JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

OPENING SESSION—July 7, 1952, 2:00 P.M.

The Thirty-First Annual Conference of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 2:00 P.M. on July 7, 1952 at the Victory Grove Camp Ground.

Rev. J. N. Jump led the Conference in singing "Love Lifted Me," and "God Leads Us Along," after which prayer was offered by Rev. H. L. Twining.

Rev. William H. Neff, First Assistant General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, was introduced to the Conference and assumed chairmanship of the same.

In a short address, Brother Neff underlined the paramount need of two things which contribute to a successful Conference. He declared that we must have the disposition of Jesus for wisdom, and the direction of the Holy Spirit for understanding.

The Secretary called the roll, and the Conference bar was organized. Sr. S. Joy Smith was seated as delegate from the Gloversville church in the absence of the regularly appointed delegate from that church.

Rev. Melvin Dieter was introduced to the Conference and spoke briefly regarding the work of the Allentown Bible College. He expressed appreciation for the contribution made to the school by the District during the past year.

The Secretary read a letter of greeting which was sent to the Conference by the General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Orrin L. Fay read a splendid report which was received with gratitude by the Conference.

The Assistant Superintendent's oral report was given and accepted.

The Secretary of the Auditing Committee read his report which was accepted by the Conference.

The Victory Grove Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Binghamton Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Vermontville Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Church Extension Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The District Young People's Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Editor of the Pilgrim News gave his report which was accepted.

Rev. Mrs. Florein Strohl was introduced to the Conference.

The Secretary of the Resolutions Committee reported.

Resolution number 1, dealing with the purchase of additional kitchen

equipment for our three Camps was read and accepted by vote of the Conference.

Resolution number 2, relative to Camp pledges was read and accepted.

Resolution number 3, pertaining to the reporting of Sunday School statistics in The Pilgrim News was read and adopted.

Resolution number 4, dealing with the date of Ministerial Conventions, was read and adopted.

Resolution number 5 was presented, advocating the installation of flush plumbing at the Victory Grove Camp Ground. After some discussion, the matter was submitted to the District Council, with the authority to investigate and act upon the same at their discretion.

The following names were presented to the Conference as candidates for ordination as Ministers: Magdalen Blann, Paul Fryer, Seymour Lawton. By motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Conference voted to ordain these candidates.

By recommendation of the Council and vote of the Conference, William F. McCulley was granted a District Preacher's License.

The splendid report of the Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions was read and gratefully received.

The Secretary read reports from the following Missionaries which were joyfully received by the Conference. Bernabe Lara, Beatrice Dodge, Grace M. Robinson, Robert Hughes, John Blann, and George and Betty Gilmore.

The motion was made and seconded that the order of business in the evening session shall be the election of officers. The motion carried.

We adjourned by expiration of time until the evening sitting.

SECOND SESSION—July 7, 1952, 7:00 p.m.

Rev. A. H. Wilson led the Conference in prayer after which some choruses were sung and a few remarks given by Brother Neff.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read by the Secretary and accepted by the Conference.

We proceeded to the election of officers.

The following tellers were appointed by the District Superintendent: Rev. Russell Davis, Rev. Meredith Twining, Rev. E. L. Zerby, Rev. Wayne Clark, Rev. Lloyd Stuart, and Clayton DuBois.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. O. L. Fay was overwhelmingly elected on the first ballot, receiving 63 out of 76 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. F. T. Finch was elected on the fourth ballot, receiving 57 out of 73 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. Rev. Robert L. Smith was elected on the first ballot, receiving 67 out of 75 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer. Rev. J. N. Jump was elected on the first ballot, receiving 67 out of 76 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for three advisory members of the Council. Rev. O. W. Lawrence and Rev. Alvin Young were elected on the first ballot, receiving 49 and 48 out of 76 votes respectively. Ballots were cast again, with no election. The motion prevailed that we vote for the three highest names. Again there was no election. The motion was adopted that we vote for the two highest names. Rev. H. L. Twining was elected, receiving 44 out of 76 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for member of the Board of Education. Rev. W. E. Watts was elected on the first ballot, receiving 45 out of 72 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for member of the Board of Trustees. Rev. Alvin Young was elected on the first ballot receiving 68 out of 72 votes cast.

Sister Blanche Avery was elected Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions by a standing vote.

A further report was heard from the Secretary of the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution number 6, regarding the Assistant District Superintendent's traveling expense was read. By vote of the Conference this resolution was tabled.

Resolution number 7, pertaining to Pastor's salaries was read and also tabled.

Resolution number 8, dealing with the Pension Plan was lost for lack of a supporting motion.

Resolution number 9, relating to the District Youth Convention was adopted by the Conference.

The District Statistician's report was read and accepted.

Sister Yeo, of the Haverhill, Mass. Church favored the Conference with a beautiful musical number on the violin.

We adjourned until the morning sitting by expiration of time.

THIRD SESSION—July 8, 1952, 9:00 A.M.

Rev. Garry Boel led the Conference in singing "He Lives." Prayer was offered by Rev. O. W. Lawrence.

Brother Neff spoke helpfully concerning the illumination and enlightenment of the Holy Spirit, and their place in safeguarding the best interests of the growing church. He based his remarks on the sixth chapter of the book of The Acts of the Apostles.

The motion was made and supported that Resolution number 9 be reconsidered. The motion carried, and after some discussion, the matter was referred to the District Council for final disposition.

Another resolution was presented by the Secretary of the Committee. Resolution number 10, relating to resident responsible persons maintaining order in our Camp dormitories was adopted by the Conference as amended.

The following resolution was presented by the Committee on Memoirs:

"Whereas, during the past Conference year, our esteemed fellow-laborers, the Rev. Jasper Hamm, the Rev. Isaac Terry, Mrs. A. H. Wilson, and Mrs. W. E. Reed have gone to be with the Lord in our Heavenly home; and

"Whereas the homegoing of these servants of God has brought us a sense of loss;

"Be it resolved, that this Conference stand in a moment of silence as a tribute to their memory, and

"Be it further resolved that memorials to them be prepared and spread upon the printed minutes of this Conference."

This was followed by a period of silence during which time the Conference stood with bowed heads, and after which Brother Neff offered an appropriate prayer. We then sang a verse of "The Sweet Bye and Bye."

In keeping with a previous request from the District Council, each church represented was asked to report the results of balloting upon the desirability of continuing the publication of "The Pilgrim News." The response was overwhelmingly in favor of the District paper.

The Pastors of the District reported that nearly 800 subscriptions to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate had been received during the year.

The Secretary informed the Conference of action taken by the Council making the date of the Binghamton Camp two weeks earlier, effective in 1953. A motion prevailed that the Conference consider the matter. After some discussion, the action of the Council was rescinded by vote of the Conference.

The District Trustees report was given and accepted.

Some discussion followed relative to the Ministerial Benefit Association, and the advantages of membership in the same were pointed out.

Brother Neff called attention to a chart which graphically portrayed "What becomes of the Pilgrim Dollar." The motion was adopted that we have a replica of this chart made for use in the churches of the District.

By motion duly made and seconded, it was decided to send to Rev. W. E. Reed the greetings of the Conference. The motion carried unanimously.

Invitations for the forth coming Ministerial Convention were extended by the churches at Ravena and Binghamton. A secret ballot vote was taken, and the Binghamton Church was chosen.

ORDINATION SERVICE

Rev. J. N. Jump led the Conference in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have." Scripture was read by Rev. A. E. Blann and Rev. F. T. Finch,

Rev. W. H. Neff gave the charge, speaking from the subject, "Three Moral Watchwords." 1. I am made a minister. 2. I am made a servant. 3. I keep my body under. Sr. Magdalen Blann, Bro. Paul Fryer, and Bro. Seymour Lawton were ordained to the Christian ministry by prayer and the laying on of hands.

The motion was adopted that we send to the churches the same number of minutes as last year.

The Secretary read the list of Pastoral Locations for the coming year.

Rev. Lloyd Stuart offered special prayer for Rev. Elvin West, who because of illness was unable to be present.

At the suggestion of the Chairman, a special love offering was received for Brother Fay for his untiring labors during the year past.

The Secretary of the Resolutions Committee read the following resolution which was adopted by the Conference:

As an expression of our appreciation to the Rev. W. H. Neff for his fine messages and efficient chairmanship over the District Conference; The District Council; Committees and other officers for their faithful labors, and the kitchen and ground staff of the Victory Grove Camp for their hospitality and entertainment,

Be it resolved that we extend a rising vote of thanks.

There being no further business, the Conference adjourned.

Although we sorrow not as those who have no hope, we have been grieved by the passing of faithful fellow-laborers during the past year. Convinced that they have risen to receive the everlasting prize, we press with holy vigor on, gladly anticipating a glorious reunion at the end of life's journey.

REV. JASPER HAMM

Rev. Jasper Hamm went to be with the Lord on March 24, 1952 at the age of 68. He was converted at the Albany Hospital at the time of a very serious illness and sanctified six months later. He is survived by his wife, the former Susan M. McCabe, a son Dierreil, three sisters, one brother and several nieces and nephews. Pastoring until called away, Brother Hamm served pastorates at East Dickinson, Brushton, Oneonta, Troy, East Windsor and Gulf Summit, New York.

The funeral was conducted by Rev. A. H. Wilson, assisted by the Rev. A. E. Blann, at Binghamton, N. Y. with interment at Cobleskill, N. Y.

ADA JOAN REED

Sister Ada Joan Reed, wife of Rev. W. E. Reed, was born at Shannonville, Ontario, Canada on September 21, 1881. Moving to Flint Michigan in 1910, she found God's redeeming Grace the following year, and while training for Service at Owosso, she was sanctified in January, 1913. From 1914 until 1922, she faithfully served, with her husband, in rescue and pastoral labors. In the latter year, however, Brother and Sister Reed sailed to Africa as missionaries. After 12 years on the foreign field, failing health forced a return to the homeland. In capacity of a pastor's wife, she served several New York appointments. On January 9, 1952 Sister Reed received her call to realms above after several years of declining health. The funeral was conducted at Northville, N. Y. with her pastor, Rev. Milton E. Pierpoint, officiating and Revs. A. E. Blann and Alvin Young assisting. Burial was at Northville.

LUELLA LAYMEN WILSON

At Albany City Hospital on September 30, 1951, Luella Laymen Wilson departed to be with the Lord, at the age of 62 years. The wife of Rev. A. H. Wilson, pastor, evangelist, and former District Superintendent, she served faithfully and well as she shared in the labors of the Ministry. Sister Wilson was born at Ballston Spa, N. Y. in 1889, converted in January, 1906 and sanctified in 1909 at Schenectady, N. Y. November 16, 1910 she was married to the Rev. A. H. Wilson. To this union six children were born.

Sister Wilson was faithful to the Saviour, even during the suffering of the latter years of her earthly sojourn. Her passing leaves husband, children, the Church, and all others whom her life touched with a great sense of loss. The funeral was conducted by the Rev. Philip Doyle, pastor of the church where her membership was held, assisted by Revs. O. L. Fay and A. E. Blann.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

FINANCE

No. 1. Resolved, that each church sending a delegate or delegates to the District Conference, pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and pastor.

No. 2. Resolved, that when the District Council deems any licensed minister unable to meet the expense of taking the study course as directed in Education Resolution No. 2, they may pay all or part of the cost of such course. The Licensee in such case shall agree to finish a year of such course in the Conference year.

No. 3. Resolved, that when money is sent direct to any fund, the church treasurer shall obtain a receipt for same and forward this to each District Representative.

No. 4. Resolved, that all departments of our church shall, upon receipt of monies, immediately forward receipts for same to sender.

No. 5. Resolved, that the District Treasurer shall maintain two funds, to be known as the District Expense Fund and The Church Extension Fund.

The ministers and workers of the District shall pay all their tithe into the church where they hold membership.

Each month the local church shall forward to the District Treasurer, the pastor's tithe and 50% of other ministerial member's tithe. These amounts shall be specified for the District Expense Fund.

The District Church Extension Fund shall be provided for by an assessment of \$1.50 per member. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer, specified for the Church Extension Fund.

The churches shall be assessed \$3.50 per member, \$1.00 for General Home Missions, or Church Extension, \$1.00 for General Administration expenses, \$.75 for a fund to found a Senior College, \$.50 for a General Church Extension Loan Fund and \$.25 for General Sunday School and Pilgrim Youth work.

The Foreign Missionary obligation shall be met by monthly offerings in our churches. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer of Foreign Missions.

No. 6. Resolved, that in order to receive due credit in the current year, any church must have all money in the mail on or before June 5. The District Treasurer shall keep his books open until June 10 so that proper credit may be given for monies mailed on or before June 5. All monies mailed after June 5, shall be entered in the following year.

No. 7. Resolved, that we as a district, adopt the system of contribut-

ing to the Allentown Bible Institute the equivalent of 25 cents a month per member; said funds to be paid through the District Treasurer, and that we request the cooperation of the School in sending each year a representative to each church to assist in raising our financial quota. This plan to continue for five years, or until 1954.

No. 8. Resolved, that the District Superintendent's support shall be as follows:

Salary, \$250.00 per month; Travel expenses, Six cents per mile by automobile, and actual expense by train or bus; In addition, the District shall provide a parsonage furnished with telephone, electricity, gas, heat, and water. Further, we recommend that adequate insurance be placed on the District Superintendent's car, the same to be paid by the District Treasurer out of the District Expense fund.

No. 9. Resolved, that the District Superintendent push the Pilgrim Pension Plan and encourage every pastor to join. In cases where it is determined by the District Council that payment of such dues would cause undue hardship for the pastor and church, said dues shall be paid by the District out of the District Expense Fund.

No. 10. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be granted an annual vacation of two weeks each year with pay.

No. 11. In order to create a sustained interest in and support for District Home Missions and Church Extension, we recommend and urge each church to set apart one prayer meeting night each month at which time earnest prayer shall be made for District Home Missions and an offering be taken for the same and forwarded to our District Treasurer. This is to be in addition to our regular yearly assessment of \$1.50 per member.

No. 12. Resolved, that those driving to work on our Camp Grounds or otherwise using their cars in the interests of the District shall receive six cents per mile for the use of their car.

No. 13. Resolved, that \$98 be allocated for the purchase of urgently needed kitchen equipment, by August 15, 1952, for use in all three camps:

- (a) the money to be advanced from district funds and repaid by the three camps within a year on a ratio of 2/7 by Victory Grove, 1/7 by Vermontville, 4/7 by Binghamton;
- (b) the items to be bought by a committee of 2 named for the purpose (at wholesale if possible);
- (c) a master list showing which equipment items are most urgently needed to be prepared by the purchasing committee, after consulting with previous camp meeting cooks, the list placed with the district secretary, for later reference, the items to be acquired as funds allow;
- (d) the equipment to be transferred from camp to camp at the district superintendent's direction.

Be it further resolved that, in each year after 1952, the three camps jointly (on the above-given ratio) provide a total of \$35 for maintenance of and additions to camp kitchen equipment.

EDUCATION

No. 1. Resolved, that the New York District go on record as favoring a permanent representative of Allentown Bible Institute for visiting the churches of our school zone, and that we will stand back of such a program and will open our churches for the raising of funds for liquidating the debt on the school property and for securing the proper facilities for the advancement of the school.

No. 2. Inasmuch as Allentown Bible Institute provides correspondence courses for ministerial students, be it resolved that all our workers desiring license to preach or ordination be required to take such course, and that the Board of Education be governed in its recommendations for license to preach or ordination by a report from the Bible Institute upon the work done by the applicant; provided, however, that due credit may be given by the Board, at its discretion, to said applicants, for any equivalent work done in any other school acceptable to it.

MISCELLANEOUS

No. 1. Resolved, that no properties such as churches, parsonages, or other buildings or land shall be sold of any of our incorporate churches without first conferring with the trustees of the district corporation.

No. 2. Resolved, that section 16 of article 2 of the religious corporation law be enforced in our district in regard to churches who have discontinued holding services and where there are less than 7 resident attending members.

That such temporalities and property be managed by the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., our ecclesiastical governing body, or may, in pursuance of the provisions of law relating to the disposition of real property by religious corporations, sell or dispose of the same, and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to which the property of such governing religious body is devoted, and shall not divert such property to any other object.

In no case shall property be sold or disposed of to support the preacher who may claim this as an out appointment.

Due notice shall be given by the District Secretary, regarding the action of the District Assembly in declaring a church extinct, within thirty days to the remaining members, if any.

No. 3. Resolved, that inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members and inasmuch as not everyone reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church as soon as possible after the distributions of the minutes.

No. 4. Resolved, that we, the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, place ourselves on record as being unalterably opposed to, and deplore the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage the sale and use of said liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.

No. 5. Inasmuch as our Manual declares itself against the wearing of jewelry; be it resolved, that none of our preachers shall use the ring ceremony in marriages, or in any way encourage the use of it. Any minister who uses such ceremony shall be dealt with by the District Council.

No. 6. Resolved, that all reports regularly sent to the District Statistician be in his hands by June 15 and that all books and records that are to be audited shall be sent to the chairman of the auditing committee by June 15.

No. 7. Resolved, that each Pastor be required to attend his or her zone Camp and to remain over at least one Sunday.

No. 8. In view of tendencies detrimental to the spiritual effort of our camp meetings, we recommend that the following rule be adopted for all our camps. All persons resident on the grounds shall respect a curfew hour of ten o'clock and lights shall be out by ten-thirty p.m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.

No. 9. Resolved, that the telephone numbers of the ministers be published annually in the Minutes and that the address of the church also be published.

No. 10. Resolved, that following the election of officers, the District Superintendent shall appoint the committees which are to function under the District Council for the ensuing year.

No. 11. RESOLVED that a District Ministerial Convention be held each year on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in April except when the second week in April is Holy Week, in which case the date of the Convention shall be set by the District Council. The place of the Convention shall always be determined by the District Council.

No. 12. RESOLVED, that the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is opposed to divorce and remarriage and that all persons who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they have been divorced, providing they have not taken another, be denied membership in said church.

No. 13. Resolved, that each pastor be given freedom to hold at least two revivals each conference year.

No. 14. INASMUCH as the heavy burden of cleaning up our Camp grounds often falls upon only a few individuals, BE IT RESOLVED that

the preachers in each Camp Zone shall be notified in advance of clean up day by one of the officials of the camp, and that each one thus notified shall be expected to give assistance in this task if at all possible. This applies to Vermontville Camp in the North; Victory Grove in the Central Zone; and Binghamton Camp in the South.

No. 15. RESOLVED, that the two center sections of seats together with the first two rows of seats in each wing of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

No. 16. RESOLVED, that the time of the business sessions of our District Conference be fixed as follows: From 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon; From 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.; From 7:00 P.M. to 10:00 P.M.

No. 17. RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be given freedom to conduct two revivals outside the District each Conference year, and that he be permitted to keep all proceeds from the same.

No. 18. RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be required to meet with each local church board at least once each Conference year.

No. 19. We recommend that each local church in as far as possible, give their pastor two weeks vacation over one Sunday with pay.

No. 20. RESOLVED, that in each of our churches a pastoral recall meeting shall be held each year not later than the third week in April.

No. 21. RESOLVED, that the monthly Sunday School report in THE PILGRIM NEWS follow the General Secretary's form, tabulating (1) The average attendance of last Conference year as reported in the Conference Minutes; (2) The average attendance to date this Conference year; (3) The average attendance this month; (4) The average attendance for the same month last year.

The monthly report shall be submitted to the Editor of THE PILGRIM NEWS by the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

No. 22. INASMUCH as the time at which our annual Conference begins necessitates that many of our preachers and delegates drive on Sunday in order to be present for the opening session, BE IT RESOLVED, that the opening session of Conference be held at 2:00 P.M. on the Monday following Victory Grove Camp, and that it continue until the following Wednesday.

No. 23. INASMUCH as there is a marked disregard for the Lord's day, and the Scripture admonishes us to keep it holy by doing no worldly business in it, BE IT RESOLVED that a contribution box be left for a free will offering at the exit of the dining hall of our camps.

No. 24. BE IT RESOLVED: That the Labor Day Youth Rally held annually at the Victory Grove Camp Ground be considered the District Youth Convention at which time the Executive Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected.

No. 25. RESOLVED, that each dormitory on our Camp grounds shall have at least one resident responsible person in charge to maintain order during Camp and Conference.

No. 26. BE IT RESOLVED that a zone treasurer and secretary be appointed along with the zone leader which will constitute a committee responsible for the youth activity of each zone.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the District Youth Executive be free to urge the organization of local societies.

No. 27. BE IT RESOLVED that a drive be made in each of our churches to make the number of Advocate subscriptions equal to the church membership, and that each pastor shall report to the next Conference concerning his progress in the Advocate campaign.

No. 28. BE IT RESOLVED that the District Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions be made an honorary member of the Conference with voice and vote in the same.

No. 29. BE IT RESOLVED that the editing committee have the power to delete from the Minutes all obsolete resolutions subject to the approval of the District Council.

No. 30. Resolved that the treasurers of the respective camp meetings shall, within a month of the closing date of each camp, forward to the pastor (or treasurer, if known) of the churches concerned either the pledge cards themselves, or a list showing: name of pledger, amount pledged, and project for which pledged.

District Superintendent's Report

To the thirty-first annual District Conference of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings.

I herewith express a genuine gratitude for your work of faith, your labor of love, and your patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.

As I submit this report, it is with praise to God for allowing me a small part in the work of His Kingdom. I praise Christ for the physical strength granted me, and I appreciate the support of all who have stood by me by sharing the burdens providence allotted me.

I have endeavored to give my best of services to the church. I trust my failures of judgment have been tempered by the love of God in all our hearts.

It is with mingled feelings that I call attention to the passing of some of God's people from our ranks. Rev. Jasper Hamm departed this life March 24, 1952. His Home-going came after a long period of ill health which came to a climax on the above date at the City Hospital at Binghamton, N. Y.

Mrs. Luella Wilson, wife of Rev. A. H. Wilson, was called to rest during the past fall. Being prepared by a premonition, she died in the triumph of the faith by which she lived for so many years.

Mrs. Ada Joan Reed, wife of Rev. W. E. Reed, was taken from us after a brief illness. Sister Reed spent several years in Africa as a Missionary under the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Rev. Isaac E. Terry, an ordained minister of our Church, passed on to his reward October 24, 1951. Bro. Terry was saved in one of Mr. Moody's services and was a true servant of Christ for many years.

Among laymen who will be greatly missed are Bro. Williams of the Lake Placid Church, Bro. Fuller of the Albany Church, Bro. Abbott of the Bloomingdale Church, and Bro. Elmer of Utica. So the old order changeth, yielding place to new. We suffer much because of gaps left in our ranks, but we suffer more because the gaps remain so long unfilled.

CHURCH PROPERTIES

The building and remodeling projects of the past conference year have added considerable to the attractiveness of our properties.

The church at Albany made extensive improvements in their main auditorium, as well as refinishing the basement.

The Brookdale Church is engaged in redecorating Sunday School rooms.

At Brushton, what was once used as a church and parsonage, has been converted into commodious and pleasant living quarters.

The church at East Athens, Pennsylvania, has begun the construction of a new church at Sayre, Penna. This building will not only answer a long-standing need, but because of a change in location, will present a new field in which to work.

The congregation at East Windsor are laying plans for added Sunday school space.

At Fox Hill, a basement has been added to the church, large enough to accommodate some Sunday school classes, and also serve as a furnace room.

The parsonage at Grand Gorge has been newly decorated inside, and some grading done outside.

The auditorium of the Middleburgh church has been redecorated.

The North Troy Church has a beautiful new parsonage. This building was made possible by the sale of the old parsonage, and while the improvement was considerable, the resulting deficit is not too large.

The church at Ogdensburg is now engaged in building a new place of worship.

At Port Jervis the church auditorium was greatly improved by sanding the floor and installing pews.

The Schenectady Church auditorium has been redecorated.

The Tunkhannock congregation is now enjoying a beautiful new church. For money expended, this church compares well with any church in the District.

Utica is in the midst of major remodeling which, when completed, will no doubt be one of our most beautiful buildings in the District.

The congregation at Syracuse put a new roof on their church building.

Approximately six hundred dollars was spent for improvements on the church at Fultonville.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

A great deal might be said concerning our District Home Missionary program. Our effort in this direction, while lacking in many aspects, was an honest and sincere and perhaps a desperate move to accomplish something for God. The procedures and application of our vision, if we may be so bold as to call it that, have been questioned by many honest hearts. I suppose our righteous criticisms, to which we have every right, are well founded, but as a people, our greatest regret should be that we have done so little for God. Indulge me while asking pardon for my failures in executing a more efficient process in Home Missionary work to call attention to the fact that we desperately need vision, sacrifice and co-operation if we are to accomplish much for God. Reports from Pittsfield and East Worcester are encouraging. The efforts of Bro. Twining at Selkirk and Bro. Lamb at Johnstown were appreciated. While these meet-

ings may not have been as fruitful as we desired, yet they were a move in the right direction.

What more can be done at present is a question, but I have on my desk a call from twelve people for a Pilgrim Holiness Church. Fields become ours when we occupy them. Jesus said, "Occupy till I come." The meaning is "To take possession of."

FOREIGN MISSIONS

We rejoice that our Foreign Missionary giving this year was \$25,989.68, or \$1,581.24 over our giving of a year ago.

PERSONAL REPORT

I preached 136 times, held twenty-three board meetings, and twenty-two annual meetings. I visited nearly all of our churches twice. I dedicated two churches, attended one General Board Meeting, one Superintendents' meeting, one board meeting of the Allentown Bible College.

I worked two weeks on Vermontville Camp, one week at Binghamton Camp, two weeks at Victory Grove Camp, worked 3½ months at Pittsfield on our church there, and two weeks at our Portable Tabernacle in Speculator, and helped Bro. Rickenbach a little at Tunkhannock.

I wrote ten articles for the Pilgrim News, officiated at two camps, was the evangelist at another, and conducted two week-end meetings.

I traveled twenty thousand miles in Kingdom interest.
