CONFERENCE JOURNAL

The forty-first annual conference of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the camp meeting tabernacle at Clarkston, Washington, July 25, 1955, at 8:00 A.M.

Rev. David Bailey led the conference in singing the song, "I Know Whom I Have Believed".

A recording of the late Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, singing the song "Stand By Me" was played.

The district superintendent, Rev. I. G. Canary, introduced Rev. M. T. Cockman, who led in prayer.

Rev. Canary welcomed the delegates and friends to the conference, then introduced the presiding officer, Rev. R. C. Hawkins, Secretary of Church Extension.

Rev. Hawkins addressed the conference using the Scripture Acts 28:11, "When Paul saw, he thanked God and took courage."

The roll was called with thirty-one ministers and delegates responding.

A motion prevailed to appoint Mrs. Hattie Smith as delegate from Coeur d'Alene.

The superintendent appointed E. O. Rathbun and David Bailey on the Reception Committee.

The conference bar was set to include the first four rows of seats and the platform of the tabernacle.

The time for sittings was voted to be 8:00-12:00 A.M., 1:30-5:00 P.M., 6:00-9:00 P.M.

The district superintendent read his report which was received by the conference.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted.

The Twin Falls and Yakima churches, their pastors and delegates were received into the conference.

The Reception Committee presented the following: Rev. and Mrs. E. R. Snook, Rev. and Mrs. Perry Thomas, Rev. and Mrs. Lester Boone, Rev. and Mrs. C. O. Mansfield, Miss Evelyn Ritenburgh and Miss Betty Miller. These were given honorary seats within the conference bar.

The district treasurer read his report which was received by the conference.

The statistician's report was given and accepted.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. M. T. Cock-man and Rev. C. W. Thomas who were given honorary seats.

It was voted to recess for fifteen minutes.

The conference reconvened with prayer being offered by M. N. Swinney.

The Assistant Superintendent read his report which was received.

The reports of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary and the Young People's Executive Secretary were given and received.

The Educational and Examining Board presented the following recommendations which were accepted: E. T. Meeks be granted 1st year license; Ronald Benjamin and W. H. Harman be granted 2nd year license; David Bailey and Lester Boone be granted 3rd year license; Ralph Coy, Bessie Crowson, George Davis, Paul Idler and Perry Thomas be granted 4th year license; that C. C. Mansfield, E. R. Snook and Betty Miller be received as ordained ministers; And Evelyn Ritenburgh as ordained deaconess.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was called for and reported as follows: Resolution No. 4 to be changed so that conference will precede rather than follow the camp meeting. This was amended that Conference convene at 8:00 A.M. on Wednesday prior to the Camp. It carried. Resolution No. 12 to be changed so that the conference year close May 31st and reports to be by June 15th. This resolution was passed.

A resolution was presented giving the district superintendent the authority to call evangelists for the local churches. This was ruled by the chair to be contrary to the Manual.

The committee presented a resolution suggesting the name of the camp ground be Pilgrim Cove. This was lost.

The Ways and Means Committee recommended a change in the district budget as follows: 88% for District Expense, 3% for General Conference Delegate Expense, 6% for District Church Extension and 3% for District Church Extension Loan Fund. This was passed.

The Committee recommended the following changes: Each Sunday school send 5% of regular offerings for District Church Extension; that the purchasing agent receive \$25 plus 3 cents per mile for his services and the district superintendent receive 5 cents per mile traveling expense. These recommendations were carried.

It was voted to delete the clause in Resolution No. 11 that the camp association fee be divided.

It was voted that the registration fee of the camp be \$2.00.

The district Missionary Society President, Mrs. Canary, presented a report of the activities during the year. This report was received with thanksgiving.

The first sitting of the conference was dismissed with prayer by Rev. C. W. Thomas.

Second Sitting

This session opened with the singing of "Lily of the Valley" led by Bro. Goss.

Prayer was offered by Rev. L. J. Laubaugh.

The secretary read the minutes of the previous sitting and they were approved.

The chairman called for a report from the president of Western Pilgrim College which was received with appreciation.

It was voted that the conference go on record as approving our local churches making application to the General Church for loans on building projects.

The election was held with the following officers being elected: District Superintendent, Rev. Ivan G. Canary; Assistant Superintendent, Rev. Harley Briggs; District Secretary, Rev. Lloyd J. Laubaugh; District Treasurer, Rev. M. N. Swinney; Advisory Council Members, Rev. Paul Washburn, Rev. Donald Goss, Rev. M. L. Acheson; Educational Board Member, Rev. T. L. Willingham; School Board Representative, Rev. David Bailey.

The district council was authorized to complete all unfinished business.

A rising vote of appreciation was given the Clarkston church for their labors for the Camp.

It was voted to send greetings to Rev. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent, expressing our appreciation and love.

The conference was adjourned with prayer.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the forty-first annual conference of the Idaho-Washington district of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Greetings in His love. "Other men laboured, and ye are entered into their labours."

It is indeed with profound humblesness of mind and soul that we report to you of the mercies and the goodness of our wonderful Lord. Other men have laboured, and sacrificed and have contributed in no small way to the blessings that we enjoy today. We have tried to carry on the responsibilities to the best of our limited ways. The fellowship, the cooperation and the good work of our brethren in the ministry have helped to lighten the load and given encouragement to the heart. We rightly know that the success of the work depends upon the stout hearts and broad shoulders of our faithful pastors and their good people. We thank God for the Pilgrim Holiness Church and for its ministry in the world today. We believe that we have a church and ministry that is second to none. We are confident that for the future that God has a greater work for our church and for our district.

- Our people and preachers. We are thankful for the kind of people and preachers on the district. Our people are spiritual, loyal and sacrificing as a whole. Our preachers are stalwarts of the faith and a credit to the whole church. The morale is high and faith for the improbable marks each one. God bless every one.
 Some of the church's best preachers are labouring in small pastorates and home missionary projects. The size of the church does not signify the calibre of the pastor.
- 2. Our local churches. Many of our churches have made good strides this last year. It is thrilling to see some of the older churches catch the vision. Seven churches have raised the pastor's salary. Two churches have built completely new buildings. Many have remodeled. Benton City has erected new front and installed rest rooms and placed up church sign. Clarkston has remodeled Sunday school rooms and decorated the sanctuary. Coeur d'Alene has completed pastor's study and rest rooms. Hermiston has built a very lovely brick

veneer church which is a credit to our denomination. Kennewick has painted the church. Weippe has finished remodeling in the Sunday school department. Yakima has built a beautiful three bed-room parsonage which can be called a modern day miracle. Grandview, Mc-Call, Post Falls, Spirit Lake and Weippe are now in a building program or making plans for one soon.

- 3. Our district meetings. We had a wonderful youth confention at Spokane and a fine district ministerial convention at Kennewick. Local men were the workers at Spokane. We were honored and blessed by having Rev. Melvin Snyder, now our First Assistant General Superintendent, as our speaker. The district camp was marked by God's presence and blessings. We thank God for the good ministry of the Felters and Salvadors.
- 4. Our new works. We conducted three home missionary campaigns during the year and God gave us two new churches, namely Yakima and Twin Falls. Yakima was organized with nineteen members. Rev. E. T. Meeks, from Indiana, came as the pastor and has done a very commendable work. Since December Brother Meeks has built one of the nicest parsonages that we have. Twin Falls was organized with thirteen members. Since then they have received two more. This was a community holiness work under the ministry of Rev. Bessie Crowson. The church has purchased the building they have been worshipping in. It is a 30 x 60 block building in a good part of the city. Rev. George Davis, from Indiana, came as the new pastor in November. He has proved to be God's man for the place and the church is moving forward. The Spokane church has closed negotiations for a new church and parsonage.
- 5. Our Camp Building Program. A lovely motel style dormitory 24 x 48 with eight individual rooms has been erected. Twelve double bunk beds complete with mattresses have been installed in it. Including the beds we have about \$1200 invested in this building. The dining room and kitchen has been remodeled by the good labours of Harley Briggs and Gene Hall of Clarkston. They have each put in over 250 hours on this one project. Some of the other ministers also donated some help on

the dormitory. We are grateful for all that was done. Rev. Carl Mansfield, an ordained minister from the Alabama-Northwest Florida district, came by and greatly assisted us in building the dormitory.

- 6. Our new personnel. The following pastors have come or are coming to the district this year. E. R. Snook, E. T. Meeks, George Davis, Perry Thomas, Lester Boone, Mrs. Bessie Crowson, Miss Betty Miller, Miss Evelyn Ritenburgh and C. O. Mansfield. Ralph Coy is coming back to us from Colorado Springs Pilgrim College to serve on the district. We are indeed thankful for these fine additional labourers for the district.
- 7. Our losses. The home going of our beloved General Superintendent, Dr. L. W. Sturk, loses to our church a great leader and to our district a great friend. Rev. W. J. Webster, pioneer missionary, district superintendent and pastor for many years in the Pilgrim Holiness Church, left us for his eternal home. His work still lives among us. We recommend that this issue of the district minutes be a memorial to Dr. Sturk and Rev. Webster. Rev. L. V. Tullis, our district youth executive secretary, councilman, and good pastor at Hermiston for the last four years, leaves us to go to Colorado Springs Pilgrim College as professor. We shall miss Brother Tullis but pray God's blessing upon him and his family as they go to their new field of labour. Rev. E. O. Rathbun and family are moving to El Monte to labour in our school there and we pray God's richest blessing to rest upon them in their field of labour.
- 8. Our gains. We believe that the reports will show a good gain in every department. No one of us can claim the credit. This is a cooperative enterprise. When one fails, we all fail. When one succeeds, we all succeed. Let us praise God for all his benefits and move forward into a greater work for His glory.

REPORT OF DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

Our Idaho-Washington district of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is especially blessed with ministers, laymen and laywomen who know how to sacrifice and carry a burden, and they are endeavoring more and more to carry out the great Commission: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel." The Missionary Societies of this district are endeavoring to operate for the express purpose of being a spiritual and material help to the local church, the district, and general home and foreign missions.

We have 14 organized societies, 3 of which have been organized this year. There are also 8 organized Junior Missionary Societies, and it is believed that the effort with the children will reap rich dividends in the days to come. Except for one church we would have a 100% missionary organization on our district - and by the next camp meeting this church will, no doubt, have an organized missionary society.

All societies did not report, but those reporting show 152 members and cash offerings for the year in the amount of \$1943.71. This amount does not include 20 boxes of S.S. literature, 50 boxes of clothing, Christmas boxes, food and clothing for needy local families, canned goods and various items for the camp ground, as well as local church interests too numerous to itemize. Many of the societies are using the study course.

Special commendation is extended to the officers and members of the missionary society of the Southwick Community Church who have made a very fine contribution to the missionary program of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, in their prayer, their study, their work and their giving.

What has been accomplished by all the missionary societies, both materially and spiritually, can only be evaluated by our blessed Lord, but we believe that He is helping us to unite our efforts as one - to promote the salvation of the lost. It has been my privilege to conduct 8 missionary services, organize 2 new missionary societies. I have received \$10.00 for traveling expenses, from one group.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF WESTERN PILGRIM COLLEGE

To the members of the forty-first Annual Conference of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church assembled at Clarkston, Washington, July 25, 1955: Greetings!

It is with a deep sense of humility and gratitude to God that I come before you to report on the work of Western Pilgrim College and its high school and elementary departments for the 1954-1955 school year. At conference time we stand, as it were, in the midst of the years, looking back over the past year in retrospect, and looking forward to the new year with great anticipation.

I feel as did our beloved Bro. Sturk in his last report to the General Board when he said, "We feel our complete and utter dependence upon the Holy Spirit for guidance and direction as we strive to perform the business necessary to the advancement of the work of God at this time. We trust at these extraordinary times characterized by unrest, perplexity, economical and political uncertainty, we shall proceed with caution, candor, and conscience, looking to our great God for help and blessing. Truly, no one can predict with any degree of certainty what a day may bring forth. It is enough, perhaps, that we strive to the best of our ability for the furtherance of Christ's kingdom and leave the unknown and unpredictable future in the hands of the Master."

I rejoice in the progress that has been made during the past year; surely the Lord has been with us each step of the way. Our new Administration building has been a great help and blessing, and I am sure it will continue to be for many years to come, if the Lord tarries. The paved streets, sidewalks, and other improvements made during the past year have not only proven to be great assets in carrying on our work, but have greatly added to the beauty of the campus as well. We appreciate these physical assets greatly but we appreciate much more the presence of the Lord in our midst as He has so graciously helped us throughout the entire year. In many ways, especially financially, this has been a very difficult year, but we have found God's grace sufficient for every need.

WAYS AND MEANS

- 1. Resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 12% of the receipts except building and improvement funds and evangelists' offerings to be applied on the district budget as follows: 88% for District Expense, 3% for General Conference Delegate Expense, 6% for District Church Extension, 3% for District Church Extension Loan Fund. Be it further resolved that each church raise an amount equal to \$6.00 per member for the General Budget as follows: General Administration, \$1.50; Foreign Missions, \$2.10; Church Extension, \$1.20; Sunday School and Youth Work, 24¢; Church Extension Loan Fund, 36¢; Senior College Fund, 60¢.
- 2. Resolved that each church take a missionary offering each month during the year, alternating between district church extension and foreign missions, offerings to apply on the missionary budget.
- 3. Resolved that all treasurers send local money for the district and general purposes to the district treasurer by the tenth of each month.
- 4. Resolved that each local treasurer give the pastor a monthly statement of the church's district obligation and that when in arrears the pastor and treasurer shall attempt to raise the same.
- 5. Resolved that we have a home missionary fund to be raised by special offerings during the camp meeting and by use of pledge cards, the same to be presented by the presiding officer in cooperation with the pastors to the amount of \$1,000 or more.
- 6. Resolved that each Sunday school send 5% of their regular offering to the district treasurer for the district church extension work.
- 7. Resolved that the annual remuneration of the secretary and statistician be \$15 each and the treasurer\$30. Also the purchasing agent to receive \$25, plus three cents per mile car expense.
- 8. Resolved that the travel expense of three cents per mile and entertainment for all sessions of the council except those meetings held during the camp meetings and conventions be assumed by the district.

- 11. Resolved that we have a camp meeting association with a minimum membership fee of \$1.00 per year. Be it further resolved that the district superintendent present this association on his visits to the churches.
- 12. Resolved that all pastors and unstationed ministers be requested to pay their tithe from ministerial remuneration to the local treasurer to be directed into the district expense fund.
- 13. Resolved that the district treasurer pay the equivalent of 4% of the superintendent's salary into the pension fund of the General Church.
- 14. Resolved that the treasurer deposit the General Conference Delegate Fund in a savings account until needed.
- 15. Resolved that in our Camp free entertainment except registration fees be given the ministers and families who work on the ground on the designated work days, preparing for and cleaning up after the camp and conference.
- 16. Resolved that the camp registration fee be \$2.00.

 Be it further resolved that the regular cost of meals shall be \$1.00 per day or 50¢ per meal except for those working their way through camp, and all children under age of 12.
- 17. Resolved that each church be requested to take an offering quarterly for the support of our zone school, Western Pilgrim College.
