JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The ninth Annual Conference of the Capital District Pilgrim Holiness Church met for its first session at 9:00 A. M., in the new National Pilgrim Church, Hyattsville, Maryland.

The session was called to order by Rev. W. R. Dudley. Rev. J. D. Pence led the congregation in singing, "I Gave My Life For Thee", and Rev. E. L. Foot lead in the opening prayer. The Arlington Church under the leadership of their pastor, Rev. Miles Bennett has made good progress. Their revival with Rev. Rose Huffman was a time of spiritual blessing. The church has been strengthened by those added to it as a result of this meeting.

The Sunday School rooms have been redecorated and the old part of the building remodeled to make another Sunday School room and a storage room.

The Church has enjoyed a good financial year and there is a good balance in the treasure to begin another year. We commend you for faithfully working at the job.

The Yorkshire Church under the leadership of their pastor Rev. Dennis Godsey were blessed by a good revival with Rev. T. M. Weir as the evangelist. A large number of young people were converted in this meeting and twenty-four of them requested letters to their school that they be excused from the dancing class. Four young men have witnessed to calls to the ministry, and are planning to attend Eastern Pilgrim College. A fine youth choir has been organized.

The Church services have been well attended and the Sunday School attendance has had a phenomenal increase.

The Sunday School rooms have been redecorated and asphalt tile has been laid on the floor throughout the Sunday School Department.

We commend you for faithfully working at the job.

The Woodlawn Church under the leadership of Rev. Lester Parks have made a good recovery this year. The Sunday School attendance has been stabilized and an increase in attendance is promising.

The financial picture is most encouraging over a year ago, the year has been finished in the blue with better prospects in the year ahead.

The Woodlawn Church was host to the Indoor Camp Meeting with Rev. Carl N. Hall as the evangelist. This meeting was a blessing to all who attended and we feel that it was a help to the local church. We appreciate the fine hospitality afforded us by Rev. and Mrs. Parks and their congregation.

We commend you for faithfully sticking to the job.

The North College Park Church under the leadership of Rev. Arthur Knowles their pastor have had a year of reorganization. They have not stood still but new plans have been made and they are on the move.

The Sunday School attendance is up and the teacher methods and materials used are very commendable.

There is a marked interest in the services of the Church and an increase in attendance.

A fine youth choir has been organized and a youth program which meets on Friday evening. This program is in competition with a Teen Club meeting on the same evening. In spite of this the Church Youth meeting has gained in attendance from 4 to 18.

Indicative of the spiritual condition of the Church is the testimony of a man converted in one of the regular services of the Church, "The position I had cherished most and worked for the hardest and had attained suddenly became insignificant when I found Jesus Christ as my Saviour".

We commend you for your faithfulness to God's work.

The United Church under the leadership of their pastor, Rev. Don Pence has forged ahead in Church and Sunday School attendance. More than once the 72 seats in their church have been filled and people have been standing in the isle and in the back of the church. Sunday School classes have been held out-of-doors when weather has permitted. On Easter Sunday morning there were 150 in attendance. More than 60 people were standing outside the church.

Plans are in hand for the construction of a 60' X 75' Church to house the church and also take care of the District Camp Meetings and other District gatherings.

We commend you for the faithful work you have done for God's work.

I have grouped the unorganized churches together in order to pay special tribute to our Home Missionaries. These ministers and their families have stayed on the job and held the line in the face of overwhelming odds. For many of them the odds have been: lack of funds, inadequate Sunday School Teachers, or total lack of teachers, having to move their place of worship, holding services in the parsonage. Fluctuating Sunday School and Church attendance, no one to play the piano, not to mention loneliness and minor details too numerous to mention here.

Thank God for these dedicated men and their families who out of love for God and His Work have stuck faithfully to the job to make possible the establishing of another lighthouse to point lost humanity to Jesus Christ.

Rev. A. P. Lape and his family reopened the Pimmit Hills Church last summer. Mr. John Lucia volunteered his services and took over the Sunday School as its' Superintendent. This new work has averaged between 15 - 20 in its' services.

Rev. Lape is making application for the use of the Pimmit Hills Elementary School for the Sunday morning Sunday School and morning service. The school is located across the street from the parsonage.

We commend these people for faithful service to God and His work.

Rev. John Foster and his congregation have faithfully carried on the work of the Lord at Cameron Valley. They have gathered a good group of people together and their Sunday School had an average attendance of 65 with the Church services well attended. These people worship in a rented hall and Rev. Foster supplies his own parsonage.

We commend these people for their faithful service to the work of God.

Rev. C. W. Beach and his congregation at Temple have consistently done God's work under ever changing conditions. People move in and out of the Village like vacationers and now the Village has been reduced in land area.

You will notice with interest that the Temple Church has contributed liberally to the District, General Church in Church Extension and Foreign Missions and to Eastern Pilgrim College.

Besides financial contributions these people have served on the staff of the Youth Camp, assisted in the preparation of the grounds and erection of the tent for the District Camp Meeting. They have supported the Camp meeting, Youth Rallies and Indoor Camp Meeting in attendance and with their means.

Two of their fine young ladies are attending Eastern Pilgrim College.

This Church has influenced a number of families in near by Burghandy Village and it seems possible that a Church can be established there.

We commend this people for their faithfulness to God's work.

Rev. Elmer Drury and his bride took over their duties as pastor of the Damascus Church on June 21, 1960.

In August they were requested to vacate the rented Church in which they held Sunday School and morning worship. This, because there are no available places to rent, made it necessary to hold the services in the parsonage.

In spite of this and the severe winter, progress has been made. An average of 34 for Sunday School with the same group for the morning worship service. Plans are in hand and approved for the construction of the first unit of the Church building and work should begin on construction very soon.

We commend this people for their faithful service to the work of the Lord.

It is my happy privilege to welcome into the Conference the new Braddock Hills Pilgrim Church.

Under the guiding hand of Rev. R. Lewis Adams the new Church was organized on the evening of April 18, 1961 with 28 adult members. The charter membership was held open to make it possible for some who could not be present for the organizational meeting to join and now the membership stands at 34.

Rev. Adams was called as their pastor and the following officers were elected: Ray Cadle Sunday School Superintendent, Don. A. Malloy Treasurer, Bob Adams Secretary, Ray Cooper and Randolph Coates Elders, Lester Nicholson and William A. Gaumer Jr. Deacons, and Don Malloy Conference Delegate.

God has given direction and a fine property with one and a half acres of ground and a good house for the parsonage has been found. The asking price for this property was \$23,600.00 Rev. Adams made them an offer of \$22,000.00 for it and the offer was accepted. A loan of \$16,000.00 has been secured from the Perpetual Building Association to make the purchase possible. Rev. and Mrs. Adams should be moving into their parsonage in the next day or so.

Plans are in preparation for the Church to be built on the Braddock Hills property next to the parsonage.

May the rich graces of God attend this new congregation as they take on the task of building a lighthouse for God in this new community.

We welcome you into our fellowship and commend you for your fine spirit and interest in the work of the Lord.

PROBLEMS:

Problems are an ever present factor in life, this is so whether you are busily engaged or doing nothing. Someone has said, "the problem of doing nothing is that you never get to take a day off." Where there is an ambitious program going on, as is the case in the Capital District, problems will be present. Problems are never devastating unless we by pass them and thus fail to find a solution to them.

It is not my purpose to accentuate our problems, or seek out an excuse, nor someone to blame but only that a solution be found that one year hence we will not be found with the same problems.

I do not feel that God's work is a machine and all we need to do is put together the parts and inject the proper chemical and it will work. However, there are methods and systems when well oiled with prayer will serve to forward the work of the new Testament Church.

In a study to find information on Church Finances I have come across a book titled, "Better Church Finances". This book is well illustrated and is a thorough study in: making the offering a matter of spiritual worship, how to estimate the potential income of your Church, how to arrive at the financial need of your Church and how to secure a systematic weekly subscription to balance a Unified Church Budget and thus meet every need of the Church local, District, general and the zone college. This book is available to you along with one on Church Promotion at \$2.00 per copy.

Resolution No. 1

Whereas the Capital District Conference, with the exception of newly organized churches, will be required to pay to the General Church the full amount of \$8.00 per member for the United Stewardship Fund during the 1961-62 Conference Year, and

Whereas Ways and Means Resolution V of the Conference Rules will have served its purpose, and no further funds will accrue to the District Church Extension Fund from its provisions.

Therefore, be it resolved that the present Ways and Means Resolution V be deleted from the Conference Rules.

Resolution No. 2

Whereas the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church recognizes the desirability of easing the financial burden of new churches during the first 3 years after their organization, by requiring only 1/4 of the U.S.F. to be paid for the first year, 1/2 the second year, and 3/4 the third year, and

whereas we of the Capital District want to encourage and assist new churches in every way we can,

Be it resolved that the following statement be adopted as a Conference Rule:

Each new church organized within the Capital District shall be required to pay District Budget, as defined in paragraph 1 of Ways and Means Resolution i of the Conference Rules, in the amount of only 2% during the first conference year after organization, 4% during the second year, 6% during the third year, and full budget thereafter.

Resolution No. 3

Be it resolved that the following statement establishing the due date of District and General Church funds to be sent to the District Treasurer be adopted as a Conference Rule:

The United Stewardship Fund and the District Budget are due on a monthly basis. These funds and all other designated funds and special offerings for District or for General Church use are to be sent to the District Treasurer as soon as practicable after the end of the month and not later than the 10th day of the following month.

TIME OF DISTRICT CAMP

Whereas the month of July and part of August is a particularly busy period for District officials and church pastors, due to the District Camp Meeting over the 2nd and 3rd. Sundays of July, followed by at least two weeks of Youth Camp, and

Whereas personal vacation plans of many people probably conflict with the mid-July camp time, and

Whereas, during the period of the District Camp this area has had heavy and continuous rains following comparatively nice wather in late June consistently for several years past, which probably hinders camp to some extent, therefore

Be it resolved to amend Standing Rule No. 1 of the Conference Rules to read as follows:

Be it resolved that the annual District Camp Meeting be held over a ten-day period beginning the third Friday of June 1961 being the first year.

PASTOR'S VACATION

Each church is encouraged to give their pastor a two-week vacation.

WORK PROGRAM FOR DISTRICT CAMP GROUNDS

The District Council shall determine the number of man hours required to prepare the grounds for camp meeting and that each year the Council requests each church to supply an equal share of man hours to complete the work.

DISTRICT YOUTH PROGRAM

Whereas the Youth Program of the Capital District is rapidly growing in size and importance, be it therefore resolved that upon the calling of the Superintendent, each pastor will make himself available for service during Youth Camp and that every pastor arrange his schedule so as to be available during the week of Pilgrim Youth Camp. The date of the Youth Camp is to be set one year in advance.

G E N E R A L R E S O L U T I O N S

TIME OF DISTRICT YOUTH MEETINGS

Whereas the local church program many times conflicts with the District Program and whereas each pastor is urged to support and promote every District function: Be it therefore, resolved that the third Friday of every other month, starting in September, be reserved for District Youth Rallies and functions. PILGRIM PENSION PLAN, INC.

Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of P. H. District, therefore, Be it resolved by the annual Conference of this District that the District Council, District Trustees and all District officials be, and they are hereby, authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local P. H. Churches of this District, subject, however, to the limitation and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the P. H. Church authorizing said loans.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE

Whereas, the 1958 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted legislation giving the Capital District Conference fully organized status by 1962, and requiring this district to begin paying the United Stewardship Fund at the rate of \$2.00 per member the first year (1958-59 Conference year) and increasing \$2.00 per member each year until the full amount of \$8.00 per member to be paid beginning with the fourth year, and

Whereas, a goal of eight (8) new churches during this quadrennium has been established for the Capital District, and

Whereas, although the objectives of Ways and Means Resolution V of the Conference Rules are still valid, it seems desirable to adjust the amount of the assessment in view of paragraph 1; above, so that the total amount due from each church will not be unreasonable.

Therefore, be it resolved that the following be substituted for Ways and Means Resolution V of the Conference Rules.

Whereas, the Capital District is now required by General Church action to pay the United Stewardship Fund, which will be \$8.00 per member per year after two more years, and

Whereas, new churches must be established on the Capital District and young churches strengthened, and

Whereas, preparation for assuming full responsibilities of an organized district is desirable and will be gained in this manner,

Therefore, be it resolved that each church of the Capital District shall pay \$8.00 per member per year to be designated as the United Stewardship Fund Offering.

Be it resolved, also, that the District Treasurer shall use these funds, first, to pay the annual United Stewardship Fund assessment to the General Church Headquarters, and then shall credit the remainder, if any, to the District Church Extension Fund for use in furthering Home Mission projects in the Capital District, and

Be it further resolved that 50% of the United Stewardship Fund be forwarded by each church treasurer to the District Treasurer within the first 90 days after Conference and that the balance be due and payable six months after the Conference date. In any event, the full amount of this offering to be paid in full by January 30th of each Conference year, and

Be it resolved further that a semi-annual conference meeting be held each fall to review District progress and arrange plans for the future gains of our Church.

STANDING WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved that the District Budget be raised as follows:

1. Each church in the District shall pay to the District Treasurer 7% of all offerings received by the church except those offerings designated for a specific purpose or activity (other than local church) such as: Missions, Church Extension, S. S. Extension (Rally Day), Colleges, and District projects.
2. All regular offerings of the church such as: tithes, building fund, S. S. and young people's offerings shall be subject to this assessment.
3. Two sevenths (2/7) of this budget shall be credited by the District Treasurer to the District Resolving Fund.
4. The remainder of the budget shall be credited to the District Administration Fund for use as required for District Administration.

5. All offerings received at District Rallies, Conferences and other meetings shall be credited to the District Administration Fund unless otherwise specifically designated or directed by the District Council.
6. The District Budget shall be paid to the District Treasurer by the 10th day of the following month.

Whereas, now churches must be established on the Capital District and young churches strengthened, and

Whereas, preparation for assuming full responsibilities of an organized district is desirable and will be gained in this manner,

Therefore, be it resolved that each church of the Capital District shall pay \$8.00 per member per year to be designated as the United Stewardship Fund Offering.

Be it resolved, also, that the District Treasurer shall use these funds, first, to pay the annual United Stewardship Fund assessment to the General Church Headquarters, and then shall credit the remainder, if any, to the District Church Extension Fund for use in furthering Home Mission projects in the Capital District, and

Be it further resolved that 50% of the United Stewardship Fund be forwarded by each church treasurer to the District Treasurer within the first 90 days after Conference and that the balance be due and payable six months after the Conference date. In any event, the full amount of this offering to be paid in full by January 30th of each Conference year, and

Be it resolved further that a semi-annual conference meeting be held each fall to review District progress and arrange plans for the future gains of our Church.

VI

Whereas the churches of this district, with the exception of the National Pilgrim Church, have not adopted the Eastern Pilgrim College school budget as recommended in Ways and Means Resolution No. VI of the Conference Rules, and

Whereas, during the visit of the Eastern Pilgrim College Choir in April members of the various congregations individually pledged an equivalent amount (approximately \$800 to \$1000) to be paid to the college for furnishing student dormitories, which indicated a desire to support the college and an acceptable method of supporting it, therefore

Be it resolved that the following be substituted for the last three (3) paragraphs of Ways and Means Resolution No. VI of the Conference Rules:

Be it resolved that the Capital District Conference include in its annual budget an item of \$800.00 for the support of Eastern Pilgrim College.

Be it further resolved that this item is to be met by voluntary pledges made by individuals or by groups in the churches of the District during two (2) visits by the Choir of E.P.C. to this District during the year, said visits to be at times and places arranged by the Capital District Council and the officials of Eastern Pilgrim College.

SPECIAL SESSION

II. Be it Resolved, that no church extension district be received into the general conference as a fully organized didistrict until it has at least 500 members of voting age, or sufficient finance to open one new church a year above locatl, district, and general expenses.

III. Whereas gain in church membership is vital to the life of the church, and whereas the means of securing this desired goal is left to circumstances, Be it Resolved, that a goal of 5000 New Members be set for the 62 to 66 quadrennium, and that a plan to gain these new members be set forth by the General Board to local churches through the medium of a Superintendent's Annual Conference.

IV. Whereas the membership of our General Conference is unusually large, and Whereas it works a financial hardship on many districts to send such a large delegation, and

Whereas the ratio of lay delegates to Ministerial delegates is so small, Where fore be it resolved that we substitute the following for Section 116, Paragraphs 1, 2 and 3.

Par. 1

There shall be a General Conference composed of all the general officers and members of the General Board, district superintendents, the presidents of Pilgrim Holiness Church Colleges and other zone or general church educational institutions in the U. S. A. and Canada, members of all standing committees and a ministerial and lay delegation, to be selected at the annual conferences immediately preceding the General Conference. If the district superintendent is a member of the General Board the assistant district superintendent shall be a member of the General Conference.

Par. 2

The delegates to the General Conference shall be selected as follows: one ministerial delegate and one lay delegate to each 300 members or major fraction thereof. Each district shall be entitled to at least one ministerial delegate and one

lay delegate in addition to the district superintendent. All lay delegates, to the general conference, must be at least 21 years of age and elected from among nominees selected by the District Council. The ministerial delegates must be chosen from the ordained ministers who are actively engaged in full time service in the Pilgrim Holiness Church at the time of the General Conference.

Par. 3

In considering the ratio for the ministerial delegation to the General Conference, foreign mission fields shall be represented as follows: All field superintendents shall be members of the General Conference. In addition to the field superintendents, one missionary shall be chosen from each mission field area as a delegate, those delegates to be selected by the Council in the area where they serve from among the missionaries on furlough in the U. S. A.

V. Whereas, each of our zone Bible schools and colleges is dependent upon the support received from the churches in its zone; Be it Resolved, that each school zone shall establish a minimum educational budget sufficient to operate such a zone college. Such budget shall be distributed among all the districts comprising the school zone. This shall be in addition to the amount specified in the General Budget for the support of the Liberal Arts College. Failure on the part of the school zone to provide the above proposed budget or failure of such college to operate within their current expense budget shall constitute sufficient reason for the General Board to restrict the college in their program, or to close the school.
