## MINUTES OF THE DISTRICT ASSEMBLY

The eleventh annual Assembly of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was held at Binghamton, N. Y., April 19-24, 1932.

First session convened at 9 A. M., April 19. District Superintendent Rev. A. H. Wilson, presiding.

After a short song service led by Rev. A. E. Blann, Rev. Jasper Hamm read 1 Peter, 4, and spoke briefly. Prayer was offered by Rev. Delbert Gasier.

Motion made and supported that the Sunday School financial report be separated from the Church report, and that the Statistical Committee be instructed to act accordingly.

Voted to return Binghamton report to delegate to be rewritten on new blanks.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

## TUESDAY, APRIL 10, 2 P. M.

Devotional exercises.

Roll call of delegates and workers. Minutes of last session read and approved.

On recommendation of the Examining Committee the following names were presented and received as members of the New York District Assembly: Rev. H. J. Olsen, Rev. E. L. Larson, Rev. A. C. Tanner, Rev. W. A. Shoemaker, Rev. W. L. Braman.

Reading and passing on reports.

Voted to return the Keyserkill report to delegate for correction.

Adjourned to Wednesday, 9 A. M.

## WEDNESDAY, APRIL 20, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises.

Voted to dispense with roll call. Reading and passing on reports.

Motion made and seconded that the report of Sister Grace Robinson, of Peniel Mission, San Francisco, California, be printed in the minutes. It was also voted that the secretary write Sister Robinson extending greetings from this assembly.

During this session several letters from the mission field in Africa were read by Rev. A. E. Blann, chairman of Missionary Board. It was voted that parts of these letters of value to the District Missionary work be printed in the minutes.

It was voted to rescind the action of the assembly in regard to printing missionary letters in the minutes.

Moved and supported that parts of the missionary letters from the African work be printed in pamphlet form for distribution.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

Several resolutions were read by the Resolutions Committee.

Resolved that our Young Peoples societies send their leaders' reports given at the annual business meeting of the local church and not at the District Assembly as at present. Resolution lost, 16 for, 23 against. Voted to extend the time to 4:15.

A resolution regarding the organizing of a District Young Peoples Society was presented and discussed at length. After moving the previous question the resolution was adopted.

Resolved, that in order to keep in harmony with our manual Section 130, Par. 4, that our District Superintendent examine all deeds to church property, and that the dedication of new churches shall be in charge of said District Superintendent. This resolution was tabled on vote of assembly.

Moved and supported that the order of the day for April 21, morning session shall be the election of officers. Motion carried.

Voted that a committee of three be appointed to confer with the young people regarding the perfecting of a district young peoples society. H. J. Olsen, D. E. Wilson, Jasper Hamm were appointed on this committee.

Adjourned to Thursday, 9 A. M.

#### THURSDAY, APRIL 21, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

The Assembly proceeded with the election of officers in accordance with the ruling of last session. District Superintendent was at follows: 56 votes cast; A. H. Wilson 43; A. H. Wilson declared elected.

The following is the vote for assistant District Superintendent: 56 votes cast; A. E. Blann 32; A. E. Blann declared elected.

Following is the vote for District Secretary: 56 votes cast; Alvin Young 52; Alvin Young declared elected.

The following is the vote for District Treasurer: 56 votes cast; W. J. C. Vanoss 42; W. J. C. Vanoss declared elected.

Three advisory members of the District Council were elected as follows: first ballot was declared void on vote of Assembly because of misunderstanding in voting.

Moved and supported that we vote for one member of Advisory Council instead of three on ballot as formerly. Motion carried.

Rev. and Mrs. Henry Bailey, of the City Mission, were introduced and voted seat in Assembly bar.

H. J. Olson, Oscar W. Lawrence, Melvin R. Blann elected advisory members of District Council.

Rev. William J. C. Vanoss was elected member of the Board of Trustees for 3 years.

Rev. David E. Wilson was elected on first ballot as member of Board of Examiners for 3 years.

#### THURSDAY, APRIL 21, 2 P. M.

Devotional exercises.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

Rev. William H. Jopple, District Superintendent of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District, Rev. Alton Jopple, pastor of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Allentown, Pa., and Rev. D. E. Price, pastor of the Pilgrim Holiness church at Stroudsburg, Pa., were introduced and voted seat in Assembly bar.

D. E. Wilson and M. E. Blann elected members of the Extension Board for 2 years.

The following members were recommended by the chairman and elected on Board of Foreign Missions: Rev. A. J. Vanoss, Rev. A. H. Wilson, Rev. Alvin Young, Augusta Hogwer, Elsie D. Avery.

Rev. S. N. Bennett elected representative of Orphan Work.

Reading and passing on reports.

Several resolutions were read by chairman of the Resolution Committee.

Motion made and seconded that a committee on Minutes, consisting of two members, be appointed by chairman. Rev. W. J. C. Vanoss and Rev. A. E. Blann were appointed.

The following resolution was read by chairman of the Resolution committee:

"Since the manual of our church provides a course of study to be pursued by the licentiate of our church, Be it resolved, that all licensed preachers of our District who have not taken educational work equal to that asked by our church be required to do so, and that all candidates be advanced only so fast as they qualify.

This resolution was tabled on vote of Assembly.

Adjourned to Friday, 9 A. M.

#### FRIDAY, APRIL 22, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Rev. and Mrs. Bates, of the Free Methodist church of Binghamton, were introduced and voted seat in conference bar.

Rev. Paul Thomas, General Secretary-Treasurer of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, was introduced and voted seat in conference bar.

The Assembly proceeded to the election of three members of Board of Education.

David E. Wilson elected for 3 years; Henry J. Olson, elected for 2 years; A. E. Blann elected for 1 year.

Several resolutions were read by chairman of Resolution Committee.

Voted that Resolution No. 6 be taken from table.

On vote of Assembly resolution No. 6 was adopted.

On recommendation of the Examining Board the name of Mrs. Mary Olsen was presented and received as a member of the New York District Assembly.

Moved and supported that all resolutions in the minutes of the 1931 Assembly that have not been rescinded be reprinted in the minutes of the 1932 Assembly. Motion carried.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

#### FRIDAY, APRIL 22, 2 P. M.

Devotional exercises.

Minutes of last session read and approved. Report of the District Treasurer read and approved.

Resolution regarding the payment of Conference claim read by the chairman of the Resolution Committee. This resolution was declared out of order.

Moved and supported that resolution No. 28 of Assembly minutes, 1931, be rescinded. Motion carried.

The following resolution was presented by the Resolution Committee:

Resolved, that each member pay their conference claims and this be forwarded to the District Treasurer before July 1st of the conference year.

This resolution was amended to read "September 1st" instead of "July 1st," and adopted.

Rev. Paul Thomas, General Secretary-Treasurer of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, was introduced and spoke concerning the importance of co-operation in all church activities, laying special stress on advancing the interest of the church paper.

Adjourned to Saturday, 9 A. M.

### SATURDAY, APRIL 23, 9 A. M.

Devotional exercises.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

Moved and supported that the roll be called to determine approximately the number of new subscribers to the Advocate for the coming year. Motion carried. Two hundred forty-five new subscriptions were pledged.

The report of the Statistical Committee read and adopted.

Voted that the chair appoint a Committee on Reports. Rev. W. L. Braman, Rev. Milton Pierpont, and Rev. Lee Lawrence were appointed on this committee.

The committee appointed to formulate plans and rules for a District Young Peoples Society reported, and their report was adopted on vote of Assembly.

Motion made and supported that the matter of electing officers of the Young Peoples Society be placed in the hands of the District Council.

It was voted on a substitute motion to suspend the by-laws of the Young Peoples Society in regard to election of officers and the District Council name the officers for the coming year.

President, Clifton Berg; vice-president, Orrin Fay; secretary, Augusta Wilson; treasurer, Mary Olsen; advisory members, Mrs. Clinton Chesebro, Milton Pierpont, Ervin Phillips.

Several resolutions were read by the Resolution Committee.

Resolved, that Sec. 120-126 concerning Deaconesses, their license, examination and course of study, be strictly enforced.

This resolution was declared out of order by the chair.

Moved and supported that the District Council nominate three candidates for District Representative of the Advocate, one to be approved by the Assembly. Motion carried.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

### SATURDAY, APRIL 23, 2 P. M.

Minutes of last session corrected and approved.

Rev. L. A. Smith of the Free Methodist Church of Windsor, N. Y., Rev. W. E. Smith, Evangelist of the New York State Holiness Association, and Rev. Robert Dyer of the Reformed Methodist Church, were introduced and voted seat in Assembly bar.

Announcement was made by the District Superintendent that the next ministerial convention will be held at Ravena, N. Y., October 5-9, 1932.

The Assembly proceeded to ballot for Advocate Representative. The following names were presented by the District Council: W. L. Braman, Augusta Engwer, A. H. Wilson; 45 votes. W. L. Braman 9; Augusta Engwer 20; A. H. Wilson 16. No election.

Second ballot, two highest, 44 votes: Augusta Engwer 34; A. H. Wilson 10.

Augusta Engwer declared elected Advocate Representative.

Invitations were extended by several churches for the 1933 Assembly. Assembly voted as follows: Binghamton 31, Lake Placid 14.

The next Annual Assembly will be held at Binghamton, N. Y., April 18-23, 1933.

The District Superintendent spoke briefly regarding the Home Missionary work.

Moved and supported that we renew our pledges for church extension

work to as near as one dollar per year per member as possible be carried.

No further business, Assembly adjourned in due form.

The business of the Assembly is over, but the business of the Lord is before us. Let us unite in our efforts with the Glory of God uppermost in mind and press the battle as never before.

The devotional exercises each morning were especially helpful, conducted by the following preachers: Jasper Hamm, W. J. C. Vanoss, D. Wilson, H. J. Olsen, A. E. Blann. The evangelistic services each evening were well attended and spiritual messages were delivered by M. R. Blann, H. J. Olsen, and Paul Thomas. God is with us. Let us go forward.

### RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

**Resolution No. 1**—Inasmuch as our Annual Assembly convenes on Tuesday, and many of the pastors and workers arrive on the Monday previous, and since the evangelistic services held each evening are a great blessing to the church, be it resolved, that we begin these evening services the Monday evening before our business sessions, thus giving a week of evangelistic services to the entertaining church.

**Resolution No. 2**—Resolved, that each person taking part in the discussion of papers, at the Ministerial Convention, be limited to five minutes until all who desire have had the privilege of the floor.

**Resolution No. 3**—Resolved, that each preacher who is assigned a subject for the Ministerial Convention prepare his subject on paper and present the same to the convention without comment.

**Resolution No. 4**—Resolved, that the District Superintendent shall provide a preacher to conduct conventions or quarterly meetings at the request of any of our churches, sufficient time being given previous to said meeting.

**Resolution No. 5**—Resolved, that in order to keep in harmony with our manual, Section 130, paragraph 4, that our District Superintendent examine all deeds to church property, that the dedication of new churches shall be in charge of said District Superintendent.

**Resolution No. 6**—Resolved, that the resolution regarding the support of District Superintendent on page 5 of Minutes of this District be adopted for another year.

**Resolution No. 7**—Since our missionary letters and reports are such a blessing to the assembly, therefore, be it resolved, that our missionary secretary write our missionaries in Swaziland asking for a personal report of their activities during the year, sending same in time to be read at our Annual Assembly.

**Resolution No. 8**—Resolved, that because of the added responsibility of the District Foreign Missionary Board, we recommend that the membership of the Board be increased to five including the District Superintendent, who shall nominate the other four members, subject to the approval of Assembly.

**Resolution No. 9**—Resolved, that resolutions numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, and 22 be dropped from our minutes of 1932.

**Resolution No. 10**—Resolved, that our pastors, who contemplate calling a evangelist from outside of our district, first advise with the District Superintendent regarding the same.

**Resolution No. 11**—Resolved, that we recommend that our churches of the New York District observe the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at least every three months. Due notice to be given from the pulpit on the previous Sunday, or not less than a week in advance.

**Resolution No. 12**—Because of the ever growing menace to vital Salvation of the divorce and remarriage evil, we feel that some definite position should be taken by the Pilgrim Holiness Church regarding the same, that honest hearts may be protected and warned, and, inasmuch as the Manual does not declare itself definitely on the subject; therefore, be it

Resolved, that until such time as the General Church does take such definite position, that people who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they were divorced, shall be denied membership in our Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the New York District.

**Resolution No. 13**—Recognizing that missionary interest is vital to the deepest spirituality of a church, we recommend and urgently request that each pastor see that a freewill offering be taken once each month and that the congregation be notified a week in advance that said offering will be taken. The day and date of offering to be determined by the local church. This offering to be sent before the 20th of each month with the report to the District Secretary of the Missionary Board. This offering shall not be taken from the pastor's support.

**Resolution No. 14**—Resolved, that all moneys intended for District Secretaries, Treasurer, etc., of the various departments of the District be sent them so as to reach them not later than April 10th.

**Resolution No. 15**—Resolved, that the New York District be subdivided by the District Council so as to include small groups of churches, which shall meet together for conventions, same to be in charge of the District Superintendent or his assistant, or some one appointed by him.

**Resolution No. 16**—Resolved, that all moneys given to Missionaries visiting our local churches be reported to our District Foreign Missionary Treasurer, by means of a receipt showing amount given them; and be it further Resolved, that all other moneys intended for the various mission fields, etc., be sent through the District Foreign Missionary Treasurer, either specified or unspecified.

**Resolution No. 17**—Resolved, that all activities for the benefit of the Bethel Orphanage work be reported direct to the representative of the orphan work for the District, and that a report be sent in from each church at the end of each quarter of the conference year; and be it further Resolved, that each church give at least one service during the year to the interest of the orphanage work at which the representatives of the same shall be invited to have charge.

**Resolution No. 18**—We recommend that each Sunday School in the District establish a birthday box for the benefit of the Bethel Orphanage work, the contents of which shall be sent at the end of each quarter of the conference year to the District Representative.

**Resolution No. 19**—Resolved, that an offering be taken by each church to help defray the expenses of the District Assembly, the same to be brought to Assembly by delegate.

**Resolution No. 20**—Resolved, that the District Superintendent visit all of the independent churches and missions on the District who are supplied by preachers who are members of this Assembly. Visits to be made as regularly as to our organized churches.

**Resolution No. 21**—Resolved, that inasmuch as the cemetery lot in the Onango Valley Cemetery at Binghamton, N. Y., is the property of the New York District and that money has been paid by said District for its actual care and that the same lot has been looked upon as a burial place for our workers, ministers and children who may desire to be buried there, and whereas the number of vacant lots have decreased rapidly, therefore be it Resolved, that none but our workers, ministers, wives and children be granted burial privilege there, except by the majority of the full Board of Trustees and then only in exceptional cases.

**Resolution No. 22**—Resolved, that resolution No. 23 in our Minutes of 1932 be amended to read as follows:



Resolved, that each church of the New York District take a monthly offering for the support of the State Church Extension work, said offering to be sent monthly to the Secretary-Treasurer of this Department, and it further Resolved, that we continue the State Church Extension work.

**Resolution No. 23**—Because of the fact that the Pastors' conference each year closes with the Annual Assembly, be it Resolved that the Pastors' farewell service will be on the Sunday following conference.

**Resolution No. 24**—Resolved, that each church sending a delegate delegates to the District Assembly pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and Pastor. The same to apply to this Assembly and hereafter.

**Resolution No. 25**—Resolved, that the Treasurers of the various departments of our work carry their accounts at the bank in the name of the department they represent and not in their personal names.

**Resolution No. 26**—Inasmuch as it is impossible according to State Law for the District Council to borrow money for any purpose unless a special corporation meeting is called, therefore be it Resolved, that this Assembly authorize said Council to borrow at its discretion not to exceed \$2,000.00 if need require.

**Resolution No. 27**—Since some of our licensed preachers may not be able to afford a correspondence course nor purchase the books required by our manual, be it Resolved that those who have studied books equivalent to the course be granted the privilege of an examination.

**Resolution No. 28**—Since our Manual provides that a representative shall visit our churches once a year in the interest of the various departments of our church, and since it is our desire to contribute to the support of these departments, but with a proper proportion, and as we have our District and local obligations to take care of, be it therefore Resolved, that none of our churches shall make arrangements with said representative nor respond to solicitations by mail or for such services without the endorsement and co-operation of the District Superintendent.

**Resolution No. 29**—Resolved, that children under the age of 14 years who are members of our church be excused from conference claims.

**Resolution No. 30**—Since the support of the Foreign Missionary department needs constant and regular attention and that occasions of great enthusiasm do not last, be it therefore Resolved, that each local church organize some definite and systematic plan by which regular monthly offerings shall be given to the support of Foreign Missionary.

**Resolution No. 31**—Be it Resolved, that each member pay their conference claims, and this be forwarded to the District Treasurer before July 1st of the conference year. Amendment, September 1st.

**Resolution No. 32**—Inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members, and inasmuch as not every member reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church in a public service other than on the Lord's Day, and as soon as possible after the distribution of the printed minutes.

**Resolution No. 33**—Resolved, that we have a District Representative for the Advocate who shall look after interests of the Advocate throughout the New York District.

**Resolution No. 34**—Resolved, that the ministers who are expected to prepare a paper for the ministerial convention shall be notified at least thirty days before said convention.

#### LETTER FROM GRACE M. ROBINSON

To the New York District Assembly, Greetings in His name:

Another year has closed and we want to report victory through Him that loved us. We have needed much help from God, but He has not failed us. The financial depression that is sweeping the world is felt very keenly in this seaport city, and we have not escaped. But in spite of this and in the face of the powers of darkness of these last days, the Lord has kept Peniel on the waterfront open and given us some cause to Praise His name!

Swedes, Finnish, Norwegian, French, Italian, Russian, German, Indian, Spanish, and Yankee have knelt at the altar since the last New York Assembly, as well as one who said, "I am just a common Pennsylvania Dutchman," but he found Jesus. I want to tell you of a few of these.

One night a tall, soldierly looking man, a Swede, came into our

... a time in the street meeting he had passed us with a sneer, ... might he was sober and under awful conviction. He knelt at the ... confessed his sins and wept and prayed his way into the kingdom. ... a transformation! He has separated himself from the old crowd ... every night when not at sea, goes on the street with us, to tell his ... companions the story of Jesus and His power to save. From others ... have learned that our brother came from one of the first families ... Sweden, some of his brothers holding high official positions, but he had ... a godly mother's heart and gone down in sin. Now about fifty- ... years of age, he is serving the Lord on board a steamer shipping to ... Honolulu from here.

Just a short time after this man was saved another sailor staggered down the street, listened to his old shipmate's testimony, and came into the mission with us and was saved. In talking with him, he told me his name was Taylor and that he came from Kentucky, also that our Bro. C. G. Taylor was his uncle. I happened to have a picture of our Bro. Taylor, and found the resemblance so striking we couldn't doubt his word.

Last Fall a Swede from another part of Sweden came in under awful conviction. He talked very broken English, so we told him to pray in his own language, the Lord would understand. The Lord met his soul. Afterward he saw his need of getting sanctified and sought a holy heart and today is testifying to that experience.

Many come in, seek the Lord, go out and we do not see them again. But sometimes the Lord sends them back to testify and encourage our hearts. One young man, who said he had never read the Bible much, but had seen in the faces of Christians that this way is the right way, came in one Sunday night, come to Jesus, said he was saved, and went out. We were a bit doubtful about him, but three months from that night he came back and testified that he had been kept all that time tho working among ungodly men.

I must tell you of our Chippewa Indian. Stolid faced and hopeless, he listened to the message, came to the Lord and was saved. He went out with the smile of Heaven lighting up his face. In a few days he went on looking for work, but with joy in his heart.

I'd like to tell you of our Christmas dinner given to our mission family; some at the table were sober for the first Christmas in many years. Some of our Christians have gone on into Holiness and testify that the Comforter dwells within. Others have failed to walk in the light and gone back into sin. While our hearts have been saddened by the awfulness of sin—we rejoice in Him, the mighty to save. "Jesus is more dear to me than earthly treasure, I can trust Him, though the billows roll." He saves and sanctifies my soul today. Pray for us. Yours to be true,

The Foreign Missionary interests have been taken care of splendidly despite the depression, and with no financial loss to the local churches. Our brethren are seeing that God blesses the church that supports the cause of Missions.

One phase of our work that needs special attention is the Home Missionary, or Church Extension work. I believe the most successful, and at the same time, most satisfactory way of doing this work is for our regular organized churches to push out with local help and reach the surrounding communities, by tent meetings, school houses and churches which have been abandoned. ## YOUNG PEOPLE'S RESOLUTION

1. We, the Young People of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Binghamton, N. Y., desire to have a district young people's organization, with one president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, etc.

2. Purpose of the organization:

(a) To organize societies in the churches that are backward in this work.

(b) To work together in holding revivals, tent-meetings, etc.

3. Each church society should send a delegate to the yearly conference at their own expense.

4. The last Saturday afternoon of conference should be set aside for a young people's conference. At this meeting the delegates should discuss the social and business carried on as in other meetings. Plans should be

made at this meeting, as to what revivals should be held in the coming year, and other new business, etc.

5. Suggestions:

A. That the number of people required for an organization should be 7 people under 35 years of age.

B. The pastor and his wife under 35 years of age should be active members, and over 35 years of age should be honorary members.

C. One of the active member preachers should be allowed to preach the last Saturday night of conference.

D. That rules stating the length of time that a person should be a Christian, and a member of the society before being elected to office, should be agreed upon.

E. Each local society should have business meetings once a quarter, or more often if necessary.

F. That each society strive to raise an amount each month equivalent to 25 cents per active member, through self-denials, love-offerings, fees, or any legitimate method.

6. We offer this to you for suggestion and hope that you will work on it, and give it your prayerful and careful consideration.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE

The committee appointed to confer with the local Young People's Society herewith submit the following rules and by-laws for the organization and work of a District Young People's Society.

I. The Young People's organization shall be called District Young People's Society of the Pilgrim Holiness Society of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of New York.

II. THE OBJECT of the district organization shall be to encourage the organization of our young people in the local church and launch evangelistic campaigns under the direction of the District Superintendent according to section 130 of our Manual Extension work shall be carried on in harmony with plans of and work of the District Church Extension Board.

MEMBERSHIP. The membership of this organization shall be divided into three classes: Active, Associate, and Honorary. (a) Active members shall be between the ages of 12 and 35 years and members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. (b) Associate members shall be those who are between the ages of 12 and 35 years who are Christians, but not members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. (c) Honorary members shall be Christian people above the age of 35 years, who desire to be affiliated with the organization. (d) Only active members have a right to vote or hold office in the organization.

III. Officers of the District Young People's Society shall consist of 7 members the same to be elected by the delegates from local societies at a time fixed by the District Council during the time of the Annual Assembly of the District. The nomination shall be made by the District Council consisting of at least three names for each position on the Board.

IV. The organization shall not hold any meetings that are not strictly religious and spiritual. All social meetings for visiting and feasting are prohibited.

V. At any time the District Young People's Society fails to live up to the rules of their constitution the District Council has a right to discontinue the organization.

Voted to insert paragraph No. 4 under section 82. Adopted. Paragraph 3 adopted.
