FIRST SITTING, MONDAY, AUGUST 10, 1964 — 9:00 A.M.

The Tenth Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened August 10, 1964 at 9:00 A.M. at Bethel Camp Grounds, Coshocton, Ohio, with singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms", "He Abides", "Redeemed", and "Precious Name", led by Rev. John Minsker. The piano was played by W. C. Bussa.

We were led in a good session of prayer by Rev. E. E. Leadingham, our Assistant District Superintendent.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Roy Ankrum, then introduced the Chairman for this conference, Dr. P. W. Thomas, General Superintendent of the Central Area of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Dr. Thomas gave the conference a few opening remarks. He based his remarks on Matthew 24:14. "This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached unto all nations as a witness". He declared "The world needs the gospel of the Kingdom; the American church needs the gospel of the kingdom."

"The leaders of our church are greatly concerned about (1.) The need of revival in our churches. (2.) The shortage of laborers." He admonished us that the preaching of the gospel is the most important work in the whole world.

The District Secretary, Rev. C. E. Jones called the roll of ministers and lay delegates. 79 ministers and 65 lay delegates were present.

M/s/c* we receive into our conference the following transfers from other districts: Rev. Clyde E. Hanks, Rev. Leonard Wolfe, Rev. H. A. Zufall, Mrs. H. A. Zufall, Rev. Arnold Keyes, Mrs. Arnold Keyes, Rev. R. D. Brown, Mrs. R. D. Brown, Rev. James Hulett.

The Conference Bar was stated to be the first eight rows in the three sections to the left of the platform, including the platform, according to the standing rules. The standing rule for the time schedule of sittings of the conference is as follows: 8:30—12:00 A.M.; 2:00—5:00 P.M.; 7:00—10:00 P.M.

*M/s/c—It was moved, seconded and carried.

M/s/c that we amend the standing rule on Page 31, part 2, of our Minutes by striking out the word "eight" and inserting the word "ten".

The standing rule now reads as follows:

The conference bar shall include the platform and the front three sections to the left of the platform and ten rows back.

The District Superintendent's report was given by Rev. Roy Ankrim. M/s/c that this fine report be accepted with appreciation.

The Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. E. E. Leadingham, gave his report. M/s/c that this report be accepted with appreciation.

The Auditing Committee's report was given by Miss Lena Hacker. M/s/c to accept this report. Miss Margaret Jones also served on this committee.

The District Treasurer's report was given by Rev. M. D. Stiverson, due to the illness of our former District Treasurer, Rev. William Brown. M/s/c that we accept this report with the understanding that the Church Extension Fund be properly revised.

Rev. George Harris was introduced by Rev. Harry Dickerson on behalf of the Reception Committee. Rev. Harris represented Eastern Pilgrim College and gave us a few words regarding the college and expressed appreciation for the District's support. He asked that we remember Eastern Pilgrim College in our prayers.

M/s/c that we recess for 10 minutes.

We reconvened by singing "This is my Story".

M/s/c that we receive transfers into our conference as follows: Rev. Charles Roark and Rev. Joseph Bryan.

The District Statistician, Rev. W. E. Honeycutt was not present, therefore, our District Secretary, Rev. C. E. Jones, gave his report summarizing the totals of the various items involved in the annual reports forms. M/s/c that we accept report.

The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report was read by Rev. Duane Saylor. M/s/c that we accept this report. A report on the Standard of Excellence was given. The Decade of Progress 1960-1970 trophy was presented to Rev. Ronald Travis and Duane French of the Fostoria church for making the most progress this year. Ribbons were also presented to the churches which made Sunday School gains this year.

The District Church Extension Committee's report was given by Rev. E. E. Leadingham, Chairman. M/s/c that we accept this report.

Due to expiration of time the conference was adjourned. Rev. Roy Ankrim dismissed in prayer.

SECOND SITTING, MONDAY, AUGUST 10, 1964—2:00 P.M.

Rev. Roy Ankrim led the congregation in singing "Redeemed". Mrs. Ada White played the organ.

The conference was led in prayer by Mrs. Johnson from the Cleveland Church.

Minutes of the first meeting were read by the District Secretary. They were approved as read.

Rev. Thomas then asked Rev. Clyde Hanks, Rev. Arnold Keyes and Mrs. Keyes to give their testimonies. They had been received into our conference from other districts during the first sitting.

The report of the Educational and Examining Board was read by Rev. W. V. Gilkerson, Secretary. There were 28 ministers recommended for first year license; 8 recommended for second year license; 3 recommended for third year license; and 1 recommended as second year licensed deaconess. M/s/c that licenses be granted as recommended by the Board.

The new first year licentiates were introduced. M/s/c that we grant these new ministers an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The Educational and Examining Board also recommended 8 ministers and one deaconess for ordination.

M/s/c that we approve this recommendation of the Educational and Examining Board.

The District Missionary Society President's report was read by Mrs. Ada White. M/s/c that this report be accepted.

The Resolutions Committee reported. Rev. John Minsker reported for the committee.

Page 28, No. 2 Camp Services. Delete word "and" and add words "and Sunday School".

Page 29, No. 11 Ministers — M/s/c that we amend resolution read by Rev. John Minsker by inserting words "if feasible" to resolution. M/s/c that the resolution be accepted as follows: Inasmuch as some of our ministers wish to further their education; Be it resolved that, if feasible, arrangements be made to offer college courses to our men. Such classes would be held at our camp grounds at a time not to conflict with other district activities. The date, cost, and teachers would be determined by a committee appointed by our District Council.

Page 30, No. 16 — M/s/c that we consider one paragraph at a time. Paragraph C—The motion to delete was lost. Paragraph D—M/s/c that we delete item (7) only.

Rev. Dale Jones reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Page 32, District Financial Plan. Section 2. C. Substitution—M/s/c that we adopt resolution as recommended by committee.

Page 32, No. 3 Camp and Conference. Section A Substitution M/s/c that we adopt resolution as recommended by committee.

Page 32, No. 3 Camp and Conference. Item c. M/s/c that we adopt correction as recommended by committee. M/s/c that we amend resolution by striking out word "active". The resolution was adopted as corrected.

Page 33, Salaries. 11, Part A, regarding District Superintendent's salary. M/s/c that we adopt resolution as amended.

Page 33, Salaries. M/s/c that No. 11, Part D be added which provides for the District Superintendent's hospitalization to be paid.

Page 34, No. 18 Social Security. Item A. Revision. M/s/c that this be adopted as revised.

Page 34, No. 18, Item B Revision. M/s/c that this be adopted as revised.

Pastor's reports were then asked for by Rev. Thomas. Nine reports were read.

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers: Rev. Ronald Travis, Rev. Duane Saylor, Rev. W. V. Gilkerson, Rev. Charles Fletcher, Rev. Donald Wachsen-schwanz, Rev. M. D. Stiverson, Rev. Gene Rowe and Rev. Dallas Ford.

Rev. E. E. Leadingham led in prayer. Rev. John Minsker led us in singing "Rock of Ages".

Scripture was read by Rev. M. D. Stiverson, Rev. C. E. Jones, and Rev. W. V. Gilkerson.

Rev. Roy Ankrim then presented eight ordinands and one deaconess to Rev. P. W. Thomas. After a short message directed to the ordinands and all present, he read the Ordination Vows to the ordinands and deaconess to be ordained. The Doxology was then sung by the congregation.

A Commissioning Service was held for Rev. and Mrs. C. E. Jones who are leaving immediately for missionary service in Northern Rhodesia, Africa.

M/s/c that we adjourn. Rev. E. E. Leadingham gave his testimony and also dismissed in prayer.

MEMORIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

REV. B. H. PUGH

Saturday, April 25, the Chillicothe Church was filled with relatives and friends of the late Rev. B. H. Pugh. 38 ministers respected their minister brother.

Rev. Benjamin H. Pugh was born near Athens, Ohio on Oct. 8, 1888. He passed to his heavenly home on April 22nd, 1964, at the age of 75 years.

Near the noon hour his book of life was closed. He took his departure from his home on McKellar St. in Chillicothe. He was the 7th child of a large family, and at the time of his birth his mother made the statement, "There's my preacher boy."

Alone in his home Feb. 1, 1920 he was converted. On Jan. 1, 1924 he was sanctified. Shortly after this he was called to the ministry. July 1925 he joined the Pilgrim Holiness Church and was ordained in 1932. He soon would have completed 40 years in the ministry. He was always ready and willing to help carry the burdens of others. The night was never too dark to go when called.

He pastored the following churches: East Cannan, Luhrig, New Marshfield, Stewart, Federal Valley, Athens, Bowersville, Chillicothe, Portsmouth, Londonderry, and St. Petersburg, Florida. He also served as evangelist, and was on the Ohio District Council for 14 years.

On April 26, 1909 he was united in marriage to Olive E. Cramer who preceded him in death July 18, 1954. May 18, 1960 he was united in marriage to Minnie Van Gundy, who survives. Also surviving are 4 daughters and 1 step-son.

Rev. Roy Deiter preached the memorial message.

Brother Pugh was not only a minister of the Gospel, a beloved brother and a true friend, but above all, a man of God.

His entrance into the Presence of our wonderful Lord was an abundant one. He will long be remembered among the Ministry and laity of our District as a true soldier of Jesus Christ.

REV. MRS. ALMA ROSELLA SHEARER

During the time between March 25, 1875 and January 17, 1964 a christian lived. The 88 years of christian influence of Mrs. Alma Shearer cannot be confined in mere words. Her life as a minister and a minister's wife has been recorded in eternity.

With her husband, they pastored various influential churches including Nelsonville and Marion in our district. While her husband was District Supt., she either pastored her own charge or faithfully labored with him in his official duties.

She toiled in God's vineyard faithfully.

As time passed her by, the burning desire to worship in church and Camp meetings was intensified. She remained a loyal member of the First Pilgrim Church, Columbus, Ohio, until God released her from duties on a cold January day.

Her pastor, Rev. W. V. Gilkerson, conducted the memorial service for her and she was laid to rest at Marion, Ohio.

During the early church history a christian charge was developed to those who died in the faith:

"Servant of God, well done
Thy Glorious warfares past,
The battles fought,
The race is won,
and thou art crowned at last".

DALE DUVALL

Dale Duvall was born in September of 1916. He passed from this life August 5, 1963.

My examination consisted of the following:

1. Confirmation and reconciliation of all deposits recorded in the ledger with actual deposits on the bank-statements for the period.
2. Reconciliation of the bank balances.
3. Mathematical accuracy of the records through June 11, 1964.
4. Examination of notes payable and amounts paid on said notes.
5. Due to the volume of receipts from member churches, no attempt was made to verify this aspect. However, to the extent of my examination, these items appear in order and reflect the proper amounts, as summarized in the statement of cash receipts and disbursements.
6. Check disbursements were scanned and spot checks made of various items. Since no invoices were submitted it was not possible to make a complete examination of these items.

7. Due to the illness of Rev. Brown and the assumption of this difficult task by Rev. Stiverson, it was determined that the cut off date for the audit should be June 11, 1964 rather than mid July. The ending fund balances as shown on the Treasurer's Report should be entered in the records and new postings started from June 11, 1964. Since Rev. Stiverson is located in Oak Hill it is my recommendation that an accountant be employed in that area to assist Rev. Stiverson with the books until he has become familiar with them and to perform the Annual Audit. I feel this would be the more economical and practical approach to the situation and would provide Rev. Stiverson with any aid he may need in his own local.

I would like to express my appreciation to the Pilgrim Holiness Church and especially to The Rev. William Brown for the excellent cooperation I have received during the past years. I sincerely hope that "Bill" Brown will be back on the active list in the very near future.

DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To Church Officials, all other friends, and before God, we humbly submit the following report from the District Missionary Society.

Someone has said that the Christian life is a happy combination of trust and toil. We are enjoying both. As a district, together we trust, and together we toil. Trust, multiplied by many hearts, releases the power of God. Toil, by the joining of many hands, results in reaching goals.

We extend our appreciation to each member of the missionary committee. They have worked willingly and harmoniously with us. Thanks also to the pastors, local presidents and their societies, who cooperated.

Each is a tool, the one needing the many, and the many needing the one.

There's an illustration of a can of paint, which said, "I'm going to paint the house". The paintbrush asserted, "No, I'm going to paint it".

The ladder sneered, "You are, are you?"

The checkbook said, "How far will either of you get without me to pay the bill?"

Just then the painter himself, overhearing the remarks, put in his word, "Perhaps I'd better take a holiday. I wonder if the house will be painted by the time I return?"

Thank God for the privilege and the plan of working together with Him and with fellowmen.

This year we finished the project of an automatic dishwasher for our camp kitchen. It was purchased, installed, and dedicated in May. The price was \$1475.70.

The Junior missionary youth are now helping collect funds for the needed garbage disposal and spray.

Three new adult societies have been organized: Ashley, Mrs. Dunn is president; Delaware, president is Mrs. Bowman; and Barberton Mt. Summit, Carol Morrison, president.

There are two new Junior societies: Marion I, Mrs. Jordan, president; and Sandusky, where the president is Mrs. Kuhn.

The camp missionary display this year was by Junior societies of the following churches: Columbus I, Columbus II, Baltimore, Bremen, Marion I, and Sandusky.

We conducted eight district missionary committee meetings. Our driving mileage totaled 2310 miles, conducting missionary services upon invitation, organizing societies, installing officers, etc.

In November, the district missionary committee voted to pay the president 7¢ per mile for travel expense, beginning with that month.

Motion was also passed that she should bring in a free-will offering from each church in which service was held; said offering to be placed in the district missionary treasury.

The current amount in the treasury is \$19.68.

The committee asks that this year, beginning with July 1st, each church send fifty-cents per month to the district missionary treasurer for use in postage, printing, mileage, etc. This replaces the former request for 25¢ and 50¢ per month from the various societies according to their size.

The committee has set some goals for this current year: viz., more new societies in the district, both adult and junior; also, as a project, the financing of church property in Brazil, or the greatest possible portion of it within the year.

We are thankful that Rev. and Mrs. C. E. Jones, from our own district, are reaching their services now into Africa.

We praise God for His blessing upon our camp missionary services with Rev. Knupp and Rev. Philippe.

\$1200.00 was raised in Thursday's meeting for general missionary transportation. \$400.00 was given to The Jones' as a love-offering.

We are working with eternity's values in view to help fulfill Jesus' promise that whosoever believeth in Him should not abide in darkness.

For any inefficiency, debit us — for the accomplishments, praise ye the Lord.

DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE REPORT

Immediately following the 1963 District Conference, the Church Extension Committee with our District Superintendent, Rev. Roy Ankrum, began making plans for the continuation of the church extension work, as outlined in the church extension policy.

One of the first responsibilities was to promote the September offering. The response to the appeal was very gratifying and insofar as we know it was the largest offering received to date.

Prior to the last annual conference, much prayer and consideration had been given to the matter of selecting a church to become the district project. In October of last year a decision was made. The church at Fremont became the project of the year.

Fremont has a population of approximately 20,000. The church building is a lovely brick structure. Over a period of 9 months the church has made the following gains:

Additional property has been purchased for their expansion.

The Cambridge church reports the addition of five new families attending the service, 19% gain in Sunday School attendance, and major repairs on the church building were made.

The Coshocton church also reports 52 seekers at the altars of prayer, 5 members uniting with the church, and 12% gain in Sunday School.

With the cooperation of Rev. Ronald Travis, our pastor at Fostoria, his people, Rev. Donald Wachenschwanz, Youth President of Great Lakes Zone, along with the pastors of this zone, a church has been started at Bettsville. A frame church building with nice pews and heated with a gas furnace on a lot, size 66 x 150 feet, has been purchased from the Methodist conference for the sum of only \$2,275. This is the only Holiness Church in the town. Rev. J. R. Walter has been pastoring this new work.

The committee has given attention to the following ten churches during the year: Cambridge, Coshocton, Delaware, Fremont, Shreve, Waverly, Wheelersburg, Tiffin, Bettsville and Perrysburg.

All of these churches except three have received financial assistance. We have had 11 committee meetings plus three or four short meetings on the camp ground at various times, and have visited four churches.

The committee has kept the District Council informed of its activities from time to time and have obtained their approval on major matters before taking action.

Because of Rev. C. E. Jones' heavy work load, and his preparing to go to the mission field, he felt that it was necessary to tender his resignation as Secretary of the committee. Rev. M. D. Stiverson was elected to the committee.

In a great Church Extension service on the last Saturday of the Camp \$5,300 was raised in cash and pledges, primarily to start a third church in Columbus. The District Council unanimously approved this project.

An honest, sincere and conscientious effort has been made on the part of the committee to promote this phase of the work in the district.

It has been a real joy to be associated with the Church Extension work since the inauguration of our present policy.

We are grateful to all the Pilgrims of our district for their prayers, cooperation and support and whatever may have been accomplished, we give God all the praise.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONARY POLICY

EASTERN OHIO DISTRICT OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH

Section 1 — Object

The object of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, as stated in our Manual is: First, to glorify God, our Father, to exalt Jesus Christ, our Saviour, and to honor the Holy Spirit.

Second, to carry out the Great Commission of our heaven-ascended Head by publishing the full gospel to every nation.

Third, to conserve the holiness work by forming churches and aiding in placing over them Spirit-baptized pastors, who will feed the flock of God and in every way possible help to get souls ready for the coming of our Lord.

In carrying out this objective, our District Home Missionary Program shall strive to strengthen and establish existing home missionary churches and to start, organize and establish new churches as outlined further in this policy.

Section 2 — Basic Goals

Whereas, there are countless needs and opportunities for the investment of our efforts and finances in the general area of district home missions, it is essential to a sound policy that we establish our basic goals and determine the type of projects that shall be given priority in our program.

Our primary goal and emphasis shall be to strengthen and establish existing home missionary churches. The term "home missionary churches" as here used does not refer only to those churches which are as yet unorganized or which has less than seven members as outlined in the Manual, but shall also include weak organized churches which have a real potential for growth if proper assistance would be given.

(Due to the fact that 50% of the churches on our district have 20 or less members, we feel that the strengthening of these churches should be given priority over new projects except as outlined below.)

Our secondary goal shall be to organize new churches in communities where the need and potential for a strong Pilgrim Holiness Church exists. Our policy shall not be the indiscriminate starting of new churches. However, we realize that if we are to fulfill the Great Commission we must not lose our vision and interest in reaching new areas with the gospel of full salvation. We shall, therefore, strive to take advantage of outstanding opportunities to start churches where the need and potential for a strong church exists. Such a project could be deemed to be of sufficient importance to take priority over our primary goal.

Section 3 — General Procedures

It shall be our policy to analyze the total picture of the needs and potential of home missionary churches as well as new opportunities in order to determine the best investment of our time, personnel and finances.

Our emphasis on the district-wide level shall concentrate on one primary project at a time. This project shall be determined as a result of the survey and analysis mentioned in the above paragraph.

It shall be our policy to initiate programs on the local and area level that will promote the strengthening of the weaker churches by the stronger churches of their area.

A careful evaluation shall be made of opportunities to start new churches. Whenever possible, approval and assistance shall be given to proposed projects which are consistent with this policy.

Section 4 — Administration

The District Superintendent has general oversight of the work throughout his district. He, therefore, shall have the responsibility of the general administration of this district home missionary policy.

In accordance with the Manual provision that "the (district) council shall assist in planning the work of the district superintendent, and shall also lend its advice to local churches in the various problems which arise from their financial and spiritual necessities." (Section 112, P. 8), there shall be a District Home Missionary or Church Extension Committee consisting of three members which shall be appointed by the district council. The members of this committee shall not necessarily be members of the district council.

This committee shall be delegated authority from the district council to carry out the district home missionary program as outlined in this policy in co-operation with the district superintendent. They shall advise and assist the district superintendent by suggesting programs and making recommendations for action to be taken concerning individual churches and situations in the process of reaching the objectives of this policy.

It shall be the responsibility of this committee to approve district home missionary projects and to promote the special projects, the September Offering, the annual camp meeting District Home Missionary Service and the district home missionary program in general.

They may make recommendations to the district superintendent concerning financial or other needed assistance, personnel placement, closer supervision or any other remedial actions which they feel should be taken to help and strengthen the weaker churches.

No program or recommendation of this committee shall be put into effect without the knowledge of the district superintendent. Decisions of this committee shall be final subject to the approval of the district superintendent, with the exception that any program or recommendation of the committee which would involve the expenditure of more than \$2,500, shall be approved by the district council. Recommendations of the committee may be taken to the full district council for consideration.

The Church Extension Committee shall make a report to the annual Conference, and to the district council when requested to do so.

In order that there be a co-ordination of all activities in this phase of the work, the district superintendent will work in co-operation with this committee and in harmony with this policy.

Section 5 — Amendments

This home missionary policy may be amended from time to time by the district council in consultation with the church extension committee.

FIRST: The name of said corporation shall be The Pilgrim Holiness Church of.....(city)....., Ohio.

SECOND: The place in this State where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is.....(city)..... County, Ohio.

THIRD The purpose or purposes for which said corporation is formed are:

- (a) To be a subsidiary of and subject to the Manual, Rules and Regulations of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Eastern District of Ohio, an Ohio Corporation with headquarters at Columbus, Ohio.
- (b) To promote the cause of the Christian religion and the interests of said Church; to provide a place of worship for its members and to conduct the same according to the Manual, rules, regulations and customs of said Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- (c) To receive, hold and disburse gifts, bequests, and funds arising from other sources; to acquire, own, hold, use, lease, mortgage, pledge, sell, convey, or otherwise dispose of the property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible of said Corporation; to borrow money and to issue, sell or pledge its obligations and evidences of indebtedness, and to mortgage its property and franchises to secure the payment thereof, subject, however, to any rules or regulations of the Manual of the said Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- (d) To do all things necessary and incidental to the purposes herein set forth.

Be it resolved that the schedule of our Camp Meeting services be so arranged as to permit one service each to be devoted to the interests of the following phases of our work, namely, World Missions, General Church Extension, District Church Extension, and Sunday School.

NO. 3 CHURCH SIGNS

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

NO. 4 COMMITTEES

- A. Be it resolved that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee consist of five members and three shall be a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that no unauthorized person be permitted to present resolutions on the Conference floor. All resolutions must be cleared either with the Resolutions Committee or the Ways and Means Committee (depending upon the nature of the resolution under consideration), who are the only authorized committees to present resolutions on the conference floor.
- C. Be it resolved that no more than one Council member serve on any one committee, except the District Church Extension Committee.

NO. 5 CONFERENCE

Be it resolved that the Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District be opened with a Communion Service for our members, delegates and friends. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a committee to arrange for this service.

NO. 6 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare reports for conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- B. Inasmuch as the conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close July 5th.

NO. 7 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister of the District, or a minister's wife, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairman and that they immediately notify all pastors in their zone; and that they shall be reimbursed by the District for expenses incurred.

NO. 8 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION

- A. Be it resolved that the district home missionary program shall be the responsibility of the District Council.
- B. Be it resolved that we as a conference set the month of September as District Church Extension Month for the purpose of presenting the need and raising of funds.
- C. In consideration of the need of district home missionary work, be it resolved that each pastor in the Eastern Ohio District be subject to a call by the Church Extension Committee for a two weeks revival.

NO. 9 DISTRICT PARSONAGE

Inasmuch as the district camp ground is becoming more the center of district activity; be it resolved that a committee be appointed by the district Council to investigate the feasibility of moving the district parsonage to Coshocton or any other centrally located point the committee may deem advisable and that we empower the District Council to make a decision to proceed to move the parsonage location if they feel it advisable.

NO. 10 LOAN PLAN

Be it resolved that we adopt the Pilgrim Pension, Inc., in the Eastern Ohio District for the purpose of helping churches to build.

NO. 11 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church in this district.
- B. Inasmuch as some of our ministers wish to further their education; Be it resolved that, if feasible, arrangements be made to offer college courses to our men. Such classes would be held at our camp grounds at a time not to conflict with other district activities. The date, cost and teachers would be determined by a committee appointed by our district council.

NO. 12 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District have an annual Ministerial Convention. The time and place to be determined by the Council.

NO. 13 PASTORS

- A. Be it resolved that the churches of the Eastern Ohio District shall give first consideration to the ministers of our conference in extending a call for their pastor. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent shall not recommend a minister outside the bounds of our district, until after a church has failed to elect a pastor from the ministers of our District.
- B. Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name at a time.

- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living; Be it resolved that the District Superintendent take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the Superintendent meets with the local church boards.
- D. In order that the churches may receive credit for the full amount they contribute toward pastoral support; Be it resolved that the question of whether or not the pastor's utilities are supplied be made a part of the pastor's annual report.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the first Sunday after Camp. (Manual, Sec. 53, Par. 1)
- F. Whereas our Manual makes no provision for the pastor's vacation, Be it resolved our churches give their pastor two weeks vacation and the District Camp meeting each year with support. Be it further resolved each pastor be permitted to accept two revivals per year.

NO. 14 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of District officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss such matters after election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

NO. 15 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Inasmuch as there are moral, physical and spiritual dangers in and many perils associated with television, be it resolved that this conference go on record urging our people to guard against the evils thereof.

NO. 16 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

- A. Be it resolved that Sunday School conventions or workshops be held in each zone as deemed advisable by the District Sunday School Board and District Superintendent. Furthermore, that the District Sunday School Board shall appoint committees in the various zones of the conference to work under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.
- B. Inasmuch as our District Camp is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Eastern Ohio Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- C. A few of our churches have been faithful in teaching the Sunday School lesson to their shut-ins, and such who are physically incapacitated, to attend the regular Sunday School sessions of the church. This is commendable and more should be done in this direction which falls under the designation of Home department. But in order to avoid any discrepancies in the Sunday School attendance count in any of the churches, and in all fairness to every Sunday School in the District. Be it resolved that only those present in the Sunday School classes in the church be counted in total attendance for that Sunday. All others who may be taught elsewhere such as our shut-ins, are to be counted and entered under "Home Department" and not be included in the count.
- D. Be it resolved that we adopt the following recommendations:
 - (1) That each Sunday School endeavor to start new Sunday School classes.
 - (2) That each Sunday School and each class set goals and strive to reach them.
 - (3) That each Sunday School adopt a system for contacting absentees.
 - (4) That each Sunday School plan weekly group visitations.
 - (5) That each Sunday School departmentalize as soon as possible.
 - (6) That much attention be given the Cradle Roll. This is a ripe field, and will pay dividends if worked.

NO. 17 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the District Superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings if possible; however, he may authorize his assistant or the pastor to conduct this meeting.

NO. 18 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership—therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

NO. 19 UNITED STEWARDSHIP AND DISTRICT FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the United Stewardship Fund and our District Budget be raised and sent to the District Treasurer as one fund which shall be known as the United Stewardship and District Fund.
(For the purpose of the annual report, the local church treasurer can take the total amount sent in for this Fund and divide it by 13, then multiply the result by 5 and that would be the amount that went to the District. The balance would be the amount that had been forwarded to the United Stewardship Fund.)
- B. Be it resolved that the District Treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the district and general interests and that said cards be forwarded to the pastors as soon after the Conference as possible.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budgets six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.
- D. Be it resolved that each church establish a workable plan in order to meet these obligations.

APPRECIATION

BE IT RESOLVED:

that we express our sincere appreciation to Rev. E. E. Leadingham for his years of faithful and devoted service to the Eastern Ohio District. We recognize with deep gratitude the valuable contribution he has made to the development and progress of our district over the past few years. May God's richest blessing continue to be upon his labors as he takes up responsibilities elsewhere.

that we extend appreciative expression to Rev. C. E. Jones for the many hours of willing service he has rendered our district. His contribution has improved various phases of our district work. May Heaven's benediction rest upon his labors as he takes his leave to be part of God's cause and Kingdom in another area.

that we extend a vote of thanks to our General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, who presided so efficiently over the business of this conference in a candid manner—yet with a sweet spirit.

STANDING RULES

2. The Conference Bar shall include the platform and the front three sections to the left of the platform and ten rows back.
3. The Ordination Service shall take place on the second day, fourth sitting at 8:30 A.M. of the Conference .

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

BUDGETS

NO. 1 UNITED STEWARDSHIP AND DISTRICT FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the United Stewardship Fund and our District Budget be raised and sent to the District Treasurer as one fund which shall be known as the United Stewardship and District Fund. (See Resolutions Committee Report, No. 18)

1. The United Stewardship and District Fund shall total \$13 per member, as outlined below. (B., 1. and C., 1.)

B. GENERAL CHURCH FINANCIAL PLAN

1. (Manual, Sec. 149) There shall be a United Stewardship Fund of \$8 per member, to be divided as follows: Administration, 38%; Church Extension, 30%; Liberal Arts College, 22%; Sunday Schools and Youth, 6%; Church Extension Loan Fund, 2%; and Contingent Fund, 2%.
2. Each district shall assume an amount equal to \$8 per assessable member. They may apportion this amount to the churches either on a membership or financial strength basis, said apportionment to be made at the time of the annual conference for the following year.
3. Money for the support of World Missions shall be raised through deputational work in the churches and the annual Self-Denial Offering. The Department of World Missions shall not do deputational work in the churches or colleges during the four weeks preceding Easter and on Rally Day Sunday in October.

C. DISTRICT FINANCIAL PLAN

1. **District Budget.** Be it resolved that our District Budget shall be \$5 per member, and that it shall be divided by the District Treasurer as follows:
Camp Ground Property 24%
District Church Extension 27%

District Parsonage	15%
Eastern Pilgrim College	28%
International Conference	6%

2. **Minister's Tithe.** Be it resolved:

- That all stationed ministers pay all their tithe on wages received from their ministerial income to the district.
- That all unstationed licensed and ordained ministers pay 50% of their tithe from their ministerial wages to the district.
- That all licensed and ordained ministers not fully supported by the church, but who have other sources of income to pay 25% of their tithe on such income to the District. This also applies to ministers not receiving any ministerial income.
- That all such tithes are to be paid to the local church treasurer and forwarded to the District Treasurer.

3. **Ministerial Convention Expenses.** Be it resolved that each church in the District be asked to share in meeting the expense of the Annual District Ministerial Convention by being assessed on the following basis: each church with a membership of twenty-five or less contribute \$5 all other churches contribute \$10 each.

NO. 2 CAMP BUDGET (SPECIAL)

Inasmuch as it takes approximately \$4,000.00 for the operation expense of the District Camp Meeting and in order to provide an efficient method of securing the necessary finances for the District Camp Meeting and one which will not detract from the spiritual purpose and will remove the pressure of immediate need and giving from both our leaders and those who attend the camp.

Be it resolved that we provide for the financial needs of the camp one year in advance by raising, during one or more services of the camp, individual voluntary pledges for this purpose to be paid during the following twelve months.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent present this need and raise offerings for this purpose as he visits the churches of the district.

NO. 3 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- Because of the continual increase of camp and conference operational expense and the ever present need of expansion (such as the purchase of more land, building a new tabernacle and additional rooms), be it resolved that this conference request and urge the District Council to eliminate where ever possible the payment of money to members of the district of camp jobs; and that our camp be operated as conservatively as possible.
- Be it resolved that a financial report of our regular camp meeting and conference be placed in the district minutes with receipts and disbursements listed.
- Be it resolved that all minister's wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- That our minister's children 14 years of age and under be entertained free. Those over 14 shall be subject to call for work in any department.
- We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives.

NO. 4 CHURCHES NEWLY ORGANIZED

Be it resolved that with the exception of the pastor's tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organizations; one-half of the second year; and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

NO. 5 SUNDAY SCHOOL BUDGET (DISTRICT)

- Be it resolved that each Sunday School be assessed annually the following amounts based on their average to be used for the expense of Sunday School promotional work.

Yearly Average	Amount to pay
50 or below	\$.25 per month
50 to 100	.50 per month
100 to 200	1.00 per month
200 or above	1.25 per month

The same is to be paid to the District Treasurer.

MINISTERS

NO. 6 CO-OPERATION

- Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.

NO. 7 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Eastern Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church each call as it is presented to him.
- B. Inasmuch as Resolution No. 8A provides for the enrollment of each church's pastors and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and, inasmuch as a number of our churches have still failed to follow through on this District's legislation, be it resolved that our District Superintendent when making his first visit to the church shall bring this to the attention of the local board.

MINUTES

NO. 8 COST OF MINUTES

Be it resolved that the price of District Minutes to be left to the discretion of the District Council.

NO. 9 PREPARING MINUTES FOR PUBLICATION

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$20.00 for services.

NO. 10 MINUTES SENT TO ALL MINISTERS AND DEACONESSSES

Whereas every minister and deaconess should be vitally interested and informed concerning the progress and program of their district; Be it resolved that the District Secretary shall send a copy of the District Minutes to every ordained and licensed minister and deaconess in the district and that they shall send \$1.00 to the District Treasurer to help cover the cost.

SALARIES

NO. 11 DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary shall be \$4,784.00, 7¢ per mile traveling expense; parsonage; all utilities and four weeks vacation.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and his wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that dues shall be paid by the District Treasurer.
- C. Be it resolved that the District shall enroll the Superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan as per the plan for the local churches and their pastors, and be it further resolved that we pay the District Superintendent an amount equal to his Social Security.
- D. Be it resolved that the district pay the district superintendent's Hospitalization Insurance premiums and that not to exceed \$15.00 per month.

NO. 12 ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

We recommend that the Superintendent when in need of additional help in the administration of district work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$12.50 per day, plus 7¢ per mile traveling expense.

NO. 13 DISTRICT COUNCIL

We recommend that 7¢ per mile be given each member of the District Council for traveling to and from the council meetings.

NO. 14 DISTRICT SECRETARY AND TREASURER

Be it resolved that the District Treasurer's Salary be \$500.00 and that the District Secretary's salary be \$250.00 per year.

NO. 15 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Be it resolved that the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$100.00 per year, plus 7¢ per mile.

NO. 16 DISTRICT STATISTICIAN

Be it resolved that the Statistician shall receive \$100.00 per year. Be it further resolved that the quarterly reports shall be sent to the District Statistician and that he shall compile them and send the report to the District Superintendent.

NO. 17 EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Board be given \$50.00 per member.

NO. 18 SOCIAL SECURITY

- A. Whereas Social Security has been extended to clergy and whereas many of the pastors have elected to go into the plan, we recommend that the local church contribute to their pastor the amount equal to 50% of his social security.
- B. We further recommend that all evangelists who tithe their ministerial income one hundred per cent into the local church of which they are a member also be included in plan 18-A.

TREASURER

NO. 19 AUDITING THE TREASURER'S BOOKS

Be it resolved that we employ an accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

NO. 20 INSURING THE TREASURER

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer bonded.

YOUTH

NO. 21 YOUNG PEOPLE

A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way.

B. Whereas the present minutes state that each Church is to forward \$10.00 for the Convention and \$5.00 for the Executive Expense Fund, we recommend that each Church forward to the District Youth Treasurer \$10.00 for the expenses of the District Youth Department and the Youth Convention and that each Zone President give close attention to see that each of his churches cooperate in this.

NO. 22 MONITORS AND POLICE

We recommend that young people who receive free entertainment at our District Convention be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

NO. 23 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than \$10.00 be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

NO. 24 YOUTH CAMP

Be it resolved that where the church considers it necessary and they are financially able to do so that they consider paying the way to Youth Camp for those youth who are unable to pay.

The tenth annual District Youth Conference convened at 9:00 A.M. Saturday July 25, 1964 on the Bethel Camp Grounds at Coshocton, Ohio.

Rev. John Minsker led the congregation in singing the theme song "Lead On O King Eternal."

Rev. Duane Saylor led in prayer.

Bro. Bailey turned the service over to Rev. O. D. Emery, General Sunday School and Youth Secretary.

Roll call report was answered by Rev. Roy Ankrum, District Superintendent, Mr. Neil Bailey, District Youth President, 20 pastors, 8 presidents, and 24 delegates.

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To Our Chairman, Rev. O. D. Emery . . . Our District Superintendent, Rev. Roy Ankrum . . . Pastors and Delegates to the Tenth Annual District Youth Conference.

Shortly after the opening of the conference year, a meeting of Zone Leaders, District Youth Officers, our Talent Director, and interested District Leaders who were able to attend, was held on the camp ground to set up the total program for

the coming year. An excellent spirit of cooperation prevailed among these fine men and women from the very beginning, and has been appreciated throughout the year.

Our Zone Rally Program, with the nine areas participating, held a total of 57 rallies, with an average attendance of 222, with approximately 75% of this record attendance being 35 years of age and under. We were given opportunity to visit 8 of the 9 areas and several individual churches this year in this interest.

Our first Senior Banquet, with 108 attending, was held the evening of May 29th on the conference grounds. A similar meeting is planned for this year.

The District Talent Hunt, together with our participation in the General Church Quiz Program, was under the very able direction of Miss Sharon Downey this year, and a Quiz Team will be sent to the National Youth Convention. A number of our young people are being prepared for the General Talent Contest.

A study was begun to determine the various areas of need in strengthening the overall Youth Program of the District.

On Memorial Day, our District Rally was again the largest single gathering of Pilgrims in Eastern Ohio, and included a Memorial Service, and the Talent Hunt Finals, with three age groups participating, in four categories.

This year the Youth Camp Program topped all previous attendance records, with a total of 305 registered campers, and a staff of 55, in the two age divisions.

PERSONAL REPORT

My capacity to serve the church is limited by full-time employment, however, in addition to my duties as district youth president, I serve as Sunday School Superintendent of my local church, and on the board of directors at Eastern Pilgrim College, and have traveled 9,647 miles outside my local area in these above interests, outside our local area, during the conference year.

Local Youth Society Presidents gave good reports on their societies. Rev. Emery made a plea to each president to charter their society, that there is only one requirement and that is to abide by the church law that is in the manual. It was carried to accept the reports of the presidents.

The Resolutions Committee chairman Rev. C. Dozer gave the report of the Resolutions committee. Resolutions No. 1, 6, and 10 carried. New Resolutions No. 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19 carried.

The Ways and Means Report was given by Rev. H. Kuhn. Resolutions No. 1-B was referred back to the committee and Youth Council.

The appointed tellers then passed out ballots for the election of officers for the coming conference year.

Brother Bailey announced the appointments for the committees next year.

The nominations were read for zone chairman.

The conference then divided into sections to elect their chairman for the coming year. The Ohio River and Southern Zones were combined by the District Council.

After reassembling in the conference bar the final resolution was being: that we express our appreciation to Rev. O. D. Emery with a standing vote, carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

RESOLUTION NO. 1

RESOLUTION NO. 3

We recommend that the Executive Committee and Zone Leaders be kept in the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Be it resolved that the Resolution Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as the choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Young People's Executive Committee to enforce this during the Young People's Convention.

RESOLUTION NO. 6

Be it resolved that the Zone Chairman appoint the Zone Secretary from the "Teen-Age" group if practical.

RESOLUTION NO. 7

Be it resolved that the District and Zone Officers Banquet be held the month of September.

RESOLUTION NO. 8

Inasmuch as the unity of the District depends greatly upon the "oneness" of the Zone Churches, be it resolved that each zone plan at least one Special Prayer Meeting as early in the conference year as possible.

RESOLUTION NO. 9

Be it resolved that the age range for the District Talent Hunt shall be under twenty years in all categories.

RESOLUTION NO. 10

Inasmuch as the District Youth Week End meetings were a great spiritual lift to our youth and church in general, be it resolved that we conduct the same in the month of March with a Special Offering to be lifted for the District Youth Project.

RESOLUTION NO. 11

- A. Inasmuch as there is a vast difference of interest, because of the age span, 9 thru 16, and in that there are many young people over the age of 16 who would like to attend our youth camps, be it resolved that we conduct a Junior and Senior Youth Camp.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council be authorized to establish the time and age limits for each camp.

RESOLUTION NO. 12

Be it resolved that we establish a five (5) member Board of Youth Camp Directors, appointed for a five year decreasing term by the Youth Council. The District Youth President, by virtue of his office, will be chairman of this board and any retiring president is to be given first consideration for appointment to this board.

RESOLUTION NO. 13

Inasmuch as our Youth Convention is held in the interest of the youth of our district, be it resolved that our annual Youth Convention and Conference be held at the close of the Senior Youth Camp.

RESOLUTION NO. 14

Be it resolved that a Junior-Senior banquet be held annually.

RESOLUTION NO. 15

- A. Be it resolved that a Teenage King and Queen be selected at our Senior Youth Camp.
- B. One candidate for King and Queen to be chosen in each zone by May 30th each year.
- C. Each candidate will have youth camp fee paid by the zone.
- D. Candidate qualifications shall be set by the District Youth Council.

RESOLUTION NO. 16

Be it resolved that each zone officer be authorized to appoint zone officers as soon after conference as practical.

RESOLUTION NO. 17

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council set the date for our Youth conference, with the approval of the District Council.

RESOLUTION NO. 18

Be it resolved that the District Youth sponsor a scholarship to our zone college. Be it further resolved that there be a scholarship committee appointed by the District Youth Council for the purpose of awarding the scholarship. The said committee shall determine the qualifications for awarding the scholarship.

RESOLUTION NO. 19

Be it resolved that we express our appreciation to our General Youth Secretary, Rev. O. D. Emery for his cooperation, and especially for presiding at our conference today.
