JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Twenty-Fourth Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Charleston camp grounds, August 12, 1946, at 9:00 A. M., with Assistant General Superintendent, Rev. R. G. Flexon in the chair.

Brother Kenneth Greves led the Conference in singing, "Precious Name." We were led to the Throne of Grace by Brother Riggs.

Rev. R. G. Flexon read the scripture lesson from the second chapter of the book of The Revelation, bringing a stirring message on the subject, "What backslides a church."

The secretary called the roll.

Motion made and supported that in the absence of the delegate and the alternate from the Argo church, Sister Ashley be seated as delegate. Carried. Motion carried to seat Sister Johnson as delegate from Onargo and Sister Eldridge as delegate from Springfield. Motion carried to have the platform and the first eight seats in the

two center sections constitute the conference bar. Motion made and supported that the time of meeting be from 8:30 A.

M. to 11:30 A. M. The afternoon sitting to convene at the call of the chair until 5:00 P. M., and the evening sitting be from 7:00 to 10:00 P. M. The District Superintendent appointed Elmer Waltrip and F. E. Glen-

dening as the Reception Committee.

The report of the District Superintendent was read and accepted.

The Auditor's report was read. Motion carried to accept. The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Camp Meeting Treasurer's report was read and accepted. The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read. Mot Motion carried to accept.

Motion carried that the present financial set up carry through the month of August, the new system beginning September 1st.

Motion carried that each church send in their budget to the District Treasurer by the 10th. of the following month.

Motion made and supported to extend the time until 12:00. Carried. Motion made and seconded that financial sheets be prepared by the District Treasurer and sent to the local treasurers stating their monthly quota.

A partial report was given by the Resolutions Committee. Motion carried that the Resolution Committee bring in a resolution per-taining to the changing of the time of our Conference from the present time of following the camp meeting to just prior to the camp. Motion carried to adjourn. Prayer by Brother Catey.

Second Sitting

The Conference reconvened at 2:45 P. M. with Brother Howard leading the congregation in singing, "He leadeth me." Prayer by J. B. Lansing. Brother Flexon gave a stirring message based upon Acts 2:41-47. Motion carried that Bro. Husselton act as secretary pro tem. The roll call was dispensed with by the Conference. The Resolutions Committee gave a further report which was accepted.

Invitations for the Ministerial Convention were received from the fol-

lowing churches: Charleston, Decatur, Robinson, Marshall, and Galesburg. The Statistical report was given. Motion carried to accept.

The Statistical report was given. Motion carried to accept. The report of the joint meeting of the Educational and Examining Boards was read. Motion carried to accept. The Reception Committee introduced the following persons to the Con-ference: Kenneth Greves of Terre Haute, Ind.; Rev. and Mrs. Stoggdell, of Streator, Ill.; Rev. Byrnes of Baylis, Ill.; and Rev. Wilkins of Indiana. The report of the District Sunday School Committee was read and ac-

cepted.

Motion carried that the election of officers be the order of the day. Bro. Beecher appointed as tellers: John Teiffel, Wm. Thompson, John Abernathy, Kenneth Greves, and Forest Adams. Rev. H. J. Beecher was re-elected as District Superintendent.

Rev. Sylvan Calloway was elected as Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. D. M. Horn was re-elected as District Secretary.

Motion carried to recess. Prayer by Bro. Flexon.

Third Sitting

The Conference was opened at 7:00 P. M. by singing the hymn, "At the Cross," led by Brother Howard. Prayer by Brother Hanna. Rev. Parker Husselton was elected as District Treasurer. Everett Ashley, W. E. Catey, and Elmor Hanna were elected as addi-tional members of the District Council.

Motion carried to set aside the rules and vote by acclamation.

Rev. W. E. Catey, whose term of office expired on the Examining Board was re-elected for 3 years.

Rev. D. M. Horn whose term of office expired on the Educational Board, was re-elected for 3 years.

Rev. Charles Riggs, whose term of office expired as District Trustee, was re-elected for 3 years.

James Cunningham and W. E. Catey were elected by ballot on the Bible School Board.

The District Superintendent appointed the various committees. (See Official Directory for the appointments). Motion made and supported that the District Council take care of all

unfinished business which remains after the District Conference. Carried. Arrangements were made and an ordination service was held with R. G. Flexon, H. J. Beecher, W. E. Catey, D. M. Horn, James Cunningham, J. W. Hancock, and Everett Ashley constituting the Ordination Council. Rev. J. H. Eldridge and Rev. Elmer Waltrip were duly ordained.

Motion carried that we give Bro. Flexon a rising vote of thanks for his wise council and good messages to the Conference.

Motion carried that our Conference go on record as endorsing Brother Flexon's message of the morning sitting and that he have it printed in the Advocate if he is so disposed.

Motion carried to adjourn. The Conference was dismissed with prayer by Bro. Flexon.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. Inasmuch as there has been a failure on the part of some of our pastors in carrying out some of the resolutions of the District Conference; therefore, be it resolved that if any pastor shall fail to carry out any resolu-tion as passed by the District Conference he shall be denied both voice and vote in the following District Conference unless he shows just cause.

2.(a) Be it resolved that in accordance with the request of the General Church Sunday School committee, a District Sunday School committee be appointed by the District Council, and that this committee shall give a re-

(b) Be it resolved that a banner be given each quarter to the Sunday
(b) Be it resolved that a banner be given each quarter to the sunday School that has the largest attendance and that a banner also be given to the Sunday School that has the highest percentage of increase in attendance over the preceeding quarter.

Be it resolved that each Sunday School shall send a quarterly (c)

report to the District Sunday School Secretary immediately following the last Sunday of the quarter. Failure to do so-the dog house!

(d) Be it resolved that each church make an earnest effort to double their average attendance during the following year. The churches reaching this goal shall be awarded a special certificate and commendation at the next district conference.

3. Be it resolved that all local ministers shall meet with the Educational Board and all licensed ministers shall meet with the Educational and Examining Boards not later than last Saturday of the camp meeting.

4. Resolved that all our evangelists and ministers arrange their slates and work so as not to conflict with the camp and conference. Be it further resolved that each pastor shall have the privilege of holding one revival off his charge with regular salary provided he supply his pulpit satisfactorily in his absence.

5. Resolved that the District Secretary be instructed to have 500 copies of these minutes printed within 30 days after the close of the annual conference.

The District Superintendent shall keep in touch with the pastors, 6. reminding them of the plans of this Conference, encouraging and helping them in carrying out said plans.

7. Each pastor shall maintain a calling list, using a card filing system which shall be the property of each succeeding pastor and the expense of same shall be borne by the local church.

Resolved that the Conference Year shall end with June 30th each 8.(a) year and all business transacted between that and the Annual Conference shall be included in the following year's report. Also the Conference year shall be divided into four quarters ending with the following dates respectively: First Quarter, July 1st to September 30th; Second Quarter, October 1st to December 31st; Third Quarter, January 1st to March 31st; Fourth Quarter, April 1st to June 30th.

(b) Be it further resolved that a quarterly meeting be held in each church within ten days following the close of each quarter, at which time reports covering the quarter shall be heard and then copied in the Church Secretary's book and mailed to the District Superintendent. (c) Resolved that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statis-

tician by July 10th.

9. Resolved that all of our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference Minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.

10.(a) Resolved that each pastor shall keep a record of all subscribers to the Advocate in each neighborhood where he pastors and shall, about thirty days before each subscription expires, endeavor to secure a renewal of the same.

(b) Be it further resolved that each pastor shall endeavor to secure in each town or community in which his regular appointments are located, a sufficient number of subscriptions to the Advocate to cause the total number of subscribers of each community to be equal in number to 50% of the membership of the respective churches.

Resolved that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be 11. made prior to the respective annual church meetings.

12. Resolved that this Conference require its Ministerial members to attend the Conference and Camp Meeting. They shall be present on the first day and remain to the close. Each church shall keep up the salary of its pastor during Camp Meeting. If any minister does not attend he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for his absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be disciplined.

13.Resolved that the District Secretary shall notify in writing all of the members of this conference who have failed to meet the requirements of the foregoing rule No. 12, calling their attention to such failure and the penalty for the same at least thirty days before our next conference.

Resolved that the pastor shall be responsible for the accuracy and 14. condition of all church records, and of all quarterly and annual reports.

15. Resolved that the books of the course of study not now possessed by the examiners shall be purchased by the District for their use. The books shall remain the property of the District and the examiners using the same

shall be responsible for their preservation and shall reimburse the District if the books are damaged or lost through their neglect.

16. Be it resolved that the District Council name the District Young People's Officers and Zone Chairmen not later than Wednesday of Camp Meeting each year.

 $17.^{-}$ Be it resolved that the Zone Chairmen be expected to visit each church in his zone at least once during the Conference year in the interest of the Young People's Work. Since there are so many churches in the Central Zone we recommend that co-chairmen for this zone be named by the District Council.

18. Be it resolved that a special Young People's report blank be pre-pared by our District Secretary and District Young Peoples Executive Secre-tary, to be mailed along with the regular quarterly report blanks to each local church. The said special blanks to be filled out and mailed to the Exec-utive Secretary to keep him informed as to the progress of the local Young People's Societies.

19. Be it resolved that our Young People's Committees be empowered to provide their own legislation upon the approval of the District Council.

20. Be it resolved that because of the present trend of this immodest age, our ministers and the laity be adminished to carry out the special rules of our Manual page 49, section 65. 21. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to

appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occuring in them from time to time.

22.Be it resolved that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.

23. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent be consulted and, if possible, present when drawing up all deeds in the District.

24.Be it resolved that the District Conference convene on Thursday at 9:00 A. M. preceding the camp meeting. 25. Be it resolved that a Ministerial Convention be held.

The time and place to be decided by the District Council.

26. Be it resolved that we have a quarterly Ministerial Zone meeting.

The Zone Chairmen to be appointed by the District Superintendent. 27. Be it resolved that a combined Young People's Rally and Sunday School Convention be held on the camp ground July 3-5. The plans for the same to be worked out by the committees. 28. Inasmuch as the views of the ministers' wives are largely minis-

terial views; therefore, we recommend that no minister's wife be elected to serve as a Lay Delegate to the General Conference.

CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved that all preachers either come, send one, or pay the equivalent of \$2.00 per day labor for the preparation of the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.
 Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint the various

camp meeting committees and said chairman of each committee be authorized to purchase the necessities of his department under the direction of the District Superintendent. 3. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint some one to be dep-

utized to patrol the camp ground during camp meeting and to be hereafter enforced.

4. Be it resolved that the pastors and the District Supt. present the needs of the camp meeting to the churches, and that each church be responsible for six dessert dishes, six heavy glasses, one blanket or comfort, one straw tick, three each of plates, knives, forks, and spoons and to secure donations of fruit and vegetables.

5. Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the ground after 7:00 p. m. without permission from parents or the one under whom they work and they shall be expected to attend Young People's and night services.

6. Be it resolved that each pastor shall secure during the year not fewer than five new members for the Charleston Camp Meeting Association.

7. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.

8. Inasmuch as so many children are on our grounds throughout the camp meeting; therefore, be it resolved that special services be held for them.

9. Inasmuch as so many people bring their lunch during the camp meeting; therefore, be it resolved that wayside tables be made and placed in convenient places on the grounds for their accomodation.

10. Be it resolved that we express our thanks to the Mattoon Baking Co., Charleston Courier, The A & P Store, the Meadow Gold Dairy, the Charleston Ice Company, and the Palmer Battery Shop, and that our secretary convey the same to them.

11. Be it resolved that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.

12. Be it resolved that when one has reserved a room or rooms that they notify the chairman of the entertainment committee not later than Wednesday prior to the beginning date of the camp as to when they expect to arrive.

13. Be it resolved that our Camp Meeting date be as follows, to begin the first Friday in August of each year.

14. We recommend that all working for their meals at camp meeting shall pay a registration fee of \$1.00, at which time they shall be given a worker's ticket.

15. We recommend that the Camp Meeting Committee have a Registration and Information sign made for the Office and that all campers, upon arrival, be requested to register their names and addresses and arrange for meals and lodging.

16. We recommend that each church be requested to furnish a bed and springs for the camp.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. Since the General Conference has adopted the Budget System of administering the finance of the General Church, we strongly urge all local boards to adopt the Budget System for administering the finances of their respective local churches, namely: Each church in this District shall raise an amount equal to 60 cents per member for General Home Missions, 50 cents per member for General Administration expense and \$1.90 per member for Foreign Missions, the same to include money raised for Foreign Missions by the Sunday School, etc.

2. We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shall decide upon a minimum financial support they will pay their pastor during the year.

3. (a) We recommend that a fund be created called the District Budget; and that this fund consist of ten per cent of all regular Church, Sunday School, and Young People's offerings, except that raised or Missions, general budget, building funds, rents, and evangelists.
(b) We further recommend that the District Budget be pro rated

(b) We further recommend that the District Budget be pro rated as follows: District Expense Fund, 75%; District Home Missions, 20%; General Conference Expense, 3%; and Frankfort Bible School, 2%.

General Conference Expense, 3%; and Frankfort Bible School, 2%. 4. We recommend that all Pastors, District Evengelists, and other licensed and ordained Ministers of the District tithe their income into the local of which they are a member.

local of which they are a member.
5. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,000 per year, and 2c per mile traveling expense.
6. Since the District Superintendent is to the District what the pastor

6. Since the District Superintendent is to the District what the pastor is to the church, we recommend, that the District Superintendent shall meet with each local church board at the time of his visits and inquire into the spiritual and financial condition of the church and help them in the solution of their various problems; we further recommend, that the duties of the District Superintendent, as outlined by the District Council, be printed in the minutes.

7. We recommend that the District Superintendent tithe his salary into the District Treasury to be credited to District Home Missions.

8. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as camp meeting treasurer and be paid the sum of \$35.00 per year. We further recom--8mend that the District Treasurer shall act as District Statistician and be paid the sum of \$90.00 per year.

9. We recommend that each Local Church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Treasury the sum of five dollars for each delegate throughout the Camp and Conference and this is to include board and lodging.

10. We recommend that the regular Sunday School offering on one Sunday per month shall be an offering for Missions, the same to be for-warded by the local church treasurer to the District Treasurer.

11. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heat-ing device that provisions be made for same by local church. 12. We recommend that our Camp Meeting date be as follows to begin

the first Friday in August of each year.

13. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks vacation with salary.

We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a 14. telephone if possible.

We recommend that the Assistant Superintendent be paid the sum 15. \$7.00 per day, plus 2c per mile traveling expenses while rendering serof We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first 16.

vices for the District.

floor, \$4.00; second floor, \$3.00; and third floor, \$1.50 per cot. 17. We recommend that each local and licensed minister taking his or her examination shall pay the examiner the amount of \$1.00 for each examination taken.

18. We recommend that District Letter Heads be printed; the amount to be decided by the District Council.

We recommend that the District Council be authorized to construct 19. necessary buildings to meet the need of the Camp. 20. We recommend that each Zone take an offering for the District

Young People's Executive upon each visit.

21.We recommend that each mémber of the District be asked to contribute one dollar per year for camp meeting expense.

22.We recommend that the District Superintendent be authorized to publish a Quarterly Bulletin; one page to be given to the District Treasurer's report; one page to the District Sunday School work; and the other pages to the work of District Home Missions, Young People's work, and other District interests.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the twenty-fourth Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings: Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

Another milestone has been passed, another years' activities recorded, and we are being hurried on to meet life's problems, encounter other diffianti-Christ obstructions. The only hope of the world lies at our door. We have the message that they need, with the commission to proclaim it and the command to "be instant in season and out of season." We must be earnthe command to be instant in season and out of season." We must be earn-est, faithful, prayerful laborers together with Him who is ever in the midst of His seven Golden candlesticks and who also has said "Fear not, I am the first and the last, I am He that liveth and was dead; and behold, I am alive forevermore, Amen, and have the keys of hell and of death." Our task is momentous. We dare not become factious or divided. We cannot stand still, we must go forward. The position we occupy is vital, and our outlook full of promises: for bright such the promises of God full of promises; for bright are the promises of God. This has been a good year on the District. Every church has had at

least one, and most of them two and three good revivals. I am sure there never has been a time of greater need for the preaching and living this Gos-pel of full Salvation than in this very hour. The District has been blessed financially this past year. Debts have been decreased and paid. Joliet paid off parsonage; Chicago sold old church and purchased a much better building in better location. Argo has purchased a splendid building site. Marshall sold old parsonage and are building new. Decatur built new par-sonage. Several other pastors made necessary improvements on both churches and parsonages. I am not quite satisfied with our Home Missionary Plans; however, our accomplishments the past year has by no means been in vain. What has been spent by us as a District I believe will bring fruitful dividends. Gales-burg church debt has been liquidated by assistance of District Home Mis-sionary Fund. Our work at Paris, pastored by Sisters Dice and Deardorff, has been supplied with some financial support. This appears to be an op-portune field. Brother Friend Glendenning and Brother Abernathy each donated some ministerial labor to the Paris work. The pastors were worthy least one, and most of them two and three good revivals. I am sure there

donated some ministerial labor to the Paris work. The pastors were worthy of more than we were able to give.

The Argo work under Brother Ashley's efficient pastoral leadership has become very promising. The District Home Missionary Department has helped some in this field; yet on the account of the lack of funds, the Dis-trict has not thus far fully kept her promise of support. Because of the serious housing and living facilities it is hard to known what to recommend as plans for our Home Missionary Work. It does appear that our District Home Missionary work as the fold support that our District Home Missionary money should serve a two-fold purpose; namely, 1st: To support salaries for chosen qualified Home Missionary workers and, 2nd: To create a loan Fund to be administered and loaned under the supervision of the District Council where and when building projects are deemed wise and promising. At present we need a church building at Bloomington, Streator, and Argo. The Reverend A. L. Luttrull Trinity Tabernacle work at Olney has con-

sidered of coming in with us. I have made three trips to Olney in the interest of this work. Our brother Breen has a nice Tabernacle work at Mattoon and they have shown good evidence of courtship. Brother Teiffel, who lives at Effingham, has a community in which he has a preaching crowd every two weeks. Brother Thompson is still holding the fort at Lerna. Also Brother Catey has conducted two revivals in Greenup with Brother Abernathy and Brother Wheeldon as the evangelists. In these meetings a few souls sought and found God and I am sure these efforts were a Gospel seedsowing time. Don't you think it would be good if we could swing back and have a blaze-hitter Frontier Home Missionary man like Brother Wheeldon use to do? Possibly Brother Wheeldon is not too old to do it again if we would give him a lift. As the darkness of the great Tribulation settles down upon this old world I find it is getting harder to have revivals, yet the possibilities of growth in grace and occupying till He comes is our Glorious privilege. Only through the grace of God, the good advise of the District Council members, the never-failing loyalty and co-operation of the true-hearted pastors and evangelists and the many words of encouragement from our laity, have I been able to face the task and problems of this past year. Hitherto hath the Lord Helped us.

I have visited all the churches three times with one exception, and several I have visited four and five times. Was honored in having a mortgage burning service at Joliet and a church dedication service at Galesburg. Conducted one ministerial convention, held all the annual business meetings of the District and several church board meetings of which I failed to keep a correct number. Have had three special-called District Council meetings, attend the General Conference; and remained over more than a day for a General Board Meeting. Have held three revivals in the District; Traveled a little over 14,000 miles, preached 156 times, worked at least three weeks on camp grounds, taken up several offerings for various needs and have had a goodly number of seekers which the pastors have reported. I have been paid more than I am worthy.

Salary from the District, \$3029.53, traveling expenses \$220.00, love offering \$77.27, revivals \$59.56. Total \$3386.36.

Also compiled one issue of the District Bulletin. There was supposed to have been ten. Please don't ask me where are the nine?
