MINUTES PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH

NEW YORK DISTRICT

The fifth annual assembly of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was held at Oneonta, N. Y., April 20-26, 1926.

Word was received of the serious illness of Bro. Arthur Mattison, pastor of the Nazarene Church at Canastota, N. Y.

Special prayer was offered by the Assembly in his behalf led by Rev. A. E. Blann of Northville.

The report of Rev. Delbert Frasier was returned for correction. After reading his report the Rev. George M. Sellers of the Keyserkill Church expressed the appreciation of himself and family for the help and sympathy extended to them from the different Churches of the District during the illness and death of their daughter.

The reports of Rev. and Mrs. Henry Shoemaker, missionaries to Alaska, were read and accepted. Voted that the Secretary write Brother and Sister Shoemaker extending greetings from the Assembly.

The Treasurer's report of Binghamton Camp Meeting read and accepted.

Report of the Treasurer of the Home Missionary Board read and accepted.

Voted to extend the time of this session to 4:10 P. M. Adjourned to 9 A. M.

Voted to dispense with roll call.

Minutes of last session read, corrected and approved.

Rev. F. H. Termohlen, business manager of the Bible School at Greensboro, N. C., was introduced and spoke at the morning session in the interest of the school.

A telegram was received stating the condition of Mrs. Elva Wilson of Northville. The Assembly was called to prayer for her recovery led by Rev. Floyd Baker.

A telegram was sent to the family expressing the interest and sympathy of the Assembly.

The itemized report of the Home Missionary was read and approved.

The Foreign Missionary report was read and accepted.

The report of the Auditors was read and accepted.

The report of the District Treasurer was read and accepted. The oral report of Sister Cora Hill was accepted.

The Resolution Committee presented the following resolution to be passed upon by the Assembly:

Resolved, that a good used adding machine for the use of the Statistical and Auditing Committee and also general district use be purchased in time to be used at this Assembly, same to be the property of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Adopted.

Resolved, that the man elected to the office of District Super-Intenndent be one who shall devote his entire time to the work of the District, engaging in quarterly meetings, etc., and that adequate provisions be made for his support that he may be free to engage in this work. After much discussion the resolution was defeated.

Resolved, that we lower our present assessment rate of \$2.00 per member to \$1.00 per member, 25 cents of which shall be disbursed toward the support of the General Superintendent and the remaining 75 cents to the support of the general work of the New York District, etc. Resolution adopted.

Resolved, that the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the New York District establish a rescue home at a suitable location, same to meet all requirements of the laws of the State of New York.

Devotional exercises, A. H. Wilson presiding.

Moved and carried that we dispense with the roll call.

Minutes read and approved.

Rev. H. A. Sancholtz, District Superintendent of the Pennsylvania and New Jersey District, was introduced and spoke in the interest of Beulah Fark Bible School at Allentown, Pa. Bro. Sancholtz introduced Bros. Baker. Little, Dieter and Lawrence, each speaking briefly in the interest of the school.

Voted to refer the resolution concerning the rescue home to the Resolution Committee for redrafting.

Resolved, that the first business of Friday morning session be the election of officers. Adopted.

Resolved. That, whereas, the Manual does not provide that pastors hold their membership in the local church which they serve, we therefore request the General Assembly to make provision in the Manual for the same,

Voted to refer this resolution to Committee on Revision of Manual.

Resolved, That whereas in the use of the report blanks provided by our general church, it would seem that an unnecessary burden has been placed upon our pastors in that they are required to report on matter that is covered by other church reports and that they are confusing and cumbersome, therefore be it Resolved, that the New York District respectfully request the General Assembly that the said report blanks be rearranged and simplified so as to exclude matter which is already covered by other church reports. Adopted.

Resolved, that we accept the invitation to hold the next annual Assembly in Binghamton. Adopted.

Report of the Committee on Revision of Manual:

No. 1, page 43. We recommend that provision be made for a cletter from one P. H. C. to another. Adopted.

No. 2, page 20, paragraph 24. We recommend that the Manual be corrected to read according to the ruling of last General Assembly concerning the date of the Assembly.

No. 3, page 20, paragraph 34. Provision is made for the calling of a special session of the General Assembly. We recommend that provision be made for a special session of the District Assembly in order to arrange for the Special General Assembly. Adopted.

No. 6, page 37, paragraph 87. Sub. 1 be made to read "to nominate pastors" according to par. 79, sub. 1, and strike out "to make all changes in pastors," so that said paragraph should read "to provide a place of worship, to recommend pastor and assistant pastor to the annual church meeting." (Par. 79.)

No. 7, page 35, par. 79. Sub. 2 should be changed to conform to the action of the last General Assembly-Minutes, page 55.

No. 8, page 20, par. 33. We recommend that all General church officers be members of the General Assembly.

No. 9, page 22, par. 38. We recommend that the missionary problems of the District be referred to the General Missionary Board rather than the General Council. Adopted.

No. 10, page 74, par. 201. We recommend that one Assistant General Superintendent be for the foreign work and that he be on the General Board of Foreign Missions. Adopted.

No. 11. Resolved, That the Fastor become a member of the church or one of the churches which he serves and that such membership move automatically when he moves to another charge. Adopted.

No. 12, page 35, par. 78. We recommend that the delegate to the District Assembly be elected by ballot at the annual church meeting. Adopted.

No. 13, page 25, par. 51. The reference par. 148 should be 155. Adopted.

No. 14, page 27. Under duties of District Assembly we recommend that a paragraph be inserted providing that the list of delegates elected to the General Assembly be sent to the General Secretary at least ten days before the General Assembly. Adopted.

No. 15, page 28, par. 58. We recommend that the District Council shall also by three fourth vote have power to exclude any unworthy member. Adopted.

No. 16, page 28, par. 59. We recommend that the reference 145 be made to read 152. Adopted.

No. 17, page 30, par. 66. We recommend that the first word "other" be stricken out. Adopted.

No. 18. Resolved, that our General Assembly convene quadrenially instead of biennially as at present. Page 20, par. 34. Adopted.

No. 19, page 35, par. 72 changed to read District Superintendent instead of General Superintendent.

No. 20, page 33, par. 73, sub. sec. 5. The reference 117 should be 124.

No. 21, page 34, par. 73, sub. 11. Ref. 95 should be 102.

No. 22, page 34, par. 73, sub. 12. Ref. 117 should be 124.

No. 23, page 34, par. 74. Ref. 125 should be 131.

No. 24, page 25, par. 50. The fourth point is not the duly of the District Assembly. Therefore we recommend this part be stricken out. Adopted.

No. 25, page 45, par. 121. Business meeting refers to appendix G. Nos. 7 and 9 are not matters for that meeting to attend to.

No. 26, page 33, par. 73, sec. 6. And a number of the local Advisory Board may be discharged from office for cause by 3 two third vote of Board.

No. 27. We recommend that a competent committee be appointed by the General Assembly to carefully study the Manual, correcting all errors in print and spelling and carefully arrange all subject matter in order in the Manual and so arrange index.

Voted to extend the time of this session to 4:10.

Adjourned to 9 A. M. Friday.

FRIDAY, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises. A. H. Wilson presiding.

Moved and carried that we dispense with the roll call at each session during this Assembly. Minutes of last session read and approved.

Moved and carried that we suspend the rules regarding the election of officers and proceed to vote on the resolution concerning the rescue home.

The following statement was presented by the District Council. In considering the case of C. W. Schuyler we feel that the requirements in the case have been met. We therefore unanimously vote to restore Bro. Schuyler to our fellowship and reissue his credentials. Signed, District Council.

Bro. Schuyler spoke briefly after reading the above statement, asking forgiveness of the Assembly for any wrong doing on his part in times past.

The following resolution was presented by the Resolution Committee:

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to obtain legal information as to State requirements for a rescue home, and that they report to this Assembly, this committee to be appointed by the Chair. Adopted.

Committee appointed, C. P. Pridgen, Carroll Bailey and H. J. Felter.

The Assembly proceeded to the election of officers.

On first ballot for District Superintendent A. H. Wilson received 43; A. E. Blann 3; S. N. Bennett 1. 47 votes cast. Bro. Wilson declared elected.

On first ballot for Assistant District Superintendent 47 votes cast. A. E. Blann 35; S. N. Bennett 5; S. S. Tompkins 1; Alvin Young 2; W. J. C. Vanoss 1; S. W. Simmons 1. A. E. Blann declared elected.

On first ballot for District Secretary 47 votes cast. Alvin Young 44, S. S. Tompkins 1, D. E. Wilson 1, Jasper Hamm 1. Alvin Young declared elected.

On first ballot for District Treasurer 47 votes cast. S. S. Tompkins 25, Loren Wilson 1, D. E. Wilson 2, W. J. C. Vanoss 9, S. N. Bennett 1, S. W. Simmons 1, C. P. Pridgen 1, H. J. Felter 1, M. R. Blann 5, Jasper Hamm 1. S. S. Tompkins was declared elected.

Moved and carried that we vote for one member of the Advisory Board on each ballot.

First ballot, 47 votes cast. S. S. Tompkins 14, Loren Wilson 2, C. P. Fridgen 2, Alvin Young 21, S. W. Simmons 1, H. J. Felter 2, D. E. Wilson 2, M. R. Blann 1, S. N. Bennett 1, Mary Berg 1. No election.

Second ballot for member of Home Missionary Board, 47 votes cast. S. S. Tompkins 12, Alvin Young 35. Alvin Young elected.

Moved and carried that the District Superintendent appoint the Foreign Missionary Board. The following board was appointed: A. E. Blann, Augusta Engwer and Verna Hamlin.

The Assembly proceeded to elect seven ministerial delegates to General Assembly to convene in Frankfort, Indiana, September 8th. Motion made and carried that the rules be suspended at this time to allow committees to report.

Following is the report: We recommend that a committee of three be appointed to find out from the State Board of Charities what are its requirements and to report to the District Council and to act according to their rules.

Moved and carried that the report of the committee on purchasing adding machine be accepted and committee discharged.

Moved and carried that the time of this afternoon session be extended 30 minutes.

The following ministerial members were elected delegates to General Assembly on first ballot: S. S. Tompkins 37, H. J. Felter 35, C. P. Pridgen 34, Jasper Hamm 30, M. R. Blann 29, D. E. Wilson 29.

Second ballot, 49 votes cast. S. W. Simmons 19, Shoemaker 13, Vanoss 17. No election

Third ballot, 49 votes cast. S. W. Simmons 23, W. J. C. Vanoss 26. W. J. C. Vanoss elected.

S. W. Simmons 23, W. A. Shoemaker 14, Loren Wilson 18, were elected alternate delegates.

It was ruled by the Chair that a minister not engaged in active work was eligible to serve as lay delegate.

The Assembly proceeded to vote for three lay delegates to General Assembly.

Adjourned to 9 A. M. Saturday.

Devotional exercises. A. H. Wilson presiding.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

Moved and carried that the Assembly proceed to vote for lay delegates to General Assembly.

Previous motion ruled out of order by the Chair.

Motion made and carried that a list of names be submitted to the Assembly by the District Council to be voted upon as lay delegates to General Assembly.

Report of the Statistical Committee read and accepted, notation to be made of its being incomplete.

The following resolutions presented by the Resolution Committee:

Resolved, Recognizing that missionary interest is vital to the deepest spirituality of a Church, we recommend and urgently

request that each Pastor see that a free will offering be taken once each month, and that the congregation be notified a week in advance that said offering will be taken. The day and date of offering to be determined by local Church. This offering to be sent before the end of each month with the report to the District Secretary of the Mission Board, Miss Verna-Hamlin, 14 Clifford Street, Binghamton, N. Y. This offering shall not be taken from the Pastor's support.

We further request that each Pastor instruct the local congregation concerning the benefit of regular and systematic giving to foreign missions, and that the Pastor preach at least one each year definitely on foreign missions. Also that the Missionary Secretary notify each delinquent Church regarding its obligation relative to this resolution and compliance thereto. Adopted.

Resolved, That the New York District be so subdivided as to include small groups of Churches, which shall meet together for quarterly meetings, same to be in charge of District Superintendent or his Assistant as Manual provides or some one appointed by them.

Amendment: That the District Council subdivide the District. Resolved, That an amount equal to 75 cents per capita be raised in public offerings or otherwise throughout the Churches of the New York District, same to be used to help defray expenses of ministerial and lay delegates to the 1926 General Assembly at Frankfort, Indiana. Adopted.

Resolved, That 500 copies of Minutes of this Assembly be printed and distributed by our Pastors among the people without charge. Adopted.

Inasmuch as W. E. Reid and wife in Swaziland, South Africa, W. H. Shocmaker and wife in Alaska, have for several years past been supported by this District in their respective fields of Missionary activities, be :t

Resolved, That we continue our support of these worthy missionaries for another year.

Ruled out of order by the Chair.

Resolved. That we, as a District, are opposed to persons divorced and remarried becoming members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and that we respectfully request our General Aassembly convening at Frankfort. Indiana, in September this year, to pass such legislation as shall prohibit such persons from becoming members and that a properly worded memorial from this District be presented to the General Assembly. Adopted,

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 20, 1926

To the Annual Assembly of the New York District of the Filgrim Holiness Church:

The following is my report as District Superintendent for the year ending April 20, 1926.

I have visited nearly all of the Churches twice during the year. Conditions have arisen at Massena, N. Y., which made it necessary to close temporarily, but we expect to open again in the near future.

A new building has been purchased at Brushton, N. Y., and made over into a comfortable Church with living rooms up stairs. The building at Amsterdam has been remodeled, enlarging the chapel room. At Brookdale, Pa., much needed repairs have been made, which have added to the looks and value of the property. At Monticello, N. Y., concrete walks have been laid around the Church and new seats purchased which has added much to the appearance of the Church. The Churches at Troy and Albany have opened up Missions in the down town districts, and some have already found God. I believe that great good will be done through these works.

LETTER FROM MRS. W. H. SHOEMAKER, ALASKA

Dear Friends: You are wondering many things about us away off in Alaska. There are many things I want to say but shall have to confine myself to the more important ones. Last July Mr. Shoemaker left Skagway for a missionary trip along the coast as far west as Kodiak. Intending to settle wherever he found a promising place. In September he wired me to pack and come to Valdez. I sold what chickens I could and secured Rev. Bolland from Douglas Alaska, to take charge of the Skagway mission temporarily. He belongs to a different church, and we can only send him a small sum of money each month. But he thought it was a call from the Lord for bigger service at that time and so accepted gladly. He works at the hotel there for his meals, so we know he does not suffer. We left him several chickens and I expect he profits a little from them. We always did. He is past middle age, a widower; devout and energetic in the Lord's work. I'ray for him. Also pray that God will send someone to keep open that mission after he leaves.

I and the two babies all enjoyed (?) a small dose of seasickness on our trip across the Gulf of Alaska. We traveled three days and nights.

We are temporarily in the Congregational church here, as Valdez has had no resident Protestant minister for years. This is more on the order of a community or union church. Especially the Sunday School which is well attended by the children. We live in the parsonage, a one and a half story house of five rooms, and also boasts a bath. Every room and closet is wired for electricity and there are many electrical conveniences here. We have a small portable electric heater and it is on account of it that I can say that this is the first winter in my life that I haven't had to get up in the morning in a cold house, at least most of the time.

Our winter has been very mild this year. We have about three feet of snow now. Have only had a few days of below zero weather. Has been 20 to 30 degrees above zero most of the time.

Mr. Shoemaker made his report of meetings, etc. You perhaps may wonder what I have had to do. During Mr. Shoemaker's absence last summer I had charge of the mission service, and rather enjoyed it. Also had some meetings in Juneau last fall. I teach a class of Sunday School girls. Also have a sewing class for them. Preach occasionally, or play the organ, or do whatever I can in helping out in the regular services. I do most of the corresponding and send monthly reports to Kingswood, Ky. Do all my own housework and sewing, etc. Make quite a few calls every month and entertain others in our home often. During February we saw two of our Sunday School children converted. We like to plan great things for our Alaska Christian young folks. Fray that some of them may get the vision of greater things and of glorious service in the King's work.

God is in our midst and we hope for great things from Him. We praise Him for health and the blessing of friends. And we thank you for all gifts of money and prayer or otherwise.
