

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Forty-first Annual Conference of the Illinois District, of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 12, 1963 at 8:00 a.m.

The Conference was opened by singing, "The Solid Rock," led by Rev. C. L. Oden. Rev. E. O. Howell led the Conference in the opening prayer.

After a few opening remarks, Rev. W. E. Hall, introduced Rev. J. D. Abbott, the General Secretary Treasurer, as chairman of the conference.

Brother Abbott read scripture from the book of Ephesians, chapter 5, verses 25-27, and spoke to the conference, concerning the church and its various methods. He emphasized God's plan for the church, and gave six important thoughts pertaining to the church; (1) The church should be Spirit filled, (2) It should be a Missionary organization, (3) It should be a praying organization, (4) It should be a united organization, (5) It should be a giving organization. (6) It should be a glorious organization.

In proceeding with the conference business, the secretary read the roll with 78 present.

A motion carried, to accept names given to fill the vacancies as lay delegates.

The reception committee, introduced Rev. Forrest Adams, and Rev. Estel Eckart to the conference, and a motion carried to accept them into the conference.

The chairman requested, that all members of the conference, move with in the conference bar.

The chairman permitted Brother Hall, to appoint Sister Meyer, to fill the vacancy on the reception committee of Sister Rogers.

The District Superintendent read his personal report, of which was full of activity for the year. He further gave a report concerning the improvements that have been made on the camp ground. A motion carried to accent this report, with deep appreciation.

The Assistant Superintendent, Rev. L. A. Williams, gave an oral report, concerning his activities for the year. A motion carried to accept this report.

The Auditing committee gave their report, and voted approved by the conference.

A motion was made and seconded to nermit the District Treasurer to give totals only as his report. Voted approved.

Brother Oden gave the District Treasurer's renort. Brother Abbott nointed out the districts standing in contributing to the United Stewardship Fund. He stated, that we as a District rated second with all districts. A motion carried, to accept the District Treasurer's report.

Brother Oden the camp treasurer gave his report, and it was voted to accept this report with deep appreciation.

The District Sunday school promotional secretary, gave his report and it was accepted with appreciation.

A summary of the Districts statistical report was read, and accepted as read

A motion carried, to recess for ten (10) minutes.

Conference reconvered at the call of the chairman, by singing a verse and chorus of, "I Pressing On."

Pastor's personal reports were read to the conference, as the District secretary called their names.

A motion carried, to change the time for the Ordination service from $1:00\ p.$ m. to $4:00\ p.$ m.

A motion carried, to reconvene at the time that the bell should following the noon hour.

Conference recessed, by the expiration of time, for lunch.

Second Sitting

Conference reconvened at the call of the chairman, by singing, "Down At The Cross," and "My faith looks up to Thee." The secretary read the minutes of the first sitting, and stood approved as read.

There was a continuation of the reading of the Pastors' personal report at this time.

The Chairman made a few comments pertaining to the pastors' reports.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. James Hertel, President of Frankfort Pilgrim College to the conference, and granted him an honorary seat within the conference bar.

Brother Hertel spoke to the conference, concerning the progress that has been made at the school.

The memorial committee, read their report. This report was approved by standing with head bowed, while Brother Abbott led in prayer.

The resolution committee read their report. Part No. 1 under new reso'utions in resolution number one, was ruled out. Part No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4 of resolution number one was accepted as read.

Resolution No. 2 was accepted as amended.

Resolution No. 3 was accepted as read.

Resolution No. 4 lost.

Resolution No. 5 lost for the want of a motion to accept.

Resolution No. 6 was tabled for future consideration.

Resolution No. 21, under standing resolutions was deleted. A motion carried, to delete No. 22 under standing resolutions.

No. 25 under standing resolutions be redrafted, to comply with the manual.

No. 8 under camp meeting resolutions accepted as read. No. 6 under new resolutions was brought back to the floor, and a motion was made to add No. 6 under new resolutions, to No. 8 under camp meeting resolutions. Voted approved.

A motion was made and seconded, to delete all resolutions pertaining to the selling of the camp grounds, and re'ocating, and that we settle down, with no intention to sell. Motion carried.

The Educational and Examining board read their reports, and stood

A motion carried, that we recess for 10 minutes, and that we reconvene at 4:00 p. m.

Ordination service was held, with Brother Gray leading the conference in singing, "A Charge To Keep I Have." Brother Callaway led the Conference in prayer. Brother Gray then led the conference in singing "Rock Of Ages." The following scriptures were read, I Timothy 3: 11-13, by Rev. James Taylor: 2 Timothy 4: 1-8, by Rev. C. L. Oden; and Titus 3: 1-11, by Rev. L. A. Williams.

Rev. W. E. Hall presented the candidates to be Ordained, to the chairman, Rev. J. D. Abbott.

After reading the scripture from I Corinthians 1: 26-29, Brother Abbott spoke concerning our conduct; In the home; In the pulpit: and among the other Brethren. He emphasized the great dangers that prevail along these lines.

The chairman, Rev. J. D. Abbott, along with the Ordination Council which consisted of Rev. W. E. Hall; Rev. L. A. Williams; Rev. C. L. Oden; Rev. Sylvan Callaway and Rev. James Taylor, proceeded to the altar. Brother Abbott read the rules pertaining to Ordain Ministers from the Pilgrim Holiness Church manual. Following the reading of the rules, Brother L. A. Williams offered the Ordination prayer. Brother Abbott, along with the Ordination council, laid their hands upon the candidates as Brother Abbott gave the commission from the manual. Brother Hall gave the benediction.

A motion carried, to reconvene at 6:00 p. m.

The conference recessed until 6:00 p. m.

Third Sitting

Conference reconvened at 6:00 p. m. at the call of the chairman. Brother Abbott led the conference in singing, "Showers of Blessing." The secretary read the minutes of the second sitting, and they stood approved as read.

The resolution committee read a partial report. A motion carried to

accept this report.

The Ways and Means committee reported as follow, No. 7 under ways and means to be changed to read, camp treasurer instead of District treasurer. A motion carried, to accept No. 7 as changed.

A motion carried to delete No. 21.

The remaining pastor's personal reports were read. The Examining board read their recommendations for Evangelist. Accepted as read.

Brother Hall appointed the tellers, and the chairman proceeded with the election of the following officers:

Memorial Committee: Mrs. Chloie Meeks and Mrs. Forrest Adams, Reception Committee: Mrs. Howard Williams, and Rev. Elva Lancaster.

Brother Hall then read the pastoral appointments.

After invitations for the Ministerial Convention were ested for it was voted to accept the Mason church's invitation for the Convention Brother Hall expressed his appreciation to Brother Abbott, and had the conference to give him a rising vote of appreciation as Chairman. A motion carried to adjourn, and Brother Oden gave the benediction.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Inasmuch as the General Board has ruled that all our District Camps shall provide for Sunday School to be conducted on the Camp Grounds each Sunday of the Camp. Therefore be it resolved, that there shall be a Sunday School service conducted on this Camp Ground each Sunday at the Camp. The Sunday School Committee to be in charge of the same, and that suitable cards of recognition be given to all who attend, denoting their presence at the Camp Sunday School. These cards to be returned to the local Sunday School thus ancouncing a profest attendance. returned to the local Sunday School, thus encouraging a perfect attendance, and that local averages be figured and any awards be given in recognition of the same.
- 2. Be it resolved, that all pastors and evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the Camp and Conference, and that if any minister does not attend Camp and Conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for the absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be dealt with by the council.
- 3. Be it resolved, that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers' duties are adopted.
- 4. Resolved, that all our preachers and laity secure respectively, a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.
 - 5. Be it resolved, that each pastor shall endeavor to bring the Pilgrim

Holiness Advocate subscription list up to a number equal to or greater than the membership of the church.

- 6. Resolved, that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.
- 7. Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of the standards of our church, therefore:
- Be it resolved that: The Illinois District Conference call attention ty page 35, section 65 of our Manual which reads, "Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Poliness Church are not to appear in public wearing the immodest forms dress so current today; such as: sun-suits, shorts, dresses of immodest ngth, slacks or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public places in shorts or without shirts."
- 8. Inasmuch as television is rapidly becoming a daily habit and an open door for infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever-increasing number of homes in America;

Therefore be it resolved that we as a District go on record as being opposed to the use and or ownership of a television set.

- 9. Be it resolved, that the District Superinterdent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time, and that there be five members on each Ways and Means and Resolutions Committee.
- 10. Be is resolved, that the District Superintendent devote at least eleven months of his time to the District work.
- 11. Be it resolved, that the District be zoned and the boundaries apply to the Ministerial, Youth, and Sunday School Departments. Be it further resolved, that the District Superintendent appoint Ministerial and Sunday School Zone Chairmen and that the Zone Chairmen and the District Superintendent be authorized to arrange Zone meetings as they deem advisable, and that a Zone Secretary and Treasurer be elected at the first meeting of the year.
- 12. Whereas it is helpful to a better understanding among our neonle who contribute to the support of our work and: Whereas the District handles this money as a public trust; Be it resolved, that the District Treasurer give a statement in totals of disbursements in his annual report of District Home Missionary funds, the same to be placed in the Conference Minutes.
- 13. Be it resolved, that all resolutions retained in the minutes from year to year be listed under "Standing rules" and all new resolutions be listed as "Conference rules" for one year, after that, all that are retained be placed under "Standing Rules."
- 14. We recommend, that all cabin owners get together and file for tax exemption on their cabins.
- 15. We recommend that the action of the 1°62 General Conference be adopted (Sunday School and Youth Quadrennial Goals, 1962-1966.)

 1. Sunday School enrollment gain of 2% per month.

 - 2. Average weekly Sunday School attendance of 80% of enrollment.
 3. Teacher Training Course annually conducted for each church.
- 4. Sunday Schools organized and conducted by the STANDARD of EXCELLENCE.
- 5. Worship opportunities provided for children of junior age and younger.
- 6. Full scale participation in the 1960-1970 Decade of Progress program for Sunday School growth.
- 7. Youth Societies graded and organized to serve three age levels in the 12-35 year old limit.
 - 8. Development of new fields of service through youth and Bible clubs.
- 16. Be it resolved, that the Council be given authority to take the necessary steps to take out Camp Insurance.
- 17. Be it resolved that this Conference delegate authority to the District Council to make necessary repairs and improvements on the campgrounds.

- 18. Be it resolved that the Ministerial Convention convene the first Tuesday evening through Thursday afternoon of April. The place to be chosen from invitations from the Churches.
- 19. Be it resolved, that all members being received into the local Pilgrim Holiness Church, that their attention should be called to Section 144, Article 2, and Section 54 of the 1962 Pilgrim Holiness Manual.
- 20. Be it resolved that this Conference approve of our Churches making application for and borrowing money from the General Church Pilgrim Pension Loan Fund. This to be in accordance with the Manual.
- 21. As the Illinois conference is incorporated be it resolved that the district Superintendent be authorized to make the annual report of the corporation as required by the state. The period of reporting is from January 15 to the last day of February each year.
- 22. That the District Council as elected from year to year be the district trustees in accordance with the articles of incorporation.
- 23. That in the event of death or hospitalization of any of our active ministers or wives, flowers shall be sent by the district treasurer. The district Superintendent is to be notified in either event of the above. All carefulness should be taken about notifying the district Superintendent so there will be no misunderstanding.
- 24. In as much as time is limited for the committees to meet and discuss resolutions, be it resolved that all new resolutions either to the Ways and Means or the Resolutions committee be mailed to the chairman before camp or placed in his hands within the first four days of the meeting. Resolutions are to be passed upon by said committee and placed in a public place for the Conference members to study before Conference.

CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Be it resolved that our camp Meeting begin the first Friday in August of each year.
- 2. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint someone to patrol the camp grounds during the Meeting and to be hereafter enforced.
- 3. Be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the Camp to the Churches and that each Church respond with such needed items as requested
- 4. Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds without special written permission from the Dean of men or the Matron of women, or accompanied by their parents. They shall be required to attend Young Peoples and evening services. Failure to keep this rule will forfeit their privilege of remaining in camp. There shall be a Dean of men and a Matron of women appointed by the District Council who shall be responsible to enforce this rule. Be it further resolved that this resolution be printed, and copies given to each one registering.
- 5. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.
- 6. Inasmuch as so many children are on the grounds throughout the camp meeting, therefore be it resolved, that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.
- 7. Be it resolved, that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.
- 8. Be it resolved that all dormitory reservations be declared non-transferable, as long as the present holders occupy them. When the holders of said reservations secure lodging elsewhere, the former reservation shall be turned to the one in charge. Those having room reservations shall receive cards from the registrar 30 days before camp, these to be returned to the one in charge of reservations. If not returned before camp, these rooms shall be rented. Said cards and postage shall be furnished by the camp, for the registrar.

Be it further resolved, in as much as all dormitories are the property

of the District, that rooms in said dorms shall be made available, to be used as deemed advisable at any time, and be used or rented when not occupied by the person holding reservations.

- 9. Be it resolved, that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall. Be it further resolved the District Council be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.
- 40. Be it resolved that all ministers and their wives who are physically able be available for work during Camp. Be it further resolved that those who choose not to work shall be charged a stipulated amount set by the District Council.
- 11. Be it resolved, that we urge each church that is able to do so to build a cottage on the camp ground for their pastor and delegate. Be is further resolved, that a lot shall be furnished free to each courch completing said building prior to our next annual Camp. The type and location of said cottage to be agreed upon by the church and the District Council.
- 12. Whereas each year there are more workers signed up for work than are needed, rendering it impossible to use them all, be it revolved that only the required number be engaged. Be it further resolved that these be accepted on a first come, first served basis, and that the department heads reserve the right to interview and reject any who would not serve his or her department in the best interest.
- 13. In as much as transistor radios have become so distracting, and such a hindrance to the spiritual atmosphere of our camp, therefore we recommend that their use on the camp ground be abandoned.
- 14. Be it resolved that all churches with a membership of 15 or more be responsible for two sets of service for eight, stainless steel ware, and churches with membership of less than 15, be responsible for one set, to be used in the dining hall.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- 1. We recommend each church in the District shall raise an amount equal to \$8.00 per member per year for the United Stewardship Fund, to conform with the action of the 1962 General Conference, to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer. (This amount is pro-rated by the General Treasurer as follows: Administration, 38% or \$3.04; Church Extension, 30% or \$2.40; Liberal Arts College, 22% or \$1.76; Sunday Schools and Youth, 6% or 48 cents; Church Extension Loan Fund, 2% or 16 cents; and Contingent, 2% or 16 cents.
- It was further recommended that 5% of the total receipts of the Youth Society be contributed to the support of the Department of Sunday Schools and Youth.
- 2. Whereas the Manual is specific in delegating the joint responsibility of the District Superintendent and the local church board, in the matter of the Pastor's salary, therefore be it resolved that the District Superintendent meet annually with the local church board to give due consideration to the pastor's salary.

Be it further resolved that at said meeting the District Superintendent diligently promote the practice of paying the pastor's travel expense, connected with his pastoral duties.

3. We recommend that the District Budget consist of 10% of all regular Church and Sunday School offerings except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, rents and evangelists, and that the District Budget be pro-rated as follows, District Expense Fund, 80%; District Home Missions, 15%; General Conference Expense, 3% and Frankfort Pilgrim College, 2%. We further recommend that in the event the General Conference Funds prove inadequate to meet the expenses of the coming General Conference, that this Conference authorize the District Council to make an appeal to the churches for a special offering for this purpose.

- 4. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$3,960 per year and 7c per mile traveling expense.
- 5. We recommend that the District Council Members, Home Missionary Committee, and all special committees be paid the sum of 7 cents per mile for traveling expense while rendering service for the District.
- 6. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as District Statistician, and be paid the sum of \$100 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer be paid the sum of \$330 per year.
- 7. We recommend, that each church pay the sum of \$10.00, per delegate, to cover the expense during Conference, said \$10.00 to be paid to the District Treasurer
- 8. We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating devices, that provisions be made for the same by the local church.
- 9. We recommend that each church grant its pastor a two weeks' vacation with salary, which shall include two Sundays.
- 10. We recommend that each church provide its parsonage with a telephone.
- 11. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent, in the absence of the District Superintendent, be paid the sum of \$10.00 per day, plus 7c per mile traveling expenses while rendering service for the District or Camp Meeting.
- 12. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor, \$3.50; little dormitory rooms, \$3.50; third floor, \$1.50 per cot. We further recommend that the electric rate shall be: All cottages, cabins or trailers, a minimum of \$1.00, plus 25c for each appliance; rooms in dormitories 25c per appliance in addition to room rent.
- 13. We recommend that District letterheads be printed, the amount to be decided by the District Council.
- 14. We recommend that the District Council appoint a district Home Missionary Committee of three, and the District Superintendent act as chairman. We further recommend that the expense of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary work.
- 15. We recommend that the churches of this District be asked to contribute the amount of \$2.00 per member to meet the indebtedness of the District parsonage.
- 16. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School Program; we recommend that each Sunday School in the district send the Sunday School Promotional Secretary the amount of four (\$4) dollars as soon after conference as possible, said four dollars per church, plus Camp Meeting Sunday School Offerings, and District Sunday School Convention Offerings, constituting the District Sunday Promotional Fund.
- 17. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid a salary of \$50 per year, plus all incidental expenses, to be paid from the District Sunday School Fund.
- 18. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay utilities at the District parsonage, consisting of lights, gas, fuel, water, and telephone.
- 19. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay District postage expense.
- 20. We recommend that the District minutes be paid for out of the District funds, and that each church shall be charged for the number of copies of the minutes they receive, and that as they are paid for, the money shall be replaced in said funds.
- 21. Whereas many of our ministers and wives who are eligible for membership in the Ministerial Benefit Association are not members. We recommend that all eligible pastors and wives become members of the Association, and that each church pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife. We further recommend that the District Treasurer carry out the same provision for the District Superintendent.

We the Educational and Examining Boards, having met and conferred jointly, do respectively submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That Esther Deisher; L. W. Hulen; Cleon Ramsey; Lewis Russell; Phyllis Russell; and Roger Russell be Ordained.
- 2. That J. M. Adams; Vernon Munson; James Sneed; be placed in the fourth year course of study.
 - 3. That Eugene Gray, be placed in the third year course of study.
- 4. That William Breidenbaugh, be placed in the second year course of study.
- 5. That Harold Jackman; John V. White, and Golda Wheeldon be placed in the first year course of study.
- 6. That all other ministers who are pursuing their course of study, be retained in their present standing.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Annual Youth Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Charleston, Illinois, August 2, 1963 at 9:00 a.m.

The Conference was opened by the president, Rev. Jerrel Adams who in turn introduced Rev. W. E. Hall, District Superintendent to preside in the Conference.

We were led in singing "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder" by Paul Gray, after which we were led in prayer by Rev. Vernon Munson.

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT REPORT

August 2 1963.

To the Chairman, Rev. W. E. Hall, pastors, youth leaders and delegates, Greetings.

We come to you again at this time of the year when we must report for the year past. Seems only a short time ago we were gathered for such an occasion

The past year we have traveled over some 1000 miles in the interest of the District Youth. Attended the Sunday School and Youth Leaders Conference, which was held at Indianapolis, Indiana in August of 1962. We have also visited each zone at the beginning of the conference year and organized the zones. Speaker at four services and have visited each zone at least twice, except the northern. Helped make the plans for Action Day Services at Frankfort, Indiana, which we feel was very successful. The attendance was the greatest that has ever been known.

We have mailed out some 117 letters and made eight long distance calls concerning the district work. Held three Youth Council meetings and have received our expenses to date.

We just recently closed our Third annual Youth Camp. And feel that these have been worthwhile. There have been some definite victories and God has supplied all of our needs. The finance has been slow in coming in, but has been adequate for the situation. All bills which have become due are paid.

We will soon be leaving the District for duties elsewhere and will not be able to assist in the work of the State, but admonish you to cooperate and assist your new leader, whoever he may be this coming year. There is a great challenge and a tremendous responsibility when we look at the Youth that God has placed before us. What we do for them may well determine their future. Shall we not arise to the present situation, and accept the challenge. 2nd Kings, 7:3 we lead "Why set we here until we die? If we say we will enter into the city, then the famine in the city, and we shall die there; and if we sit still here we die also. Now therefore come and let us fall into the hands of the Syrians; if they save us alive we shall live; and if they kill us, we shall but die.

If we fail to do something it is certain we will die. We have faced this so forceably this past year, endeavoring to organize the zones, and scarcely able to find saved youth, members of the church, which are eligible for office. If we go to the city where we have lived; where there is a drought or famine of reaching the youth of the district, we surely will die. Let us be determined as the four leprous men were, to die rather than sit idly by and perish because we were afraid to approach the surmounting difficulties.

May I say it has been a pleasure and a real challenge the past three years to serve as District Youth President. We have failed in many ways but certainly we have appreciated your standing by and your prayers which have helped us.

May the Lord richly bless you and the district as you arise and find that the Syrians have already fled and provisions awaiting you this coming year.

At the meeting there shall be the installation of Zone Chairman. and there shall be an election of Asst. Zone Chairman, Zone Secretary and Zone Treasurer. In case he cannot be present his appointee shall serve as Chairman of the organizational meeting.
- 5. Be it resolved that the following officers shall serve as the executive committee for the zone; the Zone Chairman, Assistant Zone Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer. - 6. REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- 1. Be it resolved that District Youth Minutes be printed under same cover as the District Minutes and that the District Treasurer be authorized to pay the amount for printing same from the District Youth Treasurer.
- 2. In as much as action was taken by the General Board to grant the National Sunday School Convention to be held at Denver, Colorado, August 23-24, and that the General Sunday School and Youth Secretary has called a business meeting of the District Youth Presidents at the time of this convention and that our District Youth President is expected to at end, be it resolved the expenses of our Youth President to this meeting be paid by the District Youth President, and Sunday School Promotional Secretary, travel together and share expenses equally.

RILES OF THE ILLINOIS DISTRICT PILGRIM YOUTH SOCIETY

- 1. The Southern Zone should have their zone rally the first Friday of each month; South Central second Friday of each month; North Central third Friday of each month and Northern the fourth Friday of each month.
- 2. Zone Rallies are to be held each month except July and August and optional in December and January.
- 3. At the first zone meeting in each zone there shall be the installation of zone chairman and there shall be an election of assistant zone chairman, zone secretary, and zone treasurer.
- 4. The following officers shall serve as the executive committee for the zone: the zone chairman, assistant zone chairman, secretary and treasurer. This committee shall serve as the planning committee for the zone and shall promote the programs of the general church, district and zone interest.
- 5. Each zone secretary should mail out cards to each church in his zone at least nine (9) days before rally, stating what they intend to have for the rally. Cards to be sent to pastors, D. Y. President, District Superintendent and youth president or Sunday School Superintendent of each church.
- 6. Each church to send at least one young person to represent said church to each zone rally in their zone, regardless of revival or other special meetings going on in their church at time of rally.
- 7. Each zone shall contribute within 30 days of zone rally to the District Youth Treasurer an amount equal to 50% of all offering received in zone meetings.
- 8. All money pertaining to district youth should be sent to the District Youth Treasurer and all District expenses paid by check.
- 9. If for any reason neither the Zone Chairman, Assistant Zone Chairman nor District Youth President is present to conduct rally the pastor of the church where rally is being held or the local youth president shall be in charge.
- 10. The District Youth Secretary shall send a copy of all Youth Council meetings to District Superintendent, District Youth President and Youth Council members.
- 11. Each church shall send a special offering by the 15th of July for the expenses of the District Youth Convention and Conference. The balance, if any, to be retained in the District Youth Treasury to be used in District Youth Work.
