# CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS FIRST SITTING, JULY 28, 1960

1:30 P. M.

The fifty-sixth annual conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Camp Ground in Denton, Md., with Rev. J. D. Abbott, District Superintendent presiding.

Mrs. Ruth Morris served as pianist as Rev. Leon Hynson led the conference in singing, "Deeper, Deeper" and "All For Jesus."

Mr. R. Lee Griffen, lay delegate from Trappe, Md., led the conference in prayer.

Rev. Abbott then presented 1st Lt. Wilbur Bubb, Chaplain, United States Air Force, San Antonia, Texas and a member of the Eastern District who read the Scripture lesson from the Amplified New Testament. The portion read was found in 1st. Peter 5.

Following the reading of this prescious portion of God's Word the members of the conference joined in singing, "Lord Lift Me up."

Dr. Wm. H. Neff, General Superintendent of the Eastern Area of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and Presiding Officer of this Conference was presented to the conference and welcomed to the same. Dr. Neff gave some very fitting remarks to the above mentioned Scripture.

The Secretary was then instructed to call the roll. The conference bar, having been established by past action was then given some consideration.

The reception committee presented the following ministers to the conference: Rev. Leon Hynson, Rev. J. A. Byrd, representative from Eastern Pilgrim College, and Rev. Edgar Haskins. A motion carried that they be given honorary seats within the conference bar.

Recommendations from the District Council on Ministerial transfers to our District were then given consideration. The following were approved: Rev. Miss Magdalene Bradford, from Kentucky District, Rev. Ray Chamberlain, Jr., from the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District. It was also noted that Rev. Edgar Haskins, and Rev. Leon Hynson will be received into the Conference pending receipt of their transfers.

The next order of business was the reading of reports. Rev. J. D. Abbott, our former District Superintendent, but now General Secretary of Sunday School and Youth of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, gave his excellent report. A motion carried to receive his report with gratitude and by a standing vote of appreciation. The conference joined in singing, "Blest Be the Tie that Binds."

A motion carried to have the District Treasurer's report at this time with the thought in mind of having the Auditing Committee's Report later. Rev. Mark H. Bowman gave a very clear and comprehensive report under the following divisions: A General Treasurer's Report, Home Missionary Report, and a Camp Meeting Report. A motion carried to receive the Treasurer's report with gratitude.

A further motion carried to recess for 10 minutes. Following the recess the Sunday School Promotional Secretary gave his report. A motion prevailed to receive his report. The Sunday School Secretary then presented awards to the following churches and their prespective Pastors who were named by the District Sunday School Committee as Sunday Schools of the Year. Laurel, Delaware, Pastor Reed and Ruth Morris, and Harrington, Delaware, Pastor, Wm. H. Miller.

The Laurel Sunday School also received two awards for the highest numerical and percentage gain in the District for the past conference year.

The following churches also were honored for reaching their gains of 8% or more in attendance which was the goal set by the District Sunday School Committee: Laurel, Ridgely, Saxis, Denton, Seaford, Bethlehem, Baltimore II, Goldsboro, Harrington, Milton, and Rumbley.

A further motion then carried that the Sunday School Secretary's report be incorporated in the District Conference Journal.

The District Director of Missionary Societies, Rev. Mrs. Lida Brasure gave her report and a motion carried to adopt this report.

The next report given was that of the District Statistician. A motion carried to receive the report with appreciation. The hour for adjourment was near and a motion carried after some discussion that the order of business for the evening session be the election of officers.

#### SECOND SITTING

#### THURSDAY, JULY 28, 1960

6:30 P. M.

The Rev. J. D. Abbott led the members of the conference in singing, "I Am Thine O Lord". Rev. J. A. Byrd was asked to lead in prayer. Dr. Neff, then gave some very practical remarks relative to active lay participation in District Conferences.

Rev. Abbott then appointed the following tellers: Revs. Darsch, Rimmer, Gilmore, Melvin, Hynson, Quillen, Schaltenbrand and Mr. Olney Ross.

Ballots were cast for the office of District Superintendent and resulted in the election of Rev. J. R. Mitchell as District Superintendent. It was reported that Bro. Mitchell was on his way to a Camp Meeting engagement in Kansas. A motion carried that the conference continue on with other items of business while Bro. Mitchell was being reached by telephone.

The Auditing Committee reported and the same was received by the Conference.

After some discussion a motion carried that in view of the fact that Rev. J. R. Mitchell has not been contacted at this hour the order of business for the election of other District Officers be set for the morning sitting on Friday, July 29, 1960.

Rev. J. A. Byrd, representative from Eastern Pilgrim College, then spoke to the members of the conference relative to the work of the College and brought greetings to the conference from Dr. R. G. Gunsaulus, president of Eastern Pilgrim College who is unable to be present at the conference due to an illness.

The District Secretary then read the report from the Educational Board and the Examining Committee. A motion carried to ratify the recommendations of the above mentioned boards.

The Memoirs Committee then presented their report. Dr. Neff then asked the conference to stand in silent memory of those gone on to the more excellent glory. A verse of that grand old gospel song, "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder", was presented by the members of the conference. A motion to receive the Memoirs Committee report was carried by a joyous, "Amen".

Rev. Abbott requested to be excused from fulfilling the duties of Camp Director as outlined in Standing Rule No. 39 p. 58 of the 1959 Conference Journal due to the press of other duties as General Secretary of Sunday School and Youth Work. A motion carried to accept Bro. Abbott's request.

Invitations were then extended by various churches for the Fall and Spring Ministerial Conventions and resulted in the following selections: Fall Convention, Easton, Maryland, Spring Convention, Laurel, Delaware.

At the hour of adjournment, Rev. H. D. Dukes dismissed the conference from this session in prayer.

#### THIRD SITTING, JULY 29, 1960

#### 8:30 P. M.

The District Secretary lead the members of the Conference in singing, "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus", with Rev. Ruth Morris at the Piano. Rev. P. F. Bean offered prayer. The Reception Committee presented Rev. Allen Thomas, former member of our Conference, who is now serving with Dept. of Church Extension in Texas, to the conference and he was granted an honorary seat in the conference.

Dr. Wm. H. Neff, Presiding Officer of the Conference read the Scripture lesson from Philippians 4 and stressed the need for devotions in the conference. The members of the Conference deeply appreciated the wonderful exposition from the Word of God by Bro. Neff.

Rev. Neff then reported that Rev. Roland Mitchell deeply appreciated the vote of the conference but could not feel clear under the Lord to accept the office of District Superintendent.

The tellers were called to take their places and ballots again were cast, resulting in the following elections:

Assistant Superintendent — Rev. Earl Watts.

District Secretary — Rev. Wm. H. Miller.

Ballots were cast for the members of the Council and resulted in the following elections: Rev. H D. Dukes, Rev. E. Linwood Horseman, and Rev. J. M. Griffen, Advisory members of the District Council.

Rev. J. G. Rimmer was elected for a 3 year term on the Board of Examiners, and Rev. Leon Hynson was elected to a 3 year term on the Educational Board.

Rev. Griffen from the Maryland Bible Society and also area representative of the American Bible Society was introduced to the members of the Conference and spoke briefly of that work.

A motion to adjourn carried. The closing song of the fifty-sixth Annual Conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was then presented by the members of the Conference, "A Charge To Keep I Have", followed by a prayer from Rev. Wm. H. Neff.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### General Superintendent Dr. William H. Neff, Ministeral and Lay Delegates

This is the 56th annual conference of Eastern District. Thus, for more than a half century fellow Pilgrims have gathered in yearly conclaves to report on, plan for, and promote the redeeming work of the Lord through the Pilgrim Holiness Church. As architects, spiritual craftsmen and agents for Christ, they have served well and successfully in establishing the cause of Christ in this area. We succeed the faithful and zealous of former days some of whom have bowed beneath the load of accumulated years and have entered into eternal rest. In respect for them and with firm convictions that our cause is worthy, we shoulder the tasks today and go forth into the tomorrows.

#### PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 131 times, visited each church two or more times. officiated at 4 weddings and 2 funerals, performed 1 christening and 19 baptisms, attended 8 Executive Committee meetings at Eastern Pilgrim College and 2 Eastern Pilgrim College Board of Directors meetings, held 6 council meetings and 4 parsonage committee meetings, attended 5 Sunday School board meetings, held 13 area personal evangelism meetings with Brothers Whipple and Marino, attended 2 General Board meetings in Indianapolis, held one ministerial convention committee meeting and 1 meeting of the report blanks revision committee, attended the Church Leader's Conference, and participated in several mortgage burnings, dedications, and anniversary services. As a director of Owosso College I attended one Board meeting there, gave a number of days in work on Denton camp grounds, presided at the ministerial convention, arranged for and attended the Ministers Fellowship dinner meeting held in Salisbury, Maryland, attended Education Advisory committee meeting at Indianapolis, met with the Educational and Examining boards, attended the National Youth Convention, and served as editor of Eastern Pilgrim, issuing 1250 copies per month for 10 months of the year. These and various other duties that fall the lot of a district superintendent, I have performed to the best of my ability. My traveling has totaled an estimated 25,000 miles of which amount mileage from the district has been received for 13,073 miles. My salary is paid to date. By giving such a personal report no inference to personal success is indicated. Without the faithful co-operation and efficient help of various ministers and laymen, my efforts would have been inadequate for the demands of the office. Thanks to the host of helpers I have had.

#### WITH THE LORD

Rev. Mrs. Bessie Mitchell was called to be with the Lord July 12, 1960. We can believe that she has entered into that rest which she antici-

pated for three-score years. Her Christian life, early ministry, faithful witness, and burden for the lost leave us an example worthy of emulation.

#### FINANCES

Though the District Treasurer and the District Statistician will give you more details in regards to finances, I should like to highlight certain things for our consideration. The battle of the budget is more than a way of saying we have experienced some financial straits this year. No doubt those straits have been experienced on all the levels in the church organizational structure.

You will recall that last year the annual budget was enlarged to accommodate our zone commitments as well as those to the general church and to the district, thus giving Eastern Pilgrim College a share in 100 per cent of annual budget monies. It is possible that the district budget and United Stewardship Fund have realized a cut in receipts as a result of that action. However, I hasten to point out that Education Sunday was set for May 1st at which time various faculty members were made available to us in the district to present the message of the college and to receive a special offering. That offering went towards the annual budget assessment, therefore, Eastern Pilgrim College helped, where they were able, to raise the annual budget apportionment of the church.

Any difficulties that were realized were not the fault of overspending or underestimating. The budget is sufficient if paid in full. Through Eastern Pilgrim we have reported monthly receipts from the local churches. These have been accurate and an aid to the pastors in their effort to keep a finger on the pulse of the annual budget payments. By letters and through Eastern Pilgrim, our people have been appraised of the financial status of the district from time to time. Local economics have entered into deficits in some areas. Various other problems have been responsible in some cases; in others I believe there has been a lack of training and insufficient inspiration with no program to assist in meeting the financial program of the church. Loyalty in these matters is a prerequisite to advance if we would have an ever enlarging out-reach for souls.

#### CHANGE OF DISTRICT BOUNDARY

By a letter from General Secretary R. A. Beltz, the District Superintendent was notified that the Capital District has presented a resolution to the Executive Council of the General Board for a change of Boundary. Since Capital District borders Eastern and Virginia Districts, any change of Capital's boundary affects one or both of the neighboring districts. In this case both are involved.

Presently the Capital District boundary is a circle that lies in a radius of 25 miles of the national Capital Building in Washington, D. C. The proposed change would be according to county lines and would include all of the District of Columbia, Montgomery, Howard, Prince George's and Charles counties in Maryland. It would also include Prince William, Frauquier, Frederick, Clarke, and Loudon counties in Virginia. This petition will be considered when the Executive Council meets, September 6, 1960. The District Council has notified the district superintendent of Capital District that we have no disposition at this time to protest their petition for additional territory.

Should the conference feel differently about this, it should register its feeling by vote and inform the Executive Council of the General Board prior to the scheduled meeting.

#### GENERAL SUPERINTENDENTS

Pilgrims from various churches had the privilege to hear the leaders of the church in two three-session days, October 8 and 9. The work of the ministry was enhanced by Dr. Neff in the morning addresses. In the afternoon General Superintendent Snyder highlighted the church manual and interpreted the dutes of the lay officers — Dr. Flexon stressed, most unforgetably in the evenings, the outreach of all Christians in witnessing and individual soul-winning work. The last session closed with as many as possible bowing about the altar pledging themselves to more dedicated efforts in personal evangelism. We pray God's blessings upon our Generals in their momentous tasks and pledge our faithful support to the whole Biblical and Pilgrim program to bring the lost to Christ.

#### WHIPPLE-MARINO

Messrs. Leonard Whipple and William Marino held daily sessions throughout the district, October 14 through 25, on personal and house-to-house evangelism. The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Paul D. Dieter and Rev. William H. Miller, Secretary of District Home Missions, worked with the District Superintendent in setting up the following area meetings; Denton, Greensboro, Harrington, Oxford, Cambridge, Dover, Greenwood, Hurlock, Delmar, Exmore, Bloxom, Millsboro, and Baltimore 1st. It is believed that their visits and their ministries served to inspire hearts and to enlarge our visions for the work of winning the lost to Christ.

Rev. Wilbur W. Bubb, was appointed to the chaplaincy in the United States Air Force and reported for duty October 6, 1959, at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas. Chaplain Bubb is the first minister of our denomination to serve in that position in the Air Force. We heartly com-

mend him for his field of service and the ministry he is rendering. I should like to recommend that we feature his picture in the new conference journal.

#### DISTRICT DEPARTMENTS

You will hear full and more complete reports from various department heads. However, there are some matters that I should like to call to your attention.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOLS

By now you have studied the annual attendance report, given in the June issue of the **Eastern Pilgrim.** Districtwise, we realized a 6 per cent increase. Laurel and Ridgely schools showed the most phenomenal percentage gains 60 and 33 per cent respectively. Cambridge scored the highest total attendance for the eleven-month year with a record of 13,736. The promotional secretary will tell you of the "DECADE OF PROGRESS" program which is to be promoted in our schools for the next ten years.

#### YOUTH

Local youth services, zone rallies, the youth leader's institute, and youth camp are not all of the activities engaged in by our twelve to thirty-five-year-old group. The Bible memorization quiz sponsored by the General Department of Youth was an exciting and rewarding undertaking among us. Our two teams were present at Winona Lake in June to participate in the national contest and the Eastern District teen-age team ranked second in that national contest. The contestants — Bill Pritchett, Darlene Ruark, and John Bowman — did a fine job and were awarded trophies and various other gifts.

#### DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

After much deliberation the decision was made by the district council to sell the Girdletree Church property to one of the local citizens who expressed a desire to restore it as a community landmark.

This year financial support has been given to Glen Burnie and Seaford. On both of these fronts gains are being made, strongholds established, and souls won to the Lord. Help will have to be continued to Seaford into the new year, but Glen Burnie is now self-supporting. Money for District Home Missions has come from an account which has been carried since the sizable gift from the Etta G. Hoffman Estate some years ago. However, that is now depleted. That has been supplemented by receipts from the penny-a-day calenders. This system can bring in about \$400.00 per month, which is sufficient to carry the monthly commitment of the district Home Missionary Board. Such a program costs us so little, but it means so much to others. Also, the district missionary societies were given the

"Judean Call" in the month of May. They with other church groups throughout the district were asked to contribute towards an offering (The Judean Call) sufficient to make a mortgage payment on the Seaford properties and to pay the insurance premium for one year. The goal was \$300.00. The district treasurer can give us a report as to the receipts of this call.

#### QUARTERLY REPORTS

All of the ministers of the district were asked to report to the District Superintendent any changes they would recommend for the quarterly reports regularly used in our district. This was done in an effort to carry out the wish of the conference for a revised quarterly report. After receiving some suggestions from the pastors, the committee met and revised the report blank. A supply of mimeographed blanks was then mailed to each of the pastors. It was put in the mimeographed form first with the thought that other changes could be made before they were printed. The same committee that began this should follow through to completion.

#### HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

By action of the district conference, a committee was appointed to compile a complete and correct historical account of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in the Eastern District. Rev. P. F. Bean was named chairman with Rev. Etta Clough and Rev. H. D. Dukes serving as other members of the committee.

#### DISTRICT PARSONAGE

It was acknowledged by the 1959 District Conference that steps should be taken to provide additional bedrooms and office space in the district parsonage. Therefore, in compliance with the directive of the conference, the district council appointed a committee to study this matter. The committee consisted of Rev. J. D. Abbott, Rev. Mark H. Bowman, and Rev. H. D. Dukes. Upon careful study the committee was convinced that there were two possible solutions.

(1) The present property could be remodeled and enlarged to meet the needs of such a parsonage. One contractor's estimate involved a lifting of the south side of the roof, installing dutch dormers, insulating, reroofing, finishing the upstirs completely, enlarging the study by extending it towards the street an additional 12 feet, running a porch across just beyond the front door, installing new siding and redecorating for an estimated cost of \$8,000. This included running heat to the upstairs which would be controlled by a separate thermostat. The house then would be like new inside and out.

(2) The house could be sold for a reasonable sum and lots purchased on which to build; or a house already large enough could be acquired.

What was done? Spot checks on houses for sale in Denton, Salisbury, and Cambridge were made but nothing was found to be acceptable either because of the value against the price or our ability to pay. Our property was advertised for sale for several months in newspapers at Denton, Dover and Seaford. Inquiries were made but no sale effected. For a while the Strout Agency took the property on open listing. It was roughly estimated that \$20,000 would be required to purchase acceptable lots and build according to housing needs. This would be about \$10,000 beyond the selling price of the present property.

After this study and considerable search, the committee made the following recommendation to the District Council. "INASMUCH as the conference made no provision to finance the program it adopted

AND SINCE we have no available funds with which to proceed to remodel, relocate, or build,

AND SINCE we feel the program adopted by the conference is of such financial proportion as to require great consideration by the conference,

WE RECOMMEND that the District Superintendent be authorized to give full and complete report to the conference of the findings of the council and parsonage committee. FURTHER that the council devise a plan for financing approximately \$10,000 to carry out the parsonage program involving either remodeling or relocating.

AND THAT the Ways and the Means committee present such plan at the proper time to the conference, ALSO that the conference, having been fully informed of the total involvements, be requested to reconfirm its former action and adopt a financial program to proceed."

Therefore, this matter will be coming before the conference through the regular channel of the Ways and Means committee.

#### EVERY PILGRIM GOALS FOR THE NEW YEAR

Among many worthy goals for the 1960-61 fiscal year, I should like to recommend the following:

(1) Every Pilgrim engage in the personal evangelism and soulwinning program of the church.

- (2) Every Pilgrim do his best to help to up-the-salary scale for the ministers in Eastern District.
- (3) Every Pilgrim foster an interest in every part of our church's program until he is Sunday school conscious, youth conscious, budget conscious, missions conscious, community conscious, time and eternity conscious.
- (4) Every Pilgrim giving to district home missions by the penny-a-day calendar.
- (5) Every Pilgrim living a truly sanctified life wherever he goes.

#### SEVEN YEARS

As you know, the General Board elected me as successor to Dr. Paul F. Elliott as Secretary of General Sunday Schools and Youth. I accepted the position with a keen sense of inadequacy and yet with a pledge of my best.

Thus at this conference I bring to a close seven years that I have served as your District Superintendent. You have honored me by electing me to the District's highest office. You have been gracious and considerate. You treated me with all deference and respect as side by side we labored in the interests of the Kingdom of God and the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

# TO THE 56th ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE EASTERN DISTRICT, SUNDAY SCHOOL GREETINGS!

"Since 1940 an army of more than thirty millions has come to our country," stated the Reverend Charles W. Denton at the Tenth Annual Convention of the National Association of Evangelicals, in Chicago, "And, he continued, because they have arrived one by one, looking innocent and harmless, we have not suspected their potential power. Some day, however, we are going to awaken to the fact that this army has taken over our nation. They will capture Washington and dominate the federal government as well as the administration of all fifty states. They will publish our papers, run our radio stations, preach from our pulpits, and teach in our schools. They will take over business and industry, complete authority will be in their hands.

"This army, of course, is an army of children. Over one-fifth of our population is children under twelve years of age. Fortunately they are only beginning their basic training, and we can still determine what their future will be. We can determine whether these future conquerors of our country are to be Christian or pagan." Unquote.

According to the 1950 census, there are approximately forty millions of children in the United States thirteen years of age and under. It is estimated that twenty-eight million of these children have no religious influence. When we think of this our hearts are stirred to realize our responsibility to use our influence to save this present and on-coming generation. Some may say, "I do not believe in influencing children in making choices and decisions in matters of religion." Why not? The schools will. The radio will. The newspapers will. The movies will. The television will. Their companions will. The communists will. We must put forth every effort possible to influence all we can **for Christ** thru the efforts of the Sunday School. If it had not been for the Sunday School some of us would not be Christians today; for many of us were brought to Christ and into the church and established in spiritual things thru the efforts of the Sunday School. We are realizing more and more the advantages and the need of active growing Sunday Schools.

I am glad to report another year of Sunday School growth for the Eastern District. In fact, this year makes the 14th consecutive year of growth. From a monthly average of 1620 in 1946, we have reached an all time high average of 3337. This is a numerical gain of 1717 for the 14 year period and a percentage gain of 106

The gains for this past year, though, were not quite that good. For this past year, we report an average monthly attendance of 3337 against the previous year average of 3317. This make a numerical gain of 20 and

a percentage gain of .6%, with a total of 150,464 scholars attending the 1,987 sessions held during this eleven month conference year.

The honors for making the highest numerical and percentage gains for the year goes to the Laurel Sunday School. They made a numerical gain of 38 and a percentage gain of 60%. Congratulations to you, Rev. and Mrs. Reed Morris, and your Sunday School staff.

We wish now to honor the following schools for their gains of 8% or more in attendance which was the goal set by the District Sunday School Board. Laurel with 60%, Ridgely 33%, Saxis 22%, Denton 19%, Seaford 17%, Bethlehem 14%, Baltimore II 13%, and Goldsboro, Harrington, Milton, and Rumbley with 12%. These are honored because they reached a set goal; and yet many of you that have received no honors have fought just as hard, and in some instances, won an even greater victory. I know God will reward you for your every effort.

The District Sunday School Board, realizing the need for better trained teachers in order to have more efficient schools purchased a set of teacher training filmstrips entitled — "Successful Teaching". These eight lessons were made available to all Sunday Schools on a rental basis. The reports received from the fourteen Sunday Schools that used them have been gratifying.

We again made available Sunday School membership certificates to give to all new scholars as they enrolled.

The annual Sunday School revival proved a blessing spiritually as well as numerically. Three Sunday Schools were rewarded for their achievements: Milton for making the highest numerical gain with 55, Bethlehem for making the highest percentage gain with 109%, and Baltimore 1, for enrolling the most new scholars with a total of 69. Through gifts of friends, we were able to give each of these schools a set of pupilt flags with a retail value of \$44.00.

The Tenth Annual Fourth of July Sunday School Convention was held here on Denton Camp. The general theme was — "Communicating the Gospel". Rev. A. D. Peisker, Editor of our Sunday School literature was the speaker. In the morning session he spoke on "Communicating the Gospel through Sunday School Literature", and in the afternoon on the subject — "Communicating the Gospel through the teaching ministry". A total of 505 scholars attended the two sessions.

By way of a personal report, I have presided at seven District Sunday School Board meetings and one executive committee meeting. I also conducted two Sunday School sessions at Camp and prepared monthly

statistical reports for printing in the "Eastern Pilgrim". It was again my privilege to attend the Promotional Secretaries Conference at Indianapolis, Indiana last September. The inspiration and information received has been appreciated.

I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the Sunday School Board: Rev. Watts, Rev. Darsch, Rev. Anna Bowman, Rev. Lida Brasure, Rev. Ruth Morris, and Rev. Abbott for their much needed advice and help, to all pastors, Sunday School leaders for their cooperation thus making my task easier.

Now a look toward the future — In view of the statistics given at the beginning of this report and the fact that in the next 10 years our population will increase by 40 million, — there is only one direction for us to go, and that is forward. The past has been good but the future must be better! With many still unchurched, we must accelerate our efforts to win them to Christ before it is too late.

With this challenge before us we are launching today a ten-year (1960 to 1970) program planned toward progress. We are calling it "A DECADE OF PROGRESS". This decade — planned to promote progress will center around an annual award. This award is an honor award bestowed upon the Sunday School selected as the "Sunday School of the Year". This school will be chosen on the basis of the following: 1. Standard of Excellence score. 2. Teacher Training. 3. Numerical and percentage gain. 4. Spiritual gains — number of scholars seeking to be saved or sanctified. 5. Number of scholars taken into church membership. 6. Participation in the total district and general church programs. 7. Physical improvements made to better facilitate a growing school.

We trust this "Decade of Progress" will inspire us to provide the kind of Sunday School's that will enable us to reach the maximum number of persons possible, teaching them effectively the Word of God, with the ultimate goal of leading everyone to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

The aggressive, growing, successful Sunday School must be made attractive, interesting, educative, and spiritual. It must ever be kept in mind though, that there can be no real success without the direction and assistance of the Holy Spirit.

Let us go forward as the Holy Spirit leads us in this "DECADE OF PROGRESS" toward a greater and brighter tomorrow.

#### REVEREND MRS. BESSIE MITCHELL

Bessie Jones, daughter of John R. and Susan E. Jones, was born April 15, 1884 near Henderson, Md. Next to the oldest of nine children, she is the first to be claimed by death.

She was definitely converted at the age of nine in a graracious revival at the Henderson Methodist Church, in which many were gloriously saved. Though she drifted away from this first love, she was later reclaimed at the age of 17 at Denton Camp, and a month later was sanctified in her home. She began evangelistic labors a year later. In the meantime she became affiliated with the Holiness Mission at Henderson and among the other young ladies with whom she labored, were such familiar names as: Mary and Ethel Brown, (the former became Mrs. H. J. Olson), Cora Downes, Bertha Haymond Pitcher, Maye Elliott Moffatt, and Etta Gibson Hoffman.

She was ordained to the ministry fifty years ago, July 26, 1919 by: Rev. George B. Kulp, Charles E. Cowman, G. E. Helsby, Oswald Chamber. For six years she traveled in evangelistic work. At the age of 24 she was married to Mr. Willard Mitchell, and together they pastored at Hillsboro, Maryland, Harrington, Delaware and then moved to Dover, Delaware where they started and organized the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Failing health required that active pastoral labors be dropped for many years. After the death of her husband in 1933, she assisted her daughter in pastorates at Girdletree, Md., and Cape Charles, Va., after which her health again called for a cessation from active work.

In her early Christian experience she had charge of the Children's meetings at Denton Camp. Those who sought God among the children, she wrote letters of encouragement to through the years, and some outstanding ministers came from the converts of those children's services.

Although her active labors had been over for many years, she never lost her zeal for the cause of Christ and the salvation of souls. She fully enjoyed being in all the services as long as she was able to attend and wrote countless letters of encouragement as long as she was able to hold a pencil. The dearest spot on earth to her became Denton Camp

Grounds, where she was saved, received light on the experience of entire Sanctification and where she was ordained to the Ministry. From the time she first came to the camp as a girl in her teens, she missed only four years, where she was too sick to attend. This year she will attend a far greater Camp Meeting in the skies.

On Tuesday morning, July 12, at the age of 76, she went to be with the Lord, quoting the promises that had sustained her through a life of victory and glory. She leaves behind three childen: Etta, Roland, and Russell, all of whom are ordained ministers of the gospel. There are also 5 step children, 23 grandchildren, and 18 great grandchildren. Also 3 sisters and 5 brothers.

Her life has been an inspiration to hundreds who have listened to her testimonies and exhortations and shared an interest in her prayers.

We look forward to that grand reunion when the saints of all the ages redeemed by the Prescious Blood, from every kindred, tongue, people and nation shall stand before the throne of our God, to praise Him for His Great Salvation. We add a final petition that Mother Mitchell (as she became affectionately known by many) so often included in her prayers: "God grant that not one of us shall be missing!"

#### RESOLUTIONS OF THE 1960 CONFERENCE

#### Resolutions Committee:

#### Resolutions presented before the Eastern District Conference — 1960

#### I — BE IT RESOLVED

That all objectives, plans and goals of the district departments as noted in standing rule No. 38 P61 of the Conference Journal shall be in the hands of all district ministers within 30 days following conference and furthermore that the committees and boards shall have opportunity to promote their program at the Fall Ministerial Convention, Moved and adopted.

II —

Resolution regarding the question of Catholic candidate for President.

In view of the rapid growth of the political power of the Roman Catholic Church in these United States, which fact is emphasized by the nomination of a Roman Catholic for the Presidency of this country; and in view of what the Roman Catholic Church teaches in respect to its primacy, as the only true church, and the resultant rejection of what it calls the error of its brethern", and its refusal to admit that Protestant teaching had equal status in a Roman Catholic economy, and, furthermore, in view of the practice of the Roman Catholic Church in the lands where it has already gained the predominance in the systematic curbing of other faiths, its prostestations that this could not happen in America is taken with deep mis-givings, and in view of repeated statements by reliable Catholic authorities that an individual member of the church is not free to express himself on matters on which the church has spoken (is evidenced through the criticisims from Catholic authorities of Kennedy himself when he couragously spoke out against aid to parochial schools, ambassador to the Vatican) raises the serious question as to whether a loyal son of the church would have the freedom, under an authoritanian church to exercise such freedom, for the authority of the Pope and Bishops is not restricted to strictly religious matters. In view of all this, be it therefore resolved that this conference instruct the District Superintendent to prepare an article for Eastern Pilgrim calling upon our people to pray earnestly and

think intelligently on this matter before casting their votes for a President.

Then go out and vote!

#### III - WHEREAS

there seems to be a greater need for understanding of the district program among the ministry and laity.

#### BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED

that the District Superintendent, as soon after the District Conference as possible, shall meet with the membership of the local church.

#### AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED

that the work of the Superintendent include the strengthening of the weaker churches of the district by way of Home Missionary endeavors. Moved and adopted.

IV

For foresighted leadership, for sympathetic understanding, for devotional example and for faithful service to our beloved church in all General, District and Local interests.

#### BE IT RESOLVED

that we hereby register our love and gratitude in appreciation for the past, justifyable pride of the present and certainty of success in the future of our Brother J. D. Abbott in a rising vote of Confidence. Moved and adopted.

#### V — BE IT RESOLVED

that we express our appreciation by a rising vote of thanks to our beloved General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff who so ably presided over out conference; to our esteemed District Superintendent, Rev. J. D. Abbott; to our dining room staff and to all others who have labored for our comfort, and the success of this 1960 Conference.

# RESOLUTIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE OF THE 1960 CONFERENCE

#### Resolution No. 1

Be it resolved that the Sunday School Promotional Secretary's yearly salary be raised from \$25.00 to \$50.00 and if approved by the Conference it shall be retroactive to cover the 1959 Conference year.

#### Resolution No. 2

Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 3, page 55 of the 1959 Conference Journal be amended to read — "Each church shall pay into the District Treasury 5% of all regular offerings (Sunday morning and evening and Prayer Meeting). This amount to be sent in monthly. This 5% shall be approximed as follows: 75% for District Budget and 25% for District Home Missions.

#### Resolution No. 3

Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 4, on page 55 of the 1959 Conference Journal be amended to read, "The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$80.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of the Camp Meeting Fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct not more than 2 revival meetings or conventions of not more than 4 Sundays, each year, with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.

#### Resolution No. 4

Whereas many of our ministers and their wives who are eligible for membership in the Ministerial Benefit Association are not members, BE IT RESOLVED, that we as a district recommend that each church pay the assessment fees of the Pastor and wife, all, incapacitated ordained ministers on the membership roll of any given church, and that the District shall pay the assessment fees of the District Superintendent and wife.

#### (General Board recommendation)

#### Resolution No. 5

Be it resolved that every church in the conference set aside one Sunday in each month, preferably the first, to receive the annual budget as outlined in Standing Rule No. 1 on page 55 of the 1959 Conference Journal.

#### Resolution No. 6

In response to the action of the 1959 Conference (Resolution No. 1 of the Ways and Means committee 1959) P. 53 in the 1959 Journal, the District Council recommends that each minister or church in the Eastern District shall pay the equivalent of 25% of the Ministerial Tithe into a District Parsonage Fund, and be it further resolved that this plan be terminated the end of 5 years.

#### STANDING RULES

- No. 1 The United Stewardship Fund shall be \$8.00 per member per year and our District Budget shall be set at \$3.25 per member per year and our committment to Eastern Pilgrim College be set at \$3.00 per member per year making a total of \$14.25 per member per year. Every church in the conference shall set aside one Sunday in each month, preferably the first, to receive the offering for the Annual Budget.
- No. 2. The Conference shall accept the Pension plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 4 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.
- No. 3. Each Church shall pay into the District Treasury 5% of all Regular Offerings (Sunday morning and evening and Prayer meeting). This amount to be sent in monthly. This 5% shall be apportioned as follows: 75% for District Budget, and 25% for District Home Missions.
- No. 4. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$80.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of the Camp Meeting Fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct not more than 2 revivals or conventions of not more than 4 Sundays each year, with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.
- No. 5. Each Church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member each visit.
- No. 6. The District Secretary and Treasurer shall receive \$85.00 and \$200.00 respectively plus postage per year.
- No. 7. The District Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year.
- No. 8. The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:
  - a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly
  - b. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
  - c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
  - d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
  - e. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
  - f. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.

g. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.

This assessment shall be based on the past years average attendance.

- No. 9. The District Conference recommends that each church pay the assessment fees of the Pastor and wife, all incapacitated ordained ministers on the membership roll of any given church, and the that the District shall pay the assessment fees of the District Superintendent and his wife, as these fees relate to the Ministerial Benefit Association.
- No. 10. The District shall contribute an amount equal to 4% of the District Superintendent's salary into the Pilgrim Pension Plan.
- No. 11. Each minister or church in the Eastern District shall pay the equivalent of 25% of the ministerial tithe into a District Parsonage Fund, and be it further resolved that this plan be terminated at the end of 5 years.

#### **CAMP REGULATIONS**

- No. 12. Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 13. Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 14. All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.
- No. 15. All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 16. A Bible College service shall be held the 2nd Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 17. No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 18. A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 19. A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meeting for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.

- No. 20. The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale, this practice to be continued.
- No. 21. No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been moved.
- No.21. All active district ministers and evangelists shall give 2 eight hour days of work on the camp grounds each year and in the event any minister is unable to participate in this work program, he be assessed at the rate of \$10.00 per day.
- No. 22. Ladies taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly.
- No. 23. No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 24. One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 25. The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 26. All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 27. The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrim or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the council is unable to grant a transfer of lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 28. Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.

- No. 29. Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 30. The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.

#### CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 31. All ministers assuming new pastoral duties shall move before the second Sunday after District Conference.
- No. 32. The District Superintendent as soon after conference as possible shall meet with the membership and official boards of the local churches and that his duties shall further include the strengthening of weaker churches of the district and take an active part in District Home Missionary endeavors.
- No. 33. The Conference year shall close on May 31st and all reports shall be postmarked no later than July 1st, and mailed to the District Superintendent and the District Statistician.
- No. 34. Sittings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon Session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30 Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 35. As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 36. No individual shall serve as a member of more than one of the following: Council, Examining Board, Education Board, and Resolution Committee.
- No. 37. The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 P. M. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 38. The objectives, plans and goals of all District Departments (Sunday School, Youth, Home Missionary, District Missionary Director) shall be in the hands of all District Ministers within 30 days following conference and furthermore that the committees and boards shall have opportunity to promote their program at the District Fall Ministerial Convention.

- No. 39. The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 40 The district secretary shall send, immediately following the district conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the District Superintendent and to each local Church Treasurer.
- No. 41. Each zone of our district shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.
- No. 42. The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.
- No. 43. Quarterly report blanks shall be prepared and sent to the District Superintendent by each church. Said blanks shall be furnished by the Conference Secretary.
- No. 44. The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P. M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified not later than 30 days prior to the conference.
- No. 45. There shall be a District Director of Missionary Societies appointed each year by the District Council; whose duty shall be to promote the missionary enterprise of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- No. 46. The goals for the Conference year shall be 2 new churches, and 95 new members.
- No. 47. The second Wednesday of each month shall be set aside as a day of fasting and praying for the forward movement effort in our District.
- No. 48. Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- No. 49. An Honor Roll shall be provided by the District which shall list the names of the churches that reach their yearly goals, and an appropriate award given to those churches listed thereon at the Annual Conference.

- No. 50. Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 51. The rate of mileage paid by the District for travel in district interests shall be .07c per mile.
- No. 52. The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A. M. the first Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.
- No. 53. The Home Missionary Board shall be composed of the members of the District Council with the District Superintendent as the Chairman. The Executive Branch of the Council shall constitute the administrative agency of this Board and the Advisory Members of the Council and the Pastors of the churches on the district receiving support from the District shall meet twice each year with the executive agency in advisory capacity.
- No. 54. The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 55. A District Historian shall be appointed to compile and edit the record of the history of church work in the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. He shall be appointed by the Council or the District Superintendent.
- No. 57. The District Council shall be the District Trustees and the executive members of the Council are the negotiating signers of all District transactions.
- No. 58. The conference bar shall include the first ten rows in the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform.

#### **MINUTES**

- No. 59. The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 60. The price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.

- No. 61. The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.
- No. 62. Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.

#### DISTRICT BUSINESS

- No. 63. Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 64. No annual church business meeting shall be held on Sunday.
- No. 65. Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
- No. 66. Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, other than camp and church related business.
- No. 67. The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 68. Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

- No. 69. A District Sunday School Rally shall be held on July 4.
- No. 70. Two Sunday School banners shall be awarded at the district rallies, one on the basis of the percentage of enrollment present, and the second one on the basis of the number present in all sessions, multiplied by the number of miles traveled.
- No. 71. The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$50.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the Conference for his services.

# Minutes of Fourth Annual Youth Conference

EASTERN DISTRICT

Pilgrim Holiness Church

JULY 30, 1960 Denton, Md.

#### CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The annual conference of the Youth Societies of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Eastern District was held at Denton Camp Grounds on Saturday morning, July 30, 1960, starting at 8:50 A. M.

The conference opened by the entire group singing the following choruses: Every Day With Jesus, I Love Him Better Every Day, Christ For Me, and the Pilgrim Youth Song. This was followed by a good season of prayer led by the new District Superintendant, Rev. Mark Bowman.

Rev. John D. Abbott, The new General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, was then introduced to the conference by the District Superintendent. Rev. Abbott gave quite an effective introductory speech and was warmly received by the conference. He then proceeded to describe and display most of the Youth literature published by the Pilgrim Publishing House.

Rev. Abbott read from the New Testament at Luke 9:23-26, taking as a theme for his remarks to the conference Luke 9:24. He urged the Youth of today to be faithful to the church, defend it and its standards, and spend one's self for the work of the church.

By a motion from the floor, the roll call was completed in writing by each church pastor and presented to the secretary for the record.

A motion was made by Rev. Wheatly that the first ten seats of the center section be used as a conference bar; and it was carried. All others were asked to vacate that section and all delegates and pastors move to that section of the tabernacle.

The District Youth President's report was read by Rev. Robert Darsch in the absence of Rev. Holmes. It was a fine report of the Youth Camp. The activities of the year, and his own personal report to the conference. This was accepted with commendation.

Carlton Goodhand, chairman of the reception committee, presented to the conference a distinguished guest. He was Leut. Wilbur Bubb of the United States Air Force Chaplains Corp. Rev. Abbott introduced Wilbur and he then gave a fine testimony concerning his work with the corp. He ministers to approximately 2000 men each Sunday, who perhaps otherwise would not hear a gospel message. A request was made to the conference that we back Leut. Bubb and his work with our earnest prayers.

The treasurer's report was given by Rev. George Melvin with a present balance of \$138.22. It was moved by Carlton Goodhand and seconded that the report be accepted with appreciation.

The five Zone Leaders of the district gave inspiring reports in the following order:

Tidewater Zone by Olney Ross.

Northern Zone by Rev. Lida Brasure.

Coastal Zone by Ruth Morris.

Southern Zone by Rev. Braden Shroeves.

Western Shore Zone by Rev. Atwood Berry.

All five were fine reports and were commended by the chair. It was moved and carried to change the order of the conference day. The election of officers was placed on the agenda proceeding any more reports.

The following three names were presented by the District Council for the office of District Youth President: Rev. William H. Miller, Rev. Leon Hynson, and Rev. Ray Chamberlain. The vote was cast and Rev. Miller won on the first ballot with 39 votes received of the 70 cast.

It was moved by Rev. Darsch and carried that the two Presidential candidates remaining be presented for vice-president. A vote was taken and Rev. Hynson won on the first ballot with 60 of the 70 votes cast.

Eleven names received votes for the office of Secretary with John Mervine receiving enough for election on the first Ballot.

Four names received votes for the office of District Youth Treasurer. George Melvin won on the first ballot with 50 votes of the 70 votes cast.

Reverend Allen Thomas was presented to the conference by Carlton Goodhand. Allen is with the General Church Extension in Texas among the Spanish speaking Americans. He gave a fine testimonial report and spoke briefly in Spanish.

The Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, Rev. Abbott, called all new officers to the platform and officially welcomed and installed each separately to his new office.

The attendance roll by Zones was taken and is as follows: Northern—25, Southern—9, Costal—20, Western Shore—10, and Tidewater—14, with a total of 78.

It was moved and carried to take a five minute recess. Fifteen minutes later the meeting was again called back into session.

Roland Melvin, Jr., Chairman of the Resolutions Committee read the report of that committee. All of the three resolutions were acted upon and adopted.

Olney Ross, Secretary of the Ways and Means Committee, read the two resolutions on record, which were moved and carried.

All Youth Presidents were called to the platform. Each gave an inspiring and encouraging report of his society's activities. New ideas for youth services were presented; as well as a challenge for all youth to go forward for God.

Announcement for the Youth Camp dates was made by the camp director, Rev. Darsch.

The conference was then adjourned with prayer offered by the new District Superintendent, Rev. Mark H. Bowman.

#### Resolution No. 3:

Due to the fact that Rev. J. D. Abbott is leaving the Eastern District to assume the duties of General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth; be it resolved that this Youth Conference express its appreciation to him by a rising vote of appreciation and thanks.

#### STANDING RULES OF THE YOUTH CONFERENCE

- 1. A District Youth Camp shall be conducted annually on a date set by the Youth Committee and the District Council. The Camp shall be held at a time to include 4 evenings and 3 days.
- 2. The District Youth Conference shall be held annually the first Saturday of Denton Camp at 8:30 A. M.
- 3. There shall be an annual institute of local youth leaders held during the last week of September for the purpose of defining goals, training leadership, and promoting a stronger youth organization in our district, under the direction of the Executive Youth Council.
- 4. The various committees that are necessary for Youth Conference such as Resolutions, Ways and Means, and other committees deemed advisable, shall be set up on a staggered basis, (i.e. two members selected for a three year term, two members selected for a two year term, and one member selected for a one year term) by the Executive Youth Council with the chairman of said committees appointed by the District Youth President.
- 5. Each local youth group shall send 5% of the regular offerings to the District Youth Treasurer; said amount shall be sent quarterly.
- 6. Each Zone shall contribute 10% of the Zone Rally offerings to the District Youth Treasurer; said amount to be sent quarterly.
- 7. The District Youth President shall be paid the sum of \$50.00 per year, plus postage and travel expenses at the rate of 7c per mile in the interest of District Youth.
- 8. The District Youth Council shall be reimbursed at the rate of 7c per mile to attend the District Youth Council meetings.
- 9. The District Youth President is authorized to attend the Annual Youth President's Conference in Indianapolis, with his share of the travel expenses being paid by the District Youth Society. Said expenses will be shared with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary who will be attending the same conference.
- 10. The term of the outgoing district youth officers shall be terminated at the close of the annual youth camp.
