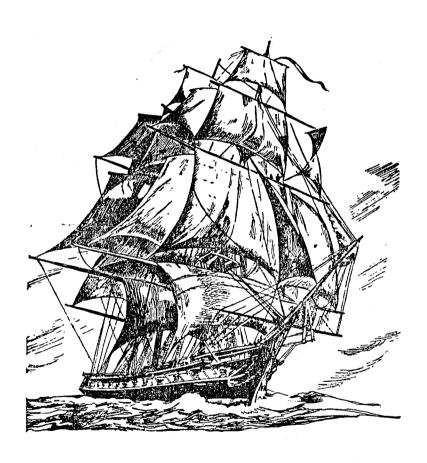

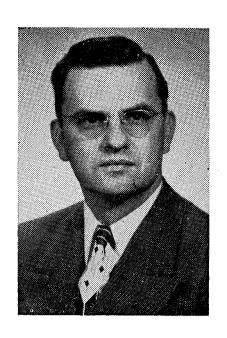

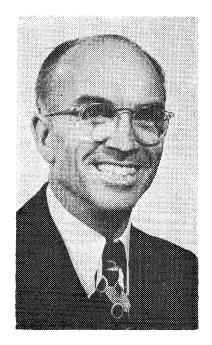

CALIFORNIA - ARIZONA ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting July 12, 1954

The thirty-second annual conference of the California-Arizona District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at El Monte, California, at 9:20 A.M. Monday, July 12, 1954.

Rev. Jim Sheets led the group in congregational singing, after which Rev.

Thomas Lee led in prayer.

Rev. Hill, our District Superintendent, introduced Rev. Wm. H. Neff, First Assistant General Superintendent, presiding officer of the conference. Rev. Neff read for a Scripture lesson from Ephesians 4, presenting many practical truths from this lesson; stressing a spiritual unity among the saints; urging a deeper realization that the presence of the Lord is here, a recognition of which should control our every action, attitude and motive.

The conference was then called to order by Rev. Neff. The District Secretary proceeded to call the roll. Fifty-one ministerial and forty-eight lay delegates

responded.

The motion was carried that the first ten rows of seats constitute the conference

The secretary read a recommendation from the District Council that the following licensed and ordained ministers be received by the conference:

Frank B. Mills, ordained minister from the Pacific Northwest District.

Roy Ellis, ordained minister from the Rocky Mountain District.

Lloyd Dixon, ordained minister from the Church of the Nazarene.

Mrs. Lloyd Dixon, ordained minister from the Church of the Nazarene.

Charles M. Spear, licensed minister from the Church of the Nazarene.

A motion carried to receive the above ministers.

A motion carried that the conference sessions be set for the following periods: 8:30 a.m.-12:00 noon; 1:00 p.m.-4:30 p.m.; 7:00 p.m.-conclusion.

The District Superintendent's report was read and accepted.

Rev. Thomas Lee, assistant superintendent, gave an oral report which, on motion, was received.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted.

Financial report of the District Sunday School Committee was read and received.

Financial report of the District Young People was read and received.

The yearly financial report of Pilgrim Bible Institute was read and accepted. A partial report of the Ways and Means Committee was presented and acted upon as follows:

A motion carried to schedule the election of officers as the first order of business for the evening sitting at 7:00 p.m.

The Examining and Educational Committees were excused to work.

Request was made for the announcement of the time of the Ordination Service and a motion carried that the time for the Ordination Service be set at 4:00 p.m.

Report of the Young People's Executive Secretary was read and accepted with a rising vote of appreciation to Brother Horine for his years of work in the interest

of Pilgrim Youth of this District.

Motion carried that Brother C. J. Meyers be appointed as a member of the Resolutions Committee to replace Howard Rogers who has transferred to another District

All committees were excused to function.

Brother Neff introduced Brother Lawrence from the West Virginia conference. Brother Lawrence, at Brother Neff's request, sang a few verses of 'Amazing Grace,' blessing the hearers.

Conference adjourned at 11:25 a.m.

Second Sitting

The second sitting of the conference convened at 1:10 p.m. Monday, July 12, 1954.

Rev. Paul Miller led in congregational singing, after which Rev. Conrad Park led in prayer.

The minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. Herschel Hughes, pastor of our Fresno Church and Rev. Roy Ellis from the Rocky Mountain District.

Church roll was called, with the pastors responding as to the number of copies

of the District Minutes desired.

The Resolutions Committee gave a partial report which was acted upon as follows:

Recommendations of the Educational and Examining Boards were read and approved.

a rising vote of appreciation to Brother Simonds for his work in this field. Report of the President of Pilgrim Bible Institute was read and approved with

a standing vote of reception. A partial report of the Ways and Means Committee was presented. Action of

the conference upon same was as follows:

The pastors and treasurers were invited to meet with the Ways and Means Committee at the close of the afternoon sitting to discuss the financial plan incorporated in the above resolution.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. Elmer Kizzee to the conference.

Brother Kizzee gave his personal testimony.

The Reception Committee introduced Brother Jones. He gave a word of his personal experience and a survey of the work he is doing among dope-addicts.

The ordination service, with Rev. Neff presiding, proceeded as follows:

Names of the following candidates for ordination were read: Ira Graham, Mrs. Erma Hacker, Benjamin Weller, George E. McClane as ministerial; Maggie Johnson and June Hill as deaconess. Rev. Thomas Hamon, unable to be present for the ordination service last year, joined with the ministerial candidates this year.

Rev. Fred Wells led in the congregational singing of "A Charge To Keep I Have." Rev. Thomas Lee and Rev. Lundy Hill read portions of scripture.

Brother Neff spoke briefly from Paul's words "I am made a minister"; "I am a servant of all." He gave some practical admonition and sound advice to ministers. Brother E. W. Hall and Brother Neff led in prayer.

The meeting adjourned at 4:45 p.m.

Third Sitting

The third sitting opened at 7:10 p.m. Monday, July 12, 1954, with congregational singing led by Rev. Jim Sheets, after which Bro. H. T. Smith led in prayer. Brother Frederickson, member of the So. San Gabriel Church, rendered a special song entitled "Nothing Between."

A motion carried that we receive Bro. Frederickson as a licensed minister of this district.

Motion carried to ratify Council action to accept Bro. Pynchon as a licensed minister transferring to this District from the Church of Christ in Christian Union. Minutes of the second sitting were read and approved.

The conference proceeded with the election of officers.

The Disrict Superintendent appointed the following tellers: Paul Miller, Joe Fillmore, George McClane, Kenneth Klein, Robert Simonds, Ira Graham, Kenneth Pease, William Rugh, Lloyd Garinger, and Stanley Miller. Christopher Stone was appointed scribe.

All heads were bowed in silent prayer, seeking Divine guidance in the election of officers.

Lundy Hill was elected District Superintendent for a term of two years.

Thomas Lee was elected Assistant District Superintendent.

Council nominations for the office of District Secretary were: Edward C. Bickmore, John Newby, William Rugh, Omar Fenton.

Council nominations for District Treasurer were: Paul D. Beck, Thomas Hamon.

Paul D. Beck was elected District Treasurer.

A motion was made that the superintendent's salary be increased \$400. Motion carried.

Report of the balloting for remaining Council member indicated no election. Rev. E. W. Hall withdrew his name due to the fact that he is moving to Tucson, Arizona this year,

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the thirty-second annual conference of the California-Arizona District of the

Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened at El Monte, California, July 12, 1954:

We are again privileged through the providence of God to meet here to do business for the kingdom; to lay plans for the coming year. As we observe the past year, while the problems and disappointments have been many, yet there has never been a day or night but that we have felt the sweet abiding, soul-refreshing, and guiding presence of the Holy Spirit.

I wish to submit the following in the way of a report of the past year's activities: Parsonages. Since our last conference the Long Beach Pilgrims under the leadership of Brother Fenton have purchased a much-needed parsonage. Brother Graham and the faithful group at Buena Park have finished building a very fine parsonage, almost free of indebtedness. Our Assistant Superintendent, Brother Lee, has completed a very beautiful and adequate parsonage in El Monte. Brother Hughes and the Fresno Pilgrims are now putting the finishing touches on a very commodious parsonage and have purchased several lots in a good location for the purpose of building a complete new church unit also. San Dimas has purchased ground and will soon be launching a building program for the purpose of building a new parsonage, using the old building now occupied by the pastor, for Sunday School rooms. Brother Newby and the San Dimas Pilgrims are going forward and all seem to have a mind to work.

Churches. Tucson First, under the present pastor, Rev. Kizzee, has finished a beautiful church. The building was started under Rev. Abbott several years ago. Bro. Brown worked a long while on this project also. We had the privilege of dedicating this beautiful new building last Spring. The Highland Park Church, under the leadership of Brother Ackerman, has located their church in another part of the city of Los Angeles and built a beautiful new chapel. The name of this church has been changed to First Church of Los Angeles and will appear in our District Minutes as such. The Oak View group has at last realized the completion of a very fine church building. Brother Manuel has lived to see the fruits of his labors, although he almost went to Heaven two years ago, before fully realizing his goal. The pastor and people have worked long and hard at this job, paying for all materials as they built. After serving the church for twenty years, Brother Manuel is leaving this year. He is leaving behind him a monument that shall, no doubt, stand until Jesus comes. South San Gabriel is well on the way toward a finished commodious church. Brother Hamon and people are pushing ahead. You will hear more about this venture during the year. Lynwood Gardens Church has bought a lot and a building in the city of Lynwood. The building has been converted into a very fine chapel and Sunday School rooms. Brother Olson has directed this project. South Phoenix has purchased three lots, with buildings on the lots, which have been converted into a nice chapel and ample Sunday School rooms that will serve our South Phoenix Pilgrims for many years to come. Brother Weller has worked day and night, along with his good people, and has achieved a wonderful result. He has given his church salary to make possible the purchase of necessary materials for the remodeling. The East Pasadena Pilgrims have finished a beautiful Sunday School and youth unit. Brother Simonds and his loyal folk are indeed to be commended. Rees Memorial, under the leadership of our former Superintendent Brother Moran, is building a new Sunday School and youth center building on a "pay as you go" basis. It is wonderful how this work has progressed.

We do thank God for these new buildings which are meeting our needs. The remarkable thing about these various building projects is the way costs have been kept down. Both preachers and laymen have donated their time, labor and money.

May God richly bless and abundantly reward all who have had any part.

Improvements. Much has been done to improve our church buildings and properties. Bell Gardens, Buena Park, Cottonwood, East Los Angeles, Phoenix First, West Phoenix, Rosemead—all have worked to make their buildings more attractive and a more pleasant place in which to worship, by painting, repairing, planting of shrubs, etc. Our District property is being renovated. The tabernacle has been partly re-roofed and plans are made to repair and repaint the tabernacle before another conference if Jesus tarries. Plans are being made to black-top our District property roads.

Home Missions. The Home Missions Department is still giving substantial help to Dixon, Yucaipa, Coolidge, South Phoenix, and Lynwood Gardens. The Riverside Church has been purchased by the State Highway Department to make way for a freeway through the city. The Council has been trying to locate a suitable site for the erection of a new building either in or near Riverside. Brother Snoddy is giving enough land in his sub-division in West Covina to the District Home Missions Department for an adequate church and ample off-street parking. Mr. Klein and Mr. Black have set up a foundation for the purpose of helping promote District Home Missions. These brethren hope to be able to give to the District monies that would ordinarily be turned to the government in taxes. Thank God for our brethren who are loyal Pilgrims and who do have an interest and a burden for the progress of our church.

Appreciation. To Brother Robert Simonds who has given himself to the task of building interest and making our District Sunday School conscious. To Martin Horine who through the years has given without measure all that he has into the youth work of our District. To Mrs. Hill who has spent many hours preparing and publishing the Pilgrim News, as well as staying alone "keeping home fires burning" many nights and days while I have been away in District work. To Brother C. W. Thomas for the leadership he has given our school. To the Assistant Superintendent, Brother Lee, and all the council members for their kindness, consideration and guidance. To all Pilgrims and friends of the California-Arizona District, to all our wonderful pastors—to each and everyone I want to say "Thank you and God bless you. May the best that Heaven has for you be yours here and hereafter."

The progress made in the erection of the new Administration Building is very gratifying. Surely God has blessed us in this great work. In a material way this is the greatest advance the school has ever made. This building will be a great blessing to the school this next year and in the years to come. There are 6,000 square feet of floor space in the building. There are six lovely classrooms, five administrative offices, a beautiful lobby, a committee meeting room, two large rest rooms and four utility rooms. This building will accommodate, in addition to housing the administrative staff, 250 students at one sitting and a total enrollment of 300.

The prospects for the coming year are very good. Dr. G. Arnold Hodgin is joining the faculty as Dean of the college and will prove a great blessing to the school and to the district. We are anticipating a good increase in enrollment due to the added

facilities and stronger faculty and staff.

I will conclude with a brief personal report. This year completes my sixth year as president of Pilgrim Bible Institute. They have been the most fruitful years of my

life. I appreciate the opportunity to serve the Lord in this great field.

In addition to serving as president, I have acted as business manager, Dean of the college, and have taught 15 hours a week in the college. I have traveled almost every Sunday with the Gospel teams doing deputational work, visiting most of the churches on this district twice during the year. I have also visited the Pacific North-

west District camp and their churches, and served as evangelist for the Idaho-Washington District Youth convention. In all I have traveled approximately 18,000 miles in the interest of the school.

As a salary I received \$2,000 in cash, my house, utilities, tuition for my children,

noon meals and some supplies, totaling approximately \$3,000.

SPECIAL THANKS are due to Bro. Eldon Stohr and Bro. Stuart who served on most all special committee assignments and were present at every committee meeting. Also, Bro. Rugh helped when he could attend, and was very valuable to the committee. Sister Reading was afflicted almost the entire year with a very severe illness, which God has now healed. Her kindly spirit and help were appreciated.

PROGRESS has been made over the district in almost all churches. Lack of room to expand, and some sickness, have caused losses and stalemates in some churches.

This convention proved to be challenging, stimulating and inspiring to all workers. Thank you all for your splendid cooperation and attendance. Rees Memorial Church,

Pastor and S.S. Supt. are due much credit for its wonderful success.

Our Sunday School Contest, during April and May, proved to be the highlight of the year. Every church which took part showed excellent gains. The winning church was Redlands, under the aggressive leadership of Rev. R. W. Brown. The church won 10 gallons of inside enamel paint, to paint both church and parsonage. This paint was donated to our district by Long-Burton Paint Co., in Pasadena. Rev. Brown and his wife won 1 week's all-expenses paid vacation to Logonita Lodge at Big Bear Lake. RESOLUTIONS OF THE 1954 CONFERENCE

No. 1. WHEREAS, many of our scholars do not remain for preaching services, and whereas it has been recommended that the Sunday School have an evangelistic emphasis, therefore, be it resolved that our pastors be urged to have a unified Sun-

day School and church service once per quarter.

No. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, that Resolution No. 14 of page 32 be substituted with the following: Be it resolved, that our pastors be urged to secure Pilgrim Holiness Evangelists as much as possible. And be it further resolved, that evangelists from other denominations be secured under the District Superintendent's approval.

No. 3. BE IT RESOLVED, that provision be made in the annual report blank of the activities and financial reports of the local and Junior Missionary Societies. Be it further resolved, that the missionary societies be recognized during the mis-

sionary services of the camp to promote such work on the district.

No. 4. WHEREAS, the Arizona Pilgrims are so far removed from the District headquarters and consequently from such church activities, and whereas it seems advantageous to the growth of our church in that state, and whereas it would release funds for the extension of our church in unevangelized areas of California, be it resolved, that we as a Conference petition the Department of General Church Extension that they take over as soon as practical the churches now in Arizona.

WHEREAS, many of our churches do not have Baptismal facilities and whereas the ordinance has been a blessing in many lives, therefore, be it resolved, that the pastors send to the District Superintendent at least ten days prior to camp meeting the names of baptismal candidates and if the number of candidates is sufficient to warrant such, a baptismal service be held during camp. Final decision in this mat-

ter shall rest with the District Council.

No. 6. BE IT RESOLVED, that this Conference give its presiding officer,

Rev. Wm. H. Neff, a rising vote of thanks for his labor of love among us.

WHEREAS, God has marvelously blessed our District during the past year, for which we thank God, and whereas our District Superintendent, Rev. Lundy Hill, has worked untiringly and devotedly; therefore, be it resolved, that the Conference give him a rising vote of thanks.

No. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, that this conference give a rising vote of thanks and appreciation to Fred K. Wells, Mildred Gustin, Rev. and Mrs. Conrad Park and the kitchen and dining room help for the gracious way they have served in helping

to make this Conference a success.

No. 9. BE IT RESOLVED, that greetings from this Conference be sent to Mrs. Wm. Neff, the wife of our presiding officer.

No. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, that greetings from this conference be sent to Mrs. Mrs. Seth C. Rees. No. 11. BE IT RESOLVED, that greetings be sent to Mrs. Alta Adams.

Resolutions of the Ways and Means Committee

BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent's salary be con-No. 1. tinued at \$3,600.00 per year, in addition to his residence, utilities, and traveling expenses.

No. 2. RESOLVED, that resolution No. 2 of the 1953 Ways and Means on

page 31 be continued in force for the next quadrennium.

No. 3. BE IT RESOLVED, that the financial records of all departments of the District be submitted to the District Auditing Committee at least THREE days prior to the District Conference. This includes District Treasurer, District Youth, Sunday School Committee, and Pilgrim Bible Institute. (This supercedes No. 25 on page 33.)

We recommend the following be adopted as the financial plan for the ensuing year. (This action would replace Nos. 29, 30, 33, 34 on page 34 and Nos. 43

and 44 on page 35 of the 1953 Minutes.)

WHEREAS, the General Conference has revised the General Budget and WHEREAS, the present set-up does not properly equalize the finances to meet the new obligation; therefore, we recommend that this Conference adopt the following

simplified system of finance as suggested by General Conference Action:

a. The combined General and District Budgets shall be computed on the basis of \$1.50 per month per member, or a total of \$18.00 per year. The figure for calculating the responsibility of each local church is the total membership reported to the previous conference, less 10%. All missionaries under commission to be exempted.

b. The special Rally Day, Thanksgiving, and Easter offerings, plus offerings taken by representatives of the various departments of the General Church,

shall be in addition to the budget. c. Remittances, under the new plan, shall be sent to the District Treasurer,

beginning with the remittance for the month of August, 1954.

No. 5. WHEREAS, during this next school year the need for finance in the Pilgrim Bible Institute will be greater than heretofore, which need must be met, therefore be it resolved, that we adopt a school budget, a minimum of \$4.00 per member per year, based on the same member ratio as the District and General Budget. Be is further resolved, that each church take an offering each month to be applied on said budget. We also request that school representatives visit each church at least once each semester to aid the church in raising the school budget.

No. 6. Inasmuch as the General Conference passed legislation requiring all local churches to participate in the Ministers' Pension Plan, BE IT RESOLVED, that

all of our churches cooperate by participating in said pension plan.

Standing Resolutions from Previous Conferences

Be it resolved that the California-Arizona District purchase all the books listed in the Manual for the study courses, that are not in the Pilgrim Bible Institute Library. All books in the School Library to be available to ministerial candidates of the District on a circulating basis of a two weeks' period with privilege of renewal. District Council to work out all details.

Whereas the stress and strain of the times in which we live are such as to tax the strength of the busy pastors of our district, be it resolved that each church of the district give its pastor a two weeks' vacation with pay.

Be is resolved that the local churches pay the traveling expenses and entertainment of their delegates for the Conference business sessions. This does not include camp meeting.

Whereas, the General Conference has made provision that newly organized churches in established districts assume one-fourth of their General Budget obligations the first year after being organized; one-half of their budget the second year; three-fourths the third year, and beginning with fourth year pay in full:

Therefore, be it resolved that on this district we apply the same percentages in

regard to our district budget.

Be it resolved that the following items be paid out of the District Expense Fund:

1. Utilities for the home of the District Superintendent.

2. Publication of the Pilgrim News.

3. District office expense.

Be it resolved that the cafeteria and lunch stand be considered part of the camp meeting operations and all monies pertaining thereto be held in the Camp Meeting fund.

Be it resolved that ministers coming to this district from other denominations be interviewed by the District Council before their credentials are presented to the Conference.

Whereas in the past important papers have been lost and a considerable loss of time and finance were necessary to secure new papers, therefore be it resolved that all local churches of the district forward to the District Council, for filing, all legal papers pertaining to the ownership of the local church property.

Whereas, the District owns shares in the Lexington Blyd. Mutual Water Co., therefore be it resolved that the following five district officers, by virtue of their office, be appointed to represent our shares in the Water Co.: The District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Treasurer and Secretary, and the President of the Board of Trustees. And be it further resolved that the representatives vote the shares as a block as instructed by the District Council on matters of policy.

(10)

Be it resolved that the District Council and following committees and boards meet one day prior to the annual Conference to take care of such work as they have on hand. The Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees, and the Educational and Examining Boards.

(11)

Be it resolved that each church on the district be responsible to furnish at least two man days labor in preparation of the grounds for camp meeting, subject to the call of the District Council.

(12)

We recommend that each self-supporting church put forth a home missionary campaign and try to establish at least one new church.

(13)

Be it resolved that all plans for the construction or remodeling of church buildings be presented to a committee on which there shall be an architect, a builder, and a financier for their suggestions. (14)

Resolved that before licensed or ordained ministers coming from other churches shall be received into the local churches, the pastor shall consult with the District Superintendent and Council regarding said minister.

(15)

Be it resolved that each pastor be granted the privilege of holding at least one revival each conference year. (16)

Be it resolved that our district Educational Board be instructed to secure a set of questions covering the course of study prescribed by the manual and make the same available to those desiring to take the Study Course.

We recommend that our District Superintendent or his Assistant shall when possible, conduct quarterly meetings at each church, at which time he shall preach a gospel sermon and administer the sacraments.

We recommend that, whereas we now have a standing Statistical Committee to function during the conference year, be it resolved that all reports be made in full and sent to the Statistical Committee not later than one week before the conference date.

(19)

Be it resolved that the use of our District Camp Grounds be limited to the activities of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

(20)

Resolved that when recommendation for credentials is presented to the Conference the candidate be present, or send a written testimony to accompany the recommendation.

(21) Whereas, the devastating influence of the liquor traffic in America is gaining such momentum, be it resolved our church and ministry take a more militant stand against the sale of the same.

(22)

Be it resolved that the part of the District Superintendent's and other district officers' expense, relating to the propagation of district home missions, be so designated and paid for out of district home mission funds.

(23)

Whereas, the local churches have been paying for the pastor's traveling and housing expenses during camp meeting and conference, and whereas, some of the pastors have to leave full time or part time secular work to attend such camp and conference, thereby cutting off part of their source of income and creating a financial problem; therefore be it resolved that each church assume the responsibility of seeing that the local pastor's temporal needs are adequately supplied during this time.

(24)Whereas, the school has operational control of the Conference grounds the greater part of the year; therefore we recommend that the matter of a maintenance man for said grounds be left to the consideration of the District Council and the School Board.

(25)Be it resolved that the Conference form a committee of four which shall have charge of the Old Folks' Home buildings and grounds, said committee to be comprised of the District Superintendent, the pastor of the El Monte Pilgrim Holiness Church, the President of the Board of Trustees, and one member to be appointed by the District Council.

(26)

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be given an annual vacation with pay, not to exceed two weeks.

(27)

We recommend that the District Secretary and the District Treasurer be allotted the sum of \$25.00 per quarter for their services, and the District Treasurer be allowed \$20.00 per month for secretarial assistance.

(28)

Be it resolved, that this Conference go on record as being in favor of a regulation which would prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages within six hundred (600) feet of the property lines of schools, churches, libraries, and playgrounds.

Be it further resolved, that we are opposed to the advertising of alcoholic bev-

erages during daylight hours on radio or television.

(29)

Be it resolved, that this Conference elect a representative to the Board of Directors of the California Temperance Federation, at their request.

An amendment was made to this resolution, referring this appointment to the District Council.

(30)

Be it resolved, that each local church be urged to raise a subscription list to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate equal to its total membership. (31)

Be it resolved, that each local church specify a time for the delegates to give a report of the District Conference.

(32)

Be it resolved, that the Conference Minutes be sold at 50c per copy. Be it further resolved, that each church remit from local funds for the minutes ordered, and then sell them to the members for the stipulated price. (33)

Be it resolved that there be a Camp Meeting Grounds Committee appointed by the Council to improve and prepare the Camp Ground for Camp services. (34)

Be it resolved, that in lieu of the Annual District Home Missions offering received the last Sunday of Camp, we adopt a system known as the District Home Missions Reserve Call System to operate as follows: The District Superintendent be privileged to ask for a special offering toward the needs of any mission project, not to exceed the equivalent of three \$1.00 calls to each voluntary member per year.
