JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Thirty-ninth Annual Conference of the Illinois District, of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 14, 1961 at 8:00 a. m.

The Conference was opened by the singing of "What a Friend," led by Rev. Hulén.

Rev. Chester Peterson offered the opening prayer of the Conference. Due to the illness, Brother Ross asked to be excused from the reception committee, so in turn, Brother Hall appointed Rev. Clifford Richardson to serve on the reception committee for this Conference.

After a few opening remarks, Rev. Hall introduced Rev. Melvin Snyder, General Superintendent as chairman of the Conference.

Rev. Snyder, after greeting the Conference, gave a few remarks concerning the reading of all reports kept by each pastor.

Rev. Snyder read his scripture lesson from the Gospel according to St. Matthew, chapter 8, reading from verse 5-13. Rev. Snyder spoke on the theme "The Miracle Of The Centurion", which was up-lifting to our faith. In this great message, we find the following divisions: (I) His faith was exercised in humility, (II) He had faith that was exercised in love, (III) He had faith that recognized constituted authority, (IV) He had faith that caused him to exercise authority.

In proceeding with the Conference, the secretary called the roll with 81 present. Following the roll call, the names of those transferred to the Illinois Conference was read, and the reception committee presented them to the conference, names as follow: Rudolph Moore, Mr. and Mrs. Rollie Schell, Howard Williams, Mrs. Howard Williams, Dennis Guile and Raymond Gamblin. Also Eugene Gray, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Applegate, Mrs. Roger Russell and Dale Campbell were introduced to the Conference. After Rev. Melvin Snyder introduced them to the Conference, a motion carried to grant them honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall read his Annual report which contained the progress that has been made in the Illinois District, as well as a personal report which was full of activity for the year. It was moved and seconded to accept this report with the greatest appreciation. Motion Carried.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Hall also read his recommendations for the oncoming year.

The Assistant Superintendent gave an oral report. A motion carried to accept this report.

The Auditors report was read, and accepted as read.

The District Treasurer, Rev. C. L. Oden, read his report. A motion carried to accept this report with the deepest appreciation.

The District Statisticians report was read, and accepted, authorizing him to bring said report up to date.

The Camp Treasurer read his report, and a motion carried to accept this report as read.

A motion carried, to change the Ordination service from 1 p. m. until 7 p. m. for this year.

The order of the day, was the reading of the individual pastor's reports. Three pastors reported up until this time.

Recessed for lunch.

Second Sitting

Conference reconvened after lunch by the Conference singing "Leaning On The Everlasting Arm", led by Rev. C. L. Oden. Prayer was offered by Rev. Roger Russell.

Minutes of the first sitting were read, and stood approved as corrected.

The reading of the pastor's personal reports continued. Following the reading of said reports, Conference recessed for ten minutes.

Conference reconvened at the call of the Chair. The educational board gave their report, and this report was accepted by the Conference.

The examining board gave their recommendations for Evangelist, and a motion carried to accept these recommendations.

The ways and means committee reported. Resolutions No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 accepted. Resolution No. 4 was amended and accepted as amended. No. 5 and No. 6 were accepted, No. 7 and No. 8 lost as presented by the committee.

The resolution committee's report was given. No. 4 and No. 7 under camp meeting resolutions was accepted as amended. Under New Resolutions No. 4 was deleted.

A motion carried to adjourn, and reconvene at 7 p. m. The evening sitting to be from 7 p. m. to 9 p. m.

Third Sitting

The third sitting opened, by the Conference singing, "A Charge To Keep I Have," and "Rock Of Ages", led by Sister Wanda Watts. Prayer was offered by Rev. Rollie Schell.

Arrangements were made, and Rev. and Mrs. Jesse V. Tewell and Rev. and Mrs. James Taylor were seated at the Altar.

Ordination service was held, with the Scripture I Timothy 3: 1-13 read by Rev. C. L. Oden, followed by the reading of Titus 3: 1-11 by Rev. Sylvan Callaway, after which Rev. L. A. Williams read II Timothy 4: 1-8. General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin Snyder gave the Ordination address. His theme was, "The Preacher God Wants". The address carried three divisions as follow: (I) A man quiet enough to hear His message. (II) A man courageous enough to preach His message. (III) A man honest enough to live His message.

Rev. W. E. Hall, Rev. L. A. Williams, Rev. C. L. Oden, Rev. Sylvan Callaway and Rev. Rollie Schell who constituted the Ordination Council, proceeded to the Altar and laid hands on the candidates, as Rev. Hall and Rev. L. A. Williams offered the Ordination prayer. Rev. Snyder then presented Rev. Tewell, and Rev. Taylor with Ordination Certificates. The congregation filed past and congratulated Rev. and Mrs. Jesse Tewell, and Rev. and Mrs. James Taylor.

Following the Ordination service the report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary was given. It was moved and seconded to accept the report. The expression was given with a hearty Amen.

The Memorial Committee read their report. The Conference approved this report by standing with heads bowed, while Rev. Melvin Snyder prayed.

A motion carried to extend the time of the sitting long enough to hear letters read, received concerning the Camp ground and the Eastern Illinois University, as well as other letters received concerning the rights of easements.

A motion was made to have the resolution committee bring in a recommendation to the Conference concerning the matter of selling the camp ground.

Conference adjourned until Tuesday A. M.

Fourth Sitting

The Conference reconvened Tuesday, August 15, 1961 at 8:00 a. m. with the Conference singing "When We All Get To Heaven", led by Rev. Paul Scheuermeier. Rev. Ronald Terry offered the opening prayer. Rev. Melvin Snyder asked for five, to give favorite passages of Scripture for a lesson for the hour.

A motion carried to seat Sister Lola Best, as delegate for the Janesville Church.

The Minutes of the Second and Third sittings were read and stood approved as read.

Requests for invitations for the Ministerial Convention was given, Ottawa was chosen as the location for said Convention.

The ways and means committee reported. This report was to amend rule No. 5 under ways and means.

Rev. W. E. Hall read the pastoral appointments as of this date. He also made explanation for the Churches that have been sold.

The resolution committee gave a partial report. A motion carried to accept this report.

The Memorial Committee report on memorials for General Conference was read.

No. 1 relating to a change of section 221, article No. 3 to read, "This course of study is to be directed by the zone school," and that all other portions of the manual be changed to agree.

No. 2 section 142 be changed, deleting the words, "And three additional members from each of the five church zones", and be replaced with the following, "And the District Superintendents of all organized Districts and school Presidents." Also that section 147 be deleted. Number one was accepted as it was presented to the Conference, Number two was amended, and accepted as amended.

The District Superintendent W. E. Hall appointed Rev. Clifford Richard, Rev. Paul Scheuermeier, Rev. Ronald Terry, Rev. Jerrel Adams, and Rev. Lewis Russell as tellers.

A motion carried to receive Rev. Robert Duda as an Ordained Minister and Sister Robert Duda as an Ordained Deaconess, into the Illinois Conference upon receipt of letter of transfer.

Conference recessed for fifteen minutes, and reconvened at the call of the Chair.

Ballots were cast in the election of the following for Lay Delegates to General Conference Dwight Henschen, Kenneth Roller, L. A. Butts. Alternates: Eloise Helm, Harold Jackman and Richard Loftis.

Ministerial Delegates to General Conference: Howard Williams, Sylvan Callaway, Rollie Schell, Thomas Manuel.

Alternates: Elmer Waltrip, Earl Wachenschwanz, Jesse Tewell and Clifford Richardson.

A motion carried to leave all unfinished business in the hands of the District Council.

Rev. W. E. Hall read the appointments of the following committees: Ways and Means—Earl Wachenschwanz, C. L. Oden, James Taylor, Lewis Russell and Howard Williams.

Resolution Committee—Jerrel Adams, Jessie Tewell, L. W. Hulén, Dennis Guile, and Vernon Munson.

Auditing Committee—Grace Catey and Mrs. L. A. Williams.

Reception Committee—Dennis Guile and Paul Scheuermeier.

A motion carried to authorize the District Council to hear, correct and approve the reading of the last sitting of the Conference Minutes.

Conference Adjourned.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Inasmuch as the General Board has ruled that all our District Camps shall provide for Sunday School to be conducted on the Camp Grounds each Sunday of the Camp. Therefore be it resolved, that there shall be a Sunday School service conducted on this Camp Ground each Sunday at the Camp. The Sunday School Committee to be in charge of the same, and that suitable cards of recognition be given to all who attend, denoting their presence at the Camp Sunday School. These cards to be returned to the local Sunday School, thus encouraging a perfect attendance, and that local averages be figured and any awards be given in recognition of the same.

2. Be it resolved, that all pastors and evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the Camp and Conference, and that if any minister does not attend Camp and Conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for the absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be dealt with by the council.

3. Be it resolved that the Conference year begins July 1, and ends on June 30 of each year, and that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician by July 10.

4. Be it resolved that the time of the sittings of the District Conference

be from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and the afternoon sitting be from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.

5. Be it resolved, that the first 10 seats in the center section, the platform and the booth constitute the Conference Bar.

6. Be it resolved, that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers' duties are adopted.

7. Resolved, that all our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.

8. Be it resolved, that each pastor shall endeavor to bring the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription list up to a number equal to or greater than the membership of the church.

9. Resolved, that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.

10. Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of the standards of our church, therefore:

Be it resolved that: The Illinois District Conference call attention to page 35, section 65 of our Manual which reads, "Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing the immodest forms of dress so current today; such as: sun-suits, shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public places in shorts or without shirts."

11. Inasmuch as television is rapidly becoming a daily habit and an open door for infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever-increasing number of homes in America;

Therefore be it resolved that we as a District go on record as being opposed to the use and or ownership of a television set.

12. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time, and that there be five members on each Ways and Means and Resolutions Committee.

13. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.

14. Be it resolved, that the District be zoned and the boundaries apply to the Ministerial, Youth, and Sunday School Departments. Be it further resolved, that the District Superintendent appoint Ministerial and Sunday School Zone Chairmen and that the Zone Chairmen and the District Superintendent be authorized to arrange Zone meetings as they deem advisable, and that a Zone Secretary and Treasurer be elected at the first meeting of the year.

15. Whereas it is helpful to a better understanding among our people who contribute to the support of our work and: Whereas the District handles this money as a public trust; Be it resolved, that the District Treasurer give a statement in totals of disbursements in his annual report of District Home Missionary funds, the same to be placed in the Conference Minutes.

16. Be it resolved, that all resolutions retained in the minutes from year to year be listed under "Standing rules" and all new resolutions be listed as "Conference rules" for one year, after that, all that are retained be placed under "Standing Rules."

17. We recommend, that all cabin owners get together and file for tax exemption on their cabins.

18. Be it resolved that we adopt the action of the 1958 General Conference known as "Toward Tomorrow."

A. 1. A gain of 85 in membership which is 10% gain.

2. Strive for at least one new church per year.

3. Annual pastors' Conference in the District.

4. Accentuated (emphasize) Holiness evangelism.

B. Sunday School and Youth:

1. That we set a goal of 2468 (330) gain in average Sunday School attendance by 1961.

2. There shall be an established standard of excellence for both Sunday School and Youth Societies.

3. That leadership training courses be provided for our Sunday School and Youth Societies.
4. There shall be an expansion and development of new fields of service such as Youth Camps, Bible Clubs and special projects.

19. Be it resolved, that the Council be given authority to take the necessary steps to take out Camp Insurance.

20. Be it resolved that this Conference delegate authority to the District Council to make necessary repairs and improvements on the campgrounds.

21. Be it resolved, that necessary steps be taken to connect on to the 4 inch water main east of the Camp grounds.

22. Be it resolved that the Sunday School Board in conjunction with the District Superintendent set up the following goals for each of our Sunday Schools to reach the quadrennial goals as set by the 1958 General Conference:

Argo, 140; Asbury, 45; Bloomington, 75; Bridgeport, 170; Casey, 40; Centralia, 30; Charleston, 155; Chicago, 65; Coffeyville, 60; Decatur First, 135; Decatur Second, 75; Galesburg, 70; Gibson City, 40; Janesville, 50; Jerseyville, 40; Joliet, 155; Lawrenceville, 170; Marshall, 100; Mason, 35; Martinsville, 50; Mt. Vernon, 45; Oblong, 90; Olney, 80; Onarga, 60; Ottawa, 100; Palestine, 125; Pleasant Hill, 70; Robinson, 70; Ste. Marie, 30; Springfield, 60; Streator, 25; Tuscola, 25; Wood River, 75; Zion, 75. Total 2,660.

23. Whereas, the General Conference has set up a United Stewardship Fund to care for a part of the expense of operating the General Church, and Whereas, the Manual states on page 82, paragraph 8 that, Any pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference, and Whereas, this rule must be enforced beginning with our next annual conference, therefore Be it resolved, that we as a conference set the month of September as United Stewardship Fund month. Be it further resolved that an offering be taken in each church in this conference sometime during said month for said fund. This is primarily to aid churches that are struggling to pay their United Stewardship Fund. Churches that have a workable system in operation that is enabling them to meet this obligation to the general church need not feel under obligation to take such an offering.

24. Whereas, most local churches have some money coming in for both foreign missions and general church extension, and Whereas, a certain percent of the United Stewardship Fund goes for these two arms of our church, therefore Be it resolved, that any local church wishing to do so may pay from unspecified foreign missionary funds that part of United Stewardship Fund pertaining to foreign missions which is 20% of said fund. Be it further resolved, that any local church wishing to do so may pay from unspecified general church extension funds that part of the United Stewardship Fund which pertains to general church extension which is 14% of such fund. This may only apply when the other part of the United Stewardship Fund has been made up by said church.

25. Be it resolved that all licensed Ministers meet with the examining board not later than the last Saturday of the Camp Meeting.

26. Be it resolved that the Ministerial Convention convene the first Tuesday evening through Thursday afternoon of April. The place to be chosen from invitations from the Churches.

27. Be it resolved that all members being received into the Local Pilgrim Holiness Church, that their attention should be called to Section 155, Article 2, and Section 69 of the 1958 Pilgrim Holiness Manual.

28. Be it resolved that this Conference approve of our Churches making application for and borrowing money from the General Church Pilgrim Pension Loan Fund. This to be in accordance with the Manual.

29. Be it resolved that provision be made in the Illinois District for a Ministerial Institute whereby those who are taking the Course of Study may have the privilege of receiving help on subjects that are required.

30. As the Illinois conference is incorporated be it resolved that the district Superintendent be authorized to make the annual report of the corporation as required by the state. The period of reporting is from January 15 to the last day of February each year.

31. That the District Council as elected from year to year be the district trustees in accordance with the articles of incorporation.

32. That in the event of death or hospitalization of any of our active ministers or wives, flowers shall be sent by the district treasurer. The district Superintendent is to be notified in either event of the above. All carefulness should be taken about notifying the district Superintendent so there will be no misunderstanding.

33. Be it resolved that the Ordination service be held each year, on Monday at 1:00 p. m.

CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that our camp Meeting begin the first Friday in August of each year.

2. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint someone to be deputized to patrol the camp grounds during the Meeting and to be hereafter enforced.

3. Be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the Camp to the Churches and that each Church respond with such needed items as requested

4. Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds without special written permission from the Dean of men or the Matron of women, or accompanied by their parents. They shall be required to attend Young Peoples and evening services. Failure to keep this rule will forfeit their privilege of remaining in camp. There shall be a Dean of men and a Matron of women appointed by the District Council who shall be responsible to enforce this rule. Be it further resolved that this resolution be printed, and copies given to each one registering.

5. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.

6. Inasmuch as so many children are on the grounds throughout the camp meeting, therefore be it resolved, that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.

7. Be it resolved that the District Council be responsible for the placing of four way side tables on the camp grounds, and we further recommend that this be completed before the 1962 camp.

8. Be it resolved, that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.

9. Be it resolved, that all dormitory reservations be declared non-transferable as long as the present holders occupy them. When the holders of said reservations secure lodging elsewhere the former reservations shall be turned to the one in charge. Those having reservations and those desiring reservations shall write to the one in charge of rooms within 60 days and not later than 30 days prior to the coming camp meeting.

10. Be it resolved, that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall. Be it further resolved the District Council be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

11. Be it resolved that all ministers and their wives who are physically able be available for work during Camp. Be it further resolved that those who choose not to work shall be charged a stipulated amount set by the District Council.

12. Be it resolved, that we urge each church that is able to do so to build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor and delegate. Be it further resolved, that a lot shall be furnished free to each church completing said building prior to our next annual Camp. The type and location of said cottage to be agreed upon by the church and the District Council.

NEW RESOLUTIONS

1. In as much as time is limited for the committees to meet and discuss resolutions, be it resolved that all new resolutions either to the Ways and Means or the Resolutions committee be mailed to the chairman before camp or placed in his hands within the first four days of

the meeting. Resolutions are to be passed upon by said committee and placed in a public place for the Conference members to study before Conference.

2. We recommend that the District Camp committee for the Camp ground for the purpose of re-locating, consist of the District Superintendent and his Assistant, and three members from the Council which they shall appoint.

3. Be it resolved that the following recommendations be adopted;

1. Repairs and redecorating of the cabins by the owners be urged.

2. That steps be taken for a better water supply.

3. Buildings, known as the barn be torn down and rebuilt or fixed up.

4. Equipment in the kitchen, such as, dish washer, hot water heater, cooking utensils, etc., be checked and that others be purchased if needed.

5. Elm trees be trimmed as recommended by Mr. Lee.

6. Due consideration be given to the different letters from Eastern Illinois University, Mr. Tyler, Attorney etc. and that an answer be given them as they have requested.

4. We recommend that the District Council engage a competent attorney to meet with them, to advise and instruct, concerning Easements and sale of our Camp ground. Also that the District Council be authorized to make the final decision.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AS ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE

1. We recommend each church in the District shall raise an amount equal to \$8.00 per member per year for the United Stewardship Fund to conform with the action of the 1958 General Conference, to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer. (This amount is pro-rated by the General Treasurer as follows: Foreign Missions 35% or \$2.80; General Administration 25% or \$2.00; Church Extension 20% or \$1.60; Senior College 10% or 80 cents; Church Extension Loan Fund 6% or 48 cents and Sunday School and Youth 4% or 32 cents. This need not be thus divided by the local treasurers.)

2. We recommend that each pastor be given a stipulated amount for his support and that at the respective annual meetings each church shall decide upon a financial support they will pay their pastor during the year.

3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church, Sunday School, and Youth offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents and evangelists, and that the District Budget be pro-rated as follows, District Expense Fund 80%; District Home Missions, 15%; General Conference Expense, 3% and Frankfort Pilgrim College, 2%. We further recommend that in the event the General Conference Funds prove inadequate to meet the expenses of the coming General Conference, that this Conference authorize the District Council to make an appeal to the churches for a special offering for this purpose.

4. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,600 per year and 7c per mile traveling expense.

5. We recommend that the District Council Members, Home Missionary Committee, and all special committees be paid the sum of 7 cents per mile for traveling expense while rendering service for the District.

6. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as District Statistician, and be paid the sum of \$75.00 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer be paid the sum of \$300.00 per year.

7. We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Fund the sum of ten (\$10) dollars for each delegate attending the Conference, said sum to be applied to the expenses of the camp meeting and Conference.

8. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating devices, that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

9. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks' vacation with salary, which shall include two Sundays.

10. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone.

11. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent, in the absence of the District Superintendent, be paid the sum of \$10.00 per day, plus 7c per mile traveling expenses while rendering service for the District or Camp Meeting.

12. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50; little dormitory rooms, \$3.50; third floor, \$1.50 per cot. We further recommend that the electric rate shall be: All cottages, cabins or trailers, a minimum of \$1.00, plus 25c for each appliance; rooms in dormitories 25c per appliance in addition to room rent.

13. We recommend that District letterheads be printed, the amount to be decided by the District Council.

14. We recommend that the District Council appoint a district Home Missionary Committee of three, and the District Superintendent act as chairman. We further recommend that the expense of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary work.

15. We recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2.00 per member to meet the indebtedness of the District parsonage.

16. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School Program; we recommend that each Sunday School in the district send the Sunday School Promotional Secretary the amount of four (\$4) dollars as soon after conference as possible, said four dollars per church, plus Camp Meeting Sunday School Offerings, and District Sunday School Convention Offerings, constituting the District Sunday Promotional Fund.

17. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid a salary of \$30 per year, plus all incidental expenses, to be paid from the District Sunday School Fund.

18. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay utilities at the District parsonage, consisting of lights, gas, fuel, water, and telephone.

19. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay District postage expense.

20. We recommend that the district minutes shall be paid for out of the Camp meeting fund, and that each church shall be charged for the number of copies of the minutes they receive, and that as they are paid for the money shall be put back in said fund.

21. Whereas the Loan Fund has proved to be such a blessing in the General Church Extension Department, and other Districts have likewise been helped in the promotion of Home Missions; we therefore recommend that we set up a District Loan Fund. We also recommend that funds from wills, gifts, legacies, etc. be placed in this fund. We further recommend that the District Council or a committee be appointed to formulate rules and by-laws governing this fund. Rate of interest and churches to which loans are made and all business be delegated to said Council of Committee. (We recommend 3% interest).

22. Whereas many of our ministers and wives who are eligible for membership in the Ministerial Benefit Association are not members. We recommend that all eligible pastors and wives become members of the Association, and that each church pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife. We further recommend that the District Treasurer carry out the same provision for the District Superintendent.

REPORT OF THE AUDITING COMMITTEE

We the Auditing Committee of the Illinois Conference, wish to report that we have examined and checked the books of the District Treasurer, the District Camp Meeting Treasurer, and the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary and Treasurer, and have found them correct and in excellent condition.

REPORT FROM THE CHURCHES

CASEY—A parsonage has been purchased and about one-half of the indebtedness has been paid off this year, to God be the Glory. Also the church has had two good revivals this year with souls finding God. Also the church has paid their budgets in full. The folk are encouraged and are trusting God for His help this next year.

COFFEYVILLE—The folk here have purchased a new well pump for the parsonage this year, the estimated cost being \$160.00. The spirituality of the church is good and they are looking forward to a good year.

DECATUR NO. 1—Church: built new exit to the basement, cost of materials—\$152.39 with the labor donated, also a new throw rug for platform behind pulpit, cost \$5.00.

Sunday School—Repair and used tire for Sunday School bus—\$70.61.

Parsonage—The parsonage was treated for termites at a cost of \$155.00. A new faucet for kitchen sink—\$10.00, three small evergreen trees were set out in front of parsonage, the interior of parsonage was repainted and some new screen put on doors and windows, also some other smaller items—estimated cost \$46.50, total estimate of repairs on parsonage was \$439.50, there was \$44.00 of this donated. The attendance has been fair and the Lord has been helping us, some souls have sought the Lord. We are very disappointed that we did not reach our goal in increase in membership for the year, but we will try harder next year. With Sister Oden being sick, the pastor has been hindered in the work. She is better for which we praise God. They are praising God for what has been accomplished this year looking forward to a better year.

GALESBURG—The folk here have painted the church outside, refinished the auditorium floor, purchased new runner for the aisle, completed the back addition to the church, considerable repairs have been made on the heating systems in both the church and parsonage. The spiritual condition of the church is very good, have had some good results at the altar and have enjoyed a good spirit in the services. One has said the church is grasping the vision and the future of the church looks bright.

PALESTINE—The folk here have paid off the indebtedness of \$2500.00 on the parsonage, and it was dedicated on New Year's Eve at the watch night service with a mortgage burning. The parsonage has been redecorated inside. God has helped the folk here to close the year free of debt. The church has had a good spiritual year, with a good number of new folks added to the congregation.

OLNEY—The folk here have made some improvements on the church, among these there was installed new front doors. They are looking to a good year in the Lord.

JANESVILLE—The folk here have laid a new floor in the kitchen of the parsonage, water line changed, estimated cost \$116.00. The folk are still in the farming project. God has certainly blessed and given good crops. Volunteer help from members of the church, neighbors, and friends who have been willing to donate their time, fuel, and equipment to this project has enabled them to bring the indebtedness on the parsonage to less than a third of the original debt. They have on hand at this time a building fund plus the good wheat crop just harvested, which netted \$558.00. Approximately 2000 bu. of corn in the crib from last year and a very good prospect of a good bean crop, also corn crop to be harvested this fall. To do what has been done with just twelve members and the pastor, leaves but one answer, GOD. The spiritual tide of the church is up and we have been having increased interests outside of the local community. They are very grateful to God for all that He has helped them to do. They are looking and expecting a good and prosperous year in the next few months to come.

OTTAWA—The folk here have painted the exterior of the church and Sunday school rooms where the old parsonage was. Purchased new aluminum storm windows for the parsonage. They have paid something like

\$1000.00 over their regular payments on the parsonage. God's presence has been very precious to us here. They have taken in nine junior members and two adults. For various reasons they are showing a loss in Sunday school. The common one, people have moved away. Have had some real struggles with darkness but the Lord has delivered. With this small advancement we are deeply convinced that God would have had us reach greater. The future is just as bright as the promises of God.

LAWRENCEVILLE—The folk here are nearing the completion of the exterior of the new addition on the front of the church. It is built of varicolored Bedford sandstone, with limestone paneling at the entrance, and a limestone in the section above the entrance. The building (addition) provides a main-floor nursery, an additional main-floor classroom, and two additional classrooms in the basement—plus a "more abundant entrance" into the sanctuary, and a direct exit from the basement. This project is being financed by a loan of \$6000.00. Its value has been estimated at \$10,000.00. There is considerable work to be done inside as yet. Also the rest of the basement was redecorated last Fall.

MASON—The folk at Mason are praising the Lord and rejoicing in the fact that the church is moving forward, spiritually and materially under the leadership of God and their good pastor, Rev. James Sneed. After much prayer, God has opened the way for them to purchase a seven room house and four lots in a choice location. With donated labor and lumber the men had received from tearing down an old church building in another town, the house was completely remodeled, a bath room installed, kitchen cabinets built, painted inside and out, a new roof put on and a front porch built. Total cost of remodeling was estimated at \$1,000.00. The estimated valuation of the parsonage now is \$6000.00. They are expecting to build a new church on the corner lots. To God be the praise and Glory for His helping us here. All the labor was donated, some unsaved working faithfully with the pastor and men of the church to finish the work. They are very grateful to everyone who helped.

URBANA—The Urbana church has made some very decided gains this year in their building program. First of all and most often important step forward of the church is to purchase property. This the Urbana church was able to do, with God's help to lead and guide, they were able to purchase the church building that they had been renting. Though the estimated cost was \$11,000.00 they were able to purchase it from the Metropolitan church for \$9500.00 because they wanted us to have it. Their interest in this is greatly appreciated. After buying the property, immediately started to redecorate the interior. A very conservative estimate would be \$3000.00 for cost of this work. New stairway, revamped the rest rooms, with all new fixtures and enlarged them, included a nursery, tiled nearly all of the basement floors. Repaired the foundation and then built a new Sunday school class room, put wall board around the basement walls. Completed with some new wiring and bringing the old fixtures from upstairs and installing them downstairs, painted the entire basement. Redecorated the main auditorium and installed new light fixtures. Also purchased another piano, new runner for aisle. The spiritual life of the church has been very good, but we want to move up. We thank God for a 31% gain in Sunday school and an 18% gain in the church membership. To God be the Glory.

PLEASANT HILL—The folk at Pleasant Hill have completed the remodeling of the Sunday School rooms in the basement of the church. Also the main auditorium of the church has been redecorated and has been insulated. Also new steps (cement) have been built at the front of the church. They are thanking God for the Material blessings but most of all the Spiritual outpouring of His Spirit upon them in the services.

JERSEYVILLE—The people here have painted the exterior of the church, put a new roof on the Parsonage and have made some other minor repairs. The estimated cost was \$161.86 with donated labor. They also have \$115.25 on hand toward the redecorating of the interior of the church.

ROBINSON—The folk here have redecorated three rooms and stairway in the parsonage, painted the garage, these were done at estimated cost of

\$40.00 with the labor donated. New runners for aisles for church and purchased new song books.

MARTINSVILLE—The folk here have repaired the damage of storm on the church roof. Estimated cost of \$160.00.

CHICAGO NO. 1—The Chicago church has made the following improvements this past year. Built two dormers on the parsonage, finished the upstairs, completed three rooms and bath, also the outside of the parsonage is being redecorated, these done at an estimated cost of \$1200.00 for material and work done.

BRIDGEPORT—God has given the folk here a good year, with the blessings of the Lord upon the services. Twenty new pews (blonde oak) for the main auditorium have been purchased at a cost of \$1900.00. They are all paid for only \$100.00, pledges have been taken to care for this. Also they have redecorated the main auditorium of the church and finished another Sunday school room in the basement.

CAMP GROUND—The old bath fixtures from the district parsonage have been installed in one of the rooms of the worker's cottage, for the camp workers and visitors convenience. Also a concrete floor has been put in the metal building that is used for the boys' dorm. This was much needed. The trees have been sprayed. Ten fire extinguishers have been purchased and placed in building on the ground. Some repairs have been made on the buildings and some on the tractor. The ground is in very nice condition, much of this is by and through the efforts of our good caretaker.

Resolution No. 1, Be it resolved in keeping with resolution No. 1 as passed that the Youth district minutes be printed as of last year, that the district treasurer be authorized to pay the amount for printing same from the Youth district treasurer. Carried.

Resolution No. 2, In as much as action was taken by the General board to grant the National Sunday School Convention to be held at Allentown, Penn., August 29-31, 1961, and that the General Sunday School and Youth Secretary has called a business meeting of the District Youth Presidents at the time of this Convention, and that our District Youth President is expected to attend, be it resolved the expenses of our Youth president to this meeting be paid by the district Youth treasurer from the District Youth funds. Moved to have Rev. Wachenschwanz to serve with Rev. Scheuermeier and Mrs. Jesse Tewell on committee. Carried.

Dismissed by Rev. Lewis Russell.

Resolved that last part of No. 9 be changed from: (postal cards to be paid for out of offerings taken at said rally.) To: The District Youth Treasurer shall provide all necessary postage for Zone Chairmen. Carried.

Resolved that remaining rules stand as are. Carried.

Report of Ways and Means Committee on rewording of No. 2.

Moved to accept. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we proceed with the election of officers. Carried.

The newly elected officers for the coming year are printed in the front of the Minutes of Illinois Youth Conference.

Reading of those appointed to future Committees, this also printed in the front of the Minutes of Illinois Youth Conference.

Conference was dismissed with prayer by our District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To the chairman, Rev. W. E. Hall, Pastors, youth leaders and delegates of the Illinois District Youth Conference, of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings.

During the past year we have served in the capacity of District Youth President to the best of our ability. It has been our pleasure to serve the Illinois District for the Pilgrim Youth. We have endeavored to carry out the required duties imposed upon us by the Manual and the annual conference proceedings as listed in the conference minutes.

This has been a good year to us in many ways. We have been able to see our prayers answered. This year as you all know was our first attempt in a youth camp. To introduce something that has not been used before brings us a challenge. The challenge this year has brought us some difficulties, disappointments, perplexing thoughts, but God has proven that he is able to do what he promises to do. Had there not been a definite time and place where we met with God and received a definite answer and a promise that he would see us through, no doubt it would have been more difficult. We thank God for the good Youth Camp which we just closed. We feel, with many others, it was very profitable. We would not want to forget the Youth who made this

This past year we have held four council meetings. Attended the Sunday School and Youth Leaders conference at Indianapolis, Ind., and have visited all zones at least twice except the northern. Preached at least once in each zone, held two Youth revivals, one at Chicago's First and one at Casey, God giving us several seekers at each. Have directed one District Youth Camp, have driven a total of 1,193 miles in the interest of the youth and have received my expenses in full at the close of the conference year June 30, 1961.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN ZONE LEADER

Bro. Chairman, District Youth President, Youth Leaders, Delegates, Pastors and Friends;

In the Southern Zone where 9 churches participated, we had 8 youth rallies during the conference year. One in each church except one. The average attendance for the year was 154. Of this number 39.3% were youth between the ages of 12 and 35. This percentage is a slight gain over last year.

My aim as leader was to get the youth in the majority instead of in the minority. For the most part only those in the youth bracket (12-35) took part in the services. The services were not necessarily evangelistic, but stress Christian Fidelity. However we were happy to have two seeking the Lord in our last rally and feel that during the year many more were encouraged to be true "Soldiers of the Cross".

A loving cup trophy was given temporarily to the church having the most points for the month and given permanently to the church having the most points for the year. The winner for the year was Bridgeport with 788 points. Palestine was close with 761 points and Oblong in third place with 525 points.

RULES OF THE ILLINOIS DISTRICT PILGRIM YOUTH SOCIETY

1. Each preacher should be willing to donate at least one service a year to the young people's meetings in his zone if called upon.
2. All money pertaining to district youth should be sent to the District Treasurer and all expenses paid by check.
3. Each zone should engage no more than two paid speakers per year and such engaged speakers are to be paid by check from the District Treasurer at the rate of five dollars per service plus 5c per mile.
4. The said speaker to be paid should be paid from other zones and not his own.
5. The D. Y. President should visit twice a year in each of the zones.
6. The Southern Zone should have their zone rally the first Friday of each month; South Central second Friday of each month; North Central third Friday of each month; and Northern the fourth Friday of each month.
7. Each church to send at least one young person to represent said church to each zone rally in their zone, regardless of revival or other special meetings going on in their church at time of rally.
8. Each zone chairman must mail out cards to each church in their zone at least nine (9) days before rally, stating what they intend to have for the rally. The Dist. Youth Treasurer shall provide all necessary postage for Zone Chairman.
9. Zone rallies are to be held in months of Sept., Nov., Jan., March, May and optional June.
10. If for any reason neither the Zone Chairman nor District Youth President is present to conduct rally the pastor of the church where rally is being held or the local Youth President shall be in charge and the offering be sent to the District Youth Treasurer.
11. There should be provision made for the District Youth President for meals and lodging when traveling over 120 miles to get to zone rally other than his own zone.
12. Be sure that each Youth Society sends report of their services to the District Superintendent.
13. That the District Youth Secretary send copy of minutes of all Youth Council meetings to District Superintendent; District youth President and Youth Council.
14. That each church send a special offering by the 15th of July for the expense of the District Youth Convention and Conference. The balance, if any, to be retained in the District Youth Treasury to be used in District Youth Work.
