To the 40th Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, California District, convened at El Monte, California, June 28, 1962, Greetings!

With the passing of another conference year, we are reminded that our day of Gospel opportunity is fast fading and the night is approaching quickly. May we in the twilight hours of this our day carefully chart our course and prayerfully strive to accomplish our mission.

Spiritual Condition

The spiritual tone in the churches is good. This is evidenced in many of the churches that are showing an increase in Sunday school and church outreach. As a result of an active lay-visitation program several of the churches have seen new converts brought to Christ and into the fellowship of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. A personal devotion to God and an active interest in the lost of our communities is in essence true spirituality.

Church Construction

A number of the churches are in building programs or in the process of starting.

Sacramento, one of our newest home missionary churches, started

their building program in June of this year. They have a choice location just off the freeway in southwest Sacramento. The District is placing \$16,000.00 of Home Missions funds in this promising new work which are to be repaid on a repayment schedule in the future.

Corona church is in the midst of an enlargement program which will give them a nice Sunday school assembly room plus additional Sunday school class rooms. The plans also include very adequate rest room facilities.

East Pasadena church has launched into a very much-needed sanctuary building program. At the present time the footings are poured, the rough plumbing is in and the concrete slab is the next item on the agenda.

El Monte church is planning to start their new sanctuary program this fall.

Riverside church is in the process of starting the construction of a new church parsonage.

San Dimas church is hoping to sell their present church property so that construction can start on their new proposed plant in a beautiful new location.

Shall we all join in gratitude and praise to God for this new thrust in church and Sunday school facilities to meet the needs of a swelling population in this our great state!

Church Improvements

Some of the churches have made some very notable and worthy improvements on their properties.

Oak View church has installed new church window glass and stone work has been added to the front of the church. This greatly enhances the appearance of the church.

San Diego church has completely enlarged and redecorated the entire interior of their church. This has increased their seating capacity considerably.

New Church

Beaumont, California is the location of our newest church. Over an acre of ground with a nice large educational building was purchased last fall in this growing city for \$18,500. This was remodeled and we now have a chapel that will seat 75 with 7 classrooms.

This city is a wide open field for the message of full salvation. There are no other churches of the Wesleyan persuasion in the city at the present time. The city has a population of about 5,000 at the present.

Concluding Remarks

The records of the District Statistician show that we have realized a gain of 38 in church membership and a gain of 73 in Sunday school attendance the last year. Some churches showed commendable gains while others showed losses. I trust that the ensuing year shall find us with nets mended for a great ingathering of souls for the Master.

I wish to conclude by expressing my personal and sincere appreciation to the District Council for their counsel and help the past year. I should like to state publicly that where the district work has suffered in any degree, these men have faithfully performed their duties and any criticism is justly mine.

It has been a joy to work with the committees representing every department of the district work. Any degree of success can be easily attributed to the loyal labors of the consecrated men and women who make up the ranks of the Pilgrims of the California District.

REPORT OF MILE HIGH PINES BOARD OF DIRECTORS

To the 1962 Annual California District Young Peoples' Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church - Greetings in the wonderful Name of the Lord Jesus Christ!

At the beginning of this Conference year, the Mile High Pines Board of Directors, determined by God's help to complete two difficult but important tasks — the construction of a huge water storage tank and the completion of the Fellowship Hall. God has been helping us to reach these high goals in a way that has often surprised us. The Board was able to secure a loan for \$6,000.00 and at present it appears that the Lord will help us make this \$6,000.00 do the work of \$10,000.00 and thereby finish both of these projects. One man has used his equipment free of charge to prepare the site for the water tank and at present a \$250.00-a-day iron crew is donating its time in erecting the tank. Thus we will be getting a 40,000-gallon water tank for about \$2,000.00 which is less than half of the normal cost.

A contractor has, free of cost to us, prepared the blueprints for com-pleting the Fellowship Hall and work will soon begin on this project. By God's continued help we will be able to dedicate both the water tank and the Fellowship Hall at this year's Labor Day Camp. The reaching of these goals will make it possible for us to use our Camp for 12 months out of the year instead of the present three months. We are also taking steps to rent the camp for all the time when it is not used by Pilgrim groups, thus meling it largely self-superting thus making it largely self-supporting.

We thank God for past, present and future victory in this part of His great kingdom.

ANNUAL REPORT OF DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY PRESIDENT

June 1, 1961 to May 31, 1962

To the Annual District Conference, Greetings:

This has been a very busy year and one quite different from the usual. I have found our adult societies wonderful to work with. The co-operation of the presidents has been splendid. I could not ask for better, I am sure.

A number of our adult groups are working on new uniforms for our African Bible women. The societies that were not able to do the sewing paid for the material for those that could sew. We anticipate that a number will have their uniforms completed and ready to send in a few days.

The significance of the various colors incorporated in the Bible Women's uniform will be the theme for a portion of the Missionary Society Service which is to be held in the tabernacle Tuesday, July 3rd, from 9:30 a.m. till noon. Many other phases of our missionary endeavor will also be presented in that service.

I have met with the officers of 26 societies and have done my best to be a help and an encouragement to them. In several of the societies I have been able to supply materials and ideas for their sewing activities. We have sent out over 200 letters on our new Missionary Society letterhead, so beautifully printed by Brother Parmenter, of Los Gatos. Also some 36 postal cards, also many packages have been sent to various mission fields. Approximately 500 pounds of soap, gathered by the Riverside society, has been sent to the Orient. The Lord has opened up a channel for the transportation of missionary supplies to the Far East, through a nonsectarian organization of young men, called the Order of De Molay. The operation is called "Project Handclasp", and the motive is to establish better relations between the United States and the peoples of these countries by supplying food and clothing without cost. They have encouraged us to send all that we wish to our missionaries by this means without charge. The west coast director is the Commandant of the 11th Naval District of the U.S. Navy, and the materials are transported aboard Naval vessels. A recent letter from the Commandant indicates that the operation has included the loading and manifesting of several hundred tons of supplies for the Orient during the last month, and yet they are ready to receive another shipment for the Philippines at any time in their warehouse. We were enabled recently to haul a trailer loaded with six barrels and one bale of clothing, four boxes of Sunday school literature and three boxes of selected religious books to San Diego, for shipment to the Philippines, through the courtesy of "Project Handclasp".

The above materials were supplied by the societies at Adams Memorial, Corona, El Monte, and Rees Memorial, with the exception of the books, which were from the former W.P.C. library.

books, which were from the former W.P.C. library. It was the desire of many of our societies to express their apprecia-tion for the labors of our retiring General Missionary Society Director, Miss Annie Eubanks (now Mrs. Annie Carlson), by pooling their donations for a wedding gift. The amount of \$50 was sent to her, so that she might select for herself a gift by which to remember the district. Her letter of thanks, describing the gift she purchased, may be read by any who desire to do so. There have been many hours of preparation and miles of travel in the interest of organizing lumior. Missionary Societies over the District in the interest of organizing Junior Missionary Societies over the District. Twenty-six churches have been visited in this regard. Twenty actually started a Junior society, but some of these have failed to continue through the year. We have had to retrace the miles several times, due to changes in Junior leaders; but with all the drawbacks we have encountered, we do have some very outstanding Junior groups. Taken as a whole, I believe that our junior leaders are some of the year bet that our junior leaders are some of the very best. There remains yet much work to be done with some groups.

At the beginning of the year, we mimeographed 300 copies of a chorus book for juniors. These were furnished to the participating groups. Sister Palmer furnished and cut the stencil.

Twelve individuals have finished the prescribed Missionary Reading Course and these will be receiving their certificates during the appointed missionary service, during the camp meeting.

We have traveled more than 1,000 miles this year in promoting the missionary work throughout the district.

I wish to publicly thank the District Superintendent and the District Council for the help and counsel they have given. I wish also to express my appreciation for the splendid help of all who so faithfully assisted in preparing the rooms for camp meeting last year.

I am grateful for the help of the other members of my committee, and also for my husband, who has helped cheerfully whenever needed. As revealed by the statistical report, the societies of the district have

RESOLUTIONS OF THE 1962 CONFERENCE

Ways and Means Committee

No. 1—WHEREAS plans are being made to have our first Western Regional Pilgrim Sunday School Convention for the 11 districts west of the Mississippi River August 20-22, 1963, in Denver, Colorado, and

WHEREAS such a meeting of Pilgrims for the purpose of Sunday School instruction, study and inspiration with guest speakers, workshops and displays can be of invaluable benefit to our work, and

SINCE in a meeting of the district superintendents and promotional secretaries of this area with Rev. J. D. Abbott, Secretary of General Sunday Schools, last February a financial plan was agreed upon for this purpose, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: we in the California District give 20 cents per Sunday School member on active enrollment in the 1962-63 conference year for the purpose of financing our First Western Regional Sunday School Convention and that said monies as collected shall be mailed monthly to district headquarters clearly designated for that purpose.

No. 2—BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Resolution No. 21 of the 1961 Minutes be changed to read "\$1.00 per copy."

No. 3—BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Standing resolution No. 22 be replaced with the following: A system to raise finance for District Home Missions shall be established. This system shall be known as the District Home Missions 500 Club, the purpose of which shall be to secure subscriptions to the 500 Club—individuals who will pledge themselves to give \$1.00 per month for the establishment of new churches in California. The District Superintendent shall solicit memberships during his visit to the local churches, and an offering for District Home Missions be taken at that time.

Resolutions Committee

No. 1—BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The District Superintendent in cooperation with youth zone leaders and heads of departments of the District Conference shall formulate a district calendar and place same in the hands of each pastor and department head of this district;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: Each youth zone leader and district department head prepare and send his annual schedules to the District Superintendent prior to the Pastors' and District Leaders' Conference the last week of September each year.

No. 2-BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The District Minutes be published with the present standing resolutions listed in categories and designated as "Standing Rules and By-Laws."

No. 3-BE IT RESOLVED THAT: A District Home Missions Board be established. Such board is to be made up of two lay members, two pastors, and the District Superintendent who shall be chairman. This board shall be appointed by the District Council. Responsibilities involved shall be:

- a. To investigate new areas to establish churches, such investigation to include surveys and finances needed;
- b. Recommendations to the District Council as to how to implement
- plans to establish new churches; c. To be responsible to carry out the recommendations presented to and approved by the District Council in order to establish such churches;
- d. Such board shall be directly amenable to the District Council.

No. 4—BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Standing resolution No. 46 be changed to read as follows: A permanent committee known as the District Steward-ship Committee, shall be established to investigate and provide material in the area of tithing for the education of our people. This committee shall be comprised of the following officers: District Superintendent, District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, District Youth President, District Missionary Society President. This committee shall make a report of its activities to the annual conference. activities to the annual conference.

No. 5—BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Each local church delegate be re-minded of and abide by the following requirement found in Section 92, Paragraph 3, of the Manual: "All delegates shall pledge themselves to their local church that they will stay until the close of the annual conference unless called home by sickness or death." Further, that such delegates pledge to attend all sessions.

No. 6-BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Since local church lay delegates are required by Manual to stay until the end of conference, be it resolved that all who hold credentials in the California Conference shall also feel obligated to conduct themselves in like manner.

No. 7—WHEREAS there exists a need for an established calendar of District activities. BE IT RESOLVED THAT the following dates be set for District functions:

Conference—the last Thursday and Friday of June.

Camp Meeting—the last Friday of June over two Sundays.

Summer Camps—Labor Day weekend and the preceding three weeks. Pastors' and Leaders' Conference—in the last full week of September. District Home Missions Emphasis-the month of September.

District Stewardship Emphasis-the month of November.

District Ministerial Convention—in the last full week of February. Pastors' Retreat—during the week following Easter.

Annual Sunday School Banquet—in the month of May.

No. 8-BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Standing resolution No. 31 be changed to read: The conference shall use the following method of renewing pastoral relations:

- a. That each church shall vote during the last full week of March on renewal of pastoral relations.
- b. That each local church secretary shall forward to the District Superintendent the results of such vote within five days following the time of voting.
- c. That each pastor shall forward to the District Superintendent his reply within 15 days of the time of voting. (See 1958 Manual, Section 53, Paragraph 3.)
- d. That each pastor who does not plan to renew pastoral relations shall notify the District Superintendent on or before the 15th day of March.

No. 9-BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Standing resolution No. 12 be changed to read: We recommend that before licensed or ordained ministers coming from outside the California District, or from other denominations, be received into local church membership, the pastor shall consult with the District Superintendent and the District Council regarding said minister. No. 10—BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Standing resolution No. 35 be deleted and that we conform to the General Sunday School Department's

"Standard of Excellence" with respect to computing Sunday School attendance.

No. 11-WHEREAS the conference delegates responsibility to its district leaders and officers and expects them to function at peak efficiency in this work of God, therefore BE IT RESOLVED THAT the full membership of the district covenant to daily hold up the hands of these servants of God with prayer and supplication.

No. 12—WHEREAS, in the past, the General Missionary Society Di-rector at headquarters has handled all the detailed correspondence with the local society presidents, and, Whereas, the number of organized societies has greatly increased during the past quadrennium, and, Whereas, it is the proper function of the District President to act as a liaison officer between the general and local group in any similar organization, therefore BE IT RESOLVED THAT: In the future, all correspondence, including

reports, shall be directed to the District President, who will in turn relay the information to headquarters and/or secure an answer in return. The ONE EXCEPTION to the above rule relates to the correspondence concerning MISSIONARY CHRISTMAS BOXES, which should still be carried on directly with headquarters.

No. 13—WHEREAS we have an obligation as Christian citizens and members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church to oppose legislation detrimental to evangelical Christianity and whereas lobbying is a most effective method of inflencing legislation. BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT: The

Of finitencing legislation, BE 11 THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT: The Office of Public Affairs of the National Association of Evangelicals be au-thorized to speak for the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on all legislative matters that are of vital interest to Christian citizens. No. 14—WHEREAS our District Superintendent has untiringly given himself to the work of building the District, therefore BE IT RESOLVED THAT we give Rev. Thomas Hamon a rising vote of appreciation for his labors of love during the past year.

No. 15-BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The Conference give its presiding officer, Dr. Melvin Snyder, a rising vote of thanks for his labor of love among us.

No. 16—BE IT RESOLVED THAT: This Conference give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Bob Smalley and to the kitchen and dining room crews for the magnificent manner in which they have entertained this conference.

No. 17-BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Greetings be sent to all the Missionaries now serving under appointment abroad, who hold membership in this District.

STANDING RULES AND BY-LAWS

Annual Conference

- 1. The time for conference sittings shall be as follows:
- 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon; 2:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. 2. The District Conference shall follow the method prescribed in the Manual, Section 45, which reads as follows:

"Each delegate shall be provided with a certificate of his appointment, signed by the pastor and secretary."

The Conference Registrar, appointed by the District Council, shall as-sume his duties at the entrance to the District Tabernacle one hour prior to the opening of each session of the Conference and shall register all members of the Conference and all duly certified lay delegates, pre-

senting each member or delegate with a badge admitting him within the conference bar.

The Conference Registrar shall receive and record the certificates from the lay delegates and shall present the list of registered delegates to the Conference Secretary prior to the opening of each session of the Conference.

- 3. The members of all standing Conference committees shall be members of the Annual District Conference with voice and vote.
- 4. The chairman of the Statistical Committee shall present orally the following highlights from the Statistical Committee report: total number of seekers, membership, Sunday school attendance and the financial summary of totals by departments. This entire report shall be posted before the fourth sitting of the Conference.
- 5. The ordination service shall be conducted in a special service at the beginning of the evening sitting on the first day of Conference.
- 6. The District Council, the Resolutions Committee, the Ways and Means Committee, the Educational Board, and the Examining Board shall meet one day prior to the Annual Conference to take care of such work as they have on hand.
- 7. When recommendation for credentials is presented to the Conference the candidate shall be present or send a written testimony to accompany the recommendation.
- 8. All local and district youth finances or monies given for youth activities shall be listed separately in district and local reports.

Conference Committees

- 1. All plans for the construction or remodeling of church buildings shall be presented to a District Building Committee on which there shall be an architect, a builder and a financier for their suggestions.
- 2. The Conference Educational and Examining Boards shall secure a set of questions covering the course of study prescribed by the Manual and make the same available to all those desiring to take the study course.
- 3. A committee of four shall have charge of the Old Folks' Home buildings and grounds, said committee to be comprised of the District Superintendent, Pastor of the El Monte Pilgrim Holiness Church, the President of the Board of Trustees and one member appointed by the District Council.
- 4. The financial records of all departments of the Conference shall be submitted to the District Auditing Committee at least three days prior to the District Conference. This includes District Treasurer, District Youth, Sunday School Committee.
- 5. The Conference Sunday School Promotional Secretary or his representative shall have the privilege of holding two services annually in each of the churches of the Conference in the interest of the work of the Conference Sunday School Committee and an offering shall be taken in said service and forwarded immediately to the Conference Treasurer being specified as an offering for the Conference Sunday School Committee.
- 6. All licensed ministers and deaconesses shall be notified in advance of Conference to meet with the Educational and Examining Boards on the Saturday previous to Conference and in the event it is impossible to do so they shall notify these boards in writing. If there is no response it will indicate to the Educational and Examining Boards that the licentiate is not interested in his or her credentials.
- 7. The Ways and Means and Resolutions Committees shall meet 30 days prior to Conference and mimeographed copies listing all resolutions with committee recommendations shall be placed in the hands of all delegates no later than 10 days prior to said District Conference.

8. The Conference Scholarship Committee shall be appointed by the District Council for the purpose of raising finances for a District Scholarship Fund. This committee will serve in the examination and recommendation of worthy students to receive help from such funds. Said committee is to be amenable to the District Council and all final appointments are to be subject to Council approval.

District

- 1. The following items shall be paid out of the District expense fund: Utilities for the home of the District Superintendent; Publication of the California Pilgrim; District office expense.
- 2. The cafeteria and lunch stand shall be considered part of the camp meeting operations and all monies pertaining thereto shall be held in the camp meeting fund.
- 3. The District Superintendent's and other District officers' expenses relating to the propagation of District home missions shall be so designated and paid out of district home missions funds.
- 4. This Conference shall list inactive ministers according to the interpretation of the General Board with reference to Section 178 of the Manual. "We understand by the term 'active and regularly engaged in the work of the ministry,' to mean pastors with a regular appointment and full time evangelists and to ministers who are under special appointment. With reference to the aged ministers we suggest that only those above 65 years may be so classified."
- The following sums shall be allowed the District Secretary and the District Treasurer for their services: District Secretary—\$25.00 per quarter; District Treasurer—\$100.00 per quarter.
- 6. This conference shall accept and adopt a goal of \$5.00 per member per year in support of Central Pilgrim College. The basis for determining membership responsibility for the above-mentioned goal is to deduct 10% from the total voting membership of the church.
- 7. The District Youth President or his representative shall have the privilege of holding two services annually in each of the churches of the District in the interest of the work of District Youth and an offering shall be taken in said service and forwarded immediately to the District Treasurer being specified as an offering for District Youth.

District Council

- 1. The District Council shall be informed of all matters of major legislative change prior to presentation to the conference.
- 2. The District Council shall promote the raising of funds for a camp grounds dormitory and is hereby authorized to use said funds for shortterm loans on properties for the development of our district until sufficient funds are received to cover the costs of construction of a campgrounds dormitory.
- 3. The District Secretary shall be informed immediately upon the death of any pastor or pastor's wife of the district and he shall notify by telephone all pastors in the district and notify the editor of the district publication.
- 4. An honor system for recognition of churches who pay their United Stewardship Fund shall be established and a chart be compiled by the District Treasurer and displayed at the District Camp and Conference.
- 5. The District Secretary shall give written notification to all appointees to standing conference committees within 30 days after District Conference. The chairman of each standing committee shall be notified by the District Secretary 60 days prior to District Conference to activate his committee.

6. Ministers coming to this District from other denominations shall be interviewed by the District Council before their credentials are presented to the Conference.

District Superintendent

- 1. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$4,500.00 per year in addition to his residence, utilities, traveling expenses and automobile mileage at seven cents per mile.
- 2. The District Superintendent shall be given an annual two-week vacation with pay.
- 3. The District Superintendent shall arrange for an annual Pastors' Retreat.
- 4. During the month of September, the District Superintendent shall call a meeting of all District leaders and pastors for the purpose of introducing the programs of the various departments for the coming year.

Local Church

- 1. All local churches shall pay the traveling expenses and entertainment of their delegates for the Conference business sessions.
- 2. All local churches shall forward to the District Council for filing all legal papers pertaining to the ownership of the local church property.
- 3. Each pastor shall be granted the privilege of holding at least one revival in each Conference year.
- 4. All reports shall be made in full and sent to the Statistical Committee not later than one week before the Conference date.
- 5. Each local church shall be urged to raise a subscription list to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate equal to its total membership.
- 6. The Conference Minutes shall be sold at \$1.00 per copy and each church shall remit from local funds for the minutes ordered and then sell them to the members for the stipulated price.
- 7. Pastors are urged to secure Pilgrim Holiness evangelists as much as possible. Evangelists from other denominations shall be secured under the District Superintendent's approval.
- 8. Each pastor shall receive an annual two-week vacation with pay.
- 9. Each church shall be responsible to furnish two man-days' labor or \$25 for preparation of the camp meeting buildings and grounds at least three days prior to camp meeting upon the call of the Conference Grounds Board.

Any church providing the labor or funds set forth above, the active ministers of that church shall be entitled to meals at one-half price.

Each individual who at the call of the Conference Grounds Board works three man days or more preparing the grounds and buildings for camp meeting shall be entitled to free board during the camp meeting.

- 10. The names and addresses of the following officers of each local church shall be submitted to the editor of the *California Pilgrim* for publication with or in the August issue of each year:
 - Sunday School Superintendent;
 - Youth Society President;
 - Missionary Society President.
- 11. Each church shall pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife who are members of the Ministerial Benefit Association.

United Stewardship Fund

- 1. The Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church which reads as follows shall be enforced:
 - "Any church or pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference."
- 2. Newly organized churches shall assume one-fourth of their United Stewardship Fund the first year after being organized, one-half the second year, three-fourths the third year, and beginning with the fourth year, pay in full.
- 3. The following is the system of finances which shall cover the total district and United Stewardship Fund obligations of the local church.

Each and every local church in the District shall send to the District Treasurer once each month a stewardship assessment in the amount of ten per cent (10%) of all offerings received by the church, Sunday School, Youth Society and Missionary Society; except all specified funds raised for the construction or acquisition of church buildings or property, Sunday School units, and parsonages, and except specified funds raised for the retirement of indebtednecs on same.

This system of finance shall be designated as the District United Stewardship Fund and each and every church in the District shall remit each month a tithe of its income to the District Treasurer for the account of said Stewardship Fund.

The District Treasurer shall distribute within 30 days after receipt the funds received in the United Stewardship Fund as follows:

1. 62% to District Stewardship Fund, said 62% to be distributed as follows:

International Conference Reserve	. 4%
Sunday School Promotional Committee	4%

Missionary Society Committee	. 2%

2. 38% to General Stewardship Fund; and if the said 38% shall exceed the annual General Stewardship Fund responsibility of this District, then the amount received over and above our annual General Stewardship responsibility shall be used for District Home Missionary work.
