REV. L. W. STURK Late General Supt. Pilgrim Holiness Church (See Report of Memorial Committee)

REV. LOUIS WILLARD STURK, D. D. 1895-1955

Dr. Louis W. Sturk, our beloved General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, went to his eternal reward on June 13, 1955, at Defiance, Ohio.

His body was taken to Owosso, Michigan, his old home, where the funeral was conducted at 2:30 p. m., June 17, at the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Dr. Sturk was a graduate of the Owosso Bible College when it was known as Owosso Bible Seminary. A Doctor of Divinity degree was granted him by God's Bible School in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Brother Sturk was one of the first students at Owosso Bible College when Rev. C. G. Taylor was its President. He was married to Miss Mae Taylor, and to this union were born three girls and two boys.

His ministerial career began in Michigan, where he served the Ellsworth and Flint churches. While in the Michigan Conference he served as one of the directors of the Bible Holiness Seminary, and for two years was its Acting President. He also served as Secretary of the Michigan Conference.

Rev. Sturk accepted the call to serve as pastor of the First Church in Cincinnati, Ohio, and remained there for six years. He was elected to the office of superintendent of the Ohio District in 1943, and remained in that office until 1946 when he was elected as General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church denomination.

While Brother Sturk was superintendent of the Ohio District a wonderful spirit of co-operation prevailed. It was during this time that the present tabernacle and Dining Hall were erected.

He was kind and considerate of all, and no pastor's problem was too large and none too small for him to share. Under his leadership our churches progressed spiritually and his visits to the churches were greatly enjoyed by both pastor and people. While we rejoiced at his promotion to General Superintendent yet we as a district felt our loss of a good spiritual leader.

He served as General Superintendent two terms of four years each and last General Conference was re-elected to another term of four years. He had just completed his first year when he was called to his heavenly home.

Brother Sturk is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mae Sturk; two sons: Louis and James; three daughters: Virginia, Georgia, and Alice; and several grandchildren, among them Barbara who made her home with him.

The sentiments of our Ohio Conference are summed up in the words, "he was a good man and a lover of peace." He wanted a spiritual church—a church that would honor the Father, the Son, the Holy Ghost, and the Divine Revelation. We shall always remember Brother Sturk especially for his singing the song, "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone." We are sure the One he loved and served was there to guide him across the river. We shall always cherish the memory of this great and good man with deep appreciation.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

(Western District)

To the First Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District, Pilgrim Holiness

Churches now in session, Sugar Grove Camp Ground, Springfield, Ohio, greetings. In the providence of an all wise and benevolent Heavenly Father, we have been spared to again assemble for the transaction of the business incident to the carrying on of the work of the Lord in this great District. Many and varied have been the experiences of the past year. No darker period has been known in the nations of the world. We desire to give thanks to our God for the indescribable sweetness of His blessings, mercy, and love, whereby we have been so graciously led along the way that has provided fellowship and assurance of victory.

From day to day we have been conscious of His Divine presence, and for our complete dependence on Him for grace, wisdom and strength, to serve as we ought to serve, and be the blessing a minister of the gospel is supposed to be.

Following the resignation of the former superintendent we were placed in the position as District Superintendent by the District Council.

At this time many of the Annual Meetings had not been held but a letter from the District Secretary carrying the desire of the District Council that the pastors conduct their own Annual meeting where pastorial changes or complications did not enter into the picture, greatly relieved our burden. We greatly appreciate the cooperation of the ministers in this phase of the work.

Improvements

Celina Rev. Wayne Hill, the pastor, reports, by a trust fund they have been given the use of an entire estate consisting of a double lot, approximately 75x150 feet, Church and parsonage combination, and a building large enough to serve as garage for the church bus and pastor's car. The parsonage has been redecorated, new table and chairs purchased for the tiny-tot Sunday School Class. The property value is considered about \$15,000.00.

Cincinnati First The Church at Fifteenth and Elm Sts. and the parsonage at 1914 Young Street were sold and a fine home at the corner of Highland and McGregor Ave. was purchased as the new parsonage. In December of 1954, the new brick church at Highland and McGregor Streets costing approximately \$46,000.00 was first used for service. In January 1955, the church and parsonage were dedicated. Rev. Melroy Ward is the good pastor.

Dayton First Rev. George Poole, pastor, reports the church has purchased a church bus and redecorated the Sunday School rooms.

Greenville The Greenville Church has installed a new heating system and redecorated the parsonage at a cost of over \$500.00. A new carpet has been purchased and laid in the Church Auditorium at a cost of \$1100.00. Rev. W. L. Kilwy, pastor.

Greenwich Village This church is being lengthened sixteen feet which gives them two more Sunday School rooms 8x14 with movable partitions. Rev. Ralph Shope, pastor.

Liberty The church audi'orium has been redecorated and paint purchased to paint the church roof. Rev. R. C. Ferguson is the pastor.

Lima First Lima First is in a building program enlarging the church, making the structure 42x60 feet with full basement, at a cost of \$13,000.00. Rev. J. B. Zeits is the pastor.

Lima Market Street Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz reports a new tile floor in the sanctuary. Seventy-nine new folding steel chairs have been purchased for the Sunday School Rooms, and all the Sunday School Rooms have been redecorated. An amplifier has been installed for prefacing Sunday Morning service with community-flooded recorded chimes. Also, the church is in its fifth year of Radio ministry.

Maud Rev. Eugene Sohn, the good pastor, reports the construction of an outside entrance to the church basement, which proves a great blessing to the Sunday School. Miamisburg At Miamisburg the auditorium floor has been sanded and varnished pews refinished and nursery completed at an over-all cost of \$200.00. The church furnished the labor. Rev. M. L. Bogard is the pastor.

Peebles Rev. James Adams, the good pastor, reports new church steps with railings, floor sanded and varnished, auditorium redecorated, new vestibule doors installed, new forced air furnace, concrete floor in the basement and new rest rooms.

Pleasant Valley A new rug has been laid on the floor of the platform, and the auditorium floor covered with new tile at a cost of approximately \$220.00. Money has been raised and plans are on foot to remodel the basement Sunday School rooms. Rev. R. M. Dillard, pastor.

St. Marys Rev. R. D. Brown reports a new basement exit with fire walls and outside stairways. The furnace and fuel rooms have been fireproofed to meet state requirements. The auditorium has been completely redecorated.

Union City, Ohio (Post Office Union City, Indiana) The Greenville Pilgrim Holiness Church, seeing the possibility of a new church at Union City, Indiana, lent assistance in many ways until an organization was perfected.

The new church at Union City was organized Sept. 9th, 1954 with 17 members. It now has 24 members.

The building in which worship is conducted was purchased at a cost of \$2500.00 Also 93 used opera seats have been purchased at a cost of \$270.00, and 50 new

hymnals secured at a cost of \$78.50. Other improvements include two heating stoves, new hot water heater, new paint job, new church sign, and a piano. Rev. Donald Wilson is the pastor.

Washington Court House On October 17th, 1954, the new Pilgrim Holiness Church at Washington Court House was dedicated. This building consists of a basement 31x56, equipped with a 185,000 B.T.U. natural gas furnace, also two well equipped rest rooms, four Sunday School rooms.

The walls are of cement block, beautifully finished inside in two tone green.

The main auditorium is 31x48 floored and with beautiful clear oak, and plaster tinted a mild green.

The Dedicatoral Service was held in the afternoon, and many friends came and filled the church to capacity. Our General Superintendent, the Late L. W. Sturk, had charge of this service.

This church is now being served by Rev. and Mrs. L. R. Roberts.

The value of this structure is 30,000.00 and at present has only about 6000.00 indebtedness.

The Sitting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. A. J. Steiger.

Fourth Sitting Tuesday Morning (Western Ohio District)

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

Resolution No. 7D, which had been held over, carried.

Resolution No. 18 and 19 Carried

The Resolutions passed by the Western Ohio Youth Conference were presented in a slightly modified form and ratified. (See Youth Business Meeting)

The Examining Committee presented candidates for ordination as follows: Wayne Goldsmith, Max O'Dell, and Donald Lorenzo Wilson as ministers and Mrs. A. D. Hunt and Mrs. Fannie Sprague as deaconesses.

A motion carried to approve the action of the Examining board,

A Resolution coming from the joint Councils that the Camp Ground Trustees have full charge of the District Camp, was amended by adding the words, "As long as these two Camps are held together." The Resolution passed as amended. Another resolution from the joint Councils carried, that the Conference

Another resolution from the joint Councils carried, that the Conference treasurer. Brother Rutledge, be given until the tenth of August to complete the business incidental to his office and to turn the books over to the District Treasurers. Brother Rutledge and the two new treasurers are to meet at or near that time to divide the funds and turn over the books.

A motion carried to ratify the action of the Council, scheduling the Ordination Service to be held at 7:00 P. M. tonight.

The Statistician read his report which was adopted.

Concerning the proposed plan of borrowing money from the Pilgrim Pension Plan Inc., the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts,

Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilogrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

The Conference was next favored by a special number in song by Rev. J. C. Brillhart who sang, "Way Down Deep In The Sea", Sister Brillhart accompanied him at the piano.

A motion for adjournment was followed by all standing and singing the Doxology.

The Conference adjourned with words of admonition and prayer led by Rev. Neff.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 Budgets

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District and General Interests, and said cards be forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District or General Budget be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budget, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.
- No. 2 Camp
- A. Be it resolved that any person who has furnished, and regularly rents a room shall have authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during the camp it shall be turned over to the Camp Secretary, unless he has authorized a family or a married person to occupy the room.
- B. Further, that all who rent a room or cot at camp, furnish their own linen.
- C. Be it resolved that any person who is transferred from our district to another district, or otherwise becomes disqualified, shall be automatically dispossessed of his room. These persons whose claims have been relinquished shall be immediately notified by the camp secretary.

- D. Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the camp ground during camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep the peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Gommittee.
- E. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference with fair remuneration; also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the camp.

No. 3 Conference.

Be it resolved that we provide services for the children during Conference.

- No. 4 Conference Year
- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's book close July 5th.

No. 5 Daily Vacation Bible School

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches.

No. 6 Decease of Minister or Wife

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister or minister's wife of the District, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and that they immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred.

No. 7 Ministers

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.
- B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study; therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.
- D. Be it resolved that our unstationed licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 8 Ministerial Benefit Association

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 9 Ministerial Convention

- A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.
- B. The date of said institute shall begin on the Monday following the first Sunday of March and continue through Wednesday of that week.
- C. The location of this should be as nearly central as possible.

No. 10 Missions

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two persons to serve with the District Superintendent as a Home Missionary Committee.
- B. This committee shall direct the efforts of a corps of ministers cooperating in Home Missionary Projects.
- C. Each Minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.
- D. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.

- E. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.
- F. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in the new works.
- G. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer and forwarded to the Treasurer of this committee.
- H. We also recommend that this committee investigate the advisability of building one or more folding Church Trailers.
- No. 11 Name of Church

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 12 Ordination

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

- A. Be it resolved that the examining board meet at least ten days prior to the convening of the District Conference.
- B. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.
- C. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night of Conference.

No. 13 Owosso Bible College

Inasmuch as the Board of Trustees of Owosso Bible College has adopted a reorganizational plan whereby the official control of the College is vested in a Board of Trustees equally representing the entire school zone, Be it Resolved that the Western Ohio Conference approve said reorganizational plan by electing one Trustee of Owosso Bible College for each six hundred members as specified by the revised By-Laws of the College. Be it further Resolved that the terms of office of said Trustees need be fixed in such a manner that hereafter only one Trustee need be elected each year except when membership increase calls for the election of additional Trustees.

14 Pastors

- A. Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.
- B. To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.
- D. Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be reconsidered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.

15 Salaries

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after the election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

16 Standards

Be it resolved that the following recommendations be placed in our District Minutes:

- A. For information concerning the standards of deportment and dress maintained by the Pilgrim Holiness Church, we refer all the following sections of the 1954 Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Church Covenant, PP. 21-23 and Special Rules, p. 35-38.
- B. We urge all Western Ohio Pilgrims to acquaint themselves with these rules of conduct.

No. 17 Sunday School Promotion

A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School Committee recommends the state conference provide for a District Sunday School Committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to co-operate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee or board be appointed by the council, and that the superintendents be members of said board.

- B. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Convention be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the promotional Secretary of District Sunday School work shall appoint committees in the various zones of the District to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- C. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our District Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- D. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.
- after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance. E. We recommend that the Ways and Means Committee present a plan of financing the Sunday School Institute to this Conference.

No. 18 Superintendent

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.

No. 19 Tithe

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 20 Voting

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 21 Youth Camp

- A. Inasmuch as youth camps in other districts are proving of definite spiritual value to the young people attending, be it resolved that the Western Ohio District conduct such a camp at the Springfield Camp Ground during the last week of June.
- B. This shall be designated as a junior camp for youth in the ages 9 to 13 inclusive.
- C. This Youth Camp shall be primarily of a devotional instructive and evangelistic nature, including Bible Studies and principle points of the doctrines of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, with a provision for daily evangelistic services.

No. 22 Youth Council

Inasmuch as the establishing of a Youth Camp is certain to place a heavier burden upon the Evecutive Youth Committee; be it resolved that we have a District Youth Council, composed of the Executive Youth Committee and two advisory members to be elected the same as the Executive Youth Committee from the nominations made by the District Council.

No. 23 Youth Convention

- A. Be it resolved that young people attending the Young People's State Convention must be approved by their local church board and a statement be issued and signed by the church secretary and pastor, and a meal ticket be issued by the Camp Secretary, otherwise they pay full fare for their entertainmen⁺.
- C. Whereas many of our churches have no knowledge of our youth work; Be it resolved that space be provided in our Conference Minutes for the financial and statistical reports of zone and district youth activities, including the business transacted in the Youth Convention. This report should be turned in to the District Secretary.

No. 24 District Council

Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members; these being the District Superintendent, the assistant District Superintendent, secretary, treasurer, and five elective members, with seven members making a quorum.

No. 25 Combined Camp

Be it resolved that we ask the Eastern District to remain in a combined camp for a period of at least three to five years.

No. 26 Summer Harvest Gathering

Since the cost of food is such an enormous item in this camp and conference; therefore be it resolved that on the first Friday of the Camp at the 10:30 meeting, we have a Summer Harvest Gathering for the Camp asking each church to cooperate by bringing in produce, canned goods and meats.

No. 27 Building committee

Since many of our pastors and churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages aren't up to the standard required by the State, therefore be it resolved that: A committee of three be appointed to act as a Bilding Committee whose duty shall be as follows: A. To study the State Building Code and learn all requirements.

- B. To study methods of financing and have knowledge of best and cheapest ways.
- C. Check with church boards as to the deed and type of mortgage.
- D. No church can buy or build without the approval of this committee and a written consent from the District Council.

No. 28 Youth Conference

The Resolutions passed by the 1955 Western Ohio Youth Conference were presented and ratified. (See Youth Business Meeting)

No. 29 Appreciation

Be it resolved:

- A. That we extend to our General Superintendent and General Secretary a vote of thanks for their Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which they conducted this conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the camp and conference the success and blessing they have been.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun and Rev. E. R. Overman for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this camp and conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our Conference Secretary.
- D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for his blessings upon us during the camp and conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

As adopted by the conference

SALARIES

No. 1 District Superintendent

- A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$3,640, 5c per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.
- B. We recommend that the Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the district work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 5c per mile traveling expense.
- No. 2 District Council

We recommend that 6c per mile one way be given each member of the District Council when traveling to Council meetings.

No. 3 District Treasurer and Secretary Be it resolved that the District Treasurer's salary be \$300.00, and the District Secretary's salary be \$100.00

No. 4 Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$40.00 per year.

No. 5 Educational and Examining Committee

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committee be given \$35.00 per member per year.

BUDGETS

No. 6 General Budget

A. We recommend that the Manual provision for the General Budget be adopted by

our conference as follows:

Total—\$6.00 Per member per year 35% or \$2.10 for Foreign Missions 25% or \$1.50 for General Administration 20% or \$1.20 for General Church Extension 10% or .60 for Senior College Fund 6% or .36 for Church Extension Loan Fund

4% or .24 for General Sunday School Extension and Youth Work

If the local church does not properly divide the money, the District treasurer is authorized to do so. No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interests is paid.

- B. We recommend that the general budget be raised monthly in the Sunday School or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.
- C. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastor in raising the Conference Home Missionary and General Budget funds.

No. 7 District budget

- A. Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the church by their tithes and offerings, and that all gross receipts of the local church, excepting General Church Budget, Conference, Home Missionary funds, evangelistic support, and building funds, be tithed, the same to be forwarded to the conference treasurer.
- B. Be it resolved that we raise 15c per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.
- C. Be it resolved that each church raise at least \$1.00 per member per year for our zone school.
- D. Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member per year, in addition to all birthday offerings, be raised annually to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.
- E. Inasmuch as the provision to date is inadequate to care for the financial obligations of the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask the local churches to raise the equivalent of one dollar (\$1.00) per member per year, to be forwarded to the District Treasurer, the same to be applied on the upkeep of the camp grounds.
- F. Be it resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 50c per member per year to liquidate the district parsonage indebtedness.
- G. Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.

No. 8 Newly Organized Churches

A. Be it resolved that, with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

B. Be it further resolved that the district budget be paid monthly.

YOUTH

No. 9 Young People

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the State Youth Convention.
- C. That our State Pilgrim Youth News Bulletin be placed on a subscription basis, Single copies at 50c per year, 10 or more copies sent to one address 35c per copy per year. All subscriptions are to expire at the end of the conference year.

No. 10 Monitors and Police

We recommend that young people who receive free entertainment at our State Convention be required to pay a registration fee of 50c, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

No. 11 Executive Secretary

Inasmuch as the Executive Youth Secretary received only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 12 Camp and Conference

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to alleviate the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all minister's wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- D. That our active minister's children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

No. 13 Sinking Fund

In order that funds may be available when it becomes necessary to either add facilities on the present grounds or establish new grounds located in the Eastern Ohio District: Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church of the conference for this fund.

The time of said offering shall be set by the Council.

TREASURER

No. 14 Auditing of Treasurer's Books

Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.

No. 15 Insuring the Treasurer

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

MINUTES

No. 16 Cost of Minutes

Be it resolved that the price of the Minutes shall be 50c per copy.

No. 17 Preparing Minutes for Publication

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$25.00 for his services.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

No. 18 District Home Missions

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer, and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the annual budget but each church will receive credit for it in their annual report.

MINISTER'S DUTIES

No. 19 Minister's Duties

- A. Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local chuch. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local churches.

No. 20 Youth Conference

The resolutions passed by the 1955 Western Ohio Youth Conference were presented in a slightly modified form and ratified. (See Youth Business Meeting)

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Resolution No. 1

Resolution No. 2

Resolution No. 3

OHIO CONFERENCE

IOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting, Monday Morning, Aug 1, 1955 (Joint Session East and West)

The 51st Annual Conference of the Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened August 1, 1955 at 9:00 A. M. Rev. B. A. Awe brought the Conference to order and Rev. A. L. Davis led in song. Rev. J. R. Siders led in a blessed season of prayer in which God's presence was

graciously manifest.

Preceeding the Conference we were highly honored by repeated manifestations of God's Spirit upon our Camp and Youth Convention. Rev. P. F. Elliott, General Secy. of Youth and Sunday School, was the challenging speaker for the Youth Convention and Rev. Victor Glenn and Rev. Floyd Goins were the evangelists mightily used of God to the salvation and sanctification of scores of needy souls and the edification of all who heard them,

The Singing Brecheisens were with us throughout the Youth Convention and Camp, bringing us deep spiritual music and singing that lifted our souls and brought Heaven near.

To God we ascribe the praise and Glory for the victories, the extent of which, eternity alone will reveal.

Rev. William H. Neff, our General Superintendent, brought us an message from the Word of God, the text of which follows: inspiring

THE CHURCH AT ITS BEST

by REV. WM. H. NEFF

General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Acts 2:41-47

Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls.

And they continued stedfastly in the Apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers.

And fear came upon every soul: and many wonders and signs were done by the apostles.

And all that believed were together, and had all things common:

And sold their possessions and goods, and parted them to all men, as every man had need.

And they, continuing daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, did eat their meat with gladness and singleness of heart,

Praising God, and having favour with all the people. And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved.

There is general agreement among evangelical leaders that the time left for evangelism at home and abroad rapidly is closing in. The reasons, I think, are at least two. One is eschatological-the end time approaches; the other is the rapid rise of nationalism in certain areas of the world which is closing the borders of nations to outside influences.

These conditions call for the church of Jesus Christ to be at its very best now, living in the fullness of Pentecost. Only a devotion for Christ and an enthusiasm born of the Spirit that is stronger and sturdier than that of the false gods of nationalism and secularism-which is a high sounding word for worldliness-will carry us through to victory. World conditions will not be settled by another war. The way Christians think and live will be the determining factor in that settlement. It is as the church lives under the full tide of the Spirit that it can meet the challenge of this ominous but opportunity-filled day.

This passage from the Acts presents a true picture of the church at its best. By picture, I do not main the detail of organization, but the principles by which it moved. You do not have a hard and fast setup in the Acts. You do have the Holy Ghost who gives direction when the growing church calls for a new ministry or arm, as He did in the case of deacons who were to take care of the charities of the church while the Apostles gave themselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word".

First of all, it followed a faith—"the apostles' doctrine." For them, the apostles' doctrine was the telling in a simple way of a Christ-centered faith: the blessed story, so commonplace to us, of Christ's birth, life, death, and resurrection—words they were just beginning to understand. But there was necessarily involved a certain amount of what now we call doctrine, for one could not tell the story then, nor today, as it is recorded in the Gospels, without impressing the hearers with the conviction that His nature was Divine, His death a sacrifice. This is doctrine.

And doctrine is important. It is faith giving an explanation of itself. As Dr. Morrison put it, "Faith is the Word of God in the heart; theology is the language which faith must use in communicating itself." Some people say, "I'm not interested in doctrine. I like practical preaching." But we need to know the great truths of the Bible, for faith without doctrine leaves us prey to the brood of false cults about us. It is a matter of grave concern that so many people have been affected by false doctrine, babbling in tongues, in Adventism, and in modern liberalism. I wonder what some of the preachers have been giving the people. Could the blame lay on the tendency to major on exhortation and inspiration rather than on specific doctrinal instruction from the Word of God?

Our Pilgrim heritage is a rich one. Our doctrines, we believe, are scriptural. We have no unreasonable teaching to embarrass us. As regards the great doctrines, we are in the evangelical tradition. But beyond that, fundamentally, as regards experience, we believe that God, in Christ, and by the Spirit, can cleanse a man's heart from sin, enthrone Deity in his life, and send him across the years in victory. We believe in grace for holiness as well as for justification. I call upon our preachers, not only to feel their faith, but to know the reason for it,

I call upon our preachers, not only to feel their faith, but to know the reason for it, and to communicate the same to our people that they may grow toward Christian maturity.

Again, the church at its best provides a redemptive fellowship. The account in the Acts assures me that the church began not as an organization or an institution, but as a fellowship. There was the beginning of the fellowship of the called-out ones: of the communion of saints, the beloved community, the body of Christ. Their experience of Christ meant that they had been cut off from the old religions, the old associations and life, with their varied backgrounds of race and nationalisms, and were brought together in a new and daring fellowship. New because it was not based on race; daring because it would be costly, calling for the finest heroisms. Thus "they continued in fellowship," meeting together around the gospel, talking about the things of God, holding on one to the other. They observed the sacrament which reminded them of their Saviour's death; they met frequently for prayer and praise; they were cheerful and contented; they loved one another and so felt such a sense of economic responsibility one for the other that they sold their possessions and goods, and parted them to all men, as every man had need."

It is a blessed truth that that fellowship of the blood-washed and Spirit-united continues to this day. What a glorious company! Talk about "best society"; here is the best that Divine love can fashion out of poor, sinful, infirm humanity. Sometimes it is marred by misunderstandings, strained by thoughtlessness, and broken by death, but it remains the best fellowship on this side of the Gates of Pearl. Let us never forget that this fellowship, understood in New Testament context embraces all of God's dear children the world around.

Confined within a smaller circle are all Pilgrims who find a sweet fellowship around Christ as full and blessed Sanctifier, and who by deliberate choice have accepted standards of conduct which we believe to be scriptural and which make for a more effective witness. Let us be faithful in our own fellowship, while at the same time we reach across the lines of denominational boundaries, recognizing a kinship with the born-again everywhere.

All of us need this fellowship. Do not foolishly say, "I do not need to be taught ... I do not need to gather with God's people where His Word is expounded." The sharing, the participation, the promise of Jesus "in the midst," make it supremely worthwhile and unique. So let us meet for prayer and praise and instruction in, and

study of, the Word as the Apostles and early disciples did.

They enjoyed fruitfulness-"the Lord added." Nor is it surprising that such men found a blessed "favor with all the people." We are not to believe that everybody accepted the message; they didn't. But still the impact of the new faith was terrific. They added, the believers multiplied; too often we subtract or divide. I like the arithmetic of the Acts.

It appears that evangelism, which is the bringing of Christ's good news to lost men, was their chief business. And that is our main mission. Subordinate to this emphasis shall be every plan and agency of the church. Everything we have of buildings and publishing plants, of offices and preachers, of organizations and institutions, exists for this—the salvation of men. Let us not fall into the error so prevalent that the test of God's favor is finances and figures; this is the test, how many people are we influencing for God !

Never were the opportunities for evangelism greater. The door is wide open. Shall we enter it? I want us to have a larger part in the great revival-which, may God be pleased to give! It is not enough for us merely to be a protest group only. If Luther had merely protested the errors of the church, the world would never have heard of him. He brought to bear upon the times a great message—justification by faith

So must we be known, not only as inheritors of wonderful truth and as critical guardians of the past, but as people who have a vital contribution to make of great power, of a strong message of full salvation that changes men from fear to faith, from weakness to strength, from sin to holiness, from hell to heaven.

The question is, How are we Pilgrims influencing people for the Lord? Some would do it by a special garb, but that could be worn without any inner grace whatsoever; others, by painting mottoes on their cars, and there may be value in this. But there must be a more effective way. Perhaps this is it: If our dear Pilgrims, the world around, are to be found putting first things first-walking in love, abhorring that which is evil, clinging to that which is good, forgiving one another, in honor preferring one another, ministering to the necessity of the saints, crucified with Christ, seeking the lost, filled with the Spirit-what an effect they will have on the world! Such demonstration of God's love and power will bring untold blessing.

Following the message the Conference lifted its heart and voice singing, "I'll Live For Him."

The roll call was read.

The Conference Bar was established to include the three sections at the right of the platform and from the back center aisle to the platform and including the platform.

The following new churches with their pastors and lay delegates were presented and received into the Conference: Van Wert, Union City, Cincinnati Orchard St., and Dayton Smithville Road.

The reception Committee presented Rev. A. L. Shaw who is transferring to us from the Michigan District.

A Resolution from the Council was read to the Conference. The resolution was as follows: Resolved that we appeal to the Executive Council of the General Board for an extension of time for the division of our Conference, and that we continue as two districts within one Conference pending action of the Executive Council.

It was moved and seconded that we adopt the proposed Resolution. After some discussion a motion calling for the previous question, carried.

The resolution lost.

The time schedule for the sittings of the Conference was as follows: 8:30-12:00 A.M.,

The list of new ministers transferring to the Conference was read and accepted. They are as follows: Donald R. Baughey, Eldon T. Rotz, John Welch, Earl Dulaney, Dale Duvall, M. L. Peterson, A. L. Shaw, Donald Wilson and Beula Hicks.

Wesley Chatfield was granted license by the Council during the year, which action was ratified by the Conference.

The Auditing Committee gave its report which was accepted.

The Conference Treasurer's report was read and accepted, also the report of Church Extension funds was read and received.

The sitting recessed by expiration of time, with Brother Neff leading in prayer.

Second Sitting Monday Afternoon (Joint Session East and West)

The second sitting of the Conference was opened with Bro. Neff leading in singing the old hymn of the Church, "There is a fountain Filled with Blood." Bro. Awe called on Bro. Robert McCoppin to lead the Conference in prayer.

The minutes of the morning sitting were read and approved.

The report of the Conference Sunday School Promotional Secretary was read and received.

Rev. Otho Jennings, Vice President of Owosso Bible College, brought greetings and a report from the College. His report was adopted by the Conference.

The Committee on Memoirs reported and after a fitting tribute was read in memory of Rev. L. W. Sturk, a recording of his singing, "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone," was played to the Conference. God graciously blessed and our spirits were lifted with the glorious reality of the depths of the message of this beautiful hymn so meaningfully sung by one who had already experienced its reality. Brother Neff also gave fitting remarks and after a few minutes of silence, led in singing a verse of, "In the Sweet By and By."

A resolution calling for the Secretary to send from the Conference, a telegram of love and good will, to Sister Shurk, was adopted.

The Chairman of the Memorials Committee finished reading the Committee's report which was received by all standing with bowed heads while Bro. Neff led in prayer.

A resolution that the tabernacle be designated as the L. W. Sturk Memorial Tabernacle, was amended, directing the Chairman to appoint a committee with equal representation from both Districts to take care of the matter, and passed as amended. The Chairman forthwith appointed the Camp Ground trustees to be this committee.

The Reception Committee reported and presented: Rev. and Mrs. Parks, evangelists from Tennessee and Mrs. William H. Neff, wife of our chairman and General Superintendent. Also presented were Rev. and Mrs. Peterson who are now pastoring in our Conference. A motion carried to grant Bro. and Sister Parks and Sister Neff, honorary seats within the Conference bar. Rev. Peterson had been received into the Conference in the morning sitting.

Brother Neff next turned the Chair to Brother Beltz for the purpose of discussing the matter of the Camp Ground and other matters incidental to the division of the Conference. Brother Beltz gave advice and direction concerning procedure and the following resolution from the Council was read and moved for adoption: Resolved that the present Ohio Conference trustees, namely: Rev. Virgil Caudill, Rev. B. A. Awe, Rev. Earl McKinney, and Rev. J. R. Siders, shall remain in office until all jointly owned District property is duly conveyed to the newly elected boards of trustees, namely: The Camp Ground Board of Trustees, Eastern Ohio District Board of Trustees

and Western Ohio District board of trustees, Eastern Ohio District board of trustees Concerning the place of meeting for the two delegations, the Council sent the following resolution which was adopted. Resolved that the Children's Tabernacle be cleaned and prepared for one of the meeting places. Be it further resolved that the Eastern delegation hold their Conference in the Children's Tabernacle.

Concerning joint meetings, the following resolution was adopted. Be it resolved that we separate now into two Conferences to elect officers and take care of all necessary business connected with each new Conference. Be it further resolved that we have at least one more joint session of the two Conferences, to meet at the call of the General Superintendent, before the Ohio Conference is finally dissolved.

A telegram of Christian Greetings from Mrs. F. H. Tormohlen was read to the Conference.

The Reception Committee presented Mrs. W. L. Kilwy to the Conference. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Bro. Beltz.

Sixth Sitting Tuesday Evening (Part A)

(A joint meeting of both Eastern and Western Ohio Districts)

The first order of business was the Ordination Service.

Rev. Roy Ankrim led in singing after which several portions of Scripture were read by the different members of the Ordination Committee. The following men comprised the Ordination Committee: Rev. William H. Neff, Rev. L. R. Roberts, Rev. O. E. Rutledge, Rev. A. L. Davis, and Rev. B. A. Awe. Brother Neff brought a most stirring charge to the Candidates, and God's presence was preciously manifest as the Ordination charge was given. The Doxology was sung followed by prayer by Rev. Neff.

A motion to send a telegram expressing greetings to Rev. Joel Harmon from the united Ohio Conference, carried.

Whereas all the business of the Ohio District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has been completed except the tranfer of the Ohio District properties from the Ohio District Board of Trustees namely—Rev. Virgil Caudill, Rev. B. A. Awe, Rev. Earl McKinney and Rev. J. R. Siders to the Sugar Grove Camp Ground Board of Trustees, the Western Ohio District Board of Trustees, and the Eastern Ohio District Board of Trustees, which transfer has been authorized by the Ohio District Conference to be made as soon as possible.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Ohio District Conference be adjourned, and that at such time as the above property transfers have been completed and deeds have been duly recorded, that the Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church will be dissolved and the Western Ohio District and the Eastern Ohio District will become its legal successors, according to the division that has been authorized by this Conference.

The above motion was carried by a unanimous vote.

The combined sitting closed with mutual blessings being expressed upon the other District and singing, "Blest Be The Tie." A motion carried that a standing vote of thanks be extended to our two chairmen,

A motion carried that a standing vote of thanks be extended to our two chairmen, General Superintendent, Rev. William Neff and General Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. R. A. Beltz, for the efficient and Christian manner in which they have led this Conference.

Brother Beltz led in a good season of closing prayer.

The Eastern Delegation was dismissed to return to their separate meeting place.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Brother Chairman:

Pastors, Evangelists, Delegates and friends of the Fifty First Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, of the Ohio District.

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In September, 1954, Rev. P. F. Elliott planned a fine Promotional Conference from all of the Youth Leaders and Promotional Secretaries. These Leaders came from all parts of the United States to the Pilgrim Holiness Head Quarters, Indianapolis, Indiana. The blessing and anointing of the Lord was greatly manifested upon the Promotional Conference Efforts. This resulted in an unanimous vote to have an Annual Promotional Conference to be held in September at the Pilgrim Holiess Head Quarters. This seems to be a great forward move in promoting Sunday School and Youth Work in our General Church from a united stand point. From this Conference much inspiration, information and enthusiasm was created to give the individual leaders a good start in their particular District Work.

The Fine Sunday School Board comprised of Rev. A. L. Davis, Rev. Norvel Rickner, Rev. Edmund Wells, Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz and Rev. Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ:

Even as it is meet for me to think this of you all, because I have you in my heart:" In the very beginning of our report we wish to give thanks to our God for the splendid Youth Convention and District camp meeting just closed. To our way of thinking we enjoyed one of the greatest Young People's Conventions we ever experienced on these grounds. During the Camp we enjoyed the deep spiritual messages and heart searching truths given by our able evangelists, Rev. Victor Glenn and Rev. Floyd Goins. These men are to be commended for their faithful preaching.

The Singing Brecheisen's as they led in song blessed the congregation again and again with well chosen special numbers throughout the campaign. Their ministry in song and music is greatly to be appreciated.

I would like at this time to pay tribute to our late General Superintendent L. W. Sturk. We were privileged to labor with him for nearly twenty years in many capacities of the church. We were also privileged to eat with him his last supper here on earth, and we are trusting we shall all eat with him at the Marriage Supper of the Lamb.

It is with a deep sense of heart-felt gratitude and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father that enables us to bring this report to you. I have been keenly conscious throughout this conference year of the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit. It is in Him we live and move and have our being. He who has blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ, according as He hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love.

We present this report in humility and gratitude to our Lord Jesus for His abounding grace and the leadership of the Holv Spirit. Our duties have been numerous but the Lord has enabled us with strength for it all, and for His protection over the many miles of travel we are indeed grateful.

We deeply feel our churches are on the upward trend in our District. A great number of our churches have had a splendid increase in Sunday School, and many of them have had a goodly number added to the membership of the church.

We wish to thank every pastor and church for their fine spirit of cooperation. Through this combined effort we feel every department of the work of the church has gone forward. We believe we have as spiritual a people as you will find anywhere.

We do not have words to express our appreciation for the kind reception the pastors and the churches have given us. We have enjoyed the Christian fellowship with the saints everywhere, and we are praying the Lord will reward everyone for their kinds words and deeds.

On July 9, we completed a period of twelve weeks of annual meetings and we can truthfully say these services have been owned and blessed and honored of the Lord. There have been some changes to be sure, but this has always been since the history of the church. This sometimes brings heaviness, to Him who says: "Not my will, but Thine be done,' 'the heaviness will disappear. "All things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are called according to His purpose."

In many ways this has been one of the busiest years in our experience as Superintendent, our duties seemed to have increased, and our work in the Homa Missionary field and other complications has caused many more miles of travel and many less hours of sleep. However, the Lord provided grace and strength for it all, to Him we give all the praise. I wish to say with the poet:

I cannot thank Thee, dear God, enough For all the beauty I see; The rivers, sunsets, mountains, and trees, The humble homes and churches Where loveliness and silence frees My fears and cares. Poppies that unfurl and spread Their flames across the hills; White lilies bloom, gay tulips nod At new-blown daffodils. Incense of Spring and cadence of rain, Blossoming meadows and peace of the forest, Starlight, and clean winds that billow the grain. The waves of the oceans; The beauty in each small star above; The songs of birds; The depths of a heart's emotions; The power of spoken words; The beauty of stream and sky and sod; Messengers of Beauty-They help attune my life and soul to God!

NEW CHURCHES

McArthur: Following the camp and conference of 1954, Bro. C. E. Jones of the Jackson Zone put on a Home Missionary Zone Rally in which great enthusiasm was created to start a new work in McArthur. A roller skating rink was rented in McArthur and Rev. B. H. Pugh and his daughters Mary and Martha were engaged as Evangelist and singers. Rev. C. E. Jones promoted the advertising and the meeting was a success. As a result on Oct. 8, 1954 a church was organized with six members with more to follow. However it became impossible to obtain a place of worship, all efforts failed until some became discouraged, but through the providence of God, Harry L. Ferguson held a tent meeting there this summer and the work was revived and there is still some hopes of getting a building to worship in.

Canton: On October 22, 1954 we were privileged to organize a new church in the city of Canton with 14 members, and 4 new members have been taken in since. We have long wished for a church in Canton and through the effort of a number of Christian people that the Lord directed us to, for we were total strangers in that city, however the Lord works miracles his wonders to perform. As a result we have a splendid group there, they are in much need of a church building for they are paying \$100.00 a month rent for their present store building in which they worship. Rev. Edward Oliver is the pastor.

Coshocton: On April 3, 1955, Rev. Paul Neville and wife went into Coshocton and started a Sunday School and a preaching service on Sunday afternoon and a Thursday night service held in a store building which the Home Missionary Committee agreed to pay the rent on. We have always desired a work in Coshocton, a beautiful city along the Muskingum River, 32 miles north of Zanesville. We are hoping and praying that this effort will develop into a new church organization in the near futurc. God bless the Neville's to accomplish something for God, pray for them and their work.

Fremont: The city of Fremont is located about 35 miles southeast of Toledo or 16 miles southwest of Port Clinton. The Lord laid it in the heart of Dallas Ford to start a work there, as a result on Fathers Day, June 19, 1955, the opening day, a combined service was held in the Y.M.C.A. building in Fremont with the attendance of 19. June 26—20 in attendance, July 3—18, July 19—25, July 17—38. Evening services have been held each Sunday. Interest has been expressed in starting cottage prayer meetings. The highest attendance for the evening services has been 35. Pray much for Bro. & Sis. Ford, this splendid young couple who are home missionary minded, that their work may succeed. The Toledo Zone of whom Melvin Stiverson is chairman, are helping in the finance of this project.

On May 1, 1955, we had the privilege of dedicating a beautiful new church in East Toledo, which was built this past Conference year. A few years ago we had nothing in East Toledo but through the faithful labors and careful management of Rev. & Mrs. Edwin Brown we now have a fine congregation and a complete beautiful church building with all the equipment that a church needs for progress. This is indeed a great asset to our District.

On August 8, 1954 we had a combined service. Dedication and mortgage note burning at the South Broad St. Lancaster Church where Rev. Clyde Goss is pastor. Just a few short years ago where this church is located was a corn field and there was no congregation. However, through the faithful labors of Bro. & Sis. Goss, today there stands a beautiful white newly painted both inside and out, basement church, with lawn, shrubs, walks, etc. This past year they added six new Sunday School rooms equipped for all age classes. Since this church has been built, new homes are going up all around it. This church was built by faith and it averages from 80 to 100 in Sunday School.

On October 10, 1954, we had a note burning service at the Akron church where Rev. Harold Baughman is the pastor. This church has been equipped with all new Sunday School rooms, also redecorated, and a new furnace installed, eaves trough, lawn, etc. This church is developing and growing, they recently pulled their pastor in

from manual labor and are paying him a living wage. This shows progress. On May 22, 1955, we enjoyed a note burning service at Perrysburg church where Dale Jones is pastor. This new beautiful church is free from indebtedness, this shows progress.

On July 3, 1955, we had a note burning service at Marion II where Norval Rickner is pastor. The no'e represented the final payment was made on the parsonage, plus this parsonage has been remodeled, repainted, inside redecorated, furnace installed and at the present time Bro. Rickner is building a garage adjoining the parsonage.

December 4, 1954 we enjoyed a mortgage burning service at the Portsmouth II church where Rev. Otto Smith is pastor. This is a beautiful new church building only a few years old and is already free from debt. This is a complete church, equipped with Sunday School rooms, etc. It is among the finest of the church buildings in our connection.

NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS

The good Pilgrims in the Toledo I Church under the ministry of Rev. Melvin Stiverson are rapidly moving forward completing their new church building built directly upon their present basement church. This new building has been in their plans for a number of years and now their dreams have come true. This indeed is a very beautiful church, new pews and pulpit furniture has been installed and is a great asset to the city as well as to the District. Facts is, the Pilgrims now have two brand new church buildings in Toledo. When passing through the city stop and visit these two new churches.

A new church building is going up in Baltimore where Rev. Charles King has been the pastor. This new church will take the place of the old portable tabernacle.

CHURCH AND PARSONAGE IMPROVEMENTS

The Cauncey Church where Rev. Ray Pidcock is pastor has been redecorated, also equipped with a new celotex ceiling and new Sunday School rooms.

The Columbus First Church has completely redecorated the parsonage.

The Columbus 5th Ave. Church has been redecorated on the inside and new Sun-

day School rooms in the basement, also a new furnace has been installed. The Carbondale Church where Rev. "Bob" Phillips is pastor, has worked diligently improving the church both inside and out. The building has been painted inside and appropriate signs placed on the walls and door. These, Rev. Phillips made himself and are hand-carved lettering. The seats have all been cleaned and a low table and bench made for the convenience of the Primary Sunday School class. The outside of the building has been newly painted, the roof painted and a cement patio built. A new sign also appears on the building giving the name of the church. Pine trees

have been planted at each side of the church improving the appearance of the yard which is also gravelled. We feel this community has a church to be proud of.

The Circleville Church where Alonzo Hill is pastor was redecorated inside.

The Four Corners Church where H. J. Kelly is pastor has been repainted on the inside.

The Galion Church where John Goon is pastor are planning to build a new church. A splendid lot has been purchased and is paid for.

The Fostoria Church where Charles Brewbaker is pastor, both church and parsonage have been redecorated. Complete new spouting, new windows, new roof and road sign for every highway leading into the city.

The Lancaster I Church where Charles Hook is the pastor has been redecorated inside and new pews installed.

The Mansfield Church where H. E. Osborn Sr., is pastor have purchased a new parsonage and redecorated the interior and sanded the floors, painted the outside and is a beautiful place to live. This is a great blessing to the Mansfield Church. The church also has been redecorated, furnace repaired and a new platform and altar rail was built. This church is making fine progress.

The Marion I Church where Walter Yoh is pastor have completely rebuilt their church basement and put in a complete unit of Sunday School rooms. This is a splendid feature of this church.

The Marion II Church where Norval Rickner is pastor have excavated underneath the church and dug out all the rock and dirt and put in a complete set of Sundav School rooms and new rest rooms, also a new gas furnace. This is a great asset to this church and it is making splendid progress.

The Murray City Church where Rev. Cliff Jolly is pastor, have installed a new gas furnace.

The Nelsonville Church where Raymond Simpson was pastor, have completed two more Sunday School rooms.

The Newark Church where Ralph King is pastor is being much improved in beauty and a growing Sunday School and church services. In our last report the wall of this church stood as lonely as a tomb stone on a grave, until J. R. Walter did something about it, and worked day and night to enclose the same, and started Sunday School on a cinder floor, however later a cement floor was put in. N. L. Russell put in the ceiling and plumbing, James Bolin of Columbus painted the interior and furnished the labor free of charge. Side walks, flower beds, shrubs, etc. and tower to be made higher and a bell placed therein is all being engineered by the present pastor, Ralph King. This is one place where the church was built first and then the congregation and it is working out well.

The Port Clinton Church where O. M. Awe is pastor have redecorated the parsonage and installed a gas furnace. This is a great improvement to the parsonage.

The Toledo I Church where Melvin Stiverson is the pastor, the new church which they are completing was reported in the first part of my report, however there was some redecorations done on the parsonage, plus the building of the new church.

The Vinton Church where Edwin Dunn was pastor have improved their parking place with crushed rock also a new heater and aisle carpet in the church.

Other repairs and improvements have been made on churches and parsonages that we do not have an account of. This has been an outstanding year for improvements and repairs on both churches and parsonages and in the building of new churches. We deeply appreciate the interest our people have shown in the up keep of their buildings.

Rev. R. A. Beltz then presented Rev. Wm. Neff, our General Supt., to our Eastern Ohio Conference and the Eastern Ohio Conference was presented to Rev. Wm. Neff.

Rev. Neff exorted us to tie into this religious wind that seems to be blowing at this time and come up next year with greater achievements for GOD. He also re-quested an interest in our prayers.

Rev. B. A. Beltz, then thanked the conference for their kindness to him. He stated that unity of the spirit has surely prevailed throughout the entire conference. Rev. B. A. Awe, our District Superintendent, then stated his appreciation for the

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

No. 1 Budgets

- Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what Α. each church is required to raise for the conference and General Interests, and said cards be forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- That all money raised in the local church for District or General Budget be sent В. by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may
- receive due credit. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears С. with their budgets, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 2 Camp Ground

- Be it resolved that this conference be polled to learn if we want an Eastern Ohio Α. Camp Ground within the next five years.
- Be it resolved that we authorize our District Council to proceed with negotiations B. concerning the appraisal and equitable settlement of the value of the Springfield Gamp Ground property.
- Be it further resolved that this conference authorize the formation of a camp C. ground committee, for the purpose of selecting a new Eastern Ohio Camp Ground; the District Council and six other persons composing the committee.
- Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint these six persons. D.

E. Be it further resolved that we have Camp Ground Trustees take full charge of camp. No. 3 Committees

Be it resolved that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolution Committee consist of seven members and five shall be a quorum.

- A. Be it resolved that we provide services for the children during conference.
- B. Be it resolved that the 1956 Conference of the Eastern Ohio District be opened with a Communion Service for our ministers. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a committee to arrange for this service.
- No. 5 Conference Year
- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for conference be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's book close July 5th.
- C. Be it resolved that District Treasurer have until the 10th of August to pay all bills, and divide all funds, before turning all books over to new Treasurers of Eastern Ohio and Western Ohio Districts.
- No. 6 Daily Vacation Bible School Be it resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches, subject to the camp dates.
- No. 7 Decease of Minister or Wife
 - Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister or minister's wife of the conference, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and that they immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District for expense incurred.
- No. 8 Loan Plan

Be it resolved that we adopt the Pilgrim Pension Loan, Inc., in the Eastern Ohio District for the purpose of helping churches to build.

- No. 9 Ministers
- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of the local Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Whereas the 1950 Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study; therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study, also that Pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend their District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers, in so far as possible, take the correspondence course leading to ordination from Owosso, or some other school approved by the Educational Committee.
- D. Be it resolved that our unstationed licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.
- E. Be it resolved that all ministers holding first year license, who fail to attend conference and report to the Examining Board for two years in succession, unless giving a legitimate reason in writing, their names will be dropped from the minutes.

No. 10 Ministerial Benefit Association.

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Eastern Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the District Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and his wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.
- No. 11 Ministerial Convention

Be it resolved that the Ohio Conference have a Ministerial Convention this conference year. The time and place is to be determined by the Council.

No. 12 Missions In consideration of the need of District Home Missionary work, be it resolved

No. 4 Conference

that each pastor in the Eastern Ohio Conference be subject to a call by the Home Missionary Committee for a two weeks revival.

No. 13 Name of Church

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 14 Owosso Bible College

- A. Whereas Owosso Bible College is the Bible school for our zone and in order that we may better acquaint our people with our Bible college, and that we might give due recognition to it; Be it resolved that we request the Camp Ground Board of Trustees that the 2:30 P. M. service on the first Friday of the camp be given over to the President of the Bible college during which time he shall present the work and the needs of the college.
- B. Inasmuch as the Board of Trustees of Owosso Bible College has adopted a reorganizational plan whereby the official control of the college is vested in a Board of Trustees equally representing the entire school zone, be it Resolved that the Eastern Ohio Conference approve said reorganizational plan by electing one trustee of Owosso college for each six hundred members as specified by the revised by-laws of the college. Be it further resolved that the terms of office of said trustees be 1, 2, 3 years respectively so that only one trustee need be elected each year except when membership increase calls for the election of additional trustees.

No. 15 Pastors

- A. Be it resolved that the churches of the Eastern Ohio District shall give first consideration to the Ministers of our conference in extending a call for their pastor. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent shall not recommend a minister outside the bounds of our district, until after a church has failed to elect a pastor from the ministers of our District.
- B. Since it requires a two-thirds majority vote at the election to call a pastor, when two or more names are voted on at the some time, the vote is divided so that no one has the necessary two-thirds vote; Be it resolved that no church vote on more than one pastor at a time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salary to meet the high cost of living; Be it resolved that the district superintendents take more interest in the support of the pastors, when the superintendents meet with the local church boards.
- D. In order that the churches may receive credit for the full amount they contribute toward pastoral support: Be it resolved that the question of whether or not the pastors utilities are supplied be made a part of the pastor's annual report.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.

No. 16 Salaries

We recommend that all matters of salaries of District officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

No. 17 Standards

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, Section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor any thing of like nature
- to be held in connection with the Church or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Gouncil encourage and enforce strict adherance to this in the Eastern Conference.
- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television; Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very

subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.

Inasmuch as our Manual gives only two sacraments or ordinances to be observed E. in our churches, namely, the Lord's Supper and water baptism, Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District forbids public feet washing as part of our worship service.

No. 18 Sunday School Promotion

- A. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Convention be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the District Sunday School Committee shall appoint committees in the various zones of the conference to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- Inasmuch as our District Camp is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Β. Eastern Ohio Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.

No. 19 Superintendent

- Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for A visiting the churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim R Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business C. meetings if possiblc; However, he may authorize his assistant or the pastor to conduct this meeting.

No. 20 Tithe

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their memberchip—therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 21 Voting

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with district council members receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all members of the District Council be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 22 Appreciation

Be it resolved:

- That we extend to our General Superintendent and his wife a vote of thanks for Α. their presence in the last sitting of our new Eastern Ohio Conference. That we extend to our General Secretary Treasurer a vote of thanks for his
- B. Christlikc spirit and efficient manner in which he labored as he conducted this conference.
- G. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Ground committee and the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the camp and conference the success and blessing they have been.
- D. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun and Rev. E. R. Overman for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this camp meeting and conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our Conference Secretary.
- E. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for his blessings upon us during the camp and conference.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

No. 1 District Superintendents

- Α. Inasmuch as we recognize the high cost of living and the increase of traveling expenses, we recommend the following: District Superintendent Salary \$3,640.00; 6c per mile traveling expenses; parsonage; all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.
- Β. We recommend that the Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the district work, be authorized to secure the services of his assistant. Further, we recommend that the assistant be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 5c per mile traveling expense. No. 2 District Council

We recommend that 6c per mile, one way, be given each member of the District Council for traveling to council meetings.

No. 3 Conference Treasurer and Secretary

Be it resolved that the Conference Treasurer's salary be \$300.00 and the Conference Secretary's salary be \$100.00.

No. 4 Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Sccretary shall each receive \$40.00 per year.

No. 5 Educational and Examining Committee

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committee be given, \$35.00. BUDGETS . . .

No. 6 General Budget

- We recommend that the Manual provision for the General Budget be adopted Α. by our conference.
 - Total \$6.00 per member per vear.
 - 35% or \$2.10 for Foreign Missions
 - 25% or \$1.50 for General Administration
 - 20% or \$1.20 for General Church Extension
 - 10% or 6% or .60 for Senior College Fund
 - .36 for Church Extension Loan Fund

4% or .24 for General Sunday School Extension and Youth Work "If the local church does not properly divide the money, the conference treasurer is authorized to do so." Sec. 149, Par. 1-3, Page 81.

"No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interests is paid."

- В. We recommend that the general budget be raised monthly in the Sunday school or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.
- C. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastors in raising the Conference Home Missionary and General Budget Funds.

No. 7 District Budget

- Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the church by their tithes and offerings, and that all gross receipts of the local church, excepting Α. General Church Budget, Conference, Home Missionary Funds, Evangelistic support, and building funds, be tithed, the same to be forwarded to the conference treasurer.
- B. Be it resolved that we raise 15c per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.
- C. Be it resolved that each church raise \$1.00 per member per year for our zone school.
- Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member, per year, in D. addition to all birthday offerings, be raised annually to constitute our conference Home Missionary Fund.
- Inasmuch as the provision to date is inadequate to care for the financial obliga-E. tions of the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask the local churches to raise the equivalent of one dollar (\$1.00) per member, per year, to be forwarded to Conference Treasurer, the same to be applied on the up keep of the camp grounds.
- F. Be it resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 50c per member per year to liquidate the district parsonage indebtedness.
- G Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommand that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.
- No. 8 Newly Organized Churches
- Be it resolved that with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches Α. be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization; one-half for the second year; and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

Be it further resolved that the district budget be paid monthly. B. –

- YOUTH . . .
- No. 9 Young People

- A. Be it resolved that an young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent the District Y. P. S. treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the State Youth Convention.
- C. That our State Pilgrim Youth News Bulletin be placed on a subscription basis. Single copies at 50c per year, 10 copies sent to one address 35c per copy per year. All subscriptions are to expire at the end of the conference year.

No. 10 Monitors and Police

We recommend that young people who receive free entertainment at our State Convention be required to pay a registration fee of 50c, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

No. 11 Executive Secretary

Inasmuch as the Executive Youth Secretary receives only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 12 Camp and Conference

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to alleviate the financial obligation of the Gamp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- D. That our active minister's children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

No. 13 Sinking Fund

In order that funds may be available when it becomes necessary to either add facilities on the present grounds or establish new grounds located in the Eastern Ohio District: Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church of the Conference for this fund. The time of said offering shall be set by the council. TREASURER...

IREASORER . .

No. 14 Auditing of Treasurer's Books

Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the Conference Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

No. 15 Insuring the Treasurer

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

No. 16 Cost of Minutes

Be it resolved that the price of District Minutes to be left to the discretion of the District Council.

No. 17 Preparing Minutes for Publication

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$10.00 for services.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS . . .

No. 18 District Home Missions

A. The Eastern District Home Missionary Committee recommends the following plan for raising funds to help support our district home missionary activities; Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions. This special offering will be promoted by each District according to their individual plans and needs. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer and will be applied

to the Home Missionary Fund of the District in which the money is collected. This offering will not apply on the annual budget but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

B. Inasmuch as we do not have money enough to help establish new churches be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio District have, what may be termed an Emergency Reserved Army. This army to answer calls given by the District Supt. These calls to be in the amount which the enlisted person has signed for the duration of year. These enlisted persons to re-enlist every year if they so desire. The calls are to range from 5.00-\$2.00 each.

There is not to be over 4 calls in any one conference year. No church or person shall be compelled to join. The money is over and above the regular budget.

No. 19 Minister's Duties

- Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of Α. this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local churches.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENT . . .

No. 20 Loan Fund

Inasmuch as many of our churches are struggling to enlarge and improve their buildings, be it resolved that our Church Boards loan from their funds at 5% interest, such loans not to exceed five years.

Resolution No. 1 Dealing with two additional advisory members to the Executive Committee.

Resolution No. 2 In as much as we feel the visits of our executive secretary to our zones during the past year have been a great blessing, be it resolved that this be a part of our permanent program.

Resolution No. 3 In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the district superintendent, the pastors, and Y. P. presidents of his zone as soon after conference as possible to plan the program for his zone for the year.

Resolution No. 4 We recommend that the Executive Committee and Zone Chairmen be kept in the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

Resolution No. 5 Be it resolved that the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible. Resolution No. 6 Be it resolved that the Eastern Ohio Pilgrim Youth be published

monthly.

Resolution No. 7 Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as the choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, and etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church;

Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Young People's Executive Committee to enforce this during the Young People's Convention.
