JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Thirty-third Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 15, 1955 at 8:00 a.m.

The Conference opened with Eugene Gray leading the congregation in singing, "A Shelter in the Time of Storm." Rev. L. A. Williams offered the opening prayer of the Conference.

Rev. W. E. Hall, District Superintendent, after a few opening remarks, introduced Rev. Melvin Snyder, First Assistant General Superintendent, as chairman of the Conference. Rev. Snyder, after greeting the Conference, brought a challenging message on the subject, "Going Forward."

The Secretary called the roll with 78 answering present.

A motion carried to have the first 10 seats in the two center sections and the platform constitute the Conference Bar. The bar was cleared.

Bro. Beard asked for a point of personal privilege, that he be anointed and prayer for healing be offered. This request was granted and prayer was also offered for Sister Honeycutt.

The Reception Committee introduced the following ministers to the Conference: Rev. M. E. Groves, Rev. Arman Calvert, and Rev. F. N. Roney. By request they each in turn gave a testimony.

A motion carried to grant them an honorary seat within the Conference

A motion prevailed to have the time of meeting to be from 8:00 a.m. to 12 a.m., and the afternoon sitting to be from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall, read his annual report. A motion carried to accept.

The Assistant Superintendent, Rev. L. A. Williams gave an oral report. Sister Honeycutt read the report of the Auditing Committee. A motion carried to accept.

The District Treasurer's report was read. A motion carried to accept. A motion carried that only the totals of the Home Missionary report be placed in the minutes.

A motion carried that only the totals of the amounts received by the indivual Home Missionary Churches be placed in future reports.

The District Youth Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

Bro. Ford read the Camp Meeting Treasurer's report from July 1 to October 1, 1954. Motion carried to accept.

Bro. Cunningham read the Camp Meeting Treasurer's report from October 1, 1954 to July 1, 1955. A motion prevailed to accept.

The District Superintendent presented Rev. Paul Meeks, the pastor of the Woodriver church, and the delegate to the Conference. A motion carried to receive this church into the Conference.

The report of the joint meeting of the Examining and Educational Boards was read and accepted.

The Statistician's report was read and accepted.

By motion the first sitting adjourned with prayer by Bro. Hall.

Second Sitting

The second sitting opened by the Conference singing the song, "My Burdens Rolled Away", led by Bro. Keith Sheridan. Prayer by Bro. Chester Parker.

A motion prevailed to dispense with the roll call.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous sitting. A motion carried to approve.

Bro. Vard Marshall was introduced to the Conference as one of the new Ministers received into the Conference. He gave a word of testimony.

A partial report of the Resolutions Committee was read. (Printed in the reports as adopted.)

By request Rev. Samuel Holder sang, "I Shall Be Like Him." Bro. Oden sang, "The Love of God."

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read. (Printed in the reports as adopted.)

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary-Treasurer read his report. A motion carried to accept.

The report of the Memorial Committee was read and adopted.

The Conference stood for a moment of silence in memory and respect to our former General Superintendent, who has recently passed on to his Eternal reward. The Chairman, Rev. Melvin Snyder, offered prayer giving thanks to God for the spiritual influence of the life of Bro. Sturk, and his faithful service to the Church; and that God's special blessing be upon our present leader, Rev. William Neff.

The final report of the Ways & Means Committee was read and accepted.

A motion carried to amend the former action on the Ways and Means Committee report, thus reducing the mileage of the District Council, Home Missionary Committee and Camp Meeting Committee, from 5 cents to 4 cents per mile.

The final report of the Resolutions Committee was read. (Printed in the

reports as adopted.)

A motion prevailed to have the election of officers be the order of the day.

The District Superintendent appointed the following as tellers: Lewis Russel, Kermeth Cobble, L. W. Hulen, D. R. Close, C. L. Oden, and Paul Meeks.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. L. A. Williams was re-elected.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary, D. M. Horn was re-elected. Ballots were cast for District Treasurer, W. C. Beard was re-elected. Ballots were cast for the Advisory members of the District Council.

A motion prevailed that the tellers count the ballots while the Conference proceeds with business. The report of the tellers showed the following Advisory members elected: L. S. Lancaster, Sylvan Calloway and D. R. Close.

Bro. Catey was elected to succeed himself on the Educational Board for a period of three years.

Bro. Calloway was elected to succeed himself on the Examining Board for a period of three years.

A motion carried that the nominees of the Council for District Trustees be declared elected by acclamation. Sylvan Calloway, W. E. Catey, and L. S. Lancaster were elected.

Ballots were cast for District Home Missionary Committee. A motion carried to proceed with business while the tellers count the ballots. The report of the tellers showed the following members were elcted: A. O. Cassady, James Cunningham, and C. L. Oden.

The Conference sitting adjourned.

Third Sitting

A Supplemental report of the Educational and Examining Boards was read and accepted.

A motion carried to adopt the resolution as drawn up by the attorney granting the District the privilege to borrow pension money.

Ballots were cast for Camp Meeting Treasurer. L. F. Ford was elected. A motion carried to give nominations from the floor for Camp Meeting Secretary. The following nominations were made: C. L. Oden, D. R. Close,

and Morris Berry. Ballots were cast and Bro. Morris Berry was elected.

A motion carried that the Camp pledge money be sent first to the District Treasurer and he in turn send it to the Camp Treasurer.

The Conference approved the appointment by the District Superintendent of the various committees. (Refer to the Official Directory.)

A motion carried that the District Council take care of all unfinished business.

A motion carried that the Council approve the reading of the last two sittings.

After a brief talk by the chairman on the budgets, a motion carried to give him a rising vote of thanks for the efficient manner in which he conducted the Conference.

A motion carried to adjourn. The Doxology was sung in dismissal.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

- 1. Inasmuch as the General Board has ruled that all our District Camps shall provide for Sunday School to be conducted on the Camp Grounds each Sunday of the Camp, Therefore be it resolved, that there shall be a Sunday School service conducted on this Camp Ground each Sunday at the Camp. The Sunday School Committee to be in charge of the same, and that suitable cards of recognition be given to all that attended, denoting their presence at the Camp Sunday School. These cards to be returned to the local Sunday School, thus encouraging a perfect attendance, and that local averages be figured and any awards be given an recognition of the same.
- 2. Be it resolved, that all local ministers shall meet with the Educational Board and all licensed ministers shall meet with the Educational and Examining Boards not later than the last Saturday of the camp meeting.
- 3. Be is resolved, that all pastors and evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the Camp and Conference, and that if any minister does not attend Camp and Conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for the absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years, he shall be dealt with by the Council.
- 4. Be it resolved, that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers' duties are adopted.
- 5. Be it resolved, that the Conference Year begin July 1st, and end on June 30th of each year, and that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician by July 10th.
- 6. Resolved, that all of our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference Minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.
- 7. Be it resolved, that each pastor shall endeavor to bring the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription list up to a number equal to or greater than the membership of the church.
- 8. Resolved, that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.
- 9. Inasmuch as books of the course of study have been furnished by the District to the examiners, be it resolved, that the examiners be responsible for the same.
- 10. Whereas the present date of the Ministerial Convention often interferes with the Easter program of many churches, and inasmuch as it is becoming an added burden to entertain the Convention in our churches, therefore be it resolved, that the Ministerial Convention be held on the Camp Grounds, beginning on Tuesday after the second Sunday of May.
- 11. Be is resolved, that because of the present trend of this immodest age, our ministers and the laity be admonished to carry out the special rules of our Manual page 35, section 65.
- 13. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time.
- 13. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.
- 14. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent be consulted and present when drawing up all the deeds in the District.
 - 15. Be it resolved, that the District be zoned as follows:

Northern Zone-Argo, Chicago, Joliet, Ottawa, Streator, and Zion.

North Central Zone—Bloomington, Canton, Decatur, Galesburg, Gibson City, Jerseyville, Onarga, Pleasant Hill, Springfield, Tuscola, Woodriver.

South Central Zone—Asbury, Casey, Charleston, Coffeyville, Janesville, Marshall, and Martinsville.

Southern Zone—Bridgeport, Centralia, Lawrenceville, Mt. Vernon, Oblong, Olney, Palestine, Robinson, and St. Marie.

Be it further resolved, that these boundaries apply to the Ministerial, Youth, and Sunday School Departments.

Be it further resolved, that the District Superintendent appoint Ministerial and Sunday School Zone Chairmen and that the Zone Chairmen and the District Superintendent be authorized to arrange Zone meetings as they deem advisable, and that a Zone Secretary and Treasurer be elected at

the first meeting of the year.

Whereas it is helpful to a better understanding among our people who contribute to the support of our work and: Whereas the District handles this money as a public trust; Be is resolved, that the District Treasurer give a statement in totals of disbursements in his annual report of District and District Home Missionary funds, the same to be placed in the Conference minutes.

CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be is resolved, that all preachers either come, send one, or pay the equivalent of \$2.00 per day labor for the preparation of the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

2. Be is resolved, that this Conference elect a Camp Secretary and a Camp Treasurer and the District Superintendent shall appoint five additional men. These seven men shall be known as a Camp Meeting Committee, and their names shall be placed in our official directory as such. It shall be the duty of this committee to supervise and be responsible for the work of the Camp grounds, both preparatory to Camp and during Camp Meeting. They shall work under the authority of the District Council.

3. Be it resolved, that the District Council appoint someone to be deputized to patrol the camp ground during the meeting and to be hereafter en-

forced.

- 4. In the face of the present need, be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the camp meeting to the churches and that each church be responsible for six desert dishes, six heavy glasses, six heavy cups, six dish towels, one blanket, one straw tick, also fruit, jelly and vegetables.
- 5. Be it resolved, that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7:00 p. m., without special permission from the proper Camp authorities or accompanied by their parents. They shall be required to attend Young People's and night services. Failure to keep this rule may forfeit their privilege of remaining in Camp. There shall be a Dean of Men and a Matron of Women, appointed by the Camp Committee, who shall be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.
- 6. Be is resolved, that receptables for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.
- 7. Inasmuch as so many children are on our grounds throughout the camp meeting, therefore, be it resolved that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.
- 8. Be it resolved, that the District Camp Meeting Committee be respon-

sible for the placing of four way-side tables on the camp ground.

9. Be it resolved, that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.

10. Be it resolved, that all dormitory reservations be declared non-transferable; but that the present reservations be recognized as long as the present holders of said accommodations desire to hold them. Those having reservations and those desiring reservations shall write the secretary of the Camp Meeting Committee within 30 days and not later than 7 days prior to the coming camp meeting.

11. Be it resolved, that our Camp Meeting begin the first Friday in

August of each year.

12. Be it resolved, that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall. Be it further resolved that the Camp Meeting Committee be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

13. We recommend that the Camp Meeting Committee have a Registration and information sign made for the Office and that all campers, upon arrival, be requested to register their names and addresses and arrange for meals and lodging.

- 14. We recommend that each church be requested to furnish a bed and springs for the camp.
- 15. Be it resolved, that we urge each church that is able to do so build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor, or pastor and delegate. Be it further resolved that a lot shall be furnished free to each church completing said building prior to our next annual camp. The type and location of said cottage to be agreed upon by the church and the District Council.
- 16. Be it resolved, that our District Council shall have our District Treasurer bonded immediately following this camp, provided the cost is not prohibitive.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

- 1. We recommend, that in accordance with the new manual, each church in the District shall raise an amount equal to \$6 per member per year for General Budget, to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer. (This amount is pro-rated by the General Treasurer as follows: Foreign Missions 35% or \$2.10, General Administration 25% or \$1.50, Church Extension 20% or \$1.20, Senior College 10% or 60 cents, Church Extension Loan Fund 6% or 36 cents, and Sunday School and Youth 4% or 24 cents. This need not be thus divided by the local treasurers.)
- 2. We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shall decide upon a minimum financial support they will pay their pastor during the year.
- 3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church, Sunday School, and Youth People's offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents and evangelists, and that the District Budget be pro-rated as follows: District Expense Fund, 80%; District Home Missions, 15%; General Conference Expense, 3%; and Frankfort Bible College 2%.
- 4. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,300.00 per year and 5c per mile traveling expense.
- 5. We recommend that the District Council members, the Home Missionary Committee, and the Camp Meeting Committee be paid the sum of 4c per mile for traveling expense while rending service for the District.
- 6. We recommend that the District Superintendent give 50% of his tithe into the District Treasury to be credited to the District Expense Fund; 25% to the local church of which he is a member; and 25% as he sees fit throughout the District.
- 7. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as District Statistician, and be paid the sum of \$75.00 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer be paid the sum of \$175.00 per year.
- 8. We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Treasury the sum of \$10.00 for each delegate attending the Camp and Conference and this is to include board and room.
- 9. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating devices that provisions be made for the same by the local church.
- 10. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks vacation with salary, which shall include two Sundays.
- 11. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone.
- 12. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent, in the absence of the District Superintendent, be paid the sum of \$10.00 per day, plus 5c per mile traveling expenses while rendering services for the District or Camp Meeting.
- 13. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50 and third floor, \$1.50 per cot.
- 14. We recommend that each local and licensed minister taking his or her examination shall pay the examiner the amount of \$1.00 for each examination taken.
- 15. We recommend that District Letter Heads be printed the amount to be decided by the District Secretary.

16. We recommend that the District Conference elect a District Home Missionary Committee of three, and the District Superintendent act as chairman. We further recommend that the expense of this Committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary Work.

17. We recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2 per year per member to meet the indebtedness of the

District parsonage.

18. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School program; We recommend that each Sunday School in the District be asked to send the Sunday School Promotional Secretary the amount of \$3 (three dollars) for this work, immediately following the District Conference.

19. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid a salary of \$30.00 per year. The salary shall be raised from the

Sunday School Conventions.

20. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay utilities at the District Treasurer pay utilities

trict parsonage, consisting of lights, gas, fuel, water, and telephone.
21. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay all the postage expense of the District Superintendent.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the chairman, Rev. M. H. Snider, Ministers and lay delegates of the 33rd annual conference of the Illinois district of the Pilgrim Holiness church, greetings.

Surely God has been good to us this past year. He has brought us through many battles this year. We are made to say truly the God of Elijah still lives today. He lives to lead us in the path that we should go. We have served the Pilgrims this year to the best of our ability. It has been a pleasure to be workers together in the Kingdom of God. Let us go forth to labor together in love and peace for the Glory of God and the upbuilding of the Kingdom of God.

Home Missions

We feel that Illinois is a great open field for district Home Missions. CANTON: The Home Missionary Department is helping on the rent of the building being used for worship. This work is progressing slowly, but we feel there is a good prospect for a good work here.

MT. VERNON: The folk here are still working for an old fashion Holiness church. Revivals have been held for which we feel is helping to do this. They are expecting to have another meeting soon and organize.

GIBSON CITY: Some few months ago we decided to purchase some property here to be used for Worship. They are having a spirit of revival in the church. It is prayer that has brought this about. Rev. and Mrs. Carl R. Smith have a burden for the people and are doing every thing they can do to see a good Holiness church established here. We feel that God wants to give us a good Pilgrim Holiness church here.

New Churches:

Some few months ago the folk at Woodriver felt it was time to organize. I went there and organized a Pilgrim Holiness church. We feel there is good opportunities for the Holiness church here. It is a great field. Rev. and Mrs. Paul Meeks are the pastors.

Property Improvements:

ARGO: The folk here have finished up the upstairs of the parsonage, redecorated it inside, put sidewalks along church, and some needed repairs on the church at the cost of \$1243.57.

BLOOMINGTON: The parsonage and church has been redecorated inside and out.

BRIDGEPORT: They covered the parsonage with insulated shingles, put new cabinets in the kitchen of parsonage, and redecorated the church inside, also new rugs for the aisles, at a cost of \$1132.13.

CHICAGO: The folk here have purchased a lot at 6939 W. Montrose. A new parsonage with full basement has been erected at cost of \$14,928.00. The basement of the parsonage is being used for Worship. They are expecting to erect a building for worship in near future.

DECATUR: The church has been equipped with some good used pews, the tower repaired, curtains and screens have been purchased to be used to separate the Sunday school classes, also the parsonage has been completely redecorated inside.

GALESBURG: The church here has installed an oil furnace in the church, put a stoker in parsonage, repaired cabinets in parsonage, and put a new front on the church.

JOLIET: The folk here have painted the church outside, made a much needed parking lot on rear of lot back of church, installed a Neon electric sign on the front of the church, made a new retaining wall in front of church yard and put crushed rock in front drive, also redecorated parsonage inside, with new window shades.

MARSHALL: The woodwork on the outside of parsonage has been painted, and a new hot water heater has been installed.

MARTINSVILLE: The folk here have built a new five room parsonage at a cost of \$3500.00.

OBLONG: Much needed improvements have been made inside of the parsonage. The stairway straightened, large clothes closets built in the master bed room, new double sink, full size cabinets and two standardized windows in the kitchen, also a new gas furnace has been installed in the church. The cost about \$2000.00.

SPRINGFIELD: A new ceiling in the church, redecorated church inside, improvements made in Sunday school rooms, a nursery made in the back of the church also the woodwork out side of parsonage painted.

OLNEY: The church has been redecorated inside, insulated and painted outside, also the yard filled with dirt. They plan to build a new parsonage in the near future.

STREATOR: The last payment was paid on the church, and on June 19th the church was dedicated and the mortgage was burned.

CAMP GROUND: Some improvements have been made this year on the camp ground. We purchased a six horse garden tractor with cycle and reel to be used in mowing the grass. A new building was erected on the ground, the cost of these about \$800.00.

Personal Report

I have preached 121 times, conducted nine district council meetings, attended two general board meetings, five zone school board meetings (Frankfort, Ind.), conducted three revivals, two week-end meetings, one week meeting, one district leader's meeting (Indianapolis, Ind.), conducted four ministerial zone meetings conducted one ministerial convention, had two dedication services, organized one new church, attended several Youth Zone rallies, held one District Youth business meeting, had one funeral, baptized six, several communion services, 51 seeking regeneration, 30 seeking sancification, I have traveled 29,255 miles in district interests, I have received my salary, traveling expenses and some gifts and donations. I have conducted all of the annual business meetings.
