Ballots were cast for the office of District Secretary, with the tellers instructed to count the ballots following the recess of this sitting. Rev. P. F. Bean closed the sitting with prayer.

THIRD SITTING, JULY 26, 1957

Rev. Ruth Schaltenbrand opened the third sitting of the Conference by leading the group in singing, "At the Cross." Rev. W. H. Neff led in prayer. The minutes of the past sittings were read and approved. The Secretary read the results of the balloting for the office of District Secretary. Rev. Wm. H. Miller was elected. The Chairman of the Conference then called for the Memorials of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church to be forwarded to the General Conference.

MEMORIAL No. 1 (Section 47, Page 48 of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Manual.) Inasmuch as many churches raise their General Budget, Church Extension offering, Self Denial offering, Forward Movement offering, and Building Fund offerings in their Sunday School, and further that a transfer of funds causes a doubling of amounts in the final summary report,

BE IT RESOLVED, that we elect a treasurer to handle all church and Sunday School funds, eliminating the office of Sunday School Treasurer.

MEMORIAL No. 2

Whereas, the General Board acts as the General Church Trustees, and whereas, some uniformity in the securing of District and Local Trustees would be desirable.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Council be the District Trustees, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Local Church Trustees be the Pastor, The Sunday School Superintendent, the Church Secretary, and the Church Treasurer.

MEMORIAL No. 3 (Section 85, Paragraph 7 P. 45 of the Pilgrim Holiness Manual.) BE IT RESOLVED, that this section be amended to read: Delegates sent to the district youth conference from local societies shall be the Pastor, the youth president, and one lay delegate from every 25 active members or major fraction thereof.

CONFERENCE REPORTS

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff, delegates and friends. Greetings in Christ's most wonderful name!

The iron tongue of time has struck another year into history. Our coming together for this annual conference marks the 53rd time that Eastern Pilgrims have thus assembled. Their gatherings, deliberations, decisions and efforts constitute our history and they follow us, giving character, force and meaning to our endeavors and accomplishments today. We thank God for the heritage that is ours—an heritage embodied in tenets of faith and recorded indelibly in the lives of our people with forty-two houses of worship established as monuments carved out by resolute perseverance and undying faith. May God be praised!

There is a relationship of interdependence among those persons engaged in Christian service. The losses or gains of the local organization are reflected in the district accounts and consequently in the General Church totals. Our mutual efforts this past year have been a source of encouragement and blessing to me.

— PERSONAL —

During the year I preached 181 times, made 99 visits to the churches and in most cases consulted with the local boards, dedicated 2 Sunday School annexes, conducted 1 cornerstone laying and 1 ground breaking service, attended 5 District

Council meetings, 2 Ministerial Convention meetings, 2 Home Missionary Board meetings, 6 Youth Council (or Executive Committee) meetings, 1 Youth Zone Business meeting, 2 Eastern Pilgrim College Board of Directors meetings, 1 meeting of Public Relations Officers of the College, 2 Forward Movement Committee meetings, 2 General Board meetings, 1 Youth Leaders Institute, 1 Forward Movement Area Workshop, New Year's Youth Rally, Church Leaders Conference and 2 Sunday School Board meetings. Also, I served as evangelist in 3 revivals, presided at the 2 Ministerial Conventions, organized 1 church, attended Eastern District's first Youth Convention and the Annual July 4th Sunday School Convention; I conducted or assisted in 3 funerals, christened 3 babies, baptised or assisted in baptising 14 persons during the 1956 camp meeting and 11 in British Guiana, South America. It was a cherished privilege to serve as a member of a Gospel Team to South America and several Islands in the Carribbean area in missionary and youth interests. I have worked many days on the camp grounds. My salary is paid in full. Offerings from revivals and gifts total \$732.21. I have travelled approximately 30,000 miles in the interests of the church, for 12,994 miles of that amount I have received mileage from the district.

- SUNDAY SCHOOLS -

There are 26 reasons why I believe the Sunday Schools in our area are headed in the right direction. For there are 26 schools that showed gains over the previous year. Rev. E. Linwood Horseman, Promotional Secretary, will reveal in his report that district-wise we show over a 5% gain in attendance this year and a much greater percentage gain during the past 5 years. The people are out there for us to gather in and it is evident that many of our local Sunday School officials are wide awake and at the job. With the bright note, I wish to interject this thought—we must be prepared to capably give the Word of God to the people when they attend our schools. The training of our teachers is becoming more and more a must. Better facilities are being provided and in some of our schools an increased effort is put forth to lead the scholars to Christ. This is the basic reason for having the Sunday School—let us re-double our work in this direction.

- EASTERN PILGRIM -

Eleven issues of the district paper (of about 1,000 copies per issue) have been prepared and mailed to the churches. The interest in the continuation of this little monthly seems good. It serves to keep us in contact with each other and keeps alive our interests in and prayers for one another.

— CAMP IMPROVEMENTS —

This year a number of improvements have been made on our property here. A new four-inch deep well has been drilled to a depth of 169 feet to assure a more adequate water supply, a new pump capable of pumping about 600 gallons per hour and water tanks with a total capacity of 440 gallons have been installed in a new and completely insulated pump house. An annex to one unit of the sanitation facilities has been erected and furnished with up-to-date fixtures. Several buildings have been re-roofed and some painted. Six new picnic tables have been built, new drinking fountain installed on the south side of the grounds, running water provided for the lunch stand, an assembly of lights installed on the west side of camp. Of principle concern, however, is the spiritual good that may be done through this annual encampment. May God's Presence be upon us and all who shall attend.

- YOUTH -

Intensive work has been done this year in the interest of youth. In addition to the regular monthly meetings held in each of our four zones and the annual New Year's rally held in Cambridge this year, Eastern District's first Youth Camp was conducted on the camp grounds June 17-21. This called for much planning and considerable venture on the part of the Youth Council. The cost for the five-day period was set at \$5 per person. Over 70 young people registered and were taught such subjects as Christian etiquette, history and doctrine of our church, etc. Evangelistic services were conducted nightly and many of the youth sought and found the Lord in those meetings. Already they are asking — "Will we have a Youth Camp next year?" I recommend to the conference that this become a part of our annual program. To encourage the youth to attend the regular camp meeting the special offer of \$2 (as total cost) has been made to those between 12 and 18 years of age. Much credit is due Rev. W. Earl Watts, district Youth Executive Secretary, for the good work done among our Pilgrim Youth.

- HOME MISSIONS AND FORWARD MOVEMENT -

"Saved, saved to tell others" are more than words by a song writer; those words embody an inescapable truth. Out with the Gospel, onward and forward to those whose lives have not yet been transformed by power divine—thus we must be activated in the work of the Lord.

Since various items of progress, improvement and advance have been reported to you through Eastern Pilgrim, I will not attempt to give them again. I simply point out a few. It was my happy privilege to organize the Glen Burnie Christians into a Pilgrim Holiness Church March 9th. Under the leadership of Rev. Charles Heckman this work has reached an important milestone in its history. The Home Missionary Board invested \$600 there, which was one-half the cost of the lot. The District Youth contributed \$631 towards the proposed new structure. At the present time the work is being incorporated under the Maryland State Laws. It is hoped that the building program can be soon undertaken. The pastor and delegate will be presented to you for acceptance of the organization at the proper time.

On January 20th Rev. Carvil Tribbit and his congregation suffered the tragic loss of Hughes Chapel when it was destroyed by fire.

Rev. Charles Ruark continues to hold forth the Word at Fairmount and Girdletree.

Baltimore I church has been forced to relocate their place of worship. The properties at Chase and Homewood Avenue have been sold and a new sanctuary will be built on Kenyon and Cliftmont Avenue. The basement structure is already built and occupied.

Rev. Newell W. Reed, Secretary of the Forward Movement Committee, will be giving his report and making recommendations for the consideration of the conference for the coming year. In conjunction with the emphasis that is to be placed on prayer and advance I urge that we pray that God will call into active Christian ministry more of our youth and consecrated laymen. On this, souls and forward movement depend.

The progress, status and promise of the cause of Holiness through our church are matters we are obligated to thoroughly study. Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote: "Progress is the activity of today and the assurance of tomorrowo" The

earnest and sincere efforts of other days have gained for us our present status and brighten today and tomorrow with greater promise of victory and forward strides. Yesterday is not bad because it is old nor tomorrow good because it is new—we must take accurate account of the good and true of the past and approach tomorrow with sharpened wits to discern the promise it holds. This we attempt in Jesus Name!

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

To the 53rd Annual of Eastern District, Greetings!

Each year we come to the conference with the realization that another year is past. A year with its problems, duties, blessings and opportunities. A year nearer the great day of rewards. Spiritually speaking there is but one great requirement toward any task, that is faithfulness. All cannot receive honor for greatest numerical or for greatest percentage gains but it should be a real pleasure to look back over the year and feel God's smile of approval for faithfulness even in little things. And yet we dare not think of even the smallest Sunday School as little for within its constituency may be another one as Catherine Booth, Susanna Wesley,, J. Hudson Taylor, H. D. Dieter or Paul Rees, who may be won by faithfulness.

District-wise we show gains numerically and I have reasons to believe Spiritually as well. We have 41 Sunday Schools operating and 26 of them show a gain over last year. Eight Schools have incomplete records so I could not count them as having gained or lost and only 7 schools show a slight loss. We show an average monthly attendance of 2977 against last year of 2834 which figures out a little more than 5 per cent gain over last year.

These gains are not stupendous but let us take just a moment to turn back the pages of history as told by the Sunday Schools of the Eastern District five years ago. At that time we had a monthly average of 2318. Comparing that figure with the average monthly attendance of this year which was 2977 we show an average numerical gain of 659 or a 28 per cent gain over our 1951-1952 conference year.

Our Sunday School Revival (Easter to Mother's Day) proved a blessing spiritually as well as numerically. Our District Sunday School Board set rather high goals and 20 of our Sunday School made their goal. Several just missed it by a small margin. I know of some churches participating in contests with one another and in all cases both churches were helped.

Our Annual Sunday School Convention here on the camp grounds on the 4th of July was well attended with more than 350 in the morning session and possibly more than 400 in the afternoon. Everyone seemed to enjoy the ministry of Rev. Thomas Weir from the Capital District. Two banners were presented. One was presented to the Bozman Sunday School for having the largest percentage of its enrollment present and the other to the Exmore Church on a point basis.

This year The Goldsboro Sunday School receives both conference awards. The Pastor is Rev. Mrs. Lida J. Brasure and the Sunday School Superintendent is Mr. W. C. Jones. This Sunday School had a numerical gain of 36 and a percentage gain of 82%. Congratulations for a wonderful accomplishment.

We wish to honor the pastors of the following churches for their gains this year. Gold Ribbon goes to Rev. Lida Brasure. Red Ribbons go to Rev. Mary P. Garrett, Rev. Marguerite Schwartz, Rev. Ernest Gary. Blue Ribbons to Rev. Paul Dieter, Rev. Charles Heckman, Rev. Liston Moyer, Rev. Calvin Hudson, Rev. Braden Shrieves, Rev. William H. Miller, Revs. Reed and Ruth Morris, Rev. Earl Lowry, Rev. Grier Baker, Revs. Walter and Ruth Schaltenbrand and yours truly, Linwood Horseman.

There is still a lot to be done. May God help each of us to go Forward this year.

YOUTH SECRETARY'S REPORT

Greetings to the 53rd Annual Conference of the Eastern District.

This has been a good year and a busy one for the Youth Department of our District and this report can by no means tell the full story of all that has been done.

It was the privilege of the Youth Secretary to attend the Sunday School and Youth Leaders Conference at Indianapolis September 4, 5 and 6. The exchange of ideas and information with other Youth Leaders was of value and it was my opinion that the knowledge gained was worth the time and money spent to attend.

In beginning the year's activities it was the responsibility of the Youth Secretary to visit the Zones and conduct a business meeting for the election of Zone officers for the year. These meetings were held in connection with the monthly zone rally. The secretary visited three of the zones conducting the business meeting and bringing the message in the rally. In the interests of District Youth work the secretary has traveled 2,416 miles and given uncounted hours of time.

Report blanks were prepared for our zone chairmen and given to them late in October. From these report blanks and other information it is safe to report that since the end of October 24 rallies have been held in our District with an average attendance of 135.

At our 1956 District Conference there was presented the youth project of raising \$500.00 in this year, by the Youth Department, to be given to our Home Missionary Church in Glen Burnie towards a new church building. Thanks to the wonderful start given this project by the 1956 District Conference and to the fine help all the way though this project did not take a year to complete. Last Dec. 16 it was the pleasure of four members of the Youth Council accompanied by Rev. Abbott our District Superintendent, to go to Glen Burnie, attend Sunday School and Church there and present to them a check for \$632.00 towards a new church building.

On Dec. 11, 1956 a Youth Leaders Institute for the benefit of local youth presidents was held in our New Liberty Church. This service was well attended and the program was interesting. It seemed to be a worthwhile venture.

A District Wide youth rally with Rev. J. A. Grout of High Point, N. C. as speaker, was held at our Cambridge church on New Year's Day. The attendance was good, the messages interesting and helpful.

On March 8th of this year the District Youth participated in a "Welcome Home Service" for Rev. Abbott who had just returned from six weeks of Missionary evangelism with the "Operation Missio" teams in South America and the West Indies. There was a large attendance at this service which was held in our church at Harrington. An offering was received which became part of our District's contribution financially to the National Pilgrim Youth Project of "Operation Missio."

In accordance with the action of the 1956 District Conference a four-day Youth Convention was held at Denton June 17 through 21. Since young people over school age would be gainfully employed and therefore unable to attend, the program of the convention was adapted to the teen age group of young people. There were 69 young people ranging in ages from 11½ to 18 who registered at the Convention. Most of them were 14 and 15 years old. A

wonderful spirit prevailed from the opening service through to the benediction of the last service. There were 26 seekers at the altar of prayer, some of them were from unsaved homes and testified that this was their first time to come to an altar. The young people were well behaved and there were no serious discipline problems. They all seemed to enjoy the Convention and 95% of them stood to their feet testifying they wanted to come back next year. Twenty-seven have written testimonials of appreciation for the Youth Convention which we hope to publish later. Because our convention staff was from our own Conference and served without pay the Convention was able to operate in the black. With 18 churches sending in an offering of \$5.00 or more for the Convention we now have a balance in Convention funds of approximately \$81.00.

Mere words cannot express my appreciation for the wonderful cooperation on the part of the Convention staff and others which helped make this first Convention a real success.

Rev. Grier Baker, our assistant District Superintendent, who served as Convention Counsellor and then later on as Dean, tells the story of the spirit prevailing in the Youth Convention in the form of a poem which he sent to me a week after the Convention was over. With it I close my report.

GOD MET US THERE

From early devotions to the evening prayer God met with us and blessed us there; We thank God for times like these For each one labored, his God to please.

From early morning until evening meal The Lord was there, everyone could feel; The fire burned high on our altars real As young hearts responded to the Gospel appeal.

While the campfire burned, how our hearts did yearn That we more and more about our Savior might learn; As we saw the sacred pictures unfold Stories were told of prophe's and sages of old.

FORWARD MOVEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

To the 1957 Eastern District Conference . . . Greetings in the Lord:

It has been the earnest endeavor of the Forward Movement Committee to carry out during this year the program as outlined in the last Conference Journal, pg. 29-30. We have tried to work with the program for advancement as presented by the general church, and in order to do this have held several meetings of the Committee during the year. We, as a committee, attended the Allexandria Conference at which our general officials presided and felt it was very instructive and profitable to all of us. Perhaps, as an outgrowth of this the committee later adopted a resolution calling for a day of fasting and prayer each month by all the churches for revival and launching of new efforts. We believe this should be continued and everything possible be done to encourage each other to this end. We urge that for the deepening of the church's spiritual life our people form prayer lists and have prayer partners.

The accomplishments of the year include also the setting of goals for each church and Sunday School of the District. These were presented and later reviewed in the Fall and Spring Ministerial Conventions. It is encouraging to see that many churches and schools have attained their goals. The General Board has asked that each conference re-adopt the minimum objectives of the past year. In our conference this was 2 churches, 2 branch Sunday Schools and 66 new members.

Materials for assisting the churches in their efforts toward advancement has been distributed by the Superintendent and good supervision has been given by his efforts. It would be good for the pastors to review with their people the points embraced in his program, especially encouraging their people to be reverent, loyal, enthusiastic, and friendly in the churches.

To implement his suggestions and to aid in carrying out a real forward effort we recommend that each church set aside during the year a special Sunday for the presentation of Forward Movement at which time special emphasis be placed on this program, and, possibly, take an offering for the Forward Movement, which offering shall be forwarded to the District Treasurer for the general Forward Movement Fund. In compliance also with the General Board's request we ask that a Forward Movement service be held during the District Camp.

Further aid, we hope, will be given to revival of our churches by the adoption of a Visitation Campaign and the conducting of a Soul Winning Class in the churches. This we urge upon each pastor and church at the earliest possible date. In conjunction with this visitation we urge that special informative advertising materials showing the work, the doctrine, and the practices of our church be distributed among the people of the communities to enlighten the people and to erase much misunderstanding concerning our church. Some Forward Movement literature will be on sale in the Camp Book Room and other will be available from our publishing house.

In accord with this policy of distribution of good literature it will be remembered that this committee has sent to each pastor, missionary and evangelist a book intended to increase the spiritual fervor of the churches. We hope each pastor studies it, and urges his people to do likewise.

We further recommend the following: that each pastor have a mailing list of members, of friends, and of those who are his responsibility; that, if possible, the members of the Forward Movement Committee visit each zone during the conference year; that local Bible Clubs be set up in the churches; that work be done thru the local missionary societies in prayer requests, projects, etc.; that we emphasize early reception of new converts into membership; and that we have a District Honor Roll listing those churches that have reached their goals, and possibly, give them some special award for their good work.

Real accomplishments in advancing the work have been evident thru the conference year: The establishment of the Youth Camp, the increase in membership, the establishment of the Glen Burnie work, the increase in the Sunday Schools, and efforts by the committee to establish a working policy for Branch Sunday Schools.

We, as a committee, would continue to urge the founding of new Sunday Schools and churches, the bringing of new converts into the church, and special efforts to deepen the devotional life of the church. To these ends we pledge our best efforts.

HOME MISSIONARY BOARD REPORT

To the Members of the 1957 District Conference, Greetings:

The last annual conference added one new member to the home missionary board in the person of the District Treasurer who is to serve by virtue of office, thus in our first meeting on September 13, 1956, Rev. Mark H. Bowman was welcomed to the board.

The number of projects considered have necessarily been limited to the resources available. Rev. W. C. Wheedleton presented to the board a proposal for a work in Middletown, Delaware which was considered and tentative plans laid when however it seemed further developments in that area were providentially closed for the present.

The highlight of the year was the organizing of the church at Glen Burnie, Md. during the month of March. The board felt that a real concentration of effort in seemingly fertile fields was of more merit than a scattering which did not seem to increase. Thus, it was unanimously agreed to loan the Glen Burnie church, on a promisory note, the amount necessary to proceed with their church building above that which the bank would agree to loan, an amount of Three Thousand Dollars. Thus we believe to have commenced a practice now in use in our General Church Extension Department, by which Pilgrim Dollars are never lost to the great cause for which they are given, but may be literally spent and re-spent in the work of Kingdom Building.

There is still an open door, there is still time, but our challenge is to increase our efforts and to work for the night cometh.

- Resolution No. 3 BE IT RESOLVED that there shall be a District Director of Missionary Societies. This person shall be appointed by the District Council and shall serve to promote the missionary enterprise of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and to co-ordinate the efforts of the local societies among our constituency throughout the district.
- Resolution No. 4 BE IT RESOLVED that this Conference adopt the following goals for this year: 2 new churches, 2 branch Sunday Schools, and 66 new members.
- Resolution No. 5 BE IT RESOLVED that the District Forward Movement service in the District Camp be held in conjunction with the other departmental services at 9:30 A. M. on Missionary Day.

- Resolution No. 1 WHEREAS, we wholeheartedly believe in what Eastern Pilgrim College is doing to train youth for Christian Service and we realize how dependent we are upon the product of the College and we wish to cooperate with the other districts in the school zone; BE IT RESOLVED that we endeavor to contribute on the basis of 25c per member per month to raise the Eastern Pilgrim College budget among our churches.
- Resolution No. 2 BE IT RESOLVED that the fiscal year of Denton Holiness Camp be from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31.
- Resolution No. 3 Recognizing as a conference the increased cost of driving and maintaining an automobile and observing the mileage rate that is paid by government and business, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that the rate of mileage paid to the District Superintendent and the District Council and other such persons on District travel be set at .07 per mile.
- Resolution No. 4 BE IT RESOLVED that Resolution #2 on page 37-38 of 1956 Conference Journal be amended to read:
 - "Whereas, we believe that the "Laborer is worthy of his hire" and that we feel our constituency desire that their district officers be better paid therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that:
 - The District Secretary receive \$85.00 per year plus postage.
 - The District Treasurer receive \$200.00 per year plus postage.
 - The District Statistician receive \$50.00 per year.
- Resolution No. 5 BE IT RESOLVED that standing rule #4, page 38 of 1956 Conference Journal be amended to read:
 - "The District Superintendent salary shall be set at \$75.00 per week, and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed three revivals each year with remuneration. All finances to be reported to the District Statistician.

STANDING RULES

- No. 1. Since our General Budget has been set at \$6.00 per member per year the apportionment be as follows: Foreign missions 35%, Administration 25%, Church extension 20%, Church extension loan fund 6%, Senior College 10%, Sunday School and youth work 4%, our District Budget shall be set at \$2.25 making a total budget of \$8.25 per member. This is to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer.
- No. 2. The Conference shall accept the Pension Plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 4 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.
- No. 3. Each Church shall pay into the District Treasury 5% of all Regular Offerings (Sunday morning and evening and Prayer Meeting). This amount to be sent in monthly. This 5% shall be apportioned as follows: 60% for District Budget; 25% for District indebtedness; and 15% for District Home Missions.
- No. 4. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$75.00 per week, and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct three revival meetings each year with remuneration. All finances to be reported to the District Statistician.
- No. 5. Each Church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member each visit.
- No. 6. The District Secretary and Treasurer shall receive \$85.00 and \$200.00 respectively plus postage per year.
 - No. 7 The District Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year.
- No. 8. The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted.
 - a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 150 and above shall give \$12.00 yearly.
 - b. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 100-149 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
 - c. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 75-99 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
 - d. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 50-74 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
 - e. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average under 50 shall give \$3.00 yearly.
- No. 9. Each local youth group shall send to the District Young People's Treasurer 5% of regular offerings; to be paid monthly.
- No. 10. The District shall contribute an amount equal to 4% of the District Superintendent's salary into the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 11. Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 12. Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
 - No. 13. All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall

register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.

- No. 14. All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 15. A Bible College service shall be held the first Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 16. All Eastern Pilgrims shall be encouraged to contribute a penny a meal toward the work of Denton Camp and that the District Superintendent shall appoint a committee to promote this plan for liquidation of the district indebtedness.
- No. 17. No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 18. A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 19. A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meetings for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 20. The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale, this practice to be continued.
- No. 21. No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by the two old dormitories which have been moved.
- No. 22. Each year there shall be a Preacher's Retreat held for a few days in the month of April for the purpose of cleaning up the camp grounds and making general repair. This retreat shall be directed by the District Council as to date and program and each minister on the district is required to attend.
- No. 23. Ladies taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly.
- No. 24. No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 25. One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 26. The District Home Missionary service shall not be held in conjunction with the General Home Missionary service.
- No. 27. The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 28. All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 29. A time shall be set for our District Home Missionary Service during the Camp by the Camp Committee.
- No. 30. The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the council is unable to grant a transfer of lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District

Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.

- No. 31. Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 32. Future building of cottages on Denton Camp ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 33. The District Forward Movement committee shall have a part in the service at the District Camp that will be held in conjunction with other departmental services, at 9:30 A.M. on Missionary Day.
- No. 34. The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp be from January 1 through December 31.

CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 35. Whereas the General Superintendent has ruled that the Conference Year ends when we close books, the books shall be closed June 30th and newly elected church board take office immediately. All reports must be in the hands of the Statistician 10 days before camp.
- No. 36. No delegate or alternate shall serve in the Annual Conference who has not been nominated by the local church board and elected by the local church.
- No. 37. Sittings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30; Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 38. As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 39. No individual shall serve as a member of more than one of the following: Council, Examining Board, Education Board, and Resolution Committee.
- No. 40. The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 p. m. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 41. The committees appointed during the conference shall be given time to present their objectives and goals for the year during the camp.
- No. 42. The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 43. The district secretary shall send, immediately following the district conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the district superintendent and to each local church treasurer.
- No. 44. Each zone of our District shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.
- No. 45. The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

- No. 46. The District Superintendent shall appoint a District Forward Movement committee consisting of a member from the District Council, S. S. Board, Youth Committee, Home Missionary Board, and 3 members at large.
- No. 47. Quarterly report blanks shall be prepared and sent to the District Superintendent by each church. Said blanks to be furnished by District Secretary.
- No. 48. The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified not later than 30 days prior to the Conference.
- No. 49. There shall be a District Director of Missionary Societies appointed each year by the District Council; whose duty shall be to promote the missionary enterprise of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- No. 50. The goals for the Conference year shall be 2 new churches, 2 branch Sunday Schools, and 66 new members.
- No. 51. The second Wednesday of each month shall be set aside as a day of fasting and praying for the Forward Movement effort in our District.
- No. 52. Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- No. 53. An Honor Roll shall be provided by the District which shall list the names of the churches that reach their yearly goals, and an appropriate award given to those churches listed thereon at the Annual Conference.
- No. 54. A special Sunday shall be designated by the District Superintendent for the Forward Movement program.
- No. 55. Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 56. Each church shall endeavor to contribute on the basis of 25c per member per month to raise our budget for Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 57. The rate of mileage paid by the District for District travel shall be .07 per mile.

MINUTES

- No. 58. The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 59. The price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 60. The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.
- No. 61. Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs committee when the church books close on June 30.

DISTRICT BUSINESS

- No. 62. Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 63. No annual church business shall be held on Sunday.

- No. 64. Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
 - No. 65. Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay.
- No. 66. The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as a pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 67. Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.

YOUNG PEOPLES WORK

- No. 68. A District Convention shall be held on New Year's Day or on Monday when New Years falls on a Sunday. Time of services to be at 10:30 a. m., 2:00 p. m. and 7:00 p. m. This convention shall be held in a centrally located place in the District.
- No. 69. A District Youth Camp shall be conducted annually on a date set by the Youth Committee and the District Council. The Camp shall be held at a time to include 4 evenings and 3 days.
- No. 70. The time and place of the District Young Peoples Business Meeting shall be set by the District Youth Committee to be ratified by the District Council.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

- No. 71. A District Sunday School rally shall be held on July 4.
- No. 72. Two Sunday School banners shall be awarded at the district rallies; one on the basis of the percentage of enrollment present and the second one the basis of the number present in all sessions multipled by the number of miles traveled.
 - No. 73. (See Standing Rule #8).






