#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

#### First Sitting

The Thirty-second Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 16, 1954 at 8:00 a.m.

The Conference opened with Rev. E. A. Meeks leading the congregation in singing, "The Solid Rock." Rev. A. O. Cassady offered the opening prayer of the Conference.

Rev. W. E. Hall, District Superintendent, read a letter of greeting from General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, who expressed regrets for his inability to be present stating his inability to be present and that he had asked Rev. P. W. Thomas, our Editor, to serve as presiding officer in the Conference. Rev. P. W. Thomas took the chair and spoke briefly a word of greeting.

At the request of Rev. Thomas the Secretary read the 91st Psalm.

The Secretary called the roll with 73 members present.

The bar was cleared with the first eight seats in the two center sections constituting the Conference bar.

A motion prevailed to have the time of meeting from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m and the afternoon setting be from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

The District Superintendent appointed Charles Riggs and Sylvan Calloway as Reception Committee.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. W. E. Honeycutt from the Pa.-N. J. District, and Rev. Glen Dyer from Gibson City. A motion prevailed to grant them an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W E. Hall, read his annual report. A motion carried to receive.

The District Superintendent presented the pastors and delegates of the following churches to the Conference, Chicago, Canton, and Tuscola. A motion prevailed to receive these new churches into the Conference. A welcome was expressed by the congregation singing, "Blest Be the Tie that Binds."

A motion carried to extend the Conference bar to include the first 10 seats in the two center sections.

The Assistant Superintendent gave an oral report. A motion carried to receive.

The Reception Committee introduced the following to the Conference, Rev. and Mrs. L. A. Williams of Argo, and Rev. and Mrs. D. R. Close of Lawrence-ville, who were officially received as members of the Conference; Rev. Groves from Mooresville, Ind. and Rev. Sammie Holder of British Guiana.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read. A motion carried to receive.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The report of the Camp meeting Treasurer was read. Motion carried to accept with corrections.

A motion carried that Mrs. W. E. Honeycutt, who has recently transferred to the Pa.-N. J. District, but is taking a pastorate in Illinois, be received into the Conference.

A partial report of the Sunday School Committee was read and received with the understanding that the complete report be prepared for the minutes.

The Statisticial report was read, with motion prevailing that just the totals be read.

A motion carried that the annual statistical reports be sent to the District Statistician by registered mail.

A motion carried that any available material incidental to the Statistical report be added before acceptance.

A motion prevailed that the Secretary send the report blanks to the churches 30 days before the end of the quarter.

The report of the joint meeting of the Examining and Educational boards was read. A motion carried to accept in its entirety.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read.

A motion carried to recess for 10 minutes.

The Conference re-assembled at the call of the bell with the congregation singing, "We're Marching to Zion" and Rev P. W. Thomas gave words of edification.

A motion prevailed that at 1;00 p.m. the Ordination service be the order of the day.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was continued. A motion carried to deal with any new recommendations one by one. (Printed in reports as adopted.)

A motion carried that Bro. Sammie Holder sing a song. He sang, "No One ever cared for Me like Jesus."

A motion carried to receive Mrs. Floyd Dunn into the Conference.

A motion prevailed to adjourn, Prayer was offered by Bro. Cassady

#### Seiond Sitting

The second sitting opened by the Conference singing, "A Charge to Keep I have" led by Rev. L. A. Williams. Prayer by Rev. L. S. Lancaster.

Arrangements were made and an Ordination service was held, with Rev. P. W. Thomas giving the Ordination message, and W E. Hall, A O. Cassady, L. S. Lancaster, D M. Horn, and W. C. Beard, constituting the rest of the Ordination Council. Earl Arnett, Morrie Berry, and W. M. Bowie were duly ordained.

A motion carried to accept the Statisticial report as read with the proper additions to appear in the Minutes.

A motion carried that W E. Honeycutt and W. E. Catey, who each were Sunday School Promotional Secretary for a part of the year, prepare a joint report to appear in the minutes.

A motion carried to proceed with the election of Officers. The District

Superintendent appointed Harvey Severs, Kenneth Cobble, Clinton Best, and Edward Tuttle as tellers. The Conference waited before God in earnest prayer for His direction.

Ballots were cast and the following officers were elected:

District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall.

Assistant Superintendent, Rev. L. A. Williams.

District Treasurer, Rev. W. C Beard.

District Secretary, Rev. D. M. Horn.

Rev. L. S. Lancaster, Rev. L. F. Ford, and Rev. Sylvan Calloway were elected as Advisory members of the District Council.

Rev. A. O. Cassady was selected to succeed himself on the Examining Board for a period of three years.

Rev. W. C. Beard was elected to succeed himself on the Educational Board for a period of three years.

A motion carried to declare Sylvan Cailoway, W. E. Catey, and L. S. Lancaster as District Trustees.

Rev. James Cummingham was elected as Camp meeting Treasurer.

A motion prevailed that the Secretary be instructed to cast a ballot for L. S. Lancaster as Camp meeting Secretary

The Conference approved the appointment of the various committees. (Refer to the Official Directory).

At the request of the chair invitations were given from the following churches for the Ministerial Convention: Lawrenceville, Argo, and Palestine.

A motion carried that the Conference vote immediately. Lawrenceville was chosen.

The Sunday School Committee presented awards to the following Sunday Schools: Springfield, for the greatest numerical gain for the year; Springfield, for the highest percentage gain for the year; and Bridgeport, for the highest numerical gain over a four year period.

The report of the Resolutions committee was read. (Printed in the 1eports as adopted.)

By request the District Treasurer read a detailed Home Missionary report.

A motion carried to delegate the recommendation of Evangelists and Singers, which are to appear in the Advocate, to the District Council upon recommendation of the local church board.

A motion carried that the District Statistician complete his report and file with the Secretary.

A motion prevailed that all unfinished business be referred to the District Council.

On motion the Conference gave a rising vote of thinks to Rev P. W. Thomas for his fine spirit and efficient chairmanship in the conference. Bro. Thomas responded by giving a word of appreciation and encouragement.

A motion carried to have a March offering for the District Superintendent.

The Conference adjourned by singing the "Doxology" and prayer by Bro. L. A. Williams.

#### REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE

#### AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

- 1. Inasmuch as the General Board has ruled that all our District Camps shall provide for Sunday School to be conducted on the Camp Grounds each Sunday of the Camp, Therefore be it resolved, that there shall be a Sunday School service conducted on this Camp Ground each Sunday at the Camp. The Sunday School Committee to be in charge of the same, and that suitable cards of recignition be given to all that attended, denoting their presence at the Camp Sunday School. These cards to be returned to the local Sunday School, thus encouraging a perfect attendance, and that local averages be figured and any awards be given on recognition of the same.
- 2. Be is resolved, that all local ministers shall meet with the Educational Board and all licensed ministers shall meet with the Educational and Examining Boards not later than the last Saturday of the camp meeting
- 3. Be it resolved, that all pastors and evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the Camp and Conference, and that if any minister does not attend Camp and Conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for the absence If he fails to do so for two consecutive years, he shall be dealt with by the Council.
- 4 Be it resolved, that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers' duties are adopted.
- 5. Be is resolved, that the Conference Year begin July 1st, and end on June 30th of each year, and that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician by July 10th.
- 6. Resolved, that all of our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference Minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.
- 7. Be it resolved, that each pastor shall endeavor to bring the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription list up to a number equal to or greater than the membership of the church.
- 8. Resolved, that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.
- 9. Inasmuch as books of the course of study have been furnished by the District to the examiners, be it resolved, that the examiners be responsible for the same
- 10. Be is resolved, that a Ministerial Convention be held beginning the first Tuesday of April. The Council to fix the place on invitation from the churches.
- 11. Be it resolved, that because of the present trend of this immodest age, our ministers and the laity be admonished to carry out the special rules of our Manual page 49, section 65.
- 12 Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time.
- 13. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.
- 14. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent be consulted and present when drawing up all the deeds in the District.
- 15. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent appoint a zone-chairman in each zone and that the superintendent and zone-chairman be authorized to arrange for zone meetings and formulate a program for the same as they

deem advisable. That a zone secretary and treasurer be elected at the first meeting.

- Whereas it is helpful to a better understanding among our people who contribute to the support of our work and; Whereas the District handles this money only as a public trust; Be it resolved, that the District Treasurer give an itemized statement of disbursements in his annual report of District, Camp, and District Home Missionary funds, the same to be placed in the Conference minutes.
- 17. Be it resolved, that our District Secretary be instructed to send a letter to our Governor commending his action in banning the sale and use of intoxicants on the State Fair Grounds during the 1954 State Fair.

#### CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Be it resolved, that all preachers either come, send one, or pay the equivalent of \$2.00 per day labor for the preparation of the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.
- 2. Be it resolved, that this Conference elect a Camp Secretary and a Camp Treasurer and the District Superintendent shall appoint five additional men. These seven men shall be known as a Camp Meeting Committee, and their names shall be placed in our official directory as such. It shall be the duty of this committee to supervise and be responsible for the work of the Camp grounds, both preparatory to Camp and during Camp Meeting. They shall work under the authority of the District Council.
- 3. Be it resolved, that the District Council appoint someone to be deputized to patrol the camp ground during the meeting and to be hereafter enforced.
- 4. In the face of the present need, be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the camp meeting to the churches and that each church be responsible for six desert dishes, six heavy glasses, six heavy cups, six dish towels, one blanket, one straw tick, also fruit, jelly and vegetables
- 5. Be it resolved, that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7:00 p. m., without special permission from the proper Camp authorities or accompanied by their parents. They shall be required to attend Young People's and night services. Failure to keep this rule may forfeit their privilege of remaining in Camp There shall be a Dean of Men and a Matron of Women, appointed by the Camp Committee, who shall be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.
- 6. Be it resolved, that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.
- 7. Inasmuch as so many children are on our grounds throughout the camp meeting, therefore, be is resolved that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.
- 8. Be it resolved, that the District Camp Meeting Committee be responsible for the placing of four way-side tables on the camp ground.
- 9. Be it resolved, that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding
- 10. Be it resolved, that all dormitory reservations be declared non-transferable; but that the present reservations be recognized as long as the present holders of said accommodations desire to hold them. Those having reservations and those desiring reservations shall write the secretary of the Camp Meeting Committee within 30 days and not later than 7 days prior to the coming camp meeting.

- 11. Be it resolved, that our Camp Meeting begin the first Friday in August of each year.
- 12. Be it resolved, that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall. Be it further resolved that the Camp Meeting Committee be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.
- 13. We recommend that the Camp Meeting Committee have a Registration and information sign made for the Office and that all campers, upon arrival, be requested to register their names and addresses and arrange for meals and lodging.
- 14. We recommend that each church be requested to furnish a bed and springs for the camp.
- 15. Be it resolved, that we urge each church that is able to do so build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor or pastor and delegate. Be it further resolved that a lot shall be furnished free to each church completing said building prior to our next annual camp The type and location of said cottage t) be agreed upon by the church and the District Council.
- 16. Be it resolved, that our District Council shall have our District Treasurer bonded immediately following this camp, provided the cost is not prohibitive.

## REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

- 1. We recommend, that in accordance with the new manual, each church in the District shall raise an amount equal to \$6 per member per year for General Budget, to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer. (This amount is pro-rated by the General Treasurer as follows: Foreign Missions 35% or \$2 10, General Administration 25% or \$1.50, Church Extention 20% or \$1.20, Senior College 10% or 60 cents, Church Extention Loan Fund 6% or 36 cents, and Sunday School and Youth 4% or 24 cents. This need not be thus divided by the local treasurers.)
- 2. We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shail decide upon a minimum financial support they will pay their pastor during the year.
- 3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church, Sunday School, and Youth People's offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents and evangelists, and that the District Budget be pro-rated as follows: District Expense Fund, 80%; District Home Missions, 15%; General Conference Expense, 3%; and Frankfort Bible College 2%.
- 4 We recommend that all pastors, District evangelists and other licensed and ordained ministers of the District, and approved Conference singers, tithe their income into the local church of which they are a member.
- 5. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,000.00 per year and 5c per mile traveling expense and not to exceed \$900.00 per year.
- 6. We recommend that the District Superintendent tithe 50% of his salary into the District Treasury to be credited to the District Expense Fund; 25% to the local church of which he is a member; and 25% as he sees fit throughout the District.

- 7. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as camp meeting treasurer and be paid the sum of \$60.00 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer shall act as District Statistician and be paid the sum of \$175 per year.
- 8. We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Treasury the sum of \$1000 for each delegate attending the Camp and Conference and this is to include board and room.
- 9 We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating devices that provisions be made for the same by the local church.
- 10. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks vacation with salary, which shall include two Sundays.
  - 11. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone.
- 12. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent be paid the sum of \$10.00 per day, plus 5c per mile traveling expenses while rendering services for the District or Camp Meeting.
- 13. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50 and third floor, \$1.50 per cot.
- 14. We recommend that each local and licensed minister taking his or her examination shall pay the examiner the amount of \$1 00 for each examination taken.
- 15. We recommend that District Letter Heads be printed the amount to be decided by the District Secretary.
- 16. We recommend that the District Council appoint a committee of three with the District Superintendent as Chairman, the same to be known as the District Home Missionary Committee. They shall have charge of all the District Home Missionary work under the direction of the District Council. We further recommend that the expenses of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary work.
- 17. We recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2 per year per member to meet the indebtedness of the District parsonage.
- 18. Whereas there is a difinite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School program; We recommend that each Sunday School in the District be asked to send the Sunday School Promotional Secretary the amount of \$3 (three dollars) for this work, immediately following the District Conference.
- 19. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid a salary of \$30.00 per year. The salary shall be raised from the Sunday School Conventions.
- 20. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay utilities at the District parsonage, consisting of lights, gas, fuel, water, and telephone.

#### REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the chairman, Rev. P. W. Thomas, ministers and lay delegates of this 32nd. annual conference of the Illinois district, now in session, greetings in the dear name of our Loard Jesus Christ. Truly these are pressing days, but praise God they are good days. We have enjoyed working with the brethern this year. We put forth every effore to see the district go forward we could. First, we urged the members of the district to be more spiritual, second to contend for an old fashion revival in their church, and third to reach out unto open fields to help others to hear the Gospel. We are praising God for past,

and present blessings and expect greater ones in the future. We truly thank our God for His many blessings to us.

#### Home Missions

The district council asked that I should with the assistance of the Roller quartet cover the district in interest of district Home Mission. About \$2200.00 was pledged in this canvas. The Illinois District is a fertile field for us. Many doors are open. The need is great, but the workers are few.

We have assisted some of the smaller churches from this fund. Canton: A crowd of folk here interested in a Pilgrim Holiness Church visited the Galesburg P. H. C. for some time. Later they had a revival meeting and I was asked to come and organize. This work was supported by the folk there.

MT. VERNON—Some months ago Rev. D. E. Winemiller moved to the city of Mt. Vernon He felt the need of a Pilgrim Holiness Church there. They started a cettage prayer meeting. Some were sancitfied in these services. They had a revival, Rev. Sherman Deisher was the evangelist. Several were helped in this meeting. Bro. Winemiller purchased a house. It has a large room where 50 chairs or more can be placed and they are having their services in it They soon expect another revival, looking forward to soon organizing a Pilgrim Holiness church there.

LAKE BLOOMINGTON AND HOLDER—There were two projects promoted under the direction of the Pilgrim Holiness church at Bloomington. Local preachers were used here. These were only feeders to the Bloomington church. We feel meetings like these are very profitable.

GIBSON CITY—Here we have rented a building for worship It has been re-decorated inside and a lot of other work done. Rev. H. B. Carter and Rev. Glen Dyer being responsible for this work. A revival was held prior to this camp meeting. A good prospect for a Pilgrim Holiness church.

#### New Churches

CHICAGO—A band of people here felt the need of organizing a church We was asked to come and organize. They have rented a building for warship and also a place for the pastor to live. Under the direction of their pastor Rev. Morris Berry, they are planning on building a church in near future. We are praying that God will give us a real old fashioned Holiness church here.

TUSCOLA—A band of people here has been having regular services for some time. They felt the need of a Pilgrim Holiness church. They rented a house where they are having services at this time. Just prior to this camp I went up and organized a Pilgrim Heliness church. Under the leadership of Rev. Robert Ethridge we are expecting this work to grow.

CANTON—Here too was a band of folk that desired an old fashion Holiness church. In above remarks about the work we stated the desire for us to come and organize. Some few weeks ago I went and organized. We are expecting this work to grow and Holy Ghost fire to spread

#### Property Improvements

Many of our churches have made needed improvements this year.

ARGO—This church has installed fiber glass awnings on their parsonage, pought two lots that were needed badly, re-decorated the inside of the church, and bought 100 folding chairs. The estimated cost was \$3550.00.

CENTRALIA—The folk here have re-decorated their church inside and painted the outside. The estimated cost \$75.00.

COFFEYVILLE—The church has installed new gas furnace in the church.

LAWRENCEVILLE—On Feb. 3 this year the Lawrenceville church was badly damaged by fire. This required nearly a complete rebuilding inside. New furnace, rewiring, re-decorating of the inside, and they have purchased new pews. The estimate cost was \$8000.00.

MARSHALL—The folk here has re-decorated their parsonage which was badly needed.

MARTINSVILLE—The folk here have re-decorated the inside of the church and refinished the pews.

ONARGO—They have painted the outside of the church which was badly needed.

PALESTINE—The folk here have added fourteen feet across the East side of the church, to take care of the increasing attendance. This changed the arrangement of the inside. The pulpit was placed in the center on east side with accordion doors used to make Sunday School rooms on either side. The entire auditorium has been redecorated, hardwood floors laid, Sunday School rooms in basement to care for crowded classes. A special day for dedication is planned in near future. The estimated cost was \$5000 00.

PLEASANT HILL—These folk have re-decorated their church building inside.

ST. MARIE—These folk have changed the appearance of the church auditorium, by lowering the ceiling and re-decorating inside. The estimated cost being \$450.00.

BRIDGEPORT—These folk are lo king forward to building a new church to care for the increased attendance Funds are being raised for this purpose.

WOODRIVER—A fine basement church has been completed at Woodriver. The estimated iost being \$6600.00.

ZION—The folk here have rented a building on the ground floor in which to have their services.

OBLONG—The folk here have finished three rooms in the basement of their church to care for the crowded Sunday School classes.

JOILET—The church here has been re-decorated inside and new flourescent lights installed.

GALESBURG—The parsonage has been re-decorated inside.

OTTAWA—The interior has been re-decorated, parsonage papered, double sink, gas furnace, hot water heater installed. A new piano bought, roof repaired and the building insulated

CAMP GROUND—A new addition has been made to the stand, this being used for book stand and registration office. A walkin cooler also has been built for the use of the camp. Much of the electric wire on the ground has been changed to meet the need of camp. A new power mower also has been purchased for the camp ground. We are very grateful to our caretaker Bro Frank Hash for the condition of the camp ground. We are also grateful for those helping to make these improvements.

#### Personal Report

I have preached 183 times, visited all of the churches. Visits made to some of the churches several times or when needed. I have traveled 29,348 miles in interest of district I have conducted 14 district council meetings, conducted all of the annual business meetings; attended several zone rallies, one District Supt. meeting at Indianapolis, Ind., two zone bible school meetings; one Sunday school board meeting at Indianapolis, Ind; conducted two revivals, six week or weekend meetings all of these being held on district. Organized three new churches, dedicated one church; held three funerals. Had general over sight of the preceding camp meeting. Received my salary and traveling expenses.
