

In Memoriam

In the year now ended God has removed from the ranks of the Church Militant to the roster of the Church Triumphant, one of His faithful ministering servants.

REV. ALBERT H. WILSON

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Rev. Albert H. Wilson was born September 1, 1888, to William and Sarah Wilson, at Saranac, N. Y., and spent the early part of his life in northern New York. He was converted at the age of 16 and soon afterward sanctified at the Moors, New York Camp Meeting under the ministry of Rev. B. S. Taylor.

He attended Poultney College, Poultney, Vermont. On November 14, 1910, he was united in marriage to Luella Layman of Schenectady who went to be with the Lord on September 30, 1951, after many years of faithful service as a consecrated helpmate. On Feb. 3, 1953, he was united in marriage to the Rev. Miss Beulah Day.

With the call of God upon his heart, he left Poultney College and immcdiately entered the full-time ministry. His first two pastorates were at Binghamton and Schenectary, N. Y. He then went to Albany where he pastored for 30 years. While there, he was elected superintendent of the N. Y. Pentcostal Rescue Mission. He served as district superintendent of the P. H. C. of the N. Y. D. for 17 years while concurrently pastoring the Albany Church.

Brother Wilson was known for his positive stand for scriptural holiness. Throughout his life he manifested a most gracious spirit, and his ministry was a rich blessing to thousands across the nation. He served as a member of the General Board for 24 years; 12 years of this period he filled the place of Second Assistant General Superintendent.

Brother Wilson entered his reward on August 15, 1956. Funeral services were conducted in the Albany Church, August 18.

He was a good man and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith. Rev. A. H. Wilson is gone, but he has left the world richer for having been here. May the memory of this great and godly man serve to challenge all of us to a closer walk with God.

Journal of Proceedings

Opening Sitting - July 8, 1957, 2:00 p.m.

The Thirty-sixth Annual Conference of the New York District convened at 2:00 p.m., July 8, 1957, on the Victory Grove Camp Ground.

Rev. Kendall Straight opened the session with the singing of, "He Keeps Me Singing," accompanied at the piano by Ruth Hobart. Rev. H. L. Twining led in prayer.

Our District Superintendent welcomed those present and spoke on behalf of the mighty manifestation of God's Spirit and the many souls saved in the Camp. A desire was expressed that the very atmosphere which prevailed in the previous ten days might be injected into the proceedings.

Rev. Melvin Snyder, First Assistant General Superintendent, was introduced as the acting chairman for the Conference. His introductory remarks revealed to us his recent experiences in a Youth Camp which seemingly highlighted his ministry. He read from St. John 16:5-15 and based his message around the text: "When he is come." 'The need of the hour is a people fully possessed of the Holy Spirit. God has always used just ordinary people to accomplish His work. A seven-fold outline portrays what His coming means:

- 1. An Eternal Companion.
- 4. A Life of Answered Prayer.
- 2. An Abundant Life.
- 5 A Fathomless Peace.6 An Unanswerable Testimony

3. Unerring Teacher.

7. Miraculous Accomplishment.

We believe at the close of this masterpiece, a foretaste of His glory and shekinah rested on the hearers. We stood to our feet as Brother Snyder closed in prayer.

The Roll Call was given.

The District Superintendent's splendid and factual report was read and a motion was passed to receive it with deep appreciation.

The Assistant District Superintendent's report was given and a motion was made to receive this oral report. Carried.

Rev. J. N. Jump, District Treasurer, gave the following reports of: District Treasurer, Pilgrim Pension Plan, and Church Extension. These reports were received by motion.

The following friends were introduced to the Conference:

Rev. William Wood; Rev. Bobbie Bidwel!, Penna.-N.J. Dist.; Rev. Arnold Brown, Cambridge, Mass.; Irvine Wickham, Ass't. Supt. of Barbados; Rev. Randolph Holder, British Guiana; Rev. William Thurston; Rev. and Mrs. Melvin Lockard: Rev. and Mrs. V. G Kattone; Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Yauger; Rev. and Mrs. Earl Thompson of the Holiness Movement of Watertown and Doctor Russell Gunsalus, President of E.P.C.

Motion made and seconded to give these an honorary seat in the bar. Carried.

Prior to the convention, a lovely bouquet of flowers had been placed in the tabernacle by Sister Wilson in memory of her husband. At this time due respect was paid to this deceased warrior of the cross and the congregation stood with bowed heads as Bro. Snyder prayed a very appropriate prayer for our beloved Rev. A. H. Wilson.

We received the limited report of the Auditing Committee relative to the following reports:

District Treasurer's Report

Church Extension Treasurer's Report

Binghamton Camp Treasurer's Report

Secretary and Treasurer of Foreign Mission's Report

It was moved to accept these reports. Carried.

A splendid and efficient report was given by Sister Stuart on behalf of our yearly giving to missions.

With real delight the Conference received the Northville Church formally into the New York District. The song, "Blest Be The Tie That Binds" was sung as the Northville pastor, wife and delegate stood in the foreground.

The District Statistician's report was received with a request from the chairman that we obtain accurate report of membership. Bro. Snyder spoke to us concerning reception of members and our negligence as Pilgrims along this line.

We adjourned by expiration of time.

Second Sitting — July 8, 1957, 7:00 p.m.

The second sitting opened with the song "Take the Name of Jesus With You," led by Rev. J. N. Jump. Rev. William K. George prayed, followed by inspiring testimonies from Sister Miller and Sister Mac-Fadgen.

Brother Snyder presented to the Conference the President of E.P.C., the Second Assistant General Supt., Doctor Russell Gunsalus. His message, only too brief but stimulating, appraised our beloved church and incited our continual support for the school. After admonishing us for our prayers we sang "Near the Cross" before entering into business.

The minutes were read and accepted with corrections.

We proceeded to establish the Conference bar. The motion was made and seconded that the bar constitute two center sections and the first five seats on each side. Motion carried. Consequently, this will replace a former standing motion.

The Binghamton Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. A. J. Whitney and accepted.

The Secretary read an excellent report from Sister Mary Conklin, editor of the Pilgrim News. By motion the report was accepted.

The Secretary of the Resolution Committee presented a resolution relative to the place of the Ministerial Convention being determined by the Conference instead of the District Council. Motion adopted.

The District Secretary proceeded with reports from our missionaries. It was a privilege to have Bro. and Sis. George Gilmore with us to read personally their own report. They have given thirteen years of foreign service for God's glory and the progress of our church. By their testimonies they would have liked "one more life for Africa." The other letters were from John Blann, Grace Robinson and Beatrice Dodge. These were all accepted with a hearty Amen.

The Victory Grove Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Garry Boel and accepted.

The District Trustee's report was read by Rev. O. W. Lawrence and accepted.

The motion prevailed that the secretary be instructed to reply to each missionary letter.

The motion was made, seconded and carried that we have a conference picture taken.

The motion was made and seconded that we as a Conference authorize the Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions to send Bro. John Blann \$100 from the Unspecified Funds. An amendment was made to the main motion that we take up a love offering at this present sitting and what was lacking of \$100 would be made up from the unspecified funds. Motion carried.

An offering was received amounting to \$105.60.

The motion of adjournment prevailed that work might be done by the Council and Committees.

Third Sitting - July 9, 1957, 9:00 a.m.

The third sitting of the 1957 Conference convened with Bro. Boel leading in the song, "Saviour, Like a Shepherd Lead Us," accompanied at the piano by Sister Miller and at the organ by Bro. Elwood Stuart. Bro. Snyder spoke briefly with appropriat∈ illustration exalting God's protection over His children.

We settled down for business and by motion dispensed with the roll call.

The minutes were read and approved.

The Vermontville Camp Treasurer's report was given by Rev. Wm. Fred McCully and accepted.

'The Young People's Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Leonard Lum and accepted.

Our District Superintendent spoke in appreciation to the young people for their effort and sacrifice in presenting to Victory Grove Camp efficient lighting facilities, and for Bro. Lamb's willingness to install the same.

Bro. Fay further spoke in behalf of the physical condition of Bro. Hosier at Chittenango and requested our prayers and support, also of the sacrificial endeavors of Bro. and Sis. Hunting at Pittsfield. The idea was intimated that perhaps the young people could help in some project relative to the Home Missionary Department in the District.

The motion was made and seconded that we as a Conference express our appreciation to the youth of the Central Zone and for Bro. Lamb for the wiring on the Victory Grove Camp Ground. Motion carried.

The Auditor's report was read in full by the Secretary and accepted.

Resolution number two in reference to the extension of the curfew hour at our camps was adopted.

Resolution number three in regards to television was amended by inserting "being opposed to the presence of television in the homes of our members." After much discussion the previous question was called for and seconded. The amendment to the main motion was passed. After further clarification of the main motion, the previous question was called for and carried.

Deliberation on vital issues continued. We were called to prayer and the one whom John said, "He helpeth our infirmities," met our hearts; the spirit of the camp again was prevalent with intermittance of song and testimony.

By expiration of time we closed the morning sitting with hearty Amens.

Fourth Sitting - July 9, 1957, 2:00 p.m.

The fourth sitting was called to order in song, "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus," led by Wm. Fred McCulley. Rev. A. E. Blann prayed. For our devotional period, verses were quoted from the Holy Writ.

The secretary read the minutes of the morning sitting and they were approved by motion.

The Resolution Committee presented the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 4 was passed involving the publication of a calendar of District events in the Pilgrim News.

Resolution No. 5 regarding pastors paying a fee because of their failure to appear at their zone camps during work week was lost.

Resolution No. 6 regarding television in the homes of E.P.C. faculty members was carried.

The Ways and Means Committee brought three resolutions before the Conference:

Resolution No. $1 \le a$ carried as to the churches making a financial contribution for the new rest rooms.

"Be It Resolved that the Secretary write to the churches who have not yet contributed to building of rest rooms, that these churches take an offering for the same."

Resolution No. 2 regarding assistance toward the defraying of expenses of the delegates to General Conference. This was carried.

Resolution No. 3 related to raising an offering for the traveling expenses of the delegates to Genral Conference. This was carried.

The Committee on Memorials submitted three items:

Memorial No. 1: in regards to changing the age limit of assessable members was carried.

Memorial No. 2 as to the revision of our Church Hymnal was carried.

Memorial No. 3 as to the initial call of a pastor to a local church was carried.

The District Secretary presented the following recommendations of the Council:

Ordained Ministers: William Thurston, V. G. Gattone.

Licensed Minister: Melvin Lockard.

Song Evangelist Certificate: Elwood and Joan Stuart.

These recommendations were heartily received by the Conference.

Wesleyan Church ARCHIVES The motion was made and seconded that we proceed to the election of officers. Motion carried. During a slight delay, Bro. and Sis. Elwood Stuart favored us graciously with song.

The following tellers were appointed by Bro. Fay:

Benjamin Rickenbach, Jr., Francis Richmond, Paul Phillippe, Joseph Hunting, Earle Wilson, William McCulley.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Dist. Supt. Rev. M. E. Pierpoint was declared elected receiving 62 votes out of 76

The District Secretary read nominations for District Secretary. After balloting Rev. A. J. Whitney was reelected with 69 out of 79 votes cast.

Two names were submitted for nomination of District Treasurer. Rev. J. N. Jump retained his office with 67 out of 76 votes.

Ballots were prepared for the three Advisory members of the Council. A ten minute recess was called for by the chairman.

At the reassembling, we sang, "Down At the Cross."

The secretary gave the report that three men had been elected on the first ballot for the Advisory Board: H. L. Twining, Lloyd Stuart and O. W. Lawrence.

The motion was made and seconded that the council act in capacity of the Board of education. Carried.

An election relative to replacing a member on the Board of Trustees for a three year term resulted in Rev. George Lamb being elected.

A single nomination by motion that nominations be closed reinstated Sister Marjorie Stuart as Secretary-Treasurer of our District Foreign Missions.

The Conference proceeded to elect seven ordained ministers as delegates to the General Conference.

The motion was made and seconded that we use the plurality vote in deciding on the delegates and alternates. Motion carried.

The brief time before adjournment was spent in securing the names of those desiring the Conference picture.

Fifth Sitting - July 9, 1957, 7:00 p.m.

The last sitting of the Conference convened with Sister Hoffman at the piano and Bro. Rickenbach leading us in song. Bro. Richmond led us to the throne of grace.

Bro. Snyder spoke briefly as to our great responsibility as a church and especially to the ministers in reaching the multitudes and presenting Christ to them. He reminded us of the great commission, "Go ye into all the world." After declaring that the people of God need a real awakening, he presented to us some literature the Forward Movement Committee has compiled for this purpose.

The minutes of the last sitting were read and accepted by motion.

The Secretary read the result of the election regarding the Ministerial Delegation who would be attending General Conference. The following were elected on the first ballot: Rev. Lloyd Stuart, Rev. H. L. Twining, Rev. James Payne, Rev. O. W. Lawrence, Rev. Carl Hall and Rev. Benjamin Rickenbach. Ballots were cast for the two that were tied for seventh place, Bro. Bidwell and Bro. Boel. Rev. Billie Bidwell was elected.

The following were declared as alternates using the plurality vote method: Rev. Garry Boel, Rev. Joseph Hunting, Rev. Fred McCulley, Rev. Paul Phillippe, Rev. William George.

The nominations for lay delegates were read by the secretary.

Election continued and the following were chosen on the first ballot: Floyd Conklin, Delbert Hollenbeck, and Lawrence Wilson.

An ordination service followed at which time Paul S. Phillippe was ordained to the ministry. The service was very impressive and blessed of God. Rev. Melvin Snyder delivered the charge from I Timothy 4:16.

The committee on Memorials presented a memorial which pertained to deleting section 93, parag. 15 from the manual and amending section 92 in reference to the date of each Annual Conference.

Memorial number 5 which related to adding the word television to our Church covenant was carried.

A Memoir of Rev. Albert H. Wilson was read by the District Secretary.

A motion was put into effect that Bro. Wilson's picture would appear in the District minutes.

By motion of the Conference, the time of adjournment was extended till all business was concluded.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Bro. Stuart, spoke briefly and gave awards to the church with highest numerical gain, Syracuse, and to the one with the highest percentage gain, Massena.

The motion was made and seconded that the council was to give directive to the secretary in regards to printing the minutes.

The Conference accepted by acclamation an invitation to Brushton for the 1958 Ministerial Convention.

The motion was made and seconded that we raise the District Superintendent's salary to \$4200 a year. Carried.

A motion prevailed to authorize the council to take care of all unfinished business and approve the minutes of the last sitting.

The Secretary of The Resolution Committee presented its final resolution which was accepted in deep appreciation by a standing vote of the delegation. "Be it resolved that we now express our appreciation to our First Assistant General Superintendent, the Rev. Melvin Snyder, for his magnanimous spirit and kindly chairmanship and for his splendid messages; to the District Council, committees, and officers for their faithful labors; the kitchen and ground help for all their services; by a rising vote of thanks."

A disposition of gratitude was displayed as a love offering was received for our presiding officer, Bro. Snyder.

Time was allotted for our three West Indian brethren to give glowing notes of victory.

Rev. Rancolph Holder of British Guiana, dismissed in triumphant prayer the 1957 sitting of the New York Conference.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

Finance

No. 1 Resolver that each church sending a delegate or delegates to the District Conference, pay the traveling expenses of said delegates and pastor.

No. 2 Resolved, that when the District Council deems any licensed minister unable to meet the expense of taking the study course as directed in Education Resolution No. 2, they may pay all or part of the cost of such course. The Licensee in such case shall agree to finish a year of such course in the Conference year.

No. 3. Resolved, that when money is sent direct to any fund, the church treasurer shall obtain a receipt for same and forward this to each District Representative.

No. 4. Resolved, that all departments of our church shall, upon receipt of monies, immediately forward receipts for same to sender.

No. 5. Resolved, that the District Treasurer shall maintain two funds, to be known as the District Expense Fund and The Church Extension Fund.

The ministers and workers of the District shall pay all their tithe into the church where they hold membership.

Each month the local church shall forward to the District Treasurer, the pastor's tithe and 50 per cent of the other ministerial member's tithe. These amounts shall be specified for the District Expense Fund.

The District Church Extension Fund shall be provided for by an assessment of \$1.50 per member. This money shall be forwarded by the local treasurer to the District Treasurer, specified for the Church Extension Fund. Resolved that we insert in our minutes the Memorial on General Budget, adopted by the General conference of 1954 as follows:

"There shall be an annual General Budget of \$6.00 per member per year: Foreign Missions 35 per cent; Administration 25 per cent, Church Extension, 20 per cent, Church Extension Loan Fund 6 per cent, Senior College, 10 per cent, Sunday School and Youth 4 per cent, this budget to be raised monthly.

It shall be the responsibility of the pastor and the church board to see that their church raises its portion of the "General Budget," and shall be raised monthly, and that our Treasurer of Foreign Missions be instructed to forward to the District Treasurer an amount equal to \$2.10 per member commensurate with the Memorial on General Budget.

No. 6: Resolved, that in order to receive due credit in the current year, any church must have all money in the mail on or before June 5. The District Treasurer shall keep his books open until June 10, so that proper credit may be given for monies mailed on or before June 5. All monies mailed after June 5, shall be entered in the following year.

No. 7. Resolved, that we as a district, continue the system of contributing to the Eastern Pilgrim College the equivalent of 25 cents a month per member; said funds to be paid through the District Treasurer, and that we request the co-operation of the School in sending each year a representative to each church to assist in raising our financial quota. This plan to continue for four years, or until 1958.

No. 8. Resolved, that the District Superintendent's support shall be as follows:

Salary, \$350.00 per month; Travel expenses, Six cents per mile by automobile, and actual expense by train or bus; In addition, the District shall provide a parsonage furnished with telephone, electricity, gas, heat and water.

No. 9. Resolved, that the District Superintendent push the Pilgrim Pension Plan and encourage every pastor to join. In cases where it is determined by the District Council that payment of such dues would cause undue hardship for the pastor and church, said dues shall be paid by the District out of the District Expense Fund.

No. 10. Resolved, that the District Superintendent be granted an annual vacation of two weeks each year with pay.

No. 11. In order to create a sustained interest in and support for District Home Missions and Church Extension, we recommend and urge each church to set apart one prayer meeting night each month at which time earnest prayer shall be made for District Home Missions and an offering to be taken for the same and forwarded to our District Treasurer. This is to be in addition to our regular yearly assessment of \$1.50 per member.

No. 12. Resolved, that those driving to work on our Camp Grounds or otherwise using their cars in the interests of the District shall receive six cents per mile for the use of their car.

No. 13. Be it resolved that when deemed advisable by both Pastor and the District Superintendent that an offering be received by the District Superintendent at the time of his regular visit for the purpose of assisting the local church in meeting its budget or for the purpose of District Church Extension.

No. 14. Be it resolved that adequate liability insurance be secured for the protection of the public and personnel involved in all activities on our camp grounds.

No. 15. Be it resolved that each church be required to send an offering each year to help defray the expense of Conference.

No. 16. Inasmuch as we are encouraged and admonished to move forward in the New York District; Be it resolved that each Zone Camp set apart one service of their respective camp for a special Home Missionary Rally at which time an offering be taken for the support of present and future Home Missionary projects.

No. 17. Be it resolved that in keeping with Resolution no. 11 and whereas there will be a debt of near \$3,000 on the District Home Missionary Parsonage, BE IT RESOLVED that the Dist. Supt. in his first visit to the churches speak of the project and that the churches respond at that time with an offering for this Dist. Extension work.

No. 18. Whereas in former years there was an offering taken by churches for delegates' expense to General Conference, BE IT RESOLV-

ED the churches of the District take an offering equivalent to \$.50 per member during this fiscal year.

EDUCATION

No. 1. Resolved that all of our local churches shall open their doors annually to the representatives of the Eastern Pilgrim College, and be it further resolved that at such times an offering shall be taken for the maintenance of the School, liquidation of debt, and new facilities. In arranging for such visits the administration shall co-operate with both the district and local officers.

No. 2 Inasnuch as Eastern Pilgrim College provides correspondence courses for ministerial students, be it resolved that all our workers desiring license to preach or ordination be required to take such course, and that the Board of Education be governed in its recommendations for license to preach or ordination by a report from the Bible College upon the work done by the applicant; provided, however, that due credit, may be given by the Board, at its discretion, to said applicants, for any equivalent work done in any other school acceptable to it.

MISCELLANEOUS

No. 1. Resolved, that no properties such as churches, parsonages, or other buildings or land shall be sold of any of our incorporate churches without first conferring with the trustees of the district corporation.

No. 2. Resolved that section 16 of article 2 of the religious corporation law be enforced in our district in regard to churches who have discontinued holding services and where there are less than 7 resident attending members.

That such temporalities and property be managed by the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Inc., our ecclesiastical governing body, or may, in pursuance of the provisions of law relating to the disposition of real property by religious corporations, sell or dispose of the same, and apply the proceeds thereof to any of the purposes to which the property of such governing religious body is devoted, and shall not divert such property to any other object.

In no case shall property be sold or disposed of to support the preacher who may claim this as an out appointment.

Due notice shall be given by the District Secretary, regarding the action of the District Assembly in declaring a church extinct, within thirty days to the remaining members, if any.

No. 3. Resolved, that inasmuch as the resolutions contain matters of vital importance to our lay members and inasmuch as not everyone reads the resolutions, we recommend that our pastors read the resolutions before the church as soon as possible after the distribution of the minutes.

No. 4. Resolved, that we, the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, place ourselves on record as being unalterably opposed to, and deplore the present sale and use of intoxicating beverages throughout the nation, and furthermore we advise and strongly urge our people not to encourage the sale and use of said liquors by patronizing such places where these intoxicating liquors are sold.

No. 5. Inasmuch as our Manual declares itself against the wearing of jewelry; be it resolved, that none of our preachers shall use the ring ceremony in marriages, or in any way encourage the use of it. Any minster who uses such ceremony shall be dealt with by the District Council

No. 6. Resolved, that all reports regularly sent to the District Statistician be in his hands by June 15 and that all books and records that are to be audited shall be sent to the chairman of the Auditing Committee by June 15.

No. 7. Resolved, that each Pastor be required to attend his or her Zone Camp and to remain over at least one Sunday.

No. 8. In view of tendencies detrimental to the spiritual effort of our camp meetings, we recommend that the fellowing rule be adopted for all our camps. All persons resident on the grounds shall respect a curfew hour of ten-thirty o'clock and lights shall be out by eleven p.m. with due exceptions to be made for any person engaged in legitimate camp meeting activities.

No. 9. Resolved, that the telephone numbers of the ministers be published annually in the Minutes and that the address of the church also be published.

No. 10. Resolved, that following the election of officers, the District Superintendent shall appoint the committees which are to function under the District Council for the ensuing year.

No. 11. RESOLVED that a District Ministerial Convention be held each year on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the second week in April except when the second week in April is Holy Week, in which case the date of the Convention shall be set by the District Council. The place of the convention shall always be determined by the District Conference.

No. 12. RESOLVED, that the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is opposed to divorce and remarriage and that all persons who are divorced and remarried, except to be remarried to the one from whom they have been divorced, providing, they have not taken another, be denied membership in said church.

No. 13. Resolved, that each pastor be given freedom to hold at least two revivals each conference year.

No. 14. INASMUCH as the heavy burden of cleaning up our Camp grounds often falls upon only a few individuals, BE IT RESOLVED that the preachers in each Camp Zone shall be notified in advance of cleanup day by one of the officials of the camp, and that each one thus notified shall be expected to give assistance to the task if at all possible. This applies to Vermontville Camp in the North; Victory Grove in the Central Zone; and Binghamton Camp in the South.

No. 15. RESOLVED that the two center sections of seats together with the first five seats of each side in the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

No. 16. RESOLVED, that the time of the business sessions of our

District Conference be fixed as follows: From 9:00 A. M. to 12:00 noon, From 2:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M.; From 7:00 P. M. to 10:00 P. M.

No. 17. RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be given freedom to conduct two revivals outside the District each Conference year, and that he be permitted to keep all proceeds from the same.

No. 18. RESOLVED, that the District Superintendent be required to meet with each local church board at least once each Conference year.

No. 19. We recommend that each local church in as far as possible, give their pastor two weeks vacation over one Sunday with pay.

No. 20. RESOLVED, that in each of our churches a pastoral recall meeting shall be held each year not later than the third week in April.

No. 21. Resolved, that the monthly Sunday School report in THE PILGRIM NEWS follow the General Secretary's form, tabulating (1) The average attendance of last Conference year as reported in the Conference Minutes; (2) The average attendance to date this Conference year; (3) The average attendance this month; (4) The average attendance for the same month last year.

The monthly report shall be submitted to the Editor of THE PIL-GRIM NEWS by the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

No. 22. INASMUCH as the time at which our annual Conference begins necessitates that many of our preachers and delegates drive on Sunday in order to be present for the opening session, BE IT RESOLVED, that the opening session of Conference be held at 2:00 P.M. on the Monday following Victory Grove Camp, and that it continue until the following Wednesday.

No. 23. Inasmuch as there is a marked disregard for the Lord's Day, and the Scripture admonished us to keep it holy by doing no worldly business in it, BE IT RESOLVED that a contribution box be left for a free will offering at the exit of the dining halls of our camps and let said free-will offering box be properly marked and left unattended.

No. 24. Resolved that the Labor Day Youth Rally at Victory Grove be a district youth rally at which time the district youth leaders will be elected, for the coming year.

No. 25. RESOLVED, that each dormitory in our Camp grounds shall have at least one resident responsible person in charge to maintain order during Camp and Conference.

No. 26. BE IT RESOLVED that a zone treasurer and secretary be appointed along with the zone leader which will constitute a committee responsible for the youth activity of each zone.

Be it further resolved that the District Yonug People's Executive Secretary be requested to urge the organization of local societies.

No. 27. BE IT RESOLVED that a drive be made in each of our churches to make the number of Advocate subscriptions equal to the church membership, and that each pastor shall report to the next Conference concerning his progress in the Advocate campaign.

No. 28. BE IT RESOLVED that the District Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions be made an honorary member of the Conference with voice and vote in the same. No. 29. BE IT RESOLVED that the Editing Committee have the power to delete from the Minutes all obsolete resolutions subject to the approval of the District Council.

No. 30. Resolved that the treasurers of the respective camp meetings shall, within a month of the closing date of each camp, forward to the pastor (or treasurer, if known) of the churches concerning either the pledge cards themselves, or a list showing: name of pledger, amount pledged, and project for which pledged.

No. 31. Resolved that each zone conduct a Sunday School Convention within the Conference year, and be it further resolved that the District Sunday School Board be responsible for arranging such conventions.

No. 32. Resolved, that no delegate shall be seated by the Conference to represent any church if that church has failed to duly elect a delegate.

No. 33. Resolved, that a speed limit of eight miles per hour be enforced on all our camp grounds, and that signs to this effect be placed at all entrances, and be it further resolved that bicycle riding on the grounds be prohibited during camp.

No. 34. Resolved that the starting date of the Binghamton Camp shall be the first Thursday of August.

No. 35. Resolved that each zone sponsor a youth camp to be held on the zone camp-grounds, at a time convenient to the respective zone, to be under jurisdiction of the zone youth leader and committee, in conjunction with the District Youth Executive and the District Superintendent.

No. 36. Resolved that each church shall upon the election of its delegate to the District Conference, forward a written notice of the same to the District Secretary.

No. 37. The Resolution Committee recommends that in the appointing of officers for the four zones into which our District is divided relative to our Young People's Societies, that the chairman of each zone be selected from our pastors and the other officers of each organization be from the lay members.

No. 38. Resolved that a new District Young People's Zone be established to be known as the Western Zone, which shall be composed of the following churches, Utica, Syracuse and Chittenango.

No. 39. Resolved that each Sunday school in the district close the Sunday school attendance records one half hour after the beginning of the said school.

No. 40. BE IT RESOLVED that the editor of the Pilgrim News receive from the District Secretary a calendar of District events to be published at least one month in advance of dates set for each event.

No. 41. Resolved, that this District go on record as being opposed to the presence of television in the homes of our members and that we urge every preacher to not only warn his people against its evils, but also to set an example by not allowing it in his home. Any preacher permitting a set in his home shall be subject to action by the District Council. No. 42. BE IT RESOLVED that this Conference go on record as being opposed to television being in the homes of the members on the faculty of Eastern Pilgrim College.

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MEMORIALS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

Memorial No. 1:

Be it resolved that Section 39, parag. 2 of the Pilgrim Holiness Manual be amended by striking out the number 14 and substituting the number 16 in its place.

Memorial No. 2:

Be it resolved that the Executive Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church with proper regard for sectional representation appoint a Hymnal revision Committee with authority to revise and re-edit our present hymnal and that this work begin immediately. Memorial No. 3:

Be it resolved that Section 53, parag. 1 of the Pilgrim Holiness Manual be amended by striking out the words "of voting age, these shall," with the punctuation, and adding in their place the word "voting." Memorial No. 4:

Be it resolved that section 93, parag. 15 be deleted from the manual of the Pilgrim Holmess Church and be it further resolved that section 92, parag. 2 be amended to read: The date of each annual conference shall be fixed by each District Council so as to make possible the attendance of the presiding General Official and at least 60 days notice of the date fixed shall be given by the District Secretary to each local church in such district.

Memorial No. 5:

Be it resolved that Section 30, parag. 10 be amended to read "to avoid world amusements, such as dances, shows, television, theatres, horse races, promiscuous bathing and all games and places where gambling is indulged in."

District Superintendent's Report

Christian greetings to this thirty-sixth annual conference of the New York District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude to God for His overshadowing mercies, in the year now past, that I present this annual report.

"It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing praises unto thy name, O most high. To show forth thy loving kindness in the morning, and thy faithfulness every night." Psalms 92:1, 2.

And so, first to God and then to His people, and also to the ministers of the District and members of the District Council I wish to express my appreciation. May Christ richly bless those who have stood by in battle, either by going forth to war or by standing by the stuff. The Christian art of holding the ropes in the shadow of a wall while others are released to conquest is deserving of praise.

TRIUMPH AND TRAGEDY

It is superfluous and perhaps ridiculous for me to call attention to the dangers of our times. No amount of words will serve to make facts real beyond our grasp and understanding of true values. But the Bible does clearly state that the church ever faces peril This fact is never new; it only becomes more apparent as we near the end of time. Lack of genuine love; seeing through eyes filled with the sands of time and thus measuring spiritual riches by sixteen worldly ounces to our ambitious pounds; soul lethargy in the midst of abounding activity which leaves us paupers in God's sight and rich in our own; all of this and more is increasingly true in these days. This is tragedy. But here, and in this vein we must not form the whole philosophy of religious thinking. It is true that Irael spent four-hundred years in bondage and servitude, but this is not their whole history. There came a day, finally, when Jordan parted, and Israel found themselves in the land of promise. This was triumph. It will ever be the same with the church of Jesus Christ, Shock and disappointment and failure, and yet success; the crest of triumph, the trough of failure; human hands that stain, but then the Divine touch; first the furnace, then the throne. One day a terrible and final death that shook the church, but the following day a resurrection that rocked This is triumph. For two thousand years the church of the world. Christ has been a small army trudging its way through raging seas of tempest-driven disorder and confusion, but a final day will yet dawn when all the host of hell must stack their arms in final surrender. We lift our eyes to the hills in the faith that finally, but surely, the great results of Calvary will bloom forever.

PROGRESS

This item cannot be properly dealt with without consideration, first of all, to our devoutness. Are we more spiritual? Are we a holy people whose love for God and His people has grown? Are we holding up the standards of the church and being true to our heritage? Are we having some influence on the world, or is the world influencing us? What are our soul riches? These are questions we should answer before we decide our progress.

Materially we have made some gains which are worthy of note.

The Albany congregation has completed a most beautiful place of worship, which is second to none in our District.

Grand Gorge is in the process of building a new church.

Schenectady is now worshiping in their new auditorium.

The Binghamton church has purchased a beautiful new organ.

The church at Ogdensburg has seated its auditorium with new pews.

The steeple, which had to be taken down because of decay, has been replaced on the church at Rockwood.

Russell is making progress in the building of a new church.

Ravena has replaced their organ with a new Hammond.

We give a hearty welcome to the people who saw fit to join the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Northville. These people have stood by our District for many years, but have now decided to be a part of our membership. God bless them.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

In submitting this financial statement I desire to give proper credit to our people for the way they have supported the General Church and Eastern Pilgrim College. Our faithfulness in this respect is reflected by the following:

I think it is a very definite mark of faithfulness to the Pilgrim Holiness Church that we should be so willing to support its institutions. I believe the attitude is firmly convincing when we consider the fact that we are the only district in the entire Pilgrim Holiness Church that has paid its budget.

For the sake of bringing before us something of the financial structure of the church, I would like to call attention to the danger of this building becoming top heavy. It isn't with any sense of insubordination to the General Church that I call attention to the following, but rather it is that I am asking for the privilege of hollering "Ouch!"

Besides the Foreign Missionary offerings taken during the year, we are asked, and in the most part, respond to the following:

1. Easter Offering for General Home Missions, and from this same department the Helping Hand Fellowship, and also pledge offerings.

2. We have the Christmas offering for aged ministers.

3. Rally Day offering for Sunday School and Youth.

4. Operation Missio.

5. Forward Movement offering.

6. The School has the Laymen's Fellowship, which has made considerable contribution to the Eastern Pilgrim College. The

School also has the Share campaign, and the 100 Club.

We must keep in mind that all of these offerings are over and above the budget. Now I don't mean to be critical in this report, but I do desire to present the fact that our financial load is cause for embarrassment. When I realize that most of our churches are carrying this heavy load, I cannot feel free to ask too much for our own New York District. Perhaps this is failure on my part more than anything else, but I am somewhat troubled over what I consider a lack of District-mindedness. For example, of what I consider a lack of District-mindedness, let me call attention to just three items.

First, let's consider the work week at our camps. Some years ago, as I remember it, we had a work week at Binghamton and also at Victory Grove, and each pastor was expected to give a week to each camp, and for the most part they did this. Men would arrive on Monday, and the policy was to stay until Friday noon. It was for the contribution of work that the pastors and their families were entertained free during the camp. In fact, some years ago when the dormitories were built at Binghamton and the District Parsonage at Victory Grove, men came week after week. Not one cent was paid out for hired labor. I believe if we can arrange for revivals off our charge, and attending meetings of other kinds, we could, and should, plan with just as much interest to give a week of work to the camp of our respective zone. If your people ran off during revival, or just stayed at home, it would not be fair to the church. Faith without works was dead two thousand years ago; and, gentlemen, we should have more faithfulness to the work that needs to be done from year to year.
