Minutes Of Conference Proceedings

FIRST SITTING

Since the homegoing of Rev. Bowman, being his assistant, it has fallen to me and the District Council to carry on the District work until this Conference. This we have done to the best of our ability. Since it was the decision of the District Council and the General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, that I remain at the Church in Salisbury, and assume the responsibilities of the District Superintendent, this we have carried through. The load has not been a light one, however, there have been many bright moments along the way and God has given strength and blessed our hearts as we have walked with Him. The Salisbury Pilgrims have shown much patience and good will in this time of change. This we sincerely appreciate and give thanks to God for such wonderful people.

IMPROVEMENTS

Baltimore 1—Completed beautiful new parsonage, purchased new hymnals for the main Auditorium and a new Gulbrandsen organ was donated by the Smoot brothers.

Bethlehem—Had a bus given to the Church. It has been repaired, painted and lettered. Practically all work was donated.

Bloxom—Built a new Dormitory on Camp ground—"5 rooms"

Cambridge—Redecorated the sanctuary of the church. Ceiling and walls painted, floors sanded and refinished, pews, pulpit furniture and altar refinished. Air conditioning has been installed. The wooden frame part of the outside bulletin board has been replaced with aluminum.

Cape Charles—Added 2 rooms to their parsonage.

Centreville—Plans to buy home for parsonage.

Deal Island—Have a lot in a new location and plan to build a new church.

Exmore—Erected beautiful bulletin board on corner of church lot. 2 rooms added and all rooms redecorated. 2 new gas units installed, Church interior and floor refinished.

Glen Burnie—Have installed floodlights in parking lot.

Greensboro—Completed parsonage, painted and furnished several Sunday School rooms in church basement.

Greenwood—Installed new furnace, painted interior walls of church, sanded and refinished floor and pews.

Harrington—Completed beautiful new Sunday School annex.

Laurel—Installed new carpeting in their church.

Milford—Put aluminum siding on church and painted trim work.

Milton—Erected aluminum awnings over the outside church doors. More shrubbery has been planted which adds to the beauty of the property.

Ridgely—Remodeled church with lowering of ceiling and fluorescent lighting, also the floor leveled and refinished.

Salisbury—Purchased a 12 acre lot for future development. New hymnals were donated by the youth society and a new communion set donated by the Junior church.

DENTON CAMP GROUNDS

New shavings in Tabernacle. Fluorescent lighting system on platform. "Dusk to Dawn" light near caretaker's cottage. Roof of the dining room aluminumized. Water facilities installed in the Evangelists cottage. Several cottages have been repaired and painted.

THE ELLWANGER MEMORIAL

Due to insufficient funds this new building has not been erected as yet. While many have sent in their pledges, and these are appreciated, we are short \$500.00 that is needed for this work.

YOUTH CAMP

The youth just closed their 10th annual Camp meeting, under the able leadership of our District Youth Director, the Rev. Reed Morris and his staff of instructors and counsellors. A goodly number of our fine young people sought the Lord, in the class sessions, in their rooms and at the Altar. May God bless them and keep them in His care!

DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY

The Missionary societies move forward under the fine leadership of Mrs. George Culver. They are doing a great work and are faithfully carrying through with their Scriptural theme, "For we are laborers together with God."

SUNDAY SCHOOL

How rewarding a work this is. "Let us not be weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." Gal. 6:9. While in some church Schools there have been gains, there has been a drop in attendance in others, so let us rally our forces and regain these losses. "It can be done." Our Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the Rev. A. T. Adams, and Committee have given excellent leadership and have done a good job. The Sunday School Convention held in the Salisbury Church in March was an outstanding event. Preachers and laymen alike expressed themselves as to the many helpful suggestions given by the committee.

PERSONAL REPORT

IN MEMORIAM

REV. MARK HENRY BOWMAN — 1908-1965

Mark Bowman was born in Bowmanstown, Pennsylvania, a small town named for his great-grandfather, John Dieter Bowman. He was born in a God-fearing home, and was blessed with a sacred heritage. He was carried to the church from his infancy, the church which his father helped build. Rev. Bowman grew up around camp meetings. His father was secretary and treasurer of the Bowmanstown Evangelical Camp for more than forty years.

Outstanding holiness preachers from across the country, were frequent visitors and guests in the Bowman home. Rev. Bowman's father had a vital interest in the founding of Beulah Park Bible School, and was a supporter of the school until his death.

His parents were much concerned about his Salvation. Ruth was one of the first students and the following year Rev. Bowman was sent there, after much entreating of the board, since he was not a saved boy. Rev. Russell Gardner, a close friend of the family sought his admittance, and earnestly prayed for his Salvation. During the opening convention and before classes had begun, Rev. Bowman was genuinely and marvelously saved, in the dining room of Old Main.

Rev. Bowman spent 7 years there, taking a business course at Dorney Business College, his high school and Theological training, also college work at Muhlenberg. During these years he worked hard to help grade the grounds and did many other things around the school.

He toured the zone with a quartette representing the Bible School, and doing whatever his hands found to do in promoting the school, which he dearly loved.

Soon after his conversion, he with his father and sister attended an all day Holiness Meeting, in the West Penn Evangelical Church. Rev. C. W. Ruth, a national holiness preacher of the Methodist Church, expounded the Word of God. While preaching a great message, he said he felt God had called a young man, and laid his hand on him for the ministry. Rev. Bowman was definitely called and referred to it many times, also telling how Rev. C. W. Ruth laid his hand on his head, which influence he felt through the years. He was true to that call throughout his life.

He graduated from Beulah Park Bible School in 1929, was ordained in 1931, took his first pastorate the same year.

After returning to school for the second semester of that first year at Beulah Park Bible School he was sanctified. He promised the Lord during his Christmas vacation he would seek the fullness of the blessing. He did so in the very first service.

During the years Rev. Bowman was a student at Beulah Park Bible School, he supplied the Pulpit, at both Pocono Lake, and Cherryville, Pa., Pilgrim Holiness churches, during his summer vacations. After his ordination in 1931 he became pastor of the Warren Pilgrim Holiness Church. Following a 4 year pastorate there, he accepted a call to the Pittsburgh District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, serving both the Elizabeth and Belle Bridge Churches, then giving his full time to the Elizabeth Church for three years, after serving both congregations for 6 years. In 1944 he was called to the Pittsburgh church, serving until 1946, when he accepted a call to the Washington, Pa. Church. From there he went to the Cherryville, Pa. Church in the Penn-N. J. District. He pastored there until 1953, when he became pastor of the Cambridge, Md. Church until 1960, when he was elected to the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, as District Superintendent.

While serving the churches across the years, Rev. Bowman served in many other capacities for his beloved church. While in the Pittsburgh, Pa. district, he gave 10 years as District Secretary and Assistant District Superintendent. He served 4 years each, as District Treasurer for both Penn-N.J. and Eastern districts. He has also served as Treasurer and Vice-President of the Board of Directors of Eastern Pilgrim College and served as a board member for about 14 years. He also, at the time of his death was a member of the Board at Owosso College, Owosso, Michigan. He also served as Sunday School Promotional Secretary, on Home Missionary Boards and Youth organization, both zone and District. Rev. Bowman certainly gave of himself, in anything his beloved church asked of him to perform, until the day of his death.

The sudden death of the Rev. Mark H. Bowman on November 23, 1965, shocked Pilgrims across the church. He suffered a heart attack while working on the camp ground with several other ministers at Denton, Md. Besides his widow, Anna, he is survived by two sons, Luke of Blue Ball, Pennsylvania, and John of Greensboro, North Carolina, and two sisters, Rev. Miss Ruth Bowman of Grand Cayman, British West Indies and Mrs. George Christman of Tamaqua, Pennsylvania.

Memorial services were held November 26 and 27 in the churches at Denton, Maryland and Reading, Pennsylvania. Some of his longtime friends shared in the services. Dr. R. D. Gunsalus gave the message at Denton, and Dr. Melvin H. Snyder at Reading. Expressions were made on the behalf of Eastern District, Pennsylvania-New Jersey District, and the General Church by Rev. H. Grier Baker, Rev. J. R. Mitchell and Rev. J. D. Abbott.

Burial was in Laurel Dale Cemetery near Reading, Pennsylvania.

IN MEMORIAM

REV. E. R. CLOUGH

Rev. Edward Raymond Clough, son of John Thomas Clough, and his wife Susan, was born Sept. 1, 1874, near Smyrna, Del., and soon after, the family moved to the vicinity of Centreville, Md., where he grew up. In 1896 he was married to Daisy Payne, who died after six years. To this union was born one son, William R. Clough.

His second wife was Mattie Fowler who passed away at Cambridge, Md. in 1914. He was married on Aug. 5, 1915 to Elizabeth Jane Carroll, and to this union were born two children, Margaret and Brainerd. Both of them preceded him in death. Mrs. Clough also passed away five years ago. She was an ordained deaconess and faithfully served with him forty-six years.

In his early years, Brother Clough conducted missions and rescue work in the cities of Baltimore, Md., Wilmington, Del. and Chester, Pa. He loved open air services and held many street meetings, and for almost forty years was in charge of the ring meetings at Denton Camp. He held pastorates in Cambridge, Hillsboro, Windy Hill, and Girdletree, Md., Dover, Gumboro, and Laurel, Del., Sunbury, Pa. and Cincinnati and Oak Hill, Ohio.

He built the first Pilgrim Holiness Church in Cambridge, Md. in 1913, which was destroyed by fire many years later. He rebuilt and held many gracious camps on the old Camden, Del. campground, made famous by meetings in the early days of Methodism in this country. He also built the present parsonage at Laurel, Del. and is remembered here for his many charitable acts and more especially for providing clothing for many needy.

Brother Clough took an intense interest in the spiritual welfare of the youth where he pastored, encouraging many of them to attend Bible School, and take an active part in the Church services. He will long be remembered for bringing carloads of children to Sunday School. There are possibly more than a score of young people who went into full time Christian work as pastors, pastors' wives, and evangelists, because of his ministry.

His final years were spent at "The House In The Pines Convalescent Homes", (Easton and Baltimore), where he made many friends and received royal care. He passed away, Tuesday, 12:30 A.M., March 1, 1966 in his 92nd year, having spent over 50 years in the ministry.

He leaves to mourn, a step-brother, Samuel Rollison of Baltimore, Md., one son William R. Clough of Centreville, Md., four grandchildren, Mrs. Alice Kaufman and Mr. William R. Clough, Jr. of Centreville, Md., Mr. Kenneth Lindner of Cambridge, Md., and Mr. Arnold Lindner of Baltimore, Md., also 5 great grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral Services were conducted at the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Laurel, Del. with Rev. H. Grier Baker, District Superintendent officiating, assisted by members of the District Council. There was singing by the Oxford Quartet, Mrs. J. G. Rimmer and the Choir.

Interment was in the Dorchester Memorial Park Cemetery, Cambridge, Md. and a short service was held there for the benefit of friends in the community. He was laid to rest awaiting the glorious resurrection day.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

To the 62nd Annual Conference of the Eastern District, Greetings:

The tremendous growth in population during recent years and the corresponding increase in juvenile delinquency and crime are becoming matters of grave concern to religious educators everywhere. Leaders realize that something must be done to counteract the letdown in morals and respect for law, or the future of our nation stands in peril. Without question, the single greatest force for providing of high ideals to young people is the Sunday School, and present-day conditions call for a great forward surge in promotion, teaching and activities, if the Sunday school is going to do for the people what needs to be done.

The danger of this age in which we live, is that the church will be obsessed with a spirit of lethargy, complacency and materialism. The scathing rebuke to the Laodician church was not only were they "lukewarm" but that they claimed to be "rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing." This trend must be quelled if the Sunday school is to provide the Spiritual growth needed today.

Eleven schools showed excellent gains this year, in spite of the fact that the district suffered a loss of 117 for the year, or a little less than 4%. The average attendance for the year was 2,947.

The school at Deal Island receives highest honor and the Decade of Progress award. They show a gain of 17 or 106% for the year.

Not all churches participated in the "March to Sunday School in March" program; but those who did realized some benefits from their efforts.

A District-wide Sunday School Convention was held in March at the Cambridge Church under the direction of the District Sunday School Board. These meetings proved to be profitable to those attending.

I presided over two District Sunday School Board meetings, mailed several promotional or news letters to all the churches, mailed the monthly report cards and compiled the report for the Eastern Pilgrim.

Some of our churches have enlarged or improved their Sunday school facilities this year to provide room for future growth. Others have created building funds or made plans to re-locate in order to expand. Several Churches conducted Leadership Training classes to provide more and better leaders. Almost all Schools conducted Daily Vacation Bible Schools or plan to have one yet this summer.

It has been a real joy to labor with our District Superintendents, the late Rev. Mark H. Bowman and Rev. H. Grier Baker, the District Sunday School Board, pastors, Sunday School Superintendents, teachers and local reporters. Your prayers and splendid cooperation have made my work easier.

The total price of this set was \$351.80. This is entirely paid. Later on, when Sister Flora Belle Slater was touring the District, it was found that an Encyclopedia set would be so appreciated, and was greatly needed in the Philippine Islands school. Several personal gifts and pledges from churches covered the amount needed for this. Through July 1st, \$297.00 has been paid on this set. The total bill for this set was \$346.80. Some societies are paying monthly on this and we are very near the end for this set. A very fine letter of appreciation was received from the Antigua school and feel sure words of appreciation will be forthcoming from the Philippine Islands. Sister Slater has already expressed her appreciation. When Bro. Ray Chamberlain, Jr. and family needed to return to the States, and Bro. Ray Chamberlain was to undergo ear surgery, we were able to give \$100.00 on the Transportation Project. We have furnished 72 pieces of Stainless Steel ware for the Dining room at Camp, and helped on the Water Facilities for the Evangelists Cottage here at Camp, - a total of \$88.30 for these. Before Sister Jeanne Lou Schwartz, left for Antigua, we were able to give her \$25.00, as a love gift from the District Missionary Society. She had so ably filled the position of Secretary on our District Committee, and served as Zone Leader. I have surely appreciated, as your District President, the fine spirit of cooperation that has been shown this year. These projects could never have been done, only as we saw the need, and did our part to meet that need. Many have participated in making this report possible. There is so much else done, through the Societies, beside what is done through the District Society.

There have been 9 zone meetings held this year - with an average attendance of 60 - an average offering of \$22.85. Total offerings were \$205.69. My heart was surely stirred, as I listened to the presentation of Missions, both home and abroad, by the fine group of zone leaders we had during the past year. Each are to be commended for their labours.

At our recent committee meeting, we decided on a theme for the new year: "I must work—night cometh". In John 9:4 we read, "I must work the works of him that sent me while it is day; the night cometh, when no man can work." These words were uttered by Jesus Himself. We none, want to be caught empty-handed I am sure—Let's not put off until tomorrow what we can do today - I read recently of 3 men that went fishing. The surface of the lake was as smooth as glass and fishing the best ever. The bass were hungry, and viciously attacked the lures. The suggestion was given to throw back everything except the largest ones, which they could be proud to take home. One of the group dissented, thinking "they might not be hitting tomorrow" but the others had a different idea about it. They set all the small fish free—so that when they were ready to go home, and showed the stringer to the one who dissented, his face dropped. The next day they agreed to keep everything of legal size—up to the limit. But,—yes, you guessed it—no fish!! They worked hard, tried all kinds of bait. Morning, afternoon and evening were spent covering every inch of the shoreline, but—no success! Finally, in desperation they tried to find them in the deep— but no fish! - They went home "empty-handed"—simply because they had counted on tomorrow! A great lesson is in this for all of us who are "fishing for men"—Let us do all we can to further the cause of World Missions— win men, women, boys and girls to Christ - We must act today! In Proverbs 27:1 we read, "Boast not thyself of tomorrow for thou knowest not what a day may bring forth." Let's each take advantage of TODAY'S OPPORTUNITIES - We each have a part in the great work of reaching the lost of earth's peoples with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Let's work "While it is day" - the "Night Cometh when no Man can Work."

Resolved, that the District Council initiate a program of safety, especially fire prevention - for the Denton Camp.

Resolution No. 5 Rejected

Resolution No. 6

Whereas, Standing Rule #24 - P. 33, gives unlimited authority to the Editing Committee, without proper direction.

Be it resolved, that it shall be made to read:

The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes, all Standing Rules deemed obsolete, subject to the approval of the District Council.

The Resolution Committee recommends that the following Standing Rules be deleted:

Passed.

Resolution No. 7

In the light of proposed merger of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and in view of the academic and economic factors making it increasingly difficult to maintain for the Eastern area, a strong theological school.

Therefore, be it resolved, that this conference ask the board of directors of Eastern Pilgrim College, to pursue again the possibility of merger, with one or more colleges in the denomination for the purpose of maintaining and enlarging the facilities for the preparation of young men and women for the ministry of the church.

Resolution No. 1

BE IT RESOLVED that Standing Rule No. 1, Page 32, be amended to read: An amount equal to 18% of all the regular church and Sunday School offerings shall be remitted by each local church monthly to the District Treasurer, (Excluded from this is to be all building fund offerings, and one 18% Budget offering per month) to be apportioned as follows:

51% - District Budget

36% - United Stewardship Fund

13% - Eastern Pilgrim College

The 51% District Budget shall be apportioned as follows:

90% - District Account

6% - Home Missionary Account

4% - General Conference Account

Resolution No. 2

BE IT RESOLVED that each church shall pay the District Superintendent, or his appointed representative 25c per member for two visits to the church each year.

Passed.

Resolution No. 3

BE IT RESOLVED, the District Secretary, Treasurer and Statistician shall receive \$125.00, \$300.00 and \$75.00 respectively, plus postage per year.

Passed.

Resolution No. 4

BE IT RESOLVED in view of the need, the District Conference recommends that each church provide hospital insurance for the pastor and his family.

Passed.

STANDING RULES**DISTRICT REGULATIONS**

- No. 1 An amount equal to 18% of all the regular church and Sunday School offerings shall be remitted by each local church, monthly, to the District Treasurer, (excluded from this is to be all building fund offerings and one 18% Budget offering per month) to be apportioned as follows:
- 51%—District Budget
 - 36%—United Stewardship Fund
 - 13%—Eastern Pilgrim College
- The 51% District Budget shall be apportioned as follows:
- 90%—District Account
 - 6%—Home Missionary Account
 - 4%—General Conference Account
- No. 2 The Conference shall accept the Pension plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 10 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.
- No. 3 The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$100.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of camp meeting fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, full payment of Pilgrim Pension Fund, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct not more than 2 revivals or conventions of not more than 4 Sundays each year, with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.
- No. 4 Each church shall pay the District Superintendent, or his appointed representative 25c per member for two visits to the church each year.
- No. 5 The District Secretary, Treasurer and Statistician shall receive \$125.00, \$300.00 and \$75.00, respectively plus postage per year.
- No. 6 The District Conference recommends that each church pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife, all incapacitated ordained ministers on the membership roll of any given church, and that the District shall pay the assessment fees of the District Superintendent and his wife, as these fees relate to the Ministerial Benefit Association.
- No. 7 The objectives, plans and goals of all District Departments (Sunday School, Youth, Home Missionary, District Missionary Director) shall be in the hands of all District Ministers within 30 days following conference and furthermore that the committees and boards shall have opportunity to promote their program at the District Fall Ministerial Convention.
- No. 8 The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.
- No. 9 Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.

-
- No. 10 Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 11 The rate of mileage paid by the District for travel in district interests shall be .07c per mile.
- No. 12 The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A.M. the third Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.
- No. 13 The Home Mission Board shall consist of Assistant District Superintendent, as Chairman, and 3 members elected as follows: One for a period of 3 years, One for a period of 2 years, One for a period of 1 year, and that one member be elected each year hereafter.
- No. 14 The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 15 The District Council shall be the District Trustees and the executive members of the Council are the negotiating signers of all District transactions.
- No. 16 The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 17 The Price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 18 The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete, subject to the approval of the District Council.
- No. 19 Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.
- No. 20 Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 21 No annual church business meeting shall be held on Sunday.
- No. 22 Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
- No. 23 Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, other than camp and church related business.
- No. 24 The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 25 Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.

- No. 26 The churches shall grant their pastor the option of conducting two revivals a year.
- No. 27 The Annual Youth Camp shall be held prior to the regular camp with the specific date and time to be determined by youth council and District Council.
- No. 28 A stenographer shall be employed by District Council to help the District Secretary in preparing the minutes for the printer.
- No. 29 Each church financially able is urged to build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor to be used and known as their "Camp Parsonage."
- No. 30 The District Superintendent shall be a standing member of the educational and examining boards.
- No. 31 A District Educational Committee shall be formed to consist of District Superintendent as Chairman, District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, District Youth Director, Director of PELT and Director of CYC. The purpose of the Committee shall be to coordinate and promote the work of these Departments on the District level.
- No. 32 The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$75.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the Conference for his services.
- No. 33 The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:
- a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.
 - b. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
 - c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
 - d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
 - e. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
 - f. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
 - g. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.
- This assessment shall be based on the past year's average attendance.

STANDING RULES

CALLING OF PASTORS

- No. 1 A pastor call meeting shall be held separate from the annual business meeting between the first and second Sunday of May, inclusive.
- No. 2. A form of procedure for first calling of pastor shall be as follows:
- (a) The results of the pastor call meeting shall immediately be forwarded to the District Superintendent by the church secretary.
 - (b) The pastor shall have 15 days to accept or reject the call and he shall inform the District Superintendent of his decision.

- (c) Whenever the church is in need of a pastor, the District Superintendent shall present, either in person, writing or through an authorized representative the list of available ministers with recommendations that fall naturally within his jurisdiction.
 - (d) A church board and church may immediately call a man on the basis of recommendation without having a trial message.
 - (e) When the board and church desire a trial message the board shall make a choice of a candidate. Candidates should be designated as first, second or third choice. A vote shall be taken on the candidate within a reasonable time, preferably immediately.
 - (f) If the first candidate is not called or refuses the call the same procedure shall be followed for the other candidates.
 - (g) A second candidate shall not be called to preach a trial message until a vote has been taken on the first.
- No. 3 All retiring ministers shall close their ministry to a church the Sunday following camp and all moving take place the following week.

STANDING RULES

CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 1 Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 2 Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 3 All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.
- No. 4 All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 5 A Bible college service shall be held the 2nd Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 6 No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 7 A day and hour shall be set for a healing service at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 8 A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meeting for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 9 No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been removed.

- No. 10 All active District Ministers and Evangelists shall give 2 eight hour days of work on the camp grounds each year and in the event any minister is unable to participate in this work program, he be assessed at the rate of \$10.00 per day.
- No. 11 Ladies and young girls taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly and as becometh holiness.
- No. 12 No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 13 One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 14 The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 15 All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 16 The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the Council is unable to grant a transfer or lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the Council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 17 Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 18 Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 19 The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.
- No. 20 The early morning prayer meeting, prior to breakfast, shall be reinstated, and also some fasting and prayer meetings shall be called during the Camp.
- No. 21 No part of the present land holdings of Denton Camp, (including the newly purchased farm) shall be sold without the prior approval of the District Conference, and that all plans for the development or reservation of this property also have the approval of the Conference.
- No. 22 The District Council shall initiate a program of safety, especially fire prevention—for the Denton Camp.

STANDING RULES

CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 1 The Conference year shall close on May 31st and all reports shall be postmarked no later than July 1st, and mailed to the District Superintendent and the District Statistician.
- No. 2 Sitzings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon Session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30; Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 3 As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 4 The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 P.M. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 5 The conference bar shall include the first ten rows in the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform.
- No. 6 The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 7 The District Secretary shall send, immediately following the District Conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the District Superintendent and to each local Church Treasurer.
- No. 8 The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P.M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified no later than 30 days prior to the conference.
- No. 9 A registration fee of \$2.00 shall be paid by each member of the District Conference to the registrar upon arrival at the District Conference. This fee shall be paid by each local church, for the pastor and each lay delegate. This fee shall be applied toward meals, electric, lodging and journal expense. It is understood that payment of this fee makes the member of the conference eligible to receive a copy of the journal without further cost.
- No. 10 In view of the need, the District Conference recommends that each church provide hospital insurance for the pastor and his family.

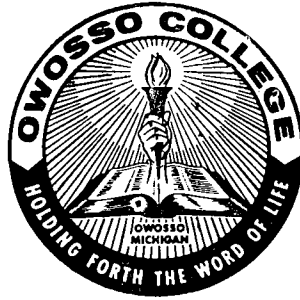

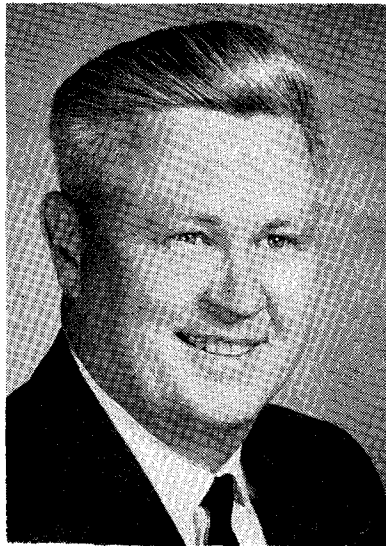

Kenneth Masterman, Director of music at the college, presented a concert that was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. 28 churches were represented at this gathering. The campers put in practice the lessons learned in Mrs. Janie Dieter's etiquette class. The inspirational singing was conducted under the direction of Rev. Miller, pastor of the Harrington Church. This church also sponsored or helped to sponsor many of their young people at the camp. The closing service under the tabernacle, during which \$203.00 was given, was most inspiring. The entire youth came forward as a body and covenanted to work for Jesus Christ in any field of labor that he should choose for them.

With a sense of deepest gratitude and appreciation to all who have helped both to labor and to pray for the youth of our district, I thank you. For the privilege of serving the Master, and the youth of our District is our delight.

RESOLUTIONS FOR YOUTH CONFERENCE

Resolution No. 1—

BE IT RESOLVED that Resolution #2, page 72 of 1965 minutes be deleted.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Zone Youth Rallies be held monthly, and that there be two (2) District Youth Rallies held each year; time, place and program of the District Rallies to be arranged by the District Youth Council. The Zone Rallies to begin in September, through May.

Resolution No. 2—Rejected.

STANDING RULES OF THE YOUTH CONFERENCE

1. A District Youth Camp shall be conducted annually on a date set by the Youth Committee and the District Council. The Camp shall be held at a time to include 4 evenings and 3 days.
2. The District Youth Conference shall be held annually the first Saturday morning of Denton Camp from the hours of 8:00 A.M. until 12 noon, with an extension of time if needed from 1:00 P.M. until 2:00 P.M. in the afternoon of the same day.
3. There shall be an annual institute of local youth leaders held during the last week of September for the purpose of defining goals, training leadership and promoting a stronger youth organization in our District, under the direction of the Executive Youth Council.
4. The various committees that are necessary for Youth Conference such as Resolutions, Ways and Means and other committees deemed advisable, shall be set up on a staggered basis (i.e. two members selected for a

one year term) by the Executive Youth Council with the chairman of said committee appointed by the District Youth President.

5. Each zone shall contribute 10% of the Zone Rally offerings to the District Youth Treasurer; said amount to be sent quarterly.
6. The District Youth President shall be paid the sum of \$100.00 per year, plus postage and travel expenses at the rate of 7c per mile in the interest of District Youth.
7. The District Youth Council shall be reimbursed at the rate of 7c per mile to attend the District Youth Council meetings.
8. The District Youth President is authorized to attend the Annual Youth President's Conference in Indianapolis, with his share of the travel expenses being paid by the District Youth Society. Said expenses will be shared with the S.S. Promotional Secretary who will be attending the same conference.
9. The District Youth President shall hold office until his successor is elected.
10. There shall be monthly youth rallies held during the conference year and these shall be held September through May, and there shall be two (2) District rallies. The District rally dates, time, place and program are to be arranged by the District Youth Council.
11. The Zone leader shall make a planned visit to each church in his zone for the purpose of promoting the youth work, and organizing a Pilgrim Youth Society. An offering shall be taken at each church to finance this program.
12. The Youth Council and the District Executive Council shall study the possibility of developing a portion of the newly purchased camp property for a Youth Camp.
13. The following system of assessment will be used throughout all churches in the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church with said funds being forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer quarterly. (Sept. 1 — Dec. 1 — March 1 — and May 31)
