CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING, JULY 28, 1955

The Fifty-first Annual Conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Holiness Church convened at Denton, Md., at 1:30 P. M., Thursday, July 28, 1955.

Rev. Paul Dieter led the group in congregational singing after which Rev. G. L. Helsby led in prayer.

The District Superintendent led the group in singing "Such Love" and then introduced Rev. Paul F. Elliott, General Secretary of Youth and Sunday School, as the presiding officer of the Conference.

The Conference was then called to order by Bro. Elliott. The Secretary proceeded to call the roll.

The motion carried that the platform and the first nine rows of seats in the two center sections constitute the conference bar.

The District Superintendent's report was read and accepted with a rising vote of appreciation. A moment of Silent Prayer was observed in memory of Rev. L. W. Sturk, our late General Superintendent.

The Assistant District Superintendent gave an oral report which on motion was received.

The Treasurer's report was given and accepted.

A motion prevailed to accept the Auditing Committee's report.

Rev. Elliott then reported on the General Treasurer's report as it related to the Eastern District.

The Superintendent presented the Pastor and delegate of Saxis, Va., to the Conference. A motion prevailed to receive this newly organized church at Saxis, Virginia, into the Conference.

Invitations for the Ministerial Conventions were then accepted by the Confernce. The Fall Ministerial Convention to be held in Salisbury, Md., and the Spring Ministerial Convention in Greenwood, Del.

The Conference proceedd with the election of officers. Bro. Elliott called upon Rev. Frank Schweitzer to lead in prayer, asking for Divine guidance.

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers: Rev. Engrem, Rev. Bell. Rev. Rimmer. Rev. Stetser, Rev. Watts, Rev. Dieter, and Rev. Reed Morris.

Ballots were cast to elect one member to the Home Missionary Board. Rev. Charles Ruark was elected.

A rising vote of Appreciation was then extended to Rev. P .F. Bean, for his faithful services as a District official over the past 30 years.

A motion to adjourn carried. Bro. Bean offered the closing prayer.

THIRD SITTING, JULY 29, 1955

The third sitting of the Conference at 8:30 a.m., Friday, July 29, 1955.

Rev. Allen Clark led the group in singing, "Sunshine In The Soul", after which Mr. George Thawley led in prayer.

Bro. Elliott gave the conference some opening remarks which were followed by a song, very beautifully sung by Mr. and Mrs. Max Hamilton.

Rev. R. D. Gunsaulus. President of Eastern Pilgrim College, Allentown, Pa., brought a very stirring message on the purpose and progress of the College.

The minutes of the past two sittings were read and approved as read.

The Resolution Committee reported again.

A motion carried to adopt the recommendation of the Examining Board as approved by the District Council.

A resolution was presented to the conference pertaining District Home Missionary work. A motion carried to adopt the following resolution: Inasmuch as there is a general concern for the organization of new churches within our District, be it resolved that each zone of our District be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church this conference year.

A motion prevailed to recess until 1:30 p.m.

FOURTH SITTING, JULY 29, 1955

The fourth sitting of the conference convened at 1:30 p. m. on Friday, July 29, 1955, with the Ordination Service as the first order of business.

The group was led in singing, "A Charge To Keep 1 Have", by William H. Miller.

Prayer was offered for the Candidates for Ordination by Rev. Grier Baker, after which the Conference joined in singing, "Rock Of Ages".

Scripture was then read by Rev. Earl Watts, Rev. Allen Clark, and Rev. J. D. Abbott.

Bro. Elliott then brought a challenging message from the Text I Cor. 9:19. He admonished all Ministers to Aspire Nobly, Adventure Courageously, and Serve Humbly. After his message the Ordination Committee, together with Bro. Elliott, ordained Rev. Calvin Hudson and Rev. Elizabeth Reed to the Christian Ministry.

The Ways and Means Committee reported again.

Resolution No. 4: Adopted

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Charles Cooper to the Conference. Bro. Cooper gave his testimony.

A motion carried that the present Trustees, who are serving, be re-elected for the coming year and that next year they be elected on a graduated scale. Said Scale to be as follows: 5 year term, 4 year term, 3 year term, 2 year term and a 1 year term.

By request, Bro. Elliott spoke briefly about the Ministerial Benefit Association, the Pilgrim Pension Plan and Social Security for Ministers.

A motion carried that the minutes be read to and approved by the District Council for the last 2 sittings and any unfinished business be placed in the hands of the District Council.

A rising Vote of Appreciation was then extended to Bro. Elliott for his faithful services as Presiding Officer of this 1955 Conference.

A motion carried to adjourn.

RESOLUTIONS OF 1955 CONFERENCE

I. Be it resolved that resolution No. 7, page 20 of 1954 Conference journal be deleted.

II. Due to the fact that Denton Camp Ground is now properly wired for adequate electricity be it resolved that Resolution No. 12, page 21, of the 1954 Conference Journal be deleted.

V. Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc.. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts, Therefore. be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they hereby authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

VI. Be it Resolved that the District Council draw up a lease form whereby every property owner at Denton Camp will have to renew their leases every 10 years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council, and that it must be sold or transferred only to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness teaching; Wherein the Council is unable to grant a transfer of lease or approval of the sale of property to an undesirable party, it shall then be bought in by the District Council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. Be it further resolved, that if for any reason the cottage is not opened and used for three consecutive years that the owner shall forfeit their lease and that the District Council shall buy in the property and that it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting a Holiness Camp Meeting.

VII. Be it resolved that any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, that notice be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within sixty (60) days.

VIII. Be it resolved that future building of cottages on this Camp Ground be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built in size and style and at least 10 feet apart for car parking. Be it further resolved that new building sites be laid off in streets.

IX. Due to the fact that the two dates that were set by the Conference for Youth Rallies, Labor Day and Memorial Day, have proven unsatisfactory because of Labor Day being so near Camp and Conference time, and Memorial Day is the time when some classes in public schools are not dismissed, Be it Resolved, that we have a District Youth Convention on New Year's Day, or on Monday when New Year's Day falls on a Sunday, time of services to be at 10:30 a. m., 2:00 p. m., and 7:00 p. m.. this meeting to be held in a central location with adequate facilities selected by the Youth Committee.

X. Be it resolved that we express our appreciation by a rising vote of thanks to our General Secretary of Youth and Sunday School work. The Rev. Paul F. Elliott, D. D., who so graciously presided at our Conference; to our District Superintendent, Rev. J. D. Abbott, for his wise leadership; to our dining room staff, lunch room staff and to all others who have labored for our comfort; and to our District Superintendent and Council a special vote of thanks for the fine improvement in appearance of grounds.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE 1955 CONFERENCE

I. Whereas our District Sunday Schools are making substantial gains in attendance and finances, and whereas finances are needed by the District Sunday School Committee to continue to promote the work: BE IT RESOLVED, that the following system of financing the District Sunday School program be adopted:

- 1. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 150 and above shall give \$12.00 per year.
- 2. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 100-149 shall give \$10.00 per year.
- 3. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 75 to 99 shall give \$8.00 per year.
- 4. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 50 to 74 shall give \$5.00 per year.
- 5. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average under 50 shall give \$3.00 per year.

II. Where as there is a definite need for funds in the Work of District Youth, be it Resolved, that each local youth group send to the District young people's treasurer 5% of regular offerings, said amount to be paid monthly.

III. Inasmuch as there is an ever increasing need for Camp finance, be it Resolved that Eastern Pilgrims be encouraged to contribute a penny a meal toward the Work of Denton Camp and be it further resolved that the District Superintendent appoint a committee to promote this plan for the liquidation of the district indebtedness.

IV. In as much as our general church strongly advocates Pilgrim Ministers belonging to the Pilgrim Pension Plan be it resolved that the District contribute an amount equal to 4% of the District Superintendent's salary into the Pension Plan.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To our presiding officer, Dr. Paul F Elliott, our ministerial co-laborers, and our lay delegates representing the many hundreds of Pilgrims of the Eastern District, GREETINGS in the Name of our Wonderful Lord.

At first it was the plan of our recently departed and greatly beloved General, Dr. L. W. Sturk, to be with us and preside at this fifty-first annual conference of the Eastern District. Later, however, he changed his plans .Then, God, in His providence, saw fit to suddenly call him to his reward on the evening of June 13th. In respect for and in loving memory of Brother Sturk I feel it is fitting for us to reverently stand for a moment with bowed heads in silent prayer.

Our new General Superintendent, Rev. William H. Neff, is assured our earnest prayers, our firm support, and our inflexible loyalty as he leads us onward in the years before us.

In submitting this report I express appreciation to all throughout the district who have made it easy for me to serve in this capacity during the past year. In this I have been able to understand the scripture verse in Judges chapter 20: "All the men of Israel were...knit together as on man." The close and pleasant association we have had together in the bonds of the Gospel have aided us in our efforts to make progress in the name of our Lord and the church.

During the past year I have made 89 visits to our churches, have met with practically all of the local boards to inquire of the spiritual life and business standing of the church, presided at 11 district council meetings, attending no fewer than 15 committee meetings, 2 General Board meetings, and 1 meeting of Church Leaders in Indianapolis, Indiana. I used the time of the alloted 3 revivals and 1 week of my vacation time for evangelistic services, presided at the two ministerial conventions — one at Milford and the other at Quinby, and attended the funeral service of Brother Sturk in Owosso, Michigan. I have preached 189 times, officiated at 3 weddings, christened 2 children, worked many days on the camp ground. One week was given to deputational work in the interest of the "SHARE" campaign of Eastern Pilgrim College. Eleven issues of each issue. One trip to Eastern Pilgrim College was made to visit the young people there from our district. My salary of \$60 per week is paid in full and the district has paid me for 12,918 miles of travel at the rate of 5c per mile.

SPIRITUAL LIFE

Above all else in rank of importance is the spiritual condition of the work of the district. Reports have come to me of some real old-fashioned revival meetings and times of spiritual blessings. What might be so in a few cases needs to be so in every church. Our concern is that our people shall meet the conditions and experience in fuller measure the evidences of the Presence of God.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Many of our Sunday Schools have shown appreciable increases and a number have made substantial gains. The report of the Promotional Secretary, Brother Horseman, will show that we have taken a forward numerical stride of 262 and show better than a 10% gain in attendance over last year. Two successful conventions were held — one at Milton and the other on July 4 on these camp grounds.

YOUTH

The zone leaders have been very active in conducting the many zone meetings for youth during this fical year. By comparison, no doubt this would prove to be the most active year as far as this part of our district program is concerned. O that God will help us to reach the youth and see them saved before they are irrecoverably lost.

HOME MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

In this department there has been great effort to launch out into new fields with the gospel message of full salvation, as well as to retain and establish some works that have been struggling under great handicaps.

SAXIS, VIRGINIA — On May 23, it was a privilege to re-organize the church at Saxis, Virginia. The organization had been dissolved for many years. During that time services continued, however, with the Groton pastor looking out for its interest. Brother Bill Miller, now pastoring there deserves much credit. Under his ministry a highly successful revival was held at which time there many conversions and experiences in Holiness realized. This new organization of 13 member is presented to you for acceptance.

GIRDLETREE, **MARYLAND** — The work at Girdletree, under the pastoral oversight of Brother Charles Ruark, is making progress. The Home Missionary Board is giving some aid there by way of partial support to the pastor. Much work has been done on the building which makes it pleasantly inviting to those of the community to worship there.

WILMINGTON — As was reported at the spring ministerial convention, our hopes were very high for a new work in Wilmington. What seemed to be a good and adequate property in a good class community was found and a down-payment made. The agreement was that we would buy if, on the adjacent vacant lot, a

church building could be erected. Shortly thereafter we were notified that such rights could not be had. This was very disappointing. The Board is still keenly interested in that area.

HUGHES CHAPEL — I have been giving attention to the work at Hughes Chapel which is pastored by Brother Carvil Tribbitt. The interest in the community seems to be good, and very spirited and soul-saving services are held there.

PEARSON'S CORNER — Following conference last year, Brother Ernest Gary agreed to go up to Pearson's Corner (about 7 miles west of Dover) to help out in an effort there that Mrs. George Rash had been putting forth for several years. For the past 5 months the average attendance in Sunday School has been 49. The Home Missionary Board stands ready to assist in any way possible this and other new works.

GLEN BURNIE — It now looks as though we may soon have a group of Pilgrims in Glen Burnie. Brother Charles Heckman, transferring to us from the Pittsburgh District, agreed to start meetings in that community which is near Baltimore. The first service was held in a home there on July 10 with 20 persons in attendance. The right to use the Glen Burnie Community Building has been granted Brother Heckman and the group now has more commodious facilities. Let us pray for this venture for Christ, souls, and the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

DISTRICT PROPERTY

Several improvements have been made here at the camp grounds. When Rev. and Mrs. Bean accepted the invitation to become caretakers of the camp, there was some work that needed to be done to the house. That included the enclosing of the back porch thus making a kitchen, pantry, and room for a bathroom. The total cost of material and labor was \$635.51.

The re-wiring of this property has been done as directed by the 1954 Conference at a cost of approximately \$3,000. Practically all of this amount went for material since the only amount spent for labor was to Eastern Shore Public Service for the setting of the creosoted poles. Sincere appreciation is expressed for the help given by many preachers and laymen who assisted from January to July to accomplish the great undertaking. Especially, we are grateful to Brother Reese Hurley of the Cambridge church who was our electrician throughout the entire job and who has made no charge for his services. Working closely with him were Brothers Paul Pritchett and Ollie Wheatley, also from Cambridge church. Mr. O. O. Stivers of REA, Mr. A. W. Reddish and Mr. Harry Hubbard of Eastern Shore Public Service have assisted in a great many details of the work.

Because of the hurricane damage to trees on the camp grounds much attention has been given to the clearing and cleaning up. The wood from the downed trees was sold for \$50 to a buyer who agreed to cut and remove it. A bulldozer was hired to move and bury stumps rubbish and undergrowth thus improving greatly the appearance of our 11 acre grove.

Recently it was determined that the district parsonage was infested with termites. Acting quickly, the council authorized the employing of an exterminator to protect the property from further damage. The cost of exterminating and replacing infected wood will amount slightly more than \$300.

I propose that this conference set up a program whereby our local congregations be asked to subscribe to a PENNY-A-MEAL plan to liquidate these debts. If this will be worked and each church endeavor to bring the giving up to EVERY PILGRIM A PENNY A MEAL in one year our district can be free of debt. I ask that the Ways and Means Committee give this proposal consideration; possibly they could recommend that a committee be set up to draft and promote such a plan.

CAMP MEETING

Since conference preceeds the camp meeting this year we look forward to, rather than back upon the annual encampment. With great burden and strong faith we enter into the meetings praying that God shall open the skies and send spiritual showers and times of salvation upon us. Our evangelists, Dr. W. L. Surbrook and Rev. Joshua Stauffer come to us with rich experiences and a Godanointed ministry. Max and Barbara Hamilton are dearly loved by us all. We anticipate a great camp meeting.

INTO THE NEW YEAR

When the conference has adjourned and the camp meeting has run its alloted time, when we have returned to our homes, our churches and our responsibilities, then it is that we will take up the charge that is ours for "...the Lord hath chosen us to stand before him, to serve Him."—2 Chron. 29:11. We represent our Lord in a troubled, confused and sin stricken world. Like the martyrs of a few centuries past, we cannot yield, we cannot recant — our faith is a part of us. In Jesus Name we remain true and our march is forward and upward in the radiant pathway of Bible Holiness.

The past year has been a year that has proven to all what God can do for the Youth. Shortly after Camp and Conference of last year I was notified of the action that the Council had zoned the District; consisting of the Northern zone with Rev. George Harris as zone chairman; the Southern zone with Brother Atwood Berry as zone chairman; and the Eastern zone with Rev. Earl Watts as zone chairman; and the Western zone with Brother Olney Ross as zone chairman.

Thus the challenge to the Sunday School.

The District Sunday School Committee has felt its great responsibility to God and the District in promoting the work of the Sunday School in our various churches. On July 4th here on the camp grounds, we held our Annual S. S. Convention. Rev. and Mrs. Joseph Brown and family were the workers. They filled in every moment possible with Songs, Illustrated messages, Chalk drawings and Flannelgraph lessons. They also made possible to any who wished for it, much of the material they used. Many left this Convention feeling that it was the type of thing we needed and was appreciated by all. This convention will be remembered as one of the best attended and one of the most interesting and benificial. Cambridge and Bozman were awarded the attendance banners at this convention.

Each month we have endeavored to get to each church as early as possible a report from all the churches (S.S.) These reports have been mimeographed sheets on which our S. S. were placed in lettered brackets. Some have tried to get their S.S. in a higher bracket and many have done so.

This year has been a good one in the work of the Sunday School. Three S.S. have made over 50% gain over last year. They are: Centreville - 75%. Rev. Calvin Hudson, Pastor. Bethlehem - 73% Rev. Paul Dieter, Pastor. Exmore 54%. Rev. Braden Shrieves, Pastor. Five S. S. have made 25% gain or more over last year. Milton - 31% Rev. Earl Watts, Pastor. Crisfield 30% - Rev. Charles Engrem, Pastor. Greensboro 30% Rev. E. L. Horseman, Pastor. Mardela 28% Rev. Lindy Adams, Pastor. Easton 27%, Rev. Allen Clark, Pastor. Six S. S. have made 10% or more over last year: Hurlock - 18% Rev. Newell Reed, Pastor. Groton 17% Rev. Bill Miller, Pastor. Bishop's Head 13% Rev. Mrs.

Ruth Morris, Pastor. Salisbury 13 % Rev. Marion Griffin, Pastor. Hooper's Island 11 % Rev. Earl Lowry, Pastor. New Liberty 10 % Rev. Russell Coverdale, Pastor. Besides the S.S. mentioned there were 11 others which made gains over last year.

The six highest in numericial gain over last year are as follows:

- 1 Milton gain of 31
- 2 Salisbury gain of 23
- 3 Centreville gain of 18
- 4 Cambridge gain of 17
- 5 Crisfield gain of 17
- 6 Easton gain of 17

As a District last year our monthly average was - 2440.

As a District this year our monthly average was - 2702.

This is an average gain of 262 numericially and a little over 10% gain for the District over last year.

STANDING RULES

No. 1. Since our General Budget has been set at \$6.00 per member per year the apportionment to be as follows: Foreign missions 35%, Administration 25%, Church extension 20%, Church extension loan fund 6%, Senior College 10%, Sunday School and youth work 4%, our District Budget shall be set at \$2.25 making a total budget of \$8.25 per member. This is to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer.

No. 2. The Conference shall accept the Pension Plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 4 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.

No. 3. Each pastor, evangelist, song evangelist, and the district Superintendent, shall pay 60% of his tithe into the local church treasury to be sent to the district treasurer monthly. This amount to be divided between district budget and district Home Missions by the district council. A special offering shall be taken on Mother's Day for District Home Missions and sent to the district treasurer by the tenth of each month.

No. 4. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set by the Council before the election of officers and that in addition he receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, milcage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct three revival meetings each year with renumeration. All finances received to be reported in full to the Conference.

No. 5. Each church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member each visit.

No. 6. The District Secretary and Treasurer shall receive \$35.00 and \$50.00 respectively, plus postage.

No. 7. The District Statistician shall be paid \$10.00 a year.

No. 8. Each church shall permit representatives to make an annual visit in the interest of raising funds to pay off the indebtedness on the district parsonage.

No. 9. The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted.

- a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 150 and above shall give \$12.00 yearly.
- b. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 100-149 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
- c. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 75-99 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
- d. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 50-74 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
- e. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average under 50 shall give \$3.00 yearly.

No. 10. Each local youth group shall send to the District Young People's Treasurer 5% of regular offerings; to be paid monthly.

No. 11. The District shall contribute an amount equal to 4% of the District Superintendent's salary into the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

CAMP REGULATIONS

No. 12. Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.

No. 13. Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.

No. 13. All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.

No. 14. All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.

No. 15. A Bible College service shall be held the first Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.

No. 16. All Eastern Pilgrims shall be encouraged to contribute a penny a meal toward the work of Denton Camp and that the District Superintendent shall appoint a committee to promote this plan for liquidation of the district indebtedness.

No. 17. No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.

No. 18. A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.

No. 19. A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meetings for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.

30

No. 20. The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale—this practice to be continued.

No. 21. No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by the two old dormitories which have been moved.

No. 22. Each year there shall be a Preacher's Retreat held for a few days in the month of April for the purpose of cleaning up the camp grounds and making general repairs. This retreat shall be directed by the District Council as to date and program and each minister on the district is required to attend.

No. 23. Ladies taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly.

No. 24. No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.

No. 25. One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.

No. 26. The District Home Missionary service shall not be held in conjunction with the General Home Missionary service.

No. 27. The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.

No. 28. All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.

No. 29. A time shall be set for our District Home Missionary Service during the Camp by the Camp Committee.

No. 30. The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the council is unable to grant a transfer of lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.

No. 31. Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.

No. 32. Future building of cottages on Denton Camp ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.

CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

No. 33. Whereas the General Superintendent has ruled that the Conference Year ends when we close books, the books shall be closed June 30th and newly elected church board take office immediately. All reports must be in the hands of the Statistician 10 days before camp.

No. 34. No delegate or alternate shall serve in the Annual Conference who has not been nominated by the local church board and elected by the local church.

No. 35. As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the haands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.

No. 36. No individual shall serve as a member of more than one of the following: Council, Examining Board, Education Board, and Resolution Committee.

No. 37. The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 p. m. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.

No. 38. The committees appointed during the conference shall be given time to present their objectives and goals for the year during the camp.

No. 39. The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.

No. 40. The district secretary shall send, immediately following the district conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the district superintendent and to each local church treasurer.

No. 41. Each zone of our District shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.

No. 42. The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

MINUTES

No. 43. The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District treasurer within 10 days.

No. 44. The price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.

No. 45. The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.

No. 46. Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs committee when the church books close on June 30.

DISTRICT BUSINESS

No. 47. Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.

No. 48. No annual church business shall be held on Sunday.

No. 49. Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.

No. 50. Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay.

No. 51. The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as a pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.

No. 52. Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.

YOUNG PEOPLES WORK

No. 53. A District Convention shall be held on New Year's Day, or on Monday when New Years falls on a Sunday. Time of services to be at 10:30a. m., 2:00 p. m. and 7:00 p. m. This convention shall be held in a centrally located place in the District.

No. 54. Special youth services shall be held the first Friday night, Saturday morning, and Saturday afternoon of the camp.

No. 55. The business meeting for the election of youth officers shall be held Saturday morning of the youth services at camp, however the previous officers shall serve until the close of camp.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

No. 56. A District Sunday School rally shall be held on July 4.

No. 57. Two Sunday School banners shall be awarded at the district rallies; one on the basis of the percentage of enrollment present and the second on the basis of the number present in all sessions multiplied by the number of miles traveled.

No. 58. (See Standing Rule No. 9)
