#### MINISTERIAL STUDY COURSE AGENCY

Whereas, there is an increasing need of maintaining ministerial study courses such as are provided for by the Manual and inasmuch as it seems advisable to conduct our study course in a more effective manner than is now operating, therefore be it Resolved, that the General Conference authorize the General Board to establish and maintain a central office at the denominational headquarters to conduct study courses for the benefit of the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, viz.:

- 1. Such Agency shall be known as the Ministerial Study Course Agency.
- 2. It shall exist for the purpose of assisting unordained ministers and deaconesses in completing the study courses required by the church.
- 3. This Agency shall provide a list of study course books as authorized from time to time by the General Board.
- 4. The Agency shall maintain contact by mail with each enrollee throughout each course of study and shall provide study outlines, examination questions and other appropriate information.
- 5. The Agency shall maintain adequate educational records as authorized from benefit of the enrollee and the church.
- 6. It shall be understood that this agency shall in no manner supplant the work of the examining and educational boards of the several districts, but shall cooperate with them by reporting annually on the progress of student ministers and deaconesses within their jurisdiction.
- 7. The Agency shall provide suitable transcripts and issue certificates upon the satisfactory completion of the work assigned.
  - 8. The Agency shall make reports to the General Board as may be required by that body.
- 9. The Agency shall be authorized to take all necessary steps for the conducting of its work as indicated by this resolution and may be approved from time to time by the General Board.

Be it further Resolved, that all licensed ministers and licensed deaconesses of the Pilgrim Holiness Church who are taking study course work shall be required to enroll with the ministerial Study Course Agency.

## JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING, MONDAY MORNING, AUGUST 8, 1960

The sixth annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened August 8, 1960 at 9:00 A.M. at Bethel Camp Grounds, Coshocton, Ohio. Our Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. E. E. Leadingham, called the conference to order. Members of the District Council were asked to sit on the platform, also Rev. Harold Monroe, District Superintendent of the Western Ohio District. Rev. Wm. Brown led the conference in singing, "What A Friend We Have In Jesus". Rev. Leadingham admonished us to have God's will in everything also to have God give us divine guidance and leadership. Rev. Wm. Gilkerson led in prayer. The opening service of the Conference was the Communion Service. "Must Jesus Bear The Cross Alone" was sung by the Conference. Rev. Roy Ankrim read from the scripture. I Corinthians 11:23-34. The Conference sang, "There Is A Fountain Filled With Blood", as they gathered for Communion. Rev. B. H. Pugh led in prayer, after which the District Council was served Communion by Rev. Leadingham and our General Superintendent Dr. Melvin Snyder. Rev. Gilkerson, Rev. Stiverson, Rev. O. Awe and Rev. Ankrim served the Conference. Rev. Harold Monroe dismissed the first table. There were two tables served. Rev. B. A. Awe was served by Dr. Snyder and Rev. Leadingham. Dr. Snyder dismissed the second table. God's spirit truly was felt in our midst. "Amazing Grace", was sung by the Conference.

Rev. Leadingham introduced our General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, to the Conference. He brought greetings from the other General Superintendents especially Rev. Flexon, the former General Superintendent of the area.

Dr. Snyder took the scripture lesson from Revelation 3:7-13. He spoke to us concerning the Ephesian Church. (The backslidden holiness church.) Out of these seven churches mentioned in this scripture five of them had to be corrected. This Ephesian Church was the most deceived of any church. Christ represents himself in each church in a different way. The message is different in each church. Each message was for a particular church and people. The only four things that were the same for all these seven churches are as follows:

- 1.) He that hath an ear let him hear what the spirit saith unto the churches.
  - a.) Spiritual Perceptability

We are to hear what the spirit has to say to us as a Conference. True success comes as we discern the will of God. He has a specific message for this conference.

- 2.) Him That Overcometh
  - a.) Spiritual Conflict

The only ones against us are sin and the devil. Everything is for you when you take God's way. If you do the will of God you will encounter spiritual conflict. If you are to win the victory you come through tremendous conflict, but he will take you through.

- 3.) I Know Thy Works
  - a.) God knows our works. He sees the quantity of our work. He knows the quality of our work. It is not what we are doing but why we are doing it. The motives and reasons.
- 4.) To The Angel of the Church
  - a.) Ministerial Responsibility. The pastor is called an angel. Angel is messenger. Messages are given to pastors by God, they in turn give it to the Church.
  - b.) Perceive His Tremendous Responsibility.
    - When God gives a message give it as near to his will without tampering with it one iota. It is your duty as a pastor to wait upon God until you have God's will and then preach it. God gave us ears to hear what the spirit had us to hear at this Conference. Lastly ministers were admonished to wait on God and preach as He lays it on their hearts.

Dr. Snyder prayed concluding his address.

The Roll Call of the Ordained and Licensed Ministers, Ordained Deaconesses and Lay Delegates was asked for by the Chairman.

The Reception Committee introduced the following to the Conference: Rev. and Mrs. Harold Monroe, Rev. Phillip Doyle, Rev. Harold Barton, Rev. R. Simpson, Rev. and Mrs. R. D. Brown, Rev. James Hulett, Mrs. K. C. Vance and Rev. A. Ot. Motion was made to give these people an honorary seat in the Conference Bar. Passed. Rev. Harold Monroe was asked to sit on the platform.

Motion was made that the Conference Bar be established to include the front three sections to the left of the plaform and eight rows back. The time schedule for sittings of the Conference is as follows: 8:30-12:00 2:00-5:00 7:00-10:00 This Conference Bar and Time Schedule is to be a standing rule from now on. Passed.

The District Superintendent's report was read by Rev. E. E. Leadingham, Asst. Supt. Rev. Leadingham then gave his report. Motion was made to receive these reports. These reports were accepted by the Conference.

Miss Margaret Jones read the Auditing Committee's report. This report was also accepted by the Conference. Rev. Leadingham made the announcements after which the Conference was recessed until the 2:00 Sitting. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. Siders.

#### SECOND SITTING-AUGUST 8, 1960-2:00 P.M.

Conference opened by singing "Down At The Cross Where My Saviour Died".

The Examining Board's report was given by Rev. Roy Ankrim. Motion was made to accept the committee's recommendations. Passed.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. Glenn Johnson, Rev. L. Davis, who are transferring from the Church of Christ & Christian Union, Rev. Steinhour, Mrs. Reiff and Rev. M. Dewey to the Conference.

Rev. Siders, Rev. Walter, Rev. Travis, Rev. Fletcher and Sis. Forner were given a few minutes to talk about the churches they have helped to build or purchase. These people were given a rising vote of thanks in appreciation for their work.

Treasurer's report was given by Rev. O. M. Awe. Motion was made to accept this report. Accepted.

Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report was given by Rev. E. E. Leadingham. Motion made to accept this report. Passed. The pastors and delegates from churches with 10% gain were introduced to the Conference. Rev. Snyder admonished the ministers to start a Sunday School teacher training class.

The Statistician's report was given by Rev. C. L. Fletcher. Motion made to accept this report. Accepted.

Motion made that the Tuesday morning session is to be the Ordination Service. This is to be a standing rule. Seconded and Passed.

The new church at Akron (II) whose pastor is Rev. Paul Lyons, was presented to the Conference. Motion was made to accept this Church. Passed.

The Educational and Examining Board gave their report. There were 24—First Year Licensed Ministers; 15—Second Year Licensed Ministers; and 4—Third Year Licensed Ministers. Rev. Duane Saylor and Rev. Leslie Ashcraft were recommended for ordination.

Motion was made to accept the following ministers into the Eastern Ohio Conference: Rev. R. D. Brown, Rev. Joseph Black, Mrs. K. C. Vance. Also Mrs. R. D. Brown who is an ordained Deaconess. Passed.

Mrs. O. M. Awe gave the Memorial Committee report. Motion made to accept this report. Passed. Rev. Snyder led in prayer.

Motion made that the conference send a message of condolence to Sis. Edwin Brown of Toledo, Ohio, whose husband was pastor of the East-Side Church. He passed away during Camp. Passed.

Resolution Committee gave their report. No. 4—"B" (Delete) Motion was made to accept this recommendation. Passed.

Ways and Means Committee gave their report. Page #32—#2 (Delete all of introduction excepting "Be it resolved". This recommendation was accepted. Page #33—#4—Paragraph "A"—Delete. This recommendation was accepted. Page #35—#14—Paragraph A (Mileage for District Superintendent to be changed from 6c to 7c per mile.) This recommendation was accepted. Page #36—Paragraph #17—Treasurer to receive \$500.00 per year and Secretary to receive \$250.00 per year. Accepted. Page #36—Paragraph #18—Promotional Secretary to receive \$100.00 per year. Accepted. Page #33—#3 Delete complete paragraph. Add new resolution. Motion made to amend the present resolution to include an itemized list of camp expenses. Second. The amendment was withdrawn.

Conference was recessed until Evening Session. Rev. Stiverson dismissed with prayer.

#### THIRD SITTING-August 8, 1960-7:00 P.M.

Dr. Snyder called the Conference to order. He introduced Rev. L. W. Drury to the Conference. He is representing Eastern Pilgrim College. Motion was made to give him an honorary scat in the Conference Bar. Passed. Rev. Drury led in prayer.

Resolution Committee gave their report. No. 3-"C" Page 28. (Be it resolved that no more than one Council member serve on any one committee.) Carried. No. 13 "F"—Pastors (Pastors to be allowed 2 weeks vacation, 2 weeks at camp and to hold 2 revivals.) Carried.

Pledges were then taken to go toward next year's camp in agreement with the new resolution.

Election of officers was the next order of business. Rev. Leadingham appointed the following tellers: V. Miller, G. Rowe, R. King, D. Wachenschwanz, C. Dozer, F. Baker and R. Pidcock.

Motion made to accept Rev. O. Steinhour into the conference. He transferred from the Evangelistic Tabernacle. Rev. Steinhour was granted second year license.

Rev. Snyder admonished us to have the direction of the Holy Spirit on our hearts. Also we should have the Holy Spirit guide us.

Rev. O. M. Awe was elected District Superintendent,

Motion was made that we have a standing vote of appreciation to Rev. Leadingham for his work as Acting District Superintendent.

Rev. E. E. Leadingham was elected Assistant District Superintendent.

Dismissed in prayer by Rev. H. Barton.

#### FOURTH SITTING-TUESDAY MORNING 8:30 A.M.

Rev. Snyder called the Conference to order. The order of the day was the Ordination Service. Motion was made to change the order of the service until all candidates were present. Passed. "More About Jesus" was sung by the Conference. Rev. Snyder spoke to the Conference a few minutes. The Ordination Service then followed. Rev. Ankrim led the Conference in singing "A Charge To Keep Have I". Rev. Orville Awe read from I Timothy 3 after which Rev. Siders led in prayer. Rev. M. D. Stiverson read from Titus 3: 1-11 and Rev. Wm. Brown read from I Timothy 4:1-8.

Rev. Leslie Ashcraft and Rev. Duane Saylor were presented to Dr. Snyder for ordination.

Dr. Snyder spoke to the ordinands and the conference from I Timothy 4:9-16. Speaking from verse 16.

#### 1. Warning (Take heed)

It is the minister's duty to warn the people. Christ should be the center and circumference of your preaching.

- a. Take heed to your attitude toward sin.
- b. Take heed in your attitude toward others.
  - 1. True holiness is fruitful.
- c. Take heed in your attitude toward constituted authority.
- d. Take heed to the doctrine. Doctrine of Christian religion that men are saved through faith in Christ alone.

#### 2. Exhortation

a. Continue taking heed to yourself and the doctrine. Continue to make progress. Make your insights deeper and faith stronger.

#### 3. Promise

a. Thou shalt both save thyself and them that hear thee.

This concluded his message.

Dr. Snyder asked the ordinands to stand in front of the altar with their wives along with the Ordination Committee. Those ordained were Rev. Duane Saylor and Rev. Leslie Ashcraft. The members of the conference came forward and extended the right hand of fellowship to the newly ordained ministers.

Rev. Glenn Johnson pronounced the benediction upon the Ordination Service. A five minute recess was granted. The Conference came to order by singing "Down At The Cross". Secretary's minutes were read and accepted by the conference.

Election of officers was continued. Rev. M. D. Stiverson was elected District Secretary. Rev. Wm. Brown was elected District Treasurer. The new member for the Educational and Examining Board elected by the Conference was Rev. Roy Ankrim who will serve for three years. (Dr. Snyder suggested that the Council make these two separate Boards for next year). Rev. Wm. Gilkerson was elected District Trustee by acclamation.

Evangelists presented before the conference are as follows: Rev. Clell Elliott, Rev. C. Lucas, Paul Ankrim (Singer), Rev. Robert Phillips, Rev. Martha Browning. Motion was made to approve these persons for General Evangelism.

Ways and Means Committee's report given by Rev. D. Jones. (Regarding love offering for Rev. B. A. Awe.) Conference approved this recommendation.

Motion made to reconvene at 1:30 P.M. Passed.

Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Dale Jones.

## FIFTH SITTING-AUGUST 9, 1960 1:30 P.M.

The Conference was called to order by Dr. Snyder. Rev. Harris led the Conference in singing "Come and Dine". Rev. K. C. Vance led in prayer.

The report on the election of District Council members was given. Rev. B. H. Pugh, Rev. Roy Ankrim, Rev. Wm. Gilkerson and Rev. Siders were elected. Motion made that the three receiving the next highest number of votes be nominees for the remaining member of the Advisory Council. The nominees are: Dale Jones, P. Harris, and J. Minsker. Rev. Paul Harris was elected.

The following two names were presented to the Conference as recommendation for Evangelism: K. C. Vance and Glenn Johnson. Motion made to accept these names. Passed.

Dr. Snyder presented Rev. B. A. Awe with a love offering from the Eastern Ohio Conference. "In The Sweet By and By" was sung. Many showers of blessings fell on the Conference; truly God's presence was near.

Resolution Committee: Virgil Miller reporting. Page #30—Paragraph 15 "D" (Definitely opposed to electing a Catholic President). Motion made to accept this recommendation. Accepted.

Ways and Means Committee—O. Awe reporting. Page #36—Paragraph #18. Motion made to reconsider this resolution. Passed. Motion made that we retain former specified amount given by the committee. Passed. Motion made to accept this resolution as amended. Passed.

Motion made that the Council should take care of any unfinished business and corrections, if necessary, of the minutes. Passed.

Dr. Snyder asked that all reports be sent in quarterly to the District Superintendent and he in turn will send in a composite report to the General Superintendent. He also stated that all ministers must attend the ministerial meetings.

Motion made that the Council appoint a Home Missionary Committee with one council member serving on said committee. Passed.

Resolution Committee—Rev. V. Miller reporting. Page #31 Paragraph 20. Motion was made to adopt this resolution. Carried.

Motion was made to express our appreciation to Rev. Dallas Ford for the use of his organ during camp and conference. Carried.

Motion made to adjourn. The Doxology was sung after which Dr. Snyder pronounced the benediction.

# DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT AND THE ASSISTANT DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

To Doctor Melvin Snyder, General Superintendent, Reverend B. A. Awe, District Superintendent and the Sixth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Eastern Ohio District:

Greetings in the Name of "Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood!"

Through the providence and mercy of God we have been permitted to assemble together again in the capacity of a District Conference to hear reports of the past year and to make plans for the future.

Due to the illness of our beloved District Superintendent it has been my lot to partially assume the duties of the District for the past six months, as he felt that he could not continue in this capacity, especially, as chairman. This responsibility was no small task. The members of the District Council have been so gracious in observing the churches in their respective zones and conducting annual business meetings.

Many of the pastors and churches contacted me concerning problems and business affairs. Also, correspondence and other matters have been referred to me for adjustment by the District Superintendent. It has been in the fear of God and with an eye single to God's glory that your servant has given counsel and advice in all of these matters to the best of his ability.

#### HOME-GOING

Two of our faithful and loyal ordained ministers have gone to their eternal reward during the year. Reverend N. O. Stucky, Marion, Ohio, Evangelist and Reverend Edwin Brown, pastor of Toledo Second Church.

#### DEDICATION OF NEW CHURCHES

On May 1st, the newly purchased Pilgrim Holiness Church at Fostoria, valued in excess of eighteen thousand dollars was dedicated. Reverend Ronald Travis and his people should be commended for their noble work. This was a great occasion for the Fostoria Pilgrims. The church is going forward spiritually, numerically and financially.

On July 3rd, a lovely block brick veneered church building at Ashley, valued at approximately twenty-five thousand dollars was dedicated. Much credit is due the pastor, Reverend J. R. Walter, for erecting this splendid edifice. It stands in the city of Ashley as a monument of the faith and sacrifice of the pastor and his people.

The Oak Hill congregation, under the leadership of their able pastor, Reverend J. R. Siders, erected a beautiful brick church, size forty by sixty, with a full basement and Sunday School class rooms. This lovely structure was dedicated on May 29th. The pastor and people are to be highly commended, as this church stands as a monument of their love, faith and sacrificial spirit. Value of the property \$45,000.

A new church has been purchased at Canton, worth at least fifteen thousand dollars. The Canton Pilgrims have occupied this building one month. Reverend Kenneth Forner is the pastor.

A Second Pilgrim Holiness Church has been organized at Akron by Reverend Burley Buchanan. Rev. Paul Lyons is the pastor.

#### IMPROVEMENTS

The Angel Ridge Church purchased a new floor, amounting to one-hundred and ninety-eight dollars to be paid through the Sunday School. Also, the exterior of the church has been painted and other repairs are contemplated, including some new windows. Reverend Charles Gaston is the pastor.

The Athens Pilgrim Holiness Church has redecorated the interior, by painting and a beautiful new carpet. This church has had a good year under the ministry of Reverend K. C. Vance.

The following are improvements for the Cambridge Pilgrim Holiness Church, amounting to four-hundred dollars: new heating unit, interior decorating, new front door repairs, front metal awning and a church sign. Reverend Paul Harris is the pastor.

A new church building is now under construction at Chauncey. The Reverend Ray Pidcock is the pastor.

The Columbus Second Church redecorated the church office and bought a new rug for the office. Also, purchased a parsonage, valued at \$13,000.00. The Reverend Clyde Watters is the pastor.

The Elyria Church is now worshipping in their new building, although it is not completed. The building is of beautiful brick structure. It is thirty-six by seventy with an auditorium which will seat one-hundred and fifty, four Sunday School class rooms, rest rooms, and pastor's study. This building is so constructed that it will be used as a Sunday School annex when the main structure is completed. The building will be worth approximately thirty-thousand dollars. The total indebtedness on parsonage and church is less than thirteen-thousand dollars. The Reverend Carles Fletcher is the pastor.

The interior of the newly purchased church at Fostoria has been redecorated, an altar rail installed, an organ donated by Mr. Claud Foster and a sign fifteen feet by four feet has been erected on the east side of the church, valued in excess of eight-hundred dollars. The Reverend Ronald Travis is the pastor.

The Mansfield Pilgrim Church is a recipient of a Thomas Electronic Organ given by Mr. Claud Foster. The Reverend J. H. Sherwood is the pastor.

The Marion Second Church redecorated the interior, a new tile floor was laid. Other new improvements are as follows: colored glass windows, velveteen drapes around the altar, solid birch door at the front of the church and three pulpit chairs, all at the cost of about thirteen-hundred dollars. Also, at the parsonage a new Armstrong gas furnace was installed. The Reverend Ralph King is the pastor.

The Port Clinton Church and parsonage has been painted. A nursery has been installed, a public address system in the main auditorium and they have contracted for a new annex, twenty-eight by forty. The Reverend Harold Bughman is the pastor.

The Portsmouth First Church redecorated the interior. Also, five rooms of the parsonage have been papered and a new sidewalk has been poured in the front of the parsonage. The Reverend F. H. Baker is the pastor.

The Bremen Church paid off their indebtedness on the parsonage. A new gas forced-air furnace was installed in the church. Also, remodeled and redecorated Sunday School rooms and other minor improvements. The Rev. Harry Dickerson is the pastor.

The Wheelersburg Church improvements are as follows: new Communion Table, \$125.00, new Communion set, new carpet \$150.00 also new pews were purchased for the church. The interior of the church was redecorated and the outside was newly painted. Rev. Hattie Craft is the pastor.

The Sandusky Church has their plan approved to build a super-structure. Several hundred dollars have been raised by this group to promote this project. The Rev. Eugene Jordan is the pastor.

The Cleveland Church has improved the appearance and increased the value of their property by installing new aluminum storm windows and screens, also, a new roof. By the rental of a parsonage they have been able to departmentalize the Sunday School which contributes much to the success of the school and offers room for growth.

The Nevada Church has completely rebuilt a garage into a beautifully furnished two-room parsonage with a new roof, also, siding. They are building a twenty by seventy sanctuary from an adjoining area. The Reverend Charles N. Brubaker is the pastor.

The Zanesville Church has a Sunday School bus. The Reverend Charles Roard is the pastor.

A lovely chapel for worship services has been arranged on the Bethel Camp Ground for the Coshocton Pilgrims, under the leadership of Reverend John Curry.

Improvements were also made on our camp ground. Field tile was laid to drain off the water from the ground and spouting put on the new motel style dorm, also, concrete sidewalks were poured around the motel. These were necessary and valuable improvements.

#### **EDITORIALS**

Reverend and Mrs. Paul Harris, our capable and efficient editors, should be commended for their splendid work which they have done in the publication of our District paper, "The Pilgrim Review." They have given themselves untiringly and without reserve. May God bless and reward them for their labors of love in this field of service.

#### DISTRICT YOUTH CAMP

Our Annual Youth Camp this year was a richly rewarding experience. More than two-hundred boys and girls between the ages of ten and sixteen attended. A new system of organization and outdoor assembly was set up. A flag and flagpole, sponsored by the youth was installed on the camp ground. A staff of about thirty workers gave of their time and talents in an effort to meet this wonderful challenge. The nightly services conducted by The Reverend Joe Brown and family were crowned with scores of seekers at the altar.

#### YOUTH CONVENTION

The Sixth Annual Youth Convention opened on Thursday evening, August 28th with Reverend Phillip Doyle bringing the message. On Friday there was a panel discussion on "Youth Wants To Know," followed by a demonstration on personal evangelism. Reverend Joe Brown representing the General Youth Department, spoke to the convention on Friday evening and conducted the business conference on Saturday. Reports were received from the District Youth officers and Zone leaders and some local youth presidents.

The following District and Zone officers were elected: Mr. Neil Bailey, District Youth President; Reverend Duane Saylor, District Youth Secretary; and Reverend Kenneth Beckley, District Youth Treasurer.

## REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

#### AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND AND DISTRICT BUDGET

#### NO. I BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the conference and general interests and said cards to be forwarded to the pastors as soon after Conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District Budget or United Stewardship Fund and District Budget be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budgets, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.
- D. Whereas, the General Conference has set up a United Stewardship Fund to care for a part of the expense of operating the general church, and
  - Whereas, the Manual states on Page 82, Paragraph 8 that, any pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without a good reason shall be denied voice in the annual conference, and

Whereas, this rule must be enforced beginning with our next annual conference, and

Whereas, there is a greet need that all district budgets be paid as early in the year as possible so that the district may function properly

Be it resolved, that we as a conference set the month of September as United Stewardship Fund and District Budget month.

Be it further resolved that during this month each church shall do their best to either raise in cash or pledges the total amount covering each of these items. Any church that now has a workable plan to take care of these items need not feel under any obligation to take such offerings during this month but should continue with their present plan.

#### NO. 2 CAMP SERVICES

Be it resolved that the schedule of our Camp services be so arranged as to permit one afternoon service each to be devoted to the interests of the following phases of our work, namely, Foreign Missions, General Church Extension and District Home Missions.

#### NO. 3 COMMITTEES

- A. Be it resolved that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee consist of five members and three shall be a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that no unauthorized person be permitted to present resolutions on the Conference floor. All resolutions must be cleared either with the Resolutions Committee or the Ways and Means Committee (depending on the nature of the resolution under consideration), who are the only authorized committees to present resolutions on the conference floor.
- C. Be it resolved that no more than one Council member serve on any one committee.

#### NO. 4 CONFERENCE

Be it resolved that the Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District be opened with a Communion Service for our members, delegates and friends. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a committee to arrange for this service.

#### NO. 5 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare reports for conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close July 5th.

#### NO. 6 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Be it resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches, subject to the camp dates.

#### NO. 7 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister's wife of the District, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairman and that they immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District for expense incurred.

#### NO. 8 LOAN PLAN

Be it resolved that we adopt the Pilgrim Pension, Inc., in the Eastern Ohio District for the purpose of helping churches to build.

#### NO. 9 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of the local Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. See Ministerial Study Agency. See page 14.

#### NO. 10 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio Conference have an annual Ministerial Convention. The time and place to be determined by the Council.

#### NO. 11 MISSIONS

In consideration of the need of District Home Missionary work, be it resolved that each pastor in the Eastern Ohio Conference be subject to a call by the Home Missionary Committee for a two weeks revival.

#### NO. 12 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

#### NO. 13 PASTORS

- A. Be it resolved that the churches of the Eastern Ohio District shall give first consideration to the Ministers of our conference in extending a call for their pastor. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent shall not recommend a minister outside the bounds of our district, until after a church has failed to elect a pastor from the ministers of our District.
- B. Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name at a time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living; Be it resolved that the district superintendent take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the superintendents meet with the local church boards.
- D. In order that the churches may receive credit for the full amount they contribute toward pastoral support; Be it resolved that the question of whether or not the pastor's utilities are supplied be made a part of the pastor's annual report.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.
- F. Whereas our manual makes no provision for the Pastor's vacation, Be it resolved our churches give their pastor two weeks vacation and the District Camp each year with support. Be it further resolved each pastor be permitted to accept two revivals per year.

#### NO. 14 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of District officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss such matters after election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

#### NO. 15 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Inasmuch as there are moral, physical and spiritual danger in and many perils associated with television, be it resolved that this conference go on record urging our people to guard against the evils thereof.
- C. Inasmuch as our Manual gives only two sacraments or ordinances to be observed in our churches, namely, the Lord's Supper and water baptism, Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District forbids public feet washing as part of our worship service.
- D. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as being opposed to the electing of a Catholic President.

#### NO. 16 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

- A. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Convention be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the District Sunday School Committee shall appoint committees in the various zones of the conference to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- B. Inasmuch as our District Camp is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Eastern Ohio Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- C. A few of our churches have been faithful in teaching the Sunday School lesson to their shutins, and such who are physically incapacitated, to attend the regular Sunday School sessions

of the church. This is commendable and more should be done in this direction which falls under the designation of Home department. But in order to avoid any discrepancies in the Sunday School attendance count in any of the churches, are in all fairness to every Sunday School in the District. Be it resolved that only those present in the Sunday School classes in the church be counted in total attendance for that Sunday. All others who may be taught elsewhere such as our shutins, are to be counted and entered under "Home Department" and not be included in the total count.

- D. Be it resolved that we adopt the following recommendations:
  - (1) That each Sunday School endeavor to start new Sunday School classes.
  - (2) That each Sunday School and each class set goals and strive to reach them.
  - (3) That each Sunday School adopt a system for contacting absentees.
  - (4) That each Sunday School plan weekly group visitations.
  - (5) That each Sunday School departmentalize as soon as possible.
  - (6) That much attention be given the Cradle Roll. This is a ripe field, and will pay dividends if worked.
  - (7) That at least one branch Sunday School be started by each Zone.
  - (8) That each Sunday School subscribe for the Sunday School Advance for all of the teachers.

#### NO. 17 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings if possible; however, he may authorize his assistant or the pastor to conduct this meeting.

#### NO. 18 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership—therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

#### NO. 19 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with district council members receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all members of the District Council be elected to office by secret ballot.

#### NO. 20 APPRECIATION

- A. Be it resolved; That we extend our General Superintendent, Dr. Snyder, a vote of thanks for his Christ-like spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this Conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the Assistant Superintendent, District Secretary, District Treasurer, the additional members of the District Council, the various committees, dining personnel, camp and conference registrars, organist, maintenance men, camp policemen and all others who have assisted in any way to make our conference the success it proved to be.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the Coshocton News and Rev. Paul Harris for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this camp meeting and the Conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our Conference Secretary.
- D. Above all, we do fervently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for his blessings upon us during this Camp and Conference.

#### STANDING RULES

- 1. The time schedule for sittings of the conference are:  $8:30-12:00;\ 2:00-5:00;\ 7:00-10:00.$
- 2. Conference Bar to include front three sections to the left of the platform and eight rows back.
- 3. Ordination Service to take place on the second day, fourth sitting at 8:30 A.M. of the Conference.

## REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

#### AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

#### **BUDGETS**

#### NO. 1 UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND (Formerly General Budget)

A. Be it resolved that the manual provision for the United Stewardship Fund as adopted by the 1958 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be adopted by our District Conference. (The amount of United Stewardship Fund \$8.00 per member per year, this formerly General Budget Name).

"If the local church does not properly divide the money, the conference treasurer is authorized to do so." Sec. 149, Par. 1-3, 1958 Manual.

"No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interests is paid."

- B. We recommend that the United Stewardship Fund be raised monthly in the Sunday School or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.
- C. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastors in raising the Conference Home Missionary and United Stewardship Fund.
- D. Whereas, there are some churches in our district which have a struggle to pay their United Stewardship Fund, and

Whereas, there are times when such churches have unspecified funds for both foreign missions and general extension, therefore,

Be it resolved, that any church wishing to do so may take from unspecified foreign Missionary money enough to make up that part of the United Stewardship Fund which applies to foreign Missions which is 20% of said fund.

Be it further resolved, that, this may apply to unspecified general church extension funds also, and from such funds the 14% of the United Stewardship Fund which applies to general church extension may be paid.

This can only apply when the other part of the United Stewardship Fund has been made up.

#### NO. 2 DISTRICT BUDGET

Be it resolved:

- A. That all stationed ministers pay all their tithe on wages received from their ministerial income to the District.
- B. That all unstationed licensed and ordained ministers pay 50% of their tithe from their ministerial wages to the District.
- C. That all licensed and ordained ministers not receiving income from the church pay 25% of their tithe to the District.
- D. All such tithes are to be paid to the local church treasurer and forwarded to the District Treasurer.

Be it resolved:

- E. That our District Budget be established at \$5.00.
- F. That our District Budget be set up on the percentage basis in the same manner as our United Stewardship Fund.

#### NO. 3 CAMP BUDGET (SPECIAL)

Inasmuch as it takes approximately \$4,000.00 for the operating expense of the District Camp meeting and in order to provide an efficient method of securing the necessary finances for

the District Camp meeting and one which will not detract from the spiritual purpose and will remove the pressure of immediate need and giving from both our leaders and those who attend the camp:

Be it resolved that we provide for the financial needs of the camp one year in advance by raising, during one or more services of the camp, individual voluntary pledges for this purpose to be paid during the following twelve months.

Be it further resolved that for this year only, due to the fact that this year's camp has concluded, that we raise as much money as possible during this conference and that each pastor be asked to secure pledges or cash in his local church to provide the balance needed.

#### NO. 4 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provision to alleviate the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- D. That our active ministers' children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

#### NO. 5 CHURCHES NEWLY ORGANIZED

Be it resolved that with the exception of the pastor's tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organizations; one-half of the second year; and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

#### NO. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Inasmuch as the present demand upon our District Home Missions Department by the several different churches is ever on the increase and in that the finances in this department have been and are at the present time very limited, the following recommendations are made in order that we may more effectively accomplish greater results in this field.

#### It is recommended:

- A. That all finances now going to the several different churches be withdrawn and that the entire consideration of the District Home Missions be placed in one church at a time and that said church receive such help as long as deemed necessary, but not to exceed one year's approval at a time.
- B. That the District Council along with the District Home Missions Committee decide on the church to be selected to receive such aid.
- C. That each church now receiving financial aid from the District Home Mission Department and those who will receive it in the future will receive at least a 60 day notice before any such funds are withdrawn.
- D. That the last Sunday of September be designated as District Home Missions Sunday and that this Sunday be highly advertised by the District Superintendent, District Home Missions Committee, District Paper, and any other means necessary to get the need before the people of our District.
- E. That the District Home Missions be given equal recognition in the same manner as the General Church Extension, and Foreign Missions at our annual Camp Meeting.
- F. That the pastor of the selected church and District Home Missions Committee be authorized to do District wide deputational work and that each church in the District be required to have at least one service each year.

- G. That the pastor of the selected church be given substantial aid that he might be able to give full time to the church for at least eight (8) months after such aid has started.
- H. That a quarterly report be made to the District Home Missions committee showing the progress being made and how finances (other than the pastor's support) are being spent.
- That funds raised be used to make up that portion of the District Budget which applies to District Home Missions.
- J. That the Eastern Ohio District have, what may be termed as an Emergency Reserved Army. This army to answer calls given by the District Home Missions Committee. Three enlisted persons may give any amount above \$2.00 and will not be called on more than two times in one Conference year. Those enlisted are to be recruited by the District Home Missions Committee and may re-enlist every year if they so desire. The money obtained in this manner is over and above the regular budget.

#### NO. 7 SUNDAY SCHOOL BUDGET (DISTRICT)

B. Be it resolved that each Sunday School be assessed annually the following amounts based on their average to be used for the expense of Sunday School promotional work.

The same to be paid to the District Treasurer.

#### **MINISTERS**

#### NO. 8

- A. Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local churches.

#### NO. 9 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Eastern Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church each call as it is presented to him. That the District Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Inasmuch as Resolution No. 9A provides for the enrollment of each church's pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and, inasmuch as a number of our churches have still failed to follow through on this District's legislation, be it resolved that our District Superintendent when making his first visit of the church he is visiting, has enrolled their pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association, and if not, to encourage that church to do so as soon as possible.

#### **MINUTES**

#### NO. 10 COST OF MINUTES

Be it resolved that the price of District Minutes to be left to the discretion of the District Council.

#### NO 11 PREPARING MINUTES FOR PUBLICATION

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$20.00 for services.

#### NO. 12 COST PILGRIM REVIEW

Inasmuch as our District Youth can no longer bear the expense of the Pilgrim Review, be it resolved that the expense and space of this periodical be equally shared by the District,

District Sunday School, and District Youth Treasuries. This is unanimously recommended by the Eastern Ohio District Youth Council.

#### **RECORDS**

#### NO. 13 RECORDS-SAFE

Due to the fact that we are now a separate conference, and to the fact that our conference records are valuable to us, and to the fact that a small fire could completely destroy the same, therefore

Be it resolved that the council be authorized and directed to purchase an approved safe and place it in the keeping of our District Treasurer for the safe-keeping of our records and finances.

#### **SALARIES**

#### NO. 14 DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Inasmuch as we recognize the high cost of living and the increase of traveling expenses, we recommend the following: District Superintendent Salary \$4,200.00, 7c per mile traveling expenses; parsonages; all utilities and four weeks vacation.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and his wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that dues be paid by the District Treasurer.
- C. Be it resolved that the District shall enroll the Superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan as per the plan for the local churches and their pastors, and be it further resolved that we pay the District Superintendent's Social Security.

#### NO. 14-A DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT (SPECIAL)

1. Inasmuch as our Superintendent, Rev. B. A. Awe has served the District for eleven years and has faithfully given of his service, we would like to show our appreciation as a conference by means of a love offering, either by cash or pledges, to be given within thirty days.

#### NO. 15 ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

We recommend that the Superintendent when in need of additional help in the administration of district work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$12.50 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.

#### NO. 16 DISTRICT COUNCIL

We recommend that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council for traveling to and from the council meetings.

#### NO. 17 CONFERENCE SECRETARY AND TREASURER

Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer's salary be \$500.00 and the Conference Secretary's salary be \$250.00.

### NO. 18 STATISTICIAN AND SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Be it resolved that the Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year and that the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$100.00 per year.

#### NO. 19 EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING COMMITTEE

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committee be given \$50.00 per member.

#### NO. 20 SOCIAL SECURITY

A. Whereas, Social Security has been extended to clergy, and whereas, many of the pastors of the Eastern Ohio District have elected to go into the plan, and whereas business enterprises pay 50% of the cost of the Social Security plan for their employees, and we believe it to be in keeping with the Spirit of the New Testament for the local church to share the cost of the

- Social Security plan for their pastor, therefore, we recommend that the Church share the cost on a 50-50 basis.
- B. We further recommend that all evangelists who tithe their ministerial income one hundred percent into the local church of which they are a member, said local church shall share the cost of the Social Security plan with them on a 50-50 basis. This shall also apply to evangelistic singers.

#### TREASURER

#### NO. 21 AUDITING THE TREASURER'S BOOKS

Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the Conference Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

#### NO. 22 INSURING THE TREASURER

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer bonded.

#### YOUTH

#### NO. 23 YOUNG PEOPLE

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention.
- C. That our District Pilgrim Review be placed on a subscription basis. Single copies at 50c per year, 10 copies sent to one address, 35c per copy per year. All subscriptions are to expire at the end of the conference year.

#### NO. 24 MONITORS AND POLICE

We recommend that young people who receive free entertainment at our District Convention be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

#### NO. 25 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than \$10.00 be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

#### NO. 26 YOUTH CAMP

Be it resolved that where the church considers it necessary and they are financially able to do so that they consider paying the way to the Youth Camp to those youth who are unable to pay.

To Our Chairman, Rev. Joseph Brown, our District Superintendent, and members of the 6th annual Youth Conference of the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Like a weaver's shuttle, irrecoverable time has carried us swiftly to the close of another year, leaving forever behind the opportunities of past weeks and months, whether fruitful or barren. During the past year, it has been my happy privilege to serve in the interest of Eastern Ohio Youth, and it has become a richly rewarding and thoroughly enjoyable experience. I have been able to visit each of the seven zones during these months, and have received excellent cooperation in every place from my ministerial brethren and our people, with 96% of our churches taking part in the zone rally program. A written report has been filed for every rally, and our zone leaders have achieved a district wide increase of 50% in attendance, with several churches being crowded out on these occasions. What a thrill to see our people rising to the challenge of reaching and holding the youth of our church, for on the average, fully one half of those attending are of the youth age group.

Our Annual United Zones Rally, on Memorial Day, with more than 400 in attendance in the afternoon service, was a pleasant tribute to our District Supt. Rev. B. A. Awe, who originated this event some years ago. Rev. Tommy Holshouser was our invited speaker for the day, with musical and vocal talent supplied largely from the various zone youth. On this occasion, several contestants, representing their zones, completed the District Essay Contest, and winners were selected. A fund was raised to finance the purchase of a flag and flagpole for the camp ground which has now been erected.

It was our privilege to represent our district, recently, at the National Pilgrim Youth Convention, at Winona Lake, where a team of three young ladies, sponsored by this district, carried their colors well into final competition in the National Bible Quiz Contest. First place in the National Vocal Talent Quest was taken by a team member, Miss Sharon Downey, of Columbus. A number of our teenage young people are finding places of usefulness in the local, zone and district areas of our church, thus enlarging our capacity to serve. I am finding that boys and girls are especially willing to accept the challenge of the church, when such opportunity is confidently and properly presented to them.

Our District Youth Camp is a living monument to the men who gave birth to it, and to the splendid staff of workers who have freely given of their time and talents to make it a Godhonored success. Literally scores of boys and girls sought help in the nightly services, conducted by Rev. Joe Brown and his family. It is my earnest and heartfelt conviction that, in the light of all the evidence, this is by far our most fertile and fruitful field. Our new system of group organization and outdoor assembly was well received by the boys and girls, and it promises to be an effective means of training our youth in group cooperation and leadership.

A number of our Youth Societies have now received their charters, and plans are being made to expand our efforts in this area. I am humbled, however, by the realization that we are only scratching the surface in reaching large numbers of boys and girls outside the four walls of our churches. I know God wants us to have them.

Unholy political and religious alliances are casting their lengthening shadows across our nation . . . we must plan well, and start soon, and we must direct our efforts where they will do the most good, as we endeavor to be faithful to our generation. With a heart filled with gratitude, may I express my deepest appreciation to you who continue in prayers and in labors in the interest of this most urgent and needy work.


