

#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

#### First Sitting

The Twenty-Ninth Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 9, 1951 at

8:40 A. M.

The Conference opened with Bro. Wesley Chatfield leading the congregation in singing, 'We'll Work Till Jesus Comes," and "Let Go and Let God Have His Way." Rev. W. C. Beard offered the opening prayer of the Conference.

The Chatfields, our Camp Meeting evangelistic singers, rendered a

special song, "It Took A Miracle," to the edification of all.

Rev. Sylvan Calloway, Assistant District Superintendent, introduced Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, as the Presiding Officer of the Conference. Rev. Sturk addressed the Conference upon the subject, "A Revival in the Pilgrim Holiness Church."

The Secretary called the roll with 64 members answering present.

A motion prevailed to have the platform and the first eight seats in the two center sections constitute the Conference bar. The bar was cleared.

The Assistant Superintendent appointed Rev. Charles Riggs and Rev.

Everett Ashley as Reception Committee.

The Reception Committee introduced to the Conference Rev. and Mrs. R. S. Shelton of North Carolina. Brother and Sister Wesley Chatfield of Ohio, Rev. Donald Cassady of Indiana, and Rev. and Mrs. H. J. Beecher of Missouri District.

A motion carried to grant them an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

Motion made to accept the transfer of Rev. and Mrs. H. J. Beecher from

the N. Central District to the Illinois Conference. Motion carried.

The Secretary read the report of the District Superintendent, Rev. R. W. Wolfe, as he was not present at the Conference. The report was accepted.

A motion prevailed to have the time of meeting be from 8:30 A. M., to 12:00 A. M. The afternoon sitting to be from 1:30 to 5:00 P. M.

The Auditors reported that because of lack of material they were unable

to give a complete report.

A motion carried to hear the District Treasurer's report. His report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The District Statistician's report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary read his report. Motion carried to accept. (Printed in reports.)

Rev. W. E. Honeycutt, Sunday School Promotional Secretary, presented a certificate of award to the Martinsville pastor and delegate for the highest percentage of gain in their Sunday School for the year.

The report of the joint meeting of the Educational and Examining Boards was read and accepted. (Printed in reports.)

The Conference recessed for five minutes.

A motion carried that Sister T. B. Ross be seated as delegate from the Streator Church.

A motion carried that Brother Dan Dwyer be seated as delegate from the Jersevville Church.

A motion carried to adjourn. Prayer by Rev. Donald Cassady.

#### Second Sitting

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 P. M., August 9, 1951, with Brother Wesley Chatfield leading in singing, "Glory to His Name," and "Let Go and Let God Have His Way." Prayer by Rev. Everett Ashley.

The Chatfields sang, "You Ain't Got Nothing at all."

Rev. L. W. Sturk read a portion from John the 17th chapter, speaking upon "Church Unity."

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous sitting which were

accepted.

The reception committee introduced to the Conference Rev. and Mrs. R. K. Storey, President of Frankfort Pilgrim College, and Rev. Wm. Dean, of the Indiana District. They were asked to give a word of testimony.

A motion prevailed to grant them an honorary seat within the Conference

bar.

A motion carried to extend to the Evangelists and Rev. Storey the privileges of the floor.

A motion carried to set the ordination service for Friday morning to take

the place of the devotional service.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was given. Resolutions No. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 7 were approved. Resolution No. 6 was referred back to the committee.

A motion carried that the District Secretary have 'Camp Rules' printed for the camp ground and that each church receive a copy of the same. The District Council will designate the rules to be printed.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was given. A motion

carried to accept their recommendations. (Printed in reports.)

The Conference recessed for five minutes.

A motion prevailed to seat Brother Clarence Popham as deligate from the Coffeyville Church in the absence of the delegate and the Alternate.

A motion carried to proceed with the election.

Rev. Sylvan Calloway, Assistant Superintendent, appointed as tellers John Abernathy, L. S. Lancaster, Louis Ford, Edward Tuttle, Jack Hysel, and Sherman Deisher.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent, Rev. A. O. Cassady was

elected. A speech was called for and given.

The Conference adjourned.

#### Third Sitting

The Third Sitting of the Conference convened at 8:45 A. M., Friday morning, August 10, 1951 with Wesley Chatfield leading the congregation in singing, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."

The Ordination service was the order of the day. Rev. L. W. Sturk, Rev. A. O. Cassady, Rev. Wm. Beard, Rev W. E. Catey, Rev. Sylvan Calloway, and

Rev. Everett Ashley constituted the Ordination Council.

Bro. Wesley Chatfield led the Conference in singing, "A Charge to Keep." Rev. W. E. Catey and Rev. Sylvan Calloway read Scriptural Selections. Rev. A. O. Cassady led in prayer. Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, gave the Ordination Message after which Kenneth Cobble, Louis Ford, Herman Lashbrook, Paul Meeks, and Nona Wilson were duly ordained. The Congregation sang, "Bless Be the Tie that Binds."

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. J. C. Williams, District Super-

intendent of Louisiana District and Rev. Myrtle Rogers of N. Central District to the Conference. Motion carried that they be given an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The Conference continued with the election of officers. The following

officers were elected:

Rev. Everett Ashley, Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. Dwight Horn, District Secretary. Rev. W. C. Beard, District Treasurer.

Rev. Sylvan Calloway, Rev. W. E. Catey and Rev. Elmer Waltrip were

elected as Advisory Members of the District Council.

A motion carried to ratify the nomination of the Council for Rev. A. O. Cassady to succeed himself for a period of 3 years of the Examining Board; Rev. W. C. Beard to succeed himself for a period of 3 years on the Educational Board; and Rev. W. E. Catey to succeed himself as District Trustee for 3 years.

A motion carried that the District Conference ask the pastors of the District to bring the Filgrim Holiness Advocate Subscription list up to a

number equal to their church membership.

The Memorial Committee's report was read and accepted. (Printed in

the reports.)

The Resolutions Committee gave their final report. Resolution No. 6 was approved as amended.

The report of the Camp Meeting Treasurer was read and accepted.

A motion carried that the Conference ratify the Minutes of the last

sitting.

A letter from Sister R. W. Wolfe was read to the Conference by Rev. W. C. Beard.

The Conference gave a hearty "Amen" in appreciation to Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, for his presence, his messages, and his gracious manner in which he presided over the Conference.

The Conference adjourned with prayer by Brother Sturk.

# REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. Inasmuch as there has been a failure on the part of some of our pastors in carrying out some of the resolutions of the District Conference: therefore, be it resolved that if any pastor shall fail to carry out any resolution as passed by the District Conference he shall be denied both voice and vote in the following District Conference unless he shows just cause.

2. Be it resolved that the fifty Sundays not including the Camp Meeting Sundays constitute the Sunday School year, and averages and

awards be thus based.

3. Be it resolved that all local ministers shall meet with the Educational Board and all licensed ministers shall meet with the Educational and Examining Boards not later than the last Saturday of the camp meeting.

4. (a) Be it resolved that each pastor shall have the privilege of holding one revival off his charge with regular salary provided he supply

his pulpit satisfactorily in his absence.

(b) Be it further resolved that each pastor and all evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the camp and conference, and that if any minister does not attend camp and conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for his absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be dealt with by the Council.

5. Be it resolved that the Annual Conference election of officers

be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers duties are adopted.
6. (a) Resolved that the Conference Year shall end with June 30th each

6. (a) Resolved that the Conference Year shall end with June 30th each year and all business transacted between that and the Annual Conference shall be included in the following year's report. Also the Conference year

shall be divided into four quarters ending with the following dates respectively: First Quarter, July 1st to September 30th; Second Quarter, October 1st to December 31st; Third Quarter, January 1st to March 31st; Fourth Quarter, April 1st to June 30th.

(b) Be it further resolved that a quarterly meeting be held in each church within ten days following the close of each quarter, at which time reports covering the quarter shall be heard and then copied in the Church

Secretary's book and mailed to the Distict Superintendent.

(c) Resolved that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statis-

tician by July 10th.

Resolved that all of our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference Minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.

8 (a) Resolved that each pastor shall keep a record of all subscribers to the Advocate in each neighborhood where he pastors and shall, about thirty days before each subscription expires, endeavor to secure a renewal

of the same.

(b) Be it further resolved that each pastor shall endeavor to secure as many subscriptions to the Advocate as possible in each town or community in which his regular appointment is located.

9. Resolved that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be

made prior to the respective annual church meetings.

Resolved that the pastor shall be responsible for the accuracy and

condition of all church records and all quarterly and annual reports.

Resolved that the books of the course of study not now possessed by the examiners shall be purchased by the District for their use. The books shall remain the property of the District and the examiners using the same shall be responsible for their preservation and shall reimburse the District if the books are damaged or lost through their neglect.

Be it resolved that a Ministerial Convention be held the first Tuesday of April. The Council to fix the place on invitation from the

churches.

Be it resolved that the District Council name the District Young People's Officers and Zone Chairmen not later than Wednesday of Camp

Meeting each year.

Be it resolved that the Zone Chairmen be expected to visit each church in his zone at least once during the Conference year in the interest of the Young People's Work. Since there are so many churches in the Central Zone we recommend that co-chairmen for this zone be named by the District Council, and his expenses be borne by the Young People's group.

Be it resolved that a special Young People's report blank be prepared by our District Secretary and District Young People's Executive Secretary, to be mailed along with the regular quarterly report blanks to each local church. The said special blanks to be filled out and mailed to the Executive Secretary to keep him informed as to the progress of the local Young People's Societies.

Be it resolved that our Young People's Committees be empowered to provide their own legislation upon the approval of the District Council.

Be it resolved that because of the present trend of this immodest age, our ministers and the laity be admonished to carry out the special rules of our Manual page 49, section 65.

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time.

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent devote at least

- eleven months of his time to the District work.

  20. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent be consulted and present when drawing up all the deeds in the District.
- Be it resolved that we have a quarterly Ministerial Zone meeting The Zone Chairman to be appointed by the District Superintendent.

#### CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved that all preachers either come, send one, or pay the equivalent of \$2.00 per day labor for the preparation of the District Camp

and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent shall appoint five men to be known as "The District Camp Meeting Committee." Their names shall be listed in the Official Directory as such. Be it further understood that the first one at the head of the list serve as chairman and the second one as secretary. It shall be the duty of this committee to supervise and responsible for the work on the Camp grounds, both preparatory to Camp and during Camp Meeting. They shall work under the authority of the District Council.

Be it resolved that the District Council appoint some one to be deputized to patrol the camp ground during meeting and to be hereafter

enforced.

In the face of the present need, be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the camp meeting to the churches and that each church be responsible for six desert dishes, six heavy glasses, six heavy cups, six dish towels one blanket, one straw tick,

also fruit, jelly, and vegetables.

Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7:00 P. M., without special permission from the proper Camp authorities or accompanied by their parents. They shall be required to attend Young People's and night services. Failure to keep this rule may forfeit their privilege of remaining in Camp. There shall be a Dean of Men and a Matron of Women, appointed by the Camp Committee, who shall be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient

places on the camp grounds.

Inasmuch as so many children are on our grounds throughout the camp meeting therefore, be it resolved that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.

Inasmuch as all sources for raising camp meeting funds prior to 8. the camp have been deleted; be it resolved that it be left in the hands of

the Council to provide a feasible plan to supply these funds.

9. Inasmuch as so many people bring their lunch during the camp meeting; therefore, be it resolved that wayside tables be made and placed in convenient places on the grounds for their accomodation.

Be it resolved that all who rent rooms during camp be advised

to bring their own bedding.

We recommend that anyone having reserved accommodations on the Camp ground shall within 30 days and not later than within 7 days of the coming Camp, notify the Secretary of the Camp Meeting Committee as to when they expect to arrive. Failure to do so may forfeit their reservation and the accommodations may be transferred to another by the Committee.

Be it resolved that our Camp Meeting date be as follows, to begin

the first Friday in August of each year.

- Be it resolved that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall.
- We recommend that the Camp Meeting Committee have a Registration and Information sign made for the Office and that all campers, upon arrival, be requested to register their names and addresses and arrange for meals and lodging.

We recommend that each church be requested to furnish a bed

and springs for the camp.

16. Be it resolved that the District Council provide a meeting place

for Young People's services other than the tabernacle.

17. We recommend that the District Council provide and post signs on the camp ground that they deem advisable, such as, no smoking, no parking, etc.

## REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

We recommend that each church in this District shall raise an amount equal to \$1 per member for General Home Missions, \$1 per member for General Administration Expense, \$2 per member for Foreign Missions 75c per member for General Church College, 50c per member for the General Home Missionary Building Loan Fund, and 25c per member for General Sunday School Work.

We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shall decide upon a minimum financial support they will pay their pastor

during the year.

We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church, Sunday School, and Young People's offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents, and evangelists, and that the District Budget be prorated as follows: District Expense Fund, 75%; District Home Missions, 20%; General Conference Expense, 3%; and Frankfort Bible School, 2%.

4. We recommend that all pastors, District evangelists, and other light and condend and missions and state of the District evangelists, and other light and condend and missions.

licensed and ordained ministers of the District tithe their income into

the local church of which they are a member.

We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,000.00 per year and 4c per mile traveling expense and not to exceed

\$800.00 per year.

6. Since the District Superintendent is to the District what the pastor is to the church, we recommend, that the District Superintendent shall meet with each local church board at the time of his visits and inquire into the spiritual and financial condition of the church and help them in the solution of their various problems; we further recommend, that the duties of the District Superintendent, as outlined by District Council, be printed in the minutes.

We recommend that the District Superintendent tithe his salary

into the District Treasury to be credited to the District Expense Fund.

8. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as camp meeting treasurer and be paid the sum of \$45.00 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer shall act as District Statistician and be paid the sum of \$175 per year.

We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Treasury the sum of \$10.00 for each delegate attending the

Camp and Conference and this is to include board and room.

We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating device that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks vacation with salary.

12. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone

We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent be paid the sum of \$7.00 per day, plus 4c per mile traveling expenses while rendering services for the District.

We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first

floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50; and third floor, \$1.50 per cot.

15 We recommend that each local and licensed minister taking his or her examination shall pay the examiner the amount of \$1.00 for each examination taken.

We recommend that District Letter Heads be printed; the

amount to be decided by the District Secretary.

17. We recommend that each Zone take an offering for the District

Young People's Executive upon each visit.

We recommend that the District Council appoint a committee 18. of three with the District Superintendent as Chairman, the same to be known as the District Home Missionary Committee. They shall have charge of all the District Home Missionary work under the direction of the District

Council. We further recommend that the expenses of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service

to the Home Missionary work

Since the recent purchase of a District Parsonage has involved the District in debt, we recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2 per year per member, to meet this indebtedness.

Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School program; We recommend that each Sunday School in the District be asked to send the District Promotional Secretary the amount of \$3 (three dollars) for this work, immediately following the District Conference.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### TO THE ILLINOIS DISTRICT CONFERENCE OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH:

God has brought us through another year with battles and burdens, but also with blessings and victories. With grateful hearts we should praise him together. Any advangement we have made has been under the Divine guidance of the mighty hand of God. In many ways, we feel the District is stronger, and is pursuing a course that if kept going will ultimately result in some substantial gains in churches and membership. The two years we have spent on the District has for the most part been spent in adjusting and rehabili-

tating the work, and we have seen some very gratifying results.

The Church at Jerseyville with a church and parsonage has been brought back to life, and is making some gains and bids fair to come back to normal life. Much credit is due Brother Jack Hysel and Brother Paul Meeks in getting this work back on its feet. Brother Stogdill has opened up a new work near Effingham, and has worked faithful at the job. Brother Dewey Barker has also opened up a new work at Shelbyville, and the Home Missionary Committee has been making some investigation as to some new property there. The church at Joliet has installed new pews and made some other improvements which has been needed for some time. It is a magnificent change and credit is due the fine property and Rev. Ralph Napier, the pastor. At Decatur Brother Riggs has been making gradual progress for the last two years until all the debt is cleared away and the church painted and also a great deal of other improvements have been made on the church. At Oblong Brother Cassady has just finished the complete renovation of the old church until it is one of the most beautiful churches in the community. Both the interior and exterior have been completely worked over. Brother Hall at Marshall has made some added improvements on the church. Brother Calloway at Palestine is in the act of making some very needed changes in the construction of the Church there. At Bloomington, Rev. Forest Adams has performed almost the inevitable. After about eight years on the field he has given the District a new church built out of very nice cement block material, and although not completely finished it is certainly a great piece of work. We have a very fine plant there. A nice parsonage next to the church and in very good location. A great amount of the labor was done by the pastor, and some donated by the community. At Springfield, Brother Beard has just about finished the parsonage, and has moved in. This is a very fine and creditable building, which adds much to the value of the District. This is not to leave out any and all other added improvements, which our good pastors have been so ardent in making an accomplishment, but we have given the most outstanding perhaps.

We have held three revivals on the District, and two off the District up until Camp Meeting season. We conducted a Ministerial Meeting in April which was held at the Argo Church. Some improvement has been made on the District parsonage, in adding metal awnings. A new power mower has been purchased for the Camp ground. Brother and Sister Hash, the efficient caretaker at the Camp Ground, have kept the grounds in better condition than it

has ever been kept.

We have traveled about 20,000 miles on the District, and have received some help on our traveling expenses from the Dist., but no stipulated amount per mile. We have held meetings and put in our offerings on the mileage. At the beginning of the year our District finances were low, but we have come out at the end of the year in good shape, and out of the deficits.

We are retiring from the District to take a position on the faculty at

Frankfort College and will be praying for the welfare of all.

## REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the twenty-ninth annual conference of the Illinois District of the

Pilgrim Holiness Church now in session at Charleston, Illinois.

GREETINGS: In the worthy name of Our Crucified and risen Lord. The District Sunday School Committee wishes to submit the following report of

the Sunday School Work of the District for the past year.

During the year there has been added to the list of Sunday Schools in this district, three new names: that of Pleasant Hill, Ewington and Shelbyville. Also the work at Jerseyville that had stood inactive for some years, has been re opened. This gives us now a total of 28 active Sunday Schools as against 24 last year, or an increase in Sunday Schools of 16 2-3rds per cent. In spite of the worst winter that we have had in many years, the District still made a gain of slightly more than 7 per cent in average weekly attendance.

During the year the Committee has printed and sent out two field letters, and in co-operation with the other departments of the District work, has printed and mailed out eleven monthly Issues of the Illinois Conference Bulletin, each issue ranging in size from one to four pages. We farther sent out weekly reports of all the Sunday Schools of the District during Sunday School Revival.

We held two committee meetings, four special Sunday School services in connection with the District Zone meetings and were favored with a very prominent part in the program during the District Ministerial meeting. It appears that this District is becoming increasingly conscious of the possibilities that lay ahead of us in the great work of building Sunday Schools.
