Resolved, that until such time as the General Church does take such befinite position, that people who are divorced and remarried, except to be penarried to the one from whom they were divorced, shall be denied membership in our Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the New York District.

Resolution No. 13—Recognizing that missionary interest is vital to the deepest spirituality of a church, we recommend and urgently request that each pastor see that a freewill offering be taken once each month and that the congregation be notified a week in advance that said offering will be taken. The day and date of offering to be determined by the local church. This offering to be sent before the 20th of each month with the report to the District Secretary of the Missionary Board. This offering shall not be taken from the pastor's support.

Resolution No. 14—Resolved, that all moneys intended for District Secretaries, Treasurer, etc., of the various departments of the District be sent them so as to reach them not later than April 10th.

Resolution No. 15—Resolved, that the New York District be subdivided by the District Council so as to include small groups of churches, which shall meet together for conventions, same to be in charge of the District Superintendent or his assistant, or some one appointed by him.

Resolution No. 16—Resolved, that all moneys given to Missionaries visiting our local churches be reported to our District Foreign Missionary Treasurer, by means of a receipt showing amount given them: and be it further Resolved, that all other moneys intended for the various mission fields, etc., be sent through the District Foreign Missionary Treasurer, either specified or unspecified.

Resolution No. 17—Resolved, that all activities for the benefit of the Bethel Orphanage work be reported direct to the representative of the orphan work for the District, and that a report be sent in from each church at the end of each quarter of the conference year; and be it further Resolved, that each church give at least one service during the year to the interest of the orphanage work at which the representatives of the same shall be invited to have charge.

Resolution No. 1S—We recommend that each Sunday School in the District establish a birthday box for the benefit of the Bethel Orphanage work, the contents of which shall be sent at the end of each quarter of the conference year to the District Representative.

Resolution No. 19—Resolved, that an offering be taken by each church to help defray the expenses of the District Assembly, the same to be brought to Assembly by delegate.

Resolution No. 20—Resolved, that the District Superintendent visit all the independent churches and missions on the District who are supplied to preachers who are members of this Assembly. Visits to be made as "stularly as to our organized churches.

Resolution No. 21—Resolved, that inasmuch as the cemetery lot in the brange Valley Cemetery at Binghamton, N. Y., is the property of the * York District and that money has been paid by said District for its "betual care and that the same lot has been looked upon as a burial for our workers, ministers and children who may desired to be "d there, and whereas the number of vacant lots have decreased "by, therefore be it Resolved, that none but our workers, ministers, "wives and children be granted burial privilege there, except by the "dy of the full Board of Trustees and then only in exceptional cases."

^{Resolution} No. 22—Resolved, that resolution No. 23 in our Minutes of the amended to read as follows:

Resolved, that each church of the New York District take a $m_{\rm e}$ offering for the support of the State Church Extension work, said $\sigma_{\rm eff}$ to be sent monthly to the Secretary-Treasurer of this Department, $\omega_{\rm eff}$ if further Resolved, that we continue the State Church Extension w

Resolution No. 23—Because of the fact that the Pastors' confereach year closes with the Annual Assembly, be it Resolved that so Pastors' farewell service will be on the Sunday following conference.

Resolution No. 24—Resolved, that each church sending a delegate delegates to the District Assembly pay the traveling expenses of said degates and Pastor. The same to apply to this Assembly and hereafter.

Resolution No. 25—Resolved, that the Treasurers of the various deparments of our work carry their accounts at the bank in the name of the department they represent and not in their personal names.

Resolution No. 26—Inasmuch as it is impossible according to State Lat for the District Council to borrow money for any purpose unless a specia corporation meeting is called, therefore be it Resolved, that this Assemble authorize said Council to borrow at its discretion not to exceed \$2,000.0 if need require.

Resolution No. 27—Since some of our licensed preachers may not b able to afford a correspondence course nor purchase the books require by our manual, be it Resolved that those who have studied books equivalent to the course be granted the privilege of an examination.

Resolution No. 28—Since our Manual provides that a representative shall visit our churches once a year in the interest of the various departments of our church, and since it is our desire to contribute to the supporof these departments, but with a proper proportion, and as we have our District and local obligations to take care of, be it therefore Resolved, that none of our churches shall make arrangements with said representative nor respond to solicitations by mail or for such services without the enrodsement and co-operation of the District Superintendent.

Resolution No. 29—Resolved, that children under the age of 14 yeas, who are members of our church be excused from conference claims.

Resolution No. 30—Since the support of the Foreign Missionary department needs constant and regular attention and that occasions of great enthusiasm do not last, be it therefore Resolved, that each local church organize some definite and systematic plan by which regular monthly offerings shall be given to the support of Foreign Missionary.

Resolution No. 31—Be it Resolved, that each member pay their conference claims, and this be forwarded to the District Treasurer befor-July 1st of the conference year. Amendment, September 1st.

Resolution No. 32—Inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members, and inasmuch as not every members reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolution before the church in a public service other than on the Lord's Day, and as soon as possible after the distribution of the printed minutes.

Resolution No. 33—Resolved, that we have a District Representative for the Advocate who shall look after interests of the Advocate through out the New York District.

Resolution No. 34—Resolved, that the ministers who are expected to prepare a paper for the ministerial convention shall be notified at least thirty days before said convention.

Just a short time after this man was saved another sailor staggered down the street, listened to his old shipmate's testimony, and came into the mission with us and was saved. In talking with him, he told me his name was Taylor and that he came from Kentucky, also that our Bro. (. G. Taylor was his uncle. I happened to have a picture of our Bro. Taylor, and found the resemblance so striking we couldn't doubt his word.

Last Fall a Swede from another part of Sweden came in under awful conviction. He talked very broken English, so we told him to pray in his own language, the Lord would understand. The Lord met his soul. Afterward he saw his need of getting sanctified and sought a holy heart and today is testifying to that experience.

Many come in, seek the Lord, go out and we do not see them again. But sometimes the Lord sends them back to testify and encourage our hearts. One young man, who said he had never read the Bible much, but had seen in the faces of Christians that this way is the right way, came in one Sunday night, come to Jesus, said he was saved, and went out. We were a bit doubtful about him, but three months from that night he he came back and testified that he had been kept all that time tho working among ungodly men.

I must tell you of our Chippewa Indian. Stolid faced and hopeless, he listened to the message, came to the Lord and was saved. He went out with the smile of Heaven lighting up his face. In a few days he went on looking for work, but with joy in his heart.

I'd like to tell you of our Christmas dinner given to our mission family; some at the table were sober for the first Christmas in many years. Some of our Christians have gone on into Holiness and testify that the Comforter dwells within. Others have failed to walk in the light and gone back into sin. While our hearts have been saddened by the awfulness of sin—we rejoice in Him, the mighty to save. "Jesus is more dear to me than earthly treasure, I can trust Him, though the billows roll." He saves and sanctifies my soul today. Pray for us. Yours to be true,

YOUNG PEOPLE'S RESOLUTION

1. We, the Young People of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Binghamton, N. Y., desire to have a district young people's organization, with one westdent, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, etc.

2. Purpose of the organization:

(a) To organize societies in the churches that are backward in this work.

(b) To work together in holding revivals, tent-meetings, etc. ¹ Euch church society should send a delegate to the yearly conference for the it own expense.

the last Saturday afternoon of conference should be set aside states people's conference. At this meeting the delegates should the ami business carried on as in other meetings. Plans should be made at this meeting, as to what revivals should be held in the correct year, and other new business, etc.

5. Suggestions:

A. That the number of people required for an organizat. should be 7 people under 35 years of age.

B. The pastor and his wife under 35 years of age should be honorar members, and over 35 years of age should be honorar members.

C. One of the active member preachers should be allowed to preach the last Saturday night of conference.

D. That rules stating the length of time that a person should be a Christian, and a member of the society before being elected to office, should be agreed upon.

E. Each local society should have business meetings once a quarter, or more often if necessary.

F. That each society strive to raise an amount each month equivalent to 25 cents per active member, through self-denials, love-offerings, fees, or any legitimate method.

6. We offer this to you for suggestion and hope that you will work on it, and give it your prayerful and careful consideration.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE

The committee appointed to confer with the local Young People's Society herewith submit the following rules and by-laws for the organization and work of a District Young People's Society.

I. The Young People's organization shall be called District Young People's Society of the Pilgrim Holiness Society of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of New York.

II. THE OBJECT of the district organization shall be to encourage the organization of our young people in the local church and launch evangelistic campaigns under the direction of the District Superintendent according to section 130 of our Manual Extension work shall be carried on in harmony with plans of and work of the District Church Extension Board.

MEMBERSHIP. The membership of this organization shall be divided into three classes: Active, Associate, and Honorary. (a) Active members shall be between the ages of 12 and 35 years and members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. (b) Associate members shall be those who are between the ages of 12 and 35 years who are Christians, but not members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. (c) Honorary members shall be Christian people above the age of 35 years, who desire to be affiliated with the organization. (d) Only active members have a right to vote or hold office in the organization.

III. Officers of the District Young People's Society shall consist of 7 members the same to be elected by the delegates from local societies at a time fixed by the District Council during the time of the Annual Assembly of the District. The nomination shall be made by the District Council consisting of at least three names for each position on the Board.

IV. The organization shall not hold any meetings that are not strictireligious and spiritual. All social meetings for visiting and feasting are prohibited.

V. At any time the District Young People's Society fails to live up the rules of their constitution the District Council has a right to $d_{\rm eff}$ continue the organization.
