Several resolutions were read by the chairman of the Resolution Committee.

Moved and supported that the orders of the day for 10:30 A. M. shall be the election of officers.

A substitute for resolution No. 10, of 1933 minutes, was discussed at length. A unanimous standing vote of Assembly passed the substitute resolution which shall read: "2% of pastors salary" instead of 4%.

Rev. R. H. Cantrell of the Church of the Nazarene at Binghamton, N. Y., was introduced and voted seat in Assembly bar.

Rev. Frank Finch of the Reformed Methodist Church at Vestal, N. Y., and Rev. Robert Dyer of the Reformed Methodist Church at Cincinnati, N. Y., were introduced and voted seat in Assembly bar.

After prayer by Rev. A. E. Blann the Assembly proceeded to the election of officers.

First ballot for District Superintendent: 60 votes cast. A. H. Wilson received 55 and was declared elected.

First ballott for Assistant District Superintendent: 60 votes cast. A. E. Blann received 50 and was declared elected.

First ballot for District Secretary: 64 votes cast. Alvin Young received 55 and was declared elected.

Rev. Harold D. Deiter, President of Beulah Park Bible School of Allentown, Pa., and Rev. Roy O. Musser of Bethlehem, Pa., were introduced and voted seat in Assembly bar.

First ballot for District Treasurer: 59 votes cast. No election. It was voted to suspend the rules and vote for the three highest.

Motion was withdrawn and it was voted to ballot for the two highest, O. W. Lawrence and D. E. Wilson.

Second ballot: 60 votes cast. O. W. Lawrence received 49 and was declared elected.

The Quartette of the Allentown Bible School was introduced and favored the Assembly with a fine quartette number.

First ballot for Advisory Members of District Council: 60 votes cast, three on ballot. H. J. Olsen, 47; M. R. Blann, 37. H. J. Olsen and M. R. Blann declared elected.

Second ballot, voting for one: 59 votes cast. No election.

Voted to suspend rules and vote for four highest, D. E. Wilson, H. L. Twining, Jasper Hamm, G. L. Helsby.

Third ballot: 57 votes cast. No election.

Fourth ballot, Voting for two highest: D. E. Wilson, H. L. Twining. 58 votes cast. D. E. Wilson, 29; H. L. Twining, 29. No election.

Fifth ballot: 58 votes cast. D. E. Wilson received 30 and was declared elected.

Adjourned to 2 P. M.

The Assembly proceeded with the election of officers.

First ballot for member of Board of Trustees: 60 votes cast. S. N. Bennett received 47 and was declared elected.

First ballot for member of Board of Examiners: 61 votes cast. A. H. Wilson received 40 and was declared elected.

First ballot for two members of the Board of Church Extension: 61 votes cast. D. E. Wilson, 41; M. R. Blann, 44. M. R. Blann and D. E. Wilson declared elected.

Voted to suspend the rules in order to pass a resolution relative to the Foreign Missionary Board.

First ballot for Board of Education: 61 votes cast. H. J. Olsen received 52 and was declared elected.

Reading and passing on reports.

After reading of the Foreign Missionary Report the District Superintendent spoke briefly commending the pastors and people of the district for the splendid response in raising funds for the return of the Reeds from from Africa for their well earned furlough.

The Beulah Park Bible School male quartette sang two splendid songs which were well rendered, and well received by the Assembly.

Bro. and Sr. Joseph and Bro. John of the New York Church spoke briefly after which an offering of \$17.71 was taken to help defray their expenses to Assembly.

The Assembly proceeded with the election of Ministerial Delegates to General Assembly, Voting for 7.

First ballot: 56 votes cast. O. W. Lawrence, 42; Jasper Hamm, 42; Ervin Phillips, 32; H. L. Twining, 39.

O. W. Lawrence, Jasper Hamm, Ervin Phillips and H. L. Twining were declared elected.

Moved and supported that we vote for the nine highest from first ballot. Voting for 3.

Second ballot: 57 votes cast. No election.

Moved and supported that we vote for the seven highest from the second ballot, the three receiving majority vote shall be declared elected as Ministerial delegates. The three highest following shall be declared elected Alternate delegates. Motion carried.

General Superintendent, Rev. W. L. Surbrook, was introduced and was tendered the chair by Dist. Supt. Wilson.

Third ballot: 58 votes cast. M. R. Blann received 35 and was declared elected.

Moved and supported that we vote for the five highest from the third ballot, the two receiving highest number of votes shall be declared elected. The three next highest shall be declared elected alternate delegates. Motion carried.

Fourth ballot: 55 votes cast. G. L. Helsby, 31; C. F. Berg, 23. G. L. Helsby and C. F. Berg were declared elected.

The three next highest, D. E. Wilson, 21; Milton Pierpoint, 21; S. N. Bennett, 12; were declared elected alternate delegates.

The Assembly proceeded with the election of four lay delegates.

Moved and supported that the District Council nominate 9 laymen, 4 from these 9 to be elected. Motion carried.

There have been unusual and heavy financial burdens, but the Bank that is opened with the key of prayer has proven sufficient for our every need.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

Resolution No. 1—Be it resolved that: Any licensed preacher who fails to stand examination on at least one book on the course of study for licensed preachers during any one year shall be demoted to the standing in the course of study one year below the standing he now occupies except he be excused by the District Council on account of sickness or for other justifiable reasons.

Resolution No. 2—In order to safeguard one another as churches, and recognize the ecclesiastical governing body be it therefore resolved that no property such as churches, parsonages, or any other buildings or land, shall be sold of any of our incorporate churches without first conferring with the trustees of the district corporation.

Resolution No. 3—Resolved that section 16 of article 2 of the religious corporation law be enforced in our district in regard to churches who have discontinued holding services and where are less than 7 resident attending members.

That such temporalities and property be managed by the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., our ecclesiastical governing body, or may, in pursuance of the provision of law relating to the disposition of real property by religious corporations, sell or dispose of the same, and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to

which the property of such governing religious body is devoted, and shall not divert such property to any other object.

In no case shall property be sold or disposed of to support the preacher who may claim this as an out appointment.

Due notice shall be given by the District Secretary regarding the action of the District Assembly in declaring a church extinct, within thirty days, to the remaining members, if any.

Resolution No. 4—Resolved, that when money is sent direct to any fund the church treasurer shall obtain a receipt for same and forward this to the district representative.

Resolution No. 5—Be it resolved, that all departments of our church shall upon receipt of moneys immediately forward receipt for same to sender.

Resolution No. 6—No preacher, or evangelist coming from another district or denomination shall hold any official position in our conference until one year shall have been spent as supplying a church or sufficient revival work in the district to prove the ability and sincerity of the candidate except they come with an unquestioned recommendation from their former denomination or district.

Resolution No. 7—Resolved: That our conference assessments be raised to \$1.25 this year and that the extra \$.25 be kept for the expenses of the delegates to the General Assembly in 1934.

(The extra \$.25 per member should be forwarded to District Treasurer not later than September 1st.)

Resolution No. 8—Inasmuch as it has been a practice in other years for some delegates to leave the business sessions of the Assembly one or two days before its close, be it resolved that all delegates shall attend each business session of the entire Assembly unless excused by the presiding officer.

Resolution No. 9—Resolved: That the District Foreign Missionary Board shall consist of five members including the District Superintendent who shall nominate said board subject to the approval of the Assembly.

Resolution No. 10—Resolved: That the District Superintendent receive for his services an amount equal to four per cent of the pastor's salary for the previous year. The same to be raised before or at the time of his visit.

Resolution No. 11—Resolved: That inasmuch as there seems to be a lack of interest in our district concerning our Sunday-school work, we recommend that all our pastors put forth a desperate effort to greater activity and make it a point to be present at every session if at all possible.

Resolution No. 12—Resolved: That in compliance with Section 16, Article 2 of the religious corporation law, we, the Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., declare the following churches extinct, namely: Grosvenors Corners, Conesville and Union Valley, and that the district council shall take possession of the temporalities and property of said churches and manage the same, or may, in provision with said law, sell or dispose of the same and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to which the property of our church is devoted.

Due notice shall be given by the district secretary of this action within thirty days to the remaining member or members, if any.

Resolution No. 13—Inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members, and inasmuch as not every one reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church, other than on the Lord's day, but as soon as possible after the distribution of the minutes.

Resolution No. 14—Be it resolved that each church of our district give \$2.00 or more per month, if possible, to church extension work.

Resolution No. 15—Be it resolved that we the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in convention assembled at Binghamton, New York, April 17-22, 1934, place ourselves on record as being unalterably

opposed to, and deplore the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage such sale or use of said liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.
