CONFERENCE JOURNAL

The 38th annual conference of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the campmeeting tabernacle, at Clarkston, Wash., July 21, 1952, at 8:00 a.m.

Mrs. Lyle Tullis led the congregation in singing the songs, "I Know Whom I have Believed" and "I Know I Love Thee Better, Lord". Prayer was offered by Bro. G. M. Pratt.

Rev. M. C. Kittle read a letter of greeting from our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, authorizing Rev. P. W. Thomas, Editor of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate, to preside over the conference. Rev. Thomas called the conference to order.

The roll was called with thirty ministers and delegates responding.

It was voted that the first five rows of seats across the tabernacle and the platform constitute the conference bar.

A motion prevailed that the time of conference sittings be the same as last year, namely, 8:00-12:00 A.M.: 1:30-5:00 P.M.; 6:00-9:30 P.M.

The District Superintendent appointed Miss Hazel Goss and Mrs. Lyle Tullis on the Reception Committee.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. Paul Washburn of Grandview, Wash., and Rev. and Mrs. C. R. Bennett of Clatskanie, Oregon to the conference. These were welcomed and given honorary seats within the conference bar.

The District Superintendent, Rev. M. C. Kittle, gave his annual report which was accepted with appreciation.

The Assistant Superintendent, Rev. G. M. Pratt, gave a verbal report which was received with thanksgiving.

The District Treasurer gave his report which was received subject to the auditor's report. A rising vote of thanks was extended to the treasurer for his faithfulness.

Mrs. Virgil Hogarth was presented to the conference and was given an honorary seat within the bar.

The Superintendent recommended that the conference receive Rev. and Mrs. Washburn and Mrs. Hogarth as licensed ministers. They were received and each gave testimony of present victory.

The report of the Educational Board was presented as follows: We recommend that Allen Harman be granted 1st year license; W. H. Harman, Ralph Coy, Virgil Hogarth and Dale Swinney be granted second year license; R. H. Buery, Alton Finney, and Lyle Tullis be granted third year license Paul Idler be granted fourth year license and Iona Kittle be dropped at her own request. The report was accepted an approved.

A motion prevailed to have the election of officers at this time.

The Superintendent appointed Dale Swinney, Lyle Tullis and Donald Goss as tellers.

Ballots were cast for district superintendent with Rev. A. H. Wilson being elected.

The motion was made and carried that we excuse the chairman while he tries to contact Bro. Wilson by telephone. The district superintendent took the chair.

Rev. Alton Finney was elected to the office of assistant superintendent.

Rev. Lloyd J. Laubaugh was elected district secretary.

A report of the Council's nomination for district treasurer presented the names of M. N. Swinney, Paul Washburn and Lyle Tullis.

Ballots were cast for Treasurer and M. N. Swinney was elected.

Ballots were then cast for Advisory Council members resulting in the election of Donald L. Goss, G. M. Pratt and Paul Washburn.

The Council presented the names of Paul Washburn, and Lloyd Laubaugh as nominees for the Educational Board. Lloyd Laubaugh was elected.

Rev. Thomas returned to the chair.

The Auditing Committee reported and its report was accepted.

The Statistician gave his report which was accepted. A motion prevailed to include in the printed report all Sunday schools and Young People's Societies functioning as Pilgrim organizations.

The Resolutions Committee presented the following which was accepted: Resolved, that the people who attend Camp Meeting be counted in attendance at their local Sunday School.

The following resolutions were presented for the consideration of the conference: 1. Resolved, that we favor the amalgamation of the two northwest districts and we instruct our chairman to carry this report to the Executive Council. 2. Resolved: that the district superintendent pastor one of our churches. Be it further resolved that he devote one weekend per month visiting churches endeavoring to cover the district three times each year. 3. Resolved: that we have a full-time superintendent.

It was moved and seconded to adopt the first one. Discussion followed and a motion prevailed to table the resolution.

It was moved to adopt the second resolution but there was no second to the motion.

It was voted that the matter of the district superintendent and his activities be referred to the district council.

The Ways and Means Committee presented a report. It was recommended that Resolution No. 15 which provided free entertainment for ministers at the Camp be deleted from the Minutes. It was carried.

- It was recommended that in Resolution No. 12 the words "and the district superintendent" be deleted. An amendment was offered to insert the words, "are requested". There was no second to the amendment. The original motion carried.

The Conference recessed until 1:00 P.M.

Second Sitting:

The Conference reconvened with the singing of the Hymn, ""Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah" led by Donald Goss.

The chair asked Rev. Dale Swinney to read the 121st Psalm and Rev. E. O. Rathbun to lead in prayer.

The chairman addressed the conference concerning the financial program of the church.

It was voted that Bro. Kittle make the appcintments of the committees.

The Reception Committee presented Sisters Vada and Gladys Henry of Colcrado Springs. They were invited to sit within the conference bar.

The Ways and Means Committee continued its report. It was recommended that in Resolution No. 9, utilities and fuel supply be added to the superintendent's remuneration. After considerable discussion it was referred to the district council.

The secretary was asked to make a correction in Resolution No. 6.

In Resolution No. 1, it was recommended by the committee that the percentage be changed from 14% to 10% and evangelist's offerings be included in the exemptions. An amendment was offered that it read "10% of regular offerings." It was lost. Another amendment was offered to change 10% to 12%. It was carried. The main resolution as amended was carried.

The superintendent appointed the committees and the appointments were approved.

A statement from the Council was presented to the conference as follows: In the event that Rev. A. H. Wilson does not accept the superintendency, we ask the Executive Council to send us a man for the office. This statement was ratified by the conference.

It was voted to send greetings to W. J. Webster and L. W. Goss from the Conference.

It was voted to adjourn and the conference adjourned with the singing of the Doxology.

Another year has passed into the hands of the keeper of the divine records, and we are gathered now to examine our earthly version of personal and district labors.

DISTRICT LABORS

Much sacrifice and earnest endeavor has characterized the labors of the ministers and their families. Laboring under the handicap of economic pressure, the subtle attacks of Satan, the scorn of a Christ-hating world, you have pressed your way through every foe to some real victories.

We have had some fine revivals, God honored conventions and Zone Rallies this year. Material progress has been made in almost every church. HOME MISSIONARY

The men of the district responded nobly to the call for labor in our home missionary church at Yakima, working untiringly until it had been remodeled completely and converted to a lovely house of worship. Rev. Moore, the pastor, and his good people have added to the beauty and usefulness of the building in recent weeks.

The Council has saved the majority of the home missionary money over a period of three years to launch this project and God has responded with a fine constituency which is or will be ready to crganize soon. We have five members with more to follow. We believe there is a wonderful future for the Yakima church.

Other activities have been limited by a shortage of men, although other doors are opening to us.

STATISTICAL AND FINANCIAL

These reports speak for the faithful labors of the pastors and wives.

8.3% gain in church membership.

5.6% gain in church receipts.

31 % gain in pastor's support.

37.1% gain in Sunday school receipts.

PERSONAL LABORS

Sermons, 113; Seekers, 111; Board meetings, 20; Calls to churches, 51; Annual meetings, 12; Baptized, 9; Revivals on the district, 1; Week-end meetings on the district, 7; Weekend meetings off the district, 1; Revivals off the district, 4; Superintendents meetings, 1; Ministerial meetings, 1; Youth conventions, 1; Zone meetings, 3; Traveled approximately 30,500 miles, the district paying for 13,768 miles.

We have examined the treasurer's book and to the best of our knowledge it is in accordance with the instructions of this Conference.

RESOLUTIONS

1. Resolved that the district council serve as the district trustees.

2. Resolved that all recall meetings be held sixty days prior to the district conference. The district (8) superintendent to be notified of the results of said meetings within ten days.

3. Resolved that each church be urged to erect a cabin on the camp ground for their pastor. Laymen may also build cabins. All building plans to be under the direction of the district council.

4. Resolved that the district conference follow the annual camp meeting. Be it further recommended that the pastors and all members of the conference be in attendance throughout the camp meeting.

5. Resolved that the council appoint an editor and arrange a means of finance for a district publication.

6. Resolved that the district superintendent have the privilege of holding four meetings during the year off the district and to keep all money.

7. Resolved that we have one three-day ministerial meeting to be held in early spring. The time and place to be arranged by the district superintendent and his assistant.

8. Resolved that two-hundred copies of the district minutes be printed.

9. Resolved that the district superintendent appoint the statistical committee at least two weeks prior to the conference.

10. Resolved that the council be authorized to appoint a committee of two to work with the superintendent in home missionary work.

11. Resolved that the district council serve as the camp meeting committee or elect a committee if necessary.

12. Resolved that we recommend active ministers be elected as members of the district council.

13. Resolved that each church treasurer have a uniform treasurer's book to keep accurate accounts.

14. Resolved that our conference year close June 30th and that each pastor see that a correct re-

port from his church be sent in not later than July 10th.

15. Resolved that in the quarterly meetings each church take an offering for the superintendent's travel expense to be sent to the district treasurer.

16. Resolved that the district superintendent upon his first quarterly visit to the churches instruct the local church board as to its duties.

17. Resolved that each church have a financial budget, setting an allowance for all expenditures, including the pastor's salary.

18. Resolved that all committees be appointed by the district superintendent at the close of each conference and hold office through the year, except the reception committee, which he shall appoint at the beginning of each conference.

19. Resolved that each pastor and superintendent be given a two-week vacation with pay.

20. Resolved that each church pay their pastor his salary during the camp and conference.

21. Resolved that we have a district young people's convention during the year and that it be held at a convenient time for the young people who are in school. 22. Resolved that we have a meeting for ministers and workers at least three times during the camp meeting, the district superintendent shall be in charge and all ministers and workers are urged to be present.

23. Resolved that we have a district Sunday-school committee to promote Sunday-school interest in the district and to cooperate with the general committee and that said committee be appointed by the district . council and the district superintendent be a member of the committee. (Recommended by the General Sunday School Committee)

24. Resolved that the people who attend camp meeting be counted in attendance at their local Sunday school. 25. Resolved that we express our appreciation to our District superintendent, secretary and treasurer for their services during the year. Be it further resolved, that we express our appreciation to our cook, Sr. Wheeler, and her helpers in the kitchen, also to the Clarkston church and friends for the splendid entertainment and food donations. 26. Resolved that we express our deep appreciation to our camp and conference workers, namely: Rev. and Mrs. P. W. Thomas; Rev. B. Ivan Williams, and Rev. and Mrs. Clifton Berg.

WAYS AND MEANS

1. Resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 12% of the receipts except building and improvement funds and evangelists' offerings to be applied on the district budget as follows: $90\frac{1}{2}\%$ for District Expense, 3% for General Conference Delegate Expense, 3% for District Home Missions, 3% for District Church Extension Loan fund, $\frac{1}{2}\%$ for Pilgrim Evangelistic Institute.

2. Resolved that each church take a missionary offering each month during the year, alternating between district home missions and foreign missions, offerings to apply on local budget.

3. Resolved that all treasurers send local money for the district and general purposes to the district treasurer by the tenth of each month.

4. Resolved that each local treasurer give the pastor a monthly statement of the church's district obligation and that when in arrears the pastor shall attempt to raise the same.

- 5. Resolved that we have a home missionary fund to be raised by special offerings during the campmeeting and by use of pledge cards, the same to be presented by the presiding officer in cooperation with the pastors to the amount of \$1,000 or more. 6. Resolved that each Sunday-school apply 5% of their regular offering and send to the district treasurer to be applied on district home missionary fund.

7. Resolved that the annual renumeration of the district secretary be \$15.00 and \$30.00 respectively.

8. Resolved that the expenses of travel and entertainment for all sessions of the council except those meetings held during camp-meetings and district conventions be assumed by the district.

9. Resolved that the district superintendent receive \$100. per month salary, five cents per mile for his travel expense when he uses his car and actual train or bus fare when traveling in the interest of the district.

10. Resolved that the district treasurer be bonded, such amount to be set by the council, and the cost to be paid out of the district expense fund.

11. Resolved that we have a camp-meeting association with a membership fee of \$1.00 per year, to be equally divided between camp expense and camp-ground improvement. Be it further resolved that the district superintendent present this association on his visits to the churches and get as many members as possible.

12. Resolved that all pastors and unstationed ministers pay their tithe from ministerial remumeration to the local treasurer to be directed into the district expense fund.

13. Resolved that the district treasurer pay the e-quivalent of 4% of the district superintendent's salary into the pension fund of the General Church.
14. Resolved that the district treasurer deposit the General Conference Delegate fund in a savings account until needed.
