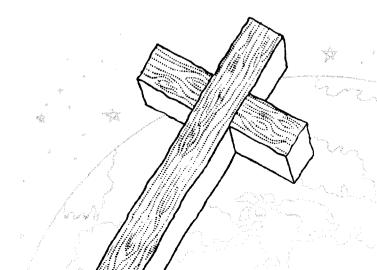

#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

## First Sitting

The 51st Annual Conference of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 8:30 a.m., July 5, 1965, at Clarkston, Washington.

The conference opened with the singing of "I Will Praise  $\operatorname{Him}^{\text{II}}$  led by Reverend Boone.

District Superintendent Meeks called the conference to order. Reverend Whetstone led in prayer. Our hearts were lifted in praise and petition that God would direct the conference from beginning to end.

Reverend Meeks presented Dr. William Neff as Chairman of the conference. Dr. Neff directed our attention to the three following portions of Scripture:

- Acts 15:28 "For it seemed good to the Holy Ghost, and to us, to lay upon you no greater burden than these necessary things;"
- Romans 12:11 "Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord;"
- I Corinthians 12:28 "And God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers, after that miracles, then gifts of healing, helps, governments, diversities of tongues."

Using these three verses Dr. Neff challenged our hearts with a brief message concerning our Christian responsibility in the world. The work of God has not been left up to us alone but the Holy Ghost is ever present to direct and assist us in the carrying out of God's Kingdom on earth. It is up to us to carry on the business of the Church in a "fervent" spirit of "business". Dr. Neff called our attention to the fact that God has set up an order of Government in His church, and that we should be diligent in seeking the mind of God in carrying on the work of the Church.

The secretary then read the roll to which thirteen Ordained Ministers, two Licensed Ministers, two Ordained Deaconesses, eleven lay delegates, and the District Missionary President responded.

Reverend Wheatley, acting in behalf of the reception committee, then presented Reverend and Mrs. D. L. Goss who were seated within the conference bar.

The following reports were read, and after appropriate recognition, were received with grateful appreciation for the respective officers:

3. District Treasurer Rev. W. L. Boone

4. Missionary President Mrs. Martha Meeks

5. Sunday School Promotional Sec'y Rev. James Rosentrater
Due to a death in the family, the District Auditor, Emmett
Cameron, was absent and his report was omitted.

A recess of ten minutes was called. Being assembled again, the conference then proceeded with business after the singing of "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes".

The next order of business presented to the conference was a partial report of the Resolutions Committee, as follows:

## A. District resolutions: (new)

 "Resolved that time be given to the Sunday School department of the District during camp to conduct workshops, other than the Sunday morning promotional service."

It was amended to read:

"Resolved that the Tuesday afternoon service and on the Morning Youth services be designated Sunday School Promotional service in addition to the Sunday morning Sunday School service." It was carried.

2. "Resolved the five (5) days immediately preceding camp (Wednesday through Sunday) be set aside as time for a Minister's retreat; and that all regular stationed Pastors attending the retreat shall receive their regular weekly pay." It was carried.

#### B. Changes in standing resolutions:

- 1. (1964 Conference Minutes, page 20, resolution No. 14) Change the wording to read: "Resolved that the laity be encouraged to report the number of contacts and calls made per month to the pastor so that the pastor may report them to the editor of the Echoes." It was carried.
- 2. (1964 Minutes, page 21, resolution No. 23) "Resolved that the name of our camp grounds be known as the Highland Park Holiness Camp Ground."

After discussion it was amended to read:
"Resolved that the name of our camp grounds be known as
'The Pilgrim Holiness Camp Ground', and that groups
renting our facilities shall put up a temporary sign
identifying their denomination while using the grounds."
It was carried.

3. (1964 Minutes, page 20, resolution No. 3)
Add the following statement to the resolution:
"Be it further resolved that the District Statistician be authorized to reject all annual reports reaching him (or her) after the deadline." It was carried.

Due to a lack of information the balance of the Resolutions Committee's report concerning District Resolutions was postponed until the second sitting of the conference.

C. Memorials to the International Conference:

District Conference."

 Be it resolved that Section 53, Paragraph 1 of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be amended by striking the following:
 "The Minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the first Sunday following the

and substituting the following:
"The time of pastoral changes in the Districts shall be determined by the actions of the respective District Conferences." It was carried.

 Be it resolved that the representation of the Annual Conferences in the United States to the International Conference be determined by the same formula which prevailed preceding the 1962 General Conference. <u>It was</u> carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported with their recommendations, as follows:

- A. Be it resolved that we start a Church Loan Fund administrated by the District Council. The following formula shall be used to start the fund.
  - 1. \$200 from the District Administration Fund
  - 2. \$100 from the General Delegate Fund
  - 3. 3% from the District budget
  - 4. Money shall be loaned at the rate of 3% interest on the unpaid balance, and repayments shall be determined by the District Council and the contracting church. It was carried.

Conference adjourned due to expiration of time and lunch.

## Second Sitting

Second sitting opened with prayer by Mrs. Alice Fry, after which the Ways and Means Committee continued its report.....

B. Resolved that Ways and Means Resolution No. 1 (1964 Minutes, page 23) be amended to read:

"Resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 12% of the receipts, excepting building and improvement funds and evangelists' offerings, to be applied on the district budget as follows: 48% for district administration expense; 5% for International Conference delegate expense; 44% for district Church Extension; and 3% for Church Loan Fund. Be it further resolved that the ministerial tithe from each pastor be channeled to the district administration fund through the local church treasurer." It was carried.

C. Be it resolved the district operate a bookstore throughout the year and the district council appoint the manager. The Chair ruled that in view of the existence of our denominational Book Store in Indianapolis, Indiana, it would be unwise to establish another. The resolution therefore was dropped.

The Resolutions Committee returned with the balance of their report as follows:

Resolved that we express our appreciation to District Superintendent and Mrs. E. E. Meeks for their hospitality and work behind the scenes during Camp and Conference.

The two preceding resolutions carried by unanimous voice vote.

A resolution referred to the district conference by the Youth Conference was presented as follows:

Resolution No. 2, page 26 (1964 Minutes) be amended to read:

"Resolved each local Youth Society send 25% of its offerings, and each respective Zone send 25% of its offerings, to the District Youth Treasurer to be applied to the District Youth Budget as follows: 50% for district youth projects and 50% for district youth operating expense. Be it further resolved that each local Youth Society send \$4.00 per year to the District Youth Treasurer to be used to send a delegate to the National Youth Convention." It was carried.

A resolution in the form of a motion from the floor was received as follows:

"Resolved that the Youth Council be allowed to plan and conduct a  $1\frac{1}{2}$  or 2 day Youth Camp under the complete supervision of the District Council during the following year. It was carried.

The Examining Board read its report as follows:

- Mrs. Devere DeField be granted second year Deaconess License.
- 2. Rev. D. L. Goss be received into the Idaho-Washington District as an ordained Minister.
- 3. Mrs. Ida Goss be received into the Idaho-Washington District as an ordained Deaconess.
- 4. Eldon Fry be granted first year Minister's License.
- 5. Ed Meeks be granted second year Minister's License.
- 6. Bob Meeks be retained in fourth year Minister's status.
- 7. Rev. W. H. Harman be retained in present status.
- 8. Rev. Curt Heath be retained in present status.

The Chair then called for a 15-minute recess, and to meet with the District Council concerning the recommendations of the Examining Board.

After the Conference was called back to order the report of the Examining Board was approved as read.

A motion was made to dispense with the reading of the District Statistical Report, and that it should appear in the District Minutes as prepared by the Statistician. It was carried.

The Memoir's Committee then gave its report of tribute to those who had been called through death from the ranks of the living. These included: Sister Jennie Metcalf, Sister Elsie May Brown, Sister Edna Mae Stapleton, Sister Margaret Sanders, and Brother Lloyd Thornton. The report was accepted by the Conference singing a chorus of "In the Sweat Bye and Bye" after which Brother Neff led a Memorial prayer.

The Conference then launched into the business of electing the various officers for the District for the coming year. Since

Reverend Meeks was beginning the second year of a two-year call as District Superintendent, the first officer for election was Assistant District Superintendent.

Reverend James Rosentrater was elected Assistant District Superintendent on the first ballot.

Reverend Gene Whetstone was elected Secretary on the first ballot.

Reverend W. L. Boone was elected Treasurer on the first ballot.

Reverends M. A. King, D. L. Goss, and Devere DeField were elected as advisory members of the District Council.

Reverend D. L. Goss was elected chairman to the Examining Board.

Reverend Devere DeField was elected chairman to the Educational Board.

Sister Martha Meeks was elected District Missionary President.

Delegates to the International Conference were elected as follows:

Ministerial delegate - Rev. W. L. Boone Rev. Rosentrater, 1st alternate Rev. Wheatley, 2nd alternate

Lay delegate - Ralph Bond
Lane Dayton, 1st alternate
Elbert Bailey, 2nd alternate

This concluded the business of the District Conference. Dr. Neff made some brief comments and concluded with the statement that "We are marching with the greatest Captain ever..."

The Conference was adjourned with prayer.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our good Chairman, Dr. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent, to our fine pastors, our good laymen, friends of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and to the 51st annual Conference, greetings.

It is good to praise the God of all grace for His love and providential care that permits us to gather here for this annual conference. It is good to reflect on the past twelve months and prepare for the battle that lies ahead. We are aware of the fact this has been one of the best years this district has had for a number of years. We give God all the credit and to Him we ascribe all the glory. Reports reveal that the moral and spiritual tides that flow in our nation were never lower than now with conflict on every hand and wars and rumors of wars. His coming must be near at hand. May we strive to enter in.

My wife and I want to express our appreciation to the District and the Clarkston Church for the wonderful vacation made possible by your gifts to us this spring. The spirit of love that prompted this will never be forgotten. We say thanks from the very depths of our hearts.

We want to express our appreciation to our good Assistant Superintendent, Bro. Rosentrater, to the fine council, to the pastors and their wives who have treated us royally in their homes, and to the fine laymen. We say praise God for such a field on which to labor. I am sure we are laboring among some of God's choicest people.

We thank God for a dedicated ministry and the pastors on this district. There is not much for these men in the way of material rewards. There are special days set aside for World Missions, General Church Extension, General Sunday Schools, and our zone College; but we find the key man has no special day. The pastor goes on sacrificing and giving to the total program and seems himself to be forgotten. I think it is high time we gave him more consideration. We find the manual states plainly he should receive first consideration, but he often ends up last. This ought not to be. We say Praise God for a group of dedicated pastors doing their best to see the Pilgrim Holiness Church go forward. They feel it is a privilege to serve this church. We are sure there is a reason for such a shortage of preachers in our Church.

#### SPIRITUAL GAINS:

This has been the best year for the district since I have been District Superintendent. We have made gains in nearly every church on the district. We have added some real families to the membership this year. Our only hope as a district is new people. We must see people saved, and not only saved, but added to our church membership. It is one thing to catch fish,

but another thing to string them. This has been a weak point in our church. We have been able to catch them, but have let other denominations gather them in to their ranks.

#### TEMPORAL GAINS:

Weippe has made considerable gains in remodeling their church. They have done considerable work on the basement, changed the sanctuary, paneled the front of the sanctuary, built a new garage, and reroofed the parsonage.

Kennewick has done much work on the parsonage this year. They have changed the front room by putting in a big picture window, sheet-rocking the walls, and changing the stairway.

Grandview has painted the church and the parsonage, paneled a room in the church, and finished the building program.

Spirit Lake has added two bedrooms and a bath to the parsonage.

Clarkston has reroofed the parsonage and started the new building program.

Coeur d'Alene has fixed the floors in the parsonage, put new rugs on the floors, and redecorated the parsonage.

#### PERSONAL REPORT:

We are glad for our church and its qualified leaders. We have appreciated our labors with Brother Neff and his words of encouragement and able advice. We thank God for a chance to labor with such a fine church as the Pilgrim Holiness Church. We are grateful for the impact it has had upon our lives and character. We feel the church owes us nothing, but we owe the church and God more than we will ever be able to pay.

I have visited the churches forty-one (41) times, conducted seventeen (17) board meetings, preached one hundred twenty-two (122) times, travelled approximately eighteen thousand six hundred forty-seven (18,647) miles, attended fifteen zone rallies, have had twelve (12) council meetings, and held one (1) revival on the district. We are sorry that we could not attend the Church Leaders Conference, but we did attend School Board Meeting at Central Pilgrim College, the Ministerial Meeting, Sunday School Conventions, and performed many other duties essential to this office.

I have received my salary in full, two hundred ninety four dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$294.38) in love offerings, some food donations, and many deeds of kindness from the laity.

I have been paid in full for all the mileage I have submitted to the District Treasurer.

I have spent many hours on the camp grounds. I wish to express appreciation to the ones who have come and mowed the grass and to the ones who were able to come during work days.

May we remember I Cor. 15:58 "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

#### DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Conference year so recently closed was marked by the blessing of God upon the Sunday School work of the District.

I wish to pay tribute to the excellent and conscientious work of my predecessor, Rev. W. L. Boone. The files which he passed to me were found to be complete and well kept. His concern for the work of Sunday Schools is well known to all of us.

Of the 13 Sunday Schools in our District, 8 recorded attendance gains for the year. The total gain for the year was 84, while the total loss was 26, leaving a net gain of 58. This is an increase of 55 over the gain of last year.

The progress of Sunday School activity on the District is verified by the gratifying increase of points which many of the Sunday Schools reported in the Decade of Progress. The trophy was awarded last year for a total of 5955 points earned. This year four (4) Sunday Schools exceeded that total by a great margin, the winning total being 10,834 points.

The pastors of four (4) of our churches attended the National Sunday School Association convention in Portland, Oregon, last fall, with great benefit to them and their churches. The pastors later shared the benefits of this Convention with the District, in two District Conventions; one on the Northern Lights Zone, the other a joint convention of the Clearwater and Yakima Valley Zones.

We anticipate greater progress in Sunday School growth in this new Conference year, because of a growing enthusiasm among

Idaho-Washington Pilgrims, because of hard work and earnest prayer, and last but not least, because of the anointing of God upon our labors, without which all our labor is in vain.

#### REPORT OF THE MEMOIRS COMMITTEE

#### DISTRICT YOUTH CONFERENCE JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

"Resolved the District Youth Council be the 'ways and means' and 'resolutions' committees." It was carried.

"Resolved that the Yakima Valley Zone name be changed to Columbia Zone." It was carried.

"Resolved each zone vote and elect their own officers other than the chairman (who is elected by the Youth Conference)."

It was carried.

## Ways and Means Committee Report

"Resolved we delete all previous financial resolutions."  $\underline{\text{It}}$  was carried.

"Resolved each local youth society send 25% of its offerings, and each respective zone send 25% of its offerings, to the district youth treasurer to be applied to the District Youth Budget as follows: 50% for District Youth projects and 50% for District Youth operating expense. Be it further resolved that each local Youth Society send \$4.00 per year to the District Youth Treasurer to be used to send a delegate to the National Youth Convention." It was carried.

A motion was made that the district youth project for the year be to purchase a mimeograph machine to be used for district youth work. It was carried.

#### STANDING RESOLUTIONS

#### I. Conference

- Resolved that the District Council serve as district trustees.
- Resolved that all recall meetings be held 60 days prior to the district conference, and that the District Superintendent be notified of the results of said meeting within ten days.
- 3. Resolved that the conference year close May 31st and that each pastor see that correct reports from his church be sent not later than June 15th. Be it further resolved that the District Statistician be authorized to reject all annual reports reaching him (or her) after the deadline.
- 4. Resolved that all committees be appointed by the District Council and hold office through the year, except the reception committee which the superintendent shall appoint at the beginning of each conference.
- 5. Resolved that each pastor and the superintendent be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.
- Resolved that we include a directory of pastoral appointments and local major officers in our minutes.
- 7. Resolved that 175 copies of the district conference minutes be printed.
- 8. Resolved that a copy of the records of the Educational and Examining Boards shall be given to the District Secretary each year.
- 9. Resolved that the Pilgrim Echoes be the established name for the district publication.
- 10. Resolved that the District Council appoint an editor and arrange a means of finance for the Echoes.
- 11. Resolved that a ministers' institute be held in the spring and that the public be invited to the evening services only. The time, place and speaker will be arranged for by the District Superintendent.
- 12. Resolved that the reports of all officers to be published in the minutes be typed and limited to 400 words except the report of the District Superintendent, and that the officers reporting be the Treasurer, Sunday School Promotional Secretary and the Missionary Society President.
- 13. Resolved that this conference recommend to the local churches that one other person, appointed by the pastor, assist the local treasurer in counting the offerings and that a written record be given the pastor after each service.(1960)
- 14. Resolved that the laity be encouraged to report the number of contacts and calls made per month to the pastor so that the pastor may report them to the editor of the Echoes. (1962)
- 15. Resolved that all district officers accepting offices be punctual and faithful in the organization and execution of their responsibilities. (1963)

- 16. Resolved that we effect a temporary Pastoral-Superintendent relationship. (1963)
- 17. Resolved that the time for Annual Conference sessions be established as 8:30-12:00; 1:00-5:00; and 6:00-9:00. (1963)
- 18. Resolved that the pews inside the first three posts of the tabernacle, and the platform, constitute the conference bar. (1963)
- 19. Resolved that secretarial help be furnished the District Secretary so that the conference minutes be completed within a month from the ending of conference.
- 20. Resolved that the district conference convene the Monday following the close of camp meeting.
- 21. Resolved that the Tuesday afternoon service and one of the Morning Youth services be designated Sunday School Promotional services in addition to the Sunday Morning Sunday School service. (1965)
- 22. Resolved that the five (5) days immediately preceding camp (Wednesday through Sunday) be set aside as time for a Minister's retreat; and that all regular stationed Pastors attending the retreat shall receive their regular weekly pay. (1965)

#### II. Camp

- 23. Resolved that each church pay their pastor his salary during camp and conference.
- 24. Resolved that there be a District Camp Meeting Board, composed of the District Youth President, and two additional members, appointed by the District Council for one and two year terms respectively. It shall be the responsibility of this Board to plan and execute the various functions of the Camp, such as: maintenance and repair, cooking and kitchen help, the operation of the book store and lunch stand, reservation and assignment of rooms, advertising and all relevant functions pertinent to Camp Meeting operation.
- 25. Resolved that the name of our camp grounds be known as "The Pilgrim Holiness Camp Ground", and that groups renting our facilities shall put up a temporary sign identifying their denomination while using the grounds. (1965)
- 26. Resolved that we adopt a one-week camp meeting schedule, and be it further resolved that it be held so as to conclude on the first Sunday of July. (1960)
- 27. Resolved that each church give an offering on the camp beef, or, in lieu of an offering, give canned goods or vegetables; and that the District Council appoint one person to contact the churches for this purpose prior to camp. (1962)
- 28. Resolved that during each camp, opportunity to be baptized be given candidates for baptism. (1963)

#### III. Sunday School

29. Resolved that the people who attend Camp Meeting, or other District group meetings, be counted in attendance at their local Sunday Schools. Be it further resolved that under no other circumstances, except herein described, shall a person

- be counted in attendance unless personally present at his own local Sunday School. (1964)
- 30. Resolved that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be appointed for the following year prior to the annual Conference, and that the Sunday School Committee be given at least one service during the Camp Meeting, at which the Committee shall present its plan for Sunday School Promotion and Enlargement during the coming year. Be it further resolved that said Committee shall meet at least twice during each Conference year. (1964)

#### IV. Youth

- 31. Resolved that we have a district young people's convention during the year and that it be held at a convenient time for the young people who are in school.
- 32. Resolved that the minutes of the District Youth Conference be included in the Regular District Minutes. (1964)

#### (Special Youth)

33. Resolved that the Youth Council be allowed to plan and conduct a  $1\frac{1}{2}$  or 2 day Youth Camp under the complete supervision of the District Council during the following year. (1965)

#### V. Missionary

34. Resolved that we elect a District Missionary Society President to oversee the work of the local missionary societies and be it further resolved that each missionary society send a quarterly report to the President and an annual report to the conference and that said report be entered in the minutes.

#### VI. Special (Annual)

- 35. Resolved that we express our appreciation to the following for their ministry and service during the camp: Rev. J. H. Philpot, camp evangelist; Rev. D. L. Goss, in charge of special singing; Mrs. Alice Fry, camp pianist; Rev. Robert Meeks, youth director; Mrs. Thelma Meeks, camp choir director; Mrs. Bonnie Whetstone, children's worker; Mrs. Devere DeField, camp cook; Rev. Dale DeField, kitchen clean-up; Mrs. Marie Biddlingmeier, dining room supervisor; Rev. James Rosentrater, purchasing agent; Rev. Ermal Wilson, Secretary of World Missions; Rev. John Dunn, Gen. Church Ext. Rep.; Rev. N. N. Bonner, C.P.C. Rep.; Rev. W. L. Boone, camp registrar; Dr. Wm. H. Neff, Chm. of District Conference.
- 36. Resolved that we express our appreciation to District Superintendent and Mrs. E. E. Meeks for their hospitality and work behind the scenes during Camp and Conference.

#### WAYS AND MEANS

1. Resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 12% of the receipts, excepting building and improvement funds and evange-lists' offerings, to be applied on the district budget as follows: 48% for district administration expense; 5% for International Conference delegate expense; 44% for District Church Extension; and 3% for Church Loan Fund. Be it further resolved that the ministerial tithe from each pastor be channeled to the

- district administration fund through the local church treasurer.

  2. Resolved that all treasurers send local monies for the District Treasurer by the tenth of each month.
- trict Treasurer by the tenth of each month.

  3. Resolved that each local treasurer give the pastor a monthly statement of the district obligation and when in arrears the pastor and the treasurer shall attempt to raise the same.
- 4. Resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday of camp for district church extension and/or camp improvement. 5. Resolved that the annual remuneration of the Secretary and Statistician be \$15.00 each; the Treasurer \$180.00 and the Editor of the Pilgrim Echoes \$25.00.
