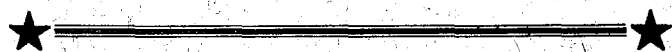

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Thirtieth Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 11, 1952 at 8:30 a. m.

The Conference opened with Bro. Eddie Reed leading the congregation in singing, "Love Lifted Me," and "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Bro. Everett Ashley offered the opening prayer of the Conference.

The Secretary read a letter of greeting from Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, stating his regret for his inability to be present at the Conference and that Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, General Secretary, would very efficiently preside.

The District Superintendent, A. O. Cassady, asked the Conference to stand as an expression of appreciation for the letter from Bro. Sturk. He then presented Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, General Secretary, to the Conference as General Presiding Officer.

Rev. Stikeleather read from the 12th chapter of Romans exhorting the Conference to brotherly love, humility and diligence in business.

The Secretary called the roll with 67 present.

A motion prevailed to have the platform and the first eight seats in the two center sections constitute the Conference bar. The bar was cleared.

A motion prevailed to have the time of meeting be from 8:30 a. m., to 12:00 a. m.; the afternoon sitting to be from 1:30 to 5:00 p. m.; and the evening sitting to be from 7:00 to 9:30 p. m.

The District Superintendent, Rev. A. O. Cassady, read his report to the Conference. A motion carried to accept the report. (Printed in reports).

The report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary was read. A motion prevailed to accept. (Printed in reports).

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. W. E. Honeycutt, presented a certificate of award to the Bridgeport pastor and delegate for the highest percentage of gain in their Sunday School for the year.

A motion carried that the Conference accept the new Church at Centralia into the Conference and that the pastor, Bro. D. E. Winemiller, and their delegate be seated within the Conference bar.

A motion carried to seat Mrs. Catt as delegate from Robinson Church.

The report of the District Statistician was read and accepted. (Printed in Reports).

The Auditing Committee's report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer read his report. A motion carried to accept. (Printed in reports).

The report of the Camp Meeting Treasurer was read and accepted. (Printed in the reports).

The Resolutions Committee read a partial report.

The Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

Second Sitting

The second-sitting opened at 1:30 p. m., with Bro. Howard leading in singing "On Christ the Solid Rock I Stand."

Bro. Stikeleather read the Scripture from the thirteenth chapter of I Cor., with brief remarks. Prayer by Bro. Charles Riggs.

The minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.

A motion prevailed to receive Rev. James Cunningham into the Conference, who is coming by transfer from the Kentucky District.

The District Superintendent appointed Revs. Ford, Ashley and Abernathy as Reception Committee.

The Reception Committee introduced to the Conference Rev. Edgar Allan Poe from the Indiana Conference and Mr. V. E. Holt a member of the Frankfort School Board.

A motion prevailed to grant them an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The Resolutions Committee continued their report. (Printed in Reports as accepted).

A motion carried that resolutions numbers 13, 14, 15, and 16 be deleted, inasmuch as this matter is taken care of by the Manual, and that as an emergency measure, the District Council take immediate action to establish an aggressive Young People's program in accordance with the Manual.

The Reception Committee introduced to the Conference Bro. Chester Parker, pastor of the Ste. Marie Church. A motion carried to grant him a seat within the Conference bar with voting privilege.

The Secretary read a letter to the Conference from the Secretary of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Annual Conference in the State of San Luis Potosi expressing appreciation and gratitude for the support of the Church in the United States both materially and spiritually.

The recommendations of the Ways and Means Committee were read. (Printed in reports as accepted).

After some helpful remarks to the Conference by Rev. S. M. Stikeleather on the subject of finances, a motion carried to recess for 10 minutes.

The Conference reconvened with the reading of the resolutions of the Camp Meeting Committee. (Printed in reports as accepted).

A motion was made that the Conference grant free lots for the churches of the District to build cottages for their pastors and delegates. A motion prevailed to refer it to the District Council and Camp Meeting Committee.

A motion was carried to extend the time long enough to have the report of the joint meeting of the Educational and Examining Board read. The report was read and accepted. (Printed in reports).

A motion prevailed to begin the evening sitting at 6:30.

The Secretary read the names of the Ordination Council as follows: Revs. Stikeleather, Cassady, Beard, Horn, Calloway and Ashley.

The Conference adjourned.

Third Sitting

The Third Sitting of the Conference opened at 6:30 with Bro. Lewis Ford leading the congregation in singing, "Rock of Ages." Prayer by Bro. Ashley.

The Scripture lesson was read by Bro. Stikeleather from II Tim., 4:1-7 after which the Conference joined in singing, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

The minutes of the second sitting were read and approved with corrections.

The Chairman of the Committee on Memorials read their report. A motion carried to receive. (Printed in reports).

The District Superintendent named for tellers Revs. Lancaster, Duda, Ford and Reed.

A motion prevailed that the local ministers who pastor churches be granted voting privileges in the Conference.

After a season of prayer the Conference proceeded with the election of officers.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. A. O. Cassady was elected. A speech was called for and given.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. Everett Ashley was elected.

Bro. Ashley declined to accept.

After several ballots were cast with no results a motion carried to set aside the rules and vote by acclamation for W. E. Hall. Bro. Hall was elected Assistant District Superintendent.

Ballots were cast and D. M. Horn was elected as District Secretary.

Bro. W. C. Beard was elected as District Treasurer.

Rev. Sylvan Calloway, Rev. Louis Ford and Rev. L. S. Lancaster were elected as Advisory Members of the District Council.

A motion carried to elect Bro. Calloway to succeed himself on the Examining Board for a period of 3 years.

Motion carried to elect Bro. Catey to succeed himself as member of the Educational Board for 3 years.

Motion carried to elect Bro. Calloway to succeed himself as a member of the Board of Trustees.

The Conference ratified the appointment of the various Boards and by the District Superintendent. (See Official Directory).

Motion carried to turn all unfinished business to the District Council.

A motion prevailed to give a rising vote of thanks to Bro. Stikeleather as Presiding Officer.

A motion prevailed to grant Chester Parker, D. E. Winemiller and James Taylor ministers' license in as much as they are pastors.

A motion carried that the Annual Conference date be adjusted to day sessions on Wednesday and Thursday of the Camp meeting. The District Council deems this action necessary in as much as it appears that the Conference did not give proper consideration to the matter as requested by General Superintendent Rev. L. W. Sturk and to the Manual page 69, section 90, paragraph 17.

The Conference adjourned.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. Inasmuch as the General Board has ruled that all our District Camps shall provide for Sunday School to be conducted on the Camp Grounds each Sunday of the Camp Therefore be it resolved that there shall be a Sunday School service conducted on this Camp Ground each Sunday of the Camp. The Sunday School Committee to be in charge of the same, and that suitable cards of recognition be given to all that attend, denoting their presence at he Camp Sunday School. These cards to be returned to the local Sunday School, thus encouraging a perfect attendance, and that local averages be figured and any awards be given on recognition of the same.
2. Be it resolved that all local ministers shall meet with the Educational Board and all licensed ministers shall meet with the Educational and Examining Boards not later than the last Saturday of the camp meeting.
3. Be it resolved that all pastor and evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the Camp and Conference, and that if any minister does not attend Camp and Conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for his absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years, he shall be dealt with by the Council.
4. Be it resolved that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers' duties are adopted.
5. Be it resolved that the Conference Year begin July 1st, and end on June 30th of each year, and that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician by July 10th.
6. Resolved that all of our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference Minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.
7. Be it resolved that each pastor shall endeavor to bring the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription list up to a number equal to or greater than the membership of the church.
8. Resolved that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made

prior to the respective annual church meetings.

9. Resolved that the pastor shall be responsible for the accuracy and condition of all church records and all quarterly and annual reports.
10. Inasmuch as books of the course of study have been furnished by the District to the examiners, be it resolved that the examiners be responsible for the same.
11. Be it resolved that a Ministerial Convention be held beginning the first Tuesday of April. The Council to fix the place on invitation from the churches.
12. Be it resolved that because of the present trend of this immodest age, our ministers and the laity be admonished to carry out the special rules of our Manual page 49, section 65.
13. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time.
14. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.
15. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent be consulted and present when drawing up all the deeds in the District.
16. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent appoint a zone-chairman in each zone and that the superintendent and zone chairman be authorized to arrange for zone meetings and formulate a program for the same as they deem advisable. That a zone secretary and treasurer be elected at the first meeting.

CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that all preachers either come, send one, or pay the equivalent of \$2.00 per day labor for the preparation of the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

2. Be it resolved that this Conference elect a Camp Secretary and a Camp Treasurer and the District Superintendent shall appoint five additional men. These seven men shall be known as a Camp Meeting Committee, and their names shall be placed in our official directory as such. It shall be the duty of this committee to supervise and be responsible for the work of the Camp grounds, both preparatory to Camp and during Camp Meeting. They shall work under the authority of the District Council.

3. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint some one to be deputized to patrol the camp ground during meeting and to be hereafter enforced.

4. In the face of the present need, be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the camp meeting to the churches and that each church be responsible for six desert dishes, six heavy glasses, six heavy cups, six dish towels one blanket, one straw tick, also fruit, jelly, and vegetables.

5. Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7:00 P. M., without special permission from the proper Camp authorities or accompanied by their parents. They shall be required to attend Young People's and night services. Failure to keep this rule may forfeit their privilege of remaining in Camp. There shall be a Dean of Men and a Matron of Women, appointed by the Camp Committee, who shall be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

6. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.

7. Inasmuch as so many children are on our grounds throughout the camp meeting: therefore, be it resolved that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.

8. Inasmuch as all sources for raising camp meeting funds prior to the camp have been depleted; be it resolved that it be left in the hands of the Council to provide a feasible plan to supply these funds.

9. Be it resolved that the District Camp Meeting Committee be responsible for the placing of four way-side tables on the Camp Ground by the 1953 Camp.

10. Be it resolved that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.

11. We recommend that anyone having reserved accommodations on the Camp ground shall within 30 days and not later than within 7 days of the coming Camp, notify the Secretary of the Camp Meeting Committee as to when they expect to arrive. Failure to do so may forfeit their reservation and the accommodations may be transferred to another by the Committee.

12. Be it resolved that our Camp Meeting date be as follows, to begin the first Friday in August of each year.

13. Be it resolved that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall.

Be it further resolved that the Camp Meeting Committee be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

14. We recommend that the Camp Meeting Committee have a Registration and Information sign made for the Office and that all campers, upon arrival, be requested to register their names and addresses and arrange for meals and lodging.

15. We recommend that each church be requested to furnish a bed and springs for the camp.

16. Be it resolved that the District Council provide a meeting place for Young People's services other than the tabernacle.

17. We recommend that the District Council provide and post signs on the camp ground that they deem advisable, such as, no smoking, no parking, etc.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. We recommend that each church in this District shall raise an amount equal to \$1 per member for General Home Missions, \$1 per member for General Administration Expense, \$2 per member for Foreign Missions 75c per member for General Church College, 50c per member for the General Home Missionary Building Loan Fund, and 25c per member for General Sunday School Work.

2. We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shall decide upon a minimum financial support they will pay their pastor during the year.

3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church, Sunday School, and Young People's offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents, and evangelists, and that the District Budget be prorated as follows: District Expense Fund, 80%; District Home Missions, 15%; General Conference Expense, 3%; and Frankfort Bible School, 2%.

4. We recommend that all pastors, District evangelists, and other licensed and ordained ministers of the District tithe their income into the local church of which they are a member.

5. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,000.00 per year and 4c per mile traveling expense and not to exceed \$800.00 per year.

6. Since the District Superintendent is to the District what the pastor is to the church, we recommend, that the District Superintendent shall meet with each local church board at the time of his visits and inquire into the spiritual and financial condition of the church and help them in the solution of their various problems.

7. We recommend that the District Superintendent tithe his salary

into the District Treasury to be credited to the District Expense Fund.

8. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as camp meeting treasurer and be paid the sum of \$45.00 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer shall act as District Statistician and be paid the sum of \$175 per year.

9. We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Treasury the sum of \$10.00 for each delegate attending the Camp and Conference and this is to include board and room.

10. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating device that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

11. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks vacation with salary.

12. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone.

13. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent be paid the sum of \$7.00 per day, plus 4c per mile traveling expenses while rendering services for the District or Camp Meeting.

14. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50; and third floor, \$1.50 per cot.

15. We recommend that each local and licensed minister taking his or her examination shall pay the examiner the amount of \$1.00 for each examination taken.

16. We recommend that District Letter Heads be printed; the amount to be decided by the District Secretary.

17. We recommend that each Zone take an offering for the District Young People's Executive upon each visit.

18. We recommend that the District Council appoint a committee of three with the District Superintendent as Chairman, the same to be known as the District Home Missionary Committee. They shall have charge of all the District Home Missionary work under the direction of the District Council. We further recommend that the expenses of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary work.

19. We recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2 per year per member, to meet this indebtedness.

20. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School program; We recommend that each Sunday School in the District be asked to send the District Promotional Secretary the amount of \$3 (three dollars) for this work, immediately following the District Conference.

21. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid a salary of \$30.00 per year. The salary shall be raised from the Sunday School Conventions.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our dearly beloved chairman, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, Pastors, Delegates, Laity and to the 30th Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church District of Illinois now in session, Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

It has been a gracious privilege to labor with you and for you, and for the District interest, it is with a keen sense of our inability and unworthiness that we have served you this year, for any progress that has been made, any good that may have been accomplished, we give our Blessed Lord all the praise. Strength has been given, grace has been granted and the Holy Spirit has been our constant guide and comfort in the many battles and problems that came our way.

Our entire time during the Conference year, with the exception of about eight days, has been spent on the District, and for the cause of the Lord, we have visited each church three times with the exception of about two, with many of the churches receiving additional visits as the occasion demanded.

The kindness extended to us as we have labored among the churches, as well as the co-operation of the pastors and laity has made this a very blessed year for us and family, and we want you to know the appreciation goes deeper than words can express. About all we can say is, thanks to you who have stood by so loyally and prayed for us, and may God pour upon you blessings from on high.

THE STATE OF THE DISTRICT — We are glad to report that our Heavenly Father has blessed us as a District, with many good revivals, reports telling of gracious out pourings of the Holy Spirit, and some of our churches have had almost a continual revival spirit in their regular services, penitent sinners have prayed through to definite victory, those who have strayed from the fold, and the Spirit has touched their hearts, have come back to grace and victory. Many believers have had the desire of their hearts satisfied by the baptism of the Holy Spirit. This adds up to the fact that our people are encouraged to press on in battle, pray harder, give more, sacrifice more in all their efforts, with a greater vision and Holy zeal for God and souls. We feel the District and our people are on the march for greater victories and higher attainments, for the tomorrows than ever before.

Our Sunday Schools are on the up grade, due to the untiring efforts of our Sunday School Board and all concerned, we are very thankful for the interest shown and the increase of attendance that has been achieved in our Sunday School and church services. It is a mark of going forward when our pastors and people become Sunday school minded. Lawrenceville has made improvements on both Church and parsonage. A new piano has been installed which was much needed in their radio work and their ministry by radio is proving to be a blessing to many hearts.

Our Argo Church has installed a cooling system; made some changes in decorations; a new bulletin board adds to the beauty of the church and a partial redecoration of the parsonage.

The Bridgeport folk are gaining on the devil. Improvements have been made on the property and they are now planning an addition to the parsonage.

Ottawa is coming to the front, new entrance to basement; new siding where needed and the church is being painted at present.

Improvements have been made around the church at Olney. Parking space has been provided for and other fine work done.

Streator folk are still holding fort and have started cottage prayer meeting in a new field.

The Palestine Church has made some needed improvements by putting in a new ceiling, refinishing the floors, painting, new carpet in aisle and around the altar. This makes a lovely little church.

Galesburg is still in the battle. They have made some improvements on the parsonage; have almost completed their Sunday School rooms in basement.

Robinson Church completely redecorated their auditorium which gives them a very lovely church. Some needed improvements have been made on the parsonage.

Pleasant Hill has made some gain and is still in the battle for souls.

Oblong Church is still going through some needed repairs. New hard wood floors have been laid in the parsonage, which was very badly needed.

Bloomington has redecorated their worship room in basement. The parsonage has been redecorated and material is now on the ground to put the roof on the church.

The Ste. Marie folk have painted the inside of their church, pews and floors and are looking forward to other improvements and gains.

Our folk at Decatur have redecorated their church and parsonage; also built a new garage and improved their parking space.

Asbury has made some fine gains by painting their church inside and also seats and floor, and planning other improvements.
