Report of the lay delegate ballot was read. M/S/C that the five highest be declared elected. They are; Miss Margaret Jones, Mr. John Carter, Mr. Chester Bussa Mr. Robert Smith, Mr. Robert Christian.

M/S/C that we vote on the tie for sixth place.

Mrs. P. W. Thomas was introduced by Rev. Harris.

Mrs. Rhoda Kelly was elected as sixth delegate.

M/S/C that we accept the next six as alternates. They are: Miss Lena Hacker, Mr. Jonathan Brown, Mr. Howard McKee, Mr. Ray Moon, Mr. Frank Moore and Mrs. Mary Lambert.

We were adjourned.

FOURTH SITTING

The Tuesday morning session was the ordination service. Three ministers and two deaconesses received their vows.

Committee on Memorials continued their report. No. 1 was approved.

Resolution Committee presented another resolution, but Dr. Thomas suggested that it be made a memorial. M/S/C that this be presented to the Council to be sent as a memorial. The resolution of appreciation was accepted with a rising vote of thanks.

Appointment of committees read by the Secretary, and the Superintendent read the pastoral appointments.

M/S/C that all unfinished business be referred to the District Council. Conference adjourned at 10:30 A.M., Tuesday, August 10.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, faithful ministers, delegates, and friends of this eleventh Annual Conference of the Eastern Ohio District: Greetings in the name of our wonderful Saviour, Jesus Christ. How sweet it is, in these days of perplexity and uncertainity, to be able to testify in the words of the songwriter and say, There's a deep settled peace in my soul, And tho' the billows of sin near me roll, He abides, Christ abides.

It seems such a short time since I stood before you to give my last report, that it is hard to realize that a whole year has passed. The past twelve months have been extremely busy and challenging ones for us, but they have never been boring or burdensome. In fact, we have enjoyed it to the fullest extent. To our great God we give praise and thanks for good health and traveling mercies throughout the past year.

It has been a continuing delight and privilege to visit the pastors and their families in their parsonage homes and to preach in their churches. The warm hospitality, the Christian fellowship, and the spiritual blessings received during these visits are a constant source of pleasure to my wife and I, for which we are deeply grateful.

It is now our duty to evaluate our work for the past year. The statement which I made last year, I feel I must repeat, as I again find so little to boast of within myself. We have conducted five district missionary committee meetings. We have held fourteen missionary services when called upon by societies of the district.

A profitable mid-winter District Missionary Convention was held in Columbus II Church on January 7th. Miss Evalee Mason and Miss Ruth Meeks were the speakers.

Five new adult societies were organized this year. Thank God for this interest from Fremont, Lancaster South Broad, Toledo East, Portsmouth First and Waverly. We praise Him for two new Junior Societies. These are at Cleveland and Fremont.

The Junior societies of the district collected a large portion of the price of the garbage disposal for the camp kitchen. District Council allowed us the last \$60.00. Total price of this commercial size disposal and spray rinse was \$317.86.

Many societies made towels and aprons for the camp. We have also handled the laundering of them during this camp season.

The current amount in the district missionary treasury is \$75.00.

The district missionary project of the year brought \$574.76 on the purchase price of church property in Brazil. A minature of our Pilgrim Holiness Brazil mission station is now here on display.

At the outset of last year, it was asked that a free-will offering for the mission-

ary treasury be given in each service where the District Missionary President was requested to speak. This was complied with in most of the churches. It is asked again this year that this rule be followed.

Each society is also asked to again send \$6.00 per year to the District Missionary Treasurer for district society expense.

We appreciate the services of Rev. M. L. Peterson and Miss Ruth Meeks in this camp. I express gratitude to faithful colaborers on the district committee, who helped all year.

Missionaries and Christian workers around the world are the greatest Peace Corps yet, for they lead men to the Prince of Peace. Let us continue to pray for and support them.

One of the primary concerns of the DCEC this year has been the ground work for the starting of the new church in Columbus. Four acres of ground has been purchased for the sum of \$10,500.00.

If proper finances allow, the first building of a 3-stage building program will be started this fall. There appears to be outstanding possibilities for this new work if we as members of the Eastern Ohio District will unite our prayers and give of our means in the coming year. The District will be kept informed as to the development of the work as it progresses.

NO. 2 CAMP SERVICES

Be it resolved that the schedule of our Camp Meeting services be so arranged as to permit one service each to be devoted to the interests of the following phases of our work; namely, World Missions, General Church Extension, District Church Extension and Sunday School.

NO. 3 CHURCH SIGNS

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

NO. 4 COMMITTEES

- (a) Be it resolved that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee consist of five members and three shall be a quorum.
- (b) Be it resolved that no unauthorized person be permitted to present resolutions on the Conference floor. All resolutions must be cleared either with the Resolutions Committee or the Ways and Means Committee.
- (c) Be it resolved that no more than one Council member serve on any one committee, except the District Extension Committee.

NO. 5 CONFERENCE YEAR.

- (a) Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare reports for conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- (b) Inasmuch as the conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close July 15th.

NO. 6 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister of the District, or a minister's wife, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairman and that they immediately notify all pastors in their zone; and that they shall be reimbursed by the District for expenses incurred.

NO. 7 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION

- (a) Be it resolved that the district home missionary program shall be the responsibility of the District Council.
- (b) Be it resolved that we as a conference set the month of September as District Extension Month for the purpose of presenting the need and raising of funds.
- (c) In consideration of the need of district home missionary work, be it resolved that each pastor in the Eastern Ohio District be subject to a call by the Church Extension Committee for a two weeks revival.

NO. 8 LOAN PLAN

Be it resolved that we adopt the Pilgrim Pension, Inc., in the Eastern Ohio District for the purpose of helping churches to build.

NO. 9 MINISTERS

- (a) Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach who is not a member of the local Pilgrim Holiness Church in this district, and who does not fully cooperate with the local church program and the pastor.
- (b) Inasmuch as some of our ministers wish to further their education; Be it resolved that, if feasible, arrangements be made to offer college courses to our men. Such classes would be held at our camp grounds at a time not to conflict with other district activities. The date, cost and teachers would be determined by a committee appointed by our district council.

NO. 10 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District have an annual Ministerial Convention. The time and place to be determined by the Council.

NO. 11 PASTORS

- (a) Be it resolved that the churches of the Eastern Ohio District shall give first consideration to the ministers of our conference in extending a call for their pastor. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent shall not recommend a minister outside the bounds of our district until after a church has failed to elect a pastor from the ministers of our District.
- (b) Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name at a time. And be it further resolved that the Pastoral vote be held the third week in May under the direction of the church secretary. The church board will count the votes and the results of a recall or non-recall be announced to the church. The total results of voting to be forwarded to the District Superintendent and the pastor.
- (c) Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living; Be it resolved that the District Superintendent take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the Superintendent meets with the local church boards.
- (d) In order that the churches may receive credit for the full amount they contribute toward pastoral support; Be it resolved that the District Superintendent urge the local church to consider providing parsonage and utilities; and this be made a part of the pastor's report.
- (e) Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the first Sunday after Camp. (Manual, Sec. 53, Par.1)
- (f) Whereas our Manual makes no provision for the pastor's vacation, Be it resolved our churches give their pastor two weeks vacation and the District Camp meeting each year with support. Be it further resolved each pastor be permitted to accept two revivals per year.

NO. 12 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of District officials be settled before the election of officers.

NO. 13 STANDARDS

(a) Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

(b) Inasmuch as there are moral, physical and spiritual dangers in and many perils associated with television, be it resolved that this conference go on record urging our people to guard against the evils thereof.

NO. 14 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

- (a) Inasmuch as our District Camp is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Eastern Ohio Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday schools.
- (b) Be it resolved that only those present in the Sunday school classes in the church be counted in total attendance for that Sunday. All others who may be taught elsewhere such as our shut-ins, are to be counted and entered under "Home Department" and not included in the count.
- (c) Be it resolved that we adopt the following recommendations:
 - (1) That each Sunday School endeavor to start new Sunday School classes.
 - (2) That each Sunday School and each class set goals and strive to reach them.
 - (3) That each Sunday School adopt a system for contacting absentees.
 - (4) That each Sunday School plan weekly group vistations.
 - (5) That each Sunday School departmentalize as soon as possible.
 - (6) That much attention be given the Cradle Roll.

NO. 15 SUPERINTENDENT

- (a) Be it resolved that when the District Superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- (b) Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings if possible; however, he may authorize anyone he chooses to conduct them.

NO. 16 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

NO. 17 UNITED STEWARDSHIP AND DISTRICT FUND

- (a) Be it resolved that the United Stewardship Fund and our District Budget be raised and sent to the District Treasurer as one fund which shall be known as the United Stewardship and District Fund.
 (For the purpose of the annual report, the local church treasurer can take
 - the total amount sent in for this Fund and divide it by 13, then multiply the result by 5 and that would be the amount that went to the District.

 The balance would be the amount that had been forwarded to the United Stew-
 - The balance would be the amount that had been forwarded to the United Stewardship Fund.)
- (b) Be it resolved that the District Treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the district and general interests and that said cards be forwarded to the pastors as soon after the Conference as possible.
- (c) The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budgets six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.
- (d) Be it resolved that each church establish a workable plan in order to meet these obligations.

APPRECIATION

Be it resolved that we extend a vote of thanks to our General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, who presided so efficiently over the business of this conference and to our District Superintendent, Rev. Roy Ankrim, and others who had a part in making this conference a success.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

NO. 1 UNITED STEWARDSHIP AND DISTRICT FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the United Stewardship Fund and our District Budget be raised and sent to the District Treasurer as one fund which shall be known as the United Stewardship and District Fund. (See Resolutions Committee Report, No. 18)
 - 1. The United Stewardship and District Fund shall total 13 per member, as outlined below. (B. 1., and C.1.)

B. GENERAL CHURCH FINANCIAL PLAN

- 1. (Manual, Sec. 149) There shall be a United Stewardship Fund of \$8 per member, to be divided as follows: Administration, 38%; Church Extension, 30%; Liberal Arts College, 22%; Sunday Schools and Youth, 6%; Church Extension Loan Fund, 2%; and Contingent Fund, 2%.
- 2. Each district shall assume an amount equal to \$8 per assessable member. They may apportion this amount to the churches either on a membership or financial strength basis, said apportionment to be made at the time of the annual conference for the following year.
- 3. Money for the support of World Missions shall be raised through deputational work in the churches and the annual Self-Denial Offering. The department of World Missions shall not do deputational work in the churches or colleges during the four weeks preceding Easter and on Rally Day Sunday in October.

C. DISTRICT FINANCIAL PLAN

1. District Budget. Be it resolved that our District Budget shall be \$5 per member, and that it shall be divided by the District Treasurer as follows:

- 2. Minister's Tithe. Be it resolved:
 - a. That all stationed ministers pay all their tithe on wages received from their ministerial income to the district.
 - b. That all unstationed licensed and ordained ministers pay 50% of their tithe from their ministerial wages to the district.
 - c. That all licensed and ordained ministers not fully supported by the church, but who have other sources of income to pay 25% of their tithe on such income to the District. This also applies to ministers not receiving any ministerial income.
 - d. That all such tithes are to be paid to the local church treasurer and and forwarded to the District Treasurer.

- e. Due to the fact that the District Superintendent is the pastor of the entire district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent shall place one-half his ministerial tithe in the District Tithe Fund and the other half at his own discretion.
- 3. Ministerial Convention Expenses. Be it resolved that each church in the District be asked to share in meeting the expense of the Annual District Ministerial Convention by being assessed on the following basis: each church with a membership of twenty-five or less contribute \$5; all other churches contribute \$10 each.

NO. 2 CAMP BUDGET (SPECIAL)

Inasmuch as it takes approximately \$5,000.00 for the operation expense of the District Camp Meeting, Be it resolved that we provide for the financial needs of the camp one year in advance by raising, during one or more services of the camp, individual voluntary pledges for this purpose to be paid during the following twelve months.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent present this need and raise offerings for this purpose as he visits the churches of the district.

NO. 3 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- (a) Because of the continual increase of camp and conference operational expense and the ever present need of expansion, be it resolved that this conference request the District Council to eliminate wherever possible the payment of money to members of the district, and that our camp be operated as conservatively as possible.
- (b) Be it resolved that a financial report of our regular camp meeting and conference be placed in the district minutes.
- (c) Be it resolved that all minister's wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- (d) That our minister's children 14 years of age and under be entertained free. Those over 14 shall be subject to call for work in any department.

NO. 4 CHURCHES NEWLY ORGANIZED

Be it resolved that with the exception of the pastor's tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organizations; one-half of the second year; and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

NO. 5 SUNDAY SCHOOL BUDGET (DISTRICT)

(a) Be it resolved that each Sunday School be assessed annually the following amounts based on their average to be used for the expense of Sunday School promotional work.

Yearly Average	Amount to Pay
50 or below	\$.25 per month
51 to 100	.50 per month
101 to 200	1.00 per month
201 or above	1.25 per month

The same is to be paid to the District Treasurer.

MINISTERS

NO. 6 CO-OPERATION

(a) Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.

NO. 7 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- (a) Be it resolved that each pastorate in the Eastern Ohio District enroll itspastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay their membership and call fees.
- (c) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, when making his first visit to the churches shall bringthe above resolution to the attention of the local board.

NO. 8 MINUTES

Be it resolved that the price of the District Minutes be left to the District Council.

NO. 9 PREPARATION OF MINUTES

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help prepare the minutes for publication and their pay to be \$35.00.

SALARIES

NO. 10 DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- (a) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent salary shall be \$5,200.00 per year, 7ϕ per mile traveling expense; parsonage; all utilities and four weeks vacation.
- (b) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and his wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that dues shall be paid by the District Treasurer.
- (c) Be it resolved that the District shall pay the entire Pilgrim Pension Plan and an amount equal to his Social Security.
- (d) Be it resolved that the district pay the District Superintendent's hospitalization insurance premiums and that not to exceed \$20.00 per month.

NO. 11 ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

We recommend that the Superintendent when in need of additional help in the administration of district work, be authorized to secure the service of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$15.00 per day, plus 7ϕ per mile traveling expense.

NO. 12 DISTRICT COUNCIL

We recommend that 7ϕ per mile be given each member of the District Council for traveling to and from the council meetings.

NO. 13 DISTRICT SECRETARY AND TREASURER

Be it resolved that the District Treasurer's Salary be \$500.00 and that the District Secretary's Salary be \$250.00 per year.

NO. 14 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Be it resolved that the Sunday School Promotional Secreatary shall receive \$100.00 per year, plus 7ϕ per mile.

NO. 15 DISTRICT STATISTICIAN

Be it resolved that the Statistician shall receive \$100.00 per year. Be it further resolved that the quarterly reports shall be sent to the District Statistician and that he shall compile them and send the report to the District Superintendent.

NO. 16 EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Board be given \$50.00per member.

NO. 17 SOCIAL SECURITY

- (a) We recommend that the local church contribute to their pastor the amount equal to 50% of his social security.

 (b) We further recommend that all evencelist who tithe their ministerial income.
- (b) We further recommend that all evangelist who tithe their ministerial income $100\,\%$ into the local church of which they are a member also be included in plan 17 a.

NO. 18 AUDITING THE TREASURER BOOK

Be it resolved that we employ an accountant to audit the book of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 15th and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

NO. 19 INSURING THE TREASURER

We recommend that the council have the District Treasurer bonded.

NO. 20 YOUNG PEOPLE

- (a) Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithes in their own local church, in the usual way.
- (b) Whereas the present minutes state that each church is to forward \$10.00 for the Convention and \$5.00 for the executive expense fund, we recommend that each church forward to the District Youth Treasurer, \$10.00 for the expense of the District Youth Department and the youth convention and that each zone

president give close attention to see that each of his churches cooperate.

NO. 21 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

In as much as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than \$10.00 be given him for each zone rally in which he speaks.

NO. 22 YOUTH CAMP

Be it resolved that where the church considers it necessary and they are financially able to do so that they consider paying the way to Youth Camp for those youth who are unable to pay.

DISTRICT YOUTH CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The Eleventh Annual District Youth Conference convened at 1:00 P.M. Saturday, April 24, 1965 at Elyria, Ohio.

Mr. Neil Bailey, District Youth President, led the congregation in singing the theme song, "Lead On O King Eternal".

Rev. Roy Ankrim, our good Superintendent, led in prayer.

Mr. Neil Bailey, our District Youth President then turned the service over to Rev. O. D. Emery, General Sunday School and Youth Secretary.

Roll call report was answered by Rev. Roy Ankrim, District Superintendent, Mr. Neil Bailey, District Youth President, 19 Pastors, 8 local youth presidents, and 23 delegates.

Rev. O.D. Emery and Conference gave Bro. Bailey a standing ovation in apprecation for his faithful service during the past six years.

Treasurer Report was given by Rev. Howard Kuhn, District Treasurer. Moved and seconded to accept the report. Received with appreciation.

The various Zone Chairmen gave outstanding reports for the past conference year. Moved and seconded to accept the Zone Chairmen's reports with appreciation.

Local Youth Presidents gave outstanding reports on their activities during the rear. Twelve presidents reported. Motion to receive reports by majority. Rev. Emery mentioned the fact that Elyria Church had 17 Seniors graduating. He also enouraged every society to organize and charter their society.

Miss Sharon Downey presented the talent winners of the District who will represent the Eastern Ohio District at the Talent Finals at the General Youth Convention. They are as follows:

Rev. Roy Ankrim, District Superintendent, expressed regrets that Bro. Bailey vas leaving the district. He stated that his labors in the past would be greatly missed. The Superintendent and Conference wished him a prosperous and happy future in the work of the Lord.

Election followed.

Rev. Duane Saylor was elected President on the third ballot. The newly elected president expressed his appreciation for the vote of confidence. Stated he would try to be worthy of the confidence placed in him.

Rev. Carles Fletcher was elected vice-president; Rev. Froman Gollihue was elected district youth secretary; Rev. Howard Kuhn was elected district treasurer.

The election of district youth Zone leaders was put in the hands of the District Council in conjunction with Youth Council.

Rev. Saylor presented a check of fifty dollars, from the youth department, to ro. Bailey as a giftfor his faithfulness and labors in the youth work. Bro. Bailey served our district for six year.

The final resolution was: That we express our appreciation to Rev. O.D.Emery with a standing vote. Carried.

The 1965 District Youth Conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. O. D. Emery.

YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To our Chairman, Rev. O. D. Emery, our District Superintendent, Rev. Roy Ankrim, and members of the 11th Annual District Youth Conference:

The young men and women of our denomination this past year have been offered a full and unparalleled program of opportunity, service and recognition. You who have made a sincere effort to make these opportunities available to your youth have known the thrill of fresh outreach and the flavor of victory.

It was my privilege again this year to visit every area of our district in a zone rally set aside for this purpose. The one thing outstanding this year has been the large percentage of youth attending these rallies. In one instance, with more than 200 in attendance, the count indicated that 85% were 35 years and under. This appears to be a general trend in most areas. The Southern Zone, with Mr. Chester Bussa as zone president, topped all others with an average of 200 per rally. The most significant gain was made by the Central Zone, Rev. Dallas Ford, president, with a 78% gain over last year. The Great Lakes Zone, under Rev. Don Wachenschwanz, led in the percentage of young people attending.

Two separate Youth Camps were conducted last year, and planned this year, according to the two general age groups. Without question, this lends itself to better control and direction in housing, classes, and in special activities and recreation. Our sincerest appreciation is expressed hereto the approximately fifty men and women who serve in the program, which has set new levels of attendance and interest. I am of the earnest conviction that this is far and away our most effective means of reaching through to the general masses of young people in our church as a whole, and the isolated teenager from many of our smaller churches in particular.

A special note of thanks is due to Miss Sharon Downey for her work in conducting the District Talent Hunt - actually our sixth year in this field. A sizeable number of our contestants were committed to the International Pilgrim Youth Convention. We most earnestly beg of you to enlarge upon this phase of the district program in the coming year. Miss Downey also directed the Book of Acts Quiz, and prepared a team for participation at the General Convention, from the Columbus II Church.

The past year marked the first time for us to conduct a banquet in recognition of our high school and college seniors. A similar event is planned this year. I feel that in years to come, the Lord willing, this will prove to be a most timely opportunity to touch upon the lives of our young people at this significant fork in the road.

Despite the distance involved, we have a good number of our young people in our zone college, and other denominational schools. This in view of the limited support is an active manner from a fraction of our church. A scholarship is now being set up in our district to give financial aidto selected students who plan to enter full time christian service.

I would that there were some way that I could adequately express my sincere, heartfelt appreciation to that resolute band of men and women who have served unselfishly in the forefront, and many times in unfamiliar territory, of the youth work over these past six years that it has been my privilege to serve. RESOLUTION NO. 1.

RESOLUTION NO. 2.

- B. Be it resolved that each society note their responsibility to support the General Youth Department with 5% of their offerings.

RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTION NO. 1.

Inasmuch as we feel the visits of our District Youth President to our zones during the past year have been a real blessing, be it resolved that the executive president visit each zone as least once during the fiscal year.

RESOLUTION NO. 2.

In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone leader arrange a meeting with the district superintendent, the pastors and young people presidents of his zone as soon after the conference as possible to plan the program for his zone for the year.

RESOLUTION NO. 3.




