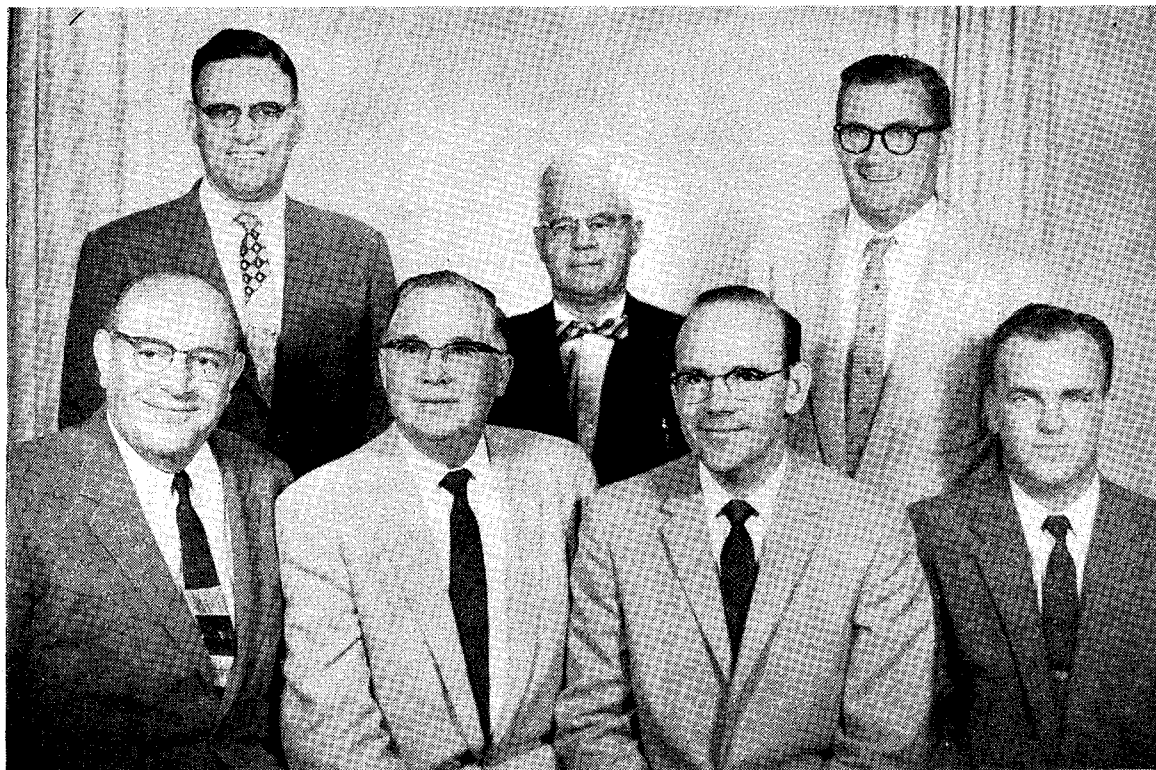

CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING JULY 24, 1958

1:30 P.M.

The fifty-fourth conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Camp Ground in Denton, Md., at 1:30 P.M. on Thursday, July 24, 1958, with Rev. J. D. Abbott, District Superintendent, presiding. Mrs. Ruth Schaltenbrand served as pianist and her husband, Rev. Walter Schaltenbrand led the conference in singing, "Love Lifted Me" and "I Know Whom I Have Believed." Bro. Abbott made some opening remarks of greetings and expressed Praised to God for His Leadership and Goodness in bringing us together for this conference. Mr. Lee Griffen, lay delegate from Trappe, Maryland led the conference in prayer.

Rev. Abbott then presented, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, General Superintendent of our Church Area to us as the Presiding Officer of this 1958 Conference. Bro. Snyder read the 20 Psalm as an Invocation upon our Conference. He then made reference to one of the Resolutions from our recent General Conference held at Winona Lake, Ind. It was entitled, "TOWARD TOMORROW". He read the preamble of this resolution and then brought to the conference some very

pointed and profitable truth from the "Five Objectives to Organized Districts" as outlined at General Conference of 1958. These five objectives were:

- A. 5,000 gain in membership during the next quadrennium.
- B. 150 new churches in organized districts during the next quadrennium.
- C. An annual Pastor's conference in each District.
- D. An Accentuated Holiness evangelism.
- E. Prayer and fasting leagues in every church.

Bro. Snyder urged every church to labor with eternities values in view and further remarked that "what we want is what God wants to give us in this hour."

Following this challenging message, the Secretary proceeded to call the Roll of delegates. The roll call was accepted.

The Conference bar was then determined to be the first 10 rows of benches in the center section of the tabernacle.

The newly organized church at Rumbley, Md., was then presented to the Conference. The Pastor, Rev. Charles Ruark and the lay delegate, Nancy Ashley were called forward. The members of the Conference voted to receive this church into the District by standing and giving a victorious testimony of Praise to our Lord.

Reports were the next order of business. Rev. J. D. Abbott, gave a splendid report of his many labors as District Superintendent. It was received by a hearty "Amen."

The report of the assistant District Superintendent was given and it was also received with gratitude.

Rev. Harold Berrian, Pastor of the Church of the Nazarene at Laurel, Del. was introduced to the Conference.

The Auditors report was given by Rev. Etta Clough and was accepted.

Rev. Mark H. Bowman gave a comprehensive treasurer's report and it was received by the Conference.

A motion carried to extend the time of this sitting for fifteen minutes.

The Statistician gave the grand total of all statistics of the District and a motion carried to accept this good report.

A motion carried to recess after each sitting and that the minutes of each sitting be read at the morning sitting.

A motion prevailed that the Ordination Service be set for 8:00 P.M. on Thursday, July 24, 1958.

Rev. Grier Baker closed the sitting with prayer.

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SECOND SITTING, JULY 24, 1958

6:30 P.M.

The second sitting of the 1958 Conference opened with Rev. Lindy Adams leading the delegates in singing - "He Keeps Me Singing." Rev. Linwood Horseman was at the Piano.

Rev. Braden Shrieves called upon the Lord in Prayer.

Rev. Leon Hynson gave the Home Missionary Board report. It was received by the Conference.

Rev. Paul Dieter gave the Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report.

This report was accepted by the Conference. Following the acceptance of this report, the Sunday School Secretary gave awards to Cambridge, Maryland for the highest numerical gain in Sunday School for the year and to Grotons, Virginia for the highest percentage gain. Awards were also given to the following churches for reaching 10% or more in percentage gain in Sunday School during the past Conference year; Mardela, Cedar Grove, Baltimore I, Baltimore II, Ridgely, and Millsboro. A report was then given to each member of the conference showing the attendance of Eastern District Sunday Schools for the year. A motion carried to accept this as the official report of the Eastern District Sunday School report for the conference year.

The reception committee presented Rev. and Mrs. Walter Bubb from Lock Haven, Pa. Bro. and Sister Bubb spoke briefly.

The Forward Movement Committee report was given by Rev. Newell Reed. Following the motion that carried to receive this report Bro. Reed, made mention of the Churches that qualified for the HONOR ROLL. In order to do this they were to show a gain of 10% in Sunday School attendance and/or 5% gain in church membership during the year. This Honor Roll is listed in the report of this committee to be found elsewhere in the Conference Journal.

The third sitting of the 1958 Conference opened with Rev. Russell Davis leading the members of the Conference in singing "Standing On The Promises." Rev. Ruth Morris was the pianist. Rev. Milford Sullivan petitioned God in fervent prayer.

Rev. W. Earl Watts, Executive Secretary of District Youth Work gave his report. A motion carried to receive this report.

The Committee on Memoirs reported. Following the reading of this report by Louetta Holden, the members of the Conference bowed in silent moments of appreciation and thanksgiving in memory of those who departed from our midst during this past conference year.

A motion carried to have Standing Rule No. 48 on P. 41 of the 1957 Conference Journal amended to read at 8:00 P.M. in order to establish a definite time for the Ordination Service.

The Ways and Means Committee reported again.

A motion carried to pay the Sunday School Promotional Secretary \$25.00 a year out of the District Sunday School Funds.

Invitations for the Spring Ministerial Convention were given next.

The conference voted to have this Convention at Cambridge, Maryland.

A motion carried that all unfinished business be left in the hands of the District Council and that they be authorized to complete any unfinished business as well as to hear and approve the reading of the minutes of the last two sittings of this conference.

A motion carried that the executive branch of the District Council constitute the administrative agency of the Home Missionary Board and that the advisory members of the Council and the Pastors of the Churches on the District receiving support from the District meet twice each year with the executive agency in advisory capacity.

The District Superintendent asked permission to appoint all Committees at a later date. The Secretary read the appointees of the Council to the office of Sunday School Promotion Secretary and to the Sunday School Board.

Rev. Robert Darsch presented a motion that the District Council appoint a District Historian. This motion carried.

Mrs. G. L. Helsby testified concerning the departure of her late husband, Rev. G. L. Helsby who went to be with the Lord on January 11, 1958. She quoted the memorable words of John Wesley during her testimony, "Our people die well."

The members of the Conference sang in closing the Doxology. Rev. Melvin Snyder who so ably presided over the Conference gave the Benediction.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin Snyder, and the ministerial and lay delegates to this annual district conference, GREETINGS IN JESUS' NAME!

By the indulgent providence of God, we meet in this 54th annual conference of the Eastern District. In the not too distant background we can hear time's sounding board thundering forth the urgency of these days. Flares of diplomatic tempers, accusations of falsifying the facts, double talk and maneuverings with ulterior motives go to make up the sordid picture of governmental conflicts in our world today. These are far from normal days—these are anxious times. Yesterday's sins and evils have greatly accumulated and they are about to boil over into our day. However, in the midst of this turbulence, aware of and alive to the present needs of the world is the church of the Lord Jesus Christ offering hope and salvation through the risen Lord.

I am reminded of Sir Winston Churchill's speech to the House of Commons on December 8, 1941 which dealt with the war with Japan. He said,—“In the past we have had a light that flickered, in the present we have a light that flames, and in the future there will be a light which shines over all the land and sea.” Certainly the light of the British Empire was discernible in the darkness of those days. How much more should the light of the church be ever increasing in brilliance and darkness-dispelling power to penetrate the gloom and pierce into every part of this sin ridden world. Let it be so!

The time allotted to us for this annual conference is most certainly not to be spent entirely in the consideration of the world's political hazards and their implications, but more particularly we are to give earnest consideration to the church's record of the past and program for the future.

PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 136 times, called on each church at least twice and consulted with the official boards, organized one church and conducted the annual business meeting of each church, attended approximately 50 board and/or committee meetings. During the year I have participated in 3 services of dedication, 1 mortgage burning service and 1 Home Coming service; had five special meetings with pastors presided at the fall ministerial convention at Harrington, and worked with the five other district superintendents in the college zone in planning and conducting a zone ministerial held on the campus of Eastern Pilgrim College. I have published the Eastern Pilgrim for 11 months with the able assistance of Rev. Wilbur Bubb, participated in or conducted 10 funerals, and christened 9 children. I have given many days of work on the camp grounds, traveled an estimated total of 30,000 miles of which amount I have received mileage from the district for 13,576 miles. My salary, as set by the conference is paid. to date. As a member of the Eastern Pilgrim College Board of Directors, I attended the 2 annual meetings, made one call on the young people from our district attending the college last year, attended 3 meetings of the General Board, 1 church leader's conference at Indianapolis; and as a member of the General Church Liberal Arts College Board of Trustees, I attended the spring meeting in Owosso, Michigan. Also, it was quite beneficial to attend the National Sunday School conference at Frankfort, Indiana, and the General Conference at Winona Lake, Indiana. It has been a privilege to serve you and labor with the considerate and capable group of ministers we have in our district.

FROM OUR MIDST

Our hearts have been greatly saddened this year by the passing from us of many dear ones so highly respected. I mention only those with ministerial connection, or who were parents of ministers. MRS. EDNA NEFF - wife of General Superintendent, Rev. William H. Neff; MRS. MABEL M. ABBOTT - my own dear mother; Rev. MAYME PARKER MILLS - for many years a song evangelist and pastor; MRS. MARTHA LAVENIA CLOUGH -mother of Rev Etta M. Clough; MR. PERCY HYNSON - father of Rev. Leon Hynson; INFANT MELVIN - child of Rev. and Mrs. George Melvin; and REV. G. L. HELSBY - a long-time and faithful laborer in the kingdom's interest. A 19th century poet spoke of death in fitting words when he wrote: “For death and life, in ceaseless strife, Beat wild on this world's shore, And all our calm is in that balm—Not lost but gone before.”

EASTERN PILGRIM

With the July issue we came to the end of the 5th year of publishing the district paper which we call Eastern Pilgrim -- a total of more than 50,000 copies have been done. For about 4½ years this district organ was distributed in mimeographed form. Beginning with December 1957 issue the paper was printed and doubled in size, and carried news and reports from all departments and interests of the district. It is felt that this news medium is a benefit and aid to our work -- it renders a wide scope of valuable services, such as news from the churches, youth news, Sunday School sidelights, financial facts and items from the district office., However, I mention it to you that you might be cognizant of the involvement. The 1250 copies per issue are being printed at a cost of \$50 - that is a cost of \$50 per month. For the past 7 months that cost has been equally distributed among the following departments: District Budget, Denton Camp, Home Missions, Youth and Sunday Schools. This is imposing a burden upon the District Budget and District Sunday School accounts. Personally I feel the benefit of the paper is worth the cost, and I ask that you give your decision as to the continuance of this project.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Aggressive leadership has been given this arm of our work this year by promotional Secretary, Rev. Paul D. Dieter. In looking back upon the year the records made, it seems Ralph Waldo Emerson was talking our language when he said, "All sorts of things and weather Must be taken in together, To make up a year And a Sphere." The "all sorts of things and weather" have kept us from showing the outstandingly good gains that would have been made. However, in spite of much sickness affecting many, many people and weather that seemed to violently strike at times, we have recorded gains instead of losses. Certainly the "ups and downs" of Sunday School work cannot always be calculated. The particulars will be given to you in Brother Dieter's report.

YOUTH

This department of the church is dealing with our promise of the future. Thus we aim to steer the younger generation right that their future and ours may be spiritually secure and bright with promise. It is true that the youth with whom we work are not perfect, but also we must acknowledge that they are not growing up in perfect homes or perfect churches. With determination we set ourselves to the task of pointing out to them the better way, and anxiously offering to them assistance according to our ability.

Rev. W. Earl Watts has vigorously headed up the youth work as Executive Secretary. Youth Camp, Youth Institutes, Zone Rallies, and the special offer to youth to attend Denton Camp are projects launched by him and the Youth Council. Also, to the faithful pastors who promote the youth work the church will ever be grateful, for in today's youth tomorrow already walks.

PROPERTY

Considerable in property improvement has been done this year, and such items have been reported to you in Eastern Pilgrim. Annexes to existing buildings, new structures and further facility development have been the expression of the faith and interest of our people district-wide.

The district parsonage is in excellent repair. However, a faulty heating system has given us some anxious concern. A fire developed in the furnace beyond control in the early morning hours May 2nd. and the fire department was summoned to extinguish it. Nearly \$100 has been spent this year to repair it, but it is improved but little. The Council has authorized further study and investigation which might involve the installation of a new system before satisfaction and property and life protection are reasonably assured.

This year a great deal of work has been required here on the camp grounds. A number of things have contributed to the work load - the heavy snows, water soaked ground, and the fact that some of the main supporting posts have been in here for nearly 60 years. The building shifted, sagged, and was not in good condition at all. In consultation with a local building contractor we undertook to jack up, straighten and more permanently support the structure. Every post now has a reinforced concrete foundation, and practically all of the plates have been tied together with brackets. The plan also called for the use of guy wires crossed from plate to plate to further brace the beams, but time ran out and this must be postponed to a later date.

Added to this was faulty water lines making necessary the digging up and laying of over 300 feet of one inch galvanized line. However, all of these things have resulted in improvements. A number of pastors and laymen have come and given of their time to help accomplish what has been done. To them we are grateful - may God richly reward them.

HOME MISSIONS AND FORWARD MOVEMENT

We hold the unconquerable belief that the message of the Lord Jesus Christ can lift the heavy pall of sin's gloom from the human heart, and change the course of human affairs. For this we engage ourselves in all of the work of the church - in everything that would tend to extend the church and be evidence of Forward Movement.

In Compliance with your directive, a year ago the second Wednesday of each month was designated through Eastern Pilgrim as the day of fasting and prayer for Forward Movement, for revival and soul saving efforts. It has been gratifying to hear of the joining together of Pilgrims in this kind of effort which is basic in the work of the Lord.

The provision of the conference to have an honor roll listing those churches that attained a 10% increase in Sunday School attendance, and/or 5% gain in church membership will be awarded in certificate form by the chairman of the Forward Movement Committee to those churches that have qualified.

Sunday, May 18, 1958 was set as FORWARD MOVEMENT SUNDAY throughout the district. Appropriate 2-color posters were prepared and mailed to each pastor to aid him in his promotion of the program. On the poster was the Forward Movement pledge authorized by the committee of which Rev. Newell Reed is chairman. It was our hope that this effort would keep before us all the importance of formulating and carrying out an aggressive program on the local level. In fact, any effort to stir our people and awaken them to the task before them is, in my opinion, creditable and full of promise.

Several pastors have conducted a "Soul Winners Class" during the year which could not be without benefit. Friends, this is where the emphasis must be. Here is the work for the church, here is her burden - her concern, in this area she must give her attention and spend her energy.

The Home Missionary Board with Rev. Leon Hynson as chairman, has sought to aid the work at Glen Burnie and Rumbly this year. Glen Burnie is yet without a permanent house of worship which imposes serious handicaps. Their search thus far has not resulted in finding satisfactory quarters elsewhere. The only time they may hold services in the hall they now occupy is Sundays -- in the afternoon and evening. There are no arrangements for accommodations during a revival meeting. Prayer on their behalf is urgently requested.

The services that were held by Rev. C. T. Ruark in the hall at Lower Fairmount resulted in the organizing of the group September 21, 1957. Soon thereafter they entered into a building program, and now at Rumbly there stands a lovely new Pilgrim Holiness Church. The pastor and delegate will be presented to the conference for acceptance at the proper time.

WHAT OF TOMORROW?

We must strive lest in the tomorrows we look back over the past and be forced to take what Shakespeare described as "a beggarly account of empty boxes." Among many other things (1) Let us keep the message of heart holiness and purity of life ever in the forefront, and make it our aim to aid and assist in everyway possible the spread of scriptural holiness. (2) Let us engage ourselves in an effort not only to attract our youth to the program and activities of the church, but also, and first of all, endeavor to whet their appetites for Christ and lead them on to establishment in Christ. (3) Let us set our sights on a minimum Sunday School increase of 10% over our average last year. (4) Let us stress the importance and blessing of belonging to the body of Christ through the Church and thus gain the equivalent of a 5% increase in church membership. (5) Let us strive to pay our budgets in full: General and District Budgets (now UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND) and Eastern Pilgrim College Budget. By each member and church paying its assessment, the needs are met and all share equally in the responsibility. (6) Let us endeavor to arrange our schedules to receive and hear the deputational workers sent out to our churches. (7) Let us continue the program of fasting and prayer and training for soul-winning. Let there be a reconfirmation of our dedication to God and His Cause.

The christian church has not in the former times journeyed all this way across centuries, across oceans, across mountains, across the prairies, nor has it remained strong, increased and enlarged as it has all through accidental happenstance. The Lord's Cause has survived and flourished because it has been championed by devout and fervently devoted servants of God. These days demand something of the same of us the former days did of our forefathers. The kingdom, and thus the church, will be advanced today and tomorrow not with idle dreams and wishful thinking, but with heart and blood and iron. To the Word of God we cling -- its precepts are our standards, our guides and our pronouncements. We respect it, we study it, we live it, and we declare it in Jesus' Wonderful Name!

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Greetings to this 54th Annual District Conference!

A weary, young lady stood before her pastor. She had looked upon the lovely church building and its costly equipment. She had studied the busy schedule and heavy program of her church, with all the demands it placed upon the members. In one column of a ledger she had listed the "costs" to maintain the Church. In the other column, where she planned to list the accomplishments, she wrote, "Nothing". "For what good had the church done in her own life?" she asked. "Just what is the Church trying to do besides keep itself in existence?" Her question, of course, alarmed her pastor.

This causes one to wonder how many millions in our country feel that way about the Church and Sunday School. While the question asked by the young lady might well alarm those who are content simply to keep the Church in existence, it is nevertheless a good question. What are the objectives of the Church and Sunday School if all our time, money and energy are given simply to keep the church in existence, we have missed the target!

What is the supreme objective of every Sunday School? Simply it is this: TO REACH THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF PERSONS WE POSSIBLY CAN; TEACHING THEM THE WORD OF GOD, WITH THE ULTIMATE GOAL OF LEADING EVERYONE TO A SAVING KNOWLEDGE OF JESUS CHRIST!

I firmly believe the Eastern District Sunday Schools are striving to reach that objective. This past year has been a wonderful year in many ways. In spite of the flu epidemic and severe weather conditions, which very definitely had an effect upon Sunday School growth, God was with us and helped us.

District wise we show gains numerically and I have every reason to believe spiritually, as well. We now have 42 Sunday Schools with the organizing of a new Sunday School at Rumbley, Md. in April. 21 of these schools made a gain over last year, 2 schools averaged the same as last year and the rest show slight losses. This year we can report an average monthly attendance of 3137 against last years average of 3088 which makes a numerical gain of 49 and a percentage gain of 2%. The average Sunday School attendance in our district is 75, with a total of 156,010 scholars attending district Sunday Schools this past year.

These gains are by no means outstanding, but we are thankful that we can report a gain. The following figures may be more encouraging. Ten years ago the average monthly attendance was 1954 against 3137 this year which is a numerical gain of 1183 and 61 percent gain. We are headed in the right direction!

The activities of the year have been varied and we trust helpful. The District Sunday School Leader's Conference held last September in Cambridge, under the direction of the General Secretary of Sunday Schools, Rev. Paul F. Elliott was well attended and I'm sure helpful to all.

The Sunday School Board prepared and distributed gratis to all

Churches a "Certificate of Sunday School Membership", which we felt would be welcomed by the Churches and cherished by all scholars. As far as I know, all Churches are using them and finding them beneficial.

The Enlargement Campaign launched by the General Sunday School Department was well received by our District Sunday Schools with 81% participating in the campaign. The District winners in each classification were: Class AA - Cambridge with 585 points, Class A - Milton with 530, Class B - Baltimore I with 1095, Class C - New Liberty with 585, Class D - Delmar with 360, Class E - Grotons with 510. Baltimore I was one of the national winners in its class and received from the General Sunday School Department a \$15.00 gift certificate and a plaque. Congratulations to this Sunday School!

The Annual Sunday School Revival (Easter to Mother's Day) proved a blessing spiritually as well as numerically. We published weekly statistical reports and various news items of interest. The best news reported was the number of scholars that were saved. A total of 153 conversions were reported during those six Sundays. Eternity alone will reveal the benefits of the Annual Sunday School Revivals.

To conclude the conference year, the Sunday School Board emphasized the last seven Sundays by giving them special titles. These, we trust, provided incentive for your scholars to work just a little harder.

We regret that the Annual Sunday School Convention to be held on Denton Camp on the 4th of July had to be cancelled due to work being done on the tabernacle and grounds. After considering several alternatives, the Board felt that the best would be to cancel it for this year.

By way of a brief personal report, I have presided over 8 District Sunday School Board meetings, attended the Promotional Secretaries Conference held at Frankford, Ind. which was held just prior to the National Sunday School Convention. At the Promotional Secretaries conference I was elected to the Advisory Committee consisting of five promotional secretaries. I attended one such meeting at Headquarters in Indianapolis.

The conference awards go to the following two Churches. For the Highest Numerical gain: Cambridge with a gain of 20. The pastor is Rev. Mark H. Bowman and Mr. Olney Ross is Superintendent. The Sunday School with the Highest Percentage gain was Grotons with 91 per cent gain. Rev. H. G. Baker is pastor and Mrs. Vilies Godwin is Superintendent. Congratulations to these "Sunday Schools of the year!"

We wish to honor the following Sunday Schools for their gain of 10 percent or more in Sunday School attendance: Mardela with 32%, Cedar Grove - 21%, Baltimore I - 15%, Ridgely - 14%, Millsboro - 13%, and Baltimore II - 11%. These we honor for their efforts, which is as it should be, and yet many of you who have received no commendation have fought just as hard, and in some instances won an even greater victory. May God richly reward you for your every effort.

IN CONCLUSION, there is only one way under God for Eastern District Sunday Schools to go, and that is FORWARD! Problems? Yes. Difficulties?

Many. The Sunday School movement wasn't started in an easy atmosphere. Robert Raikes' first Sunday School was started in very unfavorable conditions. The streets about the little building were filled with children, filthy and vile. The air was filled with cursing and human difficulties and conflicts. Many were the battles from that beginning of the Sunday School Movement to this day. But the day came in England and elsewhere when throngs of scholars gathered to be taught. Back of this daring story of Christian triumph is an incident which explains the untiring efforts of Robert Raikes. It is told that a friend came to visit Robert Raikes, who was now an aged man. Raikes led his friend to the spot in a back street where his first Sunday School was started. Robert Raikes uncovered his head and closed his eyes. For a moment, he stood in silent prayer. Then, turning towards his friend, while tears rolled down his cheeks, he said, "This, my friend, is the very spot on which I stood a number of years ago when I saw the destitution of the children, and the desecration of the Sabbath by the inhabitants of this city. As I stood here, and asked myself, CAN NOTHING BE DONE? a voice answered, TRY! I did try," said Raikes, "and see what God has done!"

I wonder what you and I see and hear as we view the streets of our village, town, or city? Surely, the voice of God must say to each of us, "TRY!" Jesus, our Master, declared, "I **must** work. . .while it is day." The Psalmist, undoubtedly writing about Jesus, speaks of the kind of zeal we need for the task before us when he says, "My zeal hath **consumed** me." Surely, no one would dare to remain idle in the face of Jesus, or the earnest apostle Paul, or others who have heard the command from God.

The challenge that faces all Sunday School workers today is, "TRY!" "TRY!" The past has been wonderful but the future will be brighter as we forge ahead with Divine Inspiration and under Divine Leadership for a greater and brighter tomorrow! With the promised help of God it can be done!

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the Pilgrims meeting in the 54th Annual Conference of the Eastern District.

Another year has rolled swiftly into the past. It was a year of opportunity to serve Christ and the Church such as may not be ours to enjoy very much longer in this troubled world.

It was my privilege to attend the Youth Leaders Conference held last August just before the opening of the National Sunday School Institute at Frankford, Indiana. The meeting of youth leaders from many conferences and the exchange of ideas and plans was of real benefit to the youth work in our own conference.

The District Youth President during the month of September presided over

organizational meetings for the Tidewater Zone at Trappe, Md., the Northern Zone at Dover, Del., the Southern Zone at Bloxom, Va., and the Eastern Zone at Laurel, Del. These meetings were held in conjunction with their first monthly rally of the season. During the year a new zone on the Western Shore was created and 3 profitable rallies were held in that zone.

An Institute of **Local Youth Leaders** was held in Salisbury, Md. on Sept. 17 with several of our **local** presidents and leaders participating. The program was interesting and the attendance was good.

On New Years Day the Annual Mid-Winter District-Wide Youth Rally was held in Milford, Del. at the Lulu Ross Elementary School with Rev. McCrea Homes, District Youth President of N. C. as speaker.

This has been one of the best years that our youth **zones** have known when it comes to interest and attendance in the monthly rallies. On the basis of reports sent to my desk, and I have not received a report on every rally held, there were 28 zone rallies held in our district last year with a total attendance of 3,406 making an average of 122 at each rally. The largest **zone rally** reported was in the Northern Zone where Rev. Allen Clark is Leader. That rally was held at Denton on May 30 with **223** present. The second largest zone rally reported was from the Southern Zone where Atwood Berry is Leader. The rally was at Saxis March 14 with **208** present. Some of our zones reported seekers at the altar of prayer indicating that a spirit of evangelism is present in our zone rallies.

Plans have been laid for the **Annual Youth Conference** to become more of a conference with the creation this year of **Resolutions, Ways and Means** and **Reception** committees to serve at the annual business meeting. It is hoped the Annual Youth Conference will provide some training for future lay leadership.

Because of our General Conference held early in June it was impossible to have Youth Camp at the same time as last year so the Second Annual Youth Camp is to be held here at the Denton Camp Grounds August 11 through August 15. Rev. Harold Lowman of Salisbury, N. C. is the engaged evangelist for Youth Camp.

In the interest of the District Youth work I have traveled 2,949 miles, preached in 8 zone rallies, presided over 3 youth council meetings and 3 meetings of the executive committee of the youth council. My traveling expenses have been paid in full at the district rate.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude to the fine pastors and faithful lay people of the Eastern Conference that I submit this report. The cooperation given me in the years I have served as zone leader and then later as Executive Youth Secretary has been excellent. The cooperation given has made it a pleasure to work with you for the good of Pilgrim Youth in the Eastern Conference and so to you I say a real thank you from the bottom of my heart.

HOME MISSIONARY BOARD REPORT

Greetings to the 54th Annual Conference of the Eastern District.

The Word of our Lord to the Philadelphian church points up the invitation and provides us with the challenge to extend the church by all the powers at our disposal. "I have set before thee an open door" Christ said. If Eastern Pilgrims are wide awake it will be easy to perceive that God has endowed us with many wonderful opportunities for "holding forth the word of Life."

Really, we must have pressed home to us the very real truth that there is an alternative to this business of advancing the kingdom of God in this world. It is that either we press ahead and gain new possessions for Christ or we shall experience the regret of seeing the cause of holiness shut out of what could have become a fruitful harvest field.

It is the heartfelt desire and avowed determination of the Home Missionary Board to seek ways and means to carry out a program of expansion and progress. Believe me when I say that we have carried the burden of District Home Missions on our hearts. Days and hours have been spent in the pursuit of the goal that is set before us.

Our efforts as a board have been concentrated on several projects during the past year.

At Rumbley, Md. we were privileged to purchase the lot on which the new church is built and present it to the church as a token of the interest and concern of the District in their forward step.

After much deliberation the board moved toward an agreement whereby we might launch a new Pilgrim work in Kenton, Del. At the last minute the door was providentially closed, at least for the present.

Probably the major concentration of effort was placed on the work that has been launched at Glen Burnie, Md. The work there, under the leadership of Rev. Chas. Heckman, has held the interest of Eastern Pilgrims since its inception. It is an organized church. However, because of the potential that is found in this suburban community, the Board has felt a desire to assist in anyway in seeing progress made. Definite and constructive plans have been made in two financial areas.

First—A commitment has been made to loan the church, on a promissory note, the sum of \$3000. This will assist them when they begin their building program.

Second—We have also worked out a fair plan of financial assistance for the incoming pastor.

The Board has acted in an advisory capacity to assist in any decisions that relate to this Board's realm of activity.

Your prayers are solicited for the advance of the work of District Home Missions. To the West and the North of us are largely untouched areas. Let us respond to the challenge of God. "Ye have compassed this mountain long enough, turn you northward" or westward or wherever the shades of night prevail and men are bound in sin's slavery. To these let us carry the message of light and of liberty.

REVEREND GEORGE LINDLEY HELSBY

In the hall where hang the shields of God's warriors who die in valiant battle, there has lately been added one scarred by fifty-odd years of warfare. It was laid by on January 14, 1958 as God granted honorable discharge to Rev. G. L. Helsby. Born near Trappe, Md. on September 7, 1881, he was converted and led into the experience of heart holiness at the age of eighteen in a tent meeting at Landing Neck. He was educated in the public schools of Maryland and studied for the ministry at God's Bible School in Cincinnati, Ohio. The churches he served as pastor are at Salisbury, Md.; Denton, Md.; Milton and Cherryville, Pa.; Gloverville, New York and Trappe, Md. He also served one term as District Superintendent in the Eastern District. For several years he was a member of the Board of Directors of Eastern Pilgrim College at Allentown, Pa. During the years he filled important offices in the district organization.



He is survived by his widow, (Mrs.) Jennie B. Helsby; three sons, Meredith, Philip and Robert and a daughter, (Mrs.) Esther Erny.

REVEREND MAYME PARKER MILLS

Sister Mills was born at Woolford, Maryland and later moved to Cambridge. She was converted as a young woman and identified herself with the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Sister Mills was musically talented and with much zeal used her lovely alto voice, trumpet, and trombone for the Lord's work. For more than twenty years she and Mrs. Oscar Ewell, (nee, Winifred Mears), traveled as co-laborers in the Gospel as members of the "Vickers Evangelistic Party," headed by the late Wm. H. Vickers. The group traveled from Boston to North Carolina in pioneer work. Persecutions were many but Sister Mills was never happier than when on the battle field for the Lord.

In 1934 she married to Mr. Wilby Mills of Bishop's Head, Md., who passed away in May 1956.

Sister Mills was ordained August 5, 1946. She served as Pastor at Bishop's Head for several years. 1—Lost

2—Be it resolved that both the Examining and Education Boards meet at 9:00 a.m. the first Friday of June each year at Denton Camp Ground and that all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting be included in the minutes with the other important dates of meetings.

3—Be it resolved that with a vision "Toward tomorrow" that the District determine as goals, two new churches in the next Conference year and a gain to the district of ninety five (95) new members.

- 4—Be it resolved that there be a Home Missionary Board composed of the District Council with the District Superintendent as Chairman and the duties of this board shall be as follows:

To promote extensive Home Missionary Activities in the undeveloped areas of our district

To investigate thoroughly the prospects of new fields

To place qualified workers where they deem it advisable and render support within the limits of the Home Missionary Fund.

- 5—Whereas there seems to be a lack of understanding among pastors concerning the reception of members who have been divorced and remarried—

Be it resolved that we have an open declaration from the leaders of this conference as to the interpretation of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church relative to this issue.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE OF THE 1958 CONFERENCE

Resolution No. 1 — Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 8 be replaced by the following:

1. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.
2. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
3. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
4. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
5. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
6. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
7. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.

This assessment shall be based on the past years average attendance.

Resolution No. 2 — Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 1, p. 38 be made to read as follows:

The United Stewardship Fund shall be \$8.00 per member and our District Budget shall be set at \$3.25 per member making a total of \$11.25 per year. This shall be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer.

Resolution No. 3 — Inasmuch as we voted to continue the printing of the Eastern Pilgrim Be it resolved that the cost of \$50.00 per month be rotated among the following District funds, namely:

1. District Budget, 2. District Home Missions, 3. District S. S.
4. District Y. P., 5. District Camp.

Resolution No. 4 — Be it resolved the District S. S. Prom. Sec'y, receive \$25.00 per year as a token of the Appreciation of the conference for his services.

STANDING RULES

- No. 1. The United Stewardship Fund shall be \$8.00 per member per year and our District Budget shall be set at \$3.25 per member per year making a total of \$11.25 per year. This amount shall be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer.
- No. 2. The Conference shall accept the Pension Plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 4 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.

- No. 3. Each Church shall pay into the District Treasury 5% of all Regular Offerings (Sunday morning and evening and Prayer Meeting). This amount to be sent in monthly. This 5% shall be apportioned as follows: 60% for District Budget; 25% for District indebtedness; and 15% for District Home Missions.
- No. 4. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$75.00 per week and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct three revival meetings each year with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.
- No. 5. Each Church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member each visit.
- No. 6. The District Secretary and Treasurer shall receive \$85.00 and \$200.00 respectively plus postage per year.
- No. 7. The District Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year.
- No. 8. The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:
- a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.
 - b. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
 - c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
 - d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
 - e. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
 - f. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
 - g. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.
- This assessment shall be based on the past years average attendance.
- No. 9. Each local youth group shall send to the District Young People's Treasurer 5% of regular offerings; to be paid monthly.
- No. 10. The District shall contribute an amount equal to 4% of the District Superintendent's salary into the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 11. Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 12. Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 13. All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register

and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.

- No. 14. All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 15. A Bible College service shall be held the first Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 16. No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 17. A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 18. A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meetings for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 19. The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale, this practice to be continued.
- No. 20. No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been moved.
- No. 21. Each year there shall be a Preacher's Retreat held for a few days in the month of April for the purpose of cleaning up the camp grounds and making general repair. This retreat shall be directed by the District Council as to date and program and each minister on the district is required to attend.
- No. 22. Ladies taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly.
- No. 23. No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 24. One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 25. The District Home Missionary service shall not be held in conjunction with the General Home Missionary service.
- No. 26. The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 27. All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 28. A time shall be set for our District Home Missionary Service during the Camp by the Camp Committee.
- No. 29. The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and

- that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the council is unable to grant a transfer of lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 30. Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 31. Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 32. The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.

CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 33. Whereas the General Superintendent has ruled that the Conference Year ends when we close books, the books shall be closed June 30th and newly elected church board take office immediately. All reports must be in the hands of the Statistician 10 days before camp.
- No. 34. Sittings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30; Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 35. As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 36. No individual shall serve as a member of more than one of the following: Council, Examining Board, Education Board, and Resolution Committee.
- No. 37. The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 p.m. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 38. The committees appointed during the conference shall be given time to present their objectives and goals for the year during the camp.
- No. 39. The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.

- No. 40. The district secretary shall send, immediately following the district conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the district superintendent and to each local church treasurer.
- No. 41. Each zone of our District shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.
- No. 42. The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.
- No. 43. Quarterly report blanks shall be prepared and sent to the District Supt. by each church. Said blanks shall be furnished by the Conference Secretary.
- No. 44. The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P.M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified not later than 30 days prior to the conference.
- No. 45. There shall be a District Director of Missionary Societies appointed each year by the District Council; whose duty shall be to promote the missionary enterprise of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- No. 46. The goals for the Conference year shall be 2 new churches, and 95 new members.
- No. 47. The second Wednesday of each month shall be set aside as a day of fasting and praying for the Forward Movement effort in our District.
- No. 48. Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- No. 49. An Honor Roll shall be provided by the District which shall list the names of the churches that reach their yearly goals, and an appropriate award given to those churches listed thereon at the Annual Conference.
- No. 50. Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 51. Each church shall endeavor to contribute on the basis of 25c per member per month to raise our budget for Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 52. The rate of mileage paid by the District for District travel shall be .07 per mile.
- No. 53. The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A.M. the first Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.

- No. 54. The Home Missionary Board shall be composed of the members of the District Council with the District Superintendent as the Chairman. The Executive Branch of the Council shall constitute the administrative agency of this Board and the Advisory Members of the Council and the Pastors of the churches on the district receiving support from the District shall meet twice each year with the executive agency in advisory capacity.
- No. 55. The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 56. A District Historian shall be appointed to compile and edit the record of the history of church work in the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. He shall be appointed by the Council or the District Superintendent.

MINUTES

- No. 57. The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 58. The price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 59. The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.
- No. 60. Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.

DISTRICT BUSINESS

- No. 61. Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 62. No annual church business meeting shall be held on Sunday.
- No. 63. Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
- No. 64. Each Pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, other than camp and church related business.
- No. 65. The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 66. Each Pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

- No. 67. A District Youth Camp shall be conducted annually on a date set by the Youth Committee and the District Council. The Camp shall be held at a time to include 4 evenings and 3 days.
- No. 68. The District Youth Conference shall be held annually the first Saturday of Denton Camp at 8:30 A.M.

- No. 69. There shall be an annual institute of local youth leaders held during the last week of September for the purpose of defining goals, training leadership, and promoting a stronger youth organization in our district, under the direction of the Executive Youth Council.
- No. 70. The various committees that are necessary for Youth Conference such as Resolutions, Ways and Means, and other committees deemed advisable, shall be set up on a staggered basis, (i.e. two members selected for a three year term, two members selected for a two year term and one member selected for a one year term) by the Executive Youth Council with the chairman of said committees appointed by the District Youth President.
- No. 71. Each local youth group shall send 5% of the regular offerings to the District Youth Treasurer. Said amount shall be sent quarterly.
- No. 72. Each Zone shall contribute 10% of the Zone Rally offerings to the District Youth Treasurer. Said amount to be sent quarterly.
- No. 73. The District Youth President shall be paid the sum of \$50.00 per year, plus postage and travel expenses at the rate of 7c per mile in the interest of District Youth.
- No. 74. The District Youth Council shall be reimbursed at the rate of 7c per mile to attend the District Youth Council meetings.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

- No. 75. A District Sunday School Rally shall be held on July 4.
- No. 76. Two Sunday School banners shall be awarded at the district rallies, one on the basis of the percentage of enrollment present, and the second one on the basis of the number present in all sessions, multiplied by the number of miles traveled.
- No. 77. The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$25.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the Conference for his services.

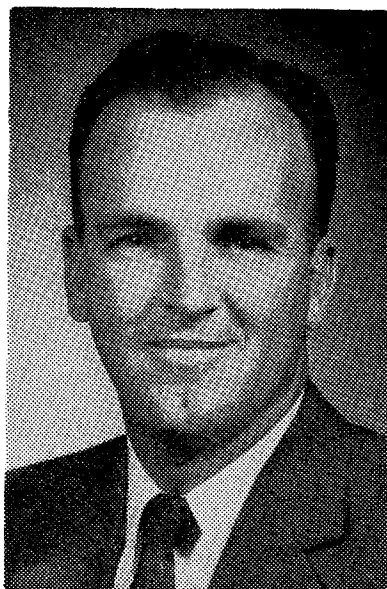

CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

No. 5 — Be it resolved that the District Youth President authorized to attend the Annual Youth President's Conference held in Indiana in September; and be it further resolved that his travel expenses be shared with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary who will be attending the same conference.

No. 6 — Be it resolved that the members of the District Youth Council be reimbursed at the rate of .07¢ per mile to attend the District Youth Council meetings.
