MINISTERIAL STUDY COURSE AGENCY

Whereas, there is an increasing need of maintaining ministerial study courses such as are provided for by the Manual and inasmuch as it seems advisable to conduct our study course in a more effective manner than is now operating, therefore be it Resolved, that the General Conference authorize the General Board to establish and maintain a central office at the denominational headquarters to conduct courses for the benefit of the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church viz.:

- 1. Such Agency shall be known as the Ministerial Study Course Agency.
- 2. It shall exist for the purpose of assisting unordained ministers and deaconesses in completing the study courses required by the church.
- 3. This Agency shall provide a list of study course books as authorized from time to time by the General Board.
- 4. The Agency shall maintain contact by mail with each enrollee throughout each course of study and shall provide study outlines, examination questions and other appropriate information.
- 5. The Agency shall maintain adequate educational records as authorized from benefit of the enrollee and the church.
- 6. It shall be undershtood that this agency shall in no manner supplant the work of the examining and educational boards of the several districts, but shall cooperate with them by reporting annually on the progress of student ministers and deaconesses within their jurisdiction.
- 7. The Agency shall provide suitable transcripts and issue certificates upon the satisfactory completion of the work assigned.
 - 8. The Agency shall make reports to the General Board as may be required by that body.
- 9. The Agency shall be authorized to take all necessary steps for the conducting of its work as indicated by this resolution and may be approved from time to time by the General Board.

Be it further Resolved, that all licensed ministers and licensed deaconeses of the Pilgrim Holiness Church who are taking study course work shall be required to enroll with the ministerial Study Course Agency.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING, TUESDAY EVENING, JULY 25, 1961.

The Seventh Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened July 25, 1961 at 7:00 O'clock P.M. at Bethel Camp Grounds, Coshocton, Ohio. The District Superintendent Rev. O. M. Awe made brief but fitting remarks at the opening of the conference.

The first order of service of the Conference was the Communion Service.

Rev. Roy Ankrim led the conference in singing while Mrs. Esther Stiverson played the Conn organ. Following the song service, the Rev. William Brown led the conference in prayer. The District Superintendent asked two of the council members to read the scripture. Rev. William Gilkerson read from the New Testament in First Corinthians 11:23-34 and Rev. E. Leadingham read a portion in Luke 22:14-20.

The District Superintendent introduced the General Superintendent Rev. Dr. Melvin Snyder. Dr. Snyder used this portion of scripture in Luke for the Communion meditation. Emphasis was placed upon "Before I Suffer." He spoke of "His desire to eat supper with you (early disciples)". He stated they knew Jesus but "you know him better than they (disciples) because of the Holy Spirit dwelling in you". Christ knew all of their limitations (and yours) knowing they were human. He stated the Old Testament sacrifice was finished, thus bringing in the New Testament sacrifice, Christ, Who is the perfect sacrifice, shedding His blood for the sins of the world.

Dr. Snyder asked the congregation to stand in reverence to Christ. While standing the congregation sang "At the Cross". The General Superintendent and the District Superintendent then served the District Council communion and in turn the Assistant Superintendent and District Secretary served communion to the General Superintendent and the District Superintendent. These then were dismissed with prayer. The ministers were served communion by the District Council after which the Lay Delegates and friends were served communion. There was an Holy ecstasy over the entire conference. The Communion service was then closed with singing the song "My Desire", the conference retiring to their seats.

The District Superintendent then introduced Rev. Dr. Snyder the General Superintendent who presided over the conference as Conference Chairman. Rev. Snyder then gave his address to the conference speaking from the scripture Matthew 8:5-13. His Theme was "The Miracle of the Centurion".

The real miracle was not the healing but the Centurion himself. The grandest lesson on faith in the Bible. Jesus says, "I have not found so great Faith, No, not in Israel". He even ruled out his own mother, even though she was selected by the Courts of heaven.

She must have had some faith. Think of the stigma she had to bear. Under all she said "My spirit rejoices".

John the Beloved was ruled out, though he was in the inner circle. Jesus said that the Centurion had more faith than John. He may have been speaking of all Israel. It seems it took Jesus by surprise that the Centurion had so much faith. He marvelled at his faith. The Centurion was a wealthy person for he built a synagogue for the people. He did it not for show, he was a business man. Doctors and lawyers argued if Jesus was the man He should be, but this man came to see for himself. We should be willing to listen to a man that the Lord has marvelled at his faith.

- 1. This man had a faith that was exercised in humility.
 - A. Before he makes a request Jesus said I'll come and heal him. He knows all about us. He knew what was in his heart.
- 2. He had a faith that worked by love.
 - A. He did not come for a personal need but for a servant.
- 3. He had a faith that recognized authority.
 - A. God is a God of constituted authority.
 - B. True faith recognizes constituted authority.

4. This kind of faith gets what it goes after.

A. We had better stick to the Bible, that's what we will be judged by.

B. Study for a faith that works.

Congregation then sang "I'll live for Him". The roll call of ministers, ordained deaconesses and lay delegates was then given.

Motion was amended to read as follows regarding the conference bar: Motion was made that the Conference Bar be established to include the front three sections to the left of the platform and eight rows back including the platform.

The time schedule for sittings of the Conference for Wednesday July 26, 1961 was as follows: 9:00-12:00 A.M., 1:30-5:00 P.M. and 7:00-10:00 P.M.

Standing rule for time schedule for sittings of the Conference is as follows: 8:30-12:00 A.M., 2:00-5:00 P.M., 7:00-10:00 P.M.

Miss Margaret Jones then read the Auditing Committee's report. This report was accepted by the conference. Those serving on this committee were Mrs. Roy Ankrim and Miss Margaret Jones.

Motion was then made and carried that we adjourn. We were dismissed in prayer by Sister Esther Wolfe.

SECOND SITTING-JULY 26, 1961 9:00 A.M.

Conference opened by singing "Showers of Blessing", led by Rev. Ankrim with Sister Esther Stiverson playing the organ.

Rev. Snyder asked all to stand for prayer and he called on Rev. Ralph King to lead in prayer after which the 145th Psalm was read. Responsive reading was had with Rev. Stiverson and Rev. Gilkerson reading interspersed with the conference reading.

Motion made and carried that we dispense with the roll call but mark late those that did not answer in the first sitting.

Due to the fact that the minutes were not ready to be read (Rev. Stiverson having to attend Special Council meetings) the minutes were not read at this sitting.

The Reception Committee, Rev. Harry Dickerson and Rev. Joseph Black, introduced the following to the Conference: Rev. J. D. Webb. Motion was made that we give Rev. J. D. Webb an honorary seat in the Conference Bar. Motion carried.

The Educational and Examining Board gave their report. There were eighteen First Year Licensed Ministers; fifteen second year licensed ministers; four third year licensed ministers. Gale Monk, Logan, Ohio, Charles Roark, Zanesville, Ohio, Mrs. Hattic Craft, Wheelersburg, Ohio and Mrs. Martha Browning. Barberton, Ohio, were recommended for ordination. Mrs. Leola Dozer, Baltimore, Ohio was recommended for Deaconess license, second year.

Motion made and seconded that we accept the report of the Examining and Educational Committee and that their recommendations be approved. Motion carried.

The District Superintendent's report was read by Rev. O. M. Awe.

Motion was made and carried that we receive the District Superintendent's report with deep appreciation. Motion carried.

The Assistant District's Superintendent's report was then read by Rev. E. E. Leadingham. Motion made that we receive the Assistant's District Superintendent's report with appreciation. Motion seconded and carried.

District Treasurer's report was then given by Rev. William Brown. Motion made and seconded that we accept the report with appreciation. Motion carried.

Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report was given by Rev. E. E. Leadingham. Motion made and seconded to accept this report. Motion carried. The pastors, superintendents and delegates were introduced to the conference which had a 5% or more gain in their church this year. They were presented with ribbons designating the per cent of gain. Certificates were also presented to those with greatest numerical gain. The Decade of Progress 1960-1970 trophy was presented to Rev. C. E. Jones, Pastor of the Jackson church for making the most progress this year.

Rev. Leadingham then expressed his appreciation for all the splendid work done by each church represented.

Dr. Snyder congratulated each of the workers for their fine work. "These things do not just happen", he stated also "that in order to lead men you have to have an idea". "The best place to get these ideas is on your knees". He admonished all to keep up the good work.

The pastors within the conference were then called upon to give a report of what God is doing for their respective churches. Due to expiration of time the reports would continue next sitting.

Announcements were then made regarding the Book Room. It was announced that the third sitting was to start at 1:30 P.M. We were dismissed with prayer.

THIRD SITTING-JULY 26, 1961 1:30 P.M.

Conference opened by singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" led by Rev. Roy Ankrim with Sister Stiverson playing the Conn Organ. Rev. O. M. Awe then called on Rev. Charles Lucas to lead in prayer.

The Memorial Committee composed of Mrs. R. D. Brown and Mrs. M. D. Stiverson reported. Mrs. R. D. Brown gave the Memorial Committee report and at the time of reading Sister M. D. Stiverson played softly on the organ.

Memoriams were read for Rev. Edwin Brown and Rev. Floyd Childs. At this time Rev. O. M. Awe sang a solo entitled, "Close to Thee". The presence of the Lord was felt as Rev. Awe rendered this song. Mrs. Brown then read a poem entitled "Goodbye", after which she read the memoriam for Rev. B. A. Awe. She concluded her report by reading another poem entitled "Tho Dead, Yet Speaketh".

Motion made and seconded that we accept the Memorial report as presented by Mrs. R. D. Brown and Mrs. M. D. Stiverson. Motion carried.

Dr. Snyder then led the conference in prayer.

Minutes were then read. Motion made, seconded that we approve minutes as read with correction. Motion carried.

Rev. O. M. Awe announced that due to the fact that Virgil Miller has transferred he was appointing Rev. John Minsker as Chairman of Resolutions Committee.

The Statistician's report was given by Rev. C. L. Fletcher. Motion made and seconded to accept this report with appreciation. Motion carried.

It was suggested by Dr. Snyder that churches not sending in a report to the statistician be called before the council to answer as to "why not". He emphasized that it was very important that these reports be turned in quarterly.

The pastors' reports were then continued until 3:15 P.M. at which time Dr. Snyder called a recess for 15 minutes. After recess, conference was called to order by Rev. R. D. Brown leading in singing the song "Come and Dine" with Sister Ada White at the organ.

Rev. Snyder then announced that Ordination Service would be held at 7:00 P.M. this evening.

Dr. Snyder admonished the churches to give their money to the United Stewardship fund before specifying a specific department since this fund is divided up in all the various departments of the church.

The Pastors' reports were continued.

Dr. Snyder then called for any announcements. Rev. Minsker announced he would like to meet with the Resolutions Committee at 6:00 P.M. in the tabernacle.

Rev. M. D. Stiverson announced that the Pocket Credentials were ready to be given out.

Due to expiration of time, conference was adjourned by Rev. Ashcraft dismissing with prayer.

FOURTH SITTING-WEDNESDAY, JULY 26, 1961 7:00 P.M.

The order of the day was the ordination service. Conference convened by Rev. O. M. Awe leading in prayer. Rev. Ankrim led in singing "A Charge to Keep Have I" as Sister Stiverson played the organ. Rev. B. H. Pugh then led in prayer followed by the congregation singing "Rock of Ages".

Rev. O. M. Awe then presented to Dr. Snyder the ordinands as follows: Mrs. Hattie Craft,

Mrs. Martha Browning, Charles Roark and Gale Monk. These were recommended by the Educational and Examining Board and passed by the conference. Rev. Snyder then asked the following ministers to read the scripture: Rev. E. E. Leadingham read 1 Tim. 3rd Chapter; Rev. Gilkerson read 2nd Timothy 4:1-8 and Rev. Harris read Titus 3:1-11.

Dr. Snyder then spoke to the ordinands and the conference from Second Chronicles 16th Chapter verses 1-11. He stated that any minister should be surprised if any church would call him to pastor or preach. We can have a perfect heart and not a perfect head. God has called us to be successful not failures. His message was divided into three parts:

- 1. God wants a man quiet enough to hear his voice. (Have a message for your people).
- 2. God is looking for a man or woman who is courageous enough to deliver his message.
- 3. God wants a man that is honest enough to live it. (God wants you to be faithful to all your people, but you must be bigger than them all.)

Dr. Snyder with the Council then ordained into the ministry the above mentioned ordinands. The members of the conference came forward and extended the right hand of fellowship to the newly ordained ministers. Dr. Snyder then admonished us to pray for the newly ordained ministers as they go forth. Rev. M. D. Stiverson pronounced the benediction upon the ordination service.

The Conference then came to order. Rev. M. D. Stiverson read the minutes of the last two sittings. Motion was made and carried that we accept minutes as corrected.

The remaining pastors' reports were then continued and finished those that were present. Announcements were then made. Dr. Snyder announced that the conference would convene at 8:30 A.M. Thursday morning.

Due to expiration of time, conference was dismissed with prayer by Rev. C. E. Jones.

FIFTH SITTING--THURSDAY, JULY 27, 1961-8:30 A.M.

Conference opened by singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms".

Rev. O. M. Awe then called on Rev. Lloyd Davis to lead in prayer. Dr. Snyder then asked Rev. Tommy Holshouser to come to the platform along with the quartet "Kings Ambassadors". Rev. Holshouser introduced the quartet after which they rendered two numbers "Amazing Grace" and "Springs of Living Waters".

Motion was made, seconded and carried that we give Rev. Holshouser an honorary seat in in the bar.

Minutes were then read and approved.

Motion made, seconded and carried that we set 1:30 P.M. as the time to elect officers for the coming year.

The Resolution Committee reported as follows: (Rev. John Minsker reporting.)

Page 28, No. 1 Budgets (D) delete "Whereas this rule must be enforced beginning with our next annual conference". Motion made to delete. Seconded and passed.

No. 15 Standards. Motion made, seconded and carried to delete (D).

No. 16 Sunday School Promotion. Delete (A) and substitution made as read by Rev. Minsker,

The Chairman then introduced the following evangelists to the conference: Mrs. Martha Browning, Rev. K. C. Vance, Rev. Clifford Jolley, Rev. B. H. Pugh. Rev. O. L. Steinhour, Rev. C. E. Lucas. The aforementioned evangelists then were asked by the Chairman to give reports on their work done this year. Rev. Snyder then stated that life answers to life and quoted "Sanctify them that the world may know that thou has sent me", after which we all stood and sang "What a Friend we Have in Jesus".

The Ways and Means Committee reported as follows: (Rev. Eugene Jordan reporting).

Pg. 32 No. 1 (A) delete "this formerly General Budget Name". Motion made, seconded and carried.

Add (G) as read by Rev. Jordan. Motion made, seconded and carried.

Page 32 Camp Budget (Special) delete second full paragraph Page 33 entirely. (This to be done editorially).

Page 35 District Superintendent No. 14 delete editorially.

This concluded the Ways and Means Committee report.

The Memorial Committee then reported with Rev. E. E. Leadingham reporting for the Council as follows:

Section 53, 1, 2, 3 and 4. Motion made and carried that this be taken to General Council. Section 126—Assigning Areas 1. This motion lost. (Voted by show of hands).

Section 58-Local Church Board. Motion made, seconded and carried to accept as read by Rev. E. E. Leadingham.

Motion made and carried that we rescind the former action of the day to begin the election of officers at 1:30 P.M. and proceed immediately with the election.

Tellers were appointed as follows: Rev. John Minsker, Rev. William Gilkerson, Rev. C. O. Watters, Rev. Alonzo Hill, Rev. Ralph King, Rev. Roy Ankrim, Rev. C. E. Jones and Rev. Joseph Black.

Dr. Snyder led in prayer asking God's blessing on the electing of officers.

Rev. O. M. Awe was elected District Superintendent.

Rev. E. E. Leadingham was elected Assistant District Superintendent. Council's nominees for secretary were then read as follows: Rev. M. D. Stiverson and Rev. C. E. Jones.

Due to expiration of time a motion was made and carried to prolong the meeting long enough to cast another ballot for District Secretary as the first ballot did not give enough for an election. Meeting was dismissed after casting of this ballot with Rev. Holshouser dismissing in prayer.

SIXTH SITTING-THURSDAY-JULY 27, 1961 1:30 P.M.

Conference opened by singing "Everyday with Jesus" and "For God so Loved the World". Rev. R. D. Brown lead in prayer.

The Reception Committee then introduced Rev. Whitmore to the conference. Motion was made and carried that we give Rev. Whitmore a seat within the conference bar.

Rev. Snyder then introduced Rev. Melvin Dieter, President of Eastern Pilgrim College to the conference. Motion was made and carried that we give him a seat within the Conference Bar.

Rev. Dieter expressed appreciation for what the Eastern Ohio District had done for E.P.C. and admonished us to keep up the good work. He stated that we should start interesting our young people in going to college in their younger years so that when they reach college age they will want to go to college. E.P.C. is a Christian college with a Christian atmosphere and a good college for all young people to attend.

Dr. Snyder then admonished us to stand behind our school as it belongs to us as much as to any other district.

The next order of business was the reading of the results of the balloting for District Secretary and District Treasurer. (Ballots were counted privately by tellers after dismissal of the morning session).

Rev. William Brown reelected District Treasurer.

There were not enough ballots for an election of the District Secretary. At this time Rev. M. D. Stiverson withdrew his name which necessitated the council making further nominations for the office of District Secretary.

Motion was made and carried that conference recess for ten minutes.

Conference convened again after recess. Nominations for District Secretary were read as follows: Rev. W. V. Gilkerson and Rev. C. E. Jones.

Ballots were cast and Rev. C. E. Jones was elected District Secretary.

Rev. Stiverson then expressed his appreciation of confidence the district had placed in him, being the first secretary of the district. He thanked the District for the cooperation given to him and the council while he had been secretary and he also stated that he knew Rev. C. E. Jones would make a good District Secretary.

Nominees for the Examining Board were then read as follows: Rev. E. E. Leadingham and Rev. Jason Sherwood. Rev. E. E. Leadingham was elected by a plurality vote.

Motion made and carried unanimously that we elect Rev. E. E. Leadingham as Trustee.

Nominations were then read for the Pilgrim Review as follows: Rev. Paul Harris and Harold Bughman, Rev. Paul Harris was elected as Pilgrim Review Editor.

District Council presented a resolution in connection with the District Home Missionary program. Due to the impractibility of the District Home Missions program as outlined in Resolution No. 6, Page 33 of the minutes.

Be it resolved that this entire resolution be deleted from the minutes and that the District Home Missionary program become the responsibility of the District Council. Moved, seconded and carried.

Educational Board was elected as follows: Reverends Harry Dickerson—3 years; R. D. Brown—2 years; William Brown—1 year.

Advisory Council members elected as follows: Reverends Roy Ankrim, William V. Gilkerson, Paul Harris, B. H. Pugh and M. D. Stiverson.

Ministerial Delegates to the General Assembly—Ballots were cast for ministerial delegates from the ordained ministers list as follows: (The first ten are the delegates and the following ten are the alternates).

Ministerial Delegates are as follows: Reverends John Minsker, Roy Ankrim, W. V. Gilkerson, Dale Jones, Harry Dickerson, R. D. Brown, Paul Harris, Duane Saylor, M. D. Stiverson and B. H. Pugh.

Alternate Ministerial Delegates are as follows:

Reverends Ronald Travis, K. C. Vance, Harold Bughman, Mrs. Hattie Craft, H. L. Ferguson, J. H. Sherwood, J. R. Siders and Alonzo Hill. There was a tie vote on Rev. Ralph King and Rev. J. R. Walters so another ballot had to be cast to break the tie.

Lay Delegates nominations to the General Conference were made as follows: Mrs. Howard Stang, Mr. Robert Christian, Mrs. Myrtle Hall, Mrs. Pearl Bennett, Mrs. Ruth Maloney, Mrs. Blanche Schein, Mr. Neil Bailey, Mr. Froman Gallihue, Miss Margaret Jones, Mr. Carlos Buckley, Mr. Robert Sharp, Miss Leana Hacker, Mrs. Dorothy Parks, Mrs. Esther Wolfe and Mr. Jack Hudnell.

The following Lav delegates were elected to the General Conference:

Mr. Neil Bailey, Miss Margaret Jones, Mrs. Howard Stang, Miss Leana Hacker, Mrs. Esther Wolfe.

Motion made and carried that we extend time since this last session. Alternate delegates were elected as follows: Mrs. Ruth Maloney, Mr. Robert Christian, Mr. Pearl Bennett, Mrs. Myrtle Hall and Mr. Carlos Buckley.

Rev. Snyder then introduced to the conference Rev. M. L. Goodman, who said a few words to us of encouragement.

Motion made and carried that Rev. Goodman have an honorary seat in the Conference bar.

Motion was made by Robert Sharp that inasmuch as it is customary to have a report from the secretary, Sunday school superintendent and the treasurer of each local church at each board meeting, be it resolved that the pastor render a report to his board on calls on members, non-members, hospital calls, sermons preached and other activities related to his local church each month.

The above motion seconded. Motion carried that this be sent as a memorial to the General Conference.

Dr. Snyder then expressed his pleasure in being able to preside over the conference. He stated that we have had a good conference and that God had poured out his blessings on us as a conference. He stated it would be probably about four years before he came this way again and he expressed his appreciation for all that was done for him.

Rev. Stiverson then requested that Rev. Paul Harris read Resolution on Page 31, Number 20 on Appreciation.

Rev. O. M. Awe, announced that the Memorial Committee would remain the same: Mrs. R. D. Brown and Mrs. M. D. Stiverson.

He also announced that the Reception Committee remain the same: Rev. Harry Dickerson, Rev. Frederick Baker.

Statistician would also remain the same, being Carles Fletcher.

Motion made and carried that we recess until 6:30 P.M.

SEVENTH SITTING-THURSDAY JULY 27, 1961 6:30 P.M.

Conference convened again at 6:30 P.M. by singing "Amazing Grace" Rev. Harry W. Dickerson led the singing. Rev. Eugene Jordan then led in prayer.

The results of the balloting for Ministerial alternate delegates were as follows: Rev. Ralph King and Rev. J. R. Watters were elected in that order.

Motion was made that the council should take care of any unfinished business and corrections, if necessary, of the minutes. Seconded and carried.

Motion made and carried that we adjourn the conference by singing the Doxology. Dr. Snyder dismissed in prayer.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, to the District Council, Pastors, Delegates, and friends of the Seventh Annual Conference of the Eastern District of Ohio of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings.

It is with mingled feelings that we approach you this day recognizing that many things dear to our heart has become history as we are now on the threshold of a new conference year. What accomplishments may have been this year, to God be all the praise. May our fine pastors and laymen be praised for any effort that has made anything outstanding. Each years work should be a step towards greater strength in winning men and women to God. It is for this purpose that we exist as a church.

SPIRITUAL CONDITION

It is not enough to just remind ourselves that the forces of sin are very active, but keep in mind that the forces of God are constantly moving on to blessing and victory through the abundant power of the Spirit of God.

A number of the churches have experienced spirit-filled revivals, others have reported special seasons of refreshment that has brought some wonderful victories. Where organized lay-visitation has been a part of the local church program, it has shown gradual but steady dividends in the promotion of the Lord's cause. We recognize that a few pastors have given a note of discouragement and need help, while on the other hand the victories of others causes us to rejoice with them. We trust it a challenge to everyone that there is a work to be done, a soul to be won. In this troubled day a deep need of spiritual alertment must ever be on us that the matter of indifference and materialism do not crowd out the real purpose of our existence.

NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS DEDICATED

On September 11, 1960, a fine new brickcrete structure at Fremont, plus new seating, was dedicated. Rev. Melvin Snyder, our General Superintendent, brought a challenging message. A work was organized there on February 8, 1959, with Rev. Dallas Ford as Pastor. On June 18, 1961, this work became known as the B. A. Awe Memorial Pilgrim Holiness Church. Rev. E. E. Leadingham ably spoke in that service. The uncompleted permanent heating system is expected to be completed in the near future.

On January 29, 1961, a new cement block structure at Chauncey, Ohio was dedicated to the service of God in that community. The work was begun under the ministry of Rev. Ray Pidcock, and was completed under the supervision of the present pastor, Rev. Chas. Hook. New seats have been added, basement classrooms and rest rooms have lately been completed.

On June 25, 1961, it was our happy privilege to dedicate the fine new brick structure at Mansfield all complete with new furniture, classrooms, nursery, a Claude Foster Thomas Organ, and an Estey Grand Piano placed in memory of Mrs. E. Gillum by her children. A cement block garage was constructed at the parsonage also. Rev. Duane Saylor is the pastor.

On June 18, at Port Clinton a fine new brickcrete Educational unit was dedicated in memory of Rev. N. O. Stuckey. This unit was adjoined to the present building providing a Youth Auditorium and classrooms with opening into the main Auditorium. New church furniture has been purchased, a hot water heating system installed. The entire property has been redecorated inside and out. Rev. Harold Bughman is the pastor.

MORTGAGE BURNING

On January 8, 1961, a mortgage-burning service was held at Toledo-East church where Rev. Richard Grogg is the pastor. A new piano was purchased at this time in memory of Rev. Edwin Brown the former pastor and founder of the church.

MAJOR IMPROVEMENTS

Akron First church has purchased a fine home for a parsonage next door to the church. It is valued at \$10,200.00. We are glad with Rev. and Mrs. H. L. Fuller and their people that this could be done. It is a fine asset to the work there.

Athens has purchased a Sunday school bus which has proved a help in their increasing membership in both Sunday school and church.

Baltimore has purchased a new forced-air furnace, put in hard-wood floors, and added 3 additional Sunday school rooms, plus additional pews and pulpit furniture.

Barberton First has purchased two lots adjoining the church. Plans are to construct a much needed educational unit for this growing church.

Barberton Mt. Summit has a fine new building that was dedicated last fall. Rev. J. D. Abbott gave the sermon due to the fact we were unable to be present. Rev. W. E. Honeycutt is the pastor there.

Bremen has purchased additional ground and surfaced it for a parking lot, also constructed 2 new Sunday school rooms with tile floor.

Cambridge has purchased some much needed pews to replace their worn out opera seats. These are used ones but fill an important place for the Pilgrims there.

Columbus First has purchased a fine church model Hammond organ. It was dedicated recently in memory of Rev. B. A. Awe, former pastor of the church, also District Superintendent.

Come to Columbus Second church, they will furnish you with plenty of hot water with their newly installed hot water heater. Also the steps at the entrance have been covered with a fine set of rubber treads.

Danville has purchased new siding for the parsonage along with other repair work making it a very fine presentable home.

Fostoria who purchased a fine church building in the Conference year of 1958-59 have as of Feb. 1960 purchased a fine dwelling for a parsonage just two blocks from the church. Since purchasing it, the redecorating inside and out has raised the market value approximately \$1500.00. A small bus has been purchased recently to accommodate the growing Sunday school.

We want to rejoice with Ironton that they have paid \$1600.00 on their loan.

Jackson has had an outstanding spirit of revival that has made it possible for their wishes to come true and a fine structure is in the process of building with the anticipation of being in this 350 seating capacity church by September 15.

Lancaster First has constructed a long needed parsonage for the work there. Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Sherwood were permitted to move in last Nov. 1960. All the landscaping and other details are in completion.

Marion Second church has taken on a new look with its bell tower on the roof, aluminum siding outside and new wall panel on the inside, a public-address system and a nursery. Plans are in the making for additional Sunday school rooms and youth auditorium.

When you go to our McCluney church park your car on their new parking lot.

Murray City have two Sunday school rooms under construction. These are within the existing auditorium.

Nevada has made way for a fine parking lot at the rear of the church, also within the present building have added two classrooms and purchased a furnace.

Newark held the first service in their new sanctuary on July 17, 1960. Since then class-rooms have been constructed in the older side of the church. \$1500.00 in work and material have been furnished without cost to the work there. Let us thank the Lord with them.

Portsmouth Second has done some paying off of indebtedness plus purchasing a Hammond spinet model organ and placed in operation a public-address system.

A number of other churches along with the ones mentioned have done a great deal of redecorating to both church and parsonage in their respective areas. Some of these have been quite extensive and we appreciate the work being well done.

We must mention too that in our notes from the pastors both verbal and by letter there are spiritual victories worth calling our attention to. One church mentioned as much as a 27 member gain. Another church has doubled their membership. THIS MEANS VICTORY, SOME SOULS HAVE FOUND GOD THROUGH THE YEAR. May God bless and reward every pastor for their labors in this great harvest field.

He is survived by his wife, Ruth, two sons, one daughter and four grandsons.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

To the 7th Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Eastern Ohio District: Greetings in the precious Name of Jesus:

This day is the climax of another year in the Sunday school work of our District. Another chapter has been written. As I prepared this report, I have been reminded of the swiftness of time; how short this past year seems to have been. As we look back across the months, perhaps many of us might recall stiff encounters with the enemy, but we are not concerned about the past battles, we are rejoicing over the victories won.

Soon after accepting this office again last year, the matter of better organization and improvement in our District Promotional Program gave us much concern. Feeling that our Sunday schools needed more attention, and would appreciate assistance with their problems, and help in promotion, the District Sunday School Board, early last fall, unanimously decided to organize the Sunday school work on the zone level. A committee of four were appointed in each zone, the Youth President of each zone was made a member of the committee. This plan was adopted in harmony with present district legislation, and with full knowledge and consent of the District Superintendent, who is a member of the District Sunday School Board. One member of each committee was designated as Sunday School Zone Leader.

Since many of our teachers and officers do not have the privilege of attending Sunday School Conventions, we felt that the zone committees would be a real asset in informing, encouraging and helping to promote the Sunday schools.

In general the plan was well accepted. The committees were faithful in performing their duties as much as they could. A few of them were unable to work at the job as they desired, because of pressing matters at the home church. The progress made and the results were encouraging especially, in the smaller Sunday schools.

We also feel that the listing of the Sunday school of "The Month" and "The Teacher of the Month," plus listing the Gold Star and Star Sunday Schools in the "Pilgrim Review" have been helpful.

In order to further assist the Sunday schools, the District Sunday School Board prepared five-year class record attendance sheets and made them available to all schools free of charge.

We have not made fabulous gains. However, we have made some gains each year. You will note we have gone over the five-thousand mark in average weekly attendance. We are indeed grateful to God for this and it is through your loyal support and cooperation this has been made possible.

The District Treasurer reports show one hundred and ninety-seven dollars and six cents in the treasury. Attendance 1960—4796; attendance 1961—5009; numerical gain of 213; percentage gain, five percent. SUNDAY SCHOOL OF THE YEAR, NUMERICALLY, Marion Second—average weekly gain thirty-four, Reverend Ralph King, Pastor; Glen Park, Sunday School Superintendent. SUNDAY SCHOOL OF THE YEAR, PERCENTAGE-WISE, Nevada—150 percent, Reverend H. L. Ferguson, Pastor, Gilbert Buckley, Sunday School Superintendent. TEACHER OF THE YEAR, Clair Parsons, Columbus Second, average weekly gain, thirty. Fortynine Sunday Schools paid their budget in full; thirty-six made gains; seventeen made 10% gain or more.

PERSONAL REPORT

I attended the Sunday School Leader's Conference in Indianapolis, Indiana. Presided over two District Sunday School Board Meetings; six zone committee meetings; held a combination Sunday School and evangelistic service in the Southern Zone; traveled approximately 2,500 miles; put out the monthly report; endeavored to promote the entire Sunday School program, both General and District; have taken care of all the business pertaining to the office of the Promotional Secretary.

In closing, I wish to take this opportunity to sincerely thank every Pastor, Sunday School Superintendent, Teacher and Officer, The District Sunday School Board and the zone committees for your loyalty, prayers and cooperation. I should also like to say that it has been a real pleasure indeed to serve you in this capacity. However, this is my final report as Promotional Secretary. I pray that God, Himself, may continue to richly bless you one and all—I most earnestly wish my successor, whoever he may be, wonderful success.

MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

MEMORIAL No. 1

THE CALLING AND CHANGING OF PASTORS

Section 53, 1. An ordained or licensed minister may be called to the pastorate of a local church, or circuit, by a majority vote of all the church members voting. These shall vote at a church meeting duly called for that purpose, provided that said minister has been recommended to the church by the district superintendent and a two-thirds vote of the local church board. The initial call of the pastor may be for either one or two years. The minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the second Sunday following the district conference (Section 60, 1 (2).

2. The call of a pastor may be renewed for the second and each succeeding year of his pastorate, without the nomination of the church board, by a majority vote by ballot of all church members voting, at a meeting duly called for this purpose.

3. (Unchanged)

4. It is hereby provided that a local church may, when renewing pastoral relations at a church meeting duly called for that purpose, by a majority vote by secret ballot of the church members voting extend the call for two, three, four, or five years. The above is true only on condition that such extended call has been recommended by the district superintendent and a two-thirds vote of the church board. The pastor accepting such an extended call shall be placed under obligation to fulfill the terms of the call, unless he is released by the church and district council.

MEMORIAL No. 2

LOCAL CHURCH BOARD

Section 58. Recognizing the importance of the youth president and missionary president, be it therefore resolved that these two officers, by virtue of their office, be members of the local church board.

MEMORIAL No. 3

THE DUTIES OF THE PASTOR

Section 54, 1, (16) Inasmuch as it is customary to have a report from the secretary, the Sunday school superintendent, and the treasurer of the local church at each local board meeting;

Be it resolved that the pastor render a report each month to his board on calls on members, calls on non-members, hospital calls, sermons preached, and other activities related to his local church.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND AND DISTRICT BUDGET

NO. 1 BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the conference and general interests and said cards to be forwarded to the pastors as soon after Conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District Budget or United Stewardship Fund and District Budget be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budgets, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.
- D. Whereas, the General Conference has set up a United Stewardship Fund to care for a part of the expense of operating the general church, and

Whereas, the Manual states on Page 82, Paragraph 8 that, any pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without a good reason shall be denied voice in the annual conference, and

Whereas, there is a great need that all district budgets be paid as early in the year as possible so that the district may function properly.

Be it resolved, that we as a conference set the month of September as United Stewardship

Fund and District Budget month. Be it further resolved that during this month each church shall do their best to either raise in cash or pledges the total amount covering each of these items. Any church that now has a workable plan to take care of these items need not feel under any obligation to take such

offerings during this month but should continue with their present plan.

NO. 2 CAMP SERVICES

Be it resolved that the schedule of our Camp services be so arranged as to permit one afternoon service each to be devoted to the interests of the following phases of our work, namely, Foreign Missions, General Church Extension and District Home Missions.

NO. 3 COMMITTEES

- A. Be it resolved that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee consist of five members and three shall be a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that no unauthorized person be permitted to present resolutions on the Conference floor. All resolutions must be cleared either with the Resolutions Committee or the Ways and Means Committee (depending on the nature of the resolution under consideration), who are the only authorized committees to present resolutions on the conference floor.
- C. Be it resolved that no more than one Council member serve on any one committee.

NO. 4 CONFERENCE

Be it resolved that the Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District be opened with a Communion Service for our members, delegates and friends. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a committee to arrange for this service.

NO. 5 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare reports for conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close July 5th.

NO. 6 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Be it resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches, subject to the camp dates.

NO. 7 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister's wife of the District, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairman and that they immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District for expense incurred.

NO. 8 LOAN PLAN

Be it resolved that we adopt the Pilgrim Pension, Inc., in the Eastern Ohio District for the purpose of helping churches to build.

NO. 9 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of the local Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. See Ministerial Study Agency. See page 14.

NO. 10 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio Conference have an annual Ministerial Convention. The time and place to be determined by the Council.

NO. 11 MISSIONS

In consideration of the need of District Home Missionary work, be it resolved that each pastor in the Eastern Ohio Conference be subject to a call by the Home Missionary Committee for a two weeks revival.

NO. 12 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

NO. 13 PASTORS

- A. Be it resolved that the churches of the Eastern Ohio District shall give first consideration to the Ministers of our conference in extending a call for their pastor. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent shall not recommend a minister outside the bounds of our district, until after a church has failed to elect a pastor from the ministers of our District.
- B. Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name at a time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living; Be it resolved that the district superintendent take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the superintendents meet with the local church boards.
- D. In order that the churches may receive credit for the full amount they contribute toward pastoral support; Be it resolved that the question of whether or not the pastor's utilities are supplied be made a part of the pastor's annual report.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.
- F. Whereas our manual makes no provision for the Pastor's vacation, Be it resolved our churches give their pastor two weeks vacation and the District Camp each year with support. Be it further resolved each pastor be permitted to accept two revivals per year.

NO. 14 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of District officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss such matters after election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

NO. 15 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Inasmuch as there are moral, physical and spiritual danger in and many perils associated with television, be it resolved that this conference go on record urging our people to guard against the evils thereof.
- C. Inasmuch as our Manual gives only two sacraments or ordinances to be observed in our churches, namely, the Lord's Supper and water baptism, be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District forbids public feet washing as part of our worship service.

NO. 16 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

- A. Be it resolved that Sunday School conventions or workshops be held in each zone as deemed advisable by the District Sunday School Board and District Superintendent. Furthermore, that the District Sunday School Board shall appoint committees in the various zones of the conference to work under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.
- B. Inasmuch as our District Camp is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Eastern Ohio Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- C. A few of our churches have been faithful in teaching the Sunday School lesson to their shutins, and such who are physically incapacitated, to attend the regular Sunday School sessions of the church. This is commendable and more should be done in this direction which falls under the designation of Home department. But in order to avoid any discrepancies in the Sunday School attendance count in any of the churches, are in all fairness to every Sunday School in the District. Be it resolved that only those present in the Sunday School classes in the church be counted in total attendance for that Sunday. All others who may be taught elsewhere such as our shutins, are to be counted and entered under "Home Department" and not be included in the total count.
- D. Be it resolved that we adopt the following recommendations:
 - (1) That each Sunday School endeavor to start new Sunday School classes.

- (2) That each Sunday School and each class set goals and strive to reach them.
- (3) That each Sunday School adopt a system for contacting absentees.
- (4) That each Sunday School plan weekly group visitations.
- (5) That each Sunday School departmentalize as soon as possible.
- (6) That much attention be given the Cradle Roll. This is a ripe field, and will pay dividends if worked.
- (7) That at least one branch Sunday School be started by each Zone.
- (8) That each Sunday School subscribe for the Sunday School Advance for all of the teachers.

NO. 17 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings if possible; however, he may authorize his assistant or the pastor to conduct this meeting.

NO. 18 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership—therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

NO. 19 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with district council members receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all members of the District Council be elected to office by secret ballot.

NO. 20 APPRECIATION

Be it resolved:

- A. That we extend our General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, a vote of thanks for his Christ-like spirit and the efficient manner in which he conducted this Conference;
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, District Secretary, District Treasurer, the additional members of the District Council, the various committees, dining personnel, camp and conference registrars, organist, maintenance men, camp policemen, and all others who have assisted in any way to make our conference the success it proved to be.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the *Coshocton Tribune* and Rev. Paul Harris for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our Conference Secretary.
- D. Above all, we do fervently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during this Camp and Conference.

STANDING RULES

- 1. The time schedule for sittings of the conference are: 8:30-12:00; 2:00-5:00; 7:00-10:00.
- Conference Bar to include the platform and the front three sections to the left of the platform and eight rows back.
- 3. Ordination Service to take place on the second day, fourth sitting at 8:30 A.M. of the Conference.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

BUDGETS

NO. 1 UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the manual provision for the United Stewardship Fund as adopted by the 1958 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be adopted by our District Conference. (The amount of United Stewardship Fund \$8.00 per member per year).
 - "If the local church does not properly divide the money, the conference treasurer is authorized to do so." Sec. 149, Par. 1-3, 1958 Manual.
 - "No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interests is paid."

- B. We recommend that the United Stewardship Fund be raised monthly in the Sunday School or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.
- C. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastors in raising the Conference Home Missionary and United Stewardship Fund.
- D. Whereas, there are some churches in our district which have a struggle to pay their United Stewardship Fund, and

Whereas, there are times when such churches have unspecified funds for both foreign missions and general extension, therefore,

Be it resolved, that any church wishing to do so may take from unspecified foreign Missionary money enough to make up that part of the United Stewardship Fund which applies to foreign Missions which is 20% of said fund.

Be it further resolved, that, this may apply to unspecified general church extension funds also, and from such funds the 14% of the United Stewardship Fund which applies to general church extension may be paid.

This can only apply when the other part of the United Stewardship Fund has been made up.

NO. 2 DISTRICT BUDGET

Be it resolved:

- A. That all stationed ministers pay all their tithe on wages received from their ministerial income to the District.
- B. That all unstationed licensed and ordained ministers pay 50% of their tithe from their ministerial wages to the District.
- C. That all licensed and ordained ministers not receiving income from the church pay 25% of their tithe to the District.
- D. All such tithes are to be paid to the local church treasurer and forwarded to the District Treasurer.

Be it resolved:

- E. That our District Budget be established at \$5.00.
- F. That our District Budget be set up on the percentage basis in the same manner as our United Stewardship Fund.

District Parsonage	15%

G. Be it resolved that each church in the District be asked to share in meeting the expenses of the Annual District Ministerial Convention by being assessed on the following basis: each church with a membership of twenty-five or less contribute \$5.00; all other churches contribute \$10.00 each.

NO. 3 CAMP BUDGET (SPECIAL)

Inasmuch as it takes approximately \$4,000.00 for the operating expense of the District Camp meeting and in order to provide an efficient method of securing the necessary finances for the District Camp meeting and one which will not detract from the spiritual purpose and will remove the pressure of immediate need and giving from both our leaders and those who attend the camp:

Be it resolved that we provide for the financial needs of the camp one year in advance by raising, during one or more services of the camp, individual voluntary pledges for this purpose to be paid during the following twelve months.

NO. 4 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provision to alleviate the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.

- D. That our active ministers' children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

NO. 5 CHURCHES NEWLY ORGANIZED

Be it resolved that with the exception of the pastor's tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organizations; one-half of the second year; and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

NO. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that the district home missionary program be the responsibility of the District Council.

NO. 7 SUNDAY SCHOOL BUDGET (DISTRICT)

A. Be it resolved that each Sunday School be assessed annually the following amounts based on their average to be used for the expense of Sunday School promotional work.

50 to 100	.50 per	month
100 to 200	1.00 per	month
200 or above	1.25 per	month

The same to be paid to the District Treasurer.

MINISTERS

NO. 8

- A. Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local churches

NO. 9 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Eastern Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church each call as it is presented to him. That the District Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Inasmuch as Resolution No. 9A provides for the enrollment of each church's pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and, inasmuch as a number of our churches have still failed to follow through on this District's legislation, be it resolved that our District Superintendent when making his first visit of the church he is visiting, has enrolled their pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association, and if not, to encourage that church to do so as soon as possible.

MINUTES

NO. 10 COST OF MINUTES

Be it resolved that the price of District Minutes to be left to the discretion of the District Council.

NO. 11 PREPARING MINUTES FOR PUBLICATION

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$20.00 for services.

NO. 12 COST PILGRIM REVIEW

Inasmuch as our District Youth can no longer bear the expense of the Pilgrim Review, be it resolved that the expense and space of this periodical be equally shared by the District, District Sunday School, and District Youth Treasuries. This is unanimously recommended by the Eastern Ohio District Youth Council.

RECORDS

NO. 13 RECORDS—SAFE

Due to the fact that we are now a separate conference, and to the fact that our conference records are valuable to us, and to the fact that a small fire could completely destroy the same, therefore

Be it resolved that the council be authorized and directed to purchase an approved safe and place it in the keeping of our District Treasurer for the safe-keeping of our records and finances.

SALARIES

NO. 14 DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Inasmuch as we recognize the high cost of living and the increase of traveling expenses, we recommend the following: District Superintendent Salary \$4.200.00, 7c per mile traveling expenses; parsonages; all utilities and four weeks vacation.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and his wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that dues be paid by the District Treasurer.
- C. Be it resolved that the District shall enroll the Superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan as per the plan for the local churches and their pastors, and be it further resolved that we pay the District Superintendent's Social Security.

NO. 15 ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

We recommend that the Superintendent when in need of additional help in the administration of district work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$12.50 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.

NO. 16 DISTRICT COUNCIL

We recommend that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council for traveling to and from the council meetings.

NO. 17 CONFERENCE SECRETARY AND TREASURER

Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer's salary be \$500.00 and the Conference Secretary's salary be \$250.00.

NO. 18 STATISTICIAN AND SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Be it resolved that the Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year and that the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$100.00 per year.

NO. 19 EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING COMMITTEE

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committee be given \$50.00 per member.

NO. 20 SOCIAL SECURITY

- A. Whereas, Social Security has been extended to clergy, and whereas, many of the pastors of the Eastern Ohio District have elected to go into the plan, and whereas business enterprises pay 50% of the cost of the Social Security plan for their employees, and we believe it to be in keeping with the Spirit of the New Testament for the local church to share the cost of the Social Security plan for their pastor, therefore, we recommend that the Church share the cost on a 50-50 basis.
- B. We further recommend that all evangelists who tithe their ministerial income one hundred percent into the local church of which they are a member, said local church shall share the cost of the Social Security plan with them on a 50-50 basis. This shall also apply to evangelistic singers.

TREASURER

NO. 21 AUDITING THE TREASURER'S BOOKS

Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the Conference Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

NO. 22 INSURING THE TREASURER

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer bonded.

YOUTH

NO. 23 YOUNG PEOPLE

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention.

C. That our District Pilgrim Review be placed on a subscription basis. Single copies at 50c per year, 10 copies sent to one address, 35c per copy per year. All subscriptions are to expire at the end of the conference year.

NO. 24 MONITORS AND POLICE

We recommend that young people who receive free entertainment at our District Convention be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

NO. 25 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than \$10.00 be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

NO. 26 YOUTH CAMP

Be it resolved that where the church considers it necessary and they are financially able to do so that they consider paying the way to the Youth Camp to those youth who are unable to pay.

The zone Chairman gave their reports which revealed much progress throughout the District. The labors of these men were greatly appreciated by the Conference as was revealed

with a standing vote of appreciation. The Resolutions Committee reported recommending Resolutions Nos. 7, 8, which was approved and No. 10 which was rejected.

The Ways and Means Committee reported recommending Resolution No. 2 which was approved.

A motion was made to recess until 1:30 p.m. Conference reconvened at 1:30 p.m. at which time the election of officers was completed.

Rev. Saylor asked a standing vote of appreciation for our Chairman, Rev. Abbott. The Benediction was given by Rev. O. M. Awe, our District Superintendent after a motion to adjourn with prayer.

WAYS AND MEANS

RESOLUTION NO. 1

- A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, out of which the expenses, incidental to the functioning of the Executive Committee in their official duties, be maintained.
- B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$5.00 a year to maintain this fund.
- C. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed .06c per mile for traveling expenses.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be it resolved that the Zone and District Youth cooperate in a combined project to build a second story on the present motel. The building plans to be in conjunction with the overall Camp ground plans as directed by the District Council.

RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Inasmuch as we feel the visits of our District Youth President to our zones during the past year have been a real blessing, be it resolved that the executive President visit each zone at least once during the fiscal year.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone leader arrange a meeting with the district superintendent, the pastors, and Y. P. presidents of his zone as soon after conference as possible to plan the program for his zone for the year.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

We recommend that the Executive Committee and Zone Leaders be kept in the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Be it resolved that the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as the choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Young People's Executive Committee to enforce this during the Young People's Convention.

RESOLUTION NO. 6

Inasmuch as the youth camp this year was a great success, be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District have an annual youth camp, and the Youth Executive Council to work out details with the District Council.

RESOLUTION NO. 7

Be it resolved that the Zone Chairman appoint the Zone Secretary from the "Teen-Age" group.

RESOLUTION NO. 8

Be it resolved that the District and Zone Officers Banquet be held the month of September.

RESOLUTION NO. 9

Inasmuch as the unity of the District depends greatly upon the "oneness" of the Zone Churches, be it resolved that each zone plan at least one Special Prayer Meeting as early in the conference year as possible.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To our Chairman, Rev. J. D. Abbott; our District Superintendent, Rev. O. M. Awe; and to the members of the 7th Annual Eastern Ohio District Youth Conference . . .

First, I would like to express sincere thanks to each of you who have cooperated to make this a great year for the youth of our church. Again this year, the various zones have combined to set a new record in zone rally attendance and interest. The average of 164 is equal in number to a great rally of over a thousand Pilgrims meeting each month of the rally scason. It was our priviledge to visit with each of the zones in a promotional rally, and it has been a pleasant and rewarding experience. We have felt a sense of earnest effort and cooperation among the Zone Leaders who have made this rally program a success, and have enjoyed a warm spirit of understanding by our District Superintendent, Rev. Orville Awe, and the members of the District Council. Our district editor has done an outstanding job of promotional work and news coverage in this interest.

This phase of the program included an organized tour of the district by the Eastern Pilgrim College Quartet, with Rev. Tommy Holshouser presenting a stirring challenge from the parable of the talents. A district-wide Talent Hunt produced dozens of young people, with various kinds of ability, many of whom took part in our United Zones Rally on Memorial Day. This particular event is the largest single gathering of Eastern Ohio Pilgrims, and the Lord smiled upon us with a beautiful day throughout. Nearly 600 persons attended these services, ate lunch in the area, and stood around the flagpole at a brief memorial service, during which an inscribed plaque was placed in honor of our former District Superintendent, and brother in Christ. Rev. B. A. Awe. Rev. Melvin Stiverson gave the keynote message, and Rev. Wm. Gilkerson spoke in the memorial service.

We feel compelled again to say that again this year our Youth Camp stands as a living tribute to the men of our district who gave birth to it, for it is without question our most promising cooperative effort. The camp was marked by a splendid spirit on the part of both campers and workers. God graciously honored our simple and sincere faith with a powerful and effective visitation in the evening services, and I believe that we have been humbled by a new understanding of the urgent needs, and almost limitless opportunities of this fertile field. Our thanks to Rev. Gilkerson and Mrs. Ada White, our boys and girls deans, for their invaluable assistance and wide understanding of this work. A total of 328 campers and workers filled every waking hour with activity, again using the outdoor assembly plan as a basis for organization. Time and space do not permit us to give due expression of our indebtedness to each of the large staff of teachers and workers, and to those who furnished transportation to make this fine camp possible.

A number of improvements have been suggested for the expansion of our talent hunt program, which will make it a more effective means of discovering and encouraging many of our boys and girls with ability to become a blessing to our church. Thirteen young people were chosen to complete in the finals in this convention, with judging and awards made on an individual basis.

We are certainly pleased to have our General Youth Director with us in the convention, which we trust shall bring a fresh approach to the complex challenge of this work. Let us meet this challenge in the coming months with a prayer, a plan, and a purpose . . . as together we look toward what can be our best days ever. God wants to do this for us.
