The Assembly proceeded with the election of officers and the following were elected:

District Superintendent, Rev. A. H. Wilson; Assistant District Supt., Rev. A. E. Blann; District Secretary, Rev. Alvin Young; District Treasurer, Rev. W. J. C. Vanoss. Advisory members of the Council, Rev. H. J. Felter, Rev. Oscar Lawrence, Rev. M. R. Blann. Member of Board of Trustees for three years, Rev. S. N. Bennett; Member Board of Examiners for three years, Rev. A. H. Wilson. Auditors, Ethel Wilson, Helena Shafer, Mary Berg. Members of Board of Church Extension for two years, Rev. A. H. Wilson, ex-officio, Rev. H. J. Felter, Rev. Alvin Young.

Voted to allow Rev. A. H. Wilson until the Friday morning session to decide as to whether or not he would accept the office of District Supt.

Report of the Board of Trustees read and accepted.

Moved and carried that 700 copies of the minutes be printed.

Moved and supported that the action of the Assembly regarding the support of District Superintendent be rescinded. Motion lost.

Moved and supported that each class leader have a class book in which a record of class meetings are to be kept so that a proper report for Assembly may be made.

The District Superintendent accepted his re-election on the following conditions which were approved by standing vote of Assembly: 1st, his church to receive first consideration; 2nd, shall not visit other churches on Sundays except in emergencies; 3rd, appointments to be made at his own convenience.

Moved and supported that our District Superintendent's visits and his offering be included in this year's report, though his visits may have been after the books were closed. Carried.

Moved and supported that the matter regarding the place of Assembly for 1932 be referred to the District Council. Carried.

Moved and supported that our Annual Assembly be held the Tuesday after the first Monday in April.

Moved and supported that the financial plan suggested at the ministerial convention this year at Binghamton be adopted by each church for the reducing of the indebtedness of our churches. Adjourned to 2 P. M.

FRIDAY, APRIL 17, 2 P. M.

Devotional exercises. Rev. A. H. Wilson, presiding.

The afternoon session was devoted to foreign missionary work.

Sister Rees gave a splendid address, speaking of the work of the various mission fields, more particularly of the work in Mexico.

Rev. A. E. Blann also spoke, confining his remarks to the foreign work.

An offering was received amounting to \$41.03.

Adjourned to 9 A. M. Saturday.

SATURDAY, APRIL 18, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises. Rev. Seth C. Rees, presiding.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

Report of the Statistical Committee read and accepted.

The following were nominated by the District Superintendent as members of the Foreign Missionary Board and duly elected: Rev. A. E. Blann, Rev. A. H. Wilson, Rev. Alvin Young, Augusta Engwer, Blanch Avery.

Voted to accept the invitation of the Lake Placid Church for 1932 Assembly, April 19-24.

It was announced that a Ministerial Convention would be held at Port Jervis, November 18-22.

Having come to the close of the business of the Assembly, it was voted to adjourn. We are thankful to God that we were permitted to have our beloved General Superintendent with us again this year. His ministry we feel has blessed our District. We believe God has had His way in all our deliberations, for which we are thankful. May the coming year be one of marked progress.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

Resolution No. 1—We recommend that section 79, page 39 of Manual, be strictly observed.

Resolution No. 2—Whereas, the General Board has approved of the agreement entered into between the General Superintendent and the Dist. Council at Gloversville October 1, 1930, be it resolved that this Assembly approve said agreement. Carried.

Resolution No. 3—Resolved, that inasmuch as the present report blanks do not meet the need of the District, a committee of three be appointed by the chair to draft proper blanks for future use.

Resolution No. 4—We recommend that section 77, page 39 of Manual, be strictly observed.

Resolution No. 5—We recommend that section 118, paragraph 2, page 2 of Manual be strictly observed.

Resolution No. 6—Resolved, that the resolution regarding the support of District Superintendent on page 5 of 1930 Minutes of this District be re-adopted for another year. Resolution approved and recommended.

Resolution No. 7—Resolved, that in as much as our foreign missionary work has a deficit, would suggest that each member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the New York District be requested to give \$1.00 or as much more as they feel the Lord may direct, to help pay off the deficit. The above not to be compulsory, merely a request. Recommended.

Resolution No. 8—Resolved, that because of the added responsibility devolving upon the District Foreign Missionary Board, we recommend that the membership of the Board be increased to five, including the District Superintendent, who shall nominate the other four members, subject to the approval of Assembly. Carried.

Resolution No. 9—Resolved, that Resolutions Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 11, 15, 16, 18, 22, 23, 24, 25, 27, 28, 29, 31 of the Minutes of this District be re-adopted, also Nos. 26, 7 and 1.

Resolution No. 10—Resolved, that our class leaders give a report of their activities on the blank provided for the same, and that the same be read and included with the other church reports at our District Assembly.

Resolution No. 11—Resolved, that we recommend that our churches of the New York District observe the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at least once every three months. Due notice to be given from the pulpit on the previous Sunday, or not less than a week in advance.

Resolution No. 12—Because of the ever growing menace to vital Salvation of the divorce and remarriage evil, we feel that some definite position should be taken by the Pilgrim Holiness Church regarding the same, that honest hearts may be protected and warned, and inasmuch as the Manual does not declare itself definitely on the subject; therefore be it

Resolved, that until such time as the General Church does take such definite position, that people who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they were divorced, shall be denied membership in our Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the New York District.

Resolution No. 13—Recognizing that missionary interest is vital to the deepest spirituality of a church, we recommend and urgently request that each Pastor see that a freewill offering be taken once each month and that the congregation be notified a week in advance that said offering will be taken. The day and date of offering to be determined by the local church. This offering to be sent before the 20th of each month with the report to the District Secretary of the Missionary Board. This offering shall not be taken from the Pastor's support.

Resolution No. 14—Resolved, that all moneys intended for District Secretaries, Treasurer, etc., of the various departments of the District be sent them so as to reach them not later than April 10th.

Resolution No. 15—Resolved, that the New York District be subdivided by the District Council so as to include small groups of churches, which shall meet together for conventions, same to be in charge of the District Superintendent or his assistant, or some one appointed by him.

Resolution No. 16—Resolved, that all moneys given to Missionaries visiting our local churches be reported to our District Foreign Missionary Treasurer, by means of a receipt showing amount given them; and be it further Resolved, that all other moneys intended for the various mission fields, etc., be sent through the District Foreign Missionary Treasurer, either specified or unspecified.

Resolution No. 17—Resolved, that all activities for the benefit of the Bethel Orphanage work be reported direct to the representative of the orphan work for the District, and that a report be sent in from each church at the end of each quarter of the conference year; and be it further Resolved, that each church give at least one service during the year to the interest of the orphanage work at which the representative of the same shall be invited to have charge.

Resolution No. 18—We recommend that each Sunday School in the District establish a birthday box for the benefit of the Bethel Orphanage work, the contents of which shall be sent at the end of each quarter of the conference year to the District Representative.

Resolution No. 19—Resolved, that an offering be taken by each church to help defray the expenses of the District Assembly, the same to be brought to Assembly by delegate.

Resolution No. 20—Resolved, that the District Superintendent visit all of the independent churches and missions on the District who are supplied by preachers who are members of this Assembly. Visits to be made as regularly as to our organized churches.

Resolution No. 21—Resolved, that inasmuch as the cemetery lot in the Chenango Valley Cemetery at Binghamton, N. Y., is the property of the New York District and that money has been paid by said District for its per-

petual care and that the same lot has been looked upon as a burial place for our workers, ministers and children who may desire to be buried there, and whereas the number of vacant lots have decreased greatly, therefore be it Resolved, that none but our workers, ministers, their wives and children be granted burial privilege there, except by the authority of the full Board of Trustees and then only in exceptional cases.

Resolution No. 22—We recommend that section 49 and paragraph 6 of the Manual be carried out strictly.

Resolution No. 23—Resolved, that resolution No. 23 in our Minutes of last year be amended to read as follows:

Resolved, that each church of the New York District take a monthly offering for the support of the State Church Extension work, said offering to be sent monthly to the Secretary-Treasurer of this Department, and be if further Resolved, that we continue the State Church Extension work.

Resolution No. 24—Because of the fact that the Pastors' conference each year closes with the Annual Assembly, be it Resolved that said Pastors' farewell service will be on the Sunday following conference.

Resolution No. 25—Resolved, that each church sending a delegate or delegates to the District Assembly pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and Pastor. The same to apply to this Assembly and hereafter.

Resolution No. 26—Resolved, that the Treasurers of the various departments of our work carry their accounts at the bank in the name of the department they represent and not in their personal names.

Resolution No. 27—Inasmuch as it is impossible according to State law for the District Council to borrow money for any purpose unless a special corporation meeting is called, therefore be it Resolved, that this Assembly authorize said Council to borrow at its discretion not to exceed \$2,000.00 if need require.

Resolution No. 28—Resolved, that one-half of the conference claims shall be sent to the District Treasurer by January 1st and that the District Treasurer be authorized to notify each church.

Resolution No. 29—Since our Manual provides that a representative shall visit our churches once a year in the interest of the various departments of our church, and since it is our desire to contribute to the support of these departments, but with a proper proportion, and as we have our District and local obligations to take care of, be it therefore Resolved, that none of our churches shall make arrangements with said representative nor respond to solicitations by mail or for such services without the endorsement and co-operation of the District Superintendent.

Resolution No. 30—Resolved, that children under the age of 14 years who are members of our church be excused from conference claims.

Resolution No. 31—Since the support of the Foreign Missionary department needs constant and regular attention and that occasions of great enthusiasm do not last, be it therefore Resolved, that each local church organize some definite and systematic plan by which regular monthly offerings shall be given to the support of Foreign Missionary.

Once again in the routine of our earthly pilgrimage we have come to the finish of our Annual Assembly. In a few hours we members will have gone our several ways, not knowing whether we will be privileged to meet again on our pilgrimage, and we feel to express our love and appreciation to the pilgrims of the church in Binghamton for their kindness in so fully welcoming and caring for the Assembly. And to our presiding officers for their kindness and consideration and to our General Superintendent for the blessing of his presence and preaching. Therefore be it

Resolved, by a rising vote of thanks, to so express ourselves with a prayer that the God of All Grace keep us in the hollow of His hand.

LETTER FROM GRACE M. ROBINSON

532 Shotwell Street, San Francisco, Calif.

To the N. Y. District Assembly: Greetings in Jesus' Name!

The Lord has given precious victory in our labors here for Him. Peniel Missionary Society has two missions here and for the first five weeks we were at what is called the Third Street Mission. About the 1st of December we were put in charge of Peniel Mission on the waterfront. We have two services every night in the week, a street meeting at 7:30 and indoor at 8 P. M. Every Friday we hold a prayer meeting at 12:30 P. M. and on Sunday A. M. a Bible study. The Lord has given us some faithful soldiers to stand by us.

Our open air service is held on what is called the Embarcadero. This is the home of sailors, seamen and longshoremen. On one side of the street are the Ferry building and the piers and buildings of the Southern Pacific Ferry Co. On the other side and where our service is held are pool rooms, restaurants, hotels and bootleggers' joints. In this one block and one side of the street there are said to be 14 bootleggers' joints. We sing Gospel songs and tell lost men that we have a Christ Who is mighty to save and strong to deliver. We have seen some fruit from faithful sowing in the salvation of drunkards and others. We thank God for every one, but a few have been outstanding. One night a man in middle life followed us in from the street meeting. I noticed he knew the songs and during the invitation invited him to the Lord. Twenty-five years ago he had been saved back in the Empire State, in the capital city, at 33 Green street. He asked me about many, Bro. Kennedy, Bro. Harry Moore and others. For years he had been away from the Lord. For about two weeks we held on for him and one Sunday night he knelt at the altar and prayed his way back to God.

Another night a young man, a Swede, came in from the street with us. He was a prize fighter but confessed he had never been happy in his life, said he had always craved something but never had been satisfied. He confessed his sins, promised to forsake them, and God met him and saved his soul. His testimony was: "I am so happy." Happiness he had sought all his life. Came in a moment when Jesus revealed Himself to him. Again another came, a dope fiend, with nerves shot to pieces. For a week he had gone without the stuff and now his nerves are jerking and twitching terribly. In answer to prayers Jesus touched him and he became as quiet as a babe. This gave him confidence towards God and after desperate prayer and holding on the Lord met him and set him free. Easter Sunday a linotype operator from across the bay stopped on the street to listen to the singing, etc. He had been drinking but his heart was touched. He followed us into the hall where we prayed for him. He told us of a Godly mother, whose dying words were "There is no night there," and who had begged him to pray and follow Jesus. Back in Kentucky is a Godly father who, he said, would do anything for him and then somewhere a Christian wife who had been forced to leave him because of his abuse. Again and again he prayed, but while we sang "There is power in the Blood." God met him. He said, "I have seen the Lord. I'm a changed man." Many others have knelt at the altar in these few months. Some have found pardon and others are hungry for holiness.

Thank the Lord for the precious privilege of pointing lost souls to the Lamb of God. Jesus is precious to my own soul. He has supplied my every need, given physical strength and most of all fills my heart with love Divine. He saves me and sanctifies me just now. Bless His name! Pray for us. Yours, all for Jesus.

In the kind providence of Him who ordereth and controlleth the destiny of men, we have been called to note the fact that it is appointed unto man once to die, by the departure from this world of our dear Sister Mary Howard (better known as Mother Howard) of Binghamton, N. Y., who departed to be with God on December 9th, 1930. Mother Howard was the last remaining one of those who felt the call of God for a Holiness movement on the north side of the City of Binghamton, and that united together to the end that the Pentecostal Rescue Mission of Binghamton became an incorporated body in 1904. Mother Howard gave of her life and temporal good as thoroughly as does the missionary going out to the field of labor, until the infirmities of age compelled her to retire from active labor. She was subject to those in control for any work or errand of mercy that she could perform. Her home was turned over for the use of our Bible School and workers. A home in which many storm tossed sick souls have found a place to rest their weary heads under the influence of her love and care. The funeral was held at the Pilgrim Tabernacle Church. That some one shall be raised up to receive her mantle and fill up the ranks until the eastern skies shall burst forth with the resplendent glory of His coming is our prayer.

It will be a glorious morning when the dead in Christ shall rise.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The following is my report as District Superintendent of the New York District for the year ending April 14, 1931.

The past year has been one of many battles and gracious victories. I believe the Churches as a whole have taken new territory. Several of the Churches have reported good revivals. There seems to be a revival spirit on and may God help us to work while "it is day for the night cometh when no man can work." All of the Churches have been visited once during the year and several of them twice. Brother Blann has assisted me some in visiting the Churches.

The Church at Cambridge, Mass., which was formerly in the Eastern District, has united with us, a new Church at Manchester, N. H., has been organized, and the opportunities for Church extension work were never greater. I believe that if our stronger organized Churches would push out and hold meetings in nearby school houses and push tent work we could enlarge our borders without much expense to the District.

The Lord has helped in a special way during the last year, although there has been a general financial depression. Our foreign missionary interests have been well taken care of and we must not retrench. We as a District are responsible for the work in Swazland, South Africa. Let us pray and plan for greater things in the coming year.

One of the dangers confronting us at this time is the tendency to swing toward popular holiness, and thus shun the legitimate reproach that goes with true Holiness. Brethren, we cannot afford to do so. Time is too short, the coming of the Lord is at hand. We must be willing to endure hardness as true soldiers of the Cross. We may never be a large Church, but let us keep clean and on fire. I received support as Dist. Supt. \$288.95.
