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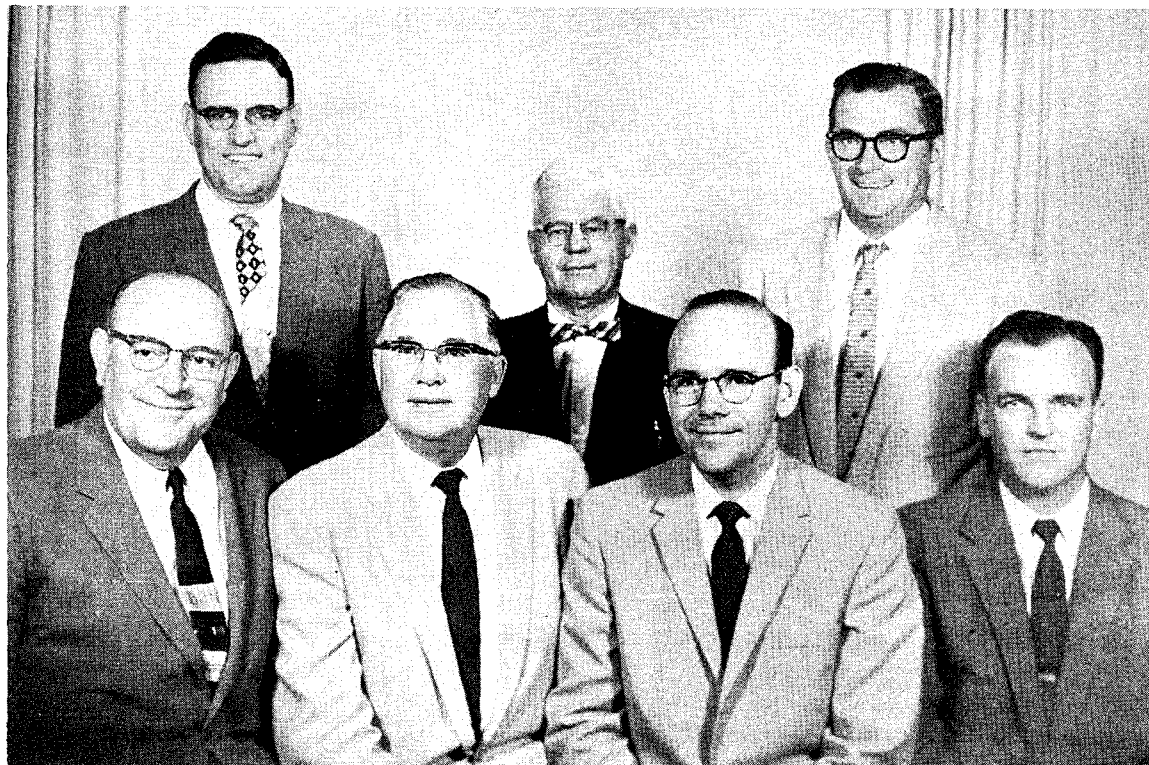

CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS**First Sitting July 23, 1959****1:30 P. M.**

The fifty-fifth annual conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Camp Ground in Denton, Md., at 1:30 P. M. on Thursday, July 23, 1959 with Rev. J. D. Abbott, District Supt. presiding.

Mrs. Horseman served as pianist and Rev. Linwood Horseman led the conference in singing, "Love Lifted Me," and "Let The Beauty of Jesus Be Seen In Me."

Mr. Paul Vincent, lay delegate from Milton, Del., led the conference in prayer.

Rev. Abbott, then presented, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, General Supt., of this area of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and presiding officer of this fifty-fifth conference.

Rev. Snyder spoke briefly of his recent trip to Africa and his visiting the missionary work. Following these interesting remarks, he read a passage of Scripture from Rev. 3:7-13 and brought a message on the three things that are the same in the 7 messages to the churches in Asia. Our hearts were greatly stirred as Bro. Snyder challenged us to, "Hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches,"

Awards were given to the Cambridge Church for having the highest numerical gain and to the Bethlehem Church for having the highest percentage gain during the conference year. Further recognition was given to all Sunday Schools in the district who reached their goal of 8% gain in average attendance.

The reception committee presented to the conference, Rev. Melvin Dieter, Acting President of Eastern Pilgrim College, Rev. McCray Holmes, Pastor at Easton, Md., Rev. and Mrs. Leo Force, Pastor at Trappe, Md., and Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Shores.

They were granted honorary seats in the conference bar.

The Director of the Missionary Societies in the District gave her report and it was accepted.

A motion carried to recess until 7:55 with the understanding

that the Ordination Service would begin at 8:00 P. M.

Following the recess the report of the Educational and Examining Board was given and a motion carried to approve the recommendation of the Council to receive this report.

At the hour appointed, the conference was called to order for the Ordination service. Members of the District Council took part in the reading of the Scriptures and prayer. Rev. Abbott then presented to the Presiding Officer of our Conference the ministers to be ordained. They were Rev. Charles Carroll, Rev. Leo Force and Rev. Aldene Bradley.

It was also stated by the District Superintendent that the council recommends leniency to the delinquent churches this year and that all Pastors and delegates shall have voice and vote in the conference.

Rev. Melvin Snyder then spoke briefly about Eastern Pilgrim College and then presented to the conference, Rev. Melvin Dieter, Acting President of Eastern Pilgrim College. Rev. Dieter brought a very good message about the PAST, THE PRESENT, THE PROBLEMS, AND THE PROMISE as they relate to the College.

Following his message the election of officers continued. Ballots were cast and the following elections took place:

A motion to adjourn carried. The closing prayer of the fifty-fifth annual conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was offered by our Presiding Officer, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin Snyder, Ministerial and Lay delegates!

On the occasion of this 55th annual district conference we meet specifically to do business for God and His Church. Our deliberations shall not involve world politics, government policies or scientific attempts or achievements. Such items are not unrelated to the church, but, instead, they are only indirectly associated. They are of great interest to us because we are world creatures and thus involved in the complexities of living here. However, we represent that great host of dedicated people the world around who, saved from sin and washed in the Blood of the Lamb, give themselves as co-workers with and witnesses for Christ. To labor to win the lost, to lift the low lives of sinners to the high plane of christian living and to establish the church — these are our committments. We meet to report, to consider plans for the year before us and to obtain a fresh anointing from God.

PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 148 times, visited each church two or more times, officiated at 4 weddings and 1 funeral, christened 1 child, dedicated 1 organ, 3 churches, 2 parsonages and 1 Sunday School annex, participated in 1 parsonage mortgage burning service, conducted 1 communion service, 1 baptismal service and helped in another. In the line of my duties I presided at 2 ministerial conventions, 14 council and Home Missionary Board meetings and 10 sessions of special meetings addressed by our General Superintendent; attended 2 meetings of the Eastern Pilgrim College Board of Directors, 1 meeting of the College Executive Committee and the Commencement exercises, 2 meetings of the Owosso College Board of Trustees, 4 Sunday School Board meetings, 4 zone meetings with the promotional secretary and Dr. London, 4 Youth Council meetings and 1 youth institute, 2 meetings of the ministerial convention committee, 2 General Board meetings in Indianapolis, 3 sessions of the district missionary society meeting at Gumboro and was present for the meetings of the district Examining and Educational boards. Many days have been given in work at our home missionary project at Seaford and on our camp grounds here. I have served as editor of Eastern Pilgrim and published 11 monthly issues. My travelling has totaled an estimated 30,000 miles of which amount mileage from the district has been received for 14,800 miles. My salary is paid to date. During the past year I have attempted to serve you and those you represent in such a manner as would please God and those under whom I labor.

Since one in this office is so utterly dependent upon the help of his fellow ministers I should like to commend them for their cooperation and assistance without which our efforts would have been in vain. The district council and all boards and committees have worked admirably and according to their assignments. It has been a privilege to work with them and to serve you this year.

CALLED HOME

On October 4, 1958 Rev. Lemuel Savage passed away at his home in Blades, Delaware. Throughout the years of his service in the christian ministry Brother Savage was indeed a holiness preacher and an earnest seeker of souls. "Called Home" best explains the experience of God's servants at the time of death — 'Called Home to be with the Lord.'

FINANCES

Complete reports will be given by district treasurer, Rev. Mark H. Bowman and district statistician, Rev. George Melvin, however some observations may be noted here. A real effort has been made by some to pay all budgets in full. It is likely the records will show that this has been our greatest year with the highest percentage paid on the assessment in our history. In some cases of budget delinquency the fault may have been the lack of a definite and workable plan for monthly collections and in stallments. In such instances let each pastor and official board come to grips with the matter and determine to be a one hundred per center in the new conference year. The United Stewardship Fund of \$8 per member per year and the district budget of \$3.25 per member annually are coupled in this district and known as the Annual Budget. Thus the scope of good provided through payment of the budget is even wider than usual. There may be a few cases where it is impossible to pay in full but there are many churches capable of improvement. It is my opinion that 1959-'60 will show marked increases in this.

A matter that is of great consequence to the good of the work is that of support for our ministers. Often it has been a matter of political note that the public school teachers are the poorest paid of those in any of the professions. However, by checking the annual reports coming to the district office by July 18th. I found that the average weekly salary of our pastor is \$39.58. With all the increased costs of present day living, CAN ANY BE LOWER THAN THAT? As a result of the deplorable financial status of the ministers far too many are forced to seek other employment to supplement the inadequate support received from the church. Consequently, instead of the church having a full-time pastor and the community a full-time worker seeking the lost among them they must be content with his off-hours and depleted energy after he has given his full-time to secular employment. Though it is unlikely the conference would wish to set the salaries of the pastors I bring it to your attention with the hope that upon returning to your home churches you might attempt to bring the pastor's salary in line with the needs and just deserts.

PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS

Since you have been kept fully informed of all local progress reports through our district paper I shall confine my account to certain district items.

In my last report to you I stated that the furnace in the district parsonage was in need of repair or replacement. The district council had a new General automatic system installed September 16 at a cost of \$750. This is a fine improvement in the district parsonage facilities.

On May 4 a 1948 chevrolet 1½ ton dump truck was purchased for use on the camp grounds. After a complete motor overhaul, installation of a new tire, complete paint job, licensing and insurance costs the district has an investment of \$800. Without a doubt this will prove to be a wise investment for our interests here.

Since obtaining the truck and by its use 150 loads of fill dirt have been hauled on our grounds. This is an improvement and at a total cost of only \$175. The driving has all been done by district ministers for which they have received no pay.

The Rev. H. P. Adams Memorial Dormitory has been given a coat of twenty gallons of paint, ½ of the girls dormitory has been re-roofed and the entire roof of the evangelists cottage recovered.

The memorial park benches program presented to the constituents of Denton Camp in 1958 has proceeded quite well. 28 have been assembled and arranged for use this year — this has been done at a cost of about \$17 per bench. This same bench if purchased on the market would probably cost \$30 or more. By purchasing the form with which to make the re-inforced concrete ends and by the labor being donated an excellent, durable, all weather and economical bench is provided for our convenience. 22 more were subscribed for and will be built this coming year.

DISTRICT DEPARTMENTS

In most cases a full and more complete report will be given by the heads of the departments.

YOUTH

Rev. Wm. H. Miller, district Youth President, his council and zone leaders have sponsored an active and aggressive program this year. Doubtless the most outstanding part of that program has been the Youth Quiz. Though many more young people should have participated in this scripture memorization effort it can be said that it has resulted in an intensified reading of the Word and concentration upon the same. May that seed bear good fruit in the lives of Pilgrim Youth.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Already in Eastern Pilgrim you have seen the yearly average of every Sunday School in the district. True, some have shown consistent losses month after month, yet there are others who just as regularly showed evidence of vision, burden, activity and success in reaching people for Christ through this arm of the church. 26 schools gained (3 of which are new), 18 sustained losses and 1 remained the same. A total of 45 schools are now being conducted in the district. District-wise the record

shows a 6% increase. Promotional Secretary, Rev. Paul D. Dieter has commendably led this work and in conjunction with the Sunday School Board planned and promoted a program adaptable in each local group.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Considerable interest has been shown by the district in establishing a work in Glen Burnie. A milestone was reached September 30th when a parsonage was purchased at 528 Munroe Circle in Glen Burnie. Regular monthly payments on this property are being made. The average Sunday School attendance for the year was 42, reflecting a numerical gain of 11. Your giving for district home missions continues to help in this home missionary outreach.

During the year 2 branch Sunday Schools have been started by "Mother Churches". Goldsboro church reached out to the northeast and opened a fine brick church building called Thomas's Chapel for Sunday afternoon classes and preaching services. Rev. Lida Brasure and Rev. James Jones are jointly carrying on the work. The average attendance has been 25.

Baltimore II has reached over in a southeasterly direction to conduct Sunday School in the Brooklyn area of the city. Rev. Marguerite Schwartz and her lay people have been blessed in their labors and have had an average attendance of 23. May God increase their ministry more and more and help that many other expansion programs shall be launched in this our fertile field.

November 3, 1958 the District Council Home Missionary Board contracted to purchase a church and parsonage property in Seaford, Delaware at a total cost of \$6,500. \$4,000 was obtained from a Seaford bank and secured by a mortgage on the two properties in that community. Monthly installments of \$48.75 over an 8 year period have been arranged. \$2,500 was borrowed from Denton National Bank and the district parsonage given in mortgage. A 10 year schedule of repayment has been agreed upon with semi-annual payments of \$125 plus interest. Many days were given by ministers and some laymen to prepare the parsonage and church for occupancy. Approximately \$1,000 was spent for materials alone. The property is deeded according to the Manual and held by the district until a local organization shall be effected. Rev. and Mrs. George Gilmore accepted the call to serve as home missionary workers in this new field. They have assumed the tasks commendably and God is blessing their labors with an average attendance of 24 and some spiritual victories. It should be noted here that considerable foundation was laid for this effort by two neighboring pastors, Rev. Robert Darsch and Rev. Russell Coverdale. Your district home missionary dollars have helped to this point. The district commitments to our home missionary program for the 1959-'60 conference year amount to approximately \$350 per month. This can be financed without it becoming a heavy burden to anyone by all subscribing to the Penny-A-Day calendar plan already in operation. By the cooperation of all members and some friends at least \$425 per month could be realized from this source alone. It can be done! Let us do it for God and souls.

CALLS FOR ACTION

The tremendous task that is ours, the ominous threats of evil powers and the imminent coming of our Lord thrust upon us an urgency that calls for action. As I see it, the call is for

1 — OPERATION RESCUE. Let us early bring our children to Christ and into the church through junior membership. Let us attempt to rescue all people everywhere from the ravages of sin and bring them to our Lord and Saviour.

2 — INCREASED EMPHASIS upon training our youth for christian service whether for general or specialized fields.

3 — A LIVABLE WAGE for every pastor and every pastor in full-time service.

4 — AN OUTREACH into new communities to begin branch Sunday Schools and establish additional preaching points TO REACH MORE SOULS FOR CHRIST AND THE CHURCH.

5 — A CONSCIENTIOUS attempt to pay our budgets in full so that a full salvation program may be carried through our Zion.

6 — 100% COOPERATION with the district home missionary program by giving at least A PENNY A DAY. Let us bear in mind that "the church's future begins today."

7 — A CLEAR AND CONSTANT stating of the Bible doctrine of heart holiness and daily evidence of the same.

8 — AN ESTABLISHING of our people in God in the midst of the turmoil, strife and instability of 20th century living.

To help us in these and other worthy goals we shall be privileged to have our Board of General Superintendents to visit us in the district October 8-11 and from October 14-26. Mr. Leonard Whipple will be with us to give instruction and aid in lay visitation, personal evangelism and soul winning. Mark these dates now! A detailed program will be made available in due time.

The words of John DeKoker to the Rev. John Wesley in October 1749 express my feelings for you: "I pray that you continue in the very same course in life and proceed onward in it. Only fight that good fight of pure, sincere, and evangelical faith, and subdue no other enemies than the corrupt flesh and its worldly desires. Avoid, more than you would a rabid dog or a venomous serpent, the multiplying of dogmas and disputations about things unnecessary. These have been the two strategems of satan by which he has caused the church, insensibly and by degrees, to err from evangelical simplicity and purity. May the kingdom of satan and of his emissaries every day be destroyed yet more and more, and the kingdom of God and His Son be erected in all hearts."

May it be so in Jesus' Name!

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

To this 55th Annual Conference of the Eastern District, Sunday School Greetings:

Every part of God's work in which God's people are participating should be considered both a privilege and a challenge. To think that God has called us to be associated with Himself in rescuing men from the clutches of sin and Satan. In the light of this staggering relationship — an arm in arm intimacy with the Divine — it is our responsibility to love and exert our energies in any institution or any method, no matter how humble its origin or seemingly foolish its activity if it produces the salvation of the lost.

The Sunday School, characterized by its informality, its unrestricted membership, its warmth, its laughing, and even at times, unruly children is one of God's ordained institutions for reaching the lost. Six little children got into a boat, and were swept out to sea. All that could, went out in search of them. Great anxiety and concern filled the hearts of the people in that community. All night, the children were drifting on the cruel sea. The next day, a fisherman rescued them. Then the cry was heard as it echoed through the town. "They are safe!" "They are safe!" The work of the Sunday School is to rescue, not six, but millions of children and adults who are drifting to ruin. Much of the effort of the Sunday School has been crude and blundering, but brethren, it must be admitted, the Sunday School has been a soul-saving institution and that is all that really matters. 70% of the organized churches in America had their beginning in a Sunday School. The Sunday School produces nearly 90% of the membership increases in established churches. It is the great arm that feeds the advancing church of Jesus Christ. In the light of all this it challenges us to greater efforts, lest we fail and those of our communities who are still in sins darkness, fail to see the Gospel Light and be lost.

God has blessed the Eastern District Sunday Schools, with the 13th year of uninterrupted growth. From an average attendance of 1620 in 1946 we have reached an average of 3317 for the present conference year. This is a numerical increase of 1697 for the 13 year period and a percentage increase of 105 percent. The numerical increase for this year is 180 making a percentage gain of 6 percent, with a total of 166,901 scholars attending District Sunday Schools this past year. Our gains have not been outstand-

ing but year after year this sort of thing spells PROGRESS in capital letters.

We now have 45 Sunday Schools, which is an increase of three over last year. One located at Seaford which now has a full time pastor, and two branch Sunday Schools. One located between Wyoming and Marydel at Chapel Point under the direction of the Goldsboro Church, and one at Brooklyn, Md., under the direction of the Baltimore II Church. May God bless these for their efforts and may His blessing continue to rest upon these new schools.

Our congratulations for outstanding achievements this year go to our Sunday Schools at Cambridge and Bethlehem. The Cambridge Pilgrims made the highest numerical gain with an increase of 25 over last year. We salute you Rev. Bowman and your good people who have labored so faithfully to bring this about. The Sunday School with the highest percentage gain was Bethlehem with a 131 percent gain. Congratulations to you Rev. Hudson and to your Sunday School staff.

We wish now to honor the following Sunday Schools for their gain of eight percent or more in Sunday School attendance which was the goal set for each church by the District Sunday School Board. Bethlehem with 131%, Glen Burnie — 35% Mardela — 28%, Easton 23%, Greensboro — 23%, Bozman — 22%, Greenwood — 19%, Rumbley — 18%, Tilghman — 16%, Delmar — 11%, Harrington — 11%, Bishop's Head — 9%, Cambridge — 9%, Centreville — 9%, Milton — 9%, Baltimore 1 — 8%, and Milford — 8%. These we honor for their effort which is as it should be, but many of you who have received no recognition have worked just as hard. May God richly reward you for your every effort.

One of the highlights of the year was the District Sunday School tour, held Nov. 5 thru 8, with Dr. and Mrs. A. S. London. Our hearts were stirred and challenged as he spoke and each rally concluded with prayer around the altar asking God for an increased vision and greater concern for our scholars. 36 churches were represented, 33 pastors, 191 teachers and officers, and a total attendance of 603.

On April 17 a District Sunday School Convention was held at Seaford, Del., with Dr. Paul F. Elliott and Rev. Joseph Brown as the workers. Almost 250 people attended the two sessions and a fine spirit prevailed.

For the Annual Sunday School Revival (Easter to Mother's Day) the Sunday School Board paired up all of our schools on the basis of their previous seven month average. The winner in each group was the Sunday

School with the highest percentage gain over their previous seven month average. The two leading Sunday Schools for this period were — Milford with a 62 percent gain, and Harrington with a numerical gain of 61. We published weekly statistical reports which kept all informed as to the progress being made.

The ninth annual Sunday School Convention held here on Denton Camp Ground July 4, heard the Rev. J. A. Grout, Jr., speak in both sessions. The Exmore church received the Mileage Banner and Bethlehem church the banner for having the highest percentage of enrollment present.

We conducted two Sunday School sessions here at camp last year.

To encourage the starting of Branch Sunday Schools the Sunday School Board has offered to pay for the literature for one three-month period for each new school. This we were happy to do for the Seaford Sunday School and the Goldsboro Branch Sunday School.

By way of a brief personal report, I have presided over five District Sunday School Board meetings. It was my happy privilege to attend the Promotional Secretaries Conference at Indianapolis, Indiana last September. The Inspiration and ideas received have been greatly appreciated.

It has been a good year, but it is now history. There is still a lot of room for improvement and advancement in our Sunday School work. we have by no means fulfilled our obligation to God or completed the task He has given each of us to do. One Evening, years ago, in the Province of Alberta, Canada, a happy father and mother went out for a stroll through the nearby wheat field with their little boy. As they wandered through the field, each thought the other held the hand of their child. All at once they realized that the boy was not with them. They called, but there was no answer. They became more and more disturbed, then terrified, and hunted everywhere with no results.

Finally, the father went back to the village and got a searching party to assist them. Many willing helpers searched all night without avail. After many hours, someone finally suggested that they join hands and cover the entire grain field, and not leave a single square foot uncovered in this last effort.

They joined hands and soon came across the body of the child, and a hush spread over them all, because they had found the child too late. As the group stood there in silence, with bowed heads, someone was heard to whisper: "If only we had joined hands before it was too late!"

My prayer is that in this new year we will join hands and unite our hearts in earnest prayer as we work together in this holy effort to rescue a few more from sin to Christ before it is too late.

All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.

STANDING RULES

- No. 2. The Conference shall accept the Pension plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 4 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.
- No. 3. Each Church shall pay into the District Treasury 5% of all Regular Offerings (Sunday morning and evening and Prayer meeting). This amount to be sent in monthly. This 5% shall be apportioned as follows: 60% for District Budget; 25% for District indebtedness; and 15% for District Home Missions.
- No. 4. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$80.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of the Camp Meeting Fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct 3 revival meetings each year with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.
- No. 5. Each Church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member each visit.
- No. 6. The District Secretary and Treasurer shall receive \$85.00 and \$200.00 respectively plus postage per year.
- No. 7. The District Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year.

- No. 8. The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:
- a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.
 - b. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
 - c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
 - d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
 - e. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
 - f. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
 - g. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.
- This assessment shall be based on the past years average attendance.
- No. 9. Each local youth group shall send to the District Young People's Treasurer 5% of regular offerings; to be paid monthly.
- No. 10. The District shall contribute an amount equal to 4% of the District Superintendent's salary into the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 11. Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 12. Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 13. All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.
- No. 14. All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 15. A Bible College service shall be held the 2nd Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 16. No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 17. A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 18. A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meeting for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 19. The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale, this practice to be continued.
- No. 20. No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been moved.

- No. 21. All active district ministers and evangelists shall give 2 eight hour days of work on the camp grounds each year and in the event any minister is unable to participate in this work program, he be assessed at the rate of \$10.00 per day.
- No. 22. Ladies taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly.
- No. 23. No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 24. One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 25. The District Home Missionary service shall not be held in conjunction with the General Home Missionary service.
- No. 26. The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 27. All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 28. A time shall be set for our District Home Missionary Service during the Camp by the Camp Committee.
- No. 29. The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrim or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the council is unable to grant a transfer of lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 30. Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 31. Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 32. The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.

CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 33. The Conference year shall close on May 31st and all reports shall be postmarked no later than July 1st, and mailed to the District Superintendent and the District Statistician.
- No. 34. Sittings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30; Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 35. As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 36. No individual shall serve as a member of more than one of the following: Council, Examining Board, Education Board, and Resolution Committee.
- No. 37. The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 p. m. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 38. The committees appointed during the conference shall be given time to present their objectives and goals for the year during the camp.
- No. 39. The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 40. The district secretary shall send, immediately following the district conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the District Superintendent and to each local Church Treasurer.
- No. 41. Each zone of our District shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.
- No. 42. The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.
- No. 43. Quarterly report blanks shall be prepared and sent to the District Superintendent by each church. Said blanks shall be furnished by the Conference Secretary.
- No. 44. The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P. M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified not later than 30 days prior to the conference.
- No. 45. There shall be a District Director of Missionary Societies appointed each year by the District Council; whose duty shall be to promote the missionary enterprise of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- No. 46. The goals for the Conference year shall be 2 new churches, and 95 new members.
- No. 47. The second Wednesday of each month shall be set aside as a day of fasting and praying for the Forward Movement effort in our District.

- No. 48. Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- No. 49. An Honor Roll shall be provided by the District which shall list the names of the churches that reach their yearly goals, and an appropriate award given to those churches listed thereon at the Annual Conference.
- No. 50. Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 51. The rate of mileage paid by the District for travel in district interests shall be .07c per mile.
- No. 52. The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A. M. the first Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.
- No. 53. The Home Missionary Board shall be composed of the members of the District Council with the District Superintendent as the Chairman. The Executive Branch of the Council shall constitute the administrative agency of this Board and the Advisory Members of the Council and the Pastors of the churches on the district receiving support from the District shall meet twice each year with the executive agency in advisory capacity.
- No. 54. The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 55. A District Historian shall be appointed to compile and edit the record of the history of church work in the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. He shall be appointed by the Council or the District Superintendent.
- No. 57. The District Council shall be the District Trustees and the executive members of the Council are the negotiating signers of all District transactions.
- No. 58. The conference bar shall include the first ten rows in the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform.

MINUTES

- No. 59. The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 60. The price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 61. The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.
- No. 62. Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.

DISTRICT BUSINESS

- No. 63. Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 64. No annual church business meeting shall be held on Sunday.
- No. 65. Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
- No. 66. Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, other than camp and church related business.
- No. 67. The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 68. Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

- No. 69. A District Youth Camp shall be conducted annually on a date set by the Youth Committee and the District Council. The Camp shall be held at a time to include 4 evenings and 3 days.
- No. 70. The District Youth Conference shall be held annually the first Saturday of Denton Camp at 8:30 A.M.
- No. 71. There shall be an annual institute of local youth leaders held during the last week of September for the purpose of defining goals, training leadership, and promoting a stronger youth organization in our district, under the direction of the Executive Youth Council.
- No. 72. The various committees that are necessary for Youth Conference such as Resolutions, Ways and Means, and other committees deemed advisable, shall be set up on a staggered basis, (i.e. two members selected for a three year term, two members selected for a two year term and one member selected for a one year term) by the Executive Youth Council with the chairman of said committees appointed by the District Youth President.
- No. 73. Each local youth group shall send 5% of the regular offerings to the District Youth Treasurer. Said amount shall be sent quarterly.
- No. 74. Each Zone shall contribute 10% of the Zone Rally offering to the District Youth Treasurer. Said amount to be sent quarterly.
- No. 75. The District Youth President shall be paid the sum of \$50.00 per year, plus postage and travel expenses at the rate of 7c per mile in the interest of District Youth.
- No. 76. The District Youth Council shall be reimbursed at the rate of 7c per mile to attend the District Youth Council meetings.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

- No. 77. A District Sunday School Rally shall be held on July 4.
- No. 78. Two Sunday School banners shall be awarded at the district rallies, one on the basis of the percentage of enrollment present, and the second one on the basis of the number present in all sessions, multiplied by the number of miles traveled .
- No. 79. The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$25.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the Conference for his services.

CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The annual conference of the Youth Societies of the Pilgrim Holiness Church representing the Eastern District was held at the District Camp Grounds at Denton, Maryland. The conference opened at 8:40 Saturday morning, July 25, 1959, by singing the following three choruses; Every Day With Jesus, My Lord Knows The Way and The Lord is My Shepherd. Reverend Charles Carroll led the singing. Reverend George Melvin then led the conference in a good season of prayer.

The presiding Officer, Reverend J. D. Abbott was presented by Reverend William H. Miller, the district Youth President. Reverend Abbott expressed the regrets of the conference for the absence of our General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, Dr. Paul Elliott. He has taken on the duties of President of Owosso College along with the Youth work and could not be here to conduct our conference.

Reverend Abbott read the first chapter of First Timothy from the Amplified New Testament. He spoke very briefly urging the members of the conference to keep God's will first and foremost, to be spiritual, and maintain a spirit of unity.

Roll call was read by the secretary, changed, and completed to correspond with the current names of those in attendance.

A motion was made by Reverend Burgess that the first seven rows in the center section serve as the conference bar. It was seconded, carried, and placed into effect. All others were requested to sit elsewhere.

The Youth President for the District, Reverend Miller, was introduced and gave a fine report. The Youth Zone Rallies averaged 113 in attendance for the year. The Quiz was put into use and was quite successful and the 1958 Youth Camp was very prosperous in that sixty-four young people found help at an altar of prayer. The District President concluded his report by formally resigning the office.

Reverend Wilbur Bubb, District Youth Treasurer, gave his report with a final balance of \$212.88. Reverend Melvin made the motion to accept the report. Note was made that the Youth Camp nearly carried it's own expenses and was well worth much more than it cost. The report was accepted with appreciation.

The five Zone Leaders gave their reports in the following order and were accepted:

The Northern Zone, John M. Mervine, leader.

The Eastern Zone, Reverend Robrt Darsch, leader.

The Southern Zone, Reverend Paul Pierpoint, leader.

Absentee report given by Rev. Holden

The Tidewater Zone, Reverend Lindy Adams, leader.

The Western Shore Zone, Reverend Charles Carroll, leader.

All Youth Presidents in attendance were called to the platform; and each gave a very brief and inspiring report. Many new and interesting ideas for youth services were presented. Extra activities outside the church with the Christian Youth were made known; and the presiding officer made request that these be noted and be put to use.

A motion was presented by Reverend Holmes to recess for ten minutes and it was carried and completed.

The conference was resumed after the recess by the report from Reverend Bubb, chairman of th Ways and Means Committee.

Res. No. 1 That Resolution No. 4 for last year be deleted and it was adopted.

Res. No. 2 That the delinquent 5% quota be paid with the first quarter payment this fiscal year and it was adopted.

A motion was made by Reverend Bubb that Resolutions No. 4 and 5 on Page 65 of the Conference Journal be deleted and it was carried.

The next item of business was the election of Officers. The District Youth President appointed the following tellers: Paul Pritchett, Sam Martin, Reese Hurley, and Donald Hinshaw.

Reverend Holmes was elected on the first ballot, welcomed, and congratulated by Reverend Abbott. His acceptance speech displayed a wonderful degree of leadership and humbleness of spirit.

Reverend Robert Darsch was re-elected on the second ballot as District Youth Vice-President and was congratulated by Rev. Abbott.

Brother Ross was elected District Youth Treasurer on the second ballott. (Olney Ross later resigned, and Rev. George Melvin was appointed District Treasurer by the District Council.)

A resolution was presented by Reverend Holmes that the outgoing Youth President continue in office until the Youth Camp is completed. After much discussion, the motion was changed to hold the office only through Denton Camp. A vote was taken and carried that the substitute motion be adopted.

A motion was presented that hereafter the Youth President take office after Youth Camp. The motion was made by Reverend Bubb. After much discussion, it was moved and carried to be referred to the Youth Council.

John Mervine was re-elected as District Youth Secretary.

The conference then separated into Zone groups to elect Zone leaders and returned with the Following results:

The Northern Zone — Reverend Lida Brasure with 12 out of 19 votes.

The Southern Zone — Reverend Braden Shrieves with 4 out of 5 votes.

The Eastern Zone — Reverend Ruth Morris with 9 out of 15 votes.

The Tidewater Zone — Olney Ross with 11 out of 18 votes.

The Western Shore Zone — Reverend Carroll with 4 out of 6 votes.

The District Youth President announced the dates for the Zone that would be in charge of the Youth Services during Camp.

Mrs. Lindy Adams requested a ruling on whether the Tidewater Zone would be required to conduct the Quiz again since they had already conducted their's correctly. It was referred to the District Youth Council.

A motion was made and carried that all unfinished business be referred to the District Youth Council.

A closing motion that honorable recognition be given the outgoing President, Reverend Miller. Also honorable mention was made for the services of the District Superintendent in conducting the conference.

A motion to adjourn was carried after a brief exhortation by the District Superintendent to move forward in the year ahead.

The meeting adjourned by prayer from Reverend Holmes, the new District Youth President.
