CALIFORNIA ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Journal of Proceedings

First Sitting, July 19, 1966

District Superintendent Thomas Lee presented the ordinands; Rev. Abbott gave the ordination charge, after which Rev. Lee offered the prayer of dedication. As the ordination council lay hands on each candidate kneeling at the altar, prayer was offered for each and Rev. Abbott ordained individually the following: Ministers—Charles Horton, Eugene Lee, Dale Kelley, Dorothy Hall, Jacob Hwang; Deaconess—Jeanne Horton.

God's presence was unusually manifest as the congregation greeted the newly-ordained before the altar.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our General Superintendent, Rev. J. D. Abbott, fellow ministers, delegates, and friends of the forty-fourth Annual Conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings!

A realistic appraisal of our work for the past year reveals that there is no discharge in this holy war, and that every foot of ground taken from the enemy must be paid for by the life investment of every sincere follower of our Lord. However, increased opposition should only serve as a call to arms for every soldier of the cross.

The numerous changes in our pastorates the previous year have necessitated time for our new men to acquaint themselves with their new field of service, and to rally their forces for an aggressive program of evangelism. This they have been doing acceptably, and God is blessing their efforts. Numerous reports of the moving of the Holy Spirit upon local congregations indicate the desire of our people for revival, and God's willingness to satisfy every hungry heart. May we continue to be a truly evangelistic church, with a burden for souls, and be satisfied with nothing less than God's best in our personal lives, and in the progress of His church.

District Home Missions

We have continued to fight a desperate, but winning, battle financially to keep our District Home Missionary churches solvent. In most cases the situation is much brighter than it was one year ago. The one exception is the work at Los Gatos. Though this church had been received as an organized work, it had never gotten beyond home missionary status. A series of unfortunate events made it necessary for the District Council to make the decision to close this work. It is presently listed for sale, and funds realized from its purchase should be re-invested in the District Home Missionary program.

SACRAMENTO is another organized church that has had to draw heavily on District Home Missionary funds for support. However, we are glad to report that under the able leadership, and spiritual ministry of Rev. Lundy Hill, it is prospering in every way. The necessity of District support has been greatly curtailed, and their church board at annual meeting voted to accept a plan that will phase out the necessity of District financial help completely within the next few months. The membership has a spirit of faith and optimism that is indeed refreshing. They are presently carrying all property payments, operating expenses, participating in United Stewardship responsibility, and carrying one-half of the pastor's support. At the rate of present progress this can be one of our strongest churches in the very near future.

BEAUMONT continues to operate under the leadership of Rev. Roland Lamb. The progress has not been spectacular, but the work is learning responsibility and going forward. They have needed some District financial assistance in addition to the payments on their parsonage of \$77.00 per month which the District has carried since its purchase. The loyal group of members are making their property payments on the church, carrying their operating expense, and endeavoring to reach the lost. Reverend Lamb, of necessity, is working full time at secular employment. Let us pray that

God will in some way make it possible for him to devote more time in the area of visitation. This is a "must" in every church, and is doubly essential in the growth and development of a new work. The coming year should be a decisive one in the establishment of this church.

RIALTO fellowship has become of age and is to be received into this Conference as an organized church. Pastor Fred Wells has done a splendid job of leading and training his people. They have carried the expense responsibility for the total operation of their church, besides contributing voluntarily to the District and General budget. There has been a bare minimum of pastoral support afforded by the District. Other than this, the loyal and sacrificial members have carried the full financial weight of this work from its beginning. We are proud to welcome this fine group into the fellowship of organized churches.

A FORWARD LOOK. Little has been done in the past two years to establish any new work. The reason for this has been largely a financial one. Not only has it been necessary to consolidate our latest investments in new work, but we have made considerable investment each year to supplement property payments, pay delinquent taxes, and care for other financial shortcomings of some churches which have been organized for years, and should be carrying their own burdens. Friends, this must come to an end if we are to make further progress in the area of District Church Extension. A parcel of ground large enough to start a church in any California city of size will average \$20,000, and the cost continues to rise. It is no small project when we talk about a new work on our District. I say this, not to discourage, but to awaken and challenge our churches to pay their budgets, learn to carry their own financial obligations, and to take some realistic steps to meet the challenge that is so obviously ours. Expensive though it may be, this is our vineyard, this is our responsibility, **THIS IS OUR OPPORTUNITY.** Let us stir the coals of our devotion to Christ and His program and create a blaze of faith and enthusiasm that will produce desired results.

THE "500 CLUB". We are indebted to those who have faithfully contributed to the District Home Missions "500 Club". I believe this was initiated to give full support to a Home Missionary worker in starting a new work. However, due to a shortage of funds it has not been possible to use it for this purpose entirely. The man for the work is ever bit as important as the work itself. A little more emphasis on the local level and we could easily realize an income of \$500 per month for this very important item. A little more urging by our pastors; a small sacrifice by our people — 25 cents per week — would work wonders for the support of this phase of the work. The plan is good, the objective is worthy. We urge pastors and people alike to get behind this project.

DISTRICT WORKERS. My report would not be complete without mention of my deep appreciation for the fine pastors and District Leaders who have served the District this past year. The District Council has labored long hours to care for the interests of our Conference. The co-operation of Rev. Lundy Hill, Assistant Superintendent, his service, and his counsel, has been a valuable asset. The District Secretary, Rev. Joseph Fillmore, and the District Treasurer, Rev. Paul Beck, have served well and faithfully in the discharge of their duties. Only those who serve in these various offices truly know the time and energy involved in performing these duties.

Charles McKay and the District Youth Council have given themselves unstintingly to the Youth work of our Conference. They are doing a fine job, and are leading our youth into a realization of total involvement in our District program.

Rev. Ellis Morrell and the District Sunday School Committee have worked faithfully to inspire and challenge our schools into a bigger and better sphere of influence. They are worthy of commendation for their sincere efforts in this very important field.

Mrs. Gertrude Beck has continued to serve the Conference well as our District Missionary Society President. Her leadership over the years has given our Society national recognition. We appreciate the labors of Sister Beck and her District Missionary Committee.

I traveled somewhat over 2500 miles in the interest of Sunday School work.

I appreciate the confidence, understanding and cooperation shown me by each of you and your churches.

MILE HIGH PINES YOUTH CAMP REPORT

To the Delegates of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Pasadena, July 19, 1966, Greetings:

The following is the official report to the conference from the Secretary of the Board of Mile High Pines, I quote:

March, 1966

"To the Pacific Regional Conference of the Brethren in Christ and the

California District of the Pilgrim Holiness:

Dear Fellow-laborers:

This past year has been one of getting acquainted in this joint project of the Brethren in Christ and the Pilgrim Holiness churches. Terms of agreement, by-laws, and policies were written and approved by the Board of Directors. The newly-formed Board of Directors elected Dan Chamberlain, chairman; Eber Dourte, vice-chairman; Nelson Miller, secretary; Paul Green, treasurer; and Ben Lenhert, advisory member.

The major activity of the year was the rehabilitation of the camp, which included many improvements which brought the camp up to Forestry, Health Department, and Building Department codes. Among these improvements were the following:

The Fellowship Hall was completed with siding on the outside, plaster-board and paint on the inside, lights, and a new roof; the cabins were repaired, new doors installed, and some new roofs; the nurse's cabin was remodeled, including new bathroom fixtures; the showers were repaired, all new plumbing and a new hot water heater installed; the kitchen and dining room were remodeled and painted, with some new equipment installed, and a new roof; the new pantry-storage room was completed; the water system "mainline" was installed, with the tank nearly completed; general clean-up and repairs were accomplished.

The Board of Directors met Oct. 29-30, 1965, and elected the new Executive Committee, which resulted in Nelson Miller, chairman; Paul Green, vice-chairman; Charles Rickel, secretary; David Eaton, assistant secretary; J. E. McCoy, Jr., treasurer; and Amos Buckwalter, advisory member.

Also, plans were made for the following construction and improvements for the 1966 camping season: A new cabin housing 30; sleeping facilities and restrooms in the east end of the Fellowship Hall; bathroom for the staff cabin; craft area patio on the south side of the kitchen; sanitation and sewage facilities increased.

With these plans completed, the capacity of the camp will be about 120 overnighers.

Approval has been granted to the camp by the Government for the placement of 1-W workers. Plans are for the placement of a couple in the near future.

The camp was in use four weeks, plus three week-ends through the summer. A number of groups have used the camp on week-ends through the winter. A major portion of the summer camping season has already been reserved for 1966.

The Board of Directors wants to express their sincere appreciation to the many who have donated their time working at the Camp. It is because of the spirit of giving that the camp succeeds. Also appreciation and thanksgiving is expressed for the dollars that have been invested in this project. May God continue to bless these investments for Him."

Supplemental to the above report I wish to add that most of the proposed work, and the work then in progress, has now been completed, or very nearly so.

Completed is a new dorm, sleeping facilities in the east end of the Fellowship Hall, Cabin 1, staff quarters, and Cabin 2, clinic, have been completely finished inside with partitions, bathroom, heat, and flooring. Sanitation and disposal lines have been completely and adequately enlarged. Almost all buildings have been reroofed and Cabins 5 and 6 have been lined with sheetrock and painted inside. The dining room and kitchen have received further improvements and have been given another painting. The dining room floor has been covered with linoleum, and the snack bar removed to the Fellowship Hall. The present phase of the water system is complete with the erection and installation of the 50,000 gallon water tank and the four-inch main line. All buildings in the entire camp have received a uniform painting on the outside.

The new idea of a "Youth Work Camp" during the Easter holidays was inaugurated this spring which proved to be highly successful and of great benefit to the camp. The young people of both the Brethren and the Pilgrims were enthusiastic and hard working. An average of over 35 youth were

present for each day of the week and a great deal of thanks is due the young people and the staff that worked with them.

Of particular significance has been the most faithful service of our Camp Manager, Mr. Virgil Feaster, who has devoted the largest portion of his full time during this past year looking out after the affairs of the camp. We are grateful to him and grateful too for the continued capable leadership of the Chairman of the Board, Nelson Miller.

It is worthy of note that at this time, just two short years after the noteworthy action of the California Conference, which in June 1962 declared itself wholeheartedly in support of Mile High Pines Youth Camp, that instead of having a property on our hands with a net minus value, we now have a going institution in which you may take justified pride, serving the Lord and our youth, with an estimated conservative net evaluation in excess of 90,000 dollars. Praise the Lord!

As we look ahead, having reviewed the past, we see God's hand still directing and leading. We are indeed grateful for His guidance and we are assured of His continued blessing as we look to Him while seeking to build for Him in this great investment for our youth. We look optimistically to the future counting upon the continued interest and support of all the California Pilgrims.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE 1966 CONFERENCE

No. 1—WHEREAS the District and General obligations belong mutually to the entire constituency, involving all churches, and WHEREAS there is a minimal amount necessary to operate both the District and General Church, in order to fulfill our responsibility in these respective areas, and WHEREAS the present budget has been projected so as to adequately cover the financial needs of both the District and General Church, based on a survey of local church income with all churches participating; THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT Section 82, Paragraph 4, of the 1962 Manual be effected beginning with the 1967 Conference. The above mentioned paragraph reads as follows:

Any church or pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference.

No. 2—WHEREAS it is frequently the case that we come to the close of a conference year with some churches in arrears in their United Stewardship obligations, thus seriously hampering the operation of the District and General Church;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT any church becoming two (2) months delinquent in their United Stewardship responsibility shall feel obligated to call upon the District Superintendent and/or the District Council to help them regarding this matter.

If any church fails to take such action, the District Council shall arrange an appointment to render such help, on the recommendation of the District Superintendent.

No. 3—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 9, under Annual

Conference, page 26, be deleted inasmuch as there is an annual presentation of our zone school at the District Camp Meeting.

Conference Committees

No. 4—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 1, under Conference Committees, page 26, be revised to read:

"The financial records of the following departments shall be submitted to the District Auditing Committee at least 15 days prior to the District Conference: District Youth Society, District Sunday School Committee, and District Missionary Society. The District Treasurer's books shall be audited by a Certified Public Accountant.

No. 5—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 2, under Conference Committees, page 26, be revised to read:

"All licensed ministers and deaconesses shall be notified in advance of Conference to meet with the Educational and Examining Boards prior to District Conference, the date or dates to be set by said boards, and, in the event it is impossible to do so, they shall notify these boards in writing."

No. 6—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 4, under Conference Committees, page 26, be revised to read:

"A standing committee known as the District Stewardship Committee shall be appointed to provide material on the subject of tithing for the education of our people. This committee shall be appointed by the District Council and shall make a report of its activities to the annual District Conference.

No. 7—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 5, under Conference Committees, page 26, be deleted.

No. 8—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 7, under Conference Committees, pages 26 and 27, be revised to read:

"Copies of the minutes and financial reports of the District Sunday School Committee, the District Missionary Society, the District Youth Society, and the Mile High Pines Board shall be mailed each month to the District Secretary."

No. 9—In conformance with the action of the current International Conference, be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 8, under Conference Committees, page 27, be revised to read:

"A District Christian Education Council shall be formed with the District Superintendent as chairman. Other members of the council shall be: the Assistant District Superintendent, the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the District Youth President, the District Director of PELT, the District Director of CYC, and others as deemed advisable.

No. 10—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 1, under District, page 27, be revised to read:

"The following sums shall be allowed for services:

District Secretary—\$50.00 per quarter;

District Treasurer—\$100.00 per quarter."

No. 11—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 3, under District, page 27, be deleted.

No. 12—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 5, under District, page 27, be revised to read:

"The Office of Public Affairs of the National Association of Evangelicals shall be authorized to speak for the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on all legislative matters that are of vital interest to and conviction of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The District Secretary shall send a copy of the District Minutes and the Manual of the P.H. Church to the State Director of the NAE, calling attention to this resolution.

No. 13—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 8, under District, page 27, be deleted.

No. 14—Covered by previous conference action.

No. 15—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 11, under District, page 27, be deleted.

District Council

No. 16—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 6, under District Council, page 28, be deleted.

District Superintendent

No. 17—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 1, under District Superintendent, page 28, be revised to read:

"The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$5,250.00 per year, in addition to his residence, utilities, traveling expense and automobile mileage at nine cents per mile."

No. 18—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 3, under District Superintendent, page 28, be deleted.

Local Church

No. 19—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 8, under Local Church, page 29, be revised to read:

"We recommend that vacations with pay for all ministers of this district range from a minimum of two weeks to a maximum of four weeks, based on the number of years of service in the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church as follows:

- a. After one year of service—a minimum of two weeks;
- b. After ten years of service—three weeks;
- c. After twenty years of service—four weeks.

No. 20—BE IT RESOLVED THAT before candidates for license are presented to the local church board, the pastor should counsel with the District Superintendent with regard to the fitness of such candidates.

No. 21—Lost.

No. 22—BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 3, under United Stewardship Fund, page 29, be deleted, inasmuch as this is covered by General Board ruling.

No. 23—BE IT RESOLVED THAT the proposed District Budget for the year 1966-67 be adopted.

No. 24—BE IT RESOLVED THAT the rental allowances, called for under our agreement covering two Life Leases at El Monte, be paid for from interest accruing to the Revolving Loan Fund, instead of from the principal.

No. 25—BE IT RESOLVED THAT monies accruing from interest on Revolving Loan Funds shall be placed in the District Home Missions Account, to be used for the promotion and support of District Home Missions after the life leases have been paid monthly.

No. 26—WHEREAS, our Board of General Superintendents at the recent International Conference charted a course for our beloved ship of Zion during the current quadrennium,

And have outlined such a course in their "Pastoral Letter to Pilgrims," as printed in the July 16, 1966 issue of the *Advocate*.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Conference adopt and implement the program as outlined:

1. To deepen the spiritual life of both pastor and people, by
 - (1) Investing more time in the study of God's Word;
 - (2) Engendering a genuine and significant prayer life;
 - (3) Maintaining a regular family altar;
 - (4) Witnessing daily through life and word.
2. To set as a goal the establishing of a branch Sunday School by each church, both large and small.

No. 27—WHEREAS the organizational structure of Mile High Pines Youth Camp established by this conference in 1965, made no provisions for a program of information or publicity or the means of raising of needed capital, and whereas, the successful development of an asset of this type will need a continuous flow of information to the constituents and capital funds to the Camp:

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Pilgrim Holiness members of the Mile High Pines Board of Directors, or their representatives be granted the privilege of presenting the program and needs of Mile High Pines to the people of the District along with the privilege of conducting at least one service annually in each church, and of taking a free-will offering.

No. 28—WHEREAS there are presently no working arrangements between the partners of Mile High Pines Youth Camp in regards to the methods and means of securing capital funds when the initial partnership arrangements are concluded:

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the following recommendation, submitted by the Board of Directors of Mile High Pines Youth Camp, be adopted:

WHEREAS the Board of Directors of Mile High Pines Camp is responsible for the raising of all capital funds for the camp, and

WHEREAS the terms of agreement do not specify a working arrangement between the partners for the soliciting of capital funds among the constituents of the respective partner denominations,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT full privilege and opportunity be given to the Board to publicize the need for and to solicit capital funds among the constituents of the respective partner denominations, and we further recommend that this working arrangement become effective on May 1, 1967.

No. 29—BE IT RESOLVED that this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Thomas Lee for his untiring labor of love among the California Pilgrims.

No. 30—BE IT RESOLVED that this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. J. D. Abbott for his labor of love among us.

No. 31—BE IT RESOLVED that greetings be sent to all the missionaries now serving under appointment abroad, who hold membership in this district.

STANDING RULES and BY-LAWS

Annual Conference

1. The time for conference sittings shall be as follows:
9 a.m. to 12 noon; 2 p.m. to 4:30 p.m., and 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.
2. A Conference Registrar, appointed by the District Council, shall assume his duties at the place of conference one hour prior to the opening of each session of the Conference and shall register all members of the Conference and all duly certified lay delegates, presenting each member or delegate with a badge admitting him within the Conference bar.
The Conference Registrar shall receive and record the certificates from the lay delegates and shall present the list of registered delegates to the Conference Secretary prior to the opening of each session of the Conference (1964).
3. The chairman of the Statistical Committee shall present orally the following highlights from the Statistical Committee report: total number of seekers, membership, Sunday School attendance and the financial summary of totals by departments. This entire report shall be posted before the fourth sitting of the Conference.
4. The ordination service shall be conducted in a special service at the beginning of the evening sitting on the first day of Conference.
5. The District Council, the Conference Action Committee, the Educational Board, and the Examining Board shall meet prior to the Annual Conference to take care of such work as they have on hand.
6. When recommendation for credentials is presented to the Conference, the candidate shall be present or send a written testimony to accompany the recommendation.
7. Each local church delegate shall be reminded of and shall abide by the following requirement found in Section 92, Paragraph 3, of the Manual: "All delegates shall pledge themselves to their local church that they will stay until the close of the annual Conference unless called home by sickness or death." Further, that such delegates pledge to attend all sessions.
8. Since local church lay delegates are required by Manual to stay until the end of Conference, all who hold credentials in the California Conference shall also feel obligated to conduct themselves in like manner.

Conference Committees

1. The financial records of the following departments of the Conference shall be submitted to the District Auditing Committee at least 15 days prior to the District Conference: District Youth Society, District Sunday School Committee and District Missionary Society. The District Treasurer's books shall be audited by a Certified Public Accountant. (1966)

2. All licensed ministers and deaconesses shall be notified in advance of Conference to meet with the Educational and Examining Boards prior to District Conference, the date, or dates to be set by said Boards, and, in the event it is impossible to do so, they shall notify these boards in writing. (1966)
3. The Conference Action Committee shall meet 30 days prior to Conference and mimeographed copies listing all resolutions shall be placed in the hands of all delegates no later than 10 days prior to said District Conference.
4. A standing committee known as the District Stewardship Committee, shall be appointed to provide material on the subject of tithing for the education of our people. This committee shall be appointed by the District Council and shall make a report of its activities to the annual District Conference. (1966)
5. It is recommended that all plans for construction or remodeling of church buildings and parsonages be presented to the District Building Committee for their suggestions. Said committee shall be appointed by the District Council. (1963)
6. Copies of the minutes and financial reports of the District Sunday School Committee, the District Missionary Society, the District Youth Society, and the Mile High Pines Board shall be mailed each month to the District Secretary. (1966)
7. A District Christian Education Council shall be formed with the District Superintendent as chairman. Other members of the council shall be: the Assistant District Superintendent, the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the District Youth President, the District Director of PELT, the District Director of CYC, and others as deemed advisable. (1966)
8. A Conference Action Committee shall be formed, said committee to consist of seven members to be appointed by the District Superintendent, which appointments may be ratified by the District Council. (1965)
9. The Pilgrim Holiness members of the Board of Directors of Mile High Pines shall be the District Superintendent, the District Secretary, the District Youth President, and the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, together with seven members elected by the District Conference from nominations submitted by the District Council. Three of these members will be elected for one year, two members for two years, and two members for three years, thereafter, each member shall be elected for a term of three years, except those serving by virtue of their office. And be it further resolved that an annual report of the activities and finances of the Mile High Pines Board be made to the District Conference. (1965)

District

1. The following sums shall be allowed for services:
 District Secretary—\$50.00 per quarter;
 District Treasurer—\$100.00 per quarter. (1966)
2. This Conference shall accept and adopt a goal of \$5.00 per member per year in support of Central Pilgrim College. The basis for determining membership responsibility for the above-mentioned goal is to deduct 10% from the total voting membership of the church. Each church shall receive an offering for Central Pilgrim College at least once each month as a means of reaching the above goal. (1963)
3. A system to raise finance for District Home Missions shall be established. This system shall be known as the District Home Missions 500 Club, the purpose of which shall be to secure subscriptions to the 500 Club — individuals who will pledge themselves to give \$1.00 per month for the establishment of new churches in California. The District Superintendent shall effect the appointment of a local church "500 Club" representative, who shall solicit new members and shall make reports of the membership and giving to the District Superintendent. "500 Club" giving shall be supplemented by a quarterly offering to be taken in each local church on the first Sunday of June, September, December and March. (1965)
4. The Office of Public Affairs of the National Association of Evangelicals

- shall be authorized to speak for the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on all legislative matters that are of vital interest to and conviction of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The District Secretary shall send a copy of the District Minutes and the Manual to the State Director of NAE, calling attention to this resolution. (1966)
5. All correspondence with the General Missionary Society Director at headquarters, including reports, shall be directed to the District President, who will in turn relay the information to headquarters and/or secure an answer in return. The ONE EXCEPTION to the above rule relates to the correspondence concerning MISSIONARY CHRISTMAS BOXES, which should still be carried on directly with headquarters.
 6. Each standing rule shall be dated, such date to be its origin or last revision. A reporting committee shall be instructed to prepare said dating within one year. (1963)
 7. The internship program as instituted by Central Pilgrim College shall be considered as part of the California District program. (1964)
 8. The District Youth President, the District Missionary President, and the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary or their representatives shall have the privilege of holding one service annually in each of the churches of the District in the interest of their particular group and an offering shall be taken in said service and forwarded immediately to the District Treasurer being specified for that particular District organization. (1965)
 9. The District Treasurer shall be authorized to remove accrual loans from the District Home Missions and other accounts, and place these in Accounts Receivable at the end of each conference year in order to better show current status of such accounts. (1965)
 10. The last Sunday afternoon of camp meeting shall be given to a Home Missionary service and an offering of cash and pledges shall be taken. (1964)

District Council

1. The District Council shall be informed of all matters of major legislative change prior to presentation to the Conference.
2. The District Secretary shall be informed immediately upon the death of any pastor or pastor's wife of the district and he shall notify by telephone all pastors in the district and notify the editor of the district publication.
3. An honor system for recognition of churches who pay their United Stewardship Fund shall be established and a chart be compiled by the District Treasurer and displayed at the District Camp and Conference.
4. The District Secretary shall give written notification to all appointees to standing Conference Committees within 30 days after District Conference. The chairman of each standing committee shall be notified by the District Secretary 60 days prior to District Conference to activate his committee.
5. Ministers coming to this District from other denominations shall be interviewed by the District Council before their credentials are presented to the Conference.

District Superintendent

1. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$5,250.00 per year in addition to his residence, utilities, traveling expenses and automobile mileage at nine cents per mile. (1966)
2. The District Superintendent shall be given an annual two-week vacation with pay.
3. The District Superintendent shall call a meeting of all District leaders and pastors for the purpose of introducing the programs of the various departments for the coming year. (1964)
4. The District Superintendent, in cooperation with youth zone leaders and heads of departments of the District Conference, shall formulate a district calendar and place same in the hands of each pastor and department head of this district; each youth zone leader and district department head shall prepare and send his annual schedules to the District Superintendent prior to the Pastors' and District Leaders' Conference. (1964)

Local Church

1. All local churches shall pay the traveling expenses and entertainment of

- their pastor and lay delegates for the Conference business sessions. (1965)
2. All local churches shall forward to the District Council for filing all legal papers pertaining to the ownership of the local church property.
 3. Each pastor shall be granted the privilege of holding at least one revival in each Conference year.
 4. All reports shall be made in full and sent to the Statistical Committee not later than one week before the Conference date.
 5. Each local church shall be urged to raise a subscription list to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate equal to its total membership.
 6. The Conference Minutes shall be sold at \$1.00 per copy and each church shall remit from local funds for the Minutes ordered and then sell them to the members for the stipulated price.
 7. Pastors are urged to secure Pilgrim Holiness evangelists as much as possible. Evangelists from other denominations shall be secured under the District Superintendent's approval.
 8. It is recommended that vacations with pay for all ministers of this district be based on the number of years in the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church as follows:
 - a. After one year of service—a minimum of two weeks;
 - b. After 10 years of service—three weeks;
 - c. After twenty years of service—four weeks.
 9. Each church shall pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife who are members of the Ministerial Benefit Association.
 10. The Conference shall use the following method of renewing pastoral relations:
 - a. That each church when renewing pastoral relations, shall vote during the last full week of March.
 - b. That each local church secretary shall forward to the District Superintendent the results of such vote within five days following the time of voting.
 - c. That each pastor shall forward to the District Superintendent his reply within 15 days of the time of voting. (See 1962 Manual, Section 53, Paragraph 3.)
 - d. That each pastor who does not plan to renew pastoral relations shall notify the District Superintendent on or before the 15th day of March. (1963)
 11. It is recommended that before licensed or ordained ministers coming from outside the California District, or from other denominations, be received into local church membership, the pastor shall consult with the District Superintendent and the District Council regarding said minister.
 12. All Sunday Schools shall conform to the General Sunday School Department's "Standard of Excellence" with respect to computing Sunday School attendance.
 13. Local churches calling pastors from outside the confines of the District shall pay the necessary expenses involved in the changing of automobile license and registration. (1963)

United Stewardship Fund

1. Newly organized churches shall assume one-fourth of their United Stewardship Fund the first year after being organized; one-half the second year; three-fourths the third year, and beginning with the fourth year, pay in full.
2. The following system of finance shall be followed, in caring for the United Stewardship Fund obligations of each local church:

Twelve percent (12%) of all offerings received by the local church in all departments (EXCEPT all specified funds raised for the construction or acquisition of the church buildings or property, Sunday School units, and parsonages; United Stewardship Funds, the 500 Club, and for all specified purposes outside the California District) shall be remitted by the local treasurer(s) each month to the District Treasurer.

The District Treasurer shall distribute within 30 days after receipt the funds received in the United Stewardship Fund as follows:
—62% to District Stewardship Fund, said 62% to be distributed as follows:

Superintendent's Account	52%
Operational Expense	19%
Home Missions	16%
International Conference Reserve	5%
Sunday School Promotional Committee	3%
Young People's Executive Committee	3%
Missionary Society Committee	2% (1965)

—38% to General Stewardship Fund; and if the said 38% shall exceed the annual General Stewardship Fund responsibility of this District, then the amount received over and above our annual General Stewardship responsibility shall be used for District Home Missionary work. (1964)

BY-LAWS GOVERNING THE CALIFORNIA DISTRICT PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH LOAN FUND

Purpose

1. The California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall maintain a fund to be known as the CALIFORNIA DISTRICT LOAN FUND. The purpose and use of this fund shall be to lend money to churches in the California District under the supervision and jurisdiction of the California District Council for the purpose of construction, relocation, improvement, and repair of church buildings and parsonages. No loan shall be made for a period of more than 12 months except upon approval by a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the Board of Directors.

Control

2. This fund shall be under the control of the District Council, also known as the Board of Directors.

3. The District Treasurer shall maintain this fund in the Crown Savings and Loan Association of El Monte, California, in a separate account from all other funds of the church. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of the Board of Directors. He shall carry on all correspondence relative to this fund. All monies shall be paid through the office of the District Treasurer, and he shall keep all records and papers of same.

4. The District Council shall govern the size of the loan by the funds available and the value of the property on which the loan is to be made.

Composition

5. This fund shall be accumulated from monies received from the sale of the District Headquarters property, sale of other district properties not otherwise designated for other purposes, special contributions and low interest loans, or investments by individuals. No gifts shall be made from this fund for any purpose, nor shall it be used except for making loans.

6. Monies accruing from interest on this fund shall be placed in the District Home Missions Account, to be used for the promotion and support of District Home Missions, after the life leases have been paid monthly from said interest.

Processing

7. The directors shall prepare an application form to be filled out by the church making application for a loan. The note and mortgage shall be signed for the church by the local trustees, if any; the pastor, district superintendent, and district trustees. It shall be secured by a mortgage on the property and such other security as may be required by the directors. Loans shall be made only when title to such property is written according to the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church or is vested in the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

8. All applications are to be made by the local trustees and pastor on behalf of the local church after they are instructed to do so by the local church board. The application shall then be submitted to the District Council for consideration and disposition. A committee from the District Council shall investigate the property on which the loan is to be made. The investigating committee shall then report their findings to the District Council and a two-thirds vote of the entire council shall be necessary to grant a loan. All checks drawn on this fund must bear the signatures of both the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer.

Repayment

9. Interest at the rate of 5.5% per annum will be charged on all loans. Full repayments shall be due at the end of the loan period. The District Board of Trustees shall be empowered to negotiate a real estate loan for the local church at the end of the loan period, if necessary.

10. These by-laws governing the CALIFORNIA DISTRICT LOAN FUND may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the District Conference. Such changes shall not be retroactive.

IN MEMORIAM

Laura E. Hall

Laura E. Hall was born August 1, 1894 at Horace, Kansas, and went to be with the Lord she loved and served on September 6, 1965.

She was raised by Godly parents and at an early age became a devout Christian. Later she engaged in Peniel Mission work in Stockton and San Francisco, California.

On June 9, 1920, she was united in marriage to Rev. Elmer R. Hall and became the mother of two children.

In July, 1931, she was wonderfully reclaimed in her own home, and on March 29, 1940 was gloriously sanctified and the same year was ordained a deaconess.

She lived a victorious, joyful Christian life and had a ringing testimony for her Lord. Her first love in God's work was the Sunday School and she served in the capacity as superintendent in various Pilgrim churches for about 25 years.

She used every available opportunity to do personal soul winning even during her last fatal illness. We expect to meet her in the heavenly world.

Beulah Loretta Weaver Morgan

Beulah Weaver was born August 17, 1912 in Hickman County, Kentucky, and departed this life at El Monte, California, September 10, 1965. She was converted at age 17 in a tent meeting conducted by Rev. James R. Adams and Rev. Lloyd Dixon. Less than one year later she was sanctified under the ministry of Rev. John T. Hatfield. On August 6, 1930, she was united in marriage to Rev. Clifford L. Morgan. To this union were born three children, James, Donald and Darlene.

Over thirty years Brother and Sister Morgan labored together in pastorates at Redlands, El Monte, Ojai, Laguna Beach, Rosemead, and Bell Gardens, California. Brother Morgan also served as District Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in California.

Sister Morgan was especially interested in youth and Sunday School work in which God blessed her ministry. When extended poor health curtailed her activities, she interceded in prayer for her husband and his work, and for others for whom she was concerned. She was greatly loved as a wife and mother; in return, she was devoted to the best interests of her family.

Edward Clifton Bickmore

E. C. Bickmore was born July 13, 1907, and departed this life at his home in Upland, California, December 26, 1965. Brother Bickmore was converted in early childhood. 1966 Annual Report

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To our General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, Rev. O. D. Emery, delegates and visitors to the Annual Youth Conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Buena Park, June 4, 1966.

California District Youth are on the move! Not because of one person, one group, one church or one program — but because they are answering the challenges of today. These are exciting times and this has been an exciting year. The opportunities that we have missed are gone and the time spent in activities in the will of God will determine how profitable the year might be. We have been pleased with the support of the District Council, as well as pastors all over the state, for each effort that has been made by the Youth Council. Sponsored jointly by the Youth Council and the Sunday School Committee, the theme was Christianity's Challenges in Today's World — a fitting battle cry for our graduates to project into "My Tomorrow" for the Graduation Banquet which completed the Youth Conference Year.

It has been a joy for me to observe and participate in the stirring response to today's challenges by our District Youth. Let us resolve that the coming year will be a better and more active year in the Great Cause before us. Let us covenant here today to give our initiative and our energy wholeheartedly to God that we might be powerful instruments in His service and that we might stand shoulder to shoulder with Paul as he says, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love His appearing." (II Timothy 4:7, 8.)

STANDING RULES AND BY-LAWS

Annual Youth Conference

No. 2—All reports to the District Youth Conference are to be prepared in triplicate; one copy to go to the District Youth President; one copy to the District Youth Secretary; one to be retained by the local society. In reference to the local society, the society president's report shall be given to the society secretary and the zone chairman's report to the zone secretary.

No. 3—The date of the Annual Youth Conference shall be set by the District Youth Council. The Annual Youth Banquet shall be held the evening before the Conference, thus combining these two vital District Youth events.

No. 4—A Conference Action Committee shall be appointed annually by the District Youth President. The committee shall consist of five members of which at least two are teenagers. The District Youth Treasurer shall automatically be a member of this committee.

No. 5—The Minutes of the District Youth Conference shall be printed in the District Journal and Minutes of the District Conference. The District Youth shall bear the cost of such printing on a per-page basis.

District Youth Council

No. 1—Where at all possible, no one person should hold two offices on the District Youth Council.

No. 2—The District Youth President shall send a written quarterly report to the District Council covering his activities, those of the zone leaders, District Youth Treasurer, and activities of the Youth Camp Committee.

No. 3—The District Youth Council shall plan and conduct quarterly workshops for the purpose of aiding in the development of the total youth program of the local church.

No. 4—The Pilgrim Pilot editor shall be instructed to send news items each month to the Pilgrim Youth News.

No. 5—The official name "Pilgrim Youth Society" shall be used on all materials and in all oral communication.

No. 6—A C.P.A. shall be consulted in setting up a standardized book-keeping system for the District Youth Society; and at the end of each year the books be audited by an auditor and/or an efficient bookkeeper.

Local Societies

No. 1—The report of each local president to Annual Conference shall include all receipts upon which budget is to be paid. (This includes all receipts except for General Church youth projects.)

No. 2—Each local youth society or church shall be urged to pay the expenses of its delegates to Youth Conference.

Pilgrim Youth Camps

No. 1—The responsibilities of the District Youth Council to the Youth Camps be as follows:

I. Before camping begins—

A. Camp location and dates

B. Choosing Camp Directors

C. Publicity

D. Pre-registration

E. Printing application blanks

F. Transportation to camp

G. Set camper fees

H. Secure services of a nurse

I. Apply for surplus foods

J. Appoint person or persons responsible for buying food

K. Secure services of cook and helper

L. Arrange for swimming facilities.

II. Prepare standardized outline for Camp Director's report.

III. Prepare written instructions in the Health Center regarding First Aid and filing insurance forms.

IV. Edit and reproduce instructions and regulations for Directors, Counselors, and Campers.

Zone

No. 1—Each newly elected chairman shall secure the name, address and phone number of each local church youth society officer, and zone officers for the President. This information must be submitted in writing, for informational purposes, within 60 days following Conference.

No. 2—Each zone chairman shall send a written quarterly report to the District Youth President.

No. 3—In case the zone chairman is incapacitated in any way, the Executive members of the District Youth Council, along with the District Superintendent, shall appoint his successor.

No. 4—Each zone treasurer shall pay to the District Youth Treasurer 10% of all offerings taken at zone rallies.

No. 5—Within 60 days prior to the Annual Youth Conference, the District Youth President shall meet with the regular delegates of each zone to elect officers for that zone. These elections shall be considered preliminary and

upon presentation by the Youth President shall be ratified by the Youth Conference. Such officers shall take office immediately following the Youth Conference.
