A LETTER TO: REV. B. A. AWE FROM THE EASTERN OHIO DISTRICT

Rev. Awe:

Congratulations upon your election. It will be reassuring to know that you will be around to guide me for the next two years. Since your first election in 1949 you have served me faithfully and I appreciate it so much.

The road to Christian leadership is long and hard. Sacrifice and labors have been yours for many years. You have climbed the ladder of success patiently and carefully. Perhaps many of the rungs seemed shaky and uncertain, but you held on with a firm grip until another step could be taken.

I, as a District, so often forget the days of labor, the long dreary miles and the many restless nights that have paved the way for your successful reign.

Will you allow me to examine your record and perhaps from it, I will grow in appreciation of your service to me.

1930-33

The bottom rung of the ladder was yours at this period. Your progress seemed slow. For four years you remained in first year license, but you were working hard. The Liberty Center Church where you first started your career paid you an average of \$323.00 per year, for the six years you served there. This was not enough to pay all the bills so — you a future District Superintendent had to labor among men for support.

At this time I supposed you to be just another average small time preacher, but the records show how wrong I was.

1935

This was a great year for you. Another rung in your ladder of success was reached when you were ordained a minister of the Gospel of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. I arranged for Rev. L. W. Sturk, one of my great Ministers, to deliver your ordination message.

1936

A milestone was attained as you accepted the pastorate of the Nelsonville Church. At Nelsonville your latent talents came alive. For ten years you preached and lived holiness among the Hocking Hills. Your influence there has been expressed by an old warrior of the cross, of another Holiness Church. Rev. Coe has stated that the greatest witness of Second Blessing Holiness in "the valley" was Ben Awe. This is a familiar way to use your name and it us just as the people knew you.

To say the least, I as a District grew proud of you as your Sunday School here grew from an average of 99 to well over 300. The Men's Class became your passion and it grew under your tender care. This class still remains as an outstanding class of men, broadcasting from the class room every Sunday.

Rev. Awe — You are on your way to the top.

1937-38

Recognizing Superintendent ability, I began to send your way various District chores. This, you needed to understand the problems of a growing District. Your first chore was a member of the Ways and Means Committee. Membership on the Resolution, Memorial and Reception Committee followed. My confidence in you at this time had grown very high so I elected you as a delegate to the General Conference.

In 1938 your record was outstanding. You made 1,085 calls and your Sunday School responded with a gain for the year of 114.

1939

You reached for another rung this year and made it. A seat on the District Council was yours by election. Faithfully yo have maintained this place for seventeen years, serving in four different positions.

A good minister and District Secretary, Rev. D. C. Shearer was called home to Heaven, and you, Brother Awe, were appointed to this position.

Also, this year I appointed you as the first Zone Chairman of the Nelsonville Zone.

1940-45

The minor tasks that came your way were diligently performed. In this period, Editor of the District Minutes became another rung in your ladder. For seven years you labored to see that the District Record was printed.

1946-48

You took another step up and came close to the top as I elected you Assistant Superintendent. Your training for the big job was about over. The Columbus First Church saw your value and you became their pastor.

1949

Your golden hour had arrived. I had outgrown my limits and needed two Superintendents. The Conference voted and you were elected to office as the First Superintendent of the Eastern Ohio Pilgrims. Your years of labor and trials had prepared you for this office.

1950

Still you are called to serve higher, the General Conference elected you to the General Board, a position you have held since that time.

1951-56

The re-election each year reveals that I, as a District, stand firmly in your favor. It tells to the whole church that yours is a good, solid, spiritual progressive program. This letter cannot express all you have accomplished. Space will not allow to reveal all the gains, but as a District your labors DO NOT go un-noticed, and we appreciate your leadership.

I, am made up of many ministers, laymen from various churches. BEING HUMAN, FART OF ME MAY DIFFER WITH YOU AT TIMES: BUT BEING CHRISTIAN I SPEAK FOR ALL — Lead on Superintendent AWE and I will follow.

Superintendent's Report

To our Presiding Officer, the pastors, evangelists, ordained deaconesses, lay delegates and friends of the 2nd annual conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Eastern Ohio District.

Greetings in the precious name of Jesus. Another milestone is passed, another year is gone and in the good providence of God we are now assembled to submit reports for the year now past and chart our course for the year that lies ahead.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude to God and the personnel of our District that I give you this report covering my activities as District Superintendent, as well as the progress on the District. I have never enjoyed sweeter fellowship with God and my fellow ministers nor received better cooperation from the churches than we have enjoyed this year. My soul rejoices in the Lord.

THE SPIRITUAL STATUS OF THE DISTRICT. Many of our churches have enjoyed spiritual awakenings. The reports of revivals over the District indicate many souls were won to God. This should show up in an increase of membership. In these days of spiritual decline and decay, of increasing worldliness and social corruption, God has given us a people who want a spiritual program. God help us ministers to keep on fire and provide such a challenge. The splendid annual recalls which our pastors received this year reflect a wonderful church and pastor relationship. More ministers received a unanimous recall this year than any year in the past.

This Conference will be new to all of us. First, because it is the first annual conference when we are completely separated from our former associative District, namely the Western Ohio District, however, our fellowship is not broken with this great District.

Second, it is new to us because it is being held before camp. A venture, I am sure, but we are trusting God all things will work together for good to them that love God, to them who are called according to His purpose. Everything was done that was humanly possible to get everything arranged to help make this new set up successful.

We come to the close of this Conference year feeling we have done our best and the churches have made advancements in every department. Our faithful pastors have done their best as they have served their churches and their community to the best of their ability and God has honored their labors of love.

"The Church's one foundation Is Jesus Christ her Lord: She is His new creation By water and the word; From heaven He came and sought her To be His holy bride; With His own blood he bought her, And for her life He died. "Mid toil and tribulation. And tumult of her war, She waits the consummation Of peace for evermore, Till with the vision glorious Her longing eyes are blest, And the great Church victorious Shall be the Church at rest."

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

First, a word about our Sunday Schools. Our Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Norval Rickner and his good wife have done splendid work compiling the Sunday School reports and presenting it to us in a fine bulletin form with Sunday School news items. Their work is very enlightening and commendable and greatly appreciated.

In the month of February, Rev. K. W. Phipps traveled with the Sunday School committee and we visited each Zone in the interest of the Sunday School and these services were well attended and very successful. The Sunday School of our District show a net gain of 1,165 scholars in attendance over the same 6 months period of last year from July to January. An all time high was reached in February, a net gain of 685 over a year ago. A full detailed report will be given by our promotional secretary.

NEW ORGANIZED CHURCHES

Sand Ridge church, a little country church near Millfield, Ohio, became a Pilgrim Church on Nov. 15, 1955. This church was brought to us under the leadership of Rev. H. J. Mings who had faithfully labored for this people and presented them to us. These are a splendid group of holiness people and may God continue to bless this new organization.

NEWARK. On February 26, 1955 we organized the Newark Church with eight members and six members have been added since, bringing it up to a total of fourteen. This church had been organized several years ago, but was lost and dissolved. However, under the capable leadership of Rev. Ralph King and his good wife, they have brought in a new work there with the exception of one member that was a part of the first organization. This work has grown till they have a splendid Sunday School. They worship in a new church building and already plans are being made to enlarge the same.

We have three new unorganzied churches which all look very encouraging and before too long we believe they will be organized.

ELYRIA. Our new unorganized work in Elyria (near Cleveland) is doing very commendable. They just closed a good revival with H. L. Ferguson as the evangelist. There is a fine group of Pilgrims there. Their new pastor is Rev. R. W. Clark of Lisbon, Ohio. The prospects are good.

FREMONT. Our new unorganized work in rFemont under the leadership of Rev. Dallas Ford is making progress. They have purchased a lot and plan to build a new church building in which to worship. God bless the prospective Pilgrims there. This work is a real faith venture.

COSHOCTON. Our new unorganized work in Coshocton has a splendid Sunday School and good church services. They worship in a hall, however plans are some day to build a church. Paul E. Neville is the pastor.

A year ago the church in McArthur still had no place to worship and the picture looked rather dark. However, we could not give it up and the Lord laid it on Rev. L. F. Knight's heart to go to McArthur. He bought a home there and converted the basement into a church and has been very successful there. Brother Knight is a living monument of courage and is making good.

Our new church in Canton that was organized a little over a year ago underwent some sifting and testing. However, a few faithful saints remained and held on and now they are becoming established and the city of Canton will soon know there is a Pilgrim Holiness Church there to stay. Rev. Kenneth Forner, one of their local men has become the pastor, and God is blessing and using this man. Continue to pray for the work there.

DEDICATION SERVICES

On Sept. 25, 1955 we had part in the Dedication Service at the Toledo First Church. This is a very beautiful attractive church building and is a great asset to our District. The fine Pilgrims there are progressing under the ministry of Rev. Melvin Stiverson.

On February 2, 1956 we dedicated a new church building in South Webster, where Frankie Williams is pastor. This is just a new organization and they had worshiped in an old filling station, but the old building was dismantled and a splendid new church building fully equipped now stands there to grace the community.

On January 29, 1956 the Barberton church enjoyed a mortgage burning on the old former building they had worshiped in before they got their new basement church. The former building has been dismantled and the lot on which it stood has been converted into a parking lot for the new church.

BALTIMORE. The Pilgrims at Baltimore have built a new church to take the place of the old tabernacle. When this church building is fully completed it will be a great blessing to our District and to the community in which it stands. Rev. Harold Todd is the pastor.

GALION. The fine Pilgrims at Galion are at last reaching the desire of their hearts and a long looked for new church building where Rev. John Goon has labored faithfully as pastor of the church. Rev. J. R. Walter is managing the building program and laboring faithfully and bringing the building to a completion as fast as free labor permits. This new church will be a great blessing to our Pilgrims and to the city of Galion. This church is really coming into existence by sacrifice and prayer.

BARBERTON. The Barberton Church under the ministry of Rev. Roy Ankrim are planning to build the new auditorium on their basement church. They have obtained a loan for the same and the contract let out. When this church is completed it will be among the finest of our District.

OAK HILL. The church at Oak Hill where Rev. J. R. Siders is the pastor have completed their new basement equipped with Sunday School room and plans are being made to build the auditorium this conference year. This will be a lovely church and a great blessing to the community and our District.

FAIR PLAY. The Fair Play school house was opened up again by Rev. R. D. Brown's son. A good revival has been reported. This church is located between Vinton and Danville. A good revival broke out there some 15 years ago under the ministry of Rev. N. L. Russell and now the revival was repeated. At present there are preaching services on Saturday night and a fine Sunday School on Sunday afternoon.

At this point we feel led to give you a summary in part of what has been accomplished during the period of our superintendency. We entered this work in '49 with fear and trembling, however, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, 14 new churches have come into existence and are going churches. All of these are in cities (with the exception of two) where there has never been a Pilgrim Holiness Church. Nine of these new organizations have new church buildings of their own and five are in rented halls. Plus these 14 new churches there are four new unorganized works and one fo those are in the process of building. I will give you the names of these cities or towns wherein these churches are located in alphabetical order: Angel Ridge, Cambridge, Cleveland, Canton, Columbus Oakwood, Galion, Ironton, Lancaster So. Broad, Morgan Center, Newark, So. Webster, Sand Ridge, Toledo East and McArthur. The four new unorganized churches are located in Coshocton, Elyria, Fremont and Fairplay.

It would be fitting and proper now to say something of the "Forward Movement" that was born at a time of a special out-pouring of the Holy Spirit on the church leaders conference in January. We trust our Conference will adopt the "Forward Movement" as it will be presented in detail by our Resolution Committee.

IMPROVEMENTS

The Nelsonville Church where E. E. Leadingham is the pastor built three Sunday School rooms, installed kitchen cabinets in the parsonage.

The Fostoria Church where Charles Brewbaker was the pastor installed a new Forced Air Furnace in the church and parsonage.

The Ashley Church where John Hersman is pastor has been redecorated and plans are being made to build Sunday School rooms.

The Bremen Church where J. D. Webb is pastor has been redecorated and other decorations and improvements.

The Cambridge Church where Paul Harris is pastor have done outside repair work.

The Chillicothe Church where Dale Jones is pastor have put in new hardwood floors, very beautiful new pews, new carpet on platform and aisles and rearrangement of the platform and altar rail. This is indeed a great asset to the church and to be much appreciated.

The Circleville Church where Alozo Hill is pastor has been redecorated.

The Columbus First Church where A. L. Davis is pastor have installed an air conditioning plant.

The Danville Church where Wm. Gilkerson is pastor have installed new seats and carpet and a piano. This has beautified the Danville Church as well as a blessing.

Lancaster So. Broad St. Church where Clyde Goss is pastor have repainted their church a beautiful white.

The Crown City Church where Fred Shockley is pastor have completed two new Sunday School rooms and redecorated the church.

The McLuney Church where John Colwell is pastor has redecorated the interior of their church.

The Murray City Church where Clifford Jolly is pastor have redecorated the interior of their church.

The Wellston Church where Harry Branscomb is pastor have redecorated their church, put in a new floor furnace, also sanded and varnished the floors.

The Vinton Church where Charles King is pastor have redecorated the interior of their church.

The Perrysburg Church where John Keith is pastor have purchased a new parsonage which is a great asset to this church.

The Portsmouth Second Church where Otto Smith is pastor have put in new beautiful church pews and a new piano to match. Very nice indeed.

The Salt Creek Church where Earl Appleman is pastor has been repainted and the church is moving along nicely.

Journal of Proceedings

FIRST SITTING, MONDAY AFTERNOON, July 15, 1956

The Second Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened July 16, 1956 at 1:00 P. M. Rev. B. A. Awe brought the conference to order and Rev. A. L. Davis led in singing "Down At the Cross" and "Faith of Our Fathers."

Rev. B. A. Awe then welcomed Rev. R. A. Beltz, our General Secretary and Treasurer, Preachers and delegates and friends, to the conference. We were admonished to look to the Lord and ask divine guidance in everything that is said and done.

Rev. Kenneth Vance led in prayer.

The conference was then turned over to Rev. R. A. Beltz, Chairman of our conference, due to the illness of Rev. Wm. Neff, General Superintendent. Rev. R. A. Beltz, who so ably presided over the conference last year, was given a special invitation to preside this year.

The Reception Committee presented the following: Rev. and Mrs. Leadingham, Sister Hattie Craft, Rev. John Keith, Rev. and Mrs. Clark, Sister N. Higgins, Brother DeWitt.

These folk were received with a hearty Amen.

Rev. B. A. Awe then gave a very splendid and inspiring report.

Motion was made and carried that we give a standing vote of appreciation for this report from Rev. B. A. Awe, District Superintendent.

The Chairman, Rev. R. A. Beltz then ordered a short recess.

Conference met again after a short recess. We sang, "I'll Live For Him." Promises were then quoted.

The Assistant Superintendent, Rev. A. L. Davis, then gave his report. It was accepted with a hearty Amen.

The Auditing Committee gave its report which was accepted.

The District Treasurer, Rev. O. M. Awe then gave his report, which was acepted.

Rev. R. A. Beltz then told us that we were above average in our budget. The delinquent churches were urged to pay up their budgets.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Norval Rickner, then gave his splendid report.

Motion was made and seconded that we accept this good report.

Rev. R. A. Beltz, Chairman, spoke a few minutes on the benfits of the Ministerial Benefit Association.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. J. R. Siders.

SECOND SITTING—MONDAY EVENING 7:00 P. M.

Conference was opened by singing "Amazing Grace." Prayer by Rev. Earl Appleman.

A very timely message was given by Rev. R. A. Beltz. He spoke on the Church at Corinth. Scripture found in Acts 18: 1-11. He described to us a picture of the Corinth Church brought down to our present day. He said that we have more information on this church at Corinth than any other church. Many converts came out of raw heathenism. Don't spend all your time crying because of a closed door, fook for an open door. A door opened for Paul. The church of Corinth started in a home. It is our obligation to make it possible for them to hear. Many of the people at Corinth, hearing, believed. God gave Paul a message. "Do not be afraid, speak, I am with thee." The Lord told Paul "I have much people in this city." There were many hungry hearts in Corinth. God has not promised we would have smooth sailing, that everybody would be with you, that everybody will be for you and that everybody will encourage you. Some people will sit on you and hold you down, but God said he would strengthen you so that they will not hurt you.

This church had a division over the preacher, they had unsanctified people there, fleshly sins had manifested itself among those that professed the name of Christ, folk having so much trouble that they were going to law with each other, married couples were having trouble in their home life, Christian liberty had arisen, disorderly worship.

The devil will do anything to wreck a church. Paul knew what the problems of the church were. There is no point in ignoring our problems.

When we have the right spirit there is an answer to our problems. We must face up to our problems and God will help us. "If any Man lcak wisdom, let him ask of God." Paul faced up to the problems at Corinth. Even though people were in the church that ought not to be, he did not disown them or disorganize the church. Not all the people in the church were bad.

We must do everything to win the erring ones back to God. Don't just wink at trouble, but do something about it. Paul deals with these people, points out their errors, seeks to save all that can be saved. The Church should be both a hospital and kindergarten.

The code in the Medical profession is that life is precious. As long as there is life, they must do everything to preserve life.

We must do everything we can to save those that have been ensuared by sin and the devil. Those that refuse to repent and go with God, there comes a time when they must be disowned in the Church. Every effort must be made to win them back to God.

If we could have more concern for those that have gone astray, a lot of erring ones could be saved from going astray. You will not help everyone you deal with, but many of them will be saved, and that is worth while.

We were admonished to read and study deeply the Church at Corinth. There we will find many helpful suggestions that will help every one of us.

After Rev. Beltz's message, Rev. B. A. Awe, then advised us to use the method of Paul and we will be able to cope with problems of today.

The conference was then turned back to Rev. R. A. Beltz, our chairman.

Secretary's minutes were read and approved.

It was moved and seconded that we accept the following names as having been transferred to the Eastern Ohio District:

Rev. B W. Clark, Rev. John Minsker, Rev. Kenneth Forner, Rev. Earl Black, and Rev. Gale Monk.

Motion carried to accept the following names for first year District License. The following have been recommended by the Educational and Examining Board: Earl Black, Jackie Lee Blankenship, Mrs. Frances Marie Carter, Mrs. Hattie Craft, Kenneth Forner, Paul Huffer, David Lyons, Delmer Wilson, Deril B. Tigner.

The following were recommended by the Educational and Examining Board for third year license: Gale Monk and Walter Noel Whitt. Motion carried to accept same.

The Reception Committee presented the following:

Rev. & Mrs. Forner and Rev. & Mrs. Black.

Rev. B. A. Awe, our District Superintendent, then appointed tellers as follows: Ray Pidcock, Rev. A. L. Davis, Rev. E. E. Leadingham, Rev. Earl Appleman, Rev. Stanley Dean, Rev. John Keith.

Election of District Officials were held as follows:

Rev. B. A. Awe was elected District Superintendent.

Rev. B. A. Awe asked an interest in our prayers and thanked all for the vote of confidence given him.

A fictitious letter to Rev. B. A. Awe was then read by Rev. Wm. Gilkerson. Our appreciation of Rev. B. A. Awe as our District Superintendent was expressed therein.

The ballots were then cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. A. L. Davis received the highest number of votes on the first ballot. He declined to let his name run any longer because of a physical condition.

Further balloting resulted in Rev. Roy Bellomy being elected as Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. Bellomy promised to do the best he could by the help of God.

The District Council nominated the following for District Secretary:

Rev. M. D. Stiverson was elected as District Secretary.

The District Council nominated the following for District Treasurer: Rev. O. M. Awe and Rev. Wm. Brown

Rev. O. M. Awe was elected as District Treasurer.

Ballots were then cast for five (5) Advisory members to the District Council. Results to be read at our next sitting, due to expiration of time.

It was moved and carried that the fictitious letter written our District Superintendent, Rev. B. A. Awe, be put in our District Minutes along with his picture.

We adjourned with prayer by Rev. E. E. Leadingham.

THIRD SITTING-TUESDAY MORNING 8:30 A. M.

Conference was opened with a Communion Service and singing "I Will Praise Him" led by Rev. Roy Ankrim.

Rev. R. A. Beltz, our Chairman, then invited all that have had the blood applied, even if not a member of the Conference to take Communion with us. He read from Luke 22: 14 and I Cor. 11: 23.

He admonished us never to forget Calvary, it was there Christ died for our sins. "He was wounded for our transgressions, bruised for our iniquities." We were bought with a price, not by silver or gold, but by the blood of the Lamb. May God keep us near the cross. Let us meditate on Calvary. It will draw us closer to God. There are two looks at Calvary, the backward and forward looks. The above being the backward look. Our forward look being when we take Com-

munion, it is a reminder to us that the Lord said He could come back again. Communion is a time of heart searching. Look forward to that blessed hope of His glorious appearing.

The Lords' Supper was administered by the Executive Council. The presence of God was gloriously felt as we knelt at the altar and partook of the Lords' Supper. There were four tables served. Prayer by Rev. J. R. Siders, Rev. Roy Ankrim, Rev. Otho Jennings. Rev. R. A. Beltz dismissed our Communion Service in prayer.

Rev. Roy Ankrim then led us in singing "Near the Cross."

Results of the election of the Advisory Council, which was had in the Monday Evening Sitting was given. Those elected on the first ballot were as follows: Rev. J. R. Siders, Rev. Wm. Brown, Rev. Roy Ankrim.

Motion made and carried that we vote on the four receiving the highest number of votes for the two unelected council members.

Secretary's minutes read and approved.

Rev. Otho Jennings, President of Owosso Bible College was then welcomed to our conference.

Ballots were passed out and we voted for the two unelected council members. The names to be voted on were as follows: Rev. B. H. Pugh, Rev. Wm. Gilkerson, Rev. E. E. Leadingham and Rev. A. L. Davis.

Rev. B. H. Pugh was elected on this ballot, which left one number yet to be elected.

Ballots were again passed, this time a motion was made and carried that we vote on the three receiving higest votes for Council. They were as follows: Rev. Wm. Gilkerson, Rev. E. E. Leadingham and Rev. A. L. Davis.

Rev. E. E. Leadingham was elected.

The Resolution Committee reported then.

The following new resolutions were adopted: Resolution 1 adopted, 2 adopted, 3 Amended and adopted, 4 Amendment to 11 and adopted, 5 referred back to committee to be reworded, 6 adopted.

Motion made and carried that Rev. Otho Jennings, President of Owosso Bible College be given an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The Ways and Means Committee reported. No. 4 adding B to the resolution adopted, 7G adding 90 per cent to the tithe. Adopted, 7H—8B to be omitted and called 7H. Adopted, 9A delete the last sentence, Adopted.

Move we adopt the sub amendment No. A as amended, Adopted, 9B change from state to District, Adopted, 9C change from state to District, Adopted, 10 change from insured to bonded, adopted, 18 delete first sentence and delete part of sentence, starting (of the District in which the money is collected), adopted, 20 delete from minutes — adopted.

Motion made and carried that we adjourn. We were dismissed in prayer by Rev. J. D. Webb.

FOURTH SITTING—TUESDAY AFTERNOON 2:00 P. M.

Conference opened by singing "The Blood Will Never Lose Its Power." Rev. E. E. Leadingham led in prayer.

Rev. R. A. Beltz, our Chairman, spoke of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate and the new Sunday School literature and urged every church and pastor to cooperate in securing subscriptions to the Advocate and urged every Sunday School to use the literature from our Pilgrim Publishing House.

Rev. R. A. Beltz then introduced Rev. Otho Jennings, President of the Owosso Bible College, who gave us a very enlightening report on Owosso College. The net worth of Owosso this year is \$15,000.00 more than a year ago. The School would like to get 30 students at least from the Eastern Ohio District. Rev. Jennings also told us that if 3,000 or more people would give \$1.00 per month, we would see the debt lifted from Owosso Bible College before the year of Golden Jubilee,

which would be 1959-1960. We were urged to pray that God would lay it upon the hearts of the people to get the debt paid off in three years. He stated that this debt must be paid for God's glory. The slogan, "Debt Free By Golden Jubilee."

Rev. R. A. Beltz thanked Rev. Otho Jennings for his splendid report.

Motion was made and seconded that we accept this fine report from the Owosso Bible College.

Secretary's minutes read and approved.

The following nominations were made by the District Council. Motions made and carried that we ratify the following:

Educational and Examining Board—Rev. Wm. Gilkerson—3 Yrs.

District Trustee—Rev. Norval Rickner—5 Yrs.

Owosso Bible College—Rev. M. D. Stiverson—3 Yrs.

Motion made and carried that we accept the Statistician's report with the undertional and Examining Board.

Motion made and carried that we accept the Statistician's report with the understanding that the report of five churches not reporting be included.

A report was given by the Resolution Committee.

The following new resolutions were adopted: Resolution No. 5 adopted, No. 7 adopted with unanimous vote, No. 8 Sunday School Home Department—adopted, No. 9 delete figure of \$30,000.00 and leave figure to the discretion of the council. Amendment was adopted, the motion as amended was adopted, 10A adopted, No. 11 adopted, 12A adopted, 12B adopted, 12C adopted.

This completed the report of the Resolution Committee.

By common consent conference will meet at 7:30 P. M. instead of 7:00 P. M.

We were adjourned in prayer by Rev. Peterson.

FIFTH SITTING-TUESDAY EVENING 7:30 P. M.

Conference was brought to order by singing "Love Lifted Me." Rev. M. L. Peterson led in prayer. Secretary's minutes read and approved.

The Ways and Means Committee reported as follows:

Resolution 7E—lost.

The Memorial Committee reported. The conference stood in silent tribute to those that had passed away.

Motion made and carried that the recommendation of the Council to the Conference to accept the "Debt Free By Golen Jubilee" program which Rev. Otho Jennings, President of Owosso Bible College presented.

Motion made and carried that the committees be ratified that were appointed by the District Council.

Rev. R. A. Beltz then asked the District Council to be seated on the platform for the "Forward Movement" Service. Rev. Virgil Miller then led us in singing "Onward Christian Soldiers." A love offering was taken for Rev. R. A. Beltz as we were singing. Rev. Beltz expressed his thanks for the offering.

Rev. R. A. Beltz spoke on "The Church at Antioch." Scripture was found in Acts 11: 19, Acts 13: 1-3 and Acts 14: 21.

Rev. Beltz stated that someone was faithful and carried the message to Antioch, so we must be faithful and carry the message to others. God cannot do anything with you until he does something for you. Since we have received this message we have an obligation to tell it to others that they may be strengthened to go out as Christians, Ministers, etc. in the work of God.

Rev. B. A. Awe admonished us to apply this truth to our hearts and go forward with the "Forward Movement." To unite together in this great field of work for God. Let us show more interest in one another.

Rev. B. A. Awe expressed appreciation to Rev. Beltz for the capable way in which he handled the Eastern Ohio District Conference.

The Conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. R. A. Beltz, our good Chairman.

We have examined the records and books of cash receipts and disbursements of your Treasurer, Rev. O. M. Awe, Port Clinton, Ohio, for the period from August 12, 1955 to June 6, 1956 and submit herewith our report.

We supported the recorded cash disbursements by examination of cancelled bank checks and other data on file. We accounted for the outstanding checks as at July 6, 1956 by means of reconcilement of the bank balance at that date. With respect to the recorded cash receipts we made test checks of such receipts by examination of remittance advices and letters from member churches. All of the recorded cash receipts were traced directly into bank deposits. We noted that cash receipts are promptly recorded and deposited.

The accompanying schedules, comprising the Treasurer's Report were test checked by us and no exceptions were disclosed. Your attention is directed to the fact that this report does not cover the operations for the full year ended July 6, 1956, as the period from July 7, to August 11, 1955, both dates inclusive, preceded Rev. O. M. Awe's term of office as Treasurer.

As at July 6, 1956, cash on hand and on deposit amounted to \$6,069.10. This represents an increase of \$555.33 over the beginning balance of \$5,513.77 at August 12, 1955. The total recorded cash receipts for the period amounted to \$43,337.01 and the recorded cash disbursements aggregated \$42,781.68.

We examined the notes due from member churches for loans previously made and found them in proper order.

Time did not permit us to verify the balance of notes payable to Buckeye Federal Savings and Loan, recorded as \$3,517.63 by the Treasurer.

The Treasurer's books and records were neatly kept and orderly in every respect.

Report of the Resolutions Committee As Adopted By the Conference

NO. 1 BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the conference and General Interests, and said cards be forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church or District or General Budget be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budgets, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

NO. 2 CAMP GROUND

- A. Inasmuch as the Springfield Camp Ground property, etc. has been appraised by an authorized appraiser in the amount of \$78,000.00, which fact is known to both the Eastern Ohio and Western Ohio Districts; be it resolved that this Eastern Ohio District Conference authorize the District Council to negotiate with the Western Ohio District for the purpose of a settlement of the Camp Ground, property, etc.
- B. Furthermore, be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District Council be authorized to decide on a period of time to complete settlement, with any necessary terms they would deem proper, providing the suggested figure for settlement is agreed upon by our Western brethren.
- C. Be it resolved that the District Council and District Trustee be authorized to investigate and purchase a suitable camp ground for the Eastern Ohio District when funds are available.
- D. Be it further resolved that we have Camp Ground Trustees take full charge of camp.

NO. 3 CAMP SERVICES

Be it resolved that the schedule of our Camp services be so arranged as to permit one afternoon service each to be devoted to the interests of the following phases of our work, namely, Foreign Missions, General Church Extension and District Home Missions.

NO. 4 COMMTTEES

- A. Be it resolved that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee consist of five members and three shall be a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that no unauthorized person be permitted to present resolutions on the Conference floor. All resolutions must be cleared either with the Resolutions Committee or the Ways and Means Committee (depending on the nature of the resolution under consideration), who are the only authorized committees to present resolutions on the Conference floor.

NO. 5 CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that we provide services for the children during conference.
- B. Be it resolved that the 1957 Conference of the Eastern Ohio District be opened with a Communion Service for our ministers, delegates and friends. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a committee to arrange for this service.

NO. 6 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare report for conference be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close July 5th.

NO. 7 CORPORATION

Whereas we have been advised by the Executive Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church that the Articles of Incorporation of the Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church which were filed October 1, 1928 under Corporation Number 133145 do not meet the requirements of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and are inadequate since the division of the Ohio District into two districts in 1955.

Be it therefore Resolved that this conference empower the District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent and Secretary and the District Trustees to incorporate the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. They are hereby empowered to secure legal counsel, sign all necessary documents and approve the articles of Incorporation and Constitution for the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, as submitted to this Conference and approved hereby, subject to the regulations as set forth in Section 95, Page 54 of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and notice of any meeting required by law to adopt said Constitution is thereby waived by the members of this Conference.

Bt it further resolved that they take these steps immediately so that the unfinished business concerning the division of the Ohio District into the Western Ohio District and the Eastern Ohio District can be completed.

NO. 8 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Be it resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches, subject to the camp dates.

NO. 9 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister or minister's wife of the district, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and that they immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District for expense incurred.

NO. 10 FORWARD MOVEMENT

Inasmuch as the General Church has launched a "Forward Movement" for the purpose of stirring our hearts to the need of advancement on all lines in our church, and:

Inasmuch as the General Conference has asked us as a Conference to set up a Forward Movement organization in our District in harmony with the objectives of the General Board:

Be it resolved that we do the following:

- 1. Have a District Forward Movement committee which shall be appointed by the District Council as suggested by the General Board.
- That this committee work in accordance with and in harmony with the desires of the General Board in promoting the worthy objectives of the Forward Movement throughout the Eastern Ohio District.

NO. 11 LOAN PLAN

Be it resolved that we adopt the Pilgrim Pension Loan, Inc., in the Eastern Ohio District for the purpose of helping churches to build.

NO. 12 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of the local Pilgrim Holiness Church
- B. Whereas the 1950 Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study; therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study, also that Pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend their District Conference.

- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers, in so far as possible, take the correspondence course leading to ordination from Owosso, or some other school approved by the Educational Committee.
- D. Be it resolved that our unstationed licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.
- E. Be it resolved that all ministers holding first year license, who fail to attend conference and report to the Examining Board for two years in succession, unless giving a legitimate reason in writing, their names be dropped from the minutes.

NO. 13 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Eastern Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the District Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application and send application blanks.
- B. Inasmuch as Resolution No. 12A provides for the enrollment of each church's pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and, inasmuch as a number of our churches have still failed to follow through on this District legislation, be it resolved that our District Superintendent when making his first visit of the conference year to the churches, inquire whether or not the local board of the church he is visiting, has enrolled their pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association, and if not, to encourage that church to do so as soon as possible.
- C. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and his wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the District Treasurer.

NO. 14 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio Conference have an annual Ministerial Convention. The time and place is to be determined by the Council.

NO. 15 MISSIONS

In consideration of the need of District Home Missionary work, be it resolved that each pastor in the Eastern Ohio Conference be subject to a call by the Home Missionary Committee for a two weeks revival.

NO. 16 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

NO. 16 OWOSSO BIBLE COLLEGE

- A. Whereas Owosso Bible College is the Bible school for our zone and in order that we may better acquaint our people with our Bible college, and that we might give due recognition to it; Be it resolved that we request the Camp Ground Board of Trustees that the 2:30 P. M. service on the first Friday of the Camp be given over to the President of the Bible college during which time he shall present the work and the needs of the college.
- B. Inasmuch as the Board of Trustees of Owosso Bible College has adopted a reorganizational plan whereby the official control of the college is vested in a Board of Trustees equally representing the entire school zone, be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio Conference approve said reorganizational plan by electing one trustee of Owosso College for each six hundred members as specified by the revised by-laws of the college. Be it further resolved that the terms of office of said trustees be 1, 2, 3 years respectively so that only one trustee need be elected each year except when membership increase calls for the election of additional trustees.

NO. 18 PASTORS

- A. Be it resolved that the churches of the Eastern Ohio District shall give first consideration to the Ministers of our conference in extending a call for their pastor. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent shall not recommend a minister outside the bounds of our district, until after a church has failed to elect a pastor from the ministers of our District.
- B. Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, when one has the necessary two-thirds vote; Be it resolved that no church vote on two or more names are voted on at the same time, the vote is divided so that no more than one pastor at a time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living; Be it resolved that the district superintendents take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the superinendents meet with the local church boards.
- D. In order that the churches may receive credit for the full amount they contribute toward pastoral support; Be it resolved that the question of whether or not the pastor's utilities are supplied be made a part of the pastor's annual report.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.
- F. Be it resolved that we adopt the following method for each church in recalling their pastor:
 - 1. Each church shall vote on either the last Sunday A. M. or the last prayer meeting night in April on the recall of their pastor.
 - 2. The Secretary of the local church shall forward the results of the voting to the District Superintendent within 5 days. The pastor shall likewise forward to the Superintendent within 15 days his decision, as to whether or not he will remain on the field, providing he received a sufficient recall vote. Manual, Sec. 53, Par. 3, Page 29.

NO. 19 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of District officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

NO. 20 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, Section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor any thing of like nature to be held in connection with the Church or any department of its work. And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherance to this in the Eastern Conference.
- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television; Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.
- E. Inasmuch as our Manual gives only two sacraments or ordinances to be observed in our churches, namely, the Lord's Supper and water baptisms, Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District forbids public feet washing as part of our worship service.

NO. 21 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

- A. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Convention be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the District Sunday School Committee shall appoint committees in the various zones of the conference to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- B. Inasmuch as our District Camp is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Eatsern Ohio Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- C. A few of our churches have been faithful in teaching the Sunday School lesson to their shutins, and such who are physically incapacitated, to attend the regular Sunday School sessions of the church. This is commendable and more should be done in this direction which falls under the designation of Home department. But in order to avoid any discrepancies in the Sunday School attendance count in any of our churches, and in all fairness to every Sunday School in the District, Be it resolved that only those present in the Sunday School classes in the church be counted in total attendance for that Sunday. All others who may be taught elsewhere such as are shut-ins, etc., are to be counted and entered under "Home Department" and not to be included in the total count.

NO. 22 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings if possible; However, he may authorize his assistant or the pastor to conduct this meeting.

NO. 23 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership—therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

NO. 24 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with district council members receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all members of the District Council be elected to office by secret ballot.

NO. 25 APPRECIATION

Be it resolved:

- A. That we extend to our General Secretary Treasurer a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, District Secretary, District Treasurer, the additional members of the District Council, the various committees, and all others who have assisted in any way to make our conference the success it proved to be.
- C. That we instruct our Secretary to write a letter to our beloved General Superintendent, assuring him of our prayers in behalf of his speedy recovery, and furthermore to express our loyalty to him in his efforts and desires for the future development of our beloved Zion, should Jesus tarry.
- D. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun and Rev. E. R. Overman for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this Camp meeting and Conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our Conference Secretary.
- E. Above all, we do fervently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Camp and Conference.

Report of the Ways and Means Committee As Adopted By the Conference

SALARIES

No. 1 District Superintendents

- A. Inasmuch as we recognize the high cost of living and the increase of traveling expenses, we recommend the following: District Superintendent Salary \$3,640.00; 6c per mile traveling expenses; parsonage; all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.
- B. We recommend that the Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of district work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 5c per mile traveling expense.

No. 2 District Council

We recommend that 6c per mile, one way, be given each member of the District Council for traveling to the council meetings.

No. 3 Conference Treasurer and Secretary

Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer's salary be \$300.00 and the Conference Secretary's salary be \$100.00.

- No. 4 Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary
- A. Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$40.00 per year.
- B. Be it resolved that each Sunday School be assessed annually the following amounts based on their average to be used for the expense of Sunday School promotional work.

50 or below S	\$ 1.00
50 to 100	3.00
100 to 200	5.00
200 or above	10.00

The same to be paid to the District Treasurer.

No. 5 Educational and Examining Committee

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committee be given, \$35.00.

BUDGETS

No. 6 General Budget

A. We recommend that the Manual provision for the General Budget be adopted by our conference.

Total — \$6.00 per member per year.

35% or \$2.10 for Foreign Missions.

25% or \$1.50 for General Administration.

20% or \$1.20 for General Church Extension.

10% or .60 for Senior College Fund.

6% or .36 for Church Extension Loan Fund.

4% or .24 for General Sunday School Extension and Youth Work.

"If the local church does not properly divide the money, the conference treasurer is authorized to do so." Sec. 149, Par. 1-3, Page 81.

"No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interests is paid."

- B. We recommend that the general budget be raised monthly in the Sunday school or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.
- C. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastors in raising the Conference Home Missionary and General Budget Funds.

No. 7 District Budget

- A. Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the church by their tithes and offerings, and that all gross receipts of the local church, excepting General Church Budget, Conference, Home Missionary Funds, Evangelistic support, and building funds, be tithed, the same to be forwarded to the District Treasurer.
- B. Be it resolved that we raise 15c per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.
- C. Be it resolved that each church raise \$1.00 per member per year for our zone school.
- D. Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member, per year, in addition to all birthday offerings, be raised annually to constitute our conference Home Missionary Fund.
- E. Inasmuch as the provision to date is inadequate to care for the financial obligations of the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask for the local churches to raise the equivalent of one dollar (\$1.00) per member, per year, to be forwarded to the District Treasurer, the same to be applied on the up keep of the camp grounds.
- F. Be it resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 50c per member, per year, to liquidate the district parsonage indebtedness.
- G. Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendents check the record of the District Treasurer and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay 90% of their district tithe.
- H. Be it further resolved that the District Budget be paid monthly.

No. 8 Newly Organized Churches

Be it resolved that with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization; one-half of the second year; and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

YOUTH

No. 9 Young People

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention.
- C. That our District Pilgrim Review be placed on a subscription basis. Single copies at 50c per year, 10 copies sent to one address, 35c per copy per year. All subscriptions are to expire at the end of the conference year.

No. 10 Monitors and Police

We recommend that young people who receive free entertainment at our District Convention be required to pay a registration fee of 50c, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

No. 11 Executive Secretary

Inasmuch as the Executive Youth Secretary receives only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 12 Camp and Conference

A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to alleviate the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.

- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly renumerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- D. That our active minister's children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

TREASURER

No. 13 Auditing of Treasurer's Books

Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the Conference Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

No. 14 Insuring the Treasurer

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer bonded.

No. 15 Cost of Minutes

Be it resolved that the price of District Minutes to be left to the discretion of the District Council.

No. 16 Preparing Minutes for Publication

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$10.00 for services.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

No. 17 District Home Missions

- A. Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions. This special offering will be promoted by the District according to the individual plans and needs. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund. This offering will not apply on the annual budget but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.
- B. Inasmuch as we do not have money enough to help establish new churches be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District have, what may be termed an Emergency Reserved Army. This army to answer calls given by the District Superintendent. These calls may be in the amount which the enlisted person has signed for the duration of year. These enlisted persons to re-enlist every year if they so desire. The calls are to range from \$5.00-\$2.00 each.

There is not to be over 4 calls in any one conference year.

No church or person shall be compelled to join. The money is over and above the regular budget.

No. 18 Minister's Duties

- A. Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local churches.

He said there were 713 paid subscriptions last year, and the goal for this year will be 1,000. It will still be the price of 50 cents per year for single copy and 35 cents for clubs of 10 or more copies.

Motion was made and carried to delete Resolution No. 1 from the Resolutions Committee list, having to do with the appointment of two additional Advisory mem-

bers to the Executive Committee.

Rev. Awe suggested that Zone Chairmen again lift an offering in the First Zone Rally of the year for the expense of the paper.

Appreciation was spoken for the tellers and secretary for work in the sitting.

Motion carried to adjourn.
