JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

OPENING SESSION - July 6, 1953, 2:00 P.M.

The Thirty-second Annual Conference of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 2:00 P.M. on July 6, 1953 at the Victory Grove Camp Ground.

The Conference began with prayer offered by Rev. Donald Hardy and the congregation singing, "Love Lifted Me."

Rev. Paul W. Thomas was introduced to the Conference and assumed chairmanship of the same. After a few words of greeting, he requested Rev. O. W. Lawrence to read for us Psalm 91. This was followed by the spontaneous singing of the chorus, "Blessed Be the Name."

The secretary called the roll of ordained and licensed ministers and ordained deaconesses.

Rev. and Mrs. Frank Schweitzer were introduced to the Conference, and Rev. Schweitzer was welcomed into the Conference as an ordained minister. Rev. Beulah Day Wilson was also received as an ordained minister.

The calling of the roll was resumed as the names of the lay delegates were recorded. This concluded the roll call.

The Conference bar was fixed in accordance with the standing rule of the Minutes.

The District Superintendent's splendid report was given and accepted.

The Assistant Superintendent gave his oral report which was accepted.

The following were introduced to the Conference and granted honorary seats within the bar. Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Weir, Rev. and Mrs. Frank Nason, and Dorothy Straight.

William Bidwell was introduced to the Conference and gave his testimony.

A committee on memorials was appointed by the District Superintendent. By the approval of the Conference, Rev. P. R. Doyle, Rev. Francis Richmond, and Rev. D. E. Babcock were named on this committee.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report and the District Church Extension Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Binghamton Camp Treasurer's report was given and accepted.

The Vermontville Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Victory Grove Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

Rev. Harry Twining Jr., was introduced to the Conference and granted an honorary seat within the bar.

The District Young People's report was given and accepted.

The splendid report of the Foreign Missionary Secretary-Treasurer was given and was received by the Conference with sincere gratitude and praise to God, and the singing of the Doxology.

The Editor of "Pilgrim News" gave his oral report which was accepted.

The District Statistician's report was given and accepted.

The Secretary read reports from the following Missionaries and workers; Rev. and Mrs. C. F. Berg, Rev. Beatrice Dodge, Rev. and Mrs. John Blann, Grace M. Robinson, and Rev. M. R. Blann. These reports were received by vote of the Conference.

A motion to adjourn until the evening session was lost.

The Secretary of the Ways and Means Committee read three resolutions with which disposition was made as follows;

Resolution number one, dealing with ways to finance the Pilgrim News was tabled.

Resolution number two, relating to the Superintendent's salary was adopted.

Resolution number three, providing for traveling expenses for delegates to the General Conference was adopted after being amended.

The motion prevailed that we adjourn until the evening session.

SECOND SESSION --- July 6, 1953, 7:00 P.M.

Rev. J. N. Jump led the congregation in singing "I Know God's Promise is True," after which Brother Thomas requested him to also lead us in prayer. We then sang the chorus, "At the Cross."

At the Chairman's request, Rev. Lloyd Stuart read Psalm number one.

By motion of the Conference, Sr. Frederick McCulley was seated as a delegate from the Oxford church.

The Secretary of the Resolutions Committee offered four resolutions for our consideration.

Resolution number one, deleting from the Minutes Resolution No. 13, page 17 of the Minutes, was carried.

Resolution number two, recommending deletion from the Minutes of Resolution No. 1, page 18, was referred back to the committee for re-drafting.

Resolution number three was lost.

Resolution number four, relating to District funds, was referred back to the committee for re-drafting.

By motion of the Conference, Rev. Frank Schweitzer, President of the Board of Directors of the Allentown Bible College, was given opportunity to speak in the interest of the School. He spoke most favorably of the work being done by the school and stressed the spiritual emphasis which is insisted upon in its program.

The motion prevailed that we next proceed to the election of officers. Several tellers were appointed by the District Superintendent.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. O. L. Fay was elected on the first ballot receiving 56 out of 74 votes cast,

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. F. T. Finch was elected on the first ballot receiving 50 out of 73 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary., Rev. R. L. Smith was elected on the first ballot receiving 60 out of 72 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer. Rev. J. N. Jump was elected on the first ballot receiving 53 out of 73 votes cast.

Ballots were cast for three advisory members to the Council. The tellers were dismissed in order that they might count the ballots and permit other business to proceed in the meanwhile.

Rev. and Mrs. Edward Shemelia were introduced to the Conference and gave their testimonies.

Brother Masterman favored us with a beautiful number in song which was deeply appreciated.

Ballots were cast for two members of the Board of Education. Rev. D. E. Wilson was elected on the first ballot. Rev. Frank Schweitzer was elected by acclamation.

The Tellers returned and reported the previous balloting for advisory members to the Council. Rev. H. L. Twining, Rev. Alvin Young, and Rev. O. W. Lawrence were elected on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for a member of the Board of Trustees. Rev. O. W. Lawrence was elected on the first ballot.

Sr. Blanche Avery was elected Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions by a standing vote of acclamation.

Brother Thomas spoke briefly concerning the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate. He urged that steps be taken to get the paper into every church home.

The motion prevailed that the time of the sitting be extended so that the pastors could commit themselves as to the number of subscriptions to the Advocate they would be responsible for during the coming year. With eight pastors not reporting the total number was 808 subscriptions.

The session adjourned by expiration of time. Rev. H. L. Twining pronounced the benediction.

THIRD SESSION — July 7, 1953, 9:00 A.M.

Rev. O. L. Fay led the congregation in singing "'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus," after which prayer was offered by Sr. Mary Berg and Rev. Wayne Clark.

Brother Thomas addressed the conference, basing his remarks upon the words, "Antipas my faithful martyr," taken from Rev. 2:13. He exhorted us to faithfulness to the Word of God and the church; Its doctrinal teachings and standards, its leaders, its institutions and interests. Then, requesting the congregation to stand, he led us in prayer.

The secretary read the Minutes of the previous sittings which were approved as read.

Our hearts were saddened as we were informed of the sudden death of one of our ordained Ministers, the Rev. Melvin R. Blann. Prayer for the remaining members of the family was offered by Brother Fay.

The motion was adopted that the Conference through the secretary, send a telegram of condolence to Sr. Blann, and also a floral piece.

We then proceeded to elect ministerial delegates to the forthcoming General Conference. The secretary announced that the number permitted us by the Manual was seven.

A motion prevailed to place four names on the first ballot. The ballots were cast, and the tellers were dismissed to count.

We then proceeded to cast ballots for lay delegates to the General Conference, three in number. The motion prevailed that nominations be made from the floor, and that no more than one name be submitted from each church. The following were nominated: Theodore Knapp, Charles Merrill, James Bolster, Albert Green, Greydon McCulley, Lawrence Wilson, William Roseman, Francis Hoffman, Leroy Morris, Paul Butler, Lloyd Berg, Sever Fay, George Price, Echtor Fountain, and Joe Clark. Ballots were cast, and while the tellers were excused to count, Sr. Yeo favored the Conference with a beautiful violin solo.

Brother Fay spoke briefly concerning plans for the church at Cherry Valley during the coming year.

The results of the first ballot for ministerial delegates to the General Conference were announced. There was no election. The motion was adopted that we vote for the six highest names. The ballots were cast, and again the tellers were dismissed to make the count.

The report was given of the first ballot for lay delegates to the General Conference, and there was no election. By motion of the Conference, the secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the three highest names. Lawrence Wilson, Albert Green, and Theodore Knapp were declared elected. The secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the next three highest names as alternate delegates, the name receiving the highest vote to be considered first alternate, and so on in the order of the voting. Sever Fay, Lloyd Berg, and James Bolster were declared elected.

An offering was taken for the expenses of the Conference.

The tellers reported the results of the second ballot for ministerial delegates to the General Conference. Rev. O. W. Lawrence, Rev. M. E. Pierpoint, Rev. H. L. Twining, Rev. P. R. Doyle, and Rev. Andrew Whitney were elected.

Ballots were cast for two remaining ministerial delegates. There was no election on the first ballot. It was decided by motion of the Conference that we vote for the seven highest names. The ballots were cast, and the tellers were excused to count.

The motion was adopted to adjourn until the afternoon sitting.

Rev. Garry Boel dismissed the sitting with prayer.

- 13 ---

Rev. Garry Boel led the Conference in singing, "He Lives," after which prayer was offered by Rev. Arthur Shafer.

The secretary announced the result of balloting for two ministerial delegates to the General Conference. There was no election. The motion was adopted that the secretary cast the ballot for the two highest names. Rev. Donald Hardy and Rev. Lindley Adams were elected.

The five ministers receiving the next highest votes, were declared alternate delegates, in the order of votes received. Rev. Russell Davis, Rev. Frank Schweitzer, Rev. Garry Boel, Rev. George Harris, Jr., and Rev. Francis Richmond were thus elected.

The secretary read the following recommendations from the Council which were approved by the Conference: That District Preacher's Licenses be granted William Bidwell, Leland Boring, and Dorothy Straight. Also that Lloyd Stuart and Meredith Twining be granted ordination as ministers of the Gospel of Christ.

The secretary of the Resolutions Committee again reported. Resolution number five was adopted by the Conference.

"As a practical expression of our sincere Christian sympathy, be it resolved that this body receive a love offering to be sent to Mrs. M. R. Blann."

An offering of \$75.00 was received as we sang, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

Resolution number six, relating to District Sunday School Conventions was adopted, as was also number seven concerning Sunday School attendance records.

Resolution number eight, relating to youth workers for our camps, was tabled.

Resolution number nine, recommending deletion from the minutes of Resolution Number twenty-four, on page twenty, was lost. In its place a substitute motion prevailed.

Resolution number ten, changing the date of Binghamton Camp was adopted after much discussion.

Resolution number two was presented in its re-drafted form, and was adopted by the Conference.

Resolution number eleven was lost.

Resolution number twelve, placing the Allentown Bible College under Zone items on our report blanks rather than under District Items was adopted.

Resolution number thirteen, pertaining to Conference delegates was adopted.

Resolution number fourteen, urging immediate construction of flush toilets on the Victory Grove Camp Ground was tabled.

Resolution number fifteen, regulating the speed of vehicles on our Camp Grounds was adopted.

The Committee on Memorials to the General Conference reported. Resolutions one, two and three were lost.

Memorials were read in honor of Rev. William E. Reed and Rev. William A. Shoemaker, deceased. The motion was adopted to spread these, together with one also honoring Rev. M. R. Blann, on the pages of the Minutes of this Conference.

The following resolution presented by the secretary of the Ways and Means Committee was adopted by the Conference:

"Be it resolved that \$2,507.48 be transferred from the District Expense Fund to the District Church Extension Fund to eliminate the deficit in the District Church Extension Fund. Also, that the District financial report for the year ending May 31st, 1953 be changed to show this transfer."

The Secretary of the Sunday School Board presented award certificates to the churches showing the highest percentage gains in Sunday School attendance during the year. The Bloomingdale Church had the highest percentage gain while the church at E. Athens showed the greatest numerical gain.

A motion prevailed to rescind Resolution number seven relating to counting Sunday School attendance thirty minutes after the school begins.

The secretary of the Resolutions Committee presented Resolution number sixteen which was lost.

The sitting adjourned by expiration of time. Prayer was offered by Rev. R. L. Smith.

FIFTH SESSION ---- July 7, 1953, 7:00 P.M.

Rev. Donald Hardy led the Conference in singing, "Satisfied." Prayer was offered by Rev. C. E. Mayne. We then sang, "At the Cross."

By motion of the Conference, the correction of the Minutes was referred to the Council.

The Committee on Resolutions again reported.

Resolution number sixteen concerning the reporting of Sunday School Attendance was tabled.

Resolution number seventeen urging organization of local Young People's Societies was adopted.

The Secretary of the Committee on Memorials reported.

Resolution number four, recommending a substitute statement for Paragraph 5g of Section 84, page 60 of the Manual was adopted by the Conference.

Resolution number five, suggesting an addition to Section 77, page 53 of the Manual was adopted by the Conference.

The Secretary of the Resolutions Committee presented the following

Wesleyan Church ARCHIVES recommendation which was adopted: Since Resolution number 17, urging organization of local Young People's Societies, and Resolution number 26b, page 21 of the Minutes are practically duplications, we recommend deletion of the old action in favor of the new.

The following was presented as a resolution to the Conference:

"As an expression of our appreciation to Rev. P. W. Thomas for his efficient chairmanship and challenging leadership; the District Council, Committees and Officers for their faithful labors, and the kitchen and ground staff of the Victory Grove Camp for their kind and efficient services: BE IT RESOLVED that we extend a rising vote of thanks." The congregation stood, thus approving the resolution.

The Pastor of the Sayre Pilgrim Holiness Church, Rev. F. T. Finch, extended an invitation to the Ministerial Convention to convene at his church. The invitation was accepted by acclamation.

ORDINATION SERVICE

The congregation sang, "A Charge to Keep Have I," after which Rev. O. L. Fay offered prayer.

Scripture passages were read by Rev. O. W. Lawrence, (Titus 3:1-11), Rev. F. T. Finch, (1 Timothy 3), and Rev. J. N. Jump, (2 Timothy 4:1-8).

Rev. P. W. Thomas gave the charge, speaking from the second chapter of second Timothy, verse three, "Thou therefore endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ."

Brother Lloyd Stuart and Brother Meredith Twining were ordained to the Christian ministry by prayer and the laying on of hands. We then sang, "The Cleansing Stream."

The secretary read the names of those who are to serve on the Conference Committees for the coming year, and also the pastoral locations.

The motion was adopted that any unfinished business be referred to the Council.

The motion was made and seconded that we adjourn. The motion carried.

The congregation stood and sang, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

Rev. Alvin Young dismissed the Conference.

REV. WM. E. REED

The Rev. William E. Reed who served in the African Mission Field, as well as pastorates, in the New York and Michigan Conferences, was called to his reward February 14, 1953. Born August 25, 1876 at Belleville, Ontario, Brother Reed was converted when 23 years of age. He was sanctified in 1911 and prepared for the ministry at Bible Holiness Seminary, Owosso, Michigan. He was married to Ada Joan Anderson who served faithfully with him in all his labors for the Lord until called Home, January 9, 1952. Funeral service for Rev. W. E. Reed was held at the Northville Holiness Mission with Rev. O. L. Fay, District Superintendent, officiating, assisted by Rev. A. E. Blann, Rev. Seymour Lawton, and Rev. Alvin Young.

REV. WM. A. SHOEMAKER

At the age of 84 years, the Rev. William Allen Shoemaker exchanged the Cross for the Crown. Parting this life on April 6, 1953, Brother Shoemaker closed a long and useful life of service to God and our Church.

At the turn of the century this prosperous farmer was filled with the Holy Ghost, sold his possessions and began his life of service. He pioneered and pastored churches at Finch Hollow, Grovenor Corners, Massena, N. Y. and Brookdale, Pa.

The funeral was conducted from the Oakdale Pilgrim Holiness Church by his pastor, Rev. G. Lindley Adams, assisted by the District Superintendent, the Rev. O. L. Fay, and the Revs. Harold Lane, F. T. Brother Shoemaker is survived by four children, three of whom are ministers, and by his second wife, the former Jennie Shafer, whom he married in 1940.

REV. MELVIN R. BLANN

Rev. Melvin R. Blann was born near Trappe, Maryland, on April 26, 1891. He was converted at an early age, sanctified shortly thereafter, and feeling a call from God to preach, he attended God's Bible School until called back home to care for his sick father.

On June 30, 1916, he was married to Miss Anna Matthews, to which union four children were born; Melvin Jr., Magdalen, Troy, and Linda. The daughter Magdalen is now serving as a missionary nurse in Swaziland, Africa.

Shortly before his marriage, he began his ministry as pastor of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Broome's Island, Md. Later, he pastored at Tilghman's Island, Md., and Mineral, Va., from whence he moved to New York State. While there he pastored at Amsterdam, Finch Hollow, Port Jervis, Wells, Oneonta, North Troy, and Monticello.

Due to ill health, he moved from Monticello back to his home state of Maryland, where in his home near Trappe, he was suddenly stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage on July 7, 1953. A short time afterward, he quietly passed this life and went to be with his Lord.

The funeral was conducted from the Trappe Pilgrim Holiness Church, with the pastor, Rev. G. L. Helsby in charge.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

FINANCE

No. 1. Resolved, that each church sending a delegate or delegates to the District Conference, pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and pastor.

No. 2. Resolved, that when the District Council deems any licensed minister unable to meet the expense of taking the study course as directed in Education Resolution No. 2, they may pay all or part of the cost of such course. The Licensee in such case shall agree to finish a year of such course in the Conference year.

No. 3. Resolved, that when money is sent direct to any fund, the church treasurer shall obtain a receipt for same and forward this to each District Representative.

No. 4. Resolved, that all departments of our church shall, upon receipt of monies, immediately forward receipts for same to sender.

No. 5. Resolved, that the District Treasurer shall maintain two funds, to be known as the District Expense Fund and The Church Extension Fund.

The ministers and workers of the District shall pay all their tithe into the church where they hold membership.

Each month the local church shall forward to the District Treasurer, the pastor's tithe and 50% of other ministerial member's tithe. These amounts shall be specified for the District Expense Fund.

The District Church Extension Fund shall be provided for by an assessment of \$1.50 per member. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer, specified for the Church Extension Fund.

The churches shall be assessed \$3.50 per member, \$1.00 for General Home Missions, or Church Extension, \$1.00 for General Administration expenses, \$.75 for a fund to found a Senior College, \$.50 for a General Church Extension Loan Fund and \$.25 for General Sunday School and Pilgrim Youth work.

The Foreign Missionary obligation shall be met by monthly offerings in our churches. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer of Foreign Missions.

No. 6. Resolved, that in order to receive due credit in the current year, any church must have all money in the mail on or before June 5. The District Treasurer shall keep his books open until June 10, so that proper credit may be given for monies mailed on or before June 5. All monies mailed after June 5, shall be entered in the following year.

No. 7. Resolved, that we as a district, adopt the system of contributing to the Allentown Bible Institute the equivalent of 25 cents a month per member; said funds to be paid through the District Treasurer, and that

we request the cooperation of the School in sending each year a representative to each church to assist in raising our financial quota. This plan to continue for five years, or until 1954.

No. 8. Resolved, that the District Superintendent's support shall be as follows:

Salary, \$300.00 per month; Travel expenses, Six cents per mile by automobile, and actual expense by train or bus; In addition, the District shall provide a parsonage furnished with telephone, electricity, gas, heat, and water.

No. 9. Resolved, that the District Superintendent push the Pilgrim Pension Plan and encourage every pastor to join. In cases where it is determined by the District Council that payment of such dues would cause undue hardship for the pastor and church, said dues shall be paid by the District out of the District Expense Fund.

No. 10. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be granted an annual vacation of two weeks each year with pay.

No. 11. In order to create a sustained interest in and support for District Home Missions and Church Extension, we recommend and urge each church to set apart one prayer meeting night each month at which time earnest prayer shall be made for District Home Missions and an offering be taken for the same and forwarded to our District Treasurer. This is to be in addition to our regular yearly assessment of \$1.50 per member.

No. 12. Resolved, that those driving to work on our Camp Grounds or otherwise using their cars in the interests of the District shall receive six cents per mile for the use of their car.

No. 13. Resolved that the expenses of the ministerial and lay delegates to the General Conference be raised by assessments of 60c per member and that these funds be sent to the District Treasurer not later than May 15th, 1954.

EDUCATION

No. 1. Resolved that all of our local churches shall open their doors annually to the representatives of the Allentown Bible College, and be it further resolved that at such times an offering shall be taken for the maintenance of the School, liquidation of debt, and new facilities. In arranging for such visits the administration shall cooperate with both the district and local officers.

No. 2. Inasmuch as Allentown Bible Institute provides correspondence courses for ministerial students, be it resolved that all our workers desiring license to preach or ordination be required to take such course, and that the Board of Education be governed in its recommendations for license to preach or ordination by a report from the Bible Institute upon the work done by the applicant; provided, however, that due credit may be given by the Board, at its discretion, to said applicants, for any equivalent work done in any other school acceptable to it.

MISCELLANEOUS

No. 1. Resolved, that no properties such as churches, parsonages, or other buildings or land shall be sold of any of our incorporate churches without first conferring with the trustees of the district corporation.

No. 2. Resolved, that section 16 of article 2 of the religious corporation law be enforced in our district in regard to churches who have discontinued holding services and where there are less than 7 resident attending members.

That such temporalities and property be managed by the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., our ecclesiastical governing body, or may, in pursuance of the provisions of law relating to the disposition of real property by religious corporations, sell or dispose of the same, and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to which the property of such governing religious body is devoted, and shall not divert such property to any other object.

In no case shall property be sold or disposed of to support the preacher who may claim this as an out appointment.

Due notice shall be given by the District Secretary, regarding the action of the District Assembly in declaring a church extinct, within thirty days to the remaining members, if any.

No. 3. Resolved, that inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members and inasmuch as not everyone reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church as soon as possible after the distributions of the minutes.

No. 4. Resolved, that we, the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, place ourselves on record as being unalterably opposed to, and deplore the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage the sale and use of said liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.

No. 5. Inasmuch as our Manual declares itself against the wearing of jewelry; be it resolved, that none of our preachers shall use the ring ceremony in marriages, or in any way encourage the use of it. Any minister who uses such ceremony shall be dealt with by the District Council.

No. 6. Resolved, that all reports regularly sent to the District Statistician be in his hands by June 15 and that all books and records that are to be audited shall be sent to the chairman of the Auditing Committee by June 15.

No. 7. Resolved, that each Pastor be required to attend his or her Zone Camp and to remain over at least one Sunday.

No. 8. In view of tendencies detrimental to the spiritual effort of our camp meetings, we recommend that the following rule be adopted for all our camps. All persons resident on the grounds shall respect a curfew hour of ten o'clock and lights shall be out by ten-thirty p.m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.

No. 9. Resolved, that the telephone numbers of the ministers be published annually in the Minutes and that the address of the church also be published.

No. 10. Resolved, that following the election of officers, the District Superintendent shall appoint the committees which are to function under the District Council for the ensuing year.

No. 11. RESOLVED that a District Ministerial Convention be held each year on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in April except when the second week in April is Holy Week, in which case the date of the Convention shall be set by the District Council. The place of the Convention shall always be determined by the District Council.

No. 12. RESOLVED, that the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is opposed to divorce and remarriage and that all persons who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they have been divorced, providing they have not taken another, be denied membership in said church.

No. 13. Resolved, that each pastor be given freedom to hold at least two revivals each conference year.

No. 14. INASMUCH as the heavy burden of cleaning up our Camp grounds often falls upon only a few individuals, BE IT RESOLVED that the preachers in each Camp Zone shall be notified in advance of cleanup day by one of the officials of the camp, and that each one thus notified shall be expected to give assistance in this task if at all possible. This applies to Vermontville Camp in the North; Victory Grove in the Central Zone; and Binghamton Camp in the South.

No. 15. RESOLVED, that the two center sections of seats together with the first two rows of seats in each wing of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

No. 16. RESOLVED, that the time of the business sessions of our District Conference be fixed as follows: From 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon; From 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.; From 7:00 P.M. to 10:00 P.M.

No. 17. RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be given freedom to conduct two revivals outside the District each Conference year, and that he be permitted to keep all proceeds from the same.

No. 18. RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be required to meet with each local church board at least once each Conference year.

No. 19. We recommend that each local church in as far as possible, give their pastor two weeks vacation over one Sunday with pay.

No. 20. RESOLVED, that in each of our churches a pastoral recall meeting shall be held each year not later than the third week in April.

No. 21. RESOLVED, that the monthly Sunday School report in THE PILGRIM NEWS follow the General Secretary's form, tabulating (1) The average attendance of last Conference year as reported in the Conference

Minutes; (2) The average attendance to date this Conference year; (3) The average attendance this month; (4) The average attendance for the same month last year.

The monthly report shall be submitted to the Editor of THE PIL-GRIM NEWS by the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

No. 22. INASMUCH as the time at which our annual Conference begins necessitates that many of our preachers and delegates drive on Sunday in order to be present for the opening session, BE IT RESOLVED, that the opening session of Conference be held at 2:00 P.M. on the Monday following Victory Grove Camp, and that it continue until the following Wednesday.

No. 23. INASMUCH as there is a marked disregard for the Lord's day, and the Scripture admonishes us to keep it holy by doing no worldly business in it, BE IT RESOLVED that a contribution box be left for a free will offering at the exit of the dining hall of our camps.

No. 24. Resolved that the Labor Day Youth Rally at Victory Grove Camp be returned to the jurisdiction of the Central Zone Youth Committee and that the District be permitted to hold the annual business meeting of the District Youth Organization in conjunction therewith.

No. 25. RESOLVED, that each dormitory on our Camp grounds shall have at least one resident responsible person in charge to maintain order during Camp and Conference.

No. 26. BE IT RESOLVED that a zone treasurer and secretary be appointed along with the zone leader which will constitute a committee responsible for the youth activity of each zone.

Be it further resolved that the District Young People's Executive Secretary be requested to urge the organization of local societies.

No. 27. BE IT RESOLVED that a drive be made in each of our churches to make the number of Advocate subscriptions equal to the church membership, and that each pastor shall report to the next Conference concerning his progress in the Advocate campaign.

No. 28. BE IT RESOLVED that the District Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions be made an honorary member of the Conference with voice and vote in the same.

No. 29. BE IT RESOLVED that the Editing Committee have the power to delete from the Minutes all obsolete resolutions subject to the approval of the District Council.

No. 30. Resolved that the treasurers of the respective camp meetings shall, within a month of the closing date of each camp, forward to the pastor (or treasurer, if known) of the churches concerned either the pledge cards themselves, or a list showing: name of pledger, amount pledged, and project for which pledged.

No. 31. Resolved that each zone conduct a Sunday School Convention within the Conference year, and be it further resolved that the District Sunday School Board be responsible for arranging such conventions. No. 32. Resolved, that the Allentown Bible College item on the report blanks be removed from the heading, "General Church Items," and that it be placed under a new heading, "Zone Items."

No. 33. Resolved, that no delegate shall be seated by the Conference to represent any church if that church has failed to duly elect a delegate.

No. 34. Resolved, that a speed limit of eight miles per hour be enforced on all our camp grounds, and that signs to this effect be placed at all entrances, and be it further resolved that bicycle riding on the grounds be prohibited during camp.

No. 35. Resolved, that the starting date of the Binghamton Camp shall be the first Thursday of August, effective in 1954 (if workers can change dates), if not, effective in 1955.

MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

No. 1. Resolved, that paragraph 5g of Section 84, page 60 of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, be deleted and the following statement substituted:

"Delegates from the ranks of active members of our local young people's societies shall be sent to the district young people's convention on the same ratio basis that delegates are sent from the local church to the District Conference. Such duly authorized delegates shall be the only laymen with voting privileges at the district young people's convention."

No. 2. Resolved, that the following addition be made to Section 77, page 53 of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Manual:

"And be it further resolved that no person shall be admitted or retained as a member who wears a ring of any kind."

District Superintendent's Report

TO THE THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE NEW YORK DISTRICT OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH:

Greetings to you in the Name of the Lord.

As I present to you this annual report, I wish to praise God for His goodness to me throughout the past year. Providence has overshadowed me with many mercies, and I have been the recipient of many more blessings than I deserved. To each of you, who have prayed for me and held up my hands in battle, I extend the deepest appreciation. I have endeavored under God to conduct the affairs of the District in keeping with the best interests of God's work.

I have a growing concern for the spiritual welfare of our church. Brethren, I submit to you that we cannot forfeit that touch of God which was upon the early church. When we become void of power, we then adopt and follow worldly pursuits endeavoring to establish the work of God. We live in restless times. The great seas of humanity are more troubled and agitated than ever before. Ideologies are in conflict; racial prejudices are so prevalent; currents of hate and lust and greed everywhere stain the moral concepts of God and life and love. The turbulence of waging wars and the fear of wars to come are as volcanoes belching out the threat of extinction to all mankind. The loss of faith in God is reflected in a loss of faith in men. The forces of evil in the world, the loss of love in the Church, the clash of the races brought about by the ever narrowing distance between nations, are all parts of an international frustration. History repeats itself over and over again in the never-ending melee of social and moral disintegration. And the church of Jesus Christ has ever had to endure the catastrophies which have hung over the generations of the past and even now threaten the present and obscure the future. But endure it has. The secret of faith which has brought the church through the troubled water of the past lives today in the hearts of many people. That faith coupled with the integrity of sanctified hearts is a guarantee to all the world that Christ and His church will ever tower "O'er the wrecks of time." Never were there truer words, "The gates of Hell shall not prevail against it."

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The grand total of our Foreign Missionary giving this year is \$31,572.30. This is several thousand dollars more than has ever been given before by our District in any one year. Truly when the Book of Life is opened, there will be many names written therein, for which those who, by their offerings made their salvation possible, shall receive great reward.

While on the subject of Foreign Missions, I might point out that the missionary societies that have provided articles of clothing for the unfortunate of other lands have performed a great Christian service.

As I present the matter of Church Extension, I desire to mention the fact that we should be concerned that there are so many places where the message of Holiness is long over-due. However, our ambitions in this respect must be holy, and if they are we cannot give first place to organizational and numerical development. I trust what little home missionary work we have engaged in has been the product of a righteous zeal. It must be admitted that our gains are not many, but we must beware lest this fact cause in us an unsavory reaction.

We have at this time two fields where Pilgrim Holiness Churches are possibilities. One field is at Cambridge, Mass., and the other is Brooklyn, N. Y. In both places we have people who come from our Foreign Missionary work in the Islands. The difficulty seems to remain ever the same; that is, we lack men and money. The group at Cambridge is being pastored by Sisters Miller and MacFadgen. If our tabernacle could be moved into Brooklyn and strong leadership could be obtained, it is my opinion that a sizeable congregation would soon be gathered. This would cost several thousand dollars, and I see no immediate hope for our undertaking this enormous task.

I believe it will be encouraging to you to read our report from the Pittsfield church this year.

Bro. Lloyd Stuart is now holding services in Maryland, N. Y., in a Union Church. We appreciate his efforts and pray they will be fruitful.

I am glad to be able to report here concerning our District Home Missionary Rally which was held at Victory Grove on July 4. Several of our churches responded in an appeal to support Bro. Billie Bidwell in Cherry Valley for one year. We received about twenty-five hundred dollars in this offering.

OUR CAMP MEETINGS

I suppose we are the only District in our Church that operates three District Camps. This has some disadvantages and I have given considerable thought to the matter. I herewith present some conclusions to you.

All three of these camps were originated by men who evidently had a concern for the fields where they are located. God has been faithful to the sacrifice made, and has saved some people in each camp who might not have been saved otherwise. I'm sure all of us are grateful to God for this.

Having three camps does serve three different zones of our District. If we had but one camp, a great many of our people could not attend a Pilgrim camp. If we had just one camp, all the preachers would be asked to devote one week of work and attend the services. That is all that is asked of the preachers now. I would like to present four ways we might more efficiently maintain our camp meetings:

- 1. Every preacher should come to his zone camp on work week.
- 2. Every preacher should be present on clean-up day.
- 3. We should talk about our camp to our people and urge them to attend.
- 4. We should have better ministerial representation to our services.

OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

I take some real satisfaction from remarks that our camp evangelists make about our Young People. They always seem impressed with the number we have and the modesty of their appearance. Allow me to say that this is gratifying, indeed. Our efforts have been to make our young people feel that they are a part of us. For the size of our district, God has given us as many spiritual young people proportionally as will be found in any district of our church.

The "Crusade of Prayer" sponsored last year, which was followed by three night Youth Rallies, proved a blessing in many places.

I would like to suggest that we do all we can to tie our precious young people into the spiritual tide of our church.

OUR DISTRICT PROPERTIES

Some additions and improvements have been made to church properties this year which add to their value and comfort.

It was my privilege to dedicate a new and spacious church at Ogdensburg. The hard work and sacrifice of Bro. Barton made this possible, and our prayer is that his vision will be rewarded in the salvation of many hearts.

The church at Pittsfield was formally dedicated this year. It was a real blessing to witness the great progress of such a nice church from such a small beginning. I appreciate the zeal and vision and hard work of Bro. Babcock as he has carried on this work.

Bro. McCulley redecorated the interior of the church at Bloomingdale, and has tentative plans for redecorating the parsonage.

Bro. Finch and his people have done a marvelous piece of work at Sayre in erecting a brick veneer church, which is second to none in our district. This building is not complete at this date, but will soon be ready for worship.

Bro. Stuart has considerably changed their place of worship at East Worcester by painting the interior and installing pews.

During the absence of a pastor at Schenectady, the people proceeded to do considerable remodeling in the parsonage.

The Ravena church enlarged their parsonage by adding two bedrooms. They also redecorated the interior and remodeled the kitchen.

THINNED RANKS

It is with sad hearts that we view the thinning of our ranks as old soldiers of the Cross lay down their armour. Brothers W. E. Reed and William Shoemaker have, after years of labor in the harvest fields, gone on to receive the reward of the faithful. The wonderful thing about it is that even though their sun is set, there is yet an afterglow lingering above the hills. As our hearts grievingly ponder our loss, we are reminded that we, too, are travelers toward eternity. May we be as faithful as those who have left us.

PERSONAL REPORT

In discharging the duties of my office I have tried with good conscience to be fair to all. I have attempted by example and ministry to hold up the standards of our District. When counsel has been asked, I have done my best to give it. When I have offered criticism I have also examined my own heart. I have been careful that my pleasures of home did not interfere with my duties.

I submit the following as an approximate presentation of my activities for the past year.

I officiated at three camps.

I devoted two weeks of work to Vermontville, a week at Binghamton, and two weeks at Victory Grove.

I met all of our church boards but four, and three of these changed my date making it inconvenient for me to do so.

I conducted fourteen annual meetings.

I visited all of our churches twice or more.

I conducted one week-end meeting and dedicated two churches.

I attended one General Board meeting, and went to another a week early and came home before it convened.

I attended one Superintendent's meeting at Indianapolis, and two Board Meetings of the Allentown Bible College.

I wrote ten articles for the Pilgrim News, and one for the Advocate.

I conducted one funeral.

I traveled approximately 20,000 miles.
