Minutes Of

Conference Proceedings

FIRST SITTING

The 61st Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Eastern District, convened at 1:30 P.M. on July 22, 1965.

Rev. Carl Candel led the Conference in singing one of Fannie Crosby's hymns; "Praise Him," with Rev. Edgar J. Haskins at the piano.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Mark H. Bowman, asked the conference to join with him in reading responsively the 148th Psalm.

Rev. Wm. H. Miller, Assistant District Superintendent, led in prayer.

Rev. Candel then led the conference in singing two verses of the hymn entitled, ''I'm Pressing.''

Rev. Bowman then introduced the General Superintendent of Eastern Area Pilgrim Holiness Church, Dr. Melvin Snyder, as Conference Chairman.

Rev. Snyder read a scripture lesson from the 3rd chapter of Revelations. From the message of Jesus to the seven churches of Asia, Brother Snyder spoke concerning four of the main statements made in the message to the churches:

- 1. "He that hath an ear let him hear what the Spirit saith." From this he brought forth the thought of Spiritual perceptability, showing us the need of listening to the Spirit. He also made the observation, that when we lose our Spiritual perception, we are confused.
- 2. "Him that overcometh". These words suggest 'he spiritual conflict, and he further stated that when an individual moves in the Will of God, he will often go against the tide. He spoke of the necessity of soul travail and used St. Paul as an example of one who stuck close to Divine purpose.
- 3. "I know thy works." These words were used by Brother Snyder to help us to understand that we are not only to be concerred about what we do but why we do it, thus searching our motives for Gospel labors. (Spiritual Accountability)
- 4. "Unto the Angel of the Church". This phrase Brother Snyder explained as meaning the message directed to the pastor, thus showing the great task that the pastor has, stating that the pastor must be a man of God filled with Holy boldness, knowing and practicing both the discipline and liberty of the New Testament. (Ministerial Responsibility)

He concluded his address, with an encouragement to the laity to stand by their pastor, in prayer and support and that the minister should do his best for the laity, that the work of the Kingdom might go forward.

The Chairman then called the conference to order and the District Secretary proceeded to call the roll. There were 46 ordained ministers, 4 licensed ministers, 7 ordained deaconesses and 48 lay delegates that answered the roll call.

The Conference bar was then established.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Mark H. Bowman, read his annual report which was received with appreciation.

Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. Wm. H. Miller, gave an oral report, and it was received.

Rev. Etta M. Clough reported for the Auditing Committee and the report was received.

Rev. Wm. H. Miller reported for the Reception Committee, and the following people were presented to the conference:

Rev. and Mrs. W. B. Walker, new pastor of Easton P. H. Church.

Rev. Calvin Disharoon

Rev. Robert Clough, new pastor of Delmar P.H. Church.

Rev. Charles Carroll.

These folk gave words of personal testimony, after which they were given an honorary seat within the conference bar, by a motion which passed.

The District Treasurer, Rev. Paul D. Dieter was asked to give his report. He had mimeographed a copy for each delegate, which was greatly appreciated, thus making it only necessary for him to point out some totals to the conference. His report was accepted, with deep appreciation for the fine job he has done as District Treasurer.

The District Statistician was asked to give his report. This report was not completed because of the expiration of time.

After a few announcements were made the conference was dismissed by Rev. Wm. H. Miller.

SECOND SITTING — JULY 22, 1965 6:30 P.M.

The second sitting of the conference opened with Rev. Charles L. Engrem leading the hymn entitled "Glory to His Name," with Rev. Edgar J. Haskins at the piano.

Mr. Olney Ross led in prayer.

The District Secretary read the minutes of the previous sitting and they were approved.

The District Statistician completed the reading of his report and it was received with deep appreciation.

The District Sunday School promotional secretary, Rev. A. T. Adams gave his report and it was accepted.

Rev. Wm. H. Miller, chairman of the reception committee, presented to the Conference chairman Rev. and Mrs. Gilbert Baker, who were introduced to the conference, and after words of personal testimony were granted on honorary seat within the Conference bar.

Mrs. Grace Culver, District Missionary Society President, gave her report and a motion passed to accept this wonderful report.

Rev. Graham F. Senter, District P.E.L.T. Directory, gave an oral report, which was received.

Roland Melvin, Jr., Distict C.Y.C. Director, also gave an oral report, which was received.

The Conference Chairman then announced that there would be a 10 minute recess. After the recess, the conference was again called to order, and Rev.

Louetta Holden, chairman of the Memoirs Committee reported. She read an original poem, dedicated to the memory of the deceased from our various churches. The Conference then stood in silent respect and prayer was offered by Sister Holden, after which the conference joined in singing "In the Sweet By and By."

After a few announcements the conference adjourned, with District Secretary dismissing with prayer.

The District Secretary read the minutes of the previous sitting and they were approved.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Our wonderful Lord has been pleased to grant us the privilege to meet in the capacity of another Annual Conference. We are most grateful, and pause again, to thank God that for the fourth consecutive year our Ministerial ranks have been unbroken. It affords me great pleasure to extend greetings, and a warm welcome to our highly esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, and to the delegates and friends to this 61st Annual Conference of the Eastern District. It is my sincere prayer that we shall have God's presence and guidance throughout this Conference. May God give us understanding hearts, so that policies will be adopted that will advance the cause for Christ.

All in all the past year has been a good year. I believe we had some of the best revivals we've had in recent years. It did my soul good to hear pastors say, "We had 21 seekers", "we had 31 seekers", "we had 50 or more seekers". An evangelistic spirit is bound to succeed.

Again this year we have had a membership gain of 15. Our District presently has 1348 members.

FINANCES

Our total receipts for the past fiscal year amounted to \$209,521.66. Our per capita giving is \$155.43. Our gain in property evaluation this year is \$37,200. This brings our total evaluation to \$1,198,000.00. Compared with the valuation listed five years ago, we have had a gain of \$596,245.00. We have an equity of \$1,063,041.94. Five years ago our equity was \$551,175.00, or about one-half.

As to our 18% Budget plan, it is working auite satisfactorily. If we all, from the strongest to the weakest church will bring up our share, our U.S.F., and E.P.C., and District needs will all be met in full.

I am pleased to announce that a number of our pastor's salaries have been raised. The average pastor's salary, received from the churches in our District is \$2,324.00 this year, or \$44.69 per week. We appreciate the faithful labors of our pastors, and trust this figure will be higher next year. "The labourer is worthy of his hire."

IMPROVEMENTS

Baltimore 1 Is building a parsonage to cost about \$17,000.00. It is located across the street from the church. Carpeted their church at the cost of \$850.00. New Bulletin Board, new fence.

Baltimore II Burned their mortgage on their church.

Bethlehem Built a two car garage.

Bloxom Has had a new furnace installed in the parsonage and the church has been renovated. New carpet installed. They have also built a new dining room for the Camp.

Broomes Island Installed rest rooms in the church.

Cambridge Sanded and refinished their parsonage floors, and papered the living room, dining room and kitchen, and carpeted their pastor's

Cape Charles Renovated the interior of the church, and plan to add two rooms to their parsonage.

Cedar Grove Had a note burning service on their church property. They refinished the church floor.

Crisfield Paid their parsonage debt in full and made some repairs on the parsonage.

- **Denton** Very comfortable pews were given to the church. They have done a lot for the appearance of the church.
- **Exmore** Added two rooms to their parsonage and painted the parsonage outside.
- Glen Burnie Dedicated their beautiful \$17,000.00 parsonage, and built a brick Bulletin Board. New piano was purchased.
- Goldsboro Brick veneered their parsonage; built a new concrete front porch and brick steps, and also a carport. They renovated the kitchen and dining room area. It cost about \$2,700.00. They also burned the mortgage of the church
- **Greensboro** The new parsonage is very spacious, in an excellent location and is being renovated and almost ready for occupancy.
- Greenwood Purchased a parsonage and paid off their church mortgage.
- **Gumboro** Painted and redecorated their parsonage within and without, and also put a new roof on their parsonage. The pews and floor of the church were refinished.
- **Harrington** Is enlarging their borders with a beautiful brick annex, costing approximately \$50,000.00.
- **Hurlock** Renovated their church at the cost of about \$2,500.00. They lowered their ceiling, painted side walls, tiled the floor under the pews and carpeted the platform and aisles. They enlarged the platform, painted the pews, and installed aluminum storm doors at the entrance.
- Millsboro Paid their way out of debt and plan to burn their mortgages after conference. They carpeted their platform and aisles.
- Milton Has spent about \$36,000.00 on their beautiful church. They have 12 Sunday School rooms, rest rooms and nursery. They also developed a lovely Junior Church room. It must be seen to be appreciated.
- **New Liberty** Has installed a new kitchen sink and cabinets, clothes closets and built a three car garage.
- Salisbury Bought a 9 Passenger Ford Falcon Club Wagon to transport S. S. scholars. They also purchased new chairs for their Junior Church room. They erected a Church Bulletin Board.
- **Saxis** Installed aluminum storm doors and screens on their doors and windows. They also purchased an organ.
- **Trappe** Has put a new roof on their parsonage and gravelled their Church driveway. They installed a new gas furnace.

YOUTH CAMP

We just closed our 9th Annual Youth Camp, under the direction of our District Youth Director, the Rev. Wayne Musgrove and his staff of instructors and counsellors. Ninety-five registered and a goodly number of our fine youth sought Christ. A full report will be given by our Youth Director to the Youth Conference on Saturday morning at 8:00 o'clock.

DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY

Our District Missionary Society is aggressive. The societies are giving, and cooperating with their enthusiastic President, Mrs. George E. Culver, and the District Missionary Committee, consisting of Rev. Jeanne Lou Schwartz, Rev. Lida J. Brasure, Mr. Roland Melvin and Mr. Reese Hurley, and also the Zone Leaders of the various zones. Sr. Culver's report will reveal their many activities.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

We regret to report a slight loss in Sunday School average attendance, however we still have a very good percentage of folk attending our Sunday School. With a church membership of 1348 we had 3064 attending our Sunday Schools every week during the year. This amounts to 2.27 per cent, or for every church member, we had about 2½ persons in our Sunday School. This is higher than our church's average in the United States.

Nevertheless, we need to strive to reach the unreached. Let us double our efforts. It is bound to pay off, spiritually, numerically and financially. We appreciate the fine work of our Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the Rev. A. T. Adams. He worked hard to show a gain. Let's cooperate with our leader. It is team work that wins. If each S. S. will show a gain our District will show a gain. "With Jesus we can win!!"

DENTON CAMP MEETING

Denton Camp Meeting is endearing itself more and more with the passing of the years. We anticipate a glorious Camp. We had two cancellations this year, but the Lord has favored us in sending two other fine evangelists, whose ministry we feel will be a blessing in our midst. The Stuarts are our singers, musicians and Children's workers.

Our receipts the past fiscal year amounted to \$10,109.04 and after all expenses were paid we still had a balance of \$83.37.

A number of improvements have been made this year, visible and invisible, such as: leveling the Girls Dormitory and replacing sills on each side of the building. We installed fluorescent lights throughout the length of the upper story, which has lighted up the inner section of rooms. The stairways of Adams Memorial were repaired. Thirty-nine cement-end benches were built. A large gas stove was added to the kitchen equipment. Several loads of fill were brought onto the grounds and graded. Some painting and electrical work was done as needed.

During the winter months we negotiated with Mrs. George Lowe, and purchased the forty acres adjoining the Camp Property, on two sides. 20 acres are in woodland and 20 acres are tillable. We have reserved five acres for parking and recreation.

The six room house and bath has been renovated. Presently the farm house and 15 acres are rented, from which we get almost enough to make our payments on the property.

We deeply appreciate the interest demonstrated on the part of the cottage owners. Mr. Fred Howard raised the roof of his cottage and also replaced the sills and covered the cottage with aluminum siding.

Rev. George E. Culver has added a nice kitchen to his cottage.

Mr. and Mrs. Pigza bought the cottage once owned by the first president of our Camp, namely Mr. Willard Thawley. They have made marked improvements.

Mrs. Cora Dean and Evelyn Ornett of Hurlock, bought the Phillips cottage, which was originally Bro. Olsen's. They too, have made some much needed repairs.

The Darsch Cottage was bought by Rev. and Mrs. Glen Staehli.

Alfred Clark added two rooms and bath to his cottage.

The Reese Hurley cottage has had a lovely enclosed porch added to it. The Hurleys take a very live interest in the Camp, in general.

The Clough cottage has a new roof put on it, and a cement floor laid in the kitchen area. Water was installed.

The Booze and Botham cottage was practically rebuilt.

Many other campers painted and made minor repairs. This is much appreciated, and bespeaks increasing interest in a spiritual Camp Meeting. Let's keep Denton Camp alive!

MITCHELL MEMORIAL

A 14" x 20" cement block cottage, with running water and toilet facilities, was built and beautifully furnished in memory of Rev. and Mrs. Willard Mitchell. Rev. Mitchell wcs the second President of the Denton Camp Meeting Association. He was elected in 1911. Mother Mitchell dearly loved Denton Camp. Her shouts will never be forgotten by those who heard her. A suitable Dedicatory service was held on July 24, 1965, with the Rev. Mark H. Bowman officiating. Rev. H. D. Dukes offered the invocation, Rev. Etta Mitchell read the scripture lesson, and Rev. Etta Clough read the Preface, by Rev. Roland Mitchell, of the booklet giving Mother Mitchell's testimony. Bro. Bowman offered the dedicatory prayer.

PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 103 times and made 98 visits to churches. I made 95 calls on pastors and 57 to laymen. Visited revivals and Camp Meetings 27 times; edited and published ten issues of the "Eastern Pilgrim." I officiated at 6 Board meetings; conducted 55 church business meetings; attended 11 zone meetings throughout the District; attended one Sunday School Committee Meeting, and 4 Sunday School area meetings; and 5 Youth Committee meetings. Mrs. Bowman and I conducted 4 Sunday School Seminars in Virginia District. We also attended our General Youth Convention at Anderson, Indiana. I attended 5 E.P.C. Board and Committee meetings; two Board meetings at Owosso College; officiated at five Mortgage Burning Services, and Dedicated two parsonages. I had seven Baptisms, one marriage, and assisted in one funeral. We spent three weeks working on the Camp Ground, and renovating the Farm house for rental.

We had two well attended Ministerial Conventions, and a very good spiritual Camp Meeting. These are always times of inspiration and blessing, and times of salvation to the lost and needy.

During the past year, we were blessed in having four area meetings with our General Superintendent Dr. Melvin H. Snyder speaking to each group. This same area program was followed with our General Secretary of S. S. and Youth, the Rev. O. D. Emery. Some of our churches profited by this in organizing C.Y.C. groups and inaugurating the Pelt program of cur church.

I travelled 18,154 miles in performance of my work. Mrs. Bowman and I wish to express our sincere appreciation for the many kindnesses shown us by the District, the hospitality extended by our pastors and their families, and our fine laymen. It has been a pleasure to labor with the District Council. your S. S. Promotional Secretary, Youth President, Missionary President, Pelt Director and C.Y.C. Director, and members of the Educational Board and Examining Board. Thank you for your cooperation.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

To the 61st Annual Conference of the Eastern District, Greetings:

Although we do not show a gain this year, as we had hoped, yet there are certain improvements taking place within our District which indicate better attendance in the future.

Renewed effort and programming is taking place in some churches, while others have launched building programs to provide needed space for greater crowds. Organized lay-visitation is producing results wherever it is consistently engaged. Leadership Training Classes are providing more qualified workers for the schools where this has been a problem. Others are grading their schools by the Standard of Excellence and are striving to up-grade the quality of their

school. Some schools are departmentalizing their entire school, thus creating more but smaller classes. Vacation Bible Schools have been a real blessing in reaching new children and in some instances souls have been won by faithfully applying the Word of God. These things, as secondary as they may seem, are essential to bigger and better Sunday Schools. Although we lament the numerical loss which our records reveal, we are showing progress in other areas.

The average attendance this year was 3,064. Last year it was 3,140. This reveals a numerical loss of 76 or $2\,\%$ for the year.

Among the seventeen schools showing gains this year, nine show a gain of $5\,\%$ or over.

The two Honor Schools of the year are: Laurel with a numerical gain of 18 and a percentage gain of 17% and Bozman with a 26% gain. We highly commend these schools which show gains for the year and we hope and pray that other schools will join their rank by next conference.

I have written and mailed several promotional or news latters to the pastors and Sunday School Superintendents, presided at one District Sunday School Board Meeting, mailed out the monthly attendance report cards and compiled the report for the Eastern Pilgrim.

It has been a real joy to labor with our District Superintendent, Rev. Mark H. Bowman, the District Sunday School Board, the pastors, Sunday School Superintendents, and local Sunday School Reporters. Your cooperation and prayers have been greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF DISTRICT MISSIONARY PRESIDENT

To our General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, our District Superintendent, Rev. Mark Bowman, and the members and friends of the 61st Annual Conference of the Eastern District.

Another year has so quickly passed, and we are gathered to do business for a new year. It has been a pleasure to work with the Missionary Societies, Zone leaders, and the fine Committee, in the Missionary work of the District, this past year. They are truly a group of those with a burden for "OTHERS", and this is greatly appreciated. Unless we have the faithful leaders, with a real vision for the work and the building up of Christ's Kingdom, both home and abroad, we as a church will utterly fail, in the great Commission given by Jesus before going back to heaven.

At the District Camp Meeting, last year, our Missionary Display Room was opened. This was done to have a permanent place for our Missionary Presidents, other officers, and all interested persons could feel free to come and observe Work ideas, ask questions in promoting their local society work, and a place in general, to help in any way needed. Sister Margaret Hankins very faithfully lent help, both in her presence much of the time, in the Display room, plus the display of various items she has collected in visiting Mission fields. Her display last year was mainly from the Philippine Islands, where she had so recently visited. This past spring she visited Jamaica, where the Dean Phillips family are laboring at the present time.

Our Deputational Workers, visiting our Camp, Bro. Paul Phillippe, and Bro. C. J. Knupp, took note of the various Work Displays from the Societies, and both expressed their appreciation for a place such as this at our District Camp. Bro. Paul Phillippe picked out items, that he said could be used especially in the work in Brazil, for Daily Vacation Bible Schools. In the Fall, these were presented to the Societies throughout the District. There was a good response to this need, until word came from the Phillippe's that they had about a wnole barrel of Daily Vacation Bible School supplies to take along to Brazil, plus other items various societies sent to them. They deeply appreciated all that each Society has done.

We appreciated the fine presentations of the various Missionary fields, given to us by Sister Margaret Hankins, Bro. Phillippe, and Bro. Knupp, in the two services held in the tabernacle on Tuesday and Wednesday P.M., following the afternoon services, previous to the regular Missionary Day service on Thursday of Camp.

During the Missionary Service, on Thursday P.M. of Camp, last year, there was a short period of time, given to the District Missionary Society group, causing us each to feel the importance of our place of responsibility, as we listened to the beautiful song "Take My Life, and Let It Be", sung very beautifully by Rev. and Mrs. Schaltenbrand, followed by a prayer for all local presidents, officers, zone leaders, your District President, and all involved in doing our best to keep pushing this great work.

In the month of October, it was my privilege to meet with the Pilgrims at the Mardela Church, with the purpose of organizing their group. Was pleased to note that they were anxious to do their part, and they have been busy through the rest of the year—and our prayer for the society, with their leader, Mrs. Stella Kenney, that this is only a beginning, for a group, with a real vision for this part of God's great work.

There were 14 Zone meetings held on the District this year. In the Fall meetings there were 386 present, in 8 zone meetings held, or an average of 48. \$141.41 was given in the Fall Zone meetings, or an average of \$17.55. There were 282 in attendance in the Spring Zone meetings, or an average of 47, for the 6 zones participating. \$110.59 was given in the Spring meetings, with an

average of \$18.43. We began the year with a good balance, and with the fine giving in the zone meetings, plus a gift to our fund, we have been able to give in 2 District Projects this year. They are as follows:

\$200.00 on Transportation Fund, helping get the Duckworth family from Curacao to Trinidad.

100.00 for Furniture in Jamaica Parsonage, where Dean Phillippe family labour.

Both of these Projects we have helped in, have been greatly appreciated. We had hoped this year to have a District Home Missionary Project to present to you, but being we did not, we are thankful to have been able to help in these. Let's pray that something will present itself in our District, that we may have a part in, this coming year.

Sister Jeanne Lou Schwartz has faithfully laboured on the District Missionary Committee, as secretary, for the past two years, and has served as Zone leader both years, and at present is getting everything in readiness to take up her labours on the Island of Antigua. We shall miss her, but am sure that our responsibility now, is to pray for her, as she assumes the great job that is hers, and one she feels is God's will for her. Let's not fail in praying for her as she leaves us.

Recently I read an article, that made me feel gnew the importance of letting our light shine brightly this year. Let's each one in our place of responsibility, do our best. It is said that in a little village in southern Europe, there is a gray stone church on a summit of a hill. It is called "The Church of many Lamps" and was built in the 16th century by an old duke. As he was growing old, he wanted something to keep bright his memory. In honor of his daughters, whom he loved dearly, he decided to build a church so beautiful that men would desire to worship as soon as they entered, because it would draw them to God. When it was finished, the duke took one of his daughters to see it. She admired the beauty, the lovely carvings, the stained-glass windows, but told her father he had forgotten one thing. She wondered where were the lamps to hang? The father told her there would be no hanging lamps, as he had provided small bronze lamps, one for every person in the village. Each one would carry his own light—if anyone didn't come, his place would be dark. 400 years have lapsed, the bronze lamps have been handed down from father to son. When the sweet-toned bells of the church ring out, the village people wend their way up the hill, each carrying his own lamp. The church is nearly always filled, for no one wishes his corner to be dark. From this legend we can glean some spiritual realities. We need more Pilgrims to help carry the "Light of the World" to darkened corners—to hand the "Lights" of our World Missionary Program from one generation to another—that we may keep the burden for the lost on the hearts of each generation. Matthew 5:16 "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven"— Remember, we are "Labourers together with God"—let's keep doing our part that the Darkness of this old world, may be lighted by the Gospel of Christ. The way we have worked together as a District Society this past year, is very commendable, let's continue on, asking the Lord to help us to do even better this year.

MEMORIALS FOR GENERAL CONFERENCE

(1) Section 131

There shall be a body known as the General Board, which shall consist of the General Superintendents, General Secretary-Treasurer, Secretary of World Missions, Secretary of Church Extension, Secretary of Sunday School and Youth, College Presidents, Publishing Agent, Editor, and District Superintendents of each District having 700 members or more.

(2) Section 53 Par. 4

WHEREAS, very few indefinite calls are extended to pastors, and inasmuch as it appears to be impractical to most churches and pastors, and invites unethical and unchristian tactics to effect a change of pastor,

BE IT RESOLVED, that, we expunge or eliminate it from Paragraph 4, which relates to the indefinite period, and grant no more than a three year extended call.

(3) WHEREAS there is a growing need in our church for an authorized Minister of Education and Music,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that there be provisions made for licensed Minister of Music and Education, this to conform to and with our manual under Licensed Minister Section 144.

STANDING RULES

DISTRICT REGULATIONS

No. 1 An amount equal to 18% of all regular church and Sunday School offerings shall be remitted by each local church monthly to the District Treasurer to be apportioned as follows:

52%—District Budget

35%—United Stewardship Fund

13 % -- Eastern Pilgrim College

The 52% District Budget shall be apportioned as follows:

87%-District Account

9%—Home Missionary Account

4 % —General Conference Account

- No. 2 The Conference shall accept the Pension plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 6 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.
- No. 3 The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$100.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of camp meeting fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, full payment of Pilgrim Pension Fund, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct not more than 2 revivals or conventions of not more than 4 Sundays each year, with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.
- No. 4 Each Church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member each visit.
- No. 5 The District Secretary, Treasurer and Statistician shall receive \$85.00, \$300.00 and \$75.00 respectively plus postage per year.
- No. 6 The District Conference recommends that each church pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife, all incapacitated ordained ministers on the membership roll of any given church, and that the District shall pay the assessment fees of the District Superintendent and his wife, as these fees relate to the Ministerial Benefit Association.
- No. 7 The District Superintendent as soon after conference as possible shall meet with the membership and official boards of the local churches and that his duties shall further include the strengthening of weaker churches of the district and take an active part in District Home Missionary endeavors.
- No. 8 The objectives, plans and goals of all District Departments (Sunday School, Youth, Home Missionary, District Missionary Director) shall be in the hands of all District Ministers within 30 days following conference and furthermore that the committees and boards shall have opportunity to promote their program at the District Fall Ministerial Convention.
- No. 9 Each zone of our district shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.
- No. 10 The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

- No. 11 Quarterly report blanks shall be prepared and sent to the District Superintendent by each church. Said blanks shall be furnished by the Conference Secretary.
- No. 12 The goals for the Conference year shall be 2 new churches, and 95 new members.
- No. 13 A registration fee of \$2.00 shall be paid by each member of the district conference to the registrar upon arrival at the district conference. This fee shall be paid by each local church, for the pastor and each lay delegate. This fee shall be applied toward meals, electric, lodging and journal expense. It is understood that payment of this fee makes the member of the conference eligible to receive a copy of the journal without further cost.
- No. 14 Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- No. 15 An Honor Roll shall be provided by the District which shall list the names of the churches that reach their yearly goals and an appropriate award given to those churches listed thereon at the Annual Conference.
- No. 16 Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 17 The rate of mileage paid by the District for travel in district interests shall be .07c per mile.
- No. 18 The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A.M. the third Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.
- No. 19 The Home Mission Board, shall consist of Assistant District Superintendent, as Chairman, and 3 members elected as follows: One for a period of 3 years, One for a period of 2 years, One for a period of 1 year, and that one member be elected each year hereafter.
- No. 20 The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 21 The District Council shall be the District Trustees and the executive members of the Council are the negotiating signers of all District transactions.
- No. 22 The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 23 The Price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 24 The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.
- No. 25 Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.
- No. 26 Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 27 No annual church business meeting shall be held on Sunday.

- No. 5 A Bible college service shall be held the 2nd Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 6 No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 7 A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 8 A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meeting for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 9 The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale, this practice to be continued.
- No. 10 No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been moved.
- No. 11 All active District Ministers and Evangelists shall give 2 eight hour days of work on the camp grounds each year and in the event any minister is unable to participate in this work program, he be assessed at the rate of \$10.00 per day.
- No. 12 Ladies and young girls taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly and as becometh holiness.
- No. 13 No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 14 One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 15 The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 16 All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 17 The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the Council is unable to grant a transfer or lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the Council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 18 Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 19 Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 20 The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.

- No. 5 The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:
 - a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.
 - b. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
 - c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
 - d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
 - e. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
 - f. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
 a. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.
 - Those with all diverge of less than 50 shall give \$0.00 yearly.

This assessment shall be based on the past year's average attendance.

No. 6 Each Sunday School shall cease counting it's attendance at the middle of the S. S. session.

STANDING RULES

CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 1 The Conference year shall close on May 31st and all reports shall be postmarked no later than July 1st, and mailed to the District Superintendent and the District Statistician.
- No. 2 Sittings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon Session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30; Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 3 As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 4 The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 P.M. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 5 The conference bar shall include the first ten rows in the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform.
- No. 6 The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 7 The District Secretary shall send, immediately following the District Conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the District Superintendent and to each local Church Treasurer.
- No. 8 The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P.M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified no later than 30 days prior to the conference.

STANDING RULES

CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 1 Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 2 Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 3 All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.
- No. 4 All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.

No. 21 The early morning prayer meeting, prior to breakfast, shall be reinstated, and also some fasting and prayer meetings shall be called during the Camp.
