# Conference Proceedings

# FIRST SITTING, JULY 26, 1962 — 1:30 P. M.

The fifty-eighth annual conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened on the Camp grounds at Denton, Maryland with Rev. Mark H. Bowman presiding. Rev. Leon Hynson led the conference in singing "I Love To Tell The Story" and "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms". Rev. Edgar J. Haskins assisted at the organ.

The conference was then asked to stand and repeat the First Psalm as a Scripture lesson, after which Rev. P. F. Bean led in prayer.

Rev. Bowman introduced Rev. P. W. Thomas, our Area General Superintendent, as our presiding officer over the conference. Brother Thomas called the conference to order and spoke from a passage of Scripture in I Cor. 10:17, "For we being many are one bread and one body." A motion passed that we officially receive the two new churches which have been organized this past church year into the conference. These churches were Seaford and Deal's Island. Each of these churches had a delegate present.

The Assistant Superintendent, the Rev. W. Earl Watts, gave a verbal report and a motion passed to accept this splendid report.

The Auditing Committee's report was held back until later.

The District Treasurer, Rev. Paul D. Dieter, gave his report for the District and General monies. A motion passed that we accept this report with gratitude. He then read the report of the Camp meeting finances. It was moved and seconded to accept this report. There were some questions concerning camp salaries. A motion was then passed that this report be tabled until we could get a breakdown on those items in question.

The District Statistician, the Rev. George Melvin read his report and a motion passed to accept this report.

The District Superintendent asked the Conference to give Mr. Richard Robbins, from Avon-Dixon Insurance Agency eight minutes to enlighten any who may have questions concerning Church Insurance as it relates to our insurance. Mr. Robbins very efficiently answered several questions from the floor.

A motion passed to bring back before the conference the report of the Camp Meeting finances. The District Treasurer gave the breakdown figures on camp salaries, and then the total Treasurer's report was accepted.

Our District Treasurer explained the auxiliary reports connected with his regular report.

There was a motion passed that we receive these auxiliary reports and make them a part of our records.

The First sitting of the conference came to a close by expiration of time and Rev. Marion L. Walker dismissed with prayer.

# SECOND SITTING — JULY 26, 1962 — 6:30 P. M.

The second sitting of the conference was opened with Brother G. H. Sipple leading the congregation in singing "At The Cross" and "He Keeps Me Singing". Sister Etta Clough played the piano.

The conference was led in prayer by Rev. Marion Griffin after which the conference joined in singing "In The Cross".

Our General Superintendent, Brother Thomas spoke briefly on the thought of welcoming the Lord to all our services. (business or otherwise). The sweet presence of the Master was felt as Brother Thomas spoke to us.

The secretary read the minutes of the first sitting and after correction, the minutes were approved.

The names of any delegates who were not present in the first sitting but who were present at this sitting were added to the roll.

Lt. Wilbur Bubb was introduced to the conference and spoke concerning his work as Chaplain after which the conference was urged by Brother Thomas to pray earnestly for Lt. Bubb.

The Rev. J. D. Abbott, General Secretary and Treasurer, was then introduced to the conference. He brought greetings, and a personal testimony, then spoke concerning the Diversified Ministries of the Church, which he listed as three:

- 1—Soul-Saving Ministry.
- 2—Training Ministry.
- 3—Edifying Ministry.

He then proceeded by asking the question, What kind of a conscience must we have? He answered this by his statements on Denominational conscience which were summed up by emphasizing our financial responsibility to the whole church program. He further stated that we are a part of the whole church. He gave some financial statistics showing where our District stood in relation to other districts financially. While he showed us that there is room for improvement, he gave us words of commendation for what was being done.

Brother Thomas explained about the Ordination Service that since it had been impossible to notity the ordinands that the ordination service be held at a later date. The date set was Sept. 25, 1962 at Roxana, Del., at 7:30 p. m.

The Educational and Examining Boards report was held until the next sitting pending approval of District Council.

The following reports were given:

Rev. Newell Reed, Promotional Secretary of District Sunday Schools. A motion passed that we accept this report.

Mrs. Elizabeth Gilmore, Directress of District Missionary Work gave her personal report and also the financial report of District Missionary Rallies. A

motion passed to accept her splendid report.

A motion passed that we set aside, standing rule #44 for this year and that the Ordination Service be set for the evening of our Fall Ministerial Convention, Also that the Examining and Educational Boards report be given in the Morning sitting.

The Resolution Committee reported with Rev. Robert Darsch as Chairman.

Resolution #1 It was moved and seconded that we adopt this resolution.

Resolution #2 It was moved and seconded that we adopt this resolution which amends standing rule #51 to read "The 3rd Friday in June instead of the 1st Friday. This motion passed.

The report of the Auditing Committee was given by Rev. Liston Moyer, chairman. This report was accepted.

The report of the Ways & Means Committee was given by the Rev. Wm. H. Miller as chairman.

Resolution #1 Moved and seconded to adopt.

Moved to amend this resolution to read "All members of the Conference pay a registration fee of \$2.50 and that lay delegates' registration fee be paid by church they represent.

Amendment was lost.

The original motion was before the conference. This was amended to read "all members of the Conference to be assessed \$2.50." It was moved and seconded to table this resolution.

Resolution #2 Moved and seconded to adopt. Carried.

Resolution #3 Moved and seconded to adopt. Then a motion was made and seconded to refer. This resolution was referred. Voted by standing. 55 voted to refer. 25 voted not to refer.

Conference joined in by singing "In The Sweet Bye and Bye."

Committee on Memoirs reported by Sister Louetta Holden as Chairman. A motion carried to accept this report. The conference s'ood for a period of meditation and silent prayer after which the Rev. H. D. Dukes led in prayer. The conference joined in singing the chorus, "Shall We Gather At The River".

A motion passed that breakfast be served at 7:00 A. M.

A motion passed to adjourn.

The Rev. P. F. Bean closed the second sitting of the conference with prayer.

# THIRD SITTING — 8:30 A. M. — JULY 27, 1962

The third sitting of the conference was opened with The Rev. Marion Walker leading the conference in singing "I Will Praise Him". After Prayer the Rev. P. W. Thomas spoke from Genesis 9:13-16. He called our attention to the Bow of Promise saying that there were certain things that were necessary in order to see the rainbow. He stated that just as it takes the clouds and the rain to form a visible rainbow so it takes the dark and hard places in the Christian life to see the rainbow. He spoke of Divine providence and said that nothing can come to the Christian's life except the love of God allows it to come. God said, "When I bring a cloud." Another necessity for one to behold the rainbow is light, so stated Brother Thomas. He reminded us that the colors in the rainbow were also significant. Yellow-gold suggests Divinity, or a tried faith; Red

suggests redemption and blue suggests truth. Purple is a combination of colors and suggests royalty; while green also being a combination of colors would suggest life and eternity. Beautiful spiritual lessons were drawn from these scriptures. He also reminded us that we must have a vantage point or be on the right side to behold the rainbow. He pictured Saint Paul as viewing his clouds with eternity in view, thus enabling him to see the rainbow as well as Moses and the Patriarchs. In closing he said that rainbows have a following quality and suggested that God's goodness and mercy follow us, and are always waiting for us. He then prayed and led the conference in singing, "The Solid Rock".

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

Rev. Bruce Lecates, pastor of Trappe P.H. Church was introduced to the conference and was asked to give his testimony, which he did.

The report of the Examining and Educational Boards were read as approved by the council. The conference approved this report.

The Resolution Committee reported with Rev. Robert Darsch as Secretary. Resolution #1 which had been referred back to the committee in the previous sitting was brought back redrafted and carried.

Ways and Means Committee reported with Rev. Wm. H. Miller acting as Secretary. Resolution #3 which had been referred back to the committee in the previous sitting was brought back redrafted and carried.

The District Supt. proceeded to name tellers in preparation for the election of officers. They were: Head Teller, Rev. Earl Lowry and the others were W. Schaltenbrand, Leon Hynson, Reed Morris, Marion Walker and Olney Ross.

A motion to recess for 10 minutes carried.

After recess the conference joined in singing, "We're Marching to Zion", after which we proceeded with the election of officers.

The results of the election are as follows:

Assistant District Supt. — Rev. William H. Miller.

District Secretary - Rev. Linwood Horseman.

District Treasurer - Rev. Paul D. Dieter.

There was a motion passed that 3 names be placed on the ballot for Advisory members of the District Council. This was done and while the tellers were counting the ballot Brother John Pizzadilli gave a good spiritual testimony.

Rev. and Mrs. P. W. Thomas were then asked to sing. They consented and sang very beautifully, "Oh My Soul Bless Thou Jehovah", after which Sr. Thomas testified.

A motion passed that Sr. Thomas be seated within the conference bar.

Mrs. J. D. Abbott was recognized and asked for a testimony. After she testified she too was granted a seat within the conference bar.

The election for the Advisory members on the first ballot were Rev. H. D. Dukes and Rev. Marion Griffin.

It was moved that we then take the three highest names on which to vote. Rev. J. Godwin Rimmer was elected.

Rev. Reed Morris was elected on the Examining Board.

A five minute recess was called for in order to give the District Council a moment to nominate names for the vacancy on Educational Board and also Examining Board.

Brother Thomas made a statement to the conference that inasmuch as the conference elected Rev. Rimmer by a strong vote that he be asked to serve on the council, in preference to the Board of Examiners.

Rev. Marion Walker was elected to the Educational Board.

Rev. George Culver was elected to the Board of Examiners for 2 years to fill the vacancy caused by Brother Rimmer's election to the council.

Rev. Mrs. Elizabeth Gilmore was elected to the office of District Missionary President.

A motion passed to adjourn.

Sister Etta Clough led in prayer.

Rev. P. W. Thomas spoke concerning the Pension Plan and gave out some pamphlets.

Rev. Thomas presented the Rev. Melvin E. Dieter who spoke to the conference concerning Eastern Pilgrim College.

Rev. J. D. Abbott was then called upon to lead out in a special prayer for E.P.C.

Resolution #3 was passed.

The Ways and Means Committee reported, Rev. Wm. H. Miller Secretary. Resolution #4 carried.

Invitations for the Fall Ministerial Convention were received from Roxana and Bethlehem Churches. The conference voted to go to Roxana for the Fall Convention.

Invitations for the Spring Ministerial Convention were received from Bethlehem and Bishop's Head Churches and the Conference voted to go to Bethlehem for the Spring Convention.

The Rev. Griffin from the American Bible Society and Maryland Bible Society was introduced to the Conference and was given opportunity to speak concerning the work that the Society does in distributing the Scriptures.

A motion passed that the District Council be authorized to correct the minutes of the last sitting if necessary and approve them.

Bro. Pizzadilli was granted opportunity to speak a few words to the conference. He spoke of his keen interest in E. P. C. and also gave his personal testimony.

A motion passed to adjourn the conference and all stood and sang The Doxology after which Rev. Thomas prayed.

# DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent, The Rev. Paul W. Thomas, Ministerial and Lay Delegates.

Greetings! Another year has gone by, and we are privileged to convene with our Ministerial ranks unbroken, it calls forth from us our deepest sense of gratitude to our Heavenly Father, who with His eye has guided us, and His hand has protected us, and His Holy Spirit has quickened us.

My heart throbs in unison with the Psalmist's when he said: "O come let us sing unto the Lord, let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation. Let us come before His presence with thanksgiving, for the Lord is a great God and we are the people of his pasture and the sheep of His hand." Psalm 95. Surely goodness and mercy have been our companions during the year past.

We meet again under God's special mercies to do business for the kingdom's interests. The year past was like others with its many and varied problems. God has helped us and to him be the glory for every accomplishment; and like the courageous spies of the past I feel like saying, "If the Lord delight in us, then he will bring us into this land, and give it us; a land which floweth with milk and honey" . . . Our giant problems are "bread for us". May God help us to feed on them and by thus masticating, digesting and assimilating them we will become strong in the Lord and in the power of His might.

I appreciate the splendid council members with whom I have been privileged to labor and also express my gratitude to all of you, my ministerial co-labourers, and to you our faithful lay leaders; may the Lord help us to continue to labor hand-in-hand and heart-to-heart as we enter into our labors during the year before us. May I assure you that as never before we need each other, and only as we unitedly catch the vision and work together will the work be done as it ought.

As I have travelled among our forty-four churches and have conducted our annual meetings I sense a very excellent spirit prevailing. Our greatest need as I see it is, for that kind of revival in which souls will be genuinely saved and sanctified wholly, and new members added to our churches; which in turn will strengthen our churches and enable us to adequately remunerate our ministers, God's servants; and also help us to meet the District and General needs financially. Let us pray, work, and give as never before to see souls brought to Christ, and into our fellowship. We need them as Pilgrims and they need the Saviour and our help as a Church.

We are happy to present two new Home Missionary Churches, which are, The Seaford Church with The Gilmores as pastors, and the Deal's Island Church with The Walkers as pastors. Each church was organized with fourteen members. The faithful pastors, their wives and families are to be commended for their labor of love in making this possible. We also appreciate the support we received from our Home Missionary minded churches. The Sunday School average at Seaford for the past year has been 49, and Deal Island has had an average of 29.

Each new church is represented by lay delegates in our conference today. Mr. Carl Huffman is here from Deal's Island, and Mrs. Phyllis Coulbourne is the lay delegate from our Seaford Church.

Our Sunday School Department has been promoted by The Rev Newell Reed under whose leadership we made a slight numerical gain of 23 for the year. Brother Reed will be giving a detailed report. We deeply appreciate his faithfulness of the past year but at his request we have released him and for the new year and have appointed Rev. George Melvin. The past year our

monthly average attendance was 3304. May I suggest an average attendance goal of 3500. We almost did this during the month of May when we ran 3497.

Our recently organized church at Glen Burnie should really challenge each of our churches with renewed vigor and spiritual life, and also cause us to give as never before to District Home Missions. It pays!

At this point may I speak of our beloved "Eastern District": Of the 1035 churches of The Pilgrim Holiness Church in the U. S. A. and Canada we have 44 which by way of comparison we rank 8th in size among the 32 Districts as to District membership we rank 9th with 1317 members; when Districts as to District membership we rank 9th with 1317 members; when it comes to average Church membership we come in as 10th with an average membership of 31. Our Sunday Schools come in 5th with an average attendance of 76.5. In finances we rank 10th as to tne total amount of \$198,243.00 "paid into our churches" and in our "percentage of General giving to total received" we are, 14th. with a 6.4 percent; but in our "percentage to District giving to total" we are 31st, giving only 3.0. This accounts for the deficits showing up on your yearly financial report. We as an "Eastern District" are one of the oldest in our denomination, this being our 58th Annual Conference. We also have one of the Oldest Camp Meetings in our Church having been organized in 1898, and are about to enter our 64th Annual Camp Meeting. We also have one of the finest District Youth Programs in our church, we rank consistently among the first six in our U. S. Fund. I have said all this to challenge your support and loyalties to our District. In all the foregoing items we average 10th. Can we not step up our District Giving to at least 10th instead of 31st, which would put us in the black and help us to do a better job and enable us to do more by way of strengthening our weaker churches and to venture out into another Home Missionary project. It is proper that our local churches should support their own pastor and take care of the local obligations as a first consideration, and secondly that their District obligation should be considered and met to the best of their ability, and lastly that our General Interests should be met. Let us be fair in considering all our obligations. Last year we kept 90.5 percent for our local need, we gave 3.1 percent to our District Interests, and gave 6.4 to General Interests. This does call for an adjustment and better distribution. No one will pay our District obligations but we, the members and churches of the Eastern District. The Word of the Lord has not changed "If any provide not for his own and especially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." and the old saying that "Charity begins at home" is also proper for us to practice.

During the past year we have made some very excellent improvements. Our new churches at Glen Burnie, Greenwood are beautiful and yet were built for very little. Rev. Shrieves at Glen Burnie and Rev. Etta Clough and their congregations are both to be congratulated. They have done much with very little. Rev. Brasure and the Pilgrims at Goldsboro likewise have done a very commendable job in enlarging their church and beautifying it on the inside and outside. These churches are all discharging their obligations very satisfactorily.

The Bethlehem and Quinby congregations both built very nice and comfortable parsonages and have kept within their financial strength. Rev. Glen Staehli and Rev. L. Holden are to be commended for their hard work and faithfulness.

Our Harrington Church is just completing a four bedroom, brick veneer, ranch type home and garage which is valued at approximately \$25,000.00. Rev. and Mrs. Wm. Miller have, with their members, laboured very faithfully in bringing this to pass. They have sold the old parsonage and hope to be moved into their new home by at least August 20th.

### HONORABLE MENTION

The Rev. Wilbur W. Bubb is still serving our country as Chaplain in the Air Force, his present address is: 8C Hay Street, Westover AFB, Mass. Chaplain Bubb was the first minister of our denomination to serve in this position.

### PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 100 times, visited each church two or more times, performed 9 baptisms, visited revivals and camps 24 times, attended 10 Eastern Pilgrim College executive Committee Meetings, 2 E. P. C. Board Meetings, 1 Owosso College Board Meeting, presided over 13 Council Meetings, attended the National Sunday School Convention, also the E. P. C. Lecture Series, attended 10 Zone Meetings in the District, I sat in with the Educational and Examining Board meetings, I presided over 7 Home Missionary Board Meetings and organized two Home Missionary Churches at Deal's Island and Seaford, Dedicated the new churches at Glen Burnie, Greenwood and the annex at Goldsboro, Dedicated the parsonages at Broomes Island, Quinby and Bethlehem. During the past year I also made 101 calls on pastors, and 50 calls on laymen, officiated at 2 marriages, I sent out 3 circular letters to pastors and churches, published 10 issues of the "Eastern Pilgrim" with a circulation of 1250 copies.

We had two very profitable Ministerial Conventions which were very well attended, also participated and attended the District S. S. Convention here on July 4th with a total attendance of 652. I also directed our District Camp Meeting and attended the services of our District Youth Camp.

I travelled 17,801 miles in performance of my duties.

My salary was paid in full.

Mrs. Bowman and I wish to express our appreciation to the District for the improvements made on the District Parsonage, and the comforts of our home. Thank you!

Mrs. Bowman has travelled with me to most of our church meetings and participated in many Sunday School activities, by means of scene-o-felt messages, teaching S. S. Classes, addressed Youth groups, served as an instructor in our Dist. Youth Camp, and has filled the pulpit as supply at Exmore and other places as needed. The Lord has privileged her to see a number of seekers at these services.

# OUR CAMP MEETING

As director of our District Camp we praise the Lord for the gracious Camp Meeting with which the Lord is still honoring our District. We also appreciate the interest taken by the Campers and property owners. Many improvements have been made by them, hundreds and thousands of dollars are spent each year to maintain this property. During the past year we have added a wing on the tabernacle; ran a new 1-1/4" pipe line to supply water to the Helsby Lane and Elliott Lane cottage owners; the seats in the tabernacle have been improved for your comfort; we have painted "Glory Inn" and the "Missionary Cottage" and had our three dormitory buildings white-washed through the kindness of Mr. Jones; all the dining room tables have been varnished. Let us all pray the Lord to grant us a glorious, fruitful, Spirit honored Camp for 1962.

# REPORT OF MISSIONARY DIRECTRESS

To the Co-Workers of the Annual Conference of the Eastern District for the 58th year, greetings in the name of Our Lord Jesus-

The Psalmist David in his 65th writing speaking of the priests in the temple, said, "Blessed is the man whom thou choosest, and causest to approach unto thee, that he may dwell in thy courts: we shall be satisfied with the goodness of thy house, even of the holy temple." Then again in verse II, "Thou crownest the year with thy goodness."

Considering the various vocations of life and the hazards that accompany them, we who have been permitted to contribute something to the files of the Lord's work through efforts of mind and body, can rejoice together because we have been chosen of God. Of surety, God has crowned our year of labor once again. Perhaps it may be hard for us to evaluate this crown of blessing, but, the value of one soul Jesus compared against the wealth of this world. Through faith, in the Lord, we believe that all of these labors have resulted in that very spiritual accomplishment.

The people of the Eastern District, once again, unitedly endeavored to assume their responsibilities in promoting missions. We welcome the Society Organizations of Glen Burnie, Centreville, and New Liberty into the conference this year. Our reports show that 32 of the 44 churches in the district are producing some type of society program. We know the other churches are coperating in missionary efforts but have been unable to fulfill the program of a society. We trust that this year some of these may be able to take that step, and that those already organized will promote to a greater extent.

A total of 12 Zone Missionary Rallies were held in the District this year. Our spring rally efforts were co-ordinated with the departure of Rev. and Mrs. Ray Chamberlain, Jr. to Africa. The churches rallied to the provision of material needs and supported the rallies. From the combined offerings of these rallies we were able to give the Chamberlains a gift of \$100.00. Of most lasting value was the blessing of the Holy Spirit as He anointed the dedication services for these workers and made us feel we had worshipped in heavenly places. The pastors and Superintendent of the District closed the services in the laying of their hands on these dedicated workers in prayer. Our desire is that others may feel the cause and call of God and give of their lives in christian service.

As District President of the Society Program 1,650 miles were travelled. 1,050 listeners attended these rallies. The District Society re-imbursed the expense of travel, as well as all other expenses for the rallies.

Last year some suggested projects were given forth to the women during the Denton Camp Society Workshop. This proved of interest and value. The white waitress aprons and headbands show some of the handiwork of the ladies. The Denton Church women under the leadership of Mrs. Culver improved Adams Memorial with shades and curtains for the windows. The Cambridge Church improved the Council Room Cottage with drapes and curtains. Pilgrim children provided the napkin holders for the dining room. All of the other donations for the Camp cannot be mentioned singularly, but are indeed appreciated. improvements on the Son Evangelist's Cottage.

Mrs. Bowman and Mrs. Dieter painted and made curtains as well as other improvements in the Song Evangelist's Cottage.

Several societies have worked hours in making gowns and clothes appropriate for weddings on Mission Stations in Africa. Our desire was to provide each station with a complete outfit to be kept ready for such occasions thus eliminating confusion when such affairs descend upon missionary personnel to provide the clothing for the national couple seeking marriage.

The quantities of boxes sent overseas and the money raised for support of World Missions Work and District Work could not have been accomplished without the co-operation of officers and people. For the active Presidents and their people we express our sincere thanks. Our Zone Leaders again were faithful in helping me promote interest. Mrs. Lucille Murphy of Tidewater, Mr. Roland Melvin of Forward, and Mrs. Charles Baker of Western Zone kindly gave in this respect and their reward will be from the Master himself. On Coastal Zone Mrs. Sullivan suffered a bad year physically but faithfully continued to promote in her local society. We regretted to lose Mrs. Brown as Leader for Southern Zone, but, trust that her efforts along with those of her husband at the General Offices may prove of greater blessings in a broader field.

It has been my pleasure to serve the District and work again with Rev. Mark Bowman and the District Pastors in promoting this work. The work of the Lord is never done, and the people of the Lord are the ones to see that

the job gets done. We know that your hands are already full, however, when this life is over it will be what has been done for Christ that will count. May we find strength in the Lord and not grow weary in the long hours of extra service. My thanks to each one of you for helping to promote God's work this year.

# WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE - 1962

tithe fund shall be used (as it is presently being used) for the parsonage account for the next 2 years.

Be it further resolved that after 2 years that all ministers shall continue to pay 25% of their tithe into a fund for the purpose of helping support

full time pastors of smaller churches with their support.

No. 3

Whereas the envelope system is widely used in the general departments of our churches and successfully used in some of our local churches to raise needed finances, be it resolved that the district make available to our churches annual budget offering envelopes with sufficient information thereon to assist in raising the funds as outlined in standing rule No. 1, page 33, conference journal of 1961.

Adopted.

No. 4.

Whereas the Conference Journals are not paying the cost of printing and whereas a cheaper grade of materials could be used to greatly reduce the cost and whereas the selling price could be increased: be it resolved that the District Council choose a suitable paper stock and adjust the selling price of journal to absorb the cost.

Adopted.

# STANDING RULES

- No. 1. The United Stewardship Fund shall be \$8.00 per member per year and our District Budget shall be set at \$3.25 per member per year and our committment to Eastern Pilgrim College be set at \$3.00 per member per year making a total of \$14.25 per member per year. Every church in the conference shall set aside one Sunday in each month, preferably the first, to receive the offering for the Annual Budget.
- No. 2. The Conference shall accept the Pension plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 4 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.
- No. 3. Each Church shall pay into the District Treasury 5% of all Regular Offerings (Sunday morning and evening and Prayer meeting). This amount to be sent in monthly. This 5% shall be apportioned as follows: 75% for District Budget, and 25% for District Home Missions.
- 4. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$85.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of camp meeting fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, full payment of Pilgrim Pension Fund, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct not more than 2 revivals or conventions of not more than 4 Sundays each year, with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.
- 5. Each Church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member No. each visit.
- No. 6. The District Secretary and Treasurer shall receive \$85.00 and \$200.00 respectively plus postage per year.
- No. 7. The District Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year.
- No. 8. The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:
  - a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.

  - b. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
    c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
    d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
    e. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
    f. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
    g. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly. This assessment shall be based on the past years average attendance.
- 9. The District Conference recommends that each church pay the assessment fees of the Pastor and wife, all incapacitated ordained ministers on the membership roll of any given church, and that the District shall pay the assessment fees of the District Superintendent and his wife, as these fees relate to the Ministerial Benefit Association.
- No. 10. All pastors shall pay all their ministerial tithe into the church where they hold membership. Each month the local church treasurer shall forward to the District Treasurer 25% of said pastor's tithe. This pastor's tithe fund shall be used (as it is presently being used) for the District Parsonage account for the next two years after which all ministers shall continue to pay 25% of their tithe into a fund for the purpose of helping support full time pastors of small churches with their support.

### CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 11. Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 12. Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 13. All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.
- No. 14. All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 15. A Bible College service shall be held the 2nd Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No.16. No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 17. A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 18. A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meeting for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 19. The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale, this practice to be continued.
- No. 20. No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been moved.
- No. 21. All active District Ministers and Evangelists shall give 2 eight hour days of work on the camp grounds each year and in the event any minister is unable to participate in this work program, he be assessed at the rate of \$10.00 per day.
- No. 22. Ladies and young girls taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly and as becometh holiness.
- No. 23. No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 24. One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 25. The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 26. All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 27. The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the council is unable to grant a transfer or lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the Council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by

- others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 28. Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 29. Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 30. The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.

### CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 31. All ministers assuming new pastoral duties shall move before the second Sunday after District Conference.
- No. 32. The District Superintendent as soon after conference as possible shall meet with the membership and official boards of the local churches and that his duties shall further include the strengthening of weaker churches of the district and take an active part in District Home Missionary endeavors.
- No. 33. The Conference year shall close on May 31st and all reports shall be postmarked no later than July 1st, and mailed to the District Superintendent and the District Statistician.
- No. 34. Sittings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon Session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30; Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 35. As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 36. No individual shall serve as a member of more than one of the following: Council, Examining Board, Education Board, and Resolution Committee.
- No. 37. The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 P. M. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 38. The objectives, plans and goals of all District Departments (Sunday School, Youth, Home Missionary, District Missionary Director) shall be in the hands of all District Ministers within 30 days following conference and furthermore that the committees and boards shall have opportunity to promote their program at the District Fall Ministerial Convention.
- No. 39. The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 40. The district secretary shall send, immediately following the district conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the District Superintendent and to each local Church Treasurer.
- No. 41. Each zone of our district shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.

- No. 42. The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.
- No. 43. Quarterly report blanks shall be prepared and sent to the District Superintendent by each church. Said blanks shall be furnished by the Conference Secretary.
- No. 44. The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P. M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified not later than 30 days prior to the conference.
- No. 45. There shall be a District Director of Missionary Societies appointed
- No. 46. The goals for the Conference year shall be 2 new churches, and 95 new members.

  each year by the District Council; whose duty shall be to promote the missionary enterprise of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- No. 47. Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- No. 48. An Honor Roll shall be provided by the District which shall list the names of the churches that reach their yearly goals, and an appropriate award given to those churches listed thereon at the Annual Conference.
- No. 49. Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 50. The rate of mileage paid by the District for travel in district interests shall be .07c per mile.
- No. 51. The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A. M. the third Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.
- No. 52. The Home Missionary Board shall be composed of the members of the District Council with the District Superintendent as the Chairman. The Executive Branch of the Council shall constitute the administrative agency of this Board and the Advisory Members of the Council and the Pastors of the churches in the district receiving support from the District shall meet twice each year with the executive agency in advisory capacity.
- No. 53. The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 54. The District Council shall be the District Trustees and the executive members of the Council are the negotiating signers of all District transactions.
- No. 55. The conference bar shall include the first ten rows in the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform.

### MINUTES

- No. 56. The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 57. The Price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 58. The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.
- No. 59. Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.

### DISTRICT BUSINESS

- No. 60. Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 61. No annual church business meeting shall be held on Sunday.
- No. 62. Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
- No. 63. Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, other than camp and church related business.
- No. 64. The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 65. Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and addresses of the local paper.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

- No. 66. A District Sunday School Rally shall be held on July 4.
- No. 67. Two Sunday School banners shall be awarded at the district rallies, one on the basis of the percentage of enrollment present, and the second one on the basis of the number present in all sessions, multiplied by the number of miles traveled.
- No. 68. The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$50.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the Conference for his services.

### DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 6th Annual Eastern District Youth Conference:

For the privilege of working together in the interests of Pilgrim Youth during the past year has indeed been a source of blessing and challenge. I am reminded of the exhortation of the Apostle Paul, "Thou therefore my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus. By way of a personal report the following compilation of efforts is submitted.

The Lord gave us a very profitable Youth Camp last August with 110 campers registered. Excellent classes, wholesome recreation and good gospel services resulted in many victories through Christ our Lord.

The church was filled at Laurel, Delaware on Thursday evening, Sept. 28, 1961 for the annual youth leader's institute. This workshop type of meeting resulted in the exchange of ideas and practical helps for young people's services.

LOOKING AHEAD . . . Our youth camp is just before us, August 13-17. Rev. Tommy Holshouser and the Quartet from Eastern Pilgrim College will be with us, the Lord Willing. Instructors will be Mrs. Anna Bowman, Rev. G!enn Staehli, Roger Ellers, and Roland Melvin, Jr. Let's pray earnestly and work faithfully for the spiritual victories that God wants to give us!

The District Wide Youth Leader's Institute will be held as scheduled at a time and place soon to be designated by the Youth Officers.

The District Wide Youth Rally once again has been set up for Friday evening, Dec. 28, 1962 at a site yet to be selected. The Shorb Brothers will be present to bring the Gospel in Song and the message from the Word. Keep this date in mind.

I would like to present the following schedule for Young People's Services during this current camp meeting.

Monday, July 30—Western Shore Zone Tuesday, July 31—Forward Zone Wednesday, Aug. 1—Coastal Zone Thursday, Aug. 2—Tidewater Zone Friday, Aug. 3—Southern Zone
