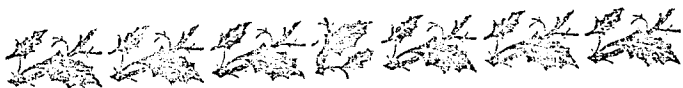

MINUTES PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH

NEW YORK DISTRICT

WEDNESDAY, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises, W. R. Cox presiding.

Roll call.

Rev. C. P. Pridgen and Harry Twining were recommended by the Examining Board and on motion were received as members of the Assembly.

Minutes of last session read and accepted.

Reading and passing on reports.

Voted to authorize the Secretary to receive and disburse money in this Assembly in the absence of the District Treasurer.

Voted that all delinquent Churches pay their conference claims at this Assembly.

Keyserkill report returned to delegate for correction.

Moved and carried that the motion regarding reporting young people's meetings in minutes be tabled.

On motion the District Superintendent appointed S. S. Tompkins Assistant Secretary during this Assembly.

Scotts Patent report returned to delegate for correction.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

WEDNESDAY, 2 P. M.

Devotional exercises, W. R. Cox presiding.

Roll call of delegates and workers.

Moved and carried that Elmer Beaney act as delegate from East Dickinson.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

The following resolution was presented by the Resolution Committee and adopted, as follows:

Recognizing that missionary interest is vital to the deepest spirituality of a Church, we recommend and urgently request that each pastor see that a free will offering be taken once each month, and that the congregation be notified a week in advance that said offering will be taken. The day and date of offering to be determined by local church. This offering to be sent before the end of each month with the report to the District Secretary of the Mission Board, Miss Verna Hamlin, 14 Clifford Street, Binghamton, N. Y. This offering shall not be taken from the pastor's support.

We further request that each pastor instruct the local congregation concerning the benefit of regular and systematic giving to foreign missions, and that the pastor preach at least once each year definitely on foreign missions. Also that the Missionary Secretary notify each delinquent church regarding its obligation relative to this resolution and compliance thereto.

The following report of the Memorial Committee was read and adopted:

During the conference year the Church has been called to suffer loss by the death of one of our preachers, Brother Darius Phillips of Herkimer, N. Y., a man whose walk among us was Godly, whose life was a blessing to the people of God, and a source of conviction to the unsaved with whom he came in touch. His life work was blessed in the salvation of souls and the sanctification of believers. His ministry was notable in that unswervingly he preached and stood for the old time Gospel.

Following his call to the ministry he gave his time unceasingly to the work of the Lord, and tirelessly in His vineyard till a break in his health compelled him to rest and lay aside, hoping that with rest he would be restored to health and be able again to be occupied in the work in which his soul delighted. But his Heavenly Father, in His love for His child, saw fit to determine otherwise and on the 12th day of July, 1924, the summons came to him and his soul went to dwell with Him who for years had been his Friend and Counsellor.

We miss him, and the Christian sympathy of this Assembly goes out to his family who are deprived of a husband and father. And while our hearts were sad, and we regret the loss of our brother and his co-operation and encouragement, still we rejoice that another soldier of the Cross has fought a good fight and kept the faith and gone to receive his crown. Another soul has proven the power of the blood of Christ to keep in the midst of conflict. He has gained the goal. Therefore be it

Resolved, That this memorial be spread on the minutes of this Assembly and a copy of the same be sent to his family.

The reading and passing on reports was resumed at this time.

Voted to extend the time of this session to 4:30 o'clock.

Moved and carried that the election of officers be held at the Thursday morning session.

Adjourned to Thursday morning.

THURSDAY, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises. W. R. Cox presiding.

On motion Rev. and Mrs. Floyd Baker and Rev. S. J. McIntyre of the Pennsylvania District were granted seats in Assembly.

Moved and carried that the name of Mrs. C. P. Pridgen be added to the roll.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

Sister Lena Roy, who has been ill for some time, was reported as not being so well at this time. The Assembly was called to prayer led by Brother Blann of Northville. May it be the pleasure of God to restore our Sister to health, that she may again engage in the work so dear to her heart.

After a few moments of silent prayer the Assembly proceeded to the election of officers for the coming year.

On the first ballot for District Superintendent A. H. Wilson received 37 of the 47 votes cast and was declared elected.

First ballot for Assistant Superintendent A. E. Blann received 28 of the 47 votes cast and was declared elected.

First ballot for District Secretary Alvin Young received 43 of the 47 votes cast and was declared elected.

First ballot for District Treasurer, no election..

Voted to suspend the rules regarding election of officers and the three receiving the highest number of votes be declared candidates.

M. R. Blann, S. S. Tompkins, W. J. C. Vanoss received the largest number votes on first ballot and declared candidates.

Second ballot for District Treasurer no election. Vanoss 15; Blann, 12; Tompkins, 21.

Third ballot for District Treasurer no election, 48 votes cast. Vanoss, 17; Blann, 10; Tompkins, 21.

Voted to suspend the rules and vote for two highest Vanoss and Tompkins declared candidates.

Fourth ballot for District Treasurer, 45 votes cast. Tompkins, 23; Vanoss, 22. Tompkins declared elected District Treasurer.

The Assembly proceeded to elect three members on District Council, 45 votes cast. W. J. C. Vanoss received 23 votes and was declared elected.

Voted to suspend the rules and declare the two next highest elected. W. A. Shoemaker, 22; S. N. Bennett, 20.

First ballot for Trustee for three years, 48 votes cast. S. N. Bennett received 38 and was declared elected.

First ballot for member of Board of Examiners for three year term, 48 votes cast. Rev. A. H. Wilson received 42 votes and was declared elected.

First ballot for District Home Missionary Board, 47 votes cast. No election.

Voted to suspend the rules and vote for four highest. A. E. Blann, W. A. Shoemaker, S. S. Tompkins and Alvin Young were declared candidates.

Second ballot for District Home Missionary Board, 47 votes cast. Alvin Young, 31; S. S. Tompkins, 25, who were declared elected.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

THURSDAY, 2 P. M.

Devotional exercises. W. R. Cox presiding.

Voted to dispense with roll call at this session.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

Moved and carried that the rules be suspended and that the District Foreign Missionary Board remain the same as last year.

The report of Lake Placid Church was returned to delegate for correction.

The report of South Colton Church was read and accepted.

Voted to accept the report of the Auditing Committee.

The personal report of Carl and Sadie Shafer read and accepted.

Moved and carried that the Auditors be furnished with invoice and vouchers when the books are submitted to them for auditing.

Moved and carried that the resignation of Mary Berg from the Auditing Board be accepted.

The report of the District Missionary Treasurer read and accepted by the Assembly rising and singing "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow."

Moved and carried that the Auditing Committee prepare a report from the District Treasurer's book in his absence.

The following resolution was presented:

Resolved, That the session convening at 2 P. M. Friday be devoted to our Foreign Missionary interests and our General Superintendent address us at that time on the subject.

Amended as follows: That the Missionary Service be held on Sunday afternoon. Adopted.

Moved and carried that the pastors who have had revivals make a verbal report of their evangelistic meetings held during the year.

Adjourned to 9 A. M. Friday.

FRIDAY, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises. W. R. Cox presiding.

Minutes of last meeting read and accepted.

The verbal reports of pastors who had held revivals during the year was continued from last session.

The following pastors reported: A. H. Wilson, M. R. Blann, W. J. C. Vanoss, G. L. Payne, G. M. Sellers, S. W. Simmons, L. C. Richmond, Walter Grady, Helena Shafer, Augusta Engwer, Stuart Tompkins, Robert Phillips and George Becker.

After these reports the General Superintendent spoke briefly encouraging the work of evangelism.

The following resolutions were presented by the Resolution Committee:

Resolved, That ministers whose names appear in the directory found in our minutes be designated as to whether ordained or not by adding the word "Reverend." Adopted.

Resolved, That inasmuch as the entertainment of the annual Assembly is becoming more difficult, we recommend that each Church raise an offering during the year for this expense, the same to be sent to the District Treasurer. Resolution defeated.

Resolved, That inasmuch as the mutual uplift of the Association of Saints is indispensable, we recommend that in each community two or more Churches come together for rathes on holidays or as often as it is practical. Adopted.

Resolved, That one half hour of the Saturday morning session be devoted to the Home Missionary work and that Bro. Cox address the Assembly. Adopted.

Inasmuch as we have licensed preachers who are stationed as pastors in charge of some of our Churches, and who heretofore have been prohibited from performing marriage ceremonies, therefore be it

Resolved, That inasmuch as our Manual does not declare itself on the subject, that this District Assembly grant this privilege to such licensed preachers who are actively engaged and stationed as pastors in charge of Churches in our district. Adopted.

Since we are so decidedly in favor of all things religious, and in that the names of the various cities are used as names for our Churches, and which do not bear any special religious significance, therefore be it

Resolved, That we give names to our Churches which have some religious meaning. Resolution defeated.

Resolution on divorce and remarriage referred to committee for redrafting.

The report of the District Treasurer prepared by the Auditing Committee was accepted.

Moved and carried that the printing of the minutes be deferred until after a complete report of the District Treasurer can be submitted.

Resolved, That 600 copies of the minutes of this Assembly be printed and distributed by our pastors among the people without charge. Adopted.

Moved and carried that the pastors of Churches who had not paid their Conference expenses bring the matter before their Churches.

Communication sent to Brother E. O. Fuller extending greetings from the Assembly.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

FRIDAY, 2 P. M.

Devotional exercises. W. R. Cox presiding.

Minutes of last session read and approved after correction.

The following resolution was presented by the Resolution Committee.

Because of the ever growing menace to vital salvation of divorce and remarriage we feel that some definite position should be taken by the Holiness Church, that honest hearts may be protected and warned, and since the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church does not declare itself definitely on this subject, therefore be it

Resolved, That until such time as our General Church does take such definite position, that people who are divorced and have remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they were divorced, shall be denied membership in the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the New York District, and that no divorced and remarried preacher be engaged in any District work. Adopted.

The report of the Statistical Committee read and adopted.

Owing to the death of the wife of our former Treasurer, Frank W. Clark of Amsterdam, N. Y., it was voted that the following night letter be sent to Brother Clark expressing the sympathy of the Assembly:

"Dear Brother Clark: While we are in session as an Assembly we have learned of the death of your wife and we take this way of expressing to you our sympathy and Christian love. We remember the years that as a member of this Assembly you stood by our side and helped to push the battle for the Lord.

"And now our prayer to the God of all grace is that He will sustain you, and that you may feel that the Eternal God is your Refuge and underneath are the Everlasting Arms."

Adjourned to 9 A. M.

SATURDAY, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises. W. R. Cox presiding.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

In accordance with a resolution passed at a former session, Brother Cox addressed the Assembly in the interest of the Home Mission work, urging the necessity of more earnest effort in extending the work beyond our established borders.

The District Superintendent, Brother Wilson, also spoke briefly on the subject of Home Missions.

Moved and carried that the yearly pledge system be adopted for the raising of funds for the Home Mission work to be paid monthly.

Resolution Committee presented the following resolution:

In view of the fact that we are arranging to do so much more along Home Missionary lines, be it

Resolved, That two more members be elected on the Home Missionary Board. Adopted.

Resolved, That the business sessions of the Assembly convene on the third Tuesday in April of each year unless ordered otherwise. Adopted.

The Assembly proceeded to elect two more members on the Home Missionary Board.

First ballot, no election.

Moved and carried to suspend the rules and vote for the four highest.

A. E. Blann, W. A. Shoemaker, W. J. C. Vanoss and H. J. Felter declared candidates.

Second ballot: A. E. Blann, 30; W. A. Shoemaker, 26, were declared elected on the Home Missionary Board.

The following resolution presented by the Resolution Committee:

The time of closing of this Assembly drawing near, we wish to show our appreciation to those who by their labors, their wisdom and forbearance have made possible this pleasant and profitable gathering by a rising vote of thanks. To our General Superintendent for the great blessing that has come to all our hearts as the word of truth has been expounded, with the demonstration of the Spirit and in power, and also for the just and fair dealing as presiding officer. To our District Superintendent, the Secretary and his assistant, the Pastor and people of this Church and the citizens of this town who have contributed to our comfort and enjoyment, which has culminated in making this gathering perhaps the banner Assembly of our District, and lastly in consideration of the splendid and efficient service rendered by the young ladies of Lake Placid, which we believe has never been excelled if equaled at any public gathering in the history of our work. We wish to pay this small tribute of our heartfelt gratitude by thanking you sincerely and placing your names upon our minutes that your kindness may not soon be effaced from our memory. Adopted.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT

To the Annual Assembly of the New York District Pilgrim
Holiness Church:

The following is my report as District Superintendent for
the year ending April 21.

The past year has been one of many peculiar and trying
battles, but God has given the victory, for which we are
thankful. Nearly all of the Churches have been visited twice
during the past year and report good progress along most
every line. Several good revivals have been reported and a
good revival spirit seems to be on in most of the Churches.

The Church at Keyserkill has purchased a much needed
parsonage and new churches have been bought at Lake Placid
and Amsterdam. A new Church has been organized at Broad-
albin with a very promising future.

Throughout the District we see a great opportunity of
doing some real home mission work. The Conference Branch

has purchased a new tent and it should be kept busy throughout the tent season. I trust that we shall get behind this work and push out and enlarge our borders.

The foreign missionary work has been taken care of very easily, nearly all of the Churches have overpaid their pledges, and most of the pastors are pushing this part of the work.

One of the promising and encouraging features of our work is the goodly number of young people who are finding God and hearing the call to definite Christian work. The success of our Church in the future depends upon our young people. May God help us to do all that we can to encourage them.

There is one perplexing and trying problem confronting us as a Church which I feel our attention should be called to at this time. I speak of the lawless spirit so prevalent in the world, and felt and seen in many ways in the Church. Nothing will ruin us quicker as a Church than to become so independent that we are lawless. May we ever obey God in all things. This will do more to check this spirit than any other thing we can do.

I received for my services as District Superintendent and Evangelist \$469. 58. Less expenses, \$162.24.
