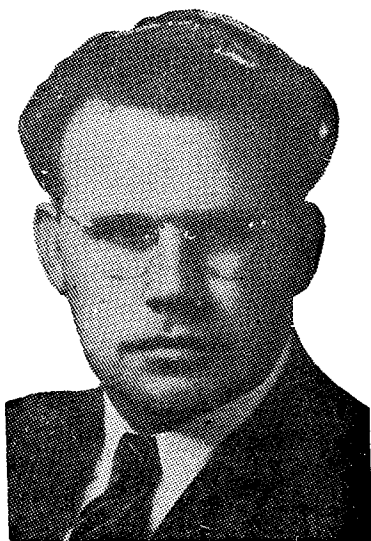
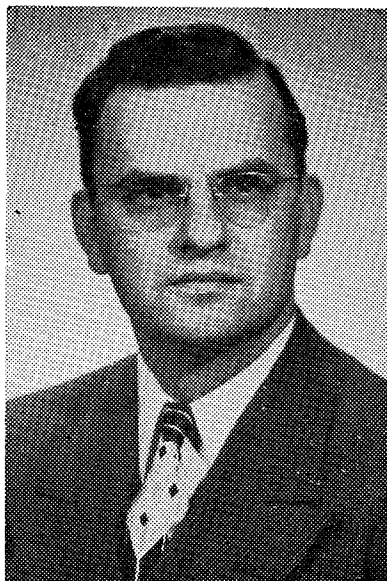

CALIFORNIA ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Journal of Proceedings

First Sitting, June 27, 1957

The thirty-fifth conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at El Monte, California at 9:00 a.m., Thursday, June 27, 1957. Rev. Thomas Hamon led the group in congregational singing, after which Rev. Thomas Lee led in prayer.

The District Superintendent introduced Dr. W. L. Surbrook, presiding officer of the conference. Doctor Surbrook gave a brief message on the subject "Watchful Warnings for Christian Workers," using as a text I Timothy 4:16, dealing with the aspects of the Christian's worship, work and worth.

Brother Surbrook pointed out that there is nothing more important in the Christian's life than his contact with God. One's reading and prayer habits are vital to his spiritual life.

Heck spent 25 years in active service in the ministry, pastoring at Plymouth, Philomath, Friend, Klamath Falls, Bend and Central Point, Oregon, doing mission work, Sunday School evangelism, and personal work among the older people who were brought in contact with a living Christ. Only the Lord could know the souls he directed to his Savior.

The last sermon he preached was in the Nazarene Church in San Jose, California, December 2, 1956. God's presence and anointing was greatly manifested; many young people lined the altar seeking the Lord. A revival spirit still continues in the church. A heart-warming thought written by a friend: "He was a gentleman and a Christian."

He is survived by his wife May, a son Wesley, and a daughter Betty Jane, four brothers, five sisters, and a host of friends.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Dr. W. L. Surbrook and members of the thirty-fifth annual conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings!

God has been good to all of us in permitting this gathering to review our labors of the past year, to appraise our existing legislation, to plan for our future needs and above all, to seek God's will in all things.

This has been the first conference since the State of Arizona was taken over by the General Church Extension Department. Arizona has profited from this move inasmuch as the Department of Church Extension, under Rev. Hawkins, has given much toward the progress of the work there. California has felt the loss of these fine Arizona Pilgrims, yet I believe God shall reward the generous attitude manifested by California in this move.

I. District Activities

A. The District Council purchased a new district parsonage in West Covina from Mr. E. B. Snoddy who made it possible for the district to have a \$16,000.00 property for \$11,000.00. This property is proving to be well located and adequate for the need and should serve the church for many years to come.

B. A splendid youth camp was held last fall at Mile High Pines. A large and much needed fellowship hall is being erected. Brother Horine and his helpers deserve much praise for their many efforts. The zone meetings have been well attended.

C. The District Workers' Conference, as well as the ministerial meeting, was well attended and our hearts and minds were refreshed from both the message of our speakers and the fellowship of our fellow workers.

D. Our relationship with Western Pilgrim College has been all one could expect. I am praying that God will meet every present and future need of the school. The financial state of the school needs our careful and prayerful interest.

E. Our pastors are laboring under increasing economic pressure and some have made sacrifices that will be acknowledged and rewarded in eternity.

F. Our laymen are standing by loyally and have given of their time and finances.

G. Rev. Simonds has visited about all of our churches in the interest of the Sunday School.

H. Time does not permit my giving a complete report — the committees, missionary societies, evangelists and workers have all had a part in the work of God.

II. Church Progress

A. Materially

Adams Memorial has bought and paid for a new organ, piano and a floor furnace.

Buena Park has bought the property next to the church.

Chino has bought a parsonage at a great saving. Thanks to the Bickmores for making this possible.

East Pasadena has purchased property adjoining their present plant.

Escondido has nearly finished their beautiful church and Sunday School wing. They have the church furnished with beautiful new pews which were made by the pastor and men of the congregation.

Fresno is in the midst of building their first unit of their proposed new plant.

Long Beach has sold their old parsonage and has bought another in a new subdivision.

Oak View has done extensive remodeling of their parsonage.

Pomona has finished their new parsonage which is proving to be adequate for the need.

Riverside has completed their new Sunday School unit.

Rosemead and **Rees Memorial** have reduced their indebtedness in an unusual way, yet paying their budget and other obligations in full.

San Fernando Pilgrims have completed their new parsonage and are now building a beautiful church and Sunday School rooms which they hope to be using in the near future.

Many of our churches have made improvements such as renovating the interior, new furnishings, painting of buildings, and in various ways have made their buildings more attractive, which certainly is a part of kingdom building. It is impossible to mention all that has been done in this respect.

B. Spiritually.

Some of our churches experienced lasting results from their revivals. I feel, however, generally speaking, that we need a deepening of our devotion to the cause of Christ. The only answer to this sinful, fearful, frustrated and seeking world is a spirit-filled New Testament Church. Organization alone will not save the world. God is more interested in agonization of Spirit-filled believers than in organization. Abandonment to the Holy Spirit counts more than our ability. God is more interested in our scars than in our degrees — in our tasks than our titles. If our people could experience a new baptism of the Holy Ghost we could preface a new and glorious day. Fellow workers, if something is to happen through us, it must first happen to us. Let us all journey back to Pentecost and renew our recognition of the place, Person and the work of the Holy Spirit.

C. Numerically.

Highest membership gain shown is Dixon, with a gain of 29. Second highest is Escondido, with a gain of 20; third, El Monte, 10. Church receiving the largest number of members is El Monte, receiving 35; second largest is Dixon, receiving 29. Third in this respect was Rees Memorial, receiving 27 new members. (Rees dropped 38 members so does not show a gain in membership.)

III. District's Future

Our future is as bright as our devotion to God. Abundant resources are ours for the asking. The promises of God are very bright.

We are having many calls for a Pilgrim Church, however, we have been handicapped because of the lack of men and money.

The District is selling the plot of ground in Monrovia, the proceeds to be used to start a new work as soon as a suitable location is found. This ground was given to the District some time ago by Victor Klein. Much time has been spent by the Forward Movement Committee and Council members in trying to locate a site in the different areas from San Diego to Sacramento. The cost of a suitable area is so great that it has been impossible to proceed to purchase any location, the cost for such a plot of ground alone running from 10 to 15 thousand dollars.

The goals set for this district by the General Church in the Forward Movement campaign were 1 new church, 1 branch Sunday School, and 50 new members. These goals have not all been reached, but with the help of the Lord and interested friends, we should be able to get at least two new churches next year. The groundwork is already laid for this venture.

IV. Personal Labors

To the loving Lord and a very patient people I submit the following report:

Times preached, 120; visits to churches, 90; Church Board meetings, 52; Youth Rallies, 3; District Council meetings, 16; Annual Meetings, 27; Bible College meetings, 10; Ministerial meeting, 1; dedication of building, 1; Superintendents' Conference, 1; General Board meetings, 2; Forward Movement meetings, 6; Revival, 1; Youth Camp and Conference, 1; other committee meetings, 15.

In addition to the above I have taken care of the many office duties and have worked several weeks on District properties which included landscaping the new District parsonage. I have traveled 41,928 miles which includes three trips to Indianapolis to the Superintendents' Conference and General Board Meetings.

Four of our faithful workers in the vineyard have been taken from us to the Church Triumphant — Sister F. H. Soltero, Sister Emla Black, Sister Gladys Clark, and Brother Harry Heck. We who remain are left with an inescapable responsibility. We must seek and win the lost to Christ.

With a new determination and a strong desire to do something for this generation, I submit the following goals for the coming year:

Two new churches.

Three branch Sunday Schools.

Fifty new Pilgrims.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE 1957 CONFERENCE

Resolutions Committee

¶ No. 1—Be it resolved that the District Secretary be informed immediately upon the death of a minister or minister's wife of the District, and that he notify by telephone all pastors in the District and that proper notification be given to the editor of the District publication.

No. 2—Be it resolved that the Conference adopt the following method of pastoral recall:

- 1—That each church shall vote during the last full week of March on the recall of its pastor.
- 2—That each local church secretary shall forward to the District Superintendent the results of such vote within five days following the time of voting.
- 3—That each pastor shall forward to the District Superintendent his reply relative to his recall, within 15 days of the time of voting. (See 1954 Manual, Section 53, Paragraph 3, Page 29).
- 4—That each pastor who does not plan to be a candidate for recall shall notify the District Superintendent on or before the 15th day of March.

No. 3—Be it resolved that the District Conference follow the method prescribed in the Manual, Section 45, Page 28, which reads as follows: "Each delegate shall be provided with a certificate of his appointment, signed by the pastor and secretary."

Be it further resolved that a Conference registrar be appointed by the

District Council, the registrar to assume his duties at the entrance to the district tabernacle one hour prior to the opening of each session of the Conference, and further that the duties of the registrar shall be to register all members of the conference and all duly certified lay delegates, presenting each member or delegate with a badge admitting him within the Conference Bar.

That the Conference registrar shall receive and record the certificates from the lay delegates, and shall present the list of registered delegates to the conference secretary prior to the opening of each session of the conference.

No. 4—Whereas the manifold duties of the District Superintendent require his complete attention, and

Whereas the District Superintendent has been bearing the responsibility of the preparation of the district camp grounds for annual conference and camp, and

Whereas this responsibility precludes the devotion of his time to his administrative duties,

Therefore be it resolved that:

- 1—The responsibility for the preparation of the grounds for annual conference and camp meeting be delegated to the district Camp Meeting Board.
- 2—That the secretary of the Camp Meeting Board shall be responsible for notifying all pastors and all other ministers of the District as to the dates for any work days set for the preparation of the grounds.

No. 5—Be it resolved that resolution No. 9, Page 35, of the Resolutions of the 1956 Conference be placed in the standing resolutions until such a time as its intent has been carried out.

No. 6—Whereas the intent of Resolution No. 6 of the 1956 Resolutions has apparently been misunderstood,

Therefore be it resolved that the following resolution appear in Standing Resolutions:

"Whereas in order that the pastor may be at his best and the church may be served better by the pastor receiving an annual vacation, therefore be it resolved that each church of the District give its pastor a two weeks vacation with pay."

No. 7—Be it resolved that Standing Resolution No. 13 be amended to read:

"Be it resolved that all plans for the construction or remodeling of church buildings be presented to the District Building Committee on which there shall be an architect, a builder, and a financier for their suggestions."

No. 8—Whereas there seems to be considerable misunderstanding relative to the listing of inactive ministers,

Therefore, be it resolved that the Conference adopt the interpretation of the General Board with reference to Section 178 of the Manual,

"We understand by the term 'actively and regularly engaged in the work of the ministry,' to mean pastors with a regular appointment and full time evangelists and to ministers who are under special appointment. With reference to the aged ministers we suggest that only those above 65 years may be so classified."

No. 9—Be it resolved that the District Superintendent call a meeting of all District leaders and pastors for the purpose of introducing the programs of the various departments for the coming year, this meeting to be held during the month of October.

No. 10—Whereas there is a well equipped book store in our District operated under the auspices of the Western Pilgrim College Board of Directors and under the name "Pilgrim Book Store," and

Whereas the continuance of the Book Store is contingent upon the support of the churches of the District, and

Whereas the potential profits of the said Book Store are to become a means of income for Western Pilgrim College and thereby help to underwrite the School's financial load,

Therefore, be it resolved that this Conference encourage its churches and

membership to patronize the Pilgrim Book Store.

No. 11—Whereas it seems necessary to have a uniform method of computing Sunday School attendance in the District so as to make the comparison of statistics on an equal basis between each and every Sunday School, thus permitting the enjoyment of equal opportunity in said comparisons,

Therefore, be it resolved that only those attending Sunday School who arrive on or before 15 minutes after the regular beginning time of the Sunday School class period be counted in reports to the District Conference or to any of its committees or officials.

No. 12—Whereas the projects and information in regard to the Foreign Missionary Department could be better co-ordinated and better results could be achieved within our individual churches and within our District as a whole through the help of a District Missionary Society Committee,

Therefore be it resolved that the District Council shall elect from the nominations of the District Council a Missionary Society Committee of not less than three members whose number and terms shall be for such periods as the District Council shall provide.

Be it further resolved that from among those elected the District Council shall appoint one to serve as District Missionary Society President. It is intended that this Missionary Society Committee shall operate under the same rules and organization as the District Sunday School Committee. (Effective in 1958).

No. 13—Whereas we are grateful for the blessings of the Lord which has been evidenced through progress in the past year, and

Whereas our District Superintendent has untiringly given himself to the work of building the District, therefore,

Be it resolved that we give Rev. Lundy Hill a rising vote of appreciation and thereby pledge him our prayers and support for the ensuing year.

No. 14—Be it resolved that the Conference give its presiding officer, Dr. W. L. Surbrook, a rising vote of thanks for his labor of love among us.

No. 15—Be it resolved that this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Conrad Park and the kitchen and dining-room crews for the magnificent manner in which they have entertained this Conference.

No. 16—Be it resolved that greetings be sent to Mrs. W. L. Surbrook, the wife of our presiding officer; to Dr. and Mrs. William H. Neff, General Superintendent; Rev. and Mrs. P. W. Thomas, editor of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate and members of this District; Mrs. Seth C. Rees; Mrs. Garner; and to all the missionaries now serving under appointment abroad who hold membership in this District.

No. 17—Be it resolved that a letter of condolence be sent to Rev. Francisco Soltero expressing the sympathy of this Conference in the recent passing of his godly companion.

No. 18—Whereas a letter has been received from the Arizona Conference expressing deep appreciation for the many blessings derived through their years of association with this Conference, and

Whereas we share the sentiments thus expressed,

Therefore, be it resolved that this Conference send a letter of greetings to the Arizona Conference expressing our deep appreciation for their letter and bidding them God's speed in the building of a strong District in Arizona.

Ways and Means Committee

No. 1—Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be continued at \$4,000.00 per year in addition to his residence, utilities and traveling expenses.

No. 2—Be it resolved that Resolution No. 8 of the 1956 Ways and Means Committee on page 36 be amended as follows: delete the words "prior to September 1st, 1956."

No. 3—Be it resolved that Resolution No. 12, page 38 of Standing Resolutions be deleted.

No. 4—Be it resolved that each church be responsible to furnish two man-days labor or \$25.00 for preparation of the Camp Meeting buildings and grounds at least three days prior to Camp Meeting upon the call of the District Superintendent.

Any church that fails to provide the labor or funds set forth above, the active ministers of that church shall be denied their usual camp discount privileges.

Each individual who, at the call of the District Superintendent, works three man-days or more preparing the grounds and buildings for Camp Meeting shall be entitled to free board during Camp Meeting.

No. 5—Whereas the majority of the Pilgrim Holiness ministers of the California District have expressed keen interest in participation in a group insurance plan such as Blue Cross, Now therefore,

Be it resolved that this conference shall as an integral part of its official functions, sponsor and promote the enrollment of its assigned ministers, teachers and full time clerical employees of the district in a group insurance plan.

- 1—That the District Council be empowered to enter into agreements with an insurance company to provide said group insurance coverage as herein mentioned;
- 2—That a committee of three ministers from this District shall be appointed by the District Council to be known as the Group Insurance Committee;
- 3—That the District Council through its appointed committee shall set up procedures, rules and methods for the enrollment of eligible personnel, collection and disbursement of funds and such other matters that are necessary to carry out the aims of this program.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS FROM PREVIOUS CONFERENCES

(1)

Be it resolved that the District Council shall be informed of all **matters of major legislative** change prior to presentation to the conference.

(2)

Be it resolved that all **school offerings** shall be **paid directly** to Western Pilgrim College. The School Treasurer shall keep an individual account for each church and report to the District Treasurer monthly and to the annual conference.

(3)

We recommend that Section 92, paragraphs 4, page 51, and Section 149, paragraphs 8, page 82 of the 1954 Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, which reads as follows, be enforced:

"Any church or pastor failing to raise the budget without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference."

(4)

Be it resolved that the local churches pay the **traveling expenses and entertainment** of their **delegates** for the Conference business sessions. This does not include camp meeting.

(5)

Whereas, the General Conference has made provision that newly organized churches in established districts assume one-fourth of their **General Budget obligations** the first year after being organized; one-half of their budget the second year; three-fourths the third year, and beginning with fourth year pay in full:

Therefore, be it resolved that on this district we apply the same percentages in regard to our **district budget**.

(6)

Be it resolved that the following items be paid out of the **District Expense Fund**:

1. Utilities for the home of the District Superintendent.
2. Publication of the Pilgrim News.
3. District office expense.

(7)

Be it resolved that the **cafeteria and lunch stand** be considered part of the camp meeting operations and all monies pertaining thereto be held in the Camp Meeting Fund.

(8)

Be it resolved that **ministers** coming to this district **from other denominations** be interviewed by the District Council before their **credentials** are presented to the Conference.

(9)

Whereas in the past important papers have been lost and a considerable loss of time and finances were necessary to secure new papers, therefore be it resolved that all local churches of the district forward to the District Council, for filing, all **legal papers** pertaining to the ownership of the local church property.

(10)

Whereas, the District owns shares in the **Lexington Blvd. Mutual Water Co.**, therefore be it resolved that the following five district **officers**, by virtue of their office, be appointed to represent our shares in the Water Co.: The District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Treasurer and Secretary and the President of the Board of Trustees. And be it further resolved that the representatives vote the shares as a block as instructed by the District Council on matters of policy.

(11)

Be it resolved that the **District Council** and following **committees** and boards, meet one day prior to the annual Conference to take care of such work as they have on hand. The Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees, and the Educational and Examining Board.

(12)

Be it resolved that the following sums be allowed to the District Secretary and the District Treasurer for their services:

District Secretary—\$25.00 per quarter.
District Treasurer—\$85.00 per quarter.

(13)

Be it resolved that all plans for the **construction or remodeling of church buildings** be presented to a District Building Committee on which there shall be an architect, a builder, and a financier for their suggestions.

(14)

Resolved that before licensed or ordained **ministers** coming from other churches shall be received into the local churches, the pastor shall consult with the District Superintendent and Council regarding said minister.

(15)

Be it resolved that each **pastor** be granted the privilege of holding at least one **revival** each conference year.

(16)

Be it resolved that our district **Educational and Examining Board** be instructed to secure a set of questions covering the course of study prescribed by the manual and make the same available to those desiring to take the Study Course.

(17)

We recommend that, whereas we now have a standing Statistical Committee to function during the conference year, be it resolved that all **reports** be made

in full and sent to **the Statistical Committee** not later than one week before the conference date.

(18)

Be it resolved that the use of our **District Camp Grounds** be limited to the activities of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

(19)

Resolved that when recommendation for **credentials** is presented to the Conference the candidate be present, or send a written testimony to accompany the recommendation.

(20)

Be it resolved that the part of the **District Superintendent's** and other district officers' **expense**, relating to the propagation of district home missions, be so designated and paid for out of district home mission funds.

(21)

Whereas, the school has operational control of the Conference grounds the greater part of the year; therefore we recommend that the matter of a **maintenance man** for said **grounds** be left to the consideration of the District Council and the School Board.

(22)

Be it resolved that the Conference form a **committee** of four which shall have charge of the Old Folks' Home buildings and **grounds**, said committee to be comprised of the District Superintendent, the pastor of the El Monte Pilgrim Holiness Church, the President of the Board of Trustees, and one member to be appointed by the District Council.

(23)

Be it resolved that the **District Superintendent** be given an annual **vacation** with pay, not to exceed two weeks.

(24)

Be it resolved that each local church be urged to raise a **subscription** list to the **Pilgrim Holiness Advocate** equal to its total membership.

(25)

Be it resolved, that the **Conference Minutes** be sold at 75c per copy. Be it further resolved, that each church remit from local funds for the minutes ordered, and then sell them to the members for the stipulated price.

(26)

Be it resolved, that there be a **Camp Meeting Grounds Committee** appointed by the Council to improve and prepare the Camp Ground for Camp services.

(27)

Be it resolved, that in lieu of the Annual District Home Missions offering received the last Sunday of Camp, we adopt a system known as the **District Home Missions Reserve Call System** to operate as follows: The District Superintendent be privileged to ask for a special offering toward the needs of any mission project, not to exceed the equivalent of three \$5.00 calls to each voluntary member per year.

(28)

Be it resolved that our pastors be urged to secure Pilgrim Holiness **Evangelists** as much as possible. And be it further resolved that evangelists from other denominations be secured under the District Superintendent's approval.

(29)

Be it resolved that the **financial records of all departments** of the District be submitted to the District Auditing Committee at least **THREE** days prior to the District Conference. This includes District Treasurer, District Youth, Sunday School Committee, and Western Pilgrim College.

(30)

Whereas the General Conference has revised the General Budget and whereas the present set-up does not properly equalize the finances to meet the new

obligation; therefore, we recommend that this conference adopt the following simplified **system of finance** as suggested by General Conference Action:

a. The combined General and District Budgets shall be computed on the basis of **\$1.50 per month per member**, or a total of \$18.00 per year. The budget responsibility of each local church shall be determined by the District Council by,—first, taking the total **membership** of each local church and deducting from that total the number of missionaries the local church has under commission; second, **deducting 10%** from the remainder; third, providing the number of non-voting members (under the age of 14 years) exceeds 10% of the remainder, then, in that event, the **number** that is in excess of 10% of the remainder is to be **deducted** from the remainder. The resulting number will be the local church's membership for budget responsibility.

To enable the District Council to determine this responsibility, each and every local church shall, during the first week in June of each conference year provide the District Council with a **list** of names and addresses of each and **every member** on the rolls of the local church as of the 31st day of May. Each member shall be listed under one of the following categories: (1) active members, (2) missionaries under commission, (3) non-voting members.

b. The **special Rally Day**, Thanksgiving, and easter **offerings**, plus offerings taken by representatives of the various departments of the General Church, shall be in addition to the **budget**.

c. Remittances shall be sent to the District Treasurer.

d. **Specified funds** are not to be considered as part of the **budget**.

(31)

Whereas in order that the pastor may be at his best and the church may be served better by the **pastor** receiving an **annual vacation**, therefore, be it resolved that each church of the District give its pastor a two weeks' vacation with pay.

(32)

In order to enable the work of the **District Sunday School Committee** to be more effective and to guide the officers of this department more completely, therefore, be it resolved that the District Council cause to be prepared a **Manual** outlining the duties, obligations, policies, sphere of operation and administration; and other pertinent data as to the office of the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and that of the Sunday School Board.

(33)

Be it resolved that the **time of sittings of future Conferences** be set as follows: 9:00 a.m.-12:00 noon; 2:00 p.m.-4:30 p.m.; and 7:00 p.m.-10:00 p.m., respectively.

(34)

Whereas, the ordaining of Ministers marks a high point in the Conference, and in the lives of those who are ordained, and whereas, in order that the **service of ordination** may be of the greatest blessing to all; and that candidates for ordination could anticipate the time for this service and that all interested persons might attend, therefore, be it resolved that the first order of business of the afternoon sitting of the second day of District Conference be that of the ordination service.

(35)

Be it resolved that each and every church in this conference shall take an **offering each** and every **month** during a major Sunday service for **Western Pilgrim College**.

(36)

Be it resolved that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, or his representative, shall have the privilege of holding two **services** annually in each of the churches of the District **in the interests** of the work of the **District Sunday School Committee** and that an offering shall be taken in said service and forwarded immediately to the District Treasurer being specified as an offering for the District Sunday School Committee.

(37)

Be it resolved that the District Council shall appoint a five member **Accounting Committee** for the purpose of coordinating, assisting, and putting into effect a uniform accounting system in our local churches together with the revision of existing forms and the preparation of additional forms for the reporting of financial affairs to the local church and/or the District; said Accounting Committee is to be appointed during the District conference, and the terms of the members shall be arranged so that not more than two members' terms shall expire in any one year, and be it further resolved that said committee shall prepare and distribute to the local churches through the District Treasurer, a financial form for the use of the local treasurer in reporting to the local church Board and for a quarterly report to the District Treasurer of the financial condition of our local churches, said form to contain substantially the same information as will be required in the Annual Financial Report.

(38)

Whereas, the **funds** received by the District from pledges for construction of a **camp dormitory** are not sufficient to cover the costs of construction, and whereas, these funds could be a great help in developing churches in our district, now therefore be it resolved that the District Council shall continue to promote the raising of funds for a campgrounds dormitory, and be it further resolved that until such time as sufficient funds are received to cover the costs of construction of a campgrounds dormitory that the District Council be authorized and is hereby authorized to use said funds for short term loans on properties for the development of our district.
