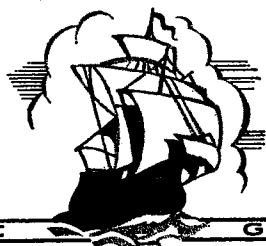

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGSFirst Sitting

The 50th Annual Conference of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 8:30 a.m. July 6, 1964 at Clarkston, Washington.

The Conference opened with the singing of "My Faith Looks Up to Thee", led by Reverend W. L. Boone.

District Superintendent E. E. Meeks called the Conference to prayer, and the Spirit of God blessed the hearts of the assembled delegates and friends, as they were led to the Throne by Emmett Cameron.

The District Superintendent presented General Superintendent William H. Neff, who took the chair. He admonished the Conference to approach the deliberations with open hearts to the direction of the Spirit of God, basing his remarks upon the scripture, "If any man lack wisdom, let him ask of the Father, who giveth to all men liberally and upbraideth not." Other promises were quoted from the Word by members of the Conference. The Chairman re-affirmed the necessity of holding open minds, ready to present and hear ideas, then under the direction of the Spirit, to arrive at the best conclusions possible. He stated that the primary theme of the New Testament was Love.

The Chairman read from the Pilgrim Holiness Manual concerning the composition of the Annual Conference, after which the Secretary called the roll of delegates; to which 15 ordained ministers, 5 licensed ministers, 2 ordained deaconesses, 13 lay delegates and the District Missionary Society President responded.

Reverend Edward Wheatley was presented officially to the Conference, and seated within the bar.

The District Superintendent read his report which was received with gratitude by a hearty "Amen".

The Assistant District Superintendent reported, and his report was approved.

The Auditor's report was read and approved.

The Treasurer read his well-prepared report, which was received with a standing vote of appreciation.

The statistical report was given, and received with appreciation.

The report of the District Missionary President was received and approved.

The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary presented his report, which was approved.

A motion to adjourn until 1:00 p.m. prevailed.

Second Sitting

The second sitting opened with the singing of one stanza of "Amazing Grace", followed with prayer by Reverend O. K. Biddlingmeier.

Dr. Neff addressed the laity on the following theme:

7 Ways In Which the Laymen Can Help Their Pastors

1. Let your pastor know of spiritual or material need anywhere in the parish.
2. Criticize constructively. (Do not be a common scold or a destructive critic.)
3. Attend services consistently. Only laymen can fill the pews.
4. Carry your share of the church load.
5. Tell your pastor about new people who move into the community.
6. Share the visitation load.
7. Be the pastor's friend.

These remarks were followed by a 3-point instruction on How to Get Along With People:

1. Take a real interest in them.
2. Look for the best in them.
3. Deal with each individual as an individual.
Each person is different from every other person.

District Superintendent Meeks gave a brief oral report on the status of the Spokane church. He reported the people are standing by the church and are faithfully doing all that they can to care for the financial needs.

The Resolutions Committee presented recommendations that standing resolutions #28 and #29 be amended to read as follows:

#28. Resolved that the people who attend Camp Meeting, or other District group meetings, on Sunday, be counted in attendance at their local Sunday School. Be it further resolved that in no other circumstances, except as herein described, shall a person be counted in attendance unless personally present at his own local Sunday School.

#29. Resolved that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be appointed for the following year, prior to the annual Conference, and that the Sunday School Committee be given at least one service during the Camp Meeting, at

which service the Committee shall present its plan for Sunday School Promotion and Enlargement during the coming year. Be it further resolved that said committee shall have at least two meetings during each Conference year.

The two preceeding recommendations were passed by voice vote.

A general resolution of appreciation to our Camp and Conference workers was passed.

A resolution of appreciation to our District Superintendent and his wife carried.

A resolution to instruct the Conference Secretary to send a letter of appreciation to the Moore Furniture Company, expressing appreciation for making their organ available for use in our Camp, was passed by common consent.

A new resolution was presented, reading as follows:

Resolved that the minutes of the District Youth Conference be included in the regular District Minutes. Carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported with their recommendations, as follows:

1. Resolved that we transfer the balance of the College Travel fund to the District Church Extension Fund. This was amended by substitution of the following motion: Moved that the College Travel fund be held in reserve, for administration by the District Council for Scholarships to Central Pilgrim College. The substitute motion carried.
2. Resolved that we delete Ways and Means Resolution #16. Carried.
3. Resolved that registration for Youth Camp and District Camp be \$13.00. This was amended to read, "Be it resolved that the fee for Youth Camp, which shall begin on Friday previous to the Annual District Camp, and continue through the District Camp, shall be \$13.00, and that the fees for the District Camp alone shall follow the schedule in Ways and Means Resolution #11. The amended motion was lost, along with the original.
4. Resolved that in appreciation for a lifetime of service to the Pilgrim Holiness Church, lifetime free registration to all functions of the Idaho-Washington District be granted to Reverend and Mrs. O. A. Wells. The motion carried by a unanimous standing vote of the conference.

The District Superintendent presented Sister Bailey to the Conference, with a report that she had given 34 continuous years of service to the Coeur d'Alene Church in the office of Treasurer.

She stood and gave an inspiring testimony which warmed the hearts of the members and friends of the Conference. A standing vote of recognition and appreciation was given her.

The Examining Board reported with the following recommendations:

1. Devere DeField and Dale DeField recommended for ordination.
2. Robert Meeks to be retained in 4th year status.
3. W. H. Harmon, Curt Heath and Albert Weaver to be retained in 2nd year status.
4. Edith Aeschliman to be retained in 1st year Deaconess status.

The recommendations of the Examining Board were approved by the Conference.

The Committee on Memoirs reported with a tribute to Brother Clarence Nulph, who passed to his reward during the past Conference year. The report was received by standing for a moment of silence, followed by prayer by Dr. Neff.

A report from the Joint-Councils of the Idaho-Washington and Pacific Northwest Districts, concerning their deliberations on the Merger proposition, was given.

The Chair stated that 3 alternatives were open to this Conference:

1. Approval of the terms and merger.
2. Refusal of the terms and merger.
3. Recommendations for amendments to the report, to be referred to the Pacific Northwest District.

The floor was opened for a motion. No motion was presented, and the Chairman ruled that the merger proposition was dead, at least until the next International Conference.

A motion to delete Standing Resolution #15 was carried.

The Chairman instructed the District Superintendent to appoint tellers, and the Conference proceeded with the election of officers for the coming Conference year.

District Superintendent E. E. Meeks was re-elected on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Reverend James Rosentrater was elected on the fifth ballot.

Reverend D. Gene Whetstone was elected District Secretary on the first ballot.

Reverend W. L. Boone was re-elected District Treasurer on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for Advisory Members of the Council. Reverend M. A. King and Reverend Devere DeField were elected on the first ballot. Ballots were cast for the two names receiving next highest votes on the first ballot. Reverend O. A. Wells was elected, completing the District Council.

Reverend M. A. King and Reverend D. Gene Whetstone were elected to three year and two year terms respectively, on the Examining Board.

Martha Meeks was re-elected as President of the District Missionary Society.

Reverend James Rosentrater was elected to a three year term on the Educational Board on the second ballot.

The Chairman recessed the Conference until 4:30, at which time the Ordination Service was to be the first order of business.

Third Sitting

The third sitting opened with the singing of "A Charge To Keep I Have", and one stanza of "Amazing Grace", led by Reverend W. L. Boone.

Portions of Scripture were read by Reverends James Rosentrater, W. L. Boone and D. Gene Whetstone.

General Superintendent William H. Neff spoke on the preferred status which the Minister of the New Testament holds, over the status of the Old Testament Prophet. He reminded the Candidates and the assembled delegates and friends, that men do not make of themselves Ministers of God, but that God makes them Ministers. He reminded the Candidates that the Pilgrim Holiness Church expects two basic things of its ministers:

1. Loyalty to the doctrines and institutions of the church.
2. Purity of heart and life.

He closed his message with the statement that the minister is made "a servant".

The Candidates took their places before the altar, where they took their ordination vows in the presence of Dr. Neff and the Ordination Council.

The Candidates knelt, and Reverend E. W. Hall, retiring minister, prayed the dedicatory prayer, after which Dr. Neff gave

the charge to the Candidates, with the laying on of hands.

The Chairman stated that by common consent any unfinished business would be left in the hands and at the disposition of the District Council.

Conference adjourned.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our Chairman, Dr. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent, to our fine pastors, our good laymen, friends of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and to the 50th annual Conference, greetings.

By the providence of God, we are permitted to gather in this 50th annual Conference. When we look at the conference minutes numerically, we shudder to think that we have not grown more than we have. But, who knows how many souls have found God, and do not appear on our register. We loose many who move to other cities where there is no Pilgrim Church. But in all this, we cannot make excuses to cover up for our failures. We must face the present and the future with a grim determination that we are not going to be the same size in the next few years as we are now. We must believe God with a real live faith until we cannot help but grow. Matthew 9:29, "According to your faith be it unto you." John 14:14, "If ye shall ask any thing in My name, I will do it." Do we ask or don't we believe?

We must express our appreciation to our fine Assistant Superintendent, Bro. Hall; to the fine council - I have never worked with a finer group of fellows; I appreciate their love and consideration for me; they are the best. The wonderful group of fine pastors and wives have treated me royally in their homes. I appreciate our wonderful group of laymen and my good wife, who has carried her part of the load well.

We were all saddened last year immediately after camp when our good pastor of Post Falls, Brother Sheets, had a nervous breakdown. The church suffered a set back, and the set back to the Kingdom was tremendous, I am sure. We have not been able to hear too much about Brother Sheets and his family, but we understand that he is much better now. We understand that he has recovered enough to get back into God's work again. They are living in California.

The church at Post Falls suffered another great loss this year, when Brother Nulph went to reap his rewards. He was working faithfully on the building up until the time he took sick. He

spoke to me just a few years before and said, "The reason I am working rather than being retired is so I might put the money into the church so they can make ends meet." This takes sanctified laymen.

We thank God for a dedicated ministry. There is no where on this district for a monetary reward. I am sure the Apostle Paul would say of these men as he did of Moses, "Esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt: for he had respect unto the recompence of the reward." Many of these men could have good paying jobs. WE THANK GOD FOR DEDICATED PASTORS SUCH AS THESE.

We detect that we are living in a land morally bankrupt. They are trying to place contraceptive pills on the campus for college coeds, selling babies from unwed mothers for a fabulous amount - from fifteen hundred to seventy five hundred dollars. Women are now wearing topless bathing suits. Look predicts for next year, "Without any bottoms". (May issue) Brethren, there are only two reasons for this, lust and advertisement. God has called us to preach against sin, are we going to be quiet or cry aloud? I prefer to cry aloud and spare not. John Wesley put it, "to save poor souls out of the fire and quench their brands in Jesus' blood". Will God have to say to this generation of preachers, "I have many things to tell you, but ye could not bear them"? Can He initiate us into the mysteries of soul-saving preaching?

I would like to bring to our pure minds some things that were mentioned in the report last year, but have not taken root in all the churches. I will not enlarge on them, but just enumerate them this year.

DISTRICT: First, we must be spiritual. Second, the district should have some plans which do not change regardless of change of personnel. These plans would include District Church Extension in a long range program. Third, each church should support its pastor the very best that they can with salary, donations, gifts, personal presence. Fourth, there should be a meeting of the pastors and wives with the superintendent every quarter for a time of fellowship and discussion of the problems of the church. Fifth, we feel that we should support our college, CPC, with both our finances and students.

THE LOCAL CHURCH: Each pastorate is short, so it would be recommended for each pastor to keep a file of his problems with his people to turn over to the next pastor. Every pastor should encourage his people to visit and have an organized visitation program. Each church should have a building program of some sort, and it should be active. Each pastor should print a church bulletin. One should be sent to every prospective person on the church calling list each week.

SPIRITUAL GAINS: This has been one of the best years since I have been District Superintendent. We have had a good gain in many of our churches this year - in Sunday school attendance, in church membership, and in nearly every phase of the church. We have had a number of folks saved throughout the district. The churches with the greatest gains would be Post Falls, which has been outstanding throughout the year; Coeur d'Alene, and Clarkston. We have had a number praying through in many of our churches.

TEMPORAL GAINS:

Post Falls is still in the midst of the building program which Brother Sheets had started. The pastor and people have worked faithfully on this project and they expect to dedicate it before the end of this conference year.

Grandview has brought their building program to a close this year. They have changed the entrance to the sanctuary, finished the basement, and redecorated the sanctuary with an addition of the nursery. This was quite a change for this church.

Kennewick has changed their rest rooms, added a nursery, and changed their entrance to the basement. This has taken quite a bit for work on the pastor's part. They have done considerable work on the parsonage and many other things around the property. They are planning on a major building program next year.

Clarkston church has installed a new gas furnace in the parsonage basement, redone a Sunday school room in the basement of the church, redecorated the church basement, and redecorated the parsonage and changed the partitions in the parsonage basement. We are planning on a new sanctuary for next year - forty by sixty eight, full basement, and laminated beams. Pray for this project.

PERSONAL REPORT:

We are glad for our church and its qualified leaders. We have appreciated our labors with Brother Snyder, and we are glad to welcome Brother Neff back with us as our General Superintendent for the next two years. Brother Neff is well acquainted with this section, as he has been over this section before. We can truthfully say that we have never regretted the day we joined this church. We are glad for our field of labor, and we think we have one of the best fields in our church even though it is one of the most difficult. I am sure most of our general men acquainted with this field would say it is one of the hardest. Why? I don't know, nor do they.

I have visited the churches forty-seven times, conducted thirty-eight board meetings, preached one hundred fifty-one times, travelled approximately twenty-two thousand, four hundred twenty miles, attended ten zone rallies, have had twelve council meetings. We have attended the Church Leaders and General Board Meetings, attended the School Board Meeting at CPC, attended the Ministerial Meeting, the Youth Convention,

visited the Pacific Northwest Camp Meeting, and Conference, and performed many other duties essential to this office.

I have received my salary in full, one hundred sixty one dollars and fifteen cents (\$161.15) in love offerings, one hundred two dollars (\$102) in food donations, and many deeds of kindness over the district from the laity.

We have been paid in full for all the mileage we have submitted to the district treasurer.

I have spent many hours on the camp ground - painted the boys' dorm, and helped reroof the tabernacle. We want to express our appreciation to all who came out for clean up days, to Brother Hassinger, Buck Hassinger, Larry Meeks, Rev. Bob Meeks, Bob Dewey, and Brother Dayton for their help in reroofing the tabernacle.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

I. Conference

1. Resolved that the District Council serve as district trustees.
2. Resolved that all recall meetings be held 60 days prior to the district conference, and that the District Superintendent be notified of the results of said meeting within ten days.
3. Resolved that the conference year close May 31st and that each pastor see that correct reports from his church be sent not later than June 15th.
4. Resolved that all committees be appointed by the District Council and hold office through the year, except the reception committee which the superintendent shall appoint at the beginning of each conference.
5. Resolved that each pastor and the superintendent be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.
6. Resolved that we include a directory of pastoral appointments and local major officers in our minutes.
7. Resolved that 175 copies of the district conference minutes be printed.
8. Resolved that a copy of the records of the Educational and Examining Boards shall be given to the District Secretary each year.
9. Resolved that the Pilgrim Echoes be the established name for the district publication.
10. Resolved that the District Council appoint an editor and arrange a means of finance for the Echoes.
11. Resolved that a ministers' institute be held in the spring and that the public be invited to the evening services only. The time, place and speaker will be arranged for by the District Superintendent.
12. Resolved that the reports of all officers to be published in the minutes be typed and limited to 400 words except the report of the District Superintendent, and that the officers reporting be the Treasurer, Sunday School Promotional Secretary and the Missionary Society President.
13. Resolved that this conference recommend to the local churches that one other person, appointed by the pastor, assist the local treasurer in counting the offerings and that a written record be given the pastor after each service. (1960)
14. Resolved that the laity be encouraged to report the number of calls made per month to the pastor so that the pastor may report them to the editor of the Echoes. (1962)
15. Resolved that all district officers accepting offices be

punctual and faithful in the organization and execution of their responsibilities. (1963)

16. Resolved that we effect a temporary Pastoral-Superintendent relationship. (1963)

17. Resolved that the time for Annual Conference sessions be established as 8:30-12:00; 1:00-5:00; and 6:00-9:00. (1963)

18. Resolved that the pews inside the first three posts of the tabernacle, and the platform, constitute the conference bar. (1963)

19. Resolved that secretarial help be furnished the District Secretary so that the conference minutes be completed within a month from the ending of conference.

20. Resolved that the district conference convene the Monday following the close of camp meeting.

II. Camp

21. Resolved that each church pay their pastor his salary during camp and conference.

22. Resolved that there be a District Camp Meeting Board, composed of the District Youth President, and two additional members, appointed by the District Council for one and two year terms respectively. Be it further resolved that the ministerial tithe from each pastor be channeled to the district administration fund through the local church treasurer.
2. Resolved that all treasurers send local monies for the District Treasurer by the tenth of each month.
3. Resolved that each local treasurer give the pastor a monthly statement of the district obligation and when in arrears the pastor and the treasurer shall attempt to raise the same.
4. Resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday of camp for district church extension and/or camp improvement.

YOUTH CONFERENCE JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The 1964 annual youth conference of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 4, 1964 at the Highland Park Camp Grounds in Clarkston, Washington. The conference with nine pastors, five local society presidents, seven local delegates, and a full executive council reporting to the roll call responded to the able leadership of General Superintendent Neff.

A motion carried to establish the conference bar as the first six pews in the center section of the tabernacle and the platform of same.

The report of the president was read and accepted. The report of the treasurer was read and accepted. The report of the Yakima Valley zone leader was heard and accepted. Reports of the local presidents were then heard and accepted.

The resolutions committee reported to the conference with the following recommendations:

Resolved the district youth secretary prepare in printable

form the minutes of the District Youth Conference and submit same to the District Secretary to be published in the District Minutes. It was amended by striking the word "minutes" and adding the word "actions". The recommendation carried as amended.

Resolved there be a three day District Youth Camp previous to the District Camp. It was amended by striking the words "there be" and adding the words "a committee be appointed to study --- and present it to the District Conference". The recommendation carried as amended.

Resolved that each local society make a scrapbook and bring said book to camp for display. The recommendation carried.

Resolved that each local secretary make quarterly reports and send same to District Youth President. Reports shall include reports of (1) Project, (2) Activities, (3) Finance. The recommendation carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported to the conference with the following recommendations:

Resolved we delete all previous financial resolutions. The recommendation carried.

Resolved each local society send twenty-five percent of its offerings for the district project and each zone send twenty-five percent of its offerings to be divided: 50% for district youth project and 50% for district youth operating expense. The recommendation carried.

A motion carried that the district youth secretary send a card to each local society spelling out this action.

The conference proceeded with the election of officers:

Rev. Robert Meeks was elected as District Youth President.

Rev. Dale DeField was elected as District Youth Vice-Pres.

Sr. Alice Fry was elected as District Youth Treasurer.

Sr. Bette Dayton was elected as District Youth Secretary.

A motion carried that the nominees for zone leaders be presented to the respective zones at their first meetings and the elections be carried out there.

The conference then chose as a district youth project for the year to split all offerings received for the project 50% to be applied on the purchase of the new lawnmower and 50% for the remodeling of the front of the tabernacle. The conference was then adjourned.
