



### Ministerial Study Course Agency

Whereas, there is an increasing need of maintaining ministerial study courses such as are provided for by the Manual and Inasmuch is it seems advisable to conduct our study course work in a more effective manner than is now operating, therefore be it Resolved, that the General Conference authorize the General Board to establish and maintain a central office at the denominational headquarters to conduct study courses for the benefit of the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, viz.:

- 1. Such Agency shall be known as the Ministerial Study Course Agency.
- 2. It shall exist for the purpose of assisting unordained ministers and deaconesses in completing the study courses required by the church.
- 3. This Agency shall provide a list of study course books as authorized from time to time by the General Board.
- 4. The Agency shall maintain contact by mail with each enrollee throughout each course of study and shall provide study outlines, examination questions and other appropriate information.
- 5. The Agency shall maintain adequate educational records as authorized from benefit of the enrollee and the church.
- 6. It shall be understood that this Agency shall in no manner supplant the work of the examining and educational boards of the several districts, but shall cooperate with them by reporting annually on the progress of student ministers and deaconesses within their jurisidiction.
- 7. The Agency shall provide suitable transcripts and issue certificates upon the satisfactory completion of the work assigned.
- 8. The Agency shall make reports to the General Board as may be required by that body.
- 9. The Agency shall be authorized to take all necessary steps for the conducting of its work as indicated by this resolution and as may be approved from time to time by the General Board.

Be it further Resolved, that all licensed ministers and licensed deaconesses of the Pilgrim Holiness Church who are taking study course work shall be required to enroll with the Ministerial Study Course Agency.

# **IOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS**

FIRST SITTING, MONDAY MORNING, AUGUST 18, 1958

The Fourth Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened August 18, 1958 at 9:00 a.m., at Bethel Camp Grounds, Coshocton, Ohio. Rev. B. A. Awe our District Superintendent brought the conference to order and led in prayer, after which Rev. O. Awe led in singing "Blessed Assurance" and "More, More About Jesus." Mrs. M. D Stiverson was the organist. Rev. E. E. Leadingham led in another session of prayer. The first order of service was Holy Communion. Rev. J. R. Siders read 1 Cor. 11:23-34. He exhorted us to be living examples of the grace of God in whatever we undertook to do.

Communion was then served to the Executive Council by Rev. R. G. Flexon after which the conference was served by Rev. B. A. Awe, Rev. E. E. Leadingham, Rev. M. D. Stiverson, and Rev Orille Awe. There were five tables served. The conference then stood and dismissed the Communion service with the song, "Amazing Grace." The presence of the Lord was greatly sensed by all present.

- Rev. B. A. Awe then welcomed the Pastors and Delegates to the conference, after which he introduced our General Superintendent, Rev. R. G. Flexon.
- Rev. R. G. Flexon stated that he found our people encouraged all over, that there are better days ahead for us. He spoke on "Good Organization." He read 1 Cor. 12:12-22. He divided his message into three parts:
  - Organization
- 2. Deputize
- 3. Supervise

He stated that the goal for this entire church is 5,000 members in the next four years. We need prayerful men, men of vision, not money but service we render that really counts for God. We need men with ambition without being ambitious. We need men that are ready to die for the cause we represent. Anything not worth dying for is not worth living for. We need men filled with the Holy Ghost, men who move cut and do something for God, spiritual rest gives us religious unrest, can't rest unless we are doing something for God. We have too much dramatics, what we need is more dynamics.

The meeting was then turned back to Rev. B. A. Awe who admonished us to walk in all the light that was shed upon us through Rev. Flexon's message.

The roll call was given by the Secretary of the Ministers and Lay Delegates, each Pastor giving the number of Advocate subscriptions that he expected to get this year.

Rev. Flexon stated that it would save the Secretary time if Pastors would get from the secretaries of their church the names of delegates and turn in to District Secretary before conference convened.

The following new churches and pastors were introduced to the conference:

1. Elyria—Rev. C. Flecher; 2. Čoshocton—Rev. P. Neville; 3. Tiffin—Rev. C. Brewbaker (Mission); 4. Nevada—Rev. R. Blinn; 5. Fairplay—Rev. D. Brown; 6. Mount Summit, Barberton—Rev. Honeycut.

It was moved and seconded that we receive the above new churches and pastors and delegates into the Eastern Ohio District. Seconded. Carried by standing vote.

The conference bar was established to include the front three sections leaving out the section to the far right of platform and back eight seats including platform.

The chairman then called for the District Superintendent's report. It was moved and seconded we accept this very encouraging report. Carried.

It was moved we recess until time for next session. Carried.

Rev. B. A. Awe dismissed in prayer.

#### SECOND SITTING, MONDAY AFTERNOON, 2:00 P.M.

Rev. R. G. Flexon, Chairman called the conference to order. Rev. Lashbrook led in singing "Satisfied." Prayer by Rev. R . W. Ives. The Chairman then introduced Dr. R. D. Gunsalus, President of Eastern Pilgrim College, who then read Phil. 3:1-11. The 10th verse was stressed by Dr. R. G. Gunsalus. What we are now doing is worth living for as well as dying for. He spoke for awhile on Eastern Pilgrim College and its connection with the Eastern Ohio District. He stated that the college became a part of the Eastern Ohio District and that this disrict has two members which are on the Board of Directors. Said members are District Superinendent, Rev. B. A. Awe and District Secretary, Rev. M. D. Stiverson. He stated that there are only three holiness seminaries in U. S. A.; that plans are made by general board to make Eastern Pilgrim College the seminary of our church. Dr. R. D. The following were presented to the conference by the Reception Committee: Rev. and Mrs. Brillhart of Michigan, General Evangelist, Dr. Otho Jennings, President Owosso College, Rev. and Mrs. Brillhart gave their testimonies after which motion and carried that we give the above honorary seats in the conference.

- Rev. R. G. Flexon then introduced Dr. Otho Jennings, President of Owosso College as our speaker for the evening. We were admonished to train our young people as we believe and he said, "nobody can train our young people as we believe but us." "Preaching is God's channel for saving souls." # DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### Rev. B. A. Awe

To General Superintendent Rev. R. G. Flexon, the pastors, evangelists, delegates and riends of the fourth annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Eastern Ohio District on the Bethel Camp Grounds, Coshocton, Ohio.

Greetings in the precious name of Jesus!

We have just closed a wonderful District Camp. The rich ministry of Rev. Castevens and Rev. Humble and the "Singing Chatfields" was greatly enjoyed and appreciated. The presence of God was felt in every service. We are deeply indebted to the board members of the Bethel Camp Grounds for permitting us to have our Camp and Conference here.

It is with a deep sense of heart-felt gratitude and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father that enables us to bring this report to you. We have been conscious throughout this conference year of the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit and we deeply feel our churches are on the upward trend in our District, both spiritually and numerically.

We wish to thank every pastor and church for their fine spirit of cooperation. Through this combined effort we feel every department of the work of the church has gone forward. We believe we have a spiritual people and are living according to the standards of holiness.

We do not have words to express our appreciation for the kind of reception the pastors and the churches have given us. We have enjoyed the Christian fellowship with the saints everywhere, and we are praying the Lord will reward everyone for their kind words and deeds. We have endeavored to do our duties as a superintendent and to serve the churches in our capacity to the best of our ability. In many ways this has been the greatest year of all my experience in serving you as your District Superintendent and in the light of this, we present this report to you in humility and gratitude to our Lord Jesus for His abounding grace and the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

During this Conference year I have visited the churches 250 times and preached over 200 times; attended two General Board Meetings; two School Board Meetings; attended all the District Council Meetings and Home Missionary Committee Meetings; three Sunday School Conventions in our District; the National Sunday School Convention in Frankfort, Indiana; the General Conference at Winona Lake, Indiana; one Dedication Service; one Ordination Service; four funerals; one wedding; conducted numerous church board meetings and 45 Annual Church elections; last but not least the Lord has enabled and helped us to organize 5 new churches and 1 mission, totaling 55 new members. For this we give God the praise.

In the midst of the labors we have just read, we have written hundreds of pieces of mail in the interest of the District. Our fellowship with the pastors has been blessed and seasoned with Grace as we talked over the many problems and in trying to reach the best conclusions for the advancement of the church, also the saints have expressed words of kindness for which we give God the praise. We have enjoyed our labors with pastors and people more than we have words to express.

Our fellowship with the District Council has been helpful and inspirational as we have exchanged views in the business sessions. It is indeed a great privilege to sit and counsel with these Godly men which help us in the management of the District and help solve its problems.

My assistant Dist. Supt., Rev. E. E. Leadingham has been a blessing and proven a valuable man in this field. His fellowship and help is very commendable.

All the Committees have labored faithfully and the Examining Board has been a real blessing.

Our Youth Camp was a new venture and a great success. It went beyond all expectations. Our teachers were at their best. The camp was conducted here at Bethel Camp Ground and the Joseph Brown family were the Evangelists. Our Pilgrim Youth are on the march and going forward.

#### NEW ORGANIZED CHURCHES

On October 11, we organized a church in Nevada, (a small town 17 miles northeast of Marion) with seven members and two more came in shortly after that, making a total of nine members. Rev. Robert Blinn is the pastor. Rev. and Mrs. Blinn are excellent young people and are doing their best for the Nevada Pilgrims. They are in need of a church building, pray for them.

On November 7 we organized a Home Missionary Church with six adults and two children in the city of Tiffin where Charles Brewbaker is pastor. They worship in a little home missionary hall. Rev. Brewbaker is doing good work there. Le us pray for them that we might have a church building and a strong church in the city of Tiffin.

On December 17 we organized a fine group of seven members at what is known as Fairplay, formally a country school house in the hills between Vinton and Danville. Rev. David Brown went there (where his mother went to school years before) and started preaching and a revival swept the community. As a result we have a church there. David Brown is a son of Rev. R. D. Brown.

On April 27 we organized the church in Elyria with seven members. This church started as a result of a tent meeting a few years ago. Then they worshipped in a hall; their goal is to build a church. They have purchased three lots and have built a splendid parsonage on one of the lots. It is so constructed that they worship in the long living room and what will later be the garage, these two rooms join each other. This church is known as the A. L. Davis Memorial Pilgrim Holiness Church. Rev. Carlos Fletcher is the pastor and he is among the most energetic young men I have known. God is blessing his labors.

On June 1 we organized a church in Coshocton with eight members where Paul and Mary Neville are pastors. This work was started here a few years ago by Bro. Neville and we need a church building here, especially so if we continue to hold our Camp Meetings and Conferences here. May the Lord continue to bless this work is our prayer.

On June 5 we organized a group that was formally known as the Scriptural Holiness Church. This church is located on Mt. Summit St., in Barberton. The Lord came mightily the night of the organization when twelve established Christians banded themselves together to be Pilgrims and took our Pilgrim Convenant. Six more members have been added since, making a total of eighteen members. W. E. Honeycutt who came to us from the Pittsburgh District is their pastor. These people are in the process of completing a splendid new church building on Mt. Summit St., in Barberton.

This makes five churches and one home missionary church that was organized this conference year with a total added membership of 55. Each of these churches have a fine Sunday School according to their membership.

#### CHURCH AND PARSONAGE IMPROVEMENTS

The Ashley church where J. R. Walter is pastor have repaired their parsonage and are in the process of laying plans to build a new church. This is a forward move for the Ashley Pilgrims.

The Bremen Church where J. D. Webb is pastor have repainted the outside of their church. A new organ was also donated to them by Mr. Claude Foster.

The Chauncey Church where Rev. Ray Pidcock is pastor are planning to completely rebuild their store building in which they worship and make it like a church building.

The Chillicothe Church where Dale Jones is pastor have beautified their church by repainting the interior.

The Cleveland Church where Charles Gollihue is pastor have painted both the inside and outside of the church and parsonage. Many items of repair work was done plus laying a new sewer line.

The Columbus First Church where W. V. Gilkerson is pastor have beautified their church by redecorating both the inside and the outside.

The Co'umbus 5th. Ave. Church where C. O. Watters is pastor have put in new front doors at both entrances and marquees over the same, which beautifies the church and protects the doors. They have redecorated the interior of their church and have enough material on hand to complete the ceiling in the basement.

The Crown City church where Edwin Dunn is pastor have painted the interior of the church and varnished the floors, also other repair work.

Rev. Dallas Ford, pastor of a home missionary project in the city of Fremont has built a lovely new church. They have already had a good revival. Pray that God will help them financially to complete the building.

The Lancaster South Broad St. Church where Clyde Goss is pastor have purchased a Sunday School bus and a new organ was donated to them by Mr. Claude Foster.

The Mansfield Church where J. H. Sherwood is pastor installed a new furnace, put in a nursery and redecorated the interior of their church. New venetian blinds and other minor repair work was done at the parsonage.

The Marion First Church where John Hersman is pastor have redecorated two rooms and the bathroom and insulated the ceilings and the garage in the parsonage.

The McCluney Church where John Colwell is pastor have a new carpet on the platform, new floor tile in the auditorium and replaced the old seats with better ones.

The Murray City Church where Clifford Jolly is pastor have painted the interior of church and have purchased two new flags; new window blinds and new seats in the beginners class, also a large picture which hangs in the front of their church.

The Nelsonville Church where E. E. Leadingham is pastor have modernized the parsonage kitchen. The Men's Class room has been completely redecorated, new chairs installed and a new tile floor.

The Newark Church where Ralph King is pastor are building an addition and when completed will be nearly an entire new church building. This will be a beautiful structure when finished and will be a great asset to the community as well as the District. This church also donated a new organ by Mr. Claude Foster.

The New Marshfield Church where Duane Saylor is pastor, constructed two new Sunday School rooms 17' x 20' onto the church and furnished the same. Installed new oak pews and floors, flourescent lights, altar, repainted interior and exterior and resurfaced the parking lot with stone. At the parsonage they installed a coal turnace and completed installation of the bathroom. Improvements valued at \$10,000. All bills paid.

The Sandusky Church where Eugene Jordan is pastor have installed new oak pews in their church and an electric sign on the outside.

The South Webster Church where Frank Williams is pastor have repainted the interior of the church, installed a coal furnace and completed the furnace room. The basement walls have been plastered and plans are being made to partition it for Sunday School rooms. Their new piano is now free from debt.

The Stewart Church where Davis Lyons is pastor have repaired the bell tower and painted the same; built a new altar rail, new flags for the platform and lights for the outside.

The Wheelersburg Church where Roy Hill Sr., is pastor are in the process of putting in new church pews and other repair work.

The Zanesville Church where Virgil Miller is pastor have repainted the interior of their church and put in a new tile floor.

The Shreve Church where James Busick is pastor have newly painted their church and parsonage and did some general repair.

The Fostoria Church where Ronald Travis is pastor have redecorated their church, put plywood paneling on ceiling and walls of vestibule and varnished it, put new roof on kitchen of the parsonage and a new roof on the vestibule. I wish to pay tribute to our Young People's Executive Sec'y. Treas. and Editor of the Pilgrim Review also the seven zone chairmen of our District and to all those that have labored so faithfully to make this camp possible.

In closing, another milestone is passed, another year is gone, and in the good providence of God we are now assembled to do business for the King. Let us pray much for this conference as we chart our course for the year that lies ahead, if Jesus tarries. Let us receive the exhortation the Apostle Paul gave to the Ephesian Church, "BE ye kind one to another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you," and again, with the apostle John, "Herein is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us, and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins." Beloved it God so loved us, we ought also to love one another.

### Sunday School Promotional Secretary's Report

TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, EASTERN OHIO DISTRICT

Greetings in the Name of our Saviour and Redeemer:

During the 1957 Annual Conference, the District Council appointed me as your Sunday School Promtional Secretary. Additional members of the committee appointed were: M. D. Stiverson, A. L. Davis, C. O. Watters and our District Superintendent, Rev. B. A. Awe. One member of the committee, Rev. A. L. Davis, was called from our midst and to his eternal reward in January of this year. He was a precious brother, indeed, and his fellowship and wise counsel has been greatly missed.

We adopted as our motto: "All at it and always at it."

At the very beginning, the Sunday School Committee voted that the Promotional Secretary should promote every phase of the Sunday School work. In August of 1957, it was my privilege, along with thirty or more delegates to attend the National Sunday School Convention, held at Frankfort, Indiana. To say the least, we feel this Convention was a great success and was, indeed, a forward step for our beloved church in the Sunday School field. The Church-wide Sunday School Enlargement Campaign was launched at the National Convention. Your Promotional Secretary helped in every way possible to put the plan into operation in our District; and we feel it was worth while.

The following Sunday Schools of the Eastern Ohio District, as leaders in their group in the Enlargement Campaign contest, were awarded five-dollar gift certificates, redeemable at our District bookroom.

Class AA—Nelsonville
Class B —Toledo I

Class C -- Cleveland

Class D —New Marshfield

Class E —Oak Grove

While we congratulate these winners, we deeply appreciate the splendid work of each Sunday School.

In 1957 the average attendance was 4405, and according to the reports which we received, the attendance for 1958 Conference year was 4481, making a gain of 76, or 1.4%. Even though the gain is very small, yet we are thankful that we did make a gain, I might add that we did not receive a report from five churches.

It was also our privilege to tour the District during the Fall months with Dr. A. S. London. We conducted at least one meeting in each Zone, and in two Zones three meetings were held. The Lord surely put His approval upon these special meetings and used Dr. London to stir our hearts along Sunday School lines. The wonderful spirit of cooperation of the pastors and laity in the various Zones was the contributing factor and key to the success of the tour. The largest increase in S. S. attendance for any one month during the year was made in the month following the S. S. tour. We travelled 1,006 miles making the tour, have published a monthly S. S. report, conducted three S. S. meetings, and have provided an article nearly each month for the Pilgrim Review in the interest of the Sunday School. I have take care of the correspondence incidental to my office, and have sent out hundreds of pieces of S. S. mail.

With the approval of the Sunday School Committee, we arranged for a Promotional Meeting. Said meeting was held the last Saturday afternoon of the District Camp. There were 30 pastors, 16 Sunday School superintendents, and 112 teachers and officers present. An 8-point workable program was presented. If it is carried

through, we firmly believe it will help our Sunday School work.

We want to take this opportunity to thank our beloved District Superintendent, Sunday School Committee, Pastors and Sunday School workers for their cooperation.

The General Conference approved four recommendations made by the General Board pertaining to Pilgrim Holiness Sunday Schools. One had to do with providing a Sunday School Standard for Pilgrim Holiness Sunday Schools. Another had to do with a change in a report blank listing the total enrollment, gain, and loss. This will be carried on the new report blanks. The other two changes had to do with the Sunday School board and Sunday School worker's conference. I list herewith the legislation adopted by the General Conference for your benefit:

The Sunday School board of which the pastor shall be the regular chairman shall consist of the pastor, the Sunday School superintendent, the assistant Sunday school superintendent, Sunday school secretary, Sunday school treasurer, and department Sunday school superintendents. Their duties shall be as follows:

Make recommendations for Sunday school teachers and co-teachers to the advisory church board.

Provide for needed literature and equipment, and have the general oversight of the Sunday school.

The General Conference also adopted the following memorial:

A Sunday School Workers' Conference should be held each month.

All the Sunday school officers, teachers, and co-teachers shall be required to attend the monthly Sunday School Workers' Conference. The purpose of the Sunday School Workers' Conference is:

- (a) To create a better understanding of the Sunday school task and to become familiar with the needs of the school.
  - (b) To guide workers in improvising methods.
  - (c) To create a unified program carried out without confusion misunderstanding or overlapping.
  - (d) To evaluate progress, make plans, and set goals.
  - (e) To provide time for special prayer and inspiration to motivate the workers.
  - (f) To bring encouragement by giving reports concerning:
    - 1. Souls that have been won to Christ.
- Growth and progress in building Christian character.
   Gains or losses in attendance.

# Report of the Resolutions Committee at Adopted by the Conference

#### UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND AND DISTRICT BUDGET

#### NO. 1. BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the conference and general interests, and said cards be forwarded to the pastors as soon after Conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District Budget or United Stewardship Fund and District Budget be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budgets, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.
- D. Whereas, the General Conference has set up a United Stawardship Fund to care for apart of the expense of operating the general church, and Whereas, the Manual states on Page 82, paragraph 8 that, Any pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice.

raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference, and

Whereas, this rule must be enforced beginning with our next annual conference, and

Whereas, there is a great need that all district budgets be paid as early in the year as possible so that the district may function properly.

Be it resolved, that we as a conference set the month of September as United Stewardship Fund and District Budget month.

Be it further resolved that during this month each church shall do their best to either raise in cash or pledges the total amount covering each of these items. Any church that now has a workable plan to take care of these items need not teel under any obligation to take such offerings during this month but should continue with their present plan.

#### NO. 2 CAMP GROUND

Be it resolved that the District Council and District Trustees be authorized to make a suitable lease of the Bethel Camp Grounds, Coshocton, Ohio for the use of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Eastern Ohio District Annual Camp Meeting and District Conference, for a period of 25 years, and that all our preachers, churches and people give them our whole-hearted cooperation.

#### NO. 3 CAMP SERVICES

Be it resolved that the schedule of our Camp services be so arranged as to permit one afternoon service each to be devoted to the interests of the following phases of our work, namely, Foreign Missions, General Church Extension and District Home Missions.

#### NO. 4 COMMITTEES

- A. Be it resolved that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee consist of five members and three shall be a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that no unauthorized person be permitted to present resolutions on the Conference floor. All resolutions must be cleared either with the Resolutions Committee or the Ways and Means Committee (depending on the nature of the resolution under consideration), who are the only authorized committees to present resolutions on the conference floor.

#### NO. 5 CONFERENCE

A. Be it resolved that the Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District be opened with a Communion Service for our ministers, delegates and friends. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a committee to arrange for this service.

B. To expedite the business of this conference . . . . . Be it resolved that all resolutions be sent to the committee chairman 30 days prior to the District Conerence and the Committees meet with the respective members and act upon the resolutions; in turn the resolutions be placed into the hands of the District Secretary to be mailed to all local churches, ordained and licensed ministers of the Eastern Ohio District before conference convenes.

#### NO. 6 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare reports for conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close July 5th.

#### NO. 7 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Be it resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches, subject to the camp dates.

#### NO. 8 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister's wife of the District, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairman and that they immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District for expense incurred.

#### NO. 9 LOAN PLAN

Be it resolved that we adopt the Pilgrim Pension Loan, Inc., in the Eastern Ohio District for the purpose of helping churches to build.

#### NO. 10 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of the local Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Whereas the 1950 Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study; therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study, also that Pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend their District Conference.

#### NO. 11 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio Conference have an annual Ministerial Convention. The time and place is to be determined by the Council.

#### NO. 12 MISSIONS

In consideration of the need of District Home Missionary work, be it resolved that each pastor in the Eastern Ohio Conference be subject to a call by the Home Missionary Committee for a two weeks revival.

#### NO. 13 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

#### NO. 14 PASTORS

- A. Be it resolved that the churches of the Eastern Ohio District shall give first consideration to the Ministers of our conference in extending a call for their pastor. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent shall not recommend a minister outside the bounds of our district, until after a church has failed to elect a pastor from the ministers of our District.
- B. Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name at a time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living; Be it resolved that the district superintendent take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the superintendents meet with the local church boards.

- D. In order that the churches may receive credit for the full amount they contribute toward pastoral support; Be it resolved that the question of whether or not the pastor's utilities are supplied be made a part of the pastor's annual report.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.

#### NO. 15 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of District officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

#### NO. 16 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Inasmuch as there are moral, physical and spiritual danger in and many perils associated with television, be it resolved that this conference go on record urging our people to guard against the such.
- C. Inasmuch as our Manual gives only two sacraments or ordinances to be observed in our churches, namely, the Lord's Supper and water baptisms, Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District forbids public feet washing as part of our worship service.

#### NO. 17 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

- A. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Convention be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Futhermore, that the District Sunday School Committee shall appoint committees in the various zones of the conference to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- B. Inasmuch as our District Camp is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Eastern Ohio Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- 12. A few of our churches have been faithful in teaching the Sunday School lesson to their shutins, and such who are physically incapacitated, to attend the regular Sunday School sessions of the church. This is commendable and more should be done in this direction which falls under the designation of Home department. But in order to avoid any discrepancies in the Sunday School attendance count in any of our churches, and in all fairness to every Sunday School in the District. Be it resolved that only those present in the Sunday School classes in the church be counted in total attendance for that Sundaf. All others who may be taught elsewhere such as are shut-ins, are to be counted and entered under "Home Department" and not to be included in the total count.
- D. Be it resolved that we adpot the following recommendations:
  - (1) That each Sunday School endeaver to start new Sunday School classes.
  - (2) That each Sunday School and each class set goals and strive hard to reach them.
  - (3) That each Sunday School adopt a system for contacting absentees.
  - (4) That each Sunday School plan weekly group visitations.
  - (5) That each Sunday School departmentalized as soon as possible.
  - (6) That much attention be given the Cradle Roll. This is a ripe field, and will pay dividends if worked.
  - (7) That at least one branch Sunday School be started by each Zone.
  - (8) That each Sunday School subscribe for the Sunday School Advance for all of the teachers.

#### NO. 18 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings if possible; However, he may authorize his assistant or the pastor to conduct this meeting.

#### NO: 19 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership—therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

#### NO. 20 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with district council members receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all members of the District Council be elected to office by secret ballot.

#### NO. 21 APPRECIATION

- A. Be it resolved; That we extend our General Superintendent a vote of thanks for his Christ-like spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this Conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, District Secretary, District Treasurer, the additional members of the District Council, the various committees, dining personnel, camp and conference registrars, maintenance men, camp policemen and all others who have assisted in any way to make our conference the success it proved to be.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the Coshocton News and Rev. Paul Harris for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this Camp meeting and Conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our Conference Secretary.
- D. That we express to the Bethel Camp Meeting Association Board our gratitude for their Christian courtesy and fellowship in all transactions involved in our using the Coshocton Camp Grounds.
- E. Above all, we do fervently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during this Camp and Conference.

# Report of the Ways and Means Committee as Adopted by the Conference

#### BUDGETS

### NO. 1 UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND (Formerly Gen'l Budget)

A. Be it resolved that the manual provision for the United Stewardship Fund as adopted by the 1958 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be adopted. by our District Conference. (The amount of United Stewardship Fund \$8.00 per member per year, this formerly General Budget Name.)

"if the local church does not properly divide the money, the conference treasurer is authorized to do so." Sec. 149, Par. 1-3, Page 81, 1954 Manual.

- "No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interests is paid."
- B. We recommend that the United Stewardship Fund be raised monthly in the Sunday School or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.
- C. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastors in raising the Conference Home Missionary and United Stewardship Fund.
- D. Whereas, there are some churches in our district which have a struggle to pay their United Stewardship Fund, and Whereas, there are times when such churches have unspecified funds for both

foreign missions and general extension, therefore,

Be it resolved, that any church wishing to do so may take from unspecified foreign Missionary money enough to make up that part of the United Stewardship Fund which, applies to foreign Missions which is 20% of said fund.

Be it further resolved, that, this may apply to unspecified general church extension funds also, and from such funds the 14% of the United Stewardship Fund which applies to general church extension may be paid.

This can only apply when the other part of the United Stewardship Fund has been made up.

#### NO. 2 DISTRICT BUDGET

- A. Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the church by their tithes and offerings, and that all gross receipts of the local church, excepting General Church Budget, Conference, Home Missionary Funds, Evangelistic support, and building funds, be tithed, the same to be forwarded to the District Treasurer.
- B. Be it resolved that we raise 30c per member per year to take care of the General Conterence expense.
- C. Whereas, the General Board of our church has designated the Owosso School as the Liberal Arts College of our church, and

Whereas, this necessitated the rezoning of the rest of our schools, thus placing the Eastern Ohio Conference in the Allentown School Zone, therefore

Be it resolved that we as a conference go on record as favoring the financial set up of that zone which calls for 25c per month, and

Whereas, there is a transition period for this conference from the Owosso School to the Allentown School, therefore

- Be it resolved, that for the first year we pledge ourselves to raise no less than \$1.50 per member for Eastern Bible College. The same to be paid on a monthly basis as far as possible.
- D. Be is resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member, per year, in addition to all birthday offerings, be raised annually to constitute our conference Home Missionary Fund.

- E. Inasmuch as the provision to date is inadequate to care for the financial obligations of the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask for the local churches to raise the equivalent of one dollar (\$1.00) per member, per year, to be forwarded to the District Treasurer, the same to be applied on the upkeep of the camp grounds.
- F. Be it resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 75c per member, per year, to liquidate the district parsonage indebtedness.
- G. Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be ommitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay 90% of their district tithe.
- H. Be it further resolved that the District Budget be paid monthly.
- I. Be it resolved that each church in the District be asked to share in meeting the expenses of the Annual District Ministerial Convention by being assessed on the following basis: Each church with a membership of 25 or less contribute \$5.00. All other churches contribute \$10.00 each.

#### NO. 3 CAMP BUDGET (SPECIAL)

Be it resolved that this Conference set a budget of \$2,000.00 for the operating expenses of the District Camp Meeting.

That each church shall assume a portion of said budget according to their financial ability to pay.

#### NO. 4 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provision to alleviate the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly renumerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- D. That our active minister's children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

#### NO. 5 CHURCHES NEWLY ORGANIZED

Be it resolved that with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organizations; one-half of the second year; and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

#### NO. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

- A. Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions. This special offering will be promoted by the District according to the individual plans and needs. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund. This offering will not apply on the annual budget but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.
- B. Inasmuch as we do not have money enough to help establish new churches be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District have, what may be termed an Emergency Reserved Army. This army to answer calls given by the District Superintendent. These calls may be in the amount which the enlisted person has signed for the duration of year. These enlisted persons to re-enlist every year if they so desire. The calls are to range from \$5.00-\$2.00 each.

There is not to be over 4 calls in any one conference year.

No church or person shall be compelled to join. The money is over and above the regular budget.

#### NO. 7 SUNDAY SCHOOL BUDGET (DISTRICT)

B. Be it resolved that each Sunday School be assessed annually the following amounts based on their average to be used for the expense of Sunday School promotional work.

Yearly Average	Amount to pay
50 or below	\$ .25 per month
50 to 100	.50 per month
100 to 200	1.00 per month
200 or above	1.25 per month

The same to be paid to the District Treasurer.

#### MINISTERS

#### NO. 8

A. Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.

B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local

## churches.

#### NO. 9 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Eastern Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the District Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application and send application blanks.
- B. Inasmuch as Resolution No. 9A provides for the enrollment of each church's pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and, inasmuch as a number of our churches have still failed to follow through on this District legislation, be it resolved that our District Superintendent when making his first visit of the conference year to the churches, inquire whether or not the local board of the church he is visiting, has enrolled their pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association, and if not, to encourage that church to do so as soon as possible.

#### MINUTES

#### NO. 10 COST OF MINUTES

Be it resolved that the price of District Minutes to be left to the discretion of the District Council.

#### NO. 11 PREPARING MINUTES FOR PUBLICATION

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close or the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$20.00 for services.

#### RECORDS

#### NO. 12 RECORDS—SAFE

Due to the fact that we are now a separate conference, and to the fact that our conference records are valuable to us, and to the fact that a small fire could completely destroy the same, therefore

Be it resolved that the council be authorized and directed to purchase an approved safe and place it in the keeping of our District Treasurer for the safe-keeping of our records and finances.

#### SALARIES

#### NO. 13 DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Inasmuch as we recognize the high cost of living and the increase of traveling expenses we recommend the following: District Superintendent Salary \$4,200.00, 6c per mile traveling expenses; parsonages: all utilities and four weeks vacation.
- C. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and his wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the District Treasurer.
- D. Be it resolved that the District shall enroll the Superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan as per the plan for the local churches and their pastors, and be it further resolved that we pay the District Superintendent's Social Security.

#### NO. 14. ASS'T SUPERINTENDENT

We recommend that the Superintendent when in need of additional help in the administration of district work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$12.50 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.

#### NO. 15 DISTRICT COUNCIL

We recommend that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council for traveling to and from the council meetings.

#### NO. 16 CONFERENCE SECRETARY AND TREASURER

Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer's salary be \$450.00 and the Conference Secretary's salary be \$200.00.

#### NO. 17 STATISTICIAN AND SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Be it resolved that the Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year and that the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$75.00 per year.

#### NO. 18 EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING COMMITTEE

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committee be given \$50.00 per member.

#### NO. 19 SOCIAL SECURITY

- A. Whereas, Social Security has been extended to clergy, and whereas, many of the pastors of the Eastern Ohio District have elected to go into the plan, and whereas, business enterprises pay 50% of the cost of the Social Security plan for their employes, and whereas, the pastor is an employee of the church which he serves, and we believe it to be in keeping with the Spirit of the New Testament for the local church to share the cost of the Social Security plan for their pastor, therefore, we recommend that the Church share the cost on a 50-50 basis.
- B. We further reommend that all evangelists who tithe their ministerial income one hundred percent into the local church of which they are a member, said local church shall share the cost of the Social Security plan with them on a 50-50 basis. This shall also apply to evangelistic singers.

#### TREASURER

#### NO. 20 AUDITING THE TREASURER'S BOOKS

Be it resolved that we employ a ceritified public accountant to adit the books of the Conference Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

#### NO. 21 INSURING THE TREASURER

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer bonded.

#### YOUTH

#### NO. 22 YOUNG PEOPLE

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention.
- C. That our District Pilgrim Review be placed on a subscription basis. Single copies at 50c per year, 10 copies sent to one address, 35c per copy per year. All subscription are to expire at the end of the conference year.

#### NO. 23 MONITORS AND POLICE

We recomend that young people who receive free entertainment at our District Convention be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Futhermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

#### NO. 24 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than \$10.00 dollars be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

#### NO. 25 YOUTH CAMP

Be it resolved that where the church considers it necessary and they are financially able to do so that they consider paying the way to the Youth Camp to those youth who are unable to pay.

## Minutes of the Eastern Ohio District Youth Conference

The business meeting of the District Youth was opened with congregational singing under the direction of our Executive Youth Secretary, Rev. John Minsker.

The Conference was then turned over to the Chairman, Dr. Paul F. Elliott, Gen. Sec. of Sunday School and Youth. Bro. Elliott gave brief reports and exortation of the past and future progress of the Youth Society, explaining changes in this department that came about as a result of action taken in the past General Conference. Bro. Elliott gave a very encouraging report of the "Radio Broadcast" and urged the local Societies to acquire time on local station to promote his work.

The Executive Secretary, Rev. John Minsker, rendered a report of his activities for the year. This report was received wih a hearty Amen!

The Treasurers' report was given by Rev. Paul Harris in the absence of Rev. Virgil Miller. This report was approved and accepted.

The Zone Chairmen gave their reports as follows: Akron Zone—Rev. Harold Bughman, Columbus Zone—Rev. C. O. Watters, Jackson Zone—Rev. Dale Jones, Lancaster Zone—Rev. Paul Harris, Nelsonville Zone—Rev. Harry Russell, Portsmouth Zone—Rev. John Minsker, Toledo Zone—Rev. Ronald Travis in the absence of Rev. Paul Downey. All reports were approved.

Rev. B. A. Awe expressed appreciation for the labors of Bro. Downey in publishing the "The Pilgrim Review." Bro. Downey has left for the Mission field.

Roll call was given by the District Secretary with Pastors, Presidents, and Delegates responding to the call.

The Conference Bar was established as the first seven (7) rows of seats in the center isle. Tellers appointed were, Rev. Lashbrook, Rev. Gilkerson, Rev. O. Awe and Rev. Sherwood.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Rickner, as the aid of the Holy Spirit was sought to direct our minds in the election of officers, that the will of God might be accomplished.

The following officers were elected: District Youth President—Rev. John Minsker, Vice President—Rev. Virgil Miller, Secretary—Rev. Duane Saylor, Treasurer—Rev. Ronald Travis, Zone Leaders: Akron Zone—Rev. Charles Fletcher, Columbus Zone—Rev. Wm. Gilkerson, Jackson Zone—Rev. Wayne Irvin, Nelsonville Zone—Mr. Robert Gaston, Portsmouth Zone—Rev. Edwin Dunn, Toledo Zone—Mr. Neil Bailey, Lancaster Zone—Rev. Paul Harris.

A motion was received to set aside the rules and the Secretary was elected by a vote of acclamation.

The Conference was recessed until 1:00 p.m.

The afternoon session opened with prayer.

Rev. John Minsker reported for the Resolutions Committee. The Committee recommended Resolution No. 8 which was approved.

Rev. Duane Saylor reported for the Ways and Means Committee. The Committee recommended an amendment to Resolution No. 1 Section B, which was approved.

Rev. Minsker asked for a standing vote of appreciation for the labors of Dr. Elliott in presiding over the Conference.

A motion was made to adjourn.

### REPORT OF DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To the Fourth Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Bethel Camp Grounds at Coshocton, Ohio—

Greetings and regards to all the members and friends of this Youth Convention!

Over a year has passed by since we last met for a relative occasion. The wheels of time are losing no ground and therefore we must keep moving on in the great work that lies before us.

After the 1957 Conference we were requested by the District Council to fill the vacancy that was created by the withdrawal of our predecessor. 
