JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Fortieth Annual Conference of the Illinois District, of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 13, 1962 at 8:00 a. m.

The Conference was opened by singing "Blessed Assurance," led by Brother Baldwin.

Brother Peterson offered the opening prayer of the Conference.

After a few opening remarks, Brother Hall introduced Dr. W. H. Neff, the General Superintendent, as Chairman of the Conference.

Brother Neff spoke to the Conference, concerning progress of the Conference. He gave four factors that we should keep in mind during this Conference, that will contribute to it. (1) Good hard thinking; (2) Earnest Praying; (3) Disposition of Jesus; (4) Guidance of the Holy Spirit.

In proceeding with the Conference business, the Secretary read the roll with 73 delegates present.

A motion was made to accept Brother and Sister H. J. Beecher as Ordained Ministers into the Conference. They were granted seats within the Conference bar. Motion carried.

The Chairman permitted Brother Hall to appoint a reception committee, due to the absence of those who had been appointed previously.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall, read a report of improvements made upon the local Churches and parsonages. He also gave a personal report, which was full of activity, for the year. It was moved and seconded to accept this report with deep appreciation, by a show of up lifted hands.

Bro. Hall, the District Superintendent, read some recommendations for the future.

The Assistant Superintendent, L. A. Williams, gave an oral report of his activities during the year. This report was accepted with deep appreciation.

The Auditors report was read, and accepted as read. The District Treasurer, Rev., C. L. Oden, read his report. A motion carried to accept this report with appreciation.

Brother Oden, the Camp Meeting treasurer, reported. And a motion carried to accept this report.

The Reception Committee introduced to the conference Sister Neff, Brother R. A. Beltz, Brother Beecher, and Brother Elmer Kizzee. It was moved and seconded to grant those who were introduced honorary seats within the conference bar. Motion carried.

The District Statistician's report was read, and was accepted by a standing vote of appreciation.

The Reception Committee presented Sister Moyer and Brother James Hertel to the conference. A motion carried to grant them honorary seats within the conference bar.

The S. S. Promotional Secretary read his report. A motion carried to accept this good report. The conference recessed for 10 minutes.

Conference reconvened at the call of the chair.

The Educational Board read its report. It was moved and seconded to accept this report. Motion carried.

The Examining Board read its recommendations for Evangelists and Singers. A motion carried to approve the recommendations.

The Resolution Committee's report was given. Number 18, in the Standing Resolutions, shall be deleted, and the action of the 1962 General Conference shall be adopted (Sunday School and Youth Quadrennial Goals) for 1962-1966.

A motion was made to refer Standing Rule No. 19 to the committee. Rules No. 21, 24 and 29 shall be deleted. Motion carried.

By recommendation of the Chair, the remaining part of the Resolution Committee's report was dispensed with until later, giving Brother Hertel an opportunity to give a report concerning the progress of the school at Frankfort. Brother Beltz also received an opportunity to speak to the Conference pertaining to the Pilgrim Pension Plan. Conference adjourned by expiration of time for lunch.

Second Sitting

The second sitting opened by the Conference singing, "A Charge To Keep, I Have," led by Brother Roger Russell.

Arrangements were made, and Rev. and Mrs. Clyde Moreillon were seated at the Altar.

Ordination service was held with the following Scriptures being read, I Timothy 3:1-13, by Rev. C. L. Oden; II Timothy 4:1-8, by Rev. Sylvan Callaway; Titus 3:1-11, by Rev. James Taylor.

General Superintendent, W. H. Neff, along with the Ordination Council, which consisted of Rev. W. E. Hall, Rev. L. A. Williams, Rev. Sylvan Callaway, Rev. C. L. Oden and Rev. James Taylor, proceeded to the Altar. Dr. Neff read the rules pertaining to Ordained Ministers from the Pilgrim Holiness Church Manual, and spoke concerning the same. The Ordination Council laid their hands upon the Candidate, as Rev. L. A. Williams and Dr. Neff offered the Ordination prayer.

Following the Ordination service, the Secretary read the minutes of the first sitting, and they stood approved as read.

Brother Beltz spoke the second time concerning the Pension Plan. The Resolution Committee read the remaining part of their report. Rules No. 2 and No. 7 in the Camp Meeting Resolutions were adopted as presented by the Committee.

An addition to rule No. 9, in Camp Meeting Resolutions, was presented by the Committee. A motion was made to amend the addition that was presented. The motion carried. No. 9 with the addition as amended was presented and lost.

It was moved and seconded to refer rule No. 9 to the Committee to be reconsidered. Motion carried.

In rule No. 2, under New Resolutions, the Committee recommended a change in the wording. The word, "from" be dropped, and the words "other than" be inserted. This change was granted, by common consent.

A motion was made to drop rules No. 3 and No. 4 from New Resolutions.

NEW RESOLUTIONS FOR 1962

A motion carried to adopt rules No. 1 and No. 2, as presented by the Committee.

Rule No. 3 was adopted after inserting the word "appointed."

A motion was made to amend rule No. 4, and it was adopted as amended.

Rule No. 5 was adopted as presented. It was moved and seconded to refer Rule No. 19, in Standing Resolutions, to the District Council.

The Ways and Means Committee read their report. Rule No. 1 is to be edited to conform with the action of the General Conference. Rule No. 2 was deleted, and a new one was presented to take its place. The new rule was adopted and presented. Rule No. 4 was adopted as presented. Rule No. 6 was amended and accepted as amended. Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

Third Sitting

Conference reconvened at 6:00 P. M. at the call of the Chairman. Brother Lewis Russell offered the opening prayer. Continuation of the reports from the Ways and Means Committee was given.

A new recommendation was offered to take the place of Rule No. 3, pertaining to District Budget. After much discussion, it was brought to the floor for vote, and lost for lack of support.

A motion carried to delete the words, "Youth Offerings", from Rule No. 3.

A motion was made to amend rule No. 17, and was adopted as amended. Rule No. 20 was accepted as presented by the Committee.

The Resolution Committee read a partial report, bringing back to the Conference floor Rule No. 9 in Camp Meeting Resolutions. It was adopted as presented.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. William Oden to the Conference. A motion carried to grant him an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The Memorial Committee read its report to the Conference. The

Conference approved its report by standing and singing, "In The Sweet By and By."

Brother Hall appointed Brother Lewis Russell, Brother Roger Russell, Brother James Sneed, Brother Dale Campbell, Brother L. W. Hulén, Brother Jerrel Adams and Brother Lawrence Butts as tellers. Ballots were cast in the election of the following officers:

District Superintendent: Brother F. J. Goins was elected as Superintendent. Examining Board, 3 years; Rollie Schell. Educational Board, 3 years; Rudolph Moore.

Conference recessed until Brother Goins could be contacted concerning his acceptance as Superintendent. Brother Goins did not accept the call as District Superintendent. So the election proceeded. Ballots were cast, and the following officers were elected:

Brother Hall read the following appointments for the Committees: Ways and Means Committee, the same as last year. Resolutions Committee, James Sneed, to replace Dennis Guile, and all the others to remain as last year; Auditing Committee, the same; Memorial Committee, the same; Reception Committee, Myrtle Rogers and Elva Lancaster.

Brother Hall also read the pastoral appointments as of this date. A motion was made to accept the invitation from the Charleston Church for the Ministerial Convention. Voted approved.

A motion carried to authorize the District Council to hear, correct and approve the reading of the last two sittings of the Conference minutes. Conference adjourned.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Inasmuch as the General Board has ruled that all our District Camps shall provide for Sunday School to be conducted on the Camp Grounds each Sunday of the Camp. Therefore be it resolved, that there shall be a Sunday School service conducted on this Camp Ground each Sunday at the Camp. The Sunday School Committee to be in charge of the same, and that suitable cards of recognition be given to all who attend, denoting their presence at the Camp Sunday School. These cards to be returned to the local Sunday School, thus encouraging a perfect attendance, and that local averages be figured and any awards be given in recognition of the same.

2. Be it resolved, that all pastors and evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the Camp and Conference, and that if any minister does not attend Camp and Conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for the absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be dealt with by the council.

3. Be it resolved that the Conference year begins July 1, and ends on June 30 of each year, and that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician by July 10.

4. Be it resolved that the time of the sittings of the District Conference be from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and the afternoon sitting be from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.

5. Be it resolved, that the first 10 seats in the center section, the platform and the booth constitute the Conference Bar.

6. Be it resolved, that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers' duties are adopted.

7. Resolved, that all our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.

8. Be it resolved, that each pastor shall endeavor to bring the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription list up to a number equal to or greater than the membership of the church.

9. Resolved, that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.

10. Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of the standards of our church, therefore:

Be it resolved that: The Illinois District Conference call attention to page 35, section 65 of our Manual which reads, "Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing the immodest forms of dress so current today; such as: sun-suits, shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public places in shorts or without shirts."

11. Inasmuch as television is rapidly becoming a daily habit and an open door for infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever-increasing number of homes in America;

Therefore be it resolved that we as a District go on record as being opposed to the use and or ownership of a television set.

12. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time, and that there be five members on each Ways and Means and Resolutions Committee.

13. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.

14. Be it resolved, that the District be zoned and the boundaries apply to the Ministerial, Youth, and Sunday School Departments. Be it further resolved, that the District Superintendent appoint Ministerial and Sunday School Zone Chairmen and that the Zone Chairmen and the District Superintendent be authorized to arrange Zone meetings as they deem advisable, and that a Zone Secretary and Treasurer be elected at the first meeting of the year.

15. Whereas it is helpful to a better understanding among our people who contribute to the support of our work and: Whereas the District handles this money as a public trust; Be it resolved, that the District Treasurer give a statement in totals of disbursements in his annual report of District Home Missionary funds, the same to be placed in the Conference Minutes.

16. Be it resolved, that all resolutions retained in the minutes from year to year be listed under "Standing rules" and all new resolutions be listed as "Conference rules" for one year, after that, all that are retained be placed under "Standing Rules."

17. We recommend, that all cabin owners get together and file for tax exemption on their cabins.

18. We recommend that the action of the 1962 General Conference be adopted (Sunday School and Youth Quadrennial Goals, 1962-1966.)

1. Sunday School enrollment gain of 2% per month.

2. Average weekly Sunday attendance of 80% of enrollment.

3. Teacher Training Course annually conducted for each church.

4. Sunday Schools organized and conducted by the **STANDARD of EXCELLENCE**.

5. Worship opportunities provided for children of junior age and younger.

6. Full scale participation in the 1960-1970 Decade of Progress program for Sunday School growth.

7. Youth Societies graded and organized to serve three age levels in the 12-35 year old limit.

8. Development of new fields of service through youth and Bible clubs.

19. Be it resolved, that the Council be given authority to take the necessary steps to take out Camp Insurance.

20. Be it resolved that this Conference delegate authority to the

District Council to make necessary repairs and improvements on the campgrounds.

21. Be it resolved that the Sunday School Board in conjunction with the District Superintendent set up the following goals for each of our Sunday Schools to reach the quadrennial goals as set by the 1958 General Conference:

Argo, 140; Asbury, 45; Bloomington, 75; Bridgeport, 170; Casey, 40; Centralia, 30; Charleston, 155; Chicago, 65; Coffeyville, 60; Decatur First, 135; Decatur Second, 75; Galesburg, 70; Gibson City, 40; Janesville, 50; Jerseyville, 40; Joliet, 155; Lawrenceville, 170; Marshall, 100; Mason, 35; Martinsville, 50; Mt. Vernon, 45; Oblong, 90; Olney, 80; Onarga, 60; Ottawa, 100; Palestine, 125; Pleasant Hill, 70; Robinson, 70; Ste. Marie, 30; Springfield, 60; Streator, 25; Tuscola, 25; Wood River, 75; Zion, 75. Total 2,660.

22. Whereas, the General Conference has set up a United Stewardship Fund to care for a part of the expense of operating the General Church, and Whereas, the Manual states on page 82, paragraph 8 that, Any pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference, and Whereas, this rule must be enforced beginning with our next annual conference, therefore Be it resolved, that we as a conference set the month of September as United Stewardship Fund month. Be it further resolved that an offering be taken in each church in this conference sometime during said month for said fund. This is primarily to aid churches that are struggling to pay their United Stewardship Fund. Churches that have a workable system in operation that is enabling them to meet this obligation to the general church need not feel under obligation to take such an offering.

23. Be it resolved that all licensed Ministers meet with the examining board not later than the last Saturday of the Camp Meeting.

24. Be it resolved that the Ministerial Convention convene the first Tuesday evening through Thursday afternoon of April. The place to be chosen from invitations from the Churches.

25. Be it resolved that all members being received into the Local Pilgrim Holiness Church, that their attention should be called to Section 155, Article 2, and Section 69 of the 1958 Pilgrim Holiness Manual.

26. Be it resolved that this Conference approve of our Churches making application for and borrowing money from the General Church Pilgrim Pension Loan Fund. This to be in accordance with the Manual.

27. As the Illinois conference is incorporated be it resolved that the district Superintendent be authorized to make the annual report of the corporation as required by the state. The period of reporting is from January 15 to the last day of February each year.

28. That the District Council as elected from year to year be the district trustees in accordance with the articles of incorporation.

29. That in the event of death or hospitalization of any of our active ministers or wives, flowers shall be sent by the district treasurer. The district Superintendent is to be notified in either event of the above. All carefulness should be taken about notifying the district Superintendent so there will be no misunderstanding.

30. Be it resolved that the Ordination service be held each year, on Monday at 1:00 p. m.

31. In as much as time is limited for the committees to meet and discuss resolutions, be it resolved that all new resolutions either to the Ways and Means or the Resolutions committee be mailed to the chairman before camp or placed in his hands within the first four days of the meeting. Resolutions are to be passed upon by said committee and placed in a public place for the Conference members to study before Conference.

32. We recommend that the District Camp committee for the Camp ground for the purpose of re-locating, consist of the District Superintendent and his Assistant, and three members other than the Council, which they shall appoint.

CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that our camp Meeting begin the first Friday in August of each year.
2. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint someone to patrol the camp grounds during the Meeting and to be hereafter enforced.
3. Be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the Camp to the Churches and that each Church respond with such needed items as requested
4. Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds without special written permission from the Dean of men or the Matron of women, or accompanied by their parents. They shall be required to attend Young Peoples and evening services. Failure to keep this rule will forfeit their privilege of remaining in camp. There shall be a Dean of men and a Matron of women appointed by the District Council who shall be responsible to enforce this rule. Be it further resolved that this resolution be printed, and copies given to each one registering.
5. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.
6. Inasmuch as so many children are on the grounds throughout the camp meeting, therefore be it resolved, that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.
7. Be it resolved, that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.
8. Be it resolved that all dormitory reservations be declared non-transferable, as long as the present holders occupy them. When the holders of said reservations secure lodging elsewhere, the former reservation shall be turned to the one in charge. Those having reservations, and those desiring reservations, shall write to the one in charge of rooms, within 60 days and not later than 30 days, prior to the coming camp meeting.

Be it further resolved, in as much as all dormitories are the property of the District, that rooms in said dorms shall be made available, to be used as deemed advisable at any time, and be used or rented when not occupied by the person holding reservations.
9. Be it resolved, that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall. Be it further resolved the District Council be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.
10. Be it resolved that all ministers and their wives who are physically able be available for work during Camp. Be it further resolved that those who choose not to work shall be charged a stipulated amount set by the District Council.
11. Be it resolved, that we urge each church that is able to do so to build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor and delegate. Be it further resolved, that a lot shall be furnished free to each church completing said building prior to our next annual Camp. The type and location of said cottage to be agreed upon by the church and the District Council.

NEW RESOLUTIONS

1. Whereas each year there are more workers signed up for work than are needed, rendering it impossible to use them all, be it resolved that only the required number be engaged. Be it further resolved that these be accepted on a first come, first served basis, and that the department heads reserve the right to interview and reject any who would not serve his or her department in the best interest.
2. Whereas there is a growing concern about the future of the camp ground, and the possibilities of our worships being hindered due to being surrounded by residence, and the State College; furthermore, under these conditions, our people are not concerned about improving our present property, or adding to; therefore, be it resolved that the District Council endeavor to sell the camp property for the purpose of relocating.

3. Be it resolved that resolution No. 2, on page 15, in New Resolutions, stay in effect, and that the same ones who have been appointed remain on this committee until their duties be discharged, and that the District Superintendent have the power to fill any vacancy on this committee that may arise.

4. In as much as transistor radios have become so distracting, and such a hindrance to the spiritual atmosphere of our camp, therefore we recommend that their use on the camp ground be abandoned.

5. Be it resolved that all churches with a membership of 15 or more be responsible for two sets of service for eight, stainless steel ware, and churches with membership of less than 15, be responsible for one set, to be used in the dining hall.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend each church in the District shall raise an amount equal to \$8.00 per member per year for the United Stewardship Fund, to conform with the action of the 1962 General Conference, to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer. (This amount is pro-rated by the General Treasurer as follows: Administration, 38% or \$3.04; Church Extension, 30% or \$2.40; Liberal Arts College, 22% or \$1.76; Sunday Schools and Youth, 6% or 48 cents; Church Extension Loan Fund, 2% or 16 cents; and Contingent, 2% or 16 cents.

It was further recommended that 5% of the total receipts of the Youth Society be contributed to the support of the Department of Sunday Schools and Youth.

2. Whereas the Manual is specific in delegating the joint responsibility of the District Superintendent and the local church board, in the matter of the Pastor's salary, therefore be it resolved that the District Superintendent meet annually with the local church board to give due consideration to the pastor's salary.

Be it further resolved that at said meeting the District Superintendent diligently promote the practice of paying the pastor's travel expense, connected with his pastoral duties.

3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church and Sunday School offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents and evangelists, and that the District Budget be pro-rated as follows, District Expense Fund, 80%; District Home Missions, 15%; General Conference Expense, 3% and Frankfort Pilgrim College, 2%. We further recommend that in the event the General Conference Funds prove inadequate to meet the expenses of the coming General Conference, that this Conference authorize the District Council to make an appeal to the churches for a special offering for this purpose.

4. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,960 per year and 7c per mile traveling expense.

5. We recommend that the District Council Members, Home Missionary Committee, and all special committees be paid the sum of 7 cents per mile for traveling expense while rendering service for the District.

6. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as District Statistician, and be paid the sum of \$100 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer be paid the sum of \$330 per year.

7. We recommend that each local church shall pay into the Camp Meeting Fund the sum of ten (\$10) dollars for each delegate attending the Conference, said sum to be applied to the expenses of the camp meeting and Conference.

8. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating devices, that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

9. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks' vacation with salary, which shall include two Sundays.

10. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone.

11. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent, in the

absence of the District Superintendent, be paid the sum of \$10.00 per day, plus 7c per mile traveling expenses while rendering service for the District or Camp Meeting.

12. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50; little dormitory rooms, \$3.50; third floor, \$1.50 per cot. We further recommend that the electric rate shall be: All cottages, cabins or trailers, a minimum of \$1.00, plus 25c for each appliance; rooms in dormitories 25c per appliance in addition to room rent.

13. We recommend that District letterheads be printed, the amount to be decided by the District Council.

14. We recommend that the District Council appoint a district Home Missionary Committee of three, and the District Superintendent act as chairman. We further recommend that the expense of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary work.

15. We recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2.00 per member to meet the indebtedness of the District parsonage.

16. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School Program; we recommend that each Sunday School in the district send the Sunday School Promotional Secretary the amount of four (\$4) dollars as soon after conference as possible, said four dollars per church, plus Camp Meeting Sunday School Offerings, and District Sunday School Convention Offerings, constituting the District Sunday Promotional Fund.

17. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid a salary of \$50 per year, plus all incidental expenses, to be paid from the District Sunday School Fund.

18. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay utilities at the District parsonage, consisting of lights, gas, fuel, water, and telephone.

19. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay District postage expense.

20. We recommend that the District minutes be paid for out of the District funds, and that each church shall be charged for the number of copies of the minutes they receive, and that as they are paid for, the money shall be replaced in said funds.

21. Whereas the Loan Fund has proved to be such a blessing in the General Church Extension Department, and other Districts have likewise been helped in the promotion of Home Missions; we therefore recommend that we set up a District Loan Fund. We also recommend that funds from wills, gifts, legacies, etc. be placed in this fund. We further recommend that the District Council or a committee be appointed to formulate rules and by-laws governing this fund. Rate of interest and churches to which loans are made and all business be delegated to said Council of Committee. (We recommend 3% interest).

22. Whereas many of our ministers and wives who are eligible for membership in the Ministerial Benefit Association are not members. We recommend that all eligible pastors and wives become members of the Association, and that each church pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife. We further recommend that the District Treasurer carry out the same provision for the District Superintendent.

REPORT OF THE AUDITING COMMITTEE

We the Auditing Committee of the Illinois Conference, wish to report that we have examined and checked the books of the District Treasurer, the District Camp Meeting Treasurer, and the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary and Treasurer, and have found them correct and in excellent condition.

REPORT FROM THE CHURCHES

CHARLESTON—The church has purchased a new piano for the church valued at \$920.00; also purchased a bus for the Sunday School, for \$200.00; also has built a new parsonage valued at \$14,500. The indebtedness on the parsonage now is \$7,992.00.

DECATUR NO. 1—The church here has installed a new roof on part of the church, resurfaced the driveways with white rock, also installed white aluminum siding on the parsonage, with a number of other improvements, at an estimated cost of \$613.39.

GALESBURG—The parsonage here was redecorated, enclosing the basement entrance. The young people's auditorium in the church has been redecorated, also two heavy glass doors in front entrance of the church have been installed, also a new power mower has been purchased.

The spiritual condition of the church is very good. The last quarter of this year we had 26 plus % gain in Sunday School, and a 13% gain in Sunday School for the year. We are grateful to God for all He has helped us do, and we are looking forward to a greater year this coming year.

JANESVILLE—The folk here at Janesville are very thankful for their accomplishments this past year. At this time a year ago the church owed \$2700.00 on their parsonage. God has helped them to pay off the indebtedness and had a mortgage burning and also a dedication of the parsonage. A new ceiling fan has been installed in the church at an estimated cost of \$95.00. They are now planning for the remodeling of the church, putting on new siding, lowering the roof, and possibly lowering the ceiling, and purchasing new pews when possible. They have a long range program set up and feel as long as they put the spiritual condition of the community first, that God will be pleased to help them to accomplish the program so stated. They are now in the process of installing insulation in the attic of the church, and a new hot water system. They still are in their farming program, which has been very successful and beneficial in paying off the debts and bills. Funds are on hand to pay for the heating equipment and insulation, plus a crib of about 1000 bushels of corn from last year. Liberal donations have made life pleasant. For it is written, "It is more blessed to give than to receive", therefore they shall have a greater blessing.

Most of all they are grateful to the Lord for the wonderful revival, which He gave them this past Spring. They had been asking Him to give a revival so that the community would know that He still lived and answered prayer, one that they would know about. He did that very thing. Twelve of their Sunday School scholars were converted. It was an unusual meeting and was the first of its kind there for 27 years. It lasted four weeks. Some were converted at the altar of the church, one in the parsonage; a school teacher prayed through on the way to teach school; one prayed through on his bed—after all God put him flat on his back to open his eyes. At this time all but one are still following the Lord. To the churches of the Illinois District, take courage, God still hears and answers prayers if our motives are right, our desires pure, and unselfish and we pray and ask according to His WILL. Let us pray that God will give the Illinois district a revival that every pastor and church will feel the benefits from.

PALESTINE: The church built new concrete steps at the parsonage, installed two rest rooms in the basement of the church, at an estimated cost of \$671.84.

COFFEYVILLE: The church has put a new roof on part of the parsonage, ceiled two rooms with sheet rock, redecorated the inside of the parsonage, built one large wardrobe, sanded and refinished all the floors, installed one storm door, one medicine cabinet, one 500 gal. L.P. gas tank, and heating units, insulated all water pipes, put in some sewer, put 20 tons of white rock on the drive.

Painted the outside of the church, worked over all the windows, doors and ceiling fans, purchased one power mower, estimated cost of \$1200.00.

The remaining debt is \$697.21. Most of all God's presence has been manifested in all of the services and among the people, for which they are very thankful.

LAWRENCEVILLE—The church here has built an addition to the church, changed the front of the church, installed new rest rooms, and a nursery, an estimated value of \$10,000.00. Had dedication and a corner laying service June 3, 1962.

MARTINSVILLE—The old chimney on the church was torn down, the roof repaired, painted the church on the outside (most of this labor was donated), gravel on the driveway around the church; this was donated by the city. The estimated cost was \$120.00.

OTTAWA—The church here has installed eave trough and down spout on the parsonage, also some minor improvements in the parsonage basement, estimated cost of \$225.00. Also put masonite on the floors of three Sunday School rooms, preparing them for floor covering; estimated cost of \$60.00.

SPRINGFIELD—The church has purchased some good seats for the main auditorium of the church, purchased another piano, painted the church, redecorated the parsonage, some donations of some kitchen utensils in the parsonage, estimated cost of \$300.15.

STE. MARIE—The Ste. Marie church has just finished an extensive exterior improvement, installed on the church thick, imitation block siding; aluminum storm windows, of double track design, were installed in eight windows and an aluminum storm door was installed in the back door; estimated cost of \$1500.00.

URBANA—The church here has purchased 24 folding chairs for the church and Sunday School use, estimated cost of \$75.00. Installed an air conditioner and wiring, estimated cost of \$450.00. Also purchased two new pulpit chairs, painted and reconditioned window screens with aluminum screen; black dirt was used in back of church lawn for fill; two new front doors were installed; new sump pump was installed in the church basement; the parsonage apartment was redecorated and a refrigerator was purchased, estimated cost \$291.05.

MASON—The folk here have built a new church, a frame building 64 x 32 feet, directly North of route 37 in Mason on the lots just North of the parsonage. Its features are an auditorium 32' x 35', four class rooms, two rest rooms, a utility room and a furnace room. The seats were repainted to blend with the trim of the interior. The parsonage kitchen has been remodeled, sheet rock put on the walls, vinyl tile blocks on the floor, wall covering and painted, new light fixtures installed.

Most of the work was done by the pastor, Rev. James Sneed and men of the church and friends of the church. The estimated valuation of the church is \$12,000 and the parsonage \$6,000.

NEW PARSONAGES—Charleston has built a new parsonage this year; estimated value of \$14,500 dollars.

NEW CHURCHES—The folk at Mason have built a new church near the parsonage

The folk at Decatur No. 2 have sold their church to the colored folk and have purchased another property on Route 51. This house has been revamped and will be used as a church until they can build a church. They moved to the new location this past week. Soon they will have a dedication and day of open house.

DISTRICT PARSONAGE—The kitchen of the District Parsonage has been enlarged and revamped, with birch cabinets across the end. This surely has been a great improvement.

CAMP GROUND—A new 2 inch water line has been installed on the camp ground. This was very much needed. The men's rest room has been modernized. The sanitary sewer run down through the camp ground, as

per easement given of last year, has made this possible. Some improvement has been made on the crossing near the entrance of the road to the camp ground.

A new hot water heater has been installed in the kitchen,; also some needed kitchen utensils have been purchased. Some of the kitchen tables have been covered with linoleum, which was needed badly.

The appearance of the camp ground is very good, which was by the hard work of our good caretaker, Bro. Don A. Young.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Rev. William H. Neff, General Superintendent, our presiding officer, fellow ministers, delegates and friends: It is with a feeling of sincere gratitude and praise to our all-wise and gracious heavenly Father, who through and by His good providence has brought us together in the capacity of this District Conference called in session at Charleston, Illinois August the 13th, 1962.

Since we assembled together a year ago on these sacred grounds to transact business, lay plans and legislate for another year's activities in the great work of the Lord, many of our fellow laborers have finished their day, laid down their cross and answered the summons to a better and more glorious country where heartaches, misunderstandings and sorrows are unknown. Many of them labored long and hard, fought long and hard, fought many battles and suffered many things while in this world of time, but their conflicts with a merciless devil and an unfriendly world are forever ended. They have been promoted from the ripened fields of service and are now identified with the church triumphant, celebrating the everlasting victory with all tears wiped from their eyes.

Ministers, Sunday school superintendents, teachers and Sunday school leaders of the Illinois District, our day is not yet done. Their homegoing has not relieved us of our grave and momentous responsibility. The lost sheep is to be sought and found lest it sink forever into eternity's night and perish, and the command of the Master is go. I know of no greater avenue

through which this is to be done than through the open channel of Sunday schools. Time is running out, our sun is setting, and the night when no man shall work may be closer than we think. May the spirit of the song writer so possess our hearts that we shall say,

"Until then with joy I'll go on singing,
Until then with joy I'll carry on

We find ourselves thrust into a fierce and violent battle between Christianity and Communism. REPORT OF SOUTHERN ZONE LEADER 1961-1962

Rev. Abbott, Rev. Hall, District Youth President, Youth Leaders, Pastors, Delegates and friends:

In the Southern Zone we had 5 rallies with an average attendance of 145. This is a loss of 9 from last year, but we are happy to report a good increase in percentage of youth attending the rallies. Last year we reported 39.3% of youth in attendance; this year we can report 43.4% youth in attendance. This means we are getting close to half of our attendance from our youth bracket of 12 to 35.

Instead of using the banner for an attendance booster, we used a lighted picture of Christ which was passed around during the year to the church with the most points at the rally and given permanently to the church with the highest total points for the year. Oblong, with 538 points, was the winner for the year. Bridgeport was close with 511 points and Lawrenceville was third with 373 points.

A short time was spent in a Scripture Drill at each rally for those between the ages of 12 through 18. One point was given to the person for each correct answer. The one with the most points at the end of the year had his or her registration fee paid to the youth camp or given an award of the same value. Shirley Jordan of Oblong was in first place with 12 points. Arlene Shew of Palestine and Hazel Wachenschwanz of Lawrenceville both tied for second place with six points each. Shirley attended the youth camp.

Our zone has sent \$115.35 to the district treasurer and received for expenses: \$10.00 for a speaker, \$12.13 for awards, and \$1.21 for postage expense, making a total of \$23.34 for expenses and leaving a balance of \$92.04 for the Youth Camp from the Southern Zone.

I wish to thank everyone for their prayers and cooperation during the past year.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. Be it resolved that District Youth minutes be printed under same cover as the District Minutes and that the district treasurer be authorized to pay the amount for printing same from the District youth treasurer.

2. In as much as action was taken by the General board to grant the National Sunday School Convention to be held at Indianapolis, Indiana August 28-30 and that the General Sunday School and Youth Secretary has called a business meeting of the District Youth Presidents at the time of this Convention and that our District Youth President is expected to attend, be it resolved the expenses of our Youth President to this meeting be paid by the District Youth Treasurer from the District Youth Funds.

3. Be it resolved that for the purpose of financing the Illinois District Youth Program including the annual youth camps, that each zone shall contribute within 30 days of zone rally to the District Youth Treasurer an amount equal to 50% of all offerings received in zone meetings.

4. Be it resolved that District Youth Officers be paid travel expenses in the discharge of official duties for the district at the rate set for the district superintendent.

RULES OF THE ILLINOIS DISTRICT PILGRIM YOUTH SOCIETY

1. The Southern Zone should have their zone rally the first Friday of each month; South Central second Friday of each month; North Central third Friday of each month and Northern the fourth Friday of each month.

2. Zone Rallies are to be held each month except July and August and optional in December and January.

3. At the first zone meeting in each zone there shall be the installation of zone chairman and there shall be an election of assistant zone chairman, zone secretary and zone treasurer.

4. The following officers shall serve as the executive committee for the zone; the zone chairman, assistant zone chairman, secretary and treasurer. This committee shall serve as the planning committee for the zone and shall promote the programs of the general church, district and zone interest.

5. Each zone secretary should mail out cards to each church in his zone at least nine (9) days before rally, stating what they intend to have for the rally. Cards to be sent to pastors, D. Y. President, District Superintendent and youth president or Sunday School Superintendent of each church.

6. Each church to send at least one young person to represent said church to each zone rally in their zone, regardless of revival or other special meetings going on in their church at time of rally.

7. Each zone shall contribute within 30 days of zone rally to the District Youth Treasurer an amount equal to 50% of all offerings received in zone meetings.

8. All money pertaining to district youth should be sent to the District Youth Treasurer and all District expenses paid by check.

9. If for any reason neither the zone Chairman, Assistant Zone Chairman nor District Youth President is present to conduct rally the pastor of the church where rally is being held or the local youth president shall be in charge.

10. The District Youth Secretary shall send a copy of all Youth Council meetings to District Superintendent, District Youth President and Youth Council members.

11. Each church shall send a special offering by the 15th of July for the expenses of the District Youth Convention and Conference. The balance if any to be retained in the District Youth Treasury to be used in District Youth Work.
