# Minutes Of Conference Proceedings

## FIRST SITTING — JULY 23, 1964

The 60th annual conference of Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened on July 23rd, 1964 at 1:30 P.M.

Rev. Mark H. Bowman, Eastern District Superintendent, opened the conference with a few words of greeting.

Rev. Reed Morris led the conference in singing "Take the Name of Jesus with You" and Rev. Edgar Haskins played the piano. Then the conference sang "The Solid Rock" after which Capital District Superintendent, Rev. R. D. Gunsalus led the conference in prayer.

Rev. Bowman then introduced and presented to the conference Dr. Melvin Snyder, General Superintendent of Eastern Area, who spoke to the conference. Brother Snyder read a Scripture lesson from Matthew, chapter 8, and spoke on the subject of Faith. He warned the conference that a mere religion was not enough, but that faith was vital. He said that the most religious people of Jesus' day were damned, because of unbelief. He remarked that one must not only be good, but good for something, and that God not only wants to do something for us, but through us. Using the Centurion's faith for an example of the real miracle in the incident, recorded in the Scripture lesson, Brother Snyder brought to our attention four things about the Centurion's faith:

- 1—He exercised his faith in profound humility.
- 2—He exercised his faith in profound love.
- 3—His faith recognized constituted authority.
- 4—His faith exercised constituted authority.

He made a practical application of these points to the conference and exhorted us to have this kind of faith.

The District Secretary proceeded to read the roll call, after which the reception committee introduced to the conference, the following people: Rev. McCray Holmes, Rev. and Mrs. Robert Bonniwell and Rev. Roy Dorsett. These folks gave a word of testimony and a motion carried to accept them in the conference and give them a seat within the conference bar.

The Conference bar was then established.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Mark H. Bowman, gave his report and a motion passed to accept this report, with appreciation.

Rev. Wm. H. Miller, Assistant Superintendent, gave his oral report and it was received.

The auditing committee reported through their chairman, Rev. Liston Moyer. A motion passed that this report be accepted, with appreciation.

District Treasurer, Rev. Paul D. Dieter gave financial report of District account and also Camp report, and both were received with appreciation.

The District Statistician, Rev. Edgar J. Haskins gave statistician's report and a motion passed to accept this report, with a rising vote of thanks.

The first session of the conference adjourned by expiration of time, and Rev. H. D. Dukes dismissed with prayer.

**SECOND SITTING, JULY 23, 1964**

The second sitting of the 1964 conference of Eastern District Pilgrim Holiness Church, opened at 6:30 P.M. July 23, 1964, with Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. Wm. H. Miller, leading the conference in singing "Trust and Obey" with Rev. E. J. Haskins at the piano.

Rev. H. G. Baker then led in prayer.

The District Secretary read the minutes of previous sitting and they were approved. Rev. Snyder introduced and presented to the conference Rev. George Harris, who brought greetings from E.P.C. Brother Snyder told the conference that there were three things that we owe our College: (1) We owe it our prayers every day. (2) We owe it our financial help every year. (3) We owe it our moral support by getting more students in. Then Rev. Harris spoke bringing greetings from Rev. Dieter, the college president. He gave a glowing report of the Loyalty fund drive and told us that 80% of the goal had been reached, which amounted to \$40,000. This had been a great encouragement to all. He stated that for every \$2500.00 invested in E.P.C. that they in turn, turned out one Christian worker. He told how that there had been an encouraging increase in college attendance and that this year would be better than for several years. He urged the conference to pray the "Lord of the Harvest" for young people who will do God's will. He closed his remarks by saying that the college has no choice, but to do the job, and no alternative but victory.

A motion carried to grant Rev. Harris an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The roll call was dispensed with, but the names of a few who were not in attendance in the first sitting were added to the roll call.

Rev. A. T. Adams, District S. S. Promotional Secretary, gave his report and a motion passed to accept this report with appreciation. Bro. Adams then presented the "Decade of Progress" award, which went to the Glen Burnie Church, with Rev. Braden Shrieves as Pastor. He also gave some ribbons to those whose Sunday Schools had shown a gain, who were not represented at the Fourth of July Convention.

Mrs. Grace Culver, District Missionary Society President, gave her report. This too was a report of much activity and accomplishments and was accepted, with appreciation.

Rev. Lida J. Brasure, District Missionary Society Treasurer, gave the financial report for the society, after which a motion prevailed to receive her report.

Rev. Snyder then asked for Pastors personal reports to be read. There were 29 pastors reporting, and 14 either absent, or not ready to report.

The second sitting of the Conference came to a close by expiration of time and the chairman asked that each one stand and shake hands with their neighbor.

**THIRD SITTING, JULY 24, 1964**

The third sitting of the conference of Eastern District Pilgrim Holiness Church, opened with Rev. Graham F. Senter leading the conference in singing "The Solid Rock", with Rev. Edgar J. Haskins at the piano. Then the conference joined in singing together "More About Jesus".

Prayer was offered by Rev. P. F. Bean.

For devotions, the conference chairman, Rev. Snyder asked for a few promises from the Word of God. Several ministers quoted passages. Bro. John Pizzadili gave personal testimony and then quoted Psalm 121. The roll call was dispensed with, by a motion and then the District Secretary read the min-

utes of the previous sitting, which were approved as read. Rev. Snyder then gave a summation of reports that were given by the pastors in the previous sitting and made the following observations:

1. Pastors (generally speaking) are under paid.
2. Each report revealed that the church had seekers at the altar.
3. Youth meetings are attended well.
4. This district has more youth attending college than the average.
5. This district has very low indebtedness.

He threw out to the conference a challenge that our faith should encompass the promise that God can take us (the P. H. Church), when we yield to him and perform a tremendous task in our nation.

Brother Snyder requested that this conference earnestly pray for a special meeting that is being sponsored by the National Holiness Association, November 3-6 at Winona Lake, at which time 19 papers on the great subjects of the Bible will be presented by Holiness leaders. He asked us to pray that God will use this to precipitate a Holy Ghost Revival.

The reception committee presented Rev. J. D. Abbott, who is General Secretary-Treasurer of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Rev. Abbott gave a personal word of testimony.

The Memoirs Committee reported through their chairman, Rev. Louetta Holden, who paid tribute to 21 people from our ranks, who have departed this life and gone to be with the Lord, during the past Conference year. The Conference stood in respect and silent prayer, after which Rev. Snyder prayed.

The Resolution Committee reported through their secretary, Rev. Wm. Quillen.

Resolution #1—Passed.

Resolution #2—Lost.

Resolution #3—The chairman ruled out the financial part of this resolution and then conference voted on the remainder and it was passed.

Resolution #4—Passed.

Resolution #5—Passed.

Resolution #6—was amended to change this resolution to read according to instructions given by General S. S. Secretary. This resolution as amended, was passed.

Resolution #7—This resolution was ruled out of order by Conference Chairman.

Resolutions #8 & #9, were combined and after some discussion, a motion to table in order to kill was made and seconded. This took a  $\frac{2}{3}$  majority of the Conference to carry, and was lost because of a lack of support.

The resolution was then voted on and passed.

A motion passed to have a 10 minute recess. After the recess the conference was again called to order.

The Ways and Means Committee reported through their secretary, Rev. Reed Morris.

Resolution #1—Passed.

Resolution #2—Passed.

Resolution #3—Passed.

Resolution #4—Passed.

The chairman of the conference gave permission to Mr. John Pizzadili, to bring up something from the floor. Brother Pizzadili's thought was that a layman be elected to the District Council. The Conference Chairman pointed out that this could not be made mandatory, but it is always in order to elect a layman to the District Council, if the Conference votes for such an individual.

The Conference Chairman, Rev. Snyder gave some helpful suggestions along the line of laymen being used on the local level to raise money and share the responsibilities of the material needs of the church, etc.

The Conference adjourned and was dismissed by prayer being offered by Mr. Olney Ross.

#### FOURTH SITTING, JULY 24, 1964

The fourth sitting of the Eastern District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church opened at 1:30 P.M., with Rev. Snyder presiding. He asked that each member of the Conference bow their head for a few moments of prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous sitting and after corrections were made, were approved.

The Resolution Committee reported through their secretary Rev. Wm. E. Quillen.

Resolution #10—passed.

Resolution #11—passed.

We then proceeded to elect officers for the various offices of the District. Conference Chairman, Rev. Snyder led in prayer.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Mark H. Bowman, appointed the following tellers:

Rev. Paul D. Dieter, Rev. Clifford Chew, Rev. Reed Morris, Rev. Charles Engrem, Rev. George Culver, Rev. Wm. Quillen, Rev. Musgrove, Rev. Schaltenbrand, Roland Melvin and Olney Ross.

After the election of officers, the Conference Chairman called for the pastor's personal reports that were not given before. Three Ministers reported.

Bro. Snyder emphasized the fact that all ministers were to send in quarterly reports, according to the manual.

A motion passed for a ten minute recess.

Conference was again called to order and the Secretary read the report of the Examining - Educational boards and this report was approved.

A motion passed that the District Council take care of any unfinished business of the Conference, and that the council also approve the minutes of the last session of the Conference.

Invitations for the Fall and Spring Ministerial Conventions were heard. Invitations came from Glen Burnie - Cape Charles - Cambridge - Salisbury.

The conference voted to go to Glen Burnie for the Fall Convention, and to Salisbury for the Spring Convention.

The Resolution Committee reported a final resolution through their Secretary, Rev. Wm. E. Quillen, which called for a rising vote of thanks to our General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin Snyder, our Conference Chairman, who had so ably presided over the conference and to the District Superintendent, Rev. Mark H. Bowman, Council, dining room and kitchen staff, for all that was done for the comfort, pleasure and success of the Conference. Our Conference Chairman urged the Conference, as individuals, to be faithful and reach out in our influence, those that we come in contact with, and win as many for Christ as possible.

The Doxology was sung and Rev. Snyder dismissed in prayer.

## DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 60th Annual Conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church now in session on Denton Camp Ground, Denton, Md. with our General Supt. The Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, D. D. presiding. Greetings!

We pause again to review the accomplishments of the past twelve months. It is with deep gratitude to God, our Heavenly Father, for all His bountiful blessings upon us. For the third consecutive year we are privileged to meet together in this Conference with our ministerial ranks unbroken, for which we humbly bow in reverential thanksgiving.

Personally, I thank God for the health and strength He has given to labor in His harvest field and for His glory. It's a glory and an honor to serve my Lord and Master. I also wish to thank God for the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the privilege of preaching the gospel under its banner. I was ordained in 1931 by the late Rev. Seth C. Rees, General Superintendent, and by the grace of the Lord I determine to be faithful unto the end.

Brethren, with Communism bearing down upon us Nationally, and the Ecumenical Council of Churches threatening and watering down our spiritual way of life and convictions, may we as Pilgrim ministers buckle on the Christian Armour and go forth in Christ's name to victory. Society is becoming more and

more corrupt. Our spiritual life is also in jeopardy due to the spirit of the church age with its lukewarmness creeping into our churches and pulpits. We need to bestir ourselves and seek fresh anointings upon our souls as ministers and laymen to preserve "the faith once for all delivered unto the saints."

My hearts desire for our beloved Eastern District is that during this conference and Camp Meeting we all may receive a fresh baptism of the Holy Spirit and return to our church and communities as freshly anointed servants for the great work before us.

During the past year a number of churches have shown commendable gains which have helped the District to show a new gain of **18** members, bringing our total membership to **1333**. We thank God for this increase.

Our Sunday Schools have averaged 3100, giving our 43 Sunday Schools an average of 72.1 which incidentally compares very well with our denominational average which is **72.0**. For every 100 church members we have 233 in Sunday School, which in Sunday School statistics ranks very high. Our Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the Rev. A. T. Adams, will be giving an enlarged and complete report. We appreciate his faithful and untiring labors during the past year. Our goal for 1954-1965 should be 3400. Remember the slogan and goal of our Sunday Schools was **Four in 1964**, if we'll really work at the job it will net us more.

### DISTRICT FINANCES

For the past two (2) years I presented at length a plea urging that we adjust and distribute our giving so as to pay our District Expenses in full. As a conference you adopted the new 18% Budget Plan last year and for the first time in years we ended with a balance in our District Account. You are to be commended for your faithfulness. Most of you have cooperated 100% and we trust that each of our churches and Sunday Schools will be able to do likewise this conference year. We have a wonderful group of Pilgrims. In my visits among the churches this spring we asked those present and voting to go on record, by a secret vote, to tithe during this conference year. The total vote among our church was approximately 640. We are very thankful for this goodly number, but trust that the other half of our members will also honor God and the Church with their tithes. As pastors and delegates and leading churchmen let us emphasize God's Financial Plan. It never fails and the contributor is always blessed for complying with God's directives.

Our statistical report shows that we have had a gain of property evaluation to the amount of \$51,500 bringing our total evaluation to \$1,160,800.00.

### IMPROVEMENTS

During the past year the mortgage note on the **Broomes Island** parsonage was burned.

This was made possible through the generosity of the late Mr. Warren Denton who gave his heart to the Lord and made the donation and then was called to His eternal reward. The gift amounted to about \$7,000.00. It is deeply appreciated by the local church and its community, and also by our District.

**Baltimore I** burned their church mortgage leaving only about \$4,000.00 indebtedness on their lots located across the road from the church upon which they plan to build their parsonage.

**Cambridge Church** renovated their parsonage; they sanded floors, painted and papered. They also reduced their debt on their lots and annex owing only a balance of \$7,900.00.

**Cape Charles** completed a pastor's study in the church, which also serves as a class room.

**Cedar Grove** has reduced their church debt from \$9,000.00 to about \$1,700.00. They have a lovely church and have done a wonderful job in a very short time; and have also increased Sr. Mary Garrett's salary.

**Crisfield** has painted the parsonage without, and did some renovating within.

**Dover Church** purchased a lovely location for their new church at the price of \$12,000.00 They are reducing their debt very commendably.

**Exmore Church** paid off their loan in full to the Home Missionary Department and added a couple of rooms to the parsonage.

**Glen Burnie** has built a beautiful parsonage costing approximately \$18,000.00 and has built a very attractive brick bulletin board.

**Greensboro** has completed their church basement and developed Sunday School rooms and also installed an accordian door in the rear of the sanctuary thus developing another class room. They have also bought the house and lot adjoining the church property which will become the parsonage when renovated.

**Hoopers Island** has done considerable work on their parsonage.

**Hurlock** laid new hardwood floors before the Engrem family arrived.

**Mardela** has added three rooms to the church thus giving them more Sunday School space for development.

**New Liberty** painted their church and parsonage.

Many other minor improvements are being made to our churches and parsonages, all of which are a credit to us. If I have overlooked mentioning your church it was not intentional. This is a ministry of its own kind, and is a way of preaching to our Church Communities.

The District parsonage garage was enlarged and developed into a two-car garage with overhead doors, and a 7 by 22 foot extension was added in the rear for storage space. It was a very much needed improvement and will be greatly appreciated by your District Superintendent.

### YOUTH CAMP

We just closed a very gracious Youth Camp under the direction of our District Youth Director, the Rev. Wayne Musgrove and his staff of instructors and counselors. One hundred and twenty-eight enrolled and a goodly number of our youth sought the Lord as their Saviour. What we owe our children by way of scriptural instruction, wholesome fellowship and recreation I feel we are discharging to a large extent through our youth camp and District Camp. Make much of your youth—teach them the ways of righteousness and true holiness. They'll rise up and call us blessed! A full report will be made by our Youth Director to the Youth Conference on Saturday morning at 8:00 o'clock.

### DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY

Our Missionary Societies are on the move. Our very dedicated President, Mrs. George E. Culver and her excellent committee has given our societies leadership, and progress has resulted. Our Missionary President will be giving her report to this conference.

### DENTON CAMP MEETING

Denton Camp Meeting holds a very sacred place in our hearts and thinking. May the revival fires burn on and on till Jesus comes! It holds a very vital part in our District program. Our budget the past year amounted to \$11,641.44. This year we have made a number of improvements, such as the painting of the Adams Memorial Dormitory, we hung gates at the main entrance; erected another water fountain near the main entrance; replaced a worn out stove in the kitchen; and opened a missionary booth in a part of the Lunch Room Building. During the past year we installed a new light near the caretakers cottage which

comes on and goes off automatically. Our caretakers, Bro. and Sr. P. F. Bean greatly appreciate it. It serves as a good night watchman.

One of our greatest needs is that of jacking up the large main dormitory and replacing the rotted sills and also making repairs within the building. We do trust that the campers and youth societies will come to our help and make this project possible during the months ahead. We also plan to build more benches to take care of our crowds.

A new cottage was built by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bell, Goldsboro, Md. This cottage is located on Dukes Drive. This is our 89th individually owned cottage on the Camp Ground.

A number of cottage owners did major repairs such as installing water and toilet facilities, replaced rotted sills, and general maintenance.

We appreciate the interest taken by everyone. Repairing and painting has a way of being contagious. Keep up the good work!

We hope before next Camp to erect a new cottage known as the Mitchell Memorial. You will learn more about it during our Camp Meeting. Read the Life Story of Mother Mitchell. She dearly loved Denton Camp. Make a substantial contribution towards this building.

### PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 100 times and made 93 visits to churches. I made 88 calls on pastors and 58 to laymen. Visited revivals and Camp Meetings 18 times; edited and published ten issues of the "Eastern Pilgrim." I officiated at nineteen (19) board meetings; conducted 52 church business meetings; attended seven zone meetings throughout the District; attended 5 Sunday School board meetings and three youth committee meetings; Mrs. Bowman and I attended the National Sunday School Convention at Buffalo; and also attended our District S. S. Convention. I attended three E. P. C. Board Meetings; and one Board Meeting of the Owosso College. We had eight Baptisms and dedicated our grandson, and performed three marriage ceremonies, and officiated at one funeral.

I officiated at the mortgage burning service of the Baltimore I Church; and also the mortgage burning service of the Broome's Island parsonage. I attended the Harold D. Dieter Lecture Series, and also the Campus Day on May 8th. Conducted eight joint council, Home Missionary, and Camp Committee Meetings.

I always participated in the work days which numbered nine during the year.

We had two very enlightening and inspiring Ministerial Conventions which were very well attended, also participated and attended the S. S. Convention here on July 4th. I also directed our District Camp Meeting and attended most of the services of our Youth Camp. During the past year I spent approximately a month of my time on these grounds in the preparation of and attendance of the Youth Camp, S. S. Convention and Conference and District Camp. I travelled 13,243 miles in performance of my duties.

Mrs. Bowman and I wish to express our appreciation to the District for the comfortable home you have provided for us, and also for the many pleasant times we enjoyed among you in our District travels. We love people, and appreciate Christian fellowship. It has been a real pleasure to serve you and to labor with the fine council you have elected. Our chief delight is to serve the One who died for us, and has called us into His service.

Another conference year is history. Only what's done for God and His glory really counts.

May the Lord of harvest grant us an ingathering of souls in the new fiscal year, and may we each press forward toward the goal He would have us make, so we can hear Him say, "well done thou good and faithful servant."

## SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

To the 60th Annual Conference of the Eastern District:

Greetings:

The past year has been one of growth for only a few of our Sunday Schools. Seventeen have shown a gain and three show the same as last year. The average attendance this year was 3,105. Last year it was 3,125. This reveals a numerical loss of 20. However, this loss is much less than the loss a year ago, which was 97. From this comparison we can see our attendance is beginning to climb upward. A little more effort on the part of those who show a loss and this very small figure can soon be off-set by increase.

We congratulate these schools and pray that other Sunday Schools of the District will join their ranks in the coming year.

This year 27 churches were represented in the July 4th Sunday School Convention at Denton Camp Ground, giving a total attendance of 375. Rev. W. A. Massey, Virginia District Superintendent, challenged our hearts as he spoke both morning and afternoon.

Glen Burnie received the attendance banner with an all-day count of 48. Ridgely won the percentage banner by rallying 50% of their enrollment out to the convention.

Our District participated in the "SEARCH FOR THE UNCHURCHED" fall enlargement campaign, and the spring "MARCH TO SUNDAY SCHOOL IN MARCH" plan sponsored by our General Sunday School Department. Nearly all of our churches sent their Rally Day offering in to the General Office.

We extend special congratulations to the pastor and people at Glen Burnie for winning the Sunday School of the Year award for this year, 1954, in the Decade of Progress plan.

Also, we wish to highly commend the pastor and people at Greensboro, for achieving the highest percentage gain and came second in numerical gain. May God bless these two leading schools of our District.

Since I have already been informed that I have been appointed to serve as your Promotional Sunday School Secretary again this year, I would like to offer

a few recommendations which I feel would strengthen our District Sunday Schools. They are as follows:

1. An all-out effort to increase our average attendance from 3,105 to 3,400. This will represent about a 10% increase.
2. Each school, where it is possible, start a branch Sunday School. We have been a bit negligent in this area of enlargement, but I feel that much good can be done in an effort along this line.
3. Each school sponsor a Teacher Training Course and endeavor to cover at least one book or section of the course.
4. Accelerate our Lay-Visitation efforts by making community surveys, compiling a permanent list of prospects and using every legitimate means possible to reach them for God and the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
5. Each School graded according to the Standard of Excellence and conscientious effort be made to improve the weak areas of our Sunday Schools.
6. 100% participation in the Decade of Progress Program.
7. That we discontinue the July 4th Sunday School Convention, for the time being and replace it by having Sunday School Institutes and Workshops, in the various zones of the District, throughout the year.
8. Place special emphasis on the "CITIZENS FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL" plan and endeavor to reach our goal of "FOUR IN SIXTY-FOUR" and "FIVE IN SIXTY-FIVE".

**MY PERSONAL REPORT:** It has been my privilege to send out the monthly report cards and compile the attendance, send out to Pastors and Superintendents several promotional letters, conducted three District Sunday School Board Meetings and had charge of the District Sunday School Convention on July 4th held on this Camp Ground.

My salary of \$50.00 a year, has been paid in full.

It has indeed been a privilege to labor with our District Superintendent, Rev. Mark Bowman, the District Sunday School Board, pastors, Sunday School Superintendents, and Sunday School reporters. Your prayers and cooperation have been greatly appreciated.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT MISSIONARY PRESIDENT

To our General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, Rev. Mark Bowman, District Superintendent, and the members and friends of the 60th Annual Conference of the Eastern District.

It has been a real joy to serve the District this past year. Do feel we, as Missionary Societies, many, at least, have been challenged, and stirred many times during the past Conference year.

Our District Missionary Committee, met at camp last year, and laid plans for the year. We decided to divide our District into 8 zones. The feeling of the Committee, was to have smaller zones, making it possible to plan zone meetings, with better lay representation. It has been my privilege to visit each

zone, once—and some, I have been asked to participate in, and have visited more than once. I have noted that through the last 3 quarters of the church year, that all of the District churches, have been represented in one or more zone meetings, with the exception of 5. This has been gratifying. The zone leaders, planned and carried out some excellent services, and feel the missionary societies, have cooperated and worked beautifully, together. The theme for the year was "Behold, I set before Thee an Open Door." Various zone leaders have used the theme, presenting the thought in different ways. Truly there are many open doors to enter, where dedicated people can help spread the gospel. Feel, as Missionary Societies, that our vision must have been enlarged this year.

The District Missionary Committee also made plans to have 500 Missionary Song and Chorus Books, mimeographed—giving each zone leader 50, to help lend variety in our Missionary zone meetings. A number of the societies wanted some to use in their local meetings—until we decided to have 1100 more made up—at a very small cost. These have been and are being used, both in local societies, as well as zone meetings.

During the year, we had a District Project, to help defray expenses of getting a 54 passenger bus, to the shipping point in Florida, for the use of the Missionary on Grand Cayman Island. Quite a few churches responded with an offering, towards the goal of \$100.00. I had the privilege of presenting the check for \$100.00 to Rev. John Croft, when he came to Denton to get the bus, and start the journey of getting it to the shipping point. He was very happy for the gift and understand that the bus is proving a real blessing on the Island.

During camp week, Monday through Friday—we had daily workshops, with Mrs. Elizabeth Gilmore, the retiring District Missionary President, in charge. Those who participated in the various workshops, were Miss Ruth Meeks, Rev. Mrs. Margaret Hankins, Rev. Dean Phillips, Rev. Paul Meeks and Rev. Charles Lewis. Due to the many inquiries, of ways to best help the missionary, especially things that can be made, and sent to the missionary, as well as the sending of used clothing, used literature, etc. - has helped us, as a Committee, to decide on a Missionary Display Room, here on the Camp Ground. This room has been made available to us, and fixed up, for the express purpose of making it possible for the President, Work-Chairman, or any interested person, from any of the local societies, as well as friends, to come, at their convenience, to ask questions, receive help, patterns, ideas, etc. that will help in carrying on their local work, this next year.

The cooperation I have received from the local societies has been gratifying. Last year quite a lot of the churches took a room, or rooms to improve, clean and make ready for use at our Conference and Camp Meeting. The buildings that are assigned to us, as a District Missionary Society, are Glory Inn, Missionary Cottage, Evangelists and Evangelistic Singers Cottages, and the Council Room and upstairs sleeping rooms. This year the churches have responded again, with more added, since last year. The willingness on the part of the Missionary Societies to take this responsibility, as a camp project, each year, is surely appreciated. Surely want the Lord to bless each one, willing to do the menial tasks—that mean so much, when completed, to those visiting the camp.

Recently, in a letter from Rev. Ermal Wilson, took note that he stated, "A great door - - - is opened." 1st Cor. 16:9. It impressed me, as we have been using the theme this year, "Behold, I set before Thee an open door." The need is GREAT—and many doors are OPEN—let's as a District Missionary Society, and each local society, continue to work together, as enthusiastically, and harmoniously—as we have this past year. Let's ask God to give us a greater vision, passion and interest in the multitudes yet standing "Outside the Door". Proverbs 29:18 says, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." This poem stirred my heart, and trust it will stir each one of us.

## REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE 1964

### Resolution No. 1

WHEREAS the District Youth Camp was very successful this year, part of which may be attributed to the time of the camp, and

WHEREAS the need for the promotion of the Spiritual well being of our young people is recognized by all of this conference;

BE IT RESOLVED that the annual Youth Camp be held prior to the regular camp, with the specific date and time of youth camp to be determined by the youth council and the District Council—passed.

### Resolution No. 2

Lost

### Resolution No. 3

BE IT RESOLVED that a stenographer be employed to help the secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer as soon after conference as possible. Passed.

### Resolution No. 4

BE IT RESOLVED that the Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Parsonage". Passed.

### Resolution No. 5

INASMUCH as the District Superintendent is in closer relationship with our ministers of the district and their ministerial standing than the educational and examining boards,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be a standing member of the Educational and Examining boards. Passed.

### Resolution No. 6

INASMUCH as the District S.S. Board has passed action regulating the count of Sunday School attendance;

BE IT RESOLVED, that each S.S. cease counting at the middle of the S.S. session; thereby placing all Sunday School counting on an equalized basis. Passed.

### Resolution No. 7

Out of Order.

### Resolution No. 8

INASMUCH as the dates for Annual Meetings at which time pastors are called, cover such a long period of weeks:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that to facilitate matters the calling of the pastor be separated from the Annual meetings and that all of our churches have a call pastor meeting some time during the period from the first Sunday in April through the second Sunday in April, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a form of procedure for the calling of pastors be established as follows to serve as a guide for the future:

(1) Let all the call pastor meetings be held during the period involving the first Sunday in April through the second Sunday of April.

(2) If the pastor is not recalled, resigns, or does not submit his name for a vote, the result of the meeting should immediately be forwarded to the Superintendent by the church secretary.

(3) If the pastor is recalled, he can have the legal time established by the manual to accept or reject the call. If he does or does not accept the call he shall immediately inform the District Supt. of his decision.

(4) In the event of the pastor's leaving, whatever the circumstances, the District Supt. shall present, either in person, writing or through an authorized representative the list of available ministers, with recommendations that naturally fall within his jurisdiction.

(5) It shall be the privilege of the local board and the church to immediately call a man on the basis of recommendation without having a trial message.

(6) In the event a board and church desire a trial message, the board shall make a choice of a candidate. If two or three candidates are chosen they should be designated as first, second and third choice.

(7) After the trial message of the first candidate there shall be a vote on the candidate within a reasonable length of time, preferably immediately.

(8) If the first candidate is not called or refuses to accept the call, the same procedure shall be followed with the second candidate or third.

(9) In no case however shall a second candidate be called to preach a trial message until a vote has been taken by the board and the church on the first.

(10) Let all retiring ministers consider their ministry to a church as ending according to manual the Sunday following Camp and all moving take place the following week. Passed.

#### **Resolution No. 9**

INASMUCH as the interest in the Fourth of July S.S. Convention seems to be on the decrease,

BE IT RESOLVED that we discontinue this convention for the time being, and replace it by workshops and institutes, planned under the direction of the District S.S. Board. Passed.

#### **Resolution No. 10**

INASMUCH as in the Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report these items seem important,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the conference adopt his recommendations as follows:

(1) An all-out effort to increase our average attendance from 3105 to 3400. This will represent about a 10% increase.

(2) Each school where possible start a branch Sunday School.

(3) Each school sponsor a Teacher Training Course and endeavor to cover at least one book or section of the course.

(4) Accelerate our lay visitation efforts by making community surveys compiling a permanent list of prospects and using every legitimate means possible to reach them for God and the P. H. Church.

(5) Each School graded according to the Standard of Excellence and a conscientious effort be made to improve the weak areas of our Sunday Schools.

(6) 100% participation in the Decade of Progress program.



(7) Place special emphasis on the "Citizens For Sunday School" plan and endeavor to reach our goal of "Four In Sixty-four" and "Five In Sixty-five". Passed.

WHEREAS it is not only customary, but a real joy and pleasure to offer gratitude to those who have labored so faithfully;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we thank Rev. Melvin Snyder our General Superintendent for his able presiding in the chair and our District Superintendent, Rev. Mark H. Bowman for his faithful labors the past year and members of the Council and Dining Room staff and all others who have made this conference pleasant and possible. We recommend its adoption with a rising vote of thanks. Passed.

**REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE 1964**

**Resolution No. 1**

INASMUCH as the Salary of the District Superintendent has not been raised for several years,

BE IT RESOLVED, that standing rule #3, page 28 be amended to read: The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$90.00 per week, etc. Passed.

**Resolution No. 2**

BE IT RESOLVED that standing rule #5 and #6 be combined to read as follows: The District Secretary, Treasurer and Statistician shall receive \$85.00, \$300.00 and \$75.00 respectively, plus postage per year. Passed.

**Resolution No. 3**

BE IT RESOLVED that standing rule #36 page 30 be amended to read: The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$75.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the conference for his services. Passed.

**Resolution No. 4**

BE IT RESOLVED that the District Council shall determine who shall serve and the amount paid to Stenographer who will assist in Journal preparation. Passed.

**STANDING RULES**

- No. 1 An amount equal to 18% of all regular church and Sunday School offerings shall be remitted by each local church monthly to the District Treasurer to be apportioned as follows:

56%—District Budget

31%—United Stewardship Fund

13%—Eastern Pilgrim College

The 56% District Budget shall be apportioned as follows:

83%—District Account

11%—Home Missionary Account

6%—General Conference Account

- No. 2 The Conference shall accept the Pension plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 6 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems

best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.

- No. 3 The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$90.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of camp meeting fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, full payment of Pilgrim Pension Fund, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct not more than 2 revivals or conventions of not more than 4 Sundays each year, with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.
- No. 4 Each Church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member each visit.
- No. 5 The District Secretary, Treasurer and Statistician shall receive \$85.00, \$300.00 and \$75.00 respectively plus postage per year.
- No. 6 The District Conference recommends that each church pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife, all incapacitated ordained ministers on the membership roll of any given church, and that the District shall pay the assessment fees of the District Superintendent and his wife, as these fees relate to the Ministerial Benefit Association.
- No. 7 The District Superintendent as soon after conference as possible shall meet with the membership and official boards of the local churches and that his duties shall further include the strengthening of weaker churches of the district and take an active part in District Home Missionary endeavors.
- No. 8 The objectives, plans and goals of all District Departments (Sunday School, Youth, Home Missionary, District Missionary Director) shall be in the hands of all District Ministers within 30 days following conference and furthermore that the committees and boards shall have opportunity to promote their program at the District Fall Ministerial Convention.
- No. 9 Each zone of our district shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.
- No. 10 The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.
- No. 11 Quarterly report blanks shall be prepared and sent to the District Superintendent by each church. Said blanks shall be furnished by the Conference Secretary.
- No. 12 The goals for the Conference year shall be 2 new churches, and 95 new members.
- No. 13 A registration fee of \$2.00 shall be paid by each member of the district conference to the registrar upon arrival at the district conference. This fee shall be applied toward meals, electric, lodging and journal expense. It is understood that payment of this fee makes the member of the conference eligible to receive a copy of the journal without further cost.
- No. 14 Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- No. 15 An Honor Roll shall be provided by the District which shall list the

names of the churches that reach their yearly goals and an appropriate award given to those churches listed thereon at the Annual Conference.

- No. 16 Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 17 The rate of mileage paid by the District for travel in district interests shall be .07c per mile.
- No. 18 The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A.M. the third Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.
- No. 19 The Home Missionary Board shall be composed of the members of the District Council with the District Superintendent as the Chairman. The Executive Branch of the Council shall constitute the administrative agency of this Board and the Advisory Members of the Council and the Pastors of the churches in the district receiving support from the District shall meet twice each year with the executive agency in advisory capacity.
- No. 20 The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 21 The District Council shall be the District Trustees and the executive members of the Council are the negotiating signers of all District transactions.
- No. 22 The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 23 The Price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 24 The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.
- No. 25 Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.
- No. 26 Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 27 No annual church business meeting shall be held on Sunday.
- No. 28 Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
- No. 29 Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, other than camp and church related business.
- No. 30 The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 31 Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.
- No. 32 The churches shall grant their pastor the option of conducting two revivals a year.
- No. 33 The Annual Youth Camp shall be held prior to the regular camp with

- the specific date and time to be determined by youth council and District Council.
- No. 34 A stenographer shall be employed by District Council to help the District Secretary in preparing the minutes for the printer.
- No. 35 Each church financially able is urged to build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor to be used and known as their "Camp Parsonage".
- No. 36 The District Superintendent shall be a standing member of the educational and examining boards.

### CALLING OF PASTORS

- No. 37 A pastor call meeting shall be held separate from the annual business meeting between the first and second Sunday of April, inclusive.
- No. 38 A form of procedure for calling of pastor shall be as follows:
- (a) The results of the pastor call meeting shall immediately be forwarded to the District Superintendent by the church secretary.
  - (b) The pastor shall have 15 days to accept or reject the call and he shall inform the District Superintendent of his decision.
  - (c) Whenever the church is in need of a pastor, the District Superintendent shall present, either in person, writing or through an authorized representative the list of available ministers, with recommendations that fall naturally within his jurisdiction.
  - (d) A church board and church may immediately call a man on the basis of recommendation without having a trial message.
  - (e) When the board and church desire a trial message the board shall make a choice of a candidate. Candidates should be designated as first, second or third choice. A vote shall be taken on the candidate within a reasonable time, preferably immediately.
  - (f) If the first candidate is not called or refuses the call the same procedure shall be followed for the other candidates.
  - (g) A second candidate shall not be called to preach a trial message until a vote has been taken on the first.
- No. 39 All retiring ministers shall close their ministry to a church the Sunday following camp and all moving take place the following week.
- No. 40 The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$75.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the Conference for his services.
- No. 41 The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:
- a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.
  - b. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
  - c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
  - d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
  - e. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
  - f. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
  - g. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.
- This assessment shall be based on the past year's average attendance.
- No. 42 Each Sunday School shall cease counting its attendance at the middle of the S. S. session.

### CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 43 The Conference year shall close on May 31st and all reports shall be postmarked no later than July 1st, and mailed to the District Superintendent and the District Statistician.
- No. 44 Sitzings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon Session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30; Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 45 As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 46 The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 P.M. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 47 The conference bar shall include the first ten rows in the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform.
- No. 48 The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 49 The district secretary shall send, immediately following the district conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the District Superintendent and to each local Church Treasurer.
- No. 50 The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P.M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified no later than 30 days prior to the conference.

### CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 51 Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 52 Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 53 All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.
- No. 54 All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 55 A Bible college service shall be held the 2nd Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 56 No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 57 A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 58 A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meeting for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 59 The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale, this practice to be continued.

- No. 60 No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been moved.
- No. 61 All active District Ministers and Evangelists shall give 2 eight hour days of work on the camp grounds each year and in the event any minister is unable to participate in this work program, he be assessed at the rate of \$10.00 per day.
- No. 62 Ladies and young girls taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly and as becometh holiness.
- No. 63 No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 64 One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 65 The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 66 All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 67 The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the council is unable to grant a transfer or lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the Council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 68 Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 69 Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 70 The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.

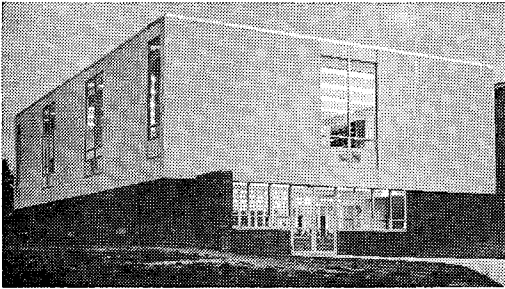

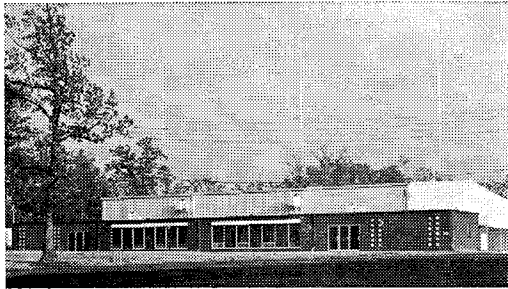

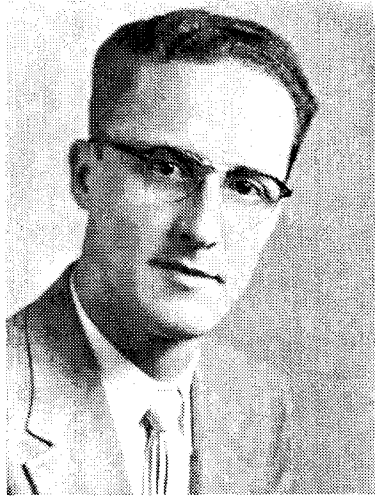

## DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 8th annual Youth Conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church with The Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, Area General Superintendent, presiding.

Indeed it has been a rewarding experience to work with the Youth of our district. Most sincerely I believe they are some of the finest to be found anywhere and my sincere prayer and desire is that they shall leave an indelible mark for God on the Eastern Shore. The cooperation given as we have endeavoured to labour together by the District Superintendent, Youth Officers, zone leaders, pastors and laymen has been deeply appreciated.

By way of activities, I submit this report. Immediately after being elected as your youth leader I assumed supervision of the youth services at Denton Camp. Our burdens here were somewhat lightened due to the services being planned in advance by the Rev. William Miller, our predecessor.



Being the director of the 1963 Youth Camp was also a new but rewarding experience. There were 64 campers registered. Here again our labours were lightened due to the advance scheduling of The Rev. Miller. The ministry of The Rev. George Harris, College Pastor at Eastern Pilgrim College, was greatly appreciated as was the willing labour of the camp staff to whom we are indebted for making the camp a success.

Soon following Youth Camp it was time for the organizational rallies for the four zones. An unsuccessful attempt was made to re-organize the zones and due to the problems involved, we went back to the four previous zones with a few minor changes. To increase interest in the Southern Zone, Salisbury was added to their churches. New Liberty came into the Coastal Zone. Mardela and Bethlehem were added to the Tidewater Zone. I was able to attend three of the first rallies for the purpose of organization. These rallies being held at Denton, Millsboro, and Trappe. Being unable to attend the first rally of the Southern Zone, Rev. Davis, the District Vice President, presided. I spoke in the zone at a later date in a rally held at Cape Charles.

The Youth Leaders Institute was held at Millsboro on September 26. The program included exchange of program ideas, how not to conduct a youth service, and a discussion of the Teen-Age Drop Out.

The District Youth Rally was held on December 27 in the Youth Hall of the Methodist Church in Seaford. The Rev. George Harris was the speaker and a district youth choir directed by Bruce Horner furnished the special singing.

As we gather for this conference, the 1964 Youth Camp is also a matter of history, this being brought about by a trial run of having the youth camp prior to the district camp. Other changes this year were the lowering of the age to 10 and also extending the camp over Friday night and closing Saturday morning. The enrollment far surpassed our expectations with the largest registration ever of 127; 66 of these coming within the 12 - 14 age group. Our hearts are still rejoicing as we saw young people at the altar every night seeking the Lord. We are confident that much good seed has been sown through the classes and the ministry of the Rev. Garry Grimes, Pastor of the Church of the Nazarene in Annapolis, Maryland.

Thursday evening and Friday morning Rev. Grimes dealt with the important subject of the call of God. Perhaps the highlight of the camp was to hear young people testify Friday evening to the fact they feel God leading them into His work. May God grant it to become reality.

I would like to make recognition of 6 of the young people who by ballot among their own age group, won honors of being the outstanding campers this year.

Age 10 - 11 Cathy Miller and Kirk Melvin from Harrington.

Age 12 - 14 Bonnie McKay and Harold Heckman from Glen Burnie.

Age 15 - 18 Patricia Mitchell and Arthur B. Schirmer from Milton.

Our thanks to all the staff who worked so willingly and untiringly to make this a good camp. We cannot mention you all, but I would like to give special recognition to our good cook, Mrs. Doris Green. Our thanks too to all the youth who came and they are worthy of praise.
