

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#### **First Sitting**

The Thirty-seventh Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 17, 1959 at 8:15 A. M.

The Conference was opened by the District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall, with Rev. C. L. Oden leading the Conference in singing, "Victory Ahead.'' Rev. Thomas Manuel offered the opening prayer of the Conference.

Rev. W. E. Hall, District Superintendent, after a few opening remarks introduced Rev. R. G. Flexon, General Superintendent, as chairman of the Conference.

Rev. R. G. Flexon, after greeting the Conference asked how many pastors during the past year have received a copy of "The Pilgrim Pastor?" Brother Flexon stated that all the promotional writing that has been printed in the Advocate will eventually be taken out and be printed been printed in the Advocate will eventually be taken out and be printed in the Bi-monthly "Pilgrim Pastor." Brother Flexon said, we have heard some of Personal Evangelism and of its great importance in the great task of Soul-winning. He told of a Brother Leonard Whipple and Brother William Marino of Battle Creek, Michigan who have teamed up together with a burden on their hearts to present this urgent need of Personal Evangelism to the people of our Church. They will support themselves and plan to cover the entire Church.

Brother Flexon stated that the Three General Superintendents have agreed to travel together and spend two or three days in each District this Fall or Winter.

Brother Flexon read I Corinthians 9:16-27, and spoke on "A Planned Ministry."

The Conference recessed to the call of the Chair so the Council could meet to approve the Roll.

#### Second Sitting

The second sitting of the Conference convened at 12:30 P. M. Rev-Jerrel Adams led the congregation in singing "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus", after which Rev. Edward Tuttle led in prayer. The Secretary called the roll with 71 present. The combined report of the Educational and Examining Boards was

read. A motion carried to receive the report.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall read his annual report. A motion carried we accept this report with a rising vote.

The District Superintendent, W. E. Hall, read his recommendations to the Conference.

The Reception Committee presented to the Conference: Clinton H. Peek, Paul Lee Scheuermeier, Ronald Terry, B. H. McBride, Henry H. Vaught, Murel Baldwin, H. H. Barton, Dr. Robert Heckart and Rev. Howard Williams. A motion carried that those who are not already members of the

Conference that they be given Honorary seats within the Conference Bar. The Assistant District Superintendent gave an oral report. A motion

carried that we accept this report.

The Auditors' report was read. A motion carried to accept the report. The District Treasurer, Rev. C. L. Oden, read the report of the late Rev. W. C. Beard's treasurers report covering July 11 through Decemberr

10, 1958, also his own report for the remainder of the year was read. A motion carried to accept.

A motion carried that the recommendation of the District Council of August 8, 1959 that, "We grant all the churches in the District a seat in the Conference."

The Camp Treasurer's report was read. A motion carried that we accept with appreciation.

The Statistical report was read and accepted with a rising vote of appreciation.

The Reception Committee presented Sister R. G. Flexon to the Conference. Sister Flexon gave her testimony. A motion carried that Sister Flexon be granted an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

The report of the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary was read. A motion carried to accept this report.

A partial report of the Ways and Means Committee was read.

A partial report of the Resolution Committee was read.

A motion carried referring No. 11 of the Camp Meeting Resolutions back to the Committee for re-drafting.

A motion carried that No. 2 of the Standing Resolutions be tabled. A motion carried that No. 4 of the New Resolutions be referred to the Committee for re-drafting.

A motion carried that No. 11 of the Standing Resolutions be referred to the Committee.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall, read a Resolution from the District Council. It lost.

A motion carried to adopt No. 11 of the Camp Meeting Resolutions amended. (All resolutions are printed in the reports as adopted.) A motion carried that No. 1 of the New Resolutions be tabled with as amended.

The Conference recessed to reconvene at the call of the Chair.

The Conference reconvened at the call of the Chair and proceded with the elections as follows:

Educational Board-W. H. Pratt, 3 years; C. L. Oden, 2 years; F. A. Wagner, 1 year.

Board of Trustees-L. S. Lancaster, C. L. Oden, S. J. Callaway. Camp Treasurer-C. L. Oden.

A motion carried to ratify the District Superintendent's appointment of the Ways and Means, Resolutions, Auditing, Memorial and Reception Committees.

The Memorial Committee read their report. The Conference approved their report by standing while Brother R. G. Flexon prayed.

The Ways and Means Committee gave a final report.

A motion carried to ratify the recommendation of the District Council of the Eyangelists and Singers. (Printed under Evangelists as ratified.)

District Superintendent, W. E. Hall, brought from the Council the matter of the Second Installment of the Camp Ground Taxes due in September. The District Council would like to know what instruction this Conference might give them as to whether or not they should continue to be paid under protest. No action was taken by the Conference.

A motion carried that the reading of the Conference Minutes and all unfinished business of the Conference be left in the hands of the District Council.

The Candidate for Ordination, Ronald W. Terry, and his wife were then seated at the altar. Brother Eugene Gray led the congregation in singing "Rock Of Ages", after which Brother Hall led in prayer.

The Scripture, I Timothy 3:1-10 was read by Rev. L. A. Williams, followed by the reading of II Timothy 4:1-8 by Rev. C. L. Oden, after which Rev. S. J. Callaway read Titus 3:1-11.

Brother Gray then led the congregation in singing, "A Charge To Keep I Have."

General Superintendent, Rev. R. G. Flexon preached on the subject, "Your Responsibility As A Minister" from the text in I Kings 17.24 "Thou art a man of God."

Brother Flexon then charged the Candidate, after which the Ordination Council proceeded to the altar and laid hands on Ronald W. Terry praying the Holy Ghost to set him apart for the Christian Ministry. Brother Flexon then presented Brother Terry with an Ordination Certificate. The Congregation filed past Brother and Sister Terry at the altar congratu-lating them and wishing them God's blessing as they anticipate their service to God and the Church at Chicago Second Church where they expect to pastor the coming year. Rev. C. L. Oden then led in prayer pronouncing the benediction.

Brother Gray led the congregation in singing, "We're Marching To Zion", and "When We All Get To Heaven."

Following the Ordination Service Eugene Gray, Mrs. L. S. Lancaster, Rev. C. L. Oden (on behalf of Sister Oden who was unable to be present), and Rev. H. B. Carter expressed their desire to be anointed and prayed with for healing. God came in mighty power as each one was prayed for and anointed with oil.

The Conference adjourned.

#### STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Inasmuch as the General Board has ruled that all our District Camps shall provide for Sunday School to be conducted on the Camp Grounds each Sunday of the Camp. Therefore be it resolved, that there shall be a Sunday School service conducted on this Camp Ground each Sunday at the Camp. The Sunday School Committee to be in charge of the same, and that suitable cards of recognition be given to all that attend, denoting their presence at the Camp Sunday School. These cards to be returned to the local Sunday School, thus encouraging a perfect attendance, and that local averages be figured and any awards be given in recognition of the same.

2. Be it resolved, that all pastors and evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the Camp and Conference, and that if any minister does not attend Camp and Conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for the absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be dealt with by the council.

3. Be it resolved that the Conference year begins July 1, and ends on June 30 of each year, and that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician by July 10.

4. Be it resolved that the time of the sittings of the District Conference be from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and the afternoon sitting be from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.

5. Be it resolved, that the first 10 seats in the two center sections and the platform of the tabernacle constitute the Conference Bar.

6. Be it resolved, that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers' duties are adopted.

7. Resolved, that all our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.

8. Be it resolved, that each pastor shall endeavor to bring the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription list up to a number equal to or greater than the membership of the church.

9. Resolved, that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.

10. Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of the standards of our church, therefore:

Be it resolved that: The Illinois District Conference call attention to page 35, section 65 of our Manual which reads, "Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing the immodest forms of dress so current today; such as: sun-suits, shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public places in shorts or without shirts."

11. Inasmuch as television is rapidly becoming a daily habit and an open door for infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever-increasing number of homes in America.

Therefore be it resolved that we as a District go on record as being opposed to the use and or ownership of a television set.

12. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time, and that there be five members on each Ways and Means and Resolutions Committee.

13. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.

14. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent be consulted and present when drawing up all the deeds in the District.

15. Be it resolved, that the District be zoned and the boundaries apply to the Ministerial, Youth, and Sunday School Departments. Be it further resolved, that the District Superintendent appoint Ministerial and Sunday School Zone Chairmen and that the Zone Chairmen and the District Superintendent be authorized to arrange Zone meetings as they deem advisable, and that a Zone Secretary and Treasurer be elected at the first meeting of the year.

16. Whereas it is helpful to a better understanding among our people who contribute to the support of our work and: Whereas the District handles this money as a public trust; Be it resolved, that the District Treasurer give a statement in totals of disbursements in his annual report of District Home Missionary funds, the same to be placed in the Conference Minutes.

17. Be it resolved that this Conference consider the sale of the District parsonage due to its depreciation and that said sale and purchase of another be left in the hands of the District Council.

18. Be is resolved, that all resolutions retained in the minutes from year to year be listed under "Standing rules" and all new resolutions be listed as "Conference rules" for one year, after that, all that are retained be placed under "Standing Rules."

19. Be it resolved that all resolutions referring to the Camp Meeting Committee be changed to read "District Council." 20. Inasmuch as the District has been paying taxes on the Camp grounds each year under protest, therefore we recommend that our District Superintendent explain the requirements necessary to have them taken off the books, then this Conference vote on what steps to take instructing the Council what to do. Also that the Cabin owners get together and file exemptions.

21. Be it resolved that we adopt the action of the 1958 General Conference known as "Toward Tomorrow."

- 1. A gain of 85 in membership which is 10% gain.
  - 2. Strive for at least one new church per year.
  - 3. Annual pastors' Conference in the District.
  - 4. Accentuated (emphasize) Holiness evangelism.
- B. Sunday School and Youth:

- 1. That we set a goal of 2468 (330) gain in average Sunday School attendance by 1961.
- 2. There shall be an established standard of excellence for both Sunday School and Youth Societies.
- 3. That leadership training courses be provided for our Sunday School and Youth Societies.
- 4. There shall be an expansion and development of new fields of service such as Youth Camps, Bible Clubs and special projects.

22. Be it resolved, that the Council be given authority to take the necessary steps to take out Camp Insurance.

23. Be it resolved that this Conference delegate authority to the District Council to make necessary repairs and improvements on the campgrounds.

24. Be it resolved, that necessary steps be taken to connect on to the 4 inch water main east of the Camp grounds.

25. Be it resolved that the Sunday School Board in conjunction with the District Superintendent set up the following goals for each of our Sunday Schools to reach the quadrennial goals as set by the 1958 General Conference:

Argo, 140; Asbury, 45; Bloomington, 75; Bridgeport, 170; Casey, 40; Centralia, 30; Charleston, 155; Chicago, 65; Coffeyville, 60; Decatur First, 135; Decatur Second, 75; Galesburg, 70; Gibson City, 40; Janesville, 50; Jerseyville, 40; Joliet, 155; Lawrenceville, 170; Marshall, 100; Mason, 35; Martinsville, 50; Mt. Vernon, 45; Oblong, 90; Olney, 80; Onarga, 60; Ottawa, 100; Palestine, 125; Pleasant Hill, 70; Robinson, 70; Ste. Marie, 30; Springfield, 60; Streator, 25; Tuscola, 25; Wood River, 75; Zion, 75. Total 2,660.

26. Whereas, the General Conference has set up a United Stewardship Fund to care for a part of the expense of operating the General Church, and Whereas, the Manual states on page 82, paragraph 8 that, Any pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference, and Whereas, this rule must be enforced beginning with our next annual conference, therefore Be it resolved, that we as a conference set the month of September as United Stewardship Fund month. Be it further resolved that an offering be taken in each church in this conference sometime during said month for said fund. This is primarily to aid churches that are struggling to pay their United Stewardship Fund. Churches that have a workable system in operation that is enabling them to meet this obligation to the general church need not feel under obligation to take such an offering.

27. Whereas, most local churches have some money coming in for both foreign missions and general church extension, and Whereas, a certain percent of the United Stewardship Fund goes for these two arms of our church, therefore Be it resolved, that any local church wishing to do so may pay from unspecified foreign missionary funds that part of United Stewardship Fund pertaining to foreign missions which is 20% of said fund. Be it further resolved, that any local church wishing to do so may pay from unspecified general church extension funds that part of the United Stewardship Fund which pertains to general church extension which is 14% of such fund. This may only apply when the other part of the United Stewardship Fund has been made up by said church.

#### CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that our Camp Meeting begin the first Friday in August of each year.

2. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint someone to be deputized to patrol the camp grounds during the meeting and to be hereafter enforced.

3. Be it resolved, that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the Camp to the churches and that each church respond with such needed items as requested.

4. Be it resolved, that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7:00 P.M., without special permission from the proper to attend Young People's and night services. Failure to keep this rule may forfeit their privilege of remaining in Camp. There shall be a Dean of Men and a Matron of Women appointed by the District Council, who shall be responsible for the enforcement of this rule. Be it further resolved, that this resolution be printed and copies given to each one registering.

5. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.

6. Inasmuch as so many children are on our grounds throughout the camp meeting, therefore be it resolved, that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.

7. Be it resolved, that the District Council be responsible for the placing of four way-side tables on the camp grounds.

8. Be it resolved, that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.

9. Be it resolved, that all dormitory reservations be declared nontransferable as long as the present holders occupy them. When the holders of said reservations secure lodging elsewhere the former reservations shall be turned to the District Council. Those having reservations and those desiring reservations shall write to the one in charge of rooms within 60 days and not later than 30 days prior to the coming camp meeting.

10. Be it resolved, that all those working for their meals actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time and thev shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall. Be it further resolved the District Council be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

11. Be it resolved that all ministers and their wives who are physically able be available for work during Camp. Be it further resolved that those who choose not to work shall be charged a stipulated amount set by the District Council.

12. Be it resolved, that the District Council appoint a Young People's leader to conduct special youth services during Camp.

13. Be it resolved, that we urge each church that is able to do so to build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor and delegate. Be it further resolved, that a lot shall be furnished free to each church completing said building prior to our next annual Camp. The type and location of said cottage to be agreed upon by the church and the District Council.

#### **NEW CONFERENCE RULES**

1. Be it resolved that all Licensed Ministers meet with the Examining Board not later than the last Saturday of the Camp Meeting.

2. Be it resolved that the Ministerial Convention convene the first Tuesday evening through Thursday afternoon of April. The place to be chosen from invitations from the Churches.

3. We recommend that we as a Conference petition the General Board

to make no change in Area Supervision at the end of two years. 4. Be it resolved that all members being received into the Local Pilgrim Holiness Church that their attention should be called to Section 155, Article 2, and Section 69 of the 1958 Pilgrim Holiness Church Manual.

5. Be it resolved that this Conference approve of our Churches making application for and borrowing monies from the General Church Pilgrim Pension Loan Fund. This to be in accordance with the Manual. 6. Be it resolved that the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be Incorporated as a District.

7. Be it resolved that provision be made in the Illinois District for a Ministerial Institute whereby those who are taking the Course of Study may have the privilege of receiving help on subjects that are required.

#### REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

#### AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. We recommend, each church in the District shall raise an amount equal to \$8.00 per member per year for the United Stewardship Fund to conform with the action of the 1958 General Conference, to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer. (This amount is pro-rated by the General Treasurer as follows: Foreign Missions 35% or \$2.80; General Administration 25% or \$2.00; Church Extension 20% or \$1.60; Senior College 10% or 80 cents; Church Extension Loan Fund 6% or  $4\xi$  cents and Sunday School and Youth 4% or 32 cents. This need not be thus divided by the local treasurers.)

2. We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shall decide upon a financial support they will pay their pastor during the year.

3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church, Sunday School, and Youth offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents and evangelists, and that the District Budget be pro-rated as follows: District Expense Fund, 80%; District Home Missions, 15%; General Conference Expense, 3% and Frankfort Pilgrim College, 2%.

4. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,600 per year and 7c per mile travling expense.

5. We recommend that the District Council Members, and the Home Missionary Committee, be paid the sum of 7c per mile for traveling expense while rendering service for the District.

6. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as District Statistician, and be paid the sum of \$75.00 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer be paid the sum of \$300.00 per year.

7. We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Terasury the sum of \$10.00 for each delegate attending the Conference and this is to include board and room.

8. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating devices that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

9. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks vacation with salary, which shall include two Sundays.

10. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone.

11. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent, in the absence of the District Superintendent, be paid the sum of \$10.00 per day, plus 7c per mile traveling expenses while rendering services for the District or Camp Meeting.

12. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50; little dormitory rooms, \$3.50; third floor, \$1.50 per cot. We further recommend that the electric rate shall be: All cottages or cabins a minimum of \$1.00 plus 25 cents for each appliance; rooms in dormitories, 25 cents per appliance in addition to the room rent; all trailers a flat rate of \$2.50.

13. We recommend that District Letter Heads be printed the amount to be decided by the District Secretary.

14. We recommend that the District Council appoint a District Home Missionary Committee of three, and the District Superintendent act as chairman. We further recommend that the expense of this Committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary Work.

to the Home Missionary Work. 15. We recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2 per year per member to meet the indebtedness of the District parsonage. 16. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School program; We recommend that each Sunday School in the District be asked to send the Sunday School Promotional Secretary the amount of (\$4 four dollars) for this work, immediately following the District Conference.

17. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid a salary of \$30.00 per year. The salary shall be raised from the Sunday School Conventions.

18. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay utilities at the District parsonage, consisting of lights, gas, fuel, water, and telephone.

19. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay all the postage expense of the District Superintendent.

20. Whereas the Loan Fund has proved to be such a blessing in the General Church Extension Department, and other Districts have likewise been helped in the promotion of Home Missions; we therefore recommend that we set up a District Loan Fund. We also recommend that funds from wills, gifts, legacies, etc., be placed in this fund. We further recommend that the District Council or a committee be appointed to formulate rules and by-laws governing this fund. Rate of interest and churches to which loans are made and all business be delegated to said Council of Committee. (We recommend 3% interest.)

## REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the Chairman, Rev. R. G. Flexon, General superintendent, Ministers, and lay delegates of the 37th Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings! While most of the World is in a state of confusion we have the privilege of worshiping God as we feel that we should. We are praising God that we were born in a land of Bibles and a Freedom of worship. Also, we are very grateful for those that blazed the way before us. We thank God for the Pilgrim Holiness church and what She stands for. The church has meant much to me and I do not in any way wish to tear down Her foundations. We are responsible to God and The church for this generation in which we live and have responsibility. What we do now will largely determine what She will be tomorrow. Some times I feel our vision has been darkened, and that we only have a pity for a lost World other than a real burden. The Spirit of sacrifice is almost unheard of in these days, and I feel God's work goes forward by and through the sacrifice of His people. We have a great field of labor. Let us awaken to our great responsibility and the opportunities that are ours.

#### NEW CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDINGS:

The folk at Mt. Vernon have built a new frame church building there. They have conducted one revival in it. This is a nice building and we are grateful to God and to those who made this possible. As stated in another place in this report a minister of another church did a lot of the oversight and work himself, without charge. To me this is the Spirit we need in these last days.

The folk at Robinson had their new church under construction at the time of our last camp. It is nearly completed at this time. It is a beautiful structure. This church was dedicated by our General Supt. July 12, of this year. This too, meant hours of labor and sacrifice.

The folk at Pleasant Hill have built a beautiful parsonage. This was needed very badly. This parsonage was dedicated this year by the District Supt. I am sure we too are grateful to the folk here for their labor and sacrifice in this.

An unfinished house has been purchased by the folk at Ottawa. This is to be finished and is to be used for parsonage. The finished work will be done by the members and friends of the church. We feel this purchase was of the Lord.

The folk at Janesville church have purchased the property just East of the church for a parsonage. This is nice property and I feel it is a good move on their part. To God we give the praise.

#### HOME MISSIONS:

We have tried to carry out the plan and program that the District Council laid out. The plan was presented for District Home Missions in the Camp meeting prior to last conference. Also a pledge offering was taken for the above plan presented by our General Supt. Rev. R. G. Flexon in a service on the last Sunday afternoon of our Camp meeting. Our plan was to help some of the churches that needed support. These churches were named in the above service. There was around \$6500.00 in pledges taken, about \$4,234.19 has been paid in the Home missions fund this year. This coming from the pledges, District budget and by special appeals made by the District Supt. We thank every one who helped us in any way. Plans for the coming year are to be made by the District Council.

#### **NEW CHURCHES:**

The District some months ago voted to approve the purchasing of another church in Chicago, located in the 6400 block on Foster Ave., to be the Second Pilgrim Holiness Church of Chicago. This work is to be under the supervision of Rev. Wm. H. Pratt, pastor of the First Pilgrim Holiness Church of Chicago. Regular Sunday School and church services are to be started soon. Also the church is to be organized as soon as possible.

Also I have been contacted wanting us to buy church buildings in two other cities. These are in cities where we could start a good church.

I believe that I have more inquiries this year about starting a Pilgrim Holiness church than in any other year that I have been superintendent.

#### **REPORTS FROM THE CHURCHES:**

ASBURY: The folk there are fixing two Sunday school rooms at the entrance of the church. These are badly needed. Also they are installing a new gas furnace to heat the church with. The estimated cost of this is \$500.00.

BLOOMINGTON: The Lord has blessed the folk there with some gains this past year. They have had a 50% gain in Sunday school and 75% gain in their offerings over the past year. They have been able to pay off some of the old debts, paint the parsonage outside, and redecorate inside, also painted the outside of the church.

CHICAGO: 1. The debt on the chapel and parsonage has been paid in full, \$3,667.81.

2. The goals set for gains by the district conference have been reached, both in gains in membership and Sunday school attendance.

3. New church with apartment for pastor has been purchased in a good location for a Second Church.

4. Foreign missionary offerings for the year were \$1300.00.

**COFFEYVILLE:** The church has been newly painted and re-varnished inside. The Sunday school rooms upstairs have been stained and varnished also. One Sunday school room has been started in the church basement, when finished, it will support the church floor which badly needed support. A new bath room has been installed in the **parsonage**, the labor was donated by the members and friends of the church. The parsonage has been trimmed on the outside. A small utility porch has also been built at the parsonage.

DECATUR FIRST: \$300.00 in pledges to finish paying for the City sewer that goes down by the church. Two road signs have been purchased, window screens for the church and window screens and blinds for the parsonage. New wiring and fixtures for additional lights. Estimate cost of \$385.55. They have made some gain both in Sunday school and church attendance in spite of the sickness. They are looking forward to a better year ahead by the Lord's help.

MT. VERNON: The folk there have built a new church. They are finishing the work as they can. A new Stoker-Matic furnace is being installed to heat the church. Most of the above work was donated. Rev. A.R.C. Howard donated the wiring and fixtures and did the work, also Rev. Troyd Carter donated the labor on the front steps to the church. Rev. Shifley, a minister from a sister denomination did the over-seeing and most of the work himself. He worked untiringly on the church, many days by himself, though a member of another church. His work was donated. Also some donated material. We say to those who donated work or material, may God bless you. This was really appreciated.

ONARGA: A new oil furnace has been installed in the church. This made room for another Sunday school room which was badly needed. Also other pews have been purchased. They have been having morning prayer meetings for more than two months in behalf of the lost of the community. God is helping their faith to rise daily helping them to feel a revival is the answer in these last days for the church.

STREATOR: The folk there have put in a new ceiling in the church, a new foundation in the basement and new steps going into the basement. Also a cement floor in the basement. The estimated cost is \$384.13.

JANESVILLE: The people there are happy to report that the past year they have, by the help of the Lord, liquidated all indebtedness. They were blessed at the time of the mortgage burning. Since that time they have purchased a seven room modern parsonage which joins the church property as a parsonage. Needless to say, they went into debt again. With such a few it seemed to be a large obligation to undertake. The old parsonage has been sold and the money put on the new property. Then the subject of renting some land and putting out a crop of beans and corn was suggested. We trusted the Lord for the land and to supply our product for the numbers.

our needs for the purchase. In two weeks after we had decided to purchase the parsonage we did rent 80 acres for the above purpose. With the help of many of the neighbors which donated their tractors and farm equipment, time and gasoline they have one of the nicest crops of beans and corn that has ever been on that farm for years. The cost of the fertilizer and seed was presented to the Sunday school one Sunday morning. The bill was \$150.00, we received in response \$162.00. We were asked to put ammonia Nitrate on the crop which was around \$75.00. Eubanks and Sons of Charleston wished to donate this to the church. As soon as we started to move into the new parsonage we had a buyer for the old one. We are now nearly one-half out of debt and the goal now is to be completely out within two years. We have also installed a rear exit to the basement and auditorium and new doors at the entrance. The estimated cost of the repairs, \$250.00, with all bills paid to date. The folk are very grateful to God and to every one that had a part in any way to make these things possible.

way to make these things possible. **ROBINSON:** The folk there have installed cabinets, and redecorated the kitchen of the parsonage. Also they have put tile on the floor of bathroom, and redecorated, and purchased venetian blinds for four rooms of the parsonage. The total estimated cost was \$255.00.

of the parsonage. The total estimated cost was \$255.00. BRIDGEPORT: The church has installed heating element in the church, estimated cost being \$1050.00. This has been paid, also \$1000.00 has been paid for lumber, three new pews have been purchased for the platform and a communion table, estimated cost being \$350.00. Also, a beautiful lighted pulpit desk, hand carved of the Good Shepherd was given to the church by a good neighbor, Robert Meek and wife. The church is free of indebtedness except the monthly loan payment and local indebtedness, of which God is helping us to meet very nicely. We humbly thank God for all that He is doing for us.

GALESBURG: The church there has enlarged the platform, installed a rear exit to the church, redecorated the church inside, built a pastor's study in the basement of the church, the estimated cost \$700.00 with donated labor, all of this is paid in full. Also, some good pews have been purchased for the church.

PÂLESTINE: The folk there have purchased new pews, at a cost of \$1788.55, refinished four Sunday school rooms at a cost of \$358.83, placed crushed stone on the parking area at a cost of \$54.00. Total cost being \$2201.38, all of which is paid.

orTTAWA: The church has purchased a parsonage. The building was unfinished and when finished will be valued at 12 to 15 thousand dollars. Also they have erected a new sign on the front lawn, put shrubbery in front of the church, put new doors on front of the church entrance and put stone on the front of church itself. Also the pastor and his wife added one new baby to the parsonage. One more added to the Sunday school.

#### PERSONAL REPORT

I have attended 17 Youth Zone rallies, One District Youth Council meeting, attended four Zone school board meetings at Frankfort, Ind., attended two General Board meetings at Indianapolis, Ind., conducted 11 District Council meetings, made 101 visits to the churches, 47 special visits to the churches at Tadianapolis. to the churches, made three special trips to Headquarters at Indianapolis, Ind., edited five District Bulletins, sent out 13 letters to the pastors, conducted 28 Annual Business meetings, attended one Homecoming, was with the General Superintendent in four zone rallies and in five local churches, and conducted one Ministerial Convention at Palestine, Ill., had a part in two Church Dedications, dedicated one church and one parsonage, preached 94 times, had two weddings, assisted in four funerals. worked many days on camp ground, had over sight of the preceding Camp meeting, traveled 28,238 miles in interest of the District and General work, received my traveling expense and salary in full.



#### **REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT**

To the chairman, Dr. Paul F. Elliott, General Youth Secretary, Pastors, Youth Leaders, Delegates of the Illinois District Pilgrim Youth Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, August 7, 1959, Greetings!

During the past Conference year there were 31 Filgrim Youth Zone Rallies in the Illinois District with a total attendance of 3,771; an average of 122. In this number there were 1,373 Youth; an average of 44 Youth per Rally. Besides these Zone Rallies we conducted one District Youth Rally on Saturday, June 13 with a morning and afternoon service with Special Singing from the different zones, also Rev. Richard Jackson of Cincinnati, Ohio as our guest speaker. We enjoyed a picnic lunch together in the Dining Hall at the Camp Grounds. The Charleston Church and their pastor, Brother Floyd Dunn, were very kind in permitting us the use of their fine church for these services. There were more than 200 in attendance at this District Rally, with a good representation from three of the zones. The Northern Zone felt they were too far removed from us to come at that time.

Attendance wise the standing of the Zones is as follows:

1. South Central Zone—9 Rallies; Total Att. 1206; Ave. Att. 134; Total Youth Att. 427; Ave. Youth Att. 47.

2. Southern Zone—10 Rallies; Total Att. 1231; Ave. Att. 123; Total Youth Att. 452; Ave. Youth Att. 45.

3. North Central Zone—9 Rallies; Total Att. 1065; Ave. Att. 115; Total Youth Att. 378; Ave. Youth Att. 42.

4. Northern Zone—5 Rallies; Total 447; Ave. Att. 89; Total Youth Att. 116; Ave. Youth Att. 33.

It was my privilege to attend the National Pilgrim Youth Leaders' Conference last September 9, 10 and 11 at Indianapolis, Indiana. I conducted two District Youth Council Meetings, attended in the Southern Zone one Zone Rally at Lawrenceville, and one Youth Revival meeting at Palestine; in the South Central Zone, I attended one Youth Rally at Martinsville; in the North Central Zone I attended six Rallies, preached at one Rally at Gibson City; in the Northern Zone, I attended 3 Rallies, preached in one Rally at Ottawa. With the capable assistance of a number of our Youth Leaders, we had the privilege of conducting a Panel Discussion on the subject "Helpful Suggestions For Our Zone Youth Rallies" at the Annual Ministerial Convention at Palestine in April.

I have prepared and edited the Youth Section of the PILGRIM VISITOR, the District Bulletin, each month since January, 1959. I have tried to promote the Youth Quiz and the Youth News Subscriptions. And, at the instruction of the District Youth Council I drew up a tentative schedule for District Pilgrim Youth Camps for Boys and Girls and presented it as instructed to the District Council which matter of Youth Camps was referred to this Youth Conference and for final approval to the District Conference.

Outside of my own Zone I have travelled 1970 miles besides to the District Youth Rally at Charleston, and received \$88.00 for my travelling expenses including \$22.55 for my trip to Indianapolis to the Youth Leaders' Conference, making it \$65.45 for District travel as well as \$3.65 for postage, Total Expenses from the District Youth Treasury. I received \$5.00 for speaking at Ottawa Rally; \$10.00 from the Palestine Youth Society for travelling expense when I visited their Youth Revival. I was unable to attend on the Rally night. I had planned to visit one or two other Rallies this year but because of sickness in my wife's family was not privileged to do so.

I can conscientiously say that I have done my best to create more inter-

est in our Youth Rallies and activities for our Youth and have had wonderful cooperation from the Pastors, Youth President, Zone Leaders, the Youth Council, my Vice-President and our good District Superintendent Brother Hall. I want them to know that I appreciate not only their cooperation but their fellowship and their prayers for this great work. There have been a few seekers in our Rallies during the past year, I recall a Rally held at Springfield when eight young 11 and 12 year old boys came under conviction to the altar to be saved. I believe some 14 people came that night.

May we never lose the vision for our Youth. Our Churches need our Youth, our youth need our Church and our God. May God help us as pro-fessors of Christianity that we'll become Missionaries to the lost Youth of our Communities and our Churches! When God saves the Youth not only is a soul saved but also a life.

## RULES OF THE ILLINOIS DISTRICT PILGRIM YOUTH SOCIETY

1. Each preacher should be willing to donate at least one service a year to the young people's meetings in his zone if called upon.

2. There should not be over two services a year in each zone that they have to pay the speaker.

3. The said speaker to be paid should be paid from other zone and not his own.

4. Speaker should be paid \$5.00 and gas expense from offerings taken in the service he assists in.

5. Zone chairmen shall pay for such speaker and their postage. The rest of the said offering should be sent to the District Treasurer of Youth, by money order, or given to the District Youth President.

The D. Y. President should visit twice a year in each of the zones.

7. The Southern Zone should have their zone rally the first Friday of each month; South Central Second Friday of each month; North Central third Friday of each month; and Northern the fourth Friday of each month.

8. Each church to send at least one young person to represent said church to each zone rally in their zone, regardless of revival or other special meetings going on in their church at time of rally.

9. Each zone chairman must mail out cards to each church in their zone at least nine (9) days before rally, stating what they intend to have for the rally. Postal cards will be paid for out of offerings taken at said rally.

10. Zone rallies are to be held each month of the year except December, July and August unless zones vote to have meetings during these months. Or rather if the zone leader desires, they shall have rallies these months.

11. If for any reason neither the Zone Chairman nor Dist. Youth Pres. is present to conduct rally the pastor of the church where rally is being held or the local Youth Pres. shall be in charge and the offering be sent to the Dist. Youth Treasurer.

12. Each Zone Chairman shall keep an account of attendance and offerings and also expenditures in his zone.

13. There should be provision made for the Dist. Youth President for meals and lodging when travelling over 120 miles to get to zone rally other than his own zone.

14. Be sure that each Youth Society send report of their services to

the District Superintendent. 15. That the District Youth Secretary send copy of minutes of all Youth Council meetings to Dist. Supt.; Dist. Youth Pres.; and Youth Council.

16. That each church send a special offering by the 15th of July for the expense of the District Youth Convention and Conference. The balance, if any, to be retained in the District Youth Treasury to be used in District Youth Work.
