MINUTES OF THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL ASSEMBLY OF THE
ILLINOIS DISTRICT PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH,

AUGUST 14, 1936.

Assembly opened at 9:15 by singing, "The Unsearchable Riches," led by Bro. D. M. Horn. We then sang, "He Leadeth Me," and were led in prayer by Bro. R. A. Beltz of the Iowa and Missouri District.

General Supt. W. L. Surbrook was then introduced to the Assembly by the District Supt., W. E. Catey. Bro. Surbrook then read a Scripture lesson from 2nd Thessalonians, 2nd chapter. He then addressed the Assembly, using the two words of the third verse of Scripture lesson, "falling away."

Roll was called and the Janesville Church was accepted into the Assembly.

Moved and seconded that the first six seats on the south side of the tabernacle constitute the Conference Bar. Carried.

Brother R. A. Beltz was invited to the platform.

Moved and seconded that the secretary be permitted to select an assistant. Carried. Bro. D. M. Horn was selected.

Moved and seconded that Assembly open at 8:30 A. M. and close at 11:30 A. M. Open at 2:00 P. M. and close at 4:30 P. M. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we have an evangelistic service at night beginning at 7:30. Carried.

Moved and seconded that District Supt. appoint committees. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we have the District Statistical report read instead of each individual minister's report. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we hear report of Ways and Means committee. Carried.

A partial report was given. A recommendation of an amendment No. 2a be changed from 15% to 10%. It was accepted.

Bro. Surbrook gave a talk, pointing out by the aid of a graph, amounts paid to Foreign and General Budget, urging that we endeavor to more equally balance our Budget. A discussion followed.

No. 2e of the Ways and Means was dropped.

Committees appointed by the District Supt. as follows:

Auditing Committee—George M. Oschwald, Ellis Maness.

Resolution Committee—Chloie Meeks, Gladys Neeley, Grace Catey.

Reception Committee—Elmor Hanna, R. S. Wheeldon.

The District Supt.'s report was read and accepted.

Brother Beltz gave a stirring message and report on Home Missionary work. Brothers Surbrook and Catey gave encouraging talks.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn to meet again at 1:30. Adjourned with prayer by Brother Catey.

AFTERNOON SITTING

Brother E. A. Meeks led in singing, "Abiding in Jesus."

Brother W. G. Henschen read the Scripture lesson. Minutes were read and approved.

Brother O. A. Morgan and Brother J. H. Philpot were invited within the Conference Bar.

Brother Surbrook gave a talk on "Financial Problems." Another talk was given by Brother Henschen.

The Statistical report was given by Sister Gladys Neeley. It was accepted.

The Ways and Means Committee gave another report.

The Educational and Examining Board gave in their report. It was moved and seconded that it be accepted. After a lengthy discussion it was accepted.

The Auditing Committee's report was read and accepted, with a vote of thanks to the District Treasurer and a motion carried that the Treasurer's salary be doubled.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

It was moved and seconded that District Superintendent appoint Auditing, Ways and Means, and Statistical Committees. Carried.

Moved and seconded that election of officers be held. Carried.

Moved and seconded that District Superintendent appoint tellers. Brothers Maness, Hall, Cunningham and Oswald were appointed.

Officers were elected as follows: Superintendent, W. E. Catey on first ballot, Assistant, W. G. Henschen, Secretary, H. J. Kemp, Treasurer, Glen Neeley, Additional members of Council, Geo. A. Smith, E. A. Meeks, and F. A. Shull.

Moved and seconded that District Council take care of printing of Minutes, number and method of financing same. Carried.

Moved and seconded that ordination service be held at 7:00 P. M. Carried.

Moved and seconded that District Council appoint one to be in charge of District Sunday School work. Carried.

Moved and seconded that time be extended to 5:00 o'clock. Carried.

Moved and seconded that 15 minutes recess be taken for committees to meet. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn to meet at 6:30. Carried. We were dismissed with prayer by secretary.

EVENING SITTING

Brother Burtle Evans led in singing, "He Brought Me Out." Brother Beltz led in prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of the afternoon sitting. They were approved as read.

Recommendation from the Examining Board that Brother Burtle Evans be retained in this Assembly in the class of the First Year.

Moved and seconded that District Council make arrangements for Zone Meetings. Carried.

The Marshall Church extended an invitation to the Ministerial Convention for the coming year.

Moved and seconded that Council arrange for time and place of Ministerial Convention. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the District Council take care of all unfinished business. Carried.

Report of Resolution Committee was read and accepted. Recommended that the Assembly, in memory of our dear Sister Hanna, bow in prayer led by Brother Catey.

Moved and seconded that arrangements be made for a Memorial service by the appointment of a committee, District Superintendent to select two others with himself to constitute committee. This service to take place during the Camp.

Proper space to be given in District Minutes also for a Memorial of Sister Hanna.

The Minutes were read and approved and the Assembly adjourned for the Ordination service.

Arrangements were made for Ordination service and Brother D. M. Horn and Sister Flora Morris were duly ordained.

Combined report of the Educational and Examining Boards.

LIFE-SKETCH OF REV. MRS. MATTIE HANNA

Rev. Mrs. Mattie Hanna, an Ordained Minister of the Illinois-Missouri District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, entered into her Eternal Rest from her home in Urbana, Illinois, on May 21, 1936, being aged sixty years, five months, and twenty-one days. She was the fourth child of Louis and Elisa Frazee of Onarga, Illinois, and grew to womanhood in the community of her nativity.

In early childhood she expressed a desire to become either a missionary or a teacher, and lived to see, not merely one, but both of these desires gratified. Her labors as a missionary, however, were confined within the boundaries of this country. Most of her youth and early womanhood was spent, either in teaching in the Grade and High Schools of Iroquois County, Ill., or in acquiring Academic training which would fit her for the better performance of the duties incident to that profession. This latter included graduation from the Onarga High School, The Onarga Seminary, and The Indiana State Teacher's College at Marion, Indiana.

During a recent automobile drive through a portion of Iroquois County, in company with the husband of the deceased, the writer's attention was called to country school after country school, and to the Onarga High School, where Mattie Frazee had labored in other days to shape the lives and character, and to instruct the minds, of the children and youth of those communities.

Sister Hanna received a careful and religious upbringing in the home of her parents and in the Church which they attended, but knew nothing of Bible Salvation until, in answer to the prayers of her grandmother, Rev. W. J. Webster, and his sister Ada, conducted a revival meeting near Onarga. The cultured and educated school teacher, of whose life we write, was astounded and shocked, not only at the truths brought by these Evangelists, but by their utter disregard of all the laws supposed to govern the proper use of the English language. But, her life-long hunger for God finally overcame all of this and she was translated into the Kingdom of God's dear Son on June 29th, 1901. How appropriate that the meetings, under the influence of which this school teacher enrolled in the School of the Great Master Teacher, were conducted in a country school house.

Some years previous to this, a family by the name of Hanna had settled "just across the field" from the Frazee home. One of the sons of the Hanna household, named Elmor, was also converted in this school house meeting. This young man, and the subject of our sketch, were united in marriage in Chicago, Illinois, on September 13th, 1906. Their nearly thirty years of wedded life were blessed with two daughters and four sons, all of whom, except the eldest daughter, Irene, survive the mother. The other daughter, Naomi, is the wife of Rev. McClusky of Greensboro, N. C. The eldest son, Elmor, Jr., and family, resides in Anderson, Ind. The other sons, Paul, Daniel, and Nathaniel, continue to make their home with their father in Urbana, Illinois.

After their marriage, Brother and Sister Hanna, both being called to the Ministry of the Gospel, enrolled as students in God's Bible School of Cincinnati, Ohio. Following their graduation from this institution, they gave themselves continuously and untiringly to the work which God asked of them. Beginning their ministry in Illinois, they later labored in Ohio, Kentucky, and Indiana, and finally returned to their native State where Sister Hanna spent the last six years of her life, the place from which she slipped away to a better world being within fifty miles of the place of her birth.

Brother Hanna served the following Illinois appointments as Pastor: Onarga, Dow and Jerseyville, Carlinville, Ottawa, and Oblong. He also pastored churches in Ohio and in Indiana, interspersing this type of ministry from time to time with many months of Evangelistic and Home Missionary work. In addition to this, he served for a time as Supt. of the Church's Orphanage at Kingswood, Kentucky. Through more than a quarter of a century, Sister Hanna was the faithful and efficient help-meet and co-laborer of her husband, sharing, with him, the trials and responsibilities incident to his varied ministry.

Perhaps the two outstanding characteristics of Sister Hanna's life were her loyalty to the highest standards of holy living, and her willingness to sacrifice her personal interests and comfort for her Savior's cause on earth. She has ceased to labor, but her labors have not ceased to bless.

Her funeral service was conducted in the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Onarga, Illinois, by her Dist. Supt., Rev. W. E. Catey, and the tabernacle which housed her noble spirit during its earthly sojourn was laid to rest in the Onarga Cemetery to await the Resurrection Morn.

The Grim Reaper has removed from our ranks another of God's chosen warriors. May the example of her holy life, her zeal for the salvation of others, and her peaceful home-going, be an incentive to us who remain to likewise

follow in the footsteps of our Lord and to enjoy a similar "abundant entrance" when we are called to meet her in the land where we'll never say "good-by."

WAYS AND MEANS

No. 1

Since the General Assembly has adopted the Budget System of administering the finances of the General Church, we strongly urge all Local Boards to adopt the Budget System for administering the finances of their respective Local Churches.

Also that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings, each church shall decide what financial support they will pay their pastor during the coming year.

No. 2

The District Budget shall be raised and disbursed in the following manner:

a. An amount equal to 10% of all funds received by each Local Church including that received by each pastor for his services as such, and that paid to evangelists, and exclusive of all funds paid to the purchase, rental, or necessary upkeep, of all real estate or buildings for Church or parsonage use, shall be set aside by the Local Church Treasurer each Monday and remitted by him to the District Treasurer on the first of each month.

(Necessary upkeep would not include money spent for furniture, furnishings, electric light bills, etc. It would include only money spent for anything actually necessary to the maintenance or preservation of the property, such as paint, roofing, together with the cost of applying same, special taxes, insurance premiums, payment on church debt, etc.)

b. All money raised directly for District and General Church interests, such as Foreign Missions, special District enterprises, etc., is not subject to the 10% tax.

c. All money received by the District Treasurer in fulfillment of the requirements of paragraph a of this ruling, shall be divided by him as follows:

District Supt. fund	60%
Miscellaneous Dist. Expense fund	25%
Dist. Church Extension fund	10%
General Assembly Expense fund	5%

No. 3

Each Church in this district shall raise an amount equal to \$1.00 per member for the General Budget.

No. 4

Each Church in this District shall raise an amount equal to \$2.00 per member for Foreign Missions, same to include money raised for Foreign Missions by the Sunday Schools, etc.

No. 5

Since the District Supt. is to the District what the pastor is to the Church, the District Supt. shall meet with each Local Church Board at the time of his visits and inquire carefully into the spiritual and financial condition of the Church and help them in the solution of their various problems.

No. 6

The District Supt. shall present the needs of canned fruits, vegetables, meats, etc., for the District Camp Meeting to each Local Church, at least once during the year.

No. 7

The District Supt. is an advisory member of all District Boards and Committees.

No. 8

The District Supt. and the District Secretary shall keep in touch with the pastors, reminding them of the plans of this Assembly, and encouraging and helping them in carrying out said plans.

No. 9

The District Supt. shall examine the records of the Secretary and Treasurer of each Local Church at the time of his regular visits thereto and shall offer any needed suggestions as to how they may improve in the performance of their duties.

No. 10

The District Supt. shall review all of the District Rules with each Local Church Board at the time of each regular visit to the respective Churches, and shall give them any needed advice in carrying them out.

No. 11

Our people shall not send money directly to any of our General Church interests, but shall remit to their Local Treasurer who shall forward same to District Treasurer, who shall disburse to the proper recipient.

No. 12

The District Secretary shall be paid \$10.00 for editing the Minutes and the District Treasurer shall be paid \$20.00 per year for his services.

No. 13

The District Treasurer shall furnish the District Supt. with a detailed report following the close of each quarter, showing what each Church has paid to each item in the District and General financial program.

No. 14

Each pastor shall maintain a calling list, using a card filing system which shall be the property of each succeeding pastor and the expense of the same shall be borne by the Local Church.

No. 15

a. The Assembly Year shall end with July 31st each year and all business transacted between that and the Annual Assembly shall be included in the following year's report. Also the Assembly Year shall be divided as into four quarters ending with the following dates respectively: First Quarter, Aug. 1st to Oct. 31st; Second Quarter, Nov. 1st to Jan. 31st; Third Quarter, Feb. 1st to April 30th; Fourth Quarter, May 1st to July 31st.

b. A quarterly meeting shall be held in each Church within ten days following the close of each quarter, at which time reports covering the quarter shall be copied in the Church Secretary book and the original reports sent to the District Superintendent.

Quarterly meetings shall be conducted by the pastor when the District Superintendent does not happen to be present. All annual reports shall be copied in the Church Secretary book and mailed to the District Statistician immediately following the close of the Assembly Year, July 31st.

No. 16

Each Local Church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Treasury the sum of five dollars for each delegate elected to the Annual Assembly, said payment to provide entertainment for said delegate throughout the Camp and

No. 17

All of our preachers and laity shall secure respectively, a copy of our Church Manual and the Minutes of the Assembly, and shall read and study

the same until they are able to understand and carry out all their provisions and requirements.

No. 18

Each Church shall be responsible for one comforter for Camp Meeting purposes and the name of the donor shall be inscribed thereon.

No. 19

The regular Sunday School offerings on one Sunday per month shall be a special offering for Foreign Missions and shall be forwarded to the District Treasurer for that purpose. The particular Sunday on which this offering shall be taken shall be determined by the Sunday School Board.

No. 20

a. Each pastor shall keep a record of all subscribers to the Advocate in each neighborhood where he pastors and shall, about thirty days before each subscription expires, endeavor to secure a renewal of the same.

b. Each pastor shall endeavor to secure, in each town or community in which his regular appointments are located, a sufficient number of subscriptions to the Advocate to cause the total number of subscribers in each community to be equal in number to 50 per cent of the membership of the respective churches.

No. 21

The revision of church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual Church Meetings.

No. 22

This Assembly requires its Ministerial members to attend the Assembly and Camp Meeting. They shall be present on the first day and remain to the close. Each Church shall keep up the salary of its pastor during Camp Meeting. If any minister does not attend, he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for his absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be disciplined.

No. 23

The District Secretary shall notify in writing all of the members of this Assembly who have failed to meet the requirements of the foregoing rule No. 22, calling their attention to such failure and the penalty for the same at least thirty days before our next Assembly.

No. 24

The pastor shall be responsible for the accuracy and condition of all Church Records, and of all quarterly and annual reports.

No. 25

The books of the course of study not now possessed by the examiners thereon shall be purchased by the District for their use. The books shall remain the property of the District and the examiners using same shall be responsible for their preservation and shall reimburse the District if the books are damaged or lost through their neglect.

No. 26

a. The District Treasurer shall make a monthly report sheet, showing the amount of money received from each Church in the District for all District and General interests. Each District and General interest shall be listed separately and each Church shall be listed in relation to the percentage of its share of the District and General financial responsibility it has paid. The name of the pastor of each Church shall be indicated and a copy of the entire report sent to each local Church Secretary of the District, who shall post same in a conspicuous place in his respective Church.

b. A copy of above report sheet shall also be furnished the District Superintendent each month.

No. 27

An annual report sheet of the financial progress and faithfulness of each Church and Pastor in relation to the District and General interests shall be prepared by the District Statistician and posted within the next District Assembly Bar.

No. 28

Each pastor shall secure during the year not fewer than five new members for the Charleston Camp Meeting Association.

Special Ruling: Each Local or Licensed Minister taking examination shall pay to his examiner the amount of 50c for each examination taken.

ACTION OF THE DISTRICT COUNCIL

It was moved and seconded that we accept Brother Geo. A. Smith's report of examination of the following preachers: L. A. Windsor of Hannibal, Mo., and Alma Acton of Eugene, Mo., ordained ministers of the Nazarene Church, be accepted on their credentials. That Fred K. Cross, of Kansas City, Kansas, a local preacher of the Kansas City, Mo., Church, be received into our Assembly and that he be placed in the Class of the First Year. These to be listed with the Iowa and Missouri ministers. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we accept Ruth Neeley into this Assembly and that she be placed in the Class of the First Year. Carried.

Moved and seconded that Brother E. A. Meeks be released from the office of Church Extension Director. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Church Extension work be left in the hands of the District Superintendent and District Council. Carried.

Moved and seconded that each pastor be responsible for raising \$2.50 for painting Camp Ground buildings and also the roofing of same. Carried.

Moved and seconded that Brother Meeks be released from the Ways and Means Committee. Carried.

Moved and seconded that Brother F. A. Shull be appointed to fill vacancy on Ways and Means Committee. Carried.
