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



Minutes Of Conference Proceedings

FIRST SITTING

The sixty-third annual conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, of the Eastern District, convened at 1:30 p.m., July 27, 1967. The Rev. Paul D. Dieter welcomed the ministerial and lay delegates to the conference and we were then led in singing "Beulah Land" by Rev. Carl Candel. Rev. E. J. Haskins served as pianist.

The District Superintendent, The Rev. Paul D. Dieter, expressed pleasure seeing Rev. Shrieves and others that are here by divine providence. The Easton pastor, Rev. W. B. Walker, led in prayer as all kneeled in God's presence.

The Rev. Paul D. Dieter introduced Dr. Paul F. Elliott, General Superintendent of the Eastern area of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, as conference chairman. Rev. Elliott brought greetings from the other General Superintendents, Rev. J. D. Abbott and Rev. Melvin Snyder. He brought an optimistic report of the church in general and extended his personal greetings to the conference saying, "This is a historic conference because it is the last conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The next conference will be with the merged church." He then called for the roll and the secretary proceeded with roll call.

A motion that Mrs. Esther Trice be seated as the delegate from Bethlehem was passed. The roll was thus established and the conference bar set to include the first ten rows of the center section and platform.

A motion prevailed to receive Rev. U. N. Freeman, Marion Griffin, Jr. and Paul Twining to the conference. They were presented by Rev. Wm. H. Miller, Chairman of the reception committee. Each one gave his personal testimony and expressed their pleasure of attending Denton Conference. Mrs. Freeman gave a glowing testimony and Rev. R. A. Beltz gave a word of personal witness.

A motion passed that Rev. Beltz be granted an honorary seat in the conference bar. The Pittsville church and pastors are to be welcomed into the conference during the evening session.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Paul D. Dieter, read his annual report. A motion prevailed to receive this report with thanksgiving and gratitude. The conference signified their consent by standing and giving a hearty AMEN.

The District Superintendent reported as Camp Director and gave a summary of improvements and future needs of the camp. He also projected a plan to help make for a greater and more efficient camp. This report was received with appreciation. The conference was then recessed for ten minutes.

The conference was reconvened and Rev. Liston Moyer reported for the Auditing committee. This report was received as read.

The District treasurer, Rev. Graham Senter, gave his printed report to each delegate. A motion passed that he read only the totals. It was moved and supported that this report be received with appreciation. Motion passed.

A motion passed that Mrs. Freeman be seated with her husband in the conference bar, as an honorary member.

A motion prevailed that money received from individuals in the churches of the district for E. P. C. be itemized, reported and carried as a supplementary report; to be placed in the conference Journal and each church be given full credit for this type of giving.

The Treasurer, Rev. Graham Senter, reported as camp treasurer. A motion passed to receive this report.

The assistant District Superintendent, Rev. Grier Baker, gave a testimony and oral report; which was received.

The District Missionary Society president, Rev. Mrs. Anna Bowman, read the Missionary Society report which was accepted.

Rev. Lida Brasure reported as District Missionary treasurer. Motion passed to receive this report.

Dr. Paul Elliott reported that he stood at the grave of Miss Bertha Joy, a devoted and dedicated missionary, who wished her body to remain, after death, with the people of her labors.

Rev. Wm. H. Miller gave an oral report as District Director of P.E.L.T.

Mr. Roland Melvin, Jr. read a report as Director of C.Y.C. These reports received.

A motion passed that the District Statistician highlight the most important items in his report and point out yearly comparisons, making this report as concise as possible. The report was received with gratitude and thanksgiving by a standing vote and giving of a hearty AMEN.

The chairman, Dr. Paul Elliott, requested that Rev. Beltz give his report tonight. Announcements were made by the District Superintendent and Rev. Graham Senter requested that he might announce the churches that will receive certificates and stars for their giving toward the eighteen per cent budget. They are as follows: 3 stars - Baltimore 1, Cambridge, Cedar Grove, Centreville, Denton, Easton, Glen Burnie, Goldsboro, Greensboro, Hurlock and Salisbury. 2 stars - Crisfield, Delmar and Milton. 1 star - Seaford.

The conference was adjourned due to expiration of time.

SECOND SITTING — JULY 27, 1967 6:30 P.M.

The second sitting of the conference reconvened at 6:45 p.m. with Mr. Olney Ross leading us in singing, "Redeemed." Rev. E. J. Haskins served as pianist.

Rev. Dieter asked all to stand as Rev. Harry Peters led us in prayer.

Dr. Paul F. Elliott asked the chairman of the committee on memoirs, Rev. Miss Louetta Holden, to come forward and take charge of this part of the conference. Memoirs were read and Dr. Elliott called the conference to stand for silent prayer to honor our beloved dead. He then prayed for those who yet remained and are hoping to meet our friends and loved ones who have died in the faith. All joined in singing, "In the Sweet Bye and Bye." Mr. John Pizzadilli testified to the marvelous grace of God that found him, keeps him and will carry him home.

Dr. Paul F. Elliott introduced Rev. R. A. Beltz, General Director of Pilgrim Pension Plan. He gave the history of the pension plan that from a small beginning there have been improvements until the assets are now more than a million dollars. The question now is - "WHAT WILL MERGER DO TO THE PLAN." There are three or four statements to be made - 1. Both denominations have a pension plan although different - and both started at the same time and now have twenty years of experience, 2. There should be a better pension plan in the merged church after twenty years of experience, 3. "members combined accumulation" is protected by the by-laws and all obligations of both denominations will be honored.

The Ministerial Benefit Fund was also explained and the conference was urged to have all the ministers to benefit by participating in both the Pension Plan and the Ministerial Benefit Fund.

Dr. Elliott asked the District Superintendent to give a summary of the history of the new church at Pittsville, Md.; of which Rev. and Mrs. Harry Peters (pastors) along with twenty others are charter members.

A motion passed that the church at Pittsville, Md. be welcomed into our conference and that the pastors, Rev. and Mrs. Peters, be officially received into our fellowship. Both gave glowing testimonies of the presence and the power of the Lord. The conference stood and sang, "Blest Be The Tie That Binds" while Dr. Elliott and Rev. Dieter welcomed them on behalf of the conference.

Minutes of the previous sitting were read by the District Secretary, Rev. Reed Morris, and approved.

Dr. Elliott reported that the merged conference will have equal representation of ministers and lay delegates. There are to be 648 delegates, 324 from each denomination.

Moved and passed that the district council serve as nominating committee and bring in twelve names of laymen. The conference shall also have the privilege of nominating others, if they so desire.

The District Promotional Secretary, Rev. A. T. Adams, read his report and it was received with thanksgiving. The conference awards were then presented. The Decade of Progress Award going to the Laurel Church. The District Attendance Award was given to Greensboro. The District Percentage Award going to Greenwood. Rev. A. T. Adams then presented the percentage gain ribbons to twentyfour churches that had made gains this year.

The examining board and educational board reported through their secretary. Rev. H. D. Dukes, and their recommendations were accepted by the conference.

The Resolutions Committee reported through their secretary, Rev. W. B. Walker, resolution number one adopted. Resolution number two - no second. Resolution number three - no second, Resolution number four - adopted, Resolution number five - adopted as amended by adding the word galvanized, Resolution number six - adopted as amended. (Amendment that the District Council be authorized to spend what funds are necessary to survey the property and implement the necessary planning to be presented to the conference next year.

Rev. Grier Baker adjourned the sitting with the conference standing for the benediction.

THIRD SITTING - JULY 28, 1967 - 8:30 A.M.

The third sitting of the conference reconvened with Rev. Irving Parker leading in singing, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Rev. Haskins at the piano.

The District Superintendent requested special prayer for Rev. P. F. Bean and Wife who are both ill. Other requests were made for Rev. C. W. Schelhouse, Mr. Oscar Ewell offered the prayer.

The conference chairman, Dr. Paul Elliott, called for spontaneous Bible Promises.

The minutes of the previous sitting were approved.

The Ways and Means Committee reported through their secretary, Rev. D. J. Wooten. Resolution number one - adopted Resolution number two - adopted

Resolution number three - substituted motion

Then the conference proceeded to elect officers. The District Superintendent appointed tellers.

Olney Ross, Paul Pritchett, Clifford Chew, Paul Twining, Irving Parker, Marion Griffin, Jr. and Charles Lambert.

After prayer by the conference chairman District officers were elected as follows: District Superintendent - Rev. Paul D. Dieter

Assistant District Superintendent - Rev. Grier Baker

District Secretary - Rev. J. Reed Morris

District Treasurer - Rev. Graham F. Senter

The conference recessed for ten minutes, while the tellers counted the ballots for the advisory members to the council. The advisory members of the District Council are: Rev. H. D. Dukes, Rev. Wm. H. Miller, Rev. A. T. Adams.

The election of the delegates to the International Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, preceding the Merging Conference. After first ballot a motion passed that the next highest in order, of the lay delegates to the merging conference, be the alternates.

The conference chairman instructed us that there will be four lay delegates to the International Conference and six of the lay delegates to the Merging Conference.

Rev. Leon Hynson, presented to the conference by the chairman of the reception committee, gave his testimony and was welcomed to the conference by Dr. Elliott, received as an honorary member and seated in the conference bar.

The Ministerial Delegates to the International and Merging Conferences are as follows: Rev. Paul D. Dieter, District Superintendent, Rev. Grier Baker, Rev. Graham Senter, Rev. Wm. H. Miller, and Rev. J. Reed Morris.

The alternates are: Rev. H. D. Dukes, Rev. D. J. Wooten, Rev. A. T. Adams, Rev. Wm. Schaffner.

The Lay Delegates to the International Conference are: Mr. Olney Ross, Mr. John Mervine, Mr. Roland Melvin, Jr., and Mr. Graham Price.

Lay Delegates to the Merging Conference include the above four laymen plus the following two: Mr. Paul Carroll, and Mr. William A. Jones.

The alternates are: International Conference - Paul Carroll, William Jones, Paul Vincent, John Pizzadili.

To the Merging Conference: The alternates are: Paul Vincent, John Pizzadili.

Dr. Elliott spoke at length concerning the merging of the two denominations while the tellers were counting the ballots for the ministerial and lay delegates to these conferences.

Moved and passed that the time be extended so that the tellers could ascertain the count.

It was moved and passed that the eight highest ministerial delegates be voted upon. The first four elected to serve as delegates, the remaining four to be alternates.

The conference recessed until after lunch.

FOURTH SITTING - JULY 28, 1967 - 1:30 P.M.

The conference reconvened with Rev. Calv:n Disharoon leading in singing, "Come and Dine." Rev. Linwood Horseman at the piano.

Lay Delegates completed the election to the International and Merging Conference.

Rev. John P. Campbell introduced to the conference. He and his wife were granted honorary seats in the conference bar.

Examining Board are as follows:

Rev. Charles Baker - three year term

Elected to the Educational Board:

Rev. David Wooten - three year term

Elected as District Missionary Society President:

Rev. Mrs. Anna Bowman

Moved and passed that the District Council be authorized to appoint a P.E.L.T. and C.Y.C. District Director.

Moved and passed that the District Council serve as/or appoint a Committee (District Merger Committee).

Motion passed that the District Council hear the conference minutes for approval.

The Conference chairman, General Superintendent Dr. P. F. Elliott along with the District Superintendent Rev. Paul D. Dieter, presented the general conference a certificate for giving eighty percent or above toward the United Stewardship Fund.

The election of member to the Home Mission Board:

Rev. Harry Peters - three year term

The Ways and Means Committee reported through their secretary, Rev. D. J. Wooten, Resolution number four - substitute motion.

A motion passed that flowers be sent to Rev. and Mrs. P. F. Bean.

Rev. A. T. Adams presented the final resolution to express our appreciation to Dr. Paul Elliott who has presided so ably in this conference.

The District Superintendent made the announcements, Dr. Elliott called for all to cooperate with the District Superintendent and Council and WALK THROUGH THE OPEN DOOR OF OPPORTUNITY that is before us. He requested prayer for the merging conference, the General Leaders (both church and national.)

Motion to adjourn the conference by singing, "Bless Be The Tie That Binds."

Benediction given by Rev. John P. Campbell, and the last District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was dismissed.

To our General Superintendent, Dr. Paul F. Elliott, Fellow Ministers, Delegates, and friends of this the 63rd Annual Conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings!

In the providence of God, we are gathered together at another annual conference. This means that we are one year closer to the coming of Christ, and left with one less year to work for God and the Church.

One year ago, you placed on my shoulders a tremendous responsibility. At the same time you presented to me some wonderful opportunities and privileges. It has been a privilege to travel over our District in the interest of God's Kingdom, to visit every church, make many new friends, share your problems and victories, and enjoy the hospitality of your homes.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation for the many kindnesses shown me and my family by the District.

MY PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 131 times, taught Sunday School 11 times, made a pastoral visit to all the churches. Presided at 89 church board meetings, 12 Council meetings, 13 District committee meetings, 3 area Sunday School and Youth Leaders Meetings, 3 General Church Extension rallies, and 2 District Ministerial Conventions.

Attended 2 Sunday School Board meetings, 2 Youth Council meetings, 2 Home Missionary Board meetings, the Youth Leaders Institute, District Youth Rally, the first District Senior Banquet, Area Leaders Conference at Richmond, Va., 2 General Board Meetings at Indianapolis, 1 Merger Sub-Committee meeting, 1 Polity Committee meeting at Marion, Ind., The National Sunday School Association Convention in Boston, Mass., 1 attended 2 E.P.C. Board meetings and 5 committee meetings of the College, and the District Ministers Fellowship Dinner.

I spoke at one church youth banquet, one World Day of Prayer Service, one Good Friday service, one Christmas Banquet, and spoke to one CYC group, and a Zone Missionary Rally.

Dedicated a new one story dormitory at Bloxom Camp, and the improvements at 2 churches.

Assisted in one parsonage dedication. Officiated at 2 mortgage burning services and one ground-breaking service.

Edited 10 issues of the Eastern Pilgrim, preached at one week-end revival, another week-end my wife and I were the singers for a revival. Served as E.P.C. Alumni President. Worked 248 hours on Denton Camp, made 66 hospital calls on Ministers and laymen, and spent 2 days in the hospital myself.

I officiated at 2 funerals, and 4 weddings, assisted in 4 funerals and one wedding. Christened 4 bab es and baptized 3 adults. I traveled 18,343 miles in the performance of my duties. My salary has been paid in full.

MEMBERSHIP

The statistical reports indicate a present membership of 1352. This is an increase of 9 over last year.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

WE APPRECIATE THE GAIN of 91 that was made in this department. Each pastor, along with their Sunday School Staff, is to be complimented for the effort put forth to reach the unreached.

FINANCES

Our total receipts for all the churches this past year amounted to \$356,471.85. Our per capita giving is \$263.66. 16 churches paid at least 80% of the 18% budget obligations. We appreciate the efforts of all the churches in the matter of budgets. Having been a pastor for over 14 years, serving 4 churches on this District, I am convinced the key to paid budgets in most instances rests with the pastor. I have always felt and believed it to be true that God blessed the churches. I pastored because I was faithful in meeting my General Church and District budget obligations. 63.5% of our United Stewardship Fund was paid. We greatly appreciate what has been done but let's all determine to work a bit harder this coming year so that every church will meet in full this obligation.

YOUTH

We just closed our 11th Annual Youth Camp under the direction of our District Youth President, the Rev. Reed Morris and his staff of instructors and counsellors. An excellent spirit prevailed. At the conclusion of the final service over 20 young people stepped out indicating that they had a call to Christian service. We must pray for, support and encourage our youth.

C.Y.C. - P.E.L.T. - MISSIONARY

Our appreciation to Mr. Roland Melvin, who is the District C.Y.C. Director, the Rev. William Miller, who heads the PELT Program, and the Rev. Mrs. Anna Bowman, the District Missionary President. Progress continues in these areas.

MERGER

On June 25, 1968 the Merger Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness and Wesleyan Methodist Denominations will convene in Anderson, Ind. To most of us this will be a new experience. However this is not something new to the history of our denomination, which is made up of various merged groups.

The decision has been made. The implementation of the action of both denominations is yet to be. We are still the Pilgrim Holiness Church and will be until June 1968.

The world has seen too much confusion, divisions, splits within the Holiness movements. We all know what this does to the Holiness witness. Unsaved people lose confidence and turn away saying, "If that is what Holiness is, I don't want it." But before us now is a tremendous opportunity to witness to Christian Holiness by showing to the world that two Holiness churches with like doctrines can unite in an effort to better evangelize the world in these last days. Let each pastor and church pray and work to make the merged church a spiritual, evangelistic, effective, and forward moving church. Let us work with all sincerity to this end.

EASTERN PILGRIM COLLEGE

Our Zone School continues to demand our sincere prayers and financial support. We are expecting a school representative to bring us up to date on the plans and needs of the school.

FROM OUR MIDST

Our hearts have been saddened with the homegoing of Rev. Calvin Hudson. Brother Hudson pastored several churches on this District and at the time of his death was the shepherd of the Cape Charles Church. He now experiences the joys of the Eternal City.

MATERIAL PROGRESS REPORT

District Parsonage - Prior to our moving into the parsonage the Council felt some needed improvements should be made. The kitchen, which had been an inconvenience to previous superintendents, was remodeled. A partition was moved, and a new sink, counter cabinets, floor, ceiling, and counter top stove was installed. Wall to wall carpet was put in the dining and living rooms instead of re-

sanding the floors. Most of the rooms were re-decorated. These improvements have been greatly appreciated.

Baltimore 1 - Redecorated the interior of the church. Also some additional improvements to the parsonage.

Baltimore 11 - Painted the interior of the church, formstoned the front of the Sunday School Annex. Put a fence around the rear of the building. Purchased the house adjoining the church.

Bethlehem - Parsonage improvements, wall to wall carpet in the ha!lway, new inlaid floor in the bathroom and a vinyl cushion rug on the kitchen and utility room. Paid off the mortgage on the parsonage.

Broomes Island - New organ given to the church.

Centreville - New gray siding has been put on the outside of the church. Grass and shrubbery planted in front of the church. A new gas heater has replaced the oil burner in the church.

Delmar - New electrical wiring in the church and the floors painted. A new roof put on the parsonage, outside trim painted, porches repaired, and interior redecorated.

Denton -The interior of the parsonage was redecorated. Remodeled the kitchen by replacing a window and installing a new kitchen sink and cabinets.

Exmore - New venetian blinds installed in the church. The interior has been redecorated and the floors varnished. 2 new gas heaters and a brick bulletin board also have been added.

Greensboro - Church benches and floors refinished. Brick step erected at side entrance. Several rooms in the basement were furnished for use by the Sunday School. The parsonage was painted along with some needed repairs.

 ${\bf Gumboro}$ - A 2 car garage has been built behind the parsonage. The utility building painted.

Hoopers Island - New storm windows have been installed on the parsonage.

Hurlock - Improvements on parsonage included the installation of a half-bath and a disappearing stairway to the attic.

Milford - New carpet has been installed in the church and the floors revamished. Aluminum siding has been put on the outside and the trim painted. The church basement was completely done over. Paneling on the walls, new ceiling, tile floors, lighting, and the furniture painted. A furnace humidifier was installed in the parsonage and heating ducts to the upstairs. New linoleum on the kitchen floor.

Millsboro - A new nylon rug was put in the church. New offering plates purchased and a new roof. The floors revarnished and a new sweeper purchased. The basement rooms were also repainted. The parsonage received a new coat of paint throughout. New venetian blinds to the windows, new gas floor furnace and a new stainless steel sink and formica counter installed.

 ${\bf Milton}$ - Built an attractive brick bulletin board and planter in front of the church.

Roxana - The church has been painted on the outside. The interior has been very beautifully redecorated with paneled walls, new ceiling, lighting, wall to wall carpet. New pulpit furniture and the pews refinished. The parsonage has been painted inside and out and new shingles on the roof. A hot water heater installed, new sink, linoleum in the kitchen and bathroom, the house was also rewired.

 ${\bf Rumbley}$ - Redecorated the interior of the church. Walls painted, floors sanded, pews refinished, and new carpet installed. Also painted the outside of the church.

Salisbury - The Men's Bible Class Room has been paneled and redecorated. Also the Junior High Room, the bathrooms, and hallway.

Saxis - New altar and new bulletin board. The ceiling lowered in the church and the inside painted. Also a new roof was put on.

Tilghman - Purchased a spinet piano, installed a hot air heating system, painted the outside of the church, and put on a new roof.

HOW ABOUT THE FUTURE?

Most of us are aware of the fact that the modern-day challenge is a very great one. Sin and confusion is everywhere. Bible ignorance, even in America, is alarming. One cannot read II Timothy 3, without knowing the end-times are upon us. We are told by the Apostle Paul, "Men will be selfish, fond of money, boastful, irreverent, callous, relentless, foul mouthed and vulgar, dissolute, and savage; they will hate goodness, they will be treacherous, reckless, and conceited, preferring pleasure to God - for though they keep up a form of religion, they will have nothing to do with it as a force." (Moffatt's Translation).

In these days we must be doing our best to reach lost souls. Are we effective church workers and Christian witnesses? In view of deteriorating moral and spiritual values all about us, I think it is time for us on the Eastern District to stop and re-examine and re-evaluate our service to God. What about our personal relationship with Christ? Underneath all our religiousness, form, standards, is there genuine love for Christ and others?

What about our service, our methods? I believe we must rediscover through prayer and searching of the Scriptures just what God wants to do with and through us.

The success of the Early Church could be attributed to two things: First, they were filled with the Holy Spirit, and Second, they were saturated with a true sense of loyalty to Christ and their mission. There is no doubt but what we need to recover the **urgency** of our mission. We stand in danger of losing the spirit of urgency which is a vital part of the Gospel. Ours is a mission of urgency.

I am proposing that this Conference adopt for the coming year, and instruct the District Council to implement, a proposal which we might call "Our Mission of Urgency". The total mission would involve:

1. The urgency of Spiritual Renewal. 2. The urgency of Evangelism. 3. The urgency of a deeper Loyalty to Christ and the church. 4. The urgency of improving our Church and Sunday School facilities.

1. THE URGENCY OF SPIRITUAL RENEWAL.

A. 1. There must be a Spiritual Renewal of the Preacher.

It is quite apparent that renewal must begin here at this vital level of church life. The materialistic octopus of our day seems to have gotten its slimy arms around too many preachers and has alienated their affections from the Christian Ministry. In too many areas, there is a growing disenchantment with the ministry. Where such men serve, the spiritual life of the church will decline.

Each of us must desire to be renewed in our relationship with Christ if we are going to be the servants of God we must be. We must spend more time with the Word in open minded study.

2. There must be a renewal of our methods.

There is no doubt in my mind about our MESSAGE being sufficient to meet the challenge of ANY day. But we must examine, and re-examine our methods. When we discover ways to do our work more effectively, we become obligated to make changes. It is my opinion

that God will require of us to get the message to the maximum number of people. Therefore, our methods will need to change, in keeping with our time. Let us allow the blessed Holy Spirit to use and to work through us and the church in this day, as He desires to do in order to reach the unreached.

B. Not only must there be a spiritual renewal of the preacher but also a SPIRITUAL RENEWAL OF THE PEOPLE!

The basic idea here is to strengthen our people's faith and to enlarge their vision through a greater involvement. There is a strong tie between spirituality and involvement. Let us inspire an evangelical renewal among our laity, by creating in them a sense of responsibility to witness and thus be a part of the Gospel outreach.

II THE URGENCY OF EVANGELISM

Jesus Christ is the urgency of evangelism! Nowhere is this more grippingly apparent than in the life of Paul. Here was a Christ-mastered, Christ-intoxicated man, who has left us the great example of evangelistic motivation. We must evangelize through church revivals, special ser ices, personal witnessing, and lay visitation.

III. THE URGENCY OF A DEEPER LOYALTY

Certainly it would enhance the power, effectiveness, beauty of our total ministry if we pastors and laymen alike could discover the way to stimulate genuine loyalty to the Eastern District and the total ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. This we know cannot be done by legislation. It must originate in dedicated hearts, hearts that will place the total interest of Christ and His Church, including the Pilgrim Holiness Church, ahead of personal interests and gain. This quality of spirit will then spill over on others when they see it demonstrated in us.

Let us ask God to fill our hearts with His grace that we may abound with love and appreciation for our church and its leaders. May our hearts abound with love for all who name the Christ as their Lord and Saviour.

IV. FINALLY, THE URGENCY OF IMPROVING OUR CHURCH AND SUNDAY SCHOOL FACILITIES

If Jesus tarries many of our church properties will be outdated. We will find it increasingly difficult to hold this generation to the church. Whether we want to face it or not our facilities play an important part in reaching and holding people to the church. We must take steps to improve our church facilities within the bounds of reasonable finance.

TO IMPLEMENT SUCH A MISSION OF URGENCY I SUGGEST:

- 1. Let us keep the message of Christian Holiness and purity of life in the forefront, and make it our goal to assist in every way possible the spread of Scriptural Holiness.
- 2. Weekly prayer and fasting.
- 3. Sunday School attendance and enrollment crusades and promotion of the youth work in cooperation with the General Sunday School and Youth Department.
- 4. Set our sights on a minimum Sunday School and church membership gain of $100\,\%$ over last year.
- 5. Every church striving to pay the 18% budget in full each month.
- 6. Eight Sunday nights of evangelism, accompanied with special prayer meetings, Oct. 6 Nov. 24.

- 7. Goals in new C.Y.C. Chapters and Pelt Training Classes.
- 8. A Loyalty Day Sunday with each pastor preaching a sermon on Loyalty to Christ, and the Church.
- 9. In the Spring a District-wide emphasis on lay visitation.

The success of such a mission depends on two fundamentals - prayer and work. THE TIME FOR RENEWAL IS NOW! TODAY IS THE DAY OF SALVATION - WE MUST USE IT.

The 68th Denton Holiness Camp Meeting will begin tomorrow night. We are praying for and anticipating a time of spiritual refreshing and soul saving.

IMPROVEMENTS

The Ellwanger Memorial is now completed and ready for occupancy. We believe this will be a lasting asset to the Camp and appreciate all who helped to make it possible. A new area has been developed for trailers and campers. Electricity and temporary water facilities have been provided. Mr. Reese Hurley took his week's vacation and did the electrical work as well as other jobs. We appreciate the many hours of donated labor that Mr. Hurley gives to the Camp each year. If this area for campers seems to be satisfactory a more permanent water system should be installed and possibly sewage facilities. It appears that this will be an ever enlarging area of the Camp.

The dishwashing area of the Dining Hall has been enclosed. This should be an improvement welcomed by all. Our thanks to Mr. Ronald Stevanus, Mr. Ogle Booze, Mr. Roland Joseph, and others for their help on this project.

The Missionary Zone under the direction of Mrs. Glenn Staehli raised money to purchase vinyl cloth to cover the tables. The Denton Society under the direction of Mrs. Powell Martin made the floral pieces that decorate the tables. We thank each one that had a part in providing these extra things that add to the attractiveness of the Dining Hall.

The District Missionary Society raised money to repair and improve the Song Evangelist's cottage. Some of the improvements have been made, but since the caretaker's house is empty, we decided to house the singers there this year. The money raised for this purpose by the Societies above what was used on the improvements this year will be held in reserve for this project.

This year I have placed considerable emphasis on the appearance of the grounds. This required many extra hours. Adults, young people, and children gave a helping hand.

The flowers at the Main Gate were planted by the Greensboro CYC. Mrs. Dorothy Holland, Director, supervised the project. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Love of Denton planted the flowers at the second entrance. These flowers add to the appearance and we all appreciate the effort put forth.

We note that a number of cottage owners have made improvements on their cottages. We trust this interest will continue.

CARETAKER

I want to take this opportunity to recognize and express appreciation to Rev. P. F. Bean who for 14 years served as caretaker. We are all grateful for his faithfulness and devotion to the Camp. We regret that his physical condition was such

that he had to give up the job. It has been suggested that we place a picture and a write-up in this year's Conference Journal. We all appreciate Bro. and Sister Bean and pray God's richest blessings upon them.

THE FUTURE

What will be the future for Denton Camp? If it is to continue it must have our earnest prayers and financial support. We dare not just take the Camp for granted. Our Camp will surely deteriorate in our day if:

- 1. We seek only to accommodate older people.
- 2. We fail to appeal to young families.
- 3. We do not improve and modernize our buildings and grounds.
- 4. We are satisfied with maintaining the status quo.
- 5. We fear every new thing.
- 6. We become introvertic and introspective and thus lose the world vision.
- 7. We fail to keep in step with the Holy Spirit.
- 8. We fail to adjust to the needs of OUR days.
- 9. We fail to keep God's anointing upon the Camp.

The day of camp meetings need not be over! The Holy Spirit is seeking to prepare the Bride of Christ. History supports the fact that the Holy Spirit often accomplished great things in strengthening the church during camp meetings. But we must face reality and keep pace with the needs of people today.

YOUTH-AT-CAMP - Here is an area that must be considered realistically by each of us. Young people add sparkle and dash whenever they are around. Some problems? Yes! But interesting ones and, as Eugenia Price puts it, "Never a dull moment."

The Youth must be wanted and must be made welcome. Young people do not really rely or go very much on the flowery words of older people. They build a lot more on attitudes shown toward them. Attitudes get through to them rather quickly. They soon feel and know if they are really wanted as a part of the Camp. It is foolish to think that young people do not want spiritual things. I believe their hearts yearn for spiritual satisfaction in the confused world in which they live.

Now, we all agree that we need the Youth on the camp grounds. But we must do more than just have them here. We must prepare and provide for them. Our Youth program makes it financially easy for them to be here but the facilities we provide are not sufficient and adequate. Four boys crowded in one bed is not a wholesome situation, but that is the best we can do when they come and want to stay. We must provide more and better housing for the Youth.

Controlled recreation, at proper times, in keeping with the spirit of the Camp, would both add to the enjoyment of the Youth and also make it easier for the Camp to maintain order. The recently purchased farm provides ample space for these needs.

SAFETY PROGRAM

Last year this Conference asked the Council to initiate a program of safety, especially fire prevention for the Camp. Recommendations by the Council are forthcoming through the Resolutions Committee.

The Leaf Problem - Each year we spend many hours in raking leaves. I'm sure no one will advocate cutting down all the trees. The Council has given the go signal to raise the money to purchase a 12 h.p. tractor with 42 in. rotary blade and vacuum cleaner if the money is raised. This equipment sells for better than

\$1400.00. However, Mr. Carlton Melvin has offered it to the Camp for \$1016.10. Already over \$450.00 has been pledged. With this the grounds could also be moved in the summer.

The faithful giving of God's people across the years has made this Camp what is has grown to be. However, we are faced with rising costs and the need for increased giving demands our attention. Steps must be taken to create a greater interest in the financial needs of the Camp. I am making the following recommendations:

- 1. That we initiate "CAMP SHARE PLAN", to raise a goal of \$5,000. each year. Individual pledges to be paid by June the first of each year. If 250 people would take a \$20.00 share this goal would be reached.
- 2. That the first Sunday of May be designated as "CAMP SUNDAY". Special emphasis shall be placed on prayer for the Camp and each church shall take an offering for the Camp. If possible, the Council shall select a project toward which this money shall be raised. This offering shall be sent to the District Treasurer by the end of May.

Join me in prayer that God will touch our hearts and that sufficient money will come in to meet the needs of the Camp this year and every year.

MY PERSONAL REPORT

I HAVE PERSONALLY worked 248 hours on the Camp Ground this year. This does not include the many minutes involved in looking after the Camp in the absence of a caretaker or the many hours my wife and boys worked. I traveled 409 miles on business for the Camp.

IN CONCLUSION, I want to thank every minister and layman that helped this year with the work of the Camp. This is no small operation. We continue to need the help of one and all.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

To the 63rd Annual Conference of the Eastern District, Greetings:

Sunday School work is so much like planting a crop. You prepare the soil, sow the seed, cultivate and then wait for the harvest. Sometimes after this is done so many things interfere with your effort contrary to what you had expected until the harvest is cut short or even sometimes, no harvest at all is reaped.

For a number of years, we in the Eastern District Sunday Schools have done what we could and yet in spite of it, at the end of the year, had to face the depressing fact of a loss in attendance.

However, the tide has turned. This year we have made substantial progress not only attendance-wise but also in other areas.

Last year eleven schools showed gains, but this year we have doubled that number and twenty-two schools show gains over last year's attendance. The total attendance was 3038 compared with 2947 last year, showing a gain of 91 or 3% for the year.

The Laurel School receives the Decade of Progress Award. The Greensboro School receives the Honor Certificate for the school having the highest numerical attendance. The Certificate of award for the school having the highest percentage gain goes to Greenwood School.

The following schools showed gains for the year:

NUMERICAL: Greensboro—18, Baltimore II—17, Roxana—16, Greenwood—15, Bozman—14, Salisbury—13, Milford—12, Easton—10, Tilghman—10, New Liberty—8, Goldsboro—7, Harrington—7, Groton—6, Gumboro—6, Saxis—6, Centreville—5, Broomes Island—2, Cambridge—2, Exmore—2, Seaford—2, Bethlehem—1, Bishops Head—1, Cedar Grove—1, Oxford—1.

PERCENTAGE: Greenwood—68%, Groton—60%, Bozman—54%, Roxana—53%, Baltimore II—20%, Saxis—20%, Greensboro—19%, Milford—19%, Tilghman—19%, Centreville—18%, New Liberty—13%, Easton—12%, Gumboro—10%, Salisbury—9%, Goldsboro—8%, Bishops Head—5%, Broomes Island—5%, Seaford—5%, Oxford—4%, Exmore—3%, Harrington—3%, Bethlehem—1%, Cambridge—1%, Cedar Grove—1%.

A District Sunday School and Youth Workshop was held at Salisbury Church with Rev. O. D. Emery, General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, and Rev. Wayne Preuz as his assistant which was well attended and proved helpful to those who attended.

The Rally Day attendance was much less this year than last year. All churches were encouraged to give in the Rally Day offering.

It was my privilege to accompany Rev. Paul D. Dieter and Rev. Reed Morris to the National Association Sunday School Convention held in Boston last fall. This was a most challenging and informative Convention filled with ideas and programs for every phase of the Sunday School work.

I presided at four District Sunday School Board Meetings, have mailed out the report cards to the churches and compiled the monthly reports for the Eastern Pilgrim. I also mailed several promotional letters to the pastors and Sunday School Superintendents in an effort to promote the Sunday School work within our District.

Some of our churches have enlarged or improved their Sunday School facilities to provide room for growth and so that their schools can be graded and classed according to age for more efficient teaching. Other churches are working on long-range planning to provide room for the future growth of our schools by re-locating

their buildings where parking can be provided. Long-range planning demands patience, wisdom and tact but will pay off in the end.

Many churches conducted D. V. B. S. which also can prove a great asset to the growth of Sunday Schools.

It has been a real joy to labor with our District Superintendent, Rev. Paul D. Dieter, the District Sunday School Board, Pastors, Sunday School Superintendents, Teachers and local reporters. Their faithful cooperation and the prayers of all the saints for us, has made our work a pleasure.

DISTRICT MISSIONARY PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To Our General Supt., Dr. Paul F. Elliott, Our District Supt., Rev. Paul Dieter, Co-workers and friends of the 63rd annual conference of the Eastern District. Greetings, with rapidity the weeks and months have passed, but since we last met some have walked through thorny paths, and sore tribulation, they have borne real crosses, yet have been able to drink of that deep well of joy that comes from the river the streams whereof make glad that City of God.

We are grateful for the accomplishments of God's grace on mission fields. May we not through thanklessness allow God's gracious favors to pass unnoticed, and may God bless His servants who are extending the knowledge of the cross of Christ in the dark places of the earth.

The theme chosen for the past year, and which we trust has helped motivate us, is found in John's Gospel Chapter 9, Verse 4. (I will give you the amplied version) "We must work the works of Him who sent me and be **busy** with His **business** while it is daylight; night is coming on when no man can work." I am sure we are more aware of this than we were a year ago. The world scene is dark-

ening, and time is running out, may our constant prayer be "make me to be more diligent in Kingdom building, fervent in Spirit, doing our work not for wages sake but to please Him." May God qualify us daily for greater service for deeper and more loving obedience to His will. May we be covetous only of the riches of His grace and the riches of His glory in this great cause for which we have promised our lives.

This office was made vacant through the transferring of the Culvers to the Penn Jersey District and we were well along in the Conference Year before I began my duties.

The department of missions has suffered a loss in the home going of the wife of our Secretary of World Missions. A floral tribute was sent to the family from the Eastern District. Also monies for a memorial to another of our faithful missionaries, Bertha Joy, who was called home, and her body rests in the country of her adopted people to await the Resurrection. \$30.25 was contributed to her memorial.

Many of our societies are having monthly work meetings, and are supplying the various fields with much needed materials, such as used literature, used clothing, awards, gifts, etc. We have endeavored to support the projects presented in our news sheet by our director of missionary societies.

All monies pledged for the World Encyclopedia that was sent to the Philippines have come in. Words of appreciation have been received. In addition to the new set of World Encyclopedias, 2 used sets have been purchased and sent to the field. These sets to go to the new school being organized among the Igorots. The Bethlehem Society has been responsible for these books.

We have had very active zone leaders in each of our zones, with the exception of zone 5 where we had a vacancy. However, we had a zone rally in this zone held in the Laurel Church which was a missionary cantata, "The Greatest Story Yet Untold" and presented by members of zone 3, planned by the zone leader, Mrs. Staehli. Eleven rallies were held, 5 fall and 6 spring rallies, with an average attendance of 72 and an average offering of \$24.85.

Most of these rallies were promotional in nature demonstrating the work of the societies. Zone 2, fally rally featured a missionary teacher, Mary Ella Taylor, an Oriental missionary representative of India. The spring rally of zone 3 presented the cantata, "The Greatest Story Yet Untold." It was presented to a full house and well received.

I attended seven of these rallies and was pleased with the interest shown by zone leaders and the members of the local societies. A new society was organized at the New Liberty Church. Mrs. Daisy Donovan is the newly elected president. They are conducting monthly work meetings. The Rumbley Church was also interested in organizing their group. We met with them in May and found them enthusiastic about missions.

The camp project this year was the renovation of the Song Evangelists cottage. This is decided on by the camp committee. We presented the project at the spring rallies. Most of the churches responded. \$264.00 has been given.

The redecorating of the dining room tables was contributed by zone three. This project amounted to \$80.00.

We appreciate the work done by our zone leaders and the cooperation of our local societies and friends of missions. Can we do a little more to help lighten the load of those who have gone forth? Mr. Webster when asked what was the greatest thought that ever entered his mind said. "The greatest thought that ever entered my mind was my personal responsibility to God."

The unfinished task of Evangelism is world wide. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world." It is our responsibility to get the gospel to the **Whole** World. Progress

of missions demands self sacrifice and "The light that shines farthest shines brightest at home."

It has been a privilege and pleasure to labor with you in the interest of missions. Shall we all do our best to advance His cause. Will you become involved in this great unfinished task of taking the Living Christ to a dying world? God grant that we may go faster and farther, and may this year be the greatest in our own personal worship, fellowship and service for the Master.

DISTRICT REGULATIONS

- No. 1 An amount equal to 18% of all the regular church and Sunday School offerings shall be remitted by each local church, monthly, to the District Treasurer, (excluded from this is to be all building fund offerings and one 18% Budget offering per month) to be apportioned as follows:
 - 51% District Budget
 - 36%—United Stewardship Fund
 - 13%-Eastern Pilgrim College
 - The 51% District Budget shall be apportioned as follows:
 - 90 % District Account
 - 4 % Home Missionary Account
 - 6 % -General Conference Account
- No. 2 The Conference shall accept the Pension plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 10 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.
- No. 3 The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$100.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of camp meeting fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, full payment of Pilgrim Pension Fund, Ministerial Benefit, Social Security, Hospitalization, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct not more than 2 revivals or conventions of not more than 4 Sundays each year, with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statician.
- No. 4 Each church shall pay the District Superintendent, or his appointed representative 25c per member for two visits to the church each year.
- No. 5 The District Secretary, Treasurer and Statistician shall receive \$125.00, \$300.00 and \$75.00, respectively plus postage per year.
- No. 6 The District Conference recommends that each church pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife, all incapacitated ordained ministers on the membership roll of any given church, and that the District shall pay the assessment fees of the District Superintendent and his wife, as these fees relate to the Ministerial Benefit Association.
- No. 7 In view of the need, the District Conference recommends that each church provide hospital insurance for the pastor and his family.
- No. 8 The objectives, plans and goals of all District Departments (Sunday School, Youth, Home Missionary, District Missionary Director) shall be in the hands of all District Missions within 30 days following conference and

- furthermore that the committees and boards shall have opportunity to promote their program at the District Fall Ministerial Convention.
- No. 9 The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in a resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.
- No. 10 Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- .No. 11 Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 12 The rate of mileage paid by the District for travel in district interests shall be .07c per mile.
- No. 13 The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A.M. the third Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.
- No. 14 The Home Mission Board shall consist of Assistant District Superintendent, as Chairman, and 3 members elected as follows: One for a period of 3 years, One for a period of 2 years, One for a period of 1 year, and that one member be elected each year hereafter.
- No. 15 The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 16 The District Council shall be the District Trustees and the executive members of the Council are the negotiating signers of all District transactions.
- No. 17 The Manuscript of the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 18 The Price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 19 The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete, subject to the approval of the District Council.
- No. 20 Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.
- No. 21 Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 22 No annual church business meeting shall be held on Sunday.
- No. 23 Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
- No. 24 Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, other than camp and church related business.
- No. 25 The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 26 Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.

- No. 27 The churches shall grant the pastor the option of conducting tworevivals a year.
- No. 28 The Annual Youth Camp shall be held prior to the regular camp with the specific date and time to be determined by youth council and District Council.
- No. 29 A stenographer shall be employed by District Council to help the District Secretary in preparing the minutes for the printer.
- No. 30 Each church financially able is urged to build a cottage on the campground for their pastor to be used and known as their "Camp Parsonage."
- No. 31 The District Superintendent shall be a standing member of the educational and examining boards.
- No. 32 A District Educational Committee shall be formed to consist of District Superintendent as Chairman, District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, District Youth Director, Director of PELT and Director of CYC. The purpose of the Committee shall be to coordinate and promote the work of these Departments on the District level.
- No. 33 The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$75.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the Conference for his services.
- No. 34 The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:

a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.

- Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
- c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
 d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly. shall give \$10.00 yearly.
- 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
- e. Those with an average of 30-49 \$5.00 yearly. f. Those with an average of shall give
- a. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.

This assessment shall be based on the past year's average attendance.

- No. 35 A special appeal shall be made to each church to pay \$2.00 per assessable member to send the delegates to the International and Merging Conferences. This is to be paid at the earliest convenience.
- No. 36 The first Sunday of May shall be designated as Camp Sunday. Special emphasis shall be placed on prayer for the camp and each church shall receive an offering for the camp. The Council shall designate the use of these funds. This offering shall be sent to the District Treasurer by the end of May.

CALLING OF PASTORS

- 1 A pastor call meeting shall be held separate from the annual business No. meeting between the first and second Sunday of May, inclusive.
- No. 2 A form of procedure for first calling of pastor shall be as follows:
 - (a) The results of the pastor call meeting shall immediately be forwarded to the District Superintendent by the church secretary.
 - (b) The pastor shall have 15 days to accept or reject the call and he shall inform the District Superintendent of his decision.
 - (c) Whenever the church is in need of a pastor, the District Superintendent shall present, either in person, writing or through an authorized representative the list of available ministers with recommendations that fall naturally within his jurisdiction.

- (d) A church board and church may immediately call a man on the basis of recommendation without having a trial message.
- (e) When the board and church desire a trial message the board shall make a choice of a candidate. Candidates should be designated as first, second or third choice. A vote shall be taken on the candidate within a reasonable time, preferably immediately.
- (f) If the first candidate is not called or refuses the call the same procedure shall be followed for the other candidates.
- (g) A second candidate shall not be called to preach a trial message until a vote has been taken on the first.
- No. 3 All retiring ministers shall close their ministry to a church the Sunday following camp and all moving take place the following week.

CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 1 Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 2 Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 3 All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.
- No. 4 All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 5 A Bible college service shall be held the 2nd Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 6 No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 7 A day and hour shall be set for a healing service at Denton Camp annually.
- No. 8 A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meeting for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 9 No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been removed.
- No. 10 All active District Ministers and Evangelists shall give 2 eight hour days of work on the camp grounds each year and in the event any minister is unable to participate in this work program, he be assessed at the rate of \$10.00 per day.
- No. 11 Ladies and young girls taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly and as becometh holiness.
- No. 12 No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee.
- No. 13 One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.

- No. 14 The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 15 All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages of 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 16 The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrims or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the Council is unable to grant a transfer or lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the Council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 17 Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 18 Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 19 The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.
- No. 20 The early morning prayer meeting, prior to breakfast, shall be reinstated, and also some fasting and prayer meetings shall be called during the Camp.
- No. 21 No part of the present land holdings of Denton Camp, (including the newly purchased farm) shall be sold without the prior approval of the District Conference, AND that the District Council be authorized to spend what funds are necessary to survey the property and implement the necessary planning to be presented to the conference next year.
- No. 22 The District Council shall initiate a program of safety, especially fire prevention—for the Denton Camp.
- No. 23 All cottages shall have the leaves and other debris removed from under them and they be enclosed with ¼ or ½ inch galvanized ratwire by Oct. 1, 1967.
- No. 24 All kerosene lamps or candles shall be discarded from use in favor of battery operated flashlights and that the old type kitchen matches be discarded in favor of book matches.
- No. 25 All cottage holders are to install an approved, outside, water cutoff valve between the cottage and the main water line.

CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 1 The Conference year shall close on May 31st and all reports shall be post-marked no later than July 1st, and mailed to the District Superintendent and the District Statistician.
- No. 2 Sittings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon Session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30; Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 3 As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 4 The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 P.M. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 5 The conference bar shall include the first ten rows in the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform.
- No. 6 The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 7 The District Secretary shall send, immediately following the District Conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the District Superintendent and to each local Church Treasurer.
- No. 8 The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P.M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified no later than 30 days prior to the conference.
- No. 9 A registration fee of \$2.00 shall be paid by each member of the District Conference to the registrar upon arrival at the District Conference. This fee shall be paid by each local church, for the pastor and each lay delegate. This fee shall be applied toward meals, electric, lodging and journal expense. It is understood that payment of this fee makes the member of the conference eligible to receive a copy of the journal without further cost.




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

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Eleventh Annual Youth Conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, held on the Denton Camp ground. To the Rev. Paul D. Dieter, District Superintendent and chairman of the conference, District Officers and Delegates; greetings in the wonderful name of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

In the words of the hymn writer, "Through many dangers, toils and snares we have already come. His grace hath brought us safe thus far and grace will lead us home." His grace is and has been sufficient for every problem and we trust Him for the future.

The association with the youth and youth work of the district has been most enjoyable and uplifting. However, there are some areas for improvement, both district wise and locally. The opportunity to work together with the pastors, youth presidents, zone leaders and officers of the district is deeply appreciated and our hopes and plans are for greater participation among the constituency in the future; that the work of the Lord may progress and substantial foundations laid.

I participated in four organizational zone rallies working with each zone leader to effect an organization with the zones that would stabilize and encourage them to do their best in the coming year. I received mileage at the rate of .07 cents per mile for each of these rallies. However, there have been many miles unreported that I traveled in the interest of the District Youth Work.

The annual Youth Leaders Institute was held in the Salisbury Church. Workshops were provided and the church was filled. At this institute an embryo pamphlet was presented to all the churches and has been implemented and compiled into booklet form in which there are many successful local youth services outlined. This has been a district project and the rewards will hopefully be in better planned and better presented youth services that will attract other youth to our societies.

l attended the National Sunday School and Youth Conference at Boston, Massachusetts with our District Superintendent and Sunday School Promotional Secretary. The District Youth Treasurer reimbursed me \$50.00 for this convention.

I also attended the Area Leaders Meeting, held in Richmond, Va. The theme was "THE TIME IS NOW." Here we were presented with the District Program for renewal. There were panel discussions of the time is now to Unite in Study of the Word, Unite in Proyer, Unite in Witnessing; the time is now to Develop a District Program of deeper loyalty through better communication, better cooperation and better motivation. The discussions were most interesting. The highlight was the time is now for Effective Outreach by penetrating new communities, Establishing branch Sunday Schools, Training Christian Workers and conserving the harvest. May we take this as our motto this year, "THE TIME IS NOW."

Over 325 attended the District Youth Rally, held in Greenwood High School Auditorium with the "Virginia Travelers" quartette giving a gospel concert. The attendance banner was presented to the church at Laurel and accepted on behalf of the church by the youth president.

Our grateful appreciation is extended to all who helped make this rally a success. Your labors of Love are most gratefully acknowledged.

The Senior Banquet, a first as a district endeavor, was well attended with seniors from 13 churches present. There were 44 in attendance at the banquet. The E. P. C. students; A. B. Shirmer, Phillip Wallace and John Bauer provided the music and singing and the Rev. Phillippe was guest speaker. The "Senior of the Year" award was presented to Heinz Rettzlaff and a delightful evening was enjoyed by all.

Youth camp for 1967 was held at Denton Camp, July 10-14 inclusive. There were 54 paid campers, 2 counselors for the girls and 3 counselors for the boys. The teachers were: Mrs. Jane Dieter, Rev. Wayne Musgrove, Rev. Wm. Schaffner, Rev D. J. Wooten. Campcraft, a new service, was provided for all campers and

especially for those in the C. Y. C. program in their individual churches was conducted by Mr. Roland Melvin, Jr., District C. Y. C. Director. These classes were appreciated and enthusiastically supported by the young people. A highlight of this camp was the banquet which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Rev. Huffman brought soul searching messages that are bearing much fruit among our youth. The last service more than twenty young people testified, by presenting themselves before the altar, that they were definitely called into the Lord's service. The whole youth body came forward and testified, by so doing, that when God called they would respond willingly and promptly.

The zones reported an increase in giving, attendance and interest. The Coastal Zone reports an average attendance of 190 with more than \$200.00 in the treasury. The Southern Zone reports an average attendance of 81. STANDING RULES OF THE YOUTH CONFERENCE

- 1. A District Youth Camp shall be conducted annually on a date set by the Youth Committee and the District Council. The Camp shall be held at a time to include 5 evenings and $4\frac{1}{2}$ days.
- The District Youth Conference shall be held the latter part of June, at a place specified by the Youth Council with the approval of the District Council. And the District Youth Officers shall continue to carry through their duties incidental to the following youth camp.
- 3. There shall be an annual institute of local youth leaders held during the last week of September for the purpose of defining goals, training leadership and promoting a stronger youth organization in our District, under the direction of the Executive Youth Council.
- 4. The various committees that are necessary for Youth Conference, such as Resolutions, Ways and Means and other committees deemed advisable, shall be set up on a staggered basis (i.e. two members selected for a one year term) by the Executive Youth Council with the chairman of said committee appointed by the District Youth President.
- 5. Each zone shall contribute 10% of the Zone Rally offerings to the District Youth Treasurer; said amount to be sent quarterly.

- The District Youth President shall be paid the sum of \$100.00 per year, plus postage and travel expenses at the rate of 7c per mile in the interest of District Youth.
- 7. The District Youth Council shall be reimbursed at the rate of 7c per mile to attend the District Youth Council meetings.
- The District Youth President is urged to attend the Annual National Sunday School Association Convention each year. That he be reimbursed to cover actual expense, not to exceed \$75.00.
- 9. The District Youth President shall hold office until his successor is elected.
- 10. There shall be monthly youth rallies held during the conference year and these shall be he'd September through May, and there shall be two (2) District rallies. The District rally dates, time, place and program are to be arranged by the District Youth Council.
- 11. The Zone leader shall make a planned visit to each church in his zone for the purpose of promoting the youth work, and organizing a Pilgrim Youth Society. An offering shall be taken at each church to finance this program.
- 12. The Youth Council and the District Executive Council shall study the possibility of developing a portion of the newly purchased camp property for a Youth Camp.
- 13. The following system of assessment will be used throughout all churches in the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church with said funds being forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer quarterly. (Sept. 1 — Dec. 1 — March 1 and May 31)
