



#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

#### FIRST SITTING

The forty fourth Annual Conference of the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened at the Charleston Illinois camp ground, June 27, 1966 at 7 P.M. The Conference was opened with Brother Eugene Coffman leading the conference in singing "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms" and "The Comforter Has Come".

After prayer requests were given, Brother L. A. Williams led the Conference in prayer.

With a few opening remarks, Reverend W. E. Hall introduced Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, the General Superintendent, as Chairman. Brother Snyder gave a report concerning the great spirit of unity that prevailed during the International Conference. He also spoke to the Conference in regards to the day in which we now live, and the great privilege which is ours in serving such a great prayer answering God, after which Brother and Sister Eugene Coffman sang a special number in song.

In proceeding with the Conference business, a motion was made and seconded, that the Conference bar would consist of the first ten rows in the two middle sections, platform, and the sound booth. Carried.

A motion carried setting the time of the conference sessions as follows: 7 P.M. to 9:30 P.M.; 8 A.M. to 11:30 A.M. 1:30 P. M.

The District Secretary read the roll call with 54 answering the call.

Following the roll call, the District Superintendent, Rev. W. E. Hall, read his report. After listening to this good report, we must say that he has certainly carried a full schedule. A motion carried to accept this good report with deep appreciation. Brother Hall then read a list of recommendations that he wished to see carried out to the conference, and a motion carried to accept the list, and that it shall become a part of our District minutes.

The Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. L. A. Williams, read his report. A motion carried to accept this good report with deep appreciation.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Dale Campbell, read his report. It was moved and seconded to accept this good report. Carried.

Also at this time the Promotional Secretary presented the Sunday School awards to the Sunday Schools that show an increase in their Sunday Schools during this conference year. An expression of appreciation was given by a rising vote.

Sister Helm read the District Missionary President's report, due to the absence of Sister Utterback. It was voted approved to accept this good report.

The receptional Committee introduced Sister Snyder to the Conference, and a motion carried to grant her an honorary seat within the conference bar. They also introduced Rev. Oscar Miller to the conference, and a motion carried to grant him an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The C.Y.C. director, Rev. Warren Posey read his report. It was moved and seconded to accept this good report. Carried. A motion carried expressing our appreciation to Brother Posey for all of his efforts put forth to promote the C.Y.C. in this District.

The PELT director, Rev. Paul Stroud gave an oral report to the conference concerning the progress that has been made in promoting this program in the Illinois District. A motion carried to accept this good report.

It was moved and seconded, to adjourn and give the different Committee's an opportunity to complete their reports. Carried.

#### Second Sitting

Conference reconvened at 8: A.M. June 28, 1966 by singing "The Solid Rock" led by Brother Eugene Gray. After prayer request, Brother Oscar Miller led the Conference in prayer.

Following prayer, a motion was made and seconded to dispense with the roll call until the examining board had given their report. Motion carried. Brother Snyder then read scripture from I Tim. 4:16, after which he spoke to the conference on a two fold purpose. I. Save Thy Self; II Save Others. His message was very pointed and anointed of the Lord.

The District Secretary read the minutes of the first sitting and a motion carried to approve the reading of the minutes.

The Auditing Committee gave their report and a motion carried to accept this report.

The District Treasurer, Rev. Awe gave his report, and a motion carried to accept this report with deep appreciation.

The District camp Treasurer, Rev. Awe gave his report. It was voted approved to accept this good report.

The District Statistician, Rev. Taylor gave his report, and a motion carried to accept this report.

The conference recessed for ten minutes, and reconvened at the call of the chair. It was a great privilege to have Rev R.A. Beltz to visit our conference and speak to the conference concerning the Pilgrim Pension plan.

It was moved and seconded to grant Brother Beltz an honorary seat within the conference bar.

Brother Hall read a report from Frankfort Pilgrim College due to the absence of Brother Hertel. A motion was made and seconded to accept this report. Voted approved.

Brother Hall also read a letter of appreciation to the Conference from Rev. Clifford Richardson. A motion carried to accept this letter of appreciation.

Brother Hall also read a report from the Real Estate Agent, Mr. Popham, in regards to the sale of the camp grounds.

The Resolutions Committee gave a partial report. The conference recessed by expiration of time.

#### Third Sitting

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 P.M. with the singing "Amazing Grace", led by Brother Oscar Miller. Brother Fred Davison led the conference in prayer. The Resolutions Committee continued to read their recommendations and they were passed upon as follow:

- #1 as presented by the committee carried as read.
- #2 as presented by the committee carried as read.
- #3 was a matter of correction in editing the journal.
- #4 as presented by the committee carried as read.
- #5 a matter of editing.
- #6 as presented by the committee lost.
- #7 as presented by the committee carried as read.
- #1 in Camp Meeting Resolutions as presented by the Committee lost.

#2 as presented by the committee carried as read.

#3 as presented by the committee carried as read.

In Conference Rules. On page 22 Resolution #3 is to remain, and a new resolution was adopted to be #4 to read as follow: Whereas there is a definite need for funds to operate the C.Y.C. program of the Illinois District, we recommend that each church raise and send  $25\phi$  per member to the District treasurer for the purpose of promoting this arm of the District.

A new resolution was presented by the committee and a motion carried to accept this new resolution.

The Ways and Means Committee gave their report to the conference and was as follow; No. 1, No. 2, No. 3, and No. 4 was accepted as presented by the committee.

The Reception committee introduced Sister Oscar Miller to the Conference.

The Examining and Educational boards gave their report, and it was voted approved to accept this report as read.

The District Secretary read the action of the District Council to accept Rev. Oscar Miller as an Ordained Minister into the Illinois Conference. A motion carried to approve the action of the District Council.

The Conference recessed for 10 minutes, and reconvened at the call of the chair. Brother Hall appointed the following as tellers: Lewis Russell; Jesse Tewell; Paul Stroud; James Southerland; Maurice McCrary; Garry Spriggs; Rudolph Moore; and Warren Posey.

The District Secretary read a recommendation that had been omitted in the Examining and Educational boards report. It was voted approved to accept this recommendation.

In proceeding with the conference business, ballots were passed out and the following candidates were elected.

A motion carried to appoint Rev. Paul Stroud as PELT director.

It was moved and seconded to authorize the District Council to approve the reading of the minutes of the last two sittings.

It was voted approved to authorize the District Council to dispense with all unfinished conference business.

Brother Hall read the pastoral appointments.

The Memorial Committee read their report, and a motion carried to accept this report by standing with heads bowed while Brother Snyder led in prayer.

Request for invitation was given for the Ministerial Convention and the invitation from Decatur first was accepted.

A motion was made and seconded to take up a love offering for Sister Meeks during this conference. Carried.

A rising vote of appreciation to Brother Snyder as chairman of this conference was taken.

#### STANDING RULES

- 1. Inasmuch as the General Board has ruled that all our District Camps shall provide for Sunday School to be conducted on the Camp Grounds each Sunday of the Camp. Therefore be it resolved, that there shall be a Sunday School service conducted on this Camp Ground each Sunday at the Camp. The Sunday School Committee to be in charge of the same, and that suitable cards of recognition be given to all who attend, denoting their presence at the Camp Sunday School. These cards to be returned to the local Sunday School, thus encouraging a perfect attendance, and that local averages be figured and any awards be given in recognition of the same.
- 2. Be it resolved, that all pastors and evangelists arrange their work so as not to conflict with the Conference, and that if any minister does not attend Conference he shall send a report of his work and an excuse for the absence. If he fails to do so for two consecutive years he shall be dealt with by the council.
- 3. Be it resolved, that the Annual Conference election of officers be deferred until all resolutions affecting officers' duties are adopted.
- 4. Resolved, that all our preachers and laity secure respectively a copy of the Church Manual and the District Conference minutes, and shall read and study the same until they are able to understand and carry out all of their provisions and requirements.
- 5. Be it resolved, that each pastor shall endeavor to bring the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription list up to a number equal to or greater than the families of the church.
- 6. Resolved, that the revision of the church membership rolls shall be made prior to the respective annual church meetings.
- 7. Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of the standards of our church therefore:
  Be it resolved, that The Illinois District Conference call attention to Section 144, Article 2, and Section 54 of our Manual which reads, "Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing the immodest forms of dress so current today; such as sun-suits, shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of
- 8. Inasmuch as television is rapidly becoming a daily habit and an open door for infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever-increasing number of homes in America:

the Church are not to appear in public places in shorts or without shirts."

Therefore be it resolved that we as a District go on record as being opposed to the use and/or ownership of a television set.

- 9. Be it resolved, that the District Superintendent be authorized to appoint all standing committees not otherwise provided for and to fill any vacancies occurring in them from time to time, and that there be five members on each Ways and Means and Resolutions Committee.
- 10. Be it resolved, that the District be zoned and the boundaries apply to the Ministerial, Youth and Sunday School Departments. Be it further resolved, that the District Superintendent appoint Ministerial and Sunday School Zone Chairmen and that the Zone Chairmen and the District Superintendent be authorized to arrange Zone meetings as they deem advisable, and that a Zone Secretary and Treasurer be elected at the first meeting of the year.
- 11. Whereas it is helpful to a better understanding among our people who contribute to the support of our work and: Whereas the District handles this money as a public trust; Be it resolved, that the District Treasurer give a statement in totals of disbursements in his annual report of District Home Missionary funds, the same to be placed in the Conference Minutes.
- 12. Be it resolved, that all resolutions retained in the minutes from year to year be listed under "Standing rules" and all new resolutions be listed as "Conference rules" for one year, after that, all that are retained be placed under "Standing Rules."

- 13. We recommend, that all cabin owners get together and file for tax exemption on their cabins.
- 14. Be it resolved, that the Council be given authority to take the necessary steps to take out Camp Insurance.
- 15. Be it resolved, that this Conference delegate authority to the District Council to make necessary repairs and improvements on the campgrounds.
- 16. Be it resolved, that the Ministerial Convention convene the first Tuesday of April, at 2 P.M. through Wednesday evening service. The place to be chosen from invitations from churches on Zone level, alternating as follow: Northern; North Central; South Central; and Southern zones.
- 17. Be it resolved, that all members being received into the local Pilgrim Holiness Church, that their attention should be called to Section 65 of the 1962 Pilgrim Holiness Manual.
- 18. Be it resolved that this Conference approve of our Churches making application for and borrowing money from the General Church Pilgrim Pension Loan Fund. This to be in accordance with the Manual.
- 19. As the Illinois conference is incorporated be it resolved that the District Superintendent be authorized to make the annual report of the corporation as required by the state. The period of reporting is from January 15 to the last day of February each year.
- 20. That the District Council as elected from year to year be the district trustees in accordance with the articles of incorporation.
- 21. Be it resolved in the event of Death of any of our active or retired Ministers and wives, the District Superintendent is to be notified by the Church Secretary, and flowers shall be sent by the District Treasurer.
- 22. Inasmuch as the Conference and the Camp are at different times, be it resolved, that all new Resolutions, either to the Ways and Means or the Resolutions Committee, be mailed to the Chairmen of said Committees, one week prior to Conference.
- 23. Be it resolved that where parsonages are not equipped with heating devices, that provisions be made for the same by the local Church.
- 24. Be it resolved that each Church grant its pastor a two-weeks vacation with salary, which shall include two Sundays.
- 25. Be it resolved that each Church provide its parsonage with a telephone.
- 26. Be it resolved that District letter heads be printed, the amount to be decided by the District Council.
- 27. Be it resolved, that the Conference year begin June 1 and end on May 31 each year, and that all annual reports be mailed to the District Statistician, by June 10th. Be it further resolved, that all business of the Conference, and changing of pastors be done at this time. (P. H. Manual 1962 Sec. 53-1 "The Minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the first Sunday following the District Conference.
- 28. Be it resolved, that the pastors notify the District Superintendent of their intended absence from their churches for one week or more.
- 29. Since the local Church books close on the last day of each month, and the District Treasurer's books close on the 10th day of each month, be it resolved, that all money for the current month, is to be in the hands of the District Treasurer on that day. Be it further resolved, that all money received after the 10th of the month, will be credited on the following month. All District and General money should be paid through the local church Treasurer to the District Treasurer.
- 30. Be it resolved, that the Chairman of the Educational and Examining boards shall call their respective Committees together prior to the Annual Conference, at which time candidates for Conference license shall be notified when to appear before them.

Be it further resolved, that the Chairman of these Committees set the time to meet. Candidates failing to appear as scheduled each year, shall appear without fail the following year. If not, they will not receive license, unless in the judgment of the combined boards, an exception should be made.

- 31. We recommend that the District Council be authorized to purchase a Christmas gift for the District Superintendent, in the amount of \$100.00 in the name of the District.
- 32. We recommend that the C.Y.C. and PELT program be supported from the District administration fund, at the discretion of the District Council. This recommendation is to be retroactive for the previous year.
- 33. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to operate the Youth program of the Illinois District, we recommend that each Church try to raise and send 25¢ per Church member, per year to the Illinois Youth Treasurer, for the purpose of promoting this arm of the District.

#### REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. Inasmuch as the action of the 1966 International Conference raised the United Stewardship fund to \$9.50 per member. We recommend that each church in the district shall raise an amount equal to \$9.50 per member per year to conform with the International Conference action, to be raised monthly and sent to the District Treasurer. (This amount is prorated by the General treasurer as follows: Church extension 27%; Administration 35.5%; Owosso College 16.8%; Sunday School and Youth 10%; Contingent fund 1.5%; Loan fund 1.6%; Evangelism 6%; Commission on Education 1.6%.

We further recommend the continuation of the personage budget system for the district based upon 15% of the regular Church and Sunday School offerings. This budget included monies which have been going for United Stewardship Fund, District Expense, District Home Missions, District Parsonage, Frankfort Pilgrim College, General Conference, and Contingent Fund. This money will be distributed in the following percentages;

United Stewardship Fund	33%
District Administration	42%
District Home Missions	11%
District Parsonage	6%
Frankfort Pilgrim College	5%
General Conference	2%
Contingent Fund	1%

- 2. We recommended that 5% of the total receipts of the Youth Society be contributed to the Department of Sunday Schools and Youth.
- 3. Whereas the Manual is specific in delegating the joint responsibility of the District Superintendent and the local church board, in the matter of the Pastor's salary, therefore be it resolved that the District Superintendent meet annually with the local church board to give due consideration to the pastor's salary, and travel expense, connected with his pastoral duties.
- 4. We recommend that the District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$4500.00 per year and  $7\phi$  per mile traveling expense.
- 5. We recommend that the District Council Members, Home Missionary Committee, and all special committees be paid the sum of 7 cents per mile for traveling expense while rendering service for the District.
- 6. We recommend that the District Secretary shall act as District Statistician, and be paid the sum of \$150 per year. We further recommend that the District Treasurer be paid the sum of \$390 per year.
- 7. We recommend, that each church pay the sum of \$10.00 per delegate, to cover the expense during Conference, said \$10.00 to be paid to the District Treasurer.
- 8. We recommend that the Assistant District Superintendent, in the absence of the District Superintendent, be paid the sum of \$15.00 per day, plus  $7\phi$  per mile traveling expenses while rendering service for the District or Camp Meeting
- 9. We recommend that the dormitory rooms rent as follows: first floor, \$4.50; second floor. \$3.50; little dormitory rooms, \$3.50; third floor, \$1.50 per cot. We further recommend that the electric rate shall be: All cottages, cabins or trailers, a minimum of \$1.00, plus  $25\phi$  for each appliance; rooms in dormitories  $25\phi$  per appliance in addition to room rent.

- 10. We recommend that the District Council appoint a district Home Missionary Committee of three, and the District Superintendent act as chairman. We further recommend that the expense of this committee be paid from the District Home Missionary fund while rendering any service to the Home Missionary work.
- 11. Whereas there is a definite need for funds to be placed at the disposal of the District Sunday School Program; we recommend that each Sunday School in the district send the Sunday School Promotional Secretary the amount of four (\$4) dollars as soon after conference as possible, said four dollars per church, plus Camp Meeting Sunday School Offerings, and District Sunday School Convention Offerings, constituting the District Sunday Promotional Fund.
- 12. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid a salary of \$75 per year, plus all incidental expenses, to be paid from the District Sunday School Fund.
- 13. We recommend that the District Treasurer pay utilities at the District parsonage, consisting of lights, gas, fuel, water, telephone, and postage expense.
- 14. We recommend that the District minutes be paid for out of the District funds, and that each church shall be charged for the number of copies of the minutes they receive, and that as they are paid for, the money shall be replaced in said funds.
- 15. Whereas many of our ministers and wives who are eligible for membership in the Ministerial Benefit Association are not members. We recommend that all eligible pastors and wives become members of the Association, and that each church pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife. We further recommend that the District Treasurer carry out the same provision for the District Superintendent.
- 16. We recommend the continuation of the percentage budget system based upon 14% of the regular Church and Sunday School offerings. This budget includes monies which have been going for United Stewardship Fund,

#### CAMP MEETING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Be it resolved that our camp Meeting begin the first Friday in August of each year.
- 2. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint someone to patrol the camp grounds during the Meeting and to be hereafter enforced.
- 3. Be it resolved that the pastors and the District Superintendent present the needs of the Camp to the Churches and that each Church respond with such needed items as requested.
- 4. Be it resolved that no single young person shall be allowed off the grounds without special written permission from the Dean of men or the Matron of women, or accompanied by their parents. They shall be required to attend Young People's and evening services. Failure to keep this rule will forfeit their privilege of remaining in camp. There shall be a Dean of men and a Matron of women appointed by the District Council who shall be responsible to enforce this rule. Be it further resolved that this resolution be printed, and copies given to each one registering.
- 5. Be it resolved that receptacles for trash be placed in convenient places on the camp grounds.
- 6. Inasmuch as so many children are on the grounds throughout the camp meeting, therefore be it resolved, that special services be held for them and that the Council secure a children's worker at least 30 days prior to the camp.
- 7. Be it resolved, that all who rent rooms during camp be advised to bring their own bedding.
- 8. Be it resolved that all dormitory reservations be declared nontransferable, as long as the present holders occupy them. When the holders of said reservations secure lodging elsewhere, the former reservation shall be turned to the one in charge. Those having room reservations shall receive cards from the registrar 30 days before camp, these to be returned to the one in

charge of reservations. If not returned before camp, these rooms shall be rented. Said cards and postage shall be furnished by the camp, for the registrar.

Be it further resolved, inasmuch as all dormitories are the property of the District, that rooms in said dorms shall be made available, to be used as deemed advisable at any time, and be used or rented when not occupied by the person holding reservations.

Be it further resolved, that all persons holding room reservations, forfeit these reservations when moving their membership from this Conference.

- 9. Be it resolved, that all those working for their meals and actively engaged ministers be required to register, at which time they shall be given a meal ticket which must be presented at the entrance of the dining hall. Be it further resolved the District Council be responsible for the enforcement of this rule.
- 10. Be it resolved that all ministers and their wives who are physically able be available for work during Camp.
- 11. Whereas each year there are more workers signed up for work than are needed, rendering it impossible to use them all, be it resolved that only the required number be engaged. Be it further resolved that these be accepted on a first come, first served basis, and that the department heads reserve the right to interview and reject any who would not serve his or her department in the best interest.
- 12. Inasmuch as transistor radios have become so distracting, and such a hindrance to the spiritual atmosphere of our camp, therefore we recommend that their use on the camp ground be abandoned.

#### CONFERENCE RULES

- (1) Whereas there is a definite need for funds to operate the C.Y.C. program of the Illinois District, we recommend that each Church raise and send 25¢ per church member to the District Treasurer for the purpose of promoting this arm of the District.
- (2) Whereas the 1966 International Conference passed a memorial for the setting up of a District Educational Council, be it resolved that this Council be set up in the Illinois District.

#### "REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT"

To Dr. Melvin H. Snyder chairman, Ministerial and lay delegates of this 44th annual district conference, greeting in the name of Jesus Christ our loving Lord.

We survey the accomplishments of the past year, and we recognize the little that has been done. As we look around us we realize there is much to be done. The report in the U. S. NEWS and World report of June 6—1966 states that the estimate of population by 1970 will be 61.7 Millions between the ages of 20-34 years, 59.2 millions between ages 5-14 years, and 64.8 millions between ages 35-64 years, if this report is true the church has a great job to do.

## THE DISTRICT MISSIONARY PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To Dr. Melvin H. Snyder Chairman, Ministerial lay delegates and friends of the 44th annual conference, greetings in the precious name of Jesus.

I am happy to report on the accomplishments that have been reached in behalf of District Missions this past conference year. For whatever has been achieved, we, the District Missionary Society Committee, give God all the glory and praise.

I, along with other members of the committee, have traveled 2,075 miles holding services in 15 of the churches of the Illinois District. There were approximately 450 people who attended with a representation of 27 churches out of the 30 in the district. The services were set up to stress the spiritual side of missions with talks on the three divisions; namely, World Missions, District Home Missions and Church Extension.

This year our offering that was taken during our services was divided two ways, as we were not given a project for Church Extension. Our goal was set at \$300 to be divided, ½ for Home Missions and 2/3 for World Missions. I, along with others, feel we had good projects and are so thrilled to tell you the total amount given was \$454.55 for which \$151.50 will be used to purchase new song books for camp meeting and \$303.05 will be used to purchase typewriters for the Bible School in the Philippines. In addition to the offering approximately 75 booklets concerning sanctification, etc. were gathered. Two packages of these were sent to Africa and I personally delivered a goodly number of these to our missionaries on the islands of Jamaica and Grand Cayman,

We, the committee, have tried to strengthen and stress the need of society work and its importance in helping carry on the work of missions in

foreign lands as we traveled throughout the district. We are happy to report one new society at Olney and trust that other societies have taken on renewed efforts.

Our travel expenses have been met by the  $50\phi$  per month commitments from the various churches. We have tried to use your money wisely and want to say thank you for your cooperation in giving.

We trust we have been able to help you as you in turn have helped us. Where there is unity there is strength.
